A special mention for Máire Mac Suibhne book "Famine in Muskerry; an drochshaol:" an outline of conditions in the sixteen parishes of Macroom Poor Law Union during the Great Famine, 1845-1851", which is an invaluable source of local history during this time. Some of the other wonderful projects were based on The Dripsey Ambush, Spike Island, Bloody Sunday 1920, The Hungarian Revolution of 1956, The Foundation of the Hungarian State, and The Battle of Grunewald during the fifteenth century in Poland and the history of Bratislava Castle in Slovakia. The feedback from the students having completed the projects was very positive and they were quite surprised by how much they enjoyed researching and displaying their work.

Importance of Languages:

Transition years took part in a webinar promoting languages in school and beyond recently. The event was organised by the BITCI (Business in the Community Ireland) and Languages Connect, a panel of industry representatives (from Kerry Group, Met Life Insurance, SAP International Software) and a third level languages student from UCC spoke to the students about the importance of languages in their careers. Walk for Water 2022

As part of Lent this year the Religion Teachers of First- and Second-year classes in St. Mary's, agreed to involve their groups with a campaign of raising funds for building wells to access water for communities in semi-arid regions of Uganda and Kenya. Due to global warming, droughts which were experienced every ten years or so, are now seen as often as every two years and water can be a very scarce commodity.

This has very serious implications for the local communities, women and girls in particular, as they are the family members who traditionally fetch the water and who may have to walk for many kilometres to find clean potable water. This directly impacts their everyday lives, safety, schooling and education progression thereafter.

As part of World Water Day, we were invited by Aidlink, the charity we had connected with, to a live Webinar with the groups that Aidlink work with in the affected areas. All our second-year students attended this and we learned about the charity's work done in the last forty years, through presentations and question and answers sessions. Two days later, our first- and second-year students and their teachers embarked on a 5km "Walk for Water" as a symbolic gesture of empathy for students in those harsh African dry regions, with a goal of raising enough funds through sponsorship to build a shallow well, the girls were aiming to raise \in 1500.

The weather was fabulous on the day, and everyone enjoyed the beautiful Castle grounds by the Sullane river. Our Green school committee held a non-uniform day and other activities on the following Monday, and kindly donated their raised funds to Aidlink also. Overall, the school raised in excess of €1750 and had great fun in the process. Well done to Ms Maura Casey for organising this event.

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Continued Proposal of a Blueway boardwalk at the Gearagh

Eco-tourism, protection measures and moving forward with a possible development?

When empty muscle shells can often be seen. There was also evidence of water pollution at the site with oil evident on some bodies of water & a vast amount of dog excrement. In an interview with Kevin Corcoran, he stated that the 'swan pearls were an invasive species, not seen in the Gearagh before'. Native Fresh Water Pearls to the site discussed in an article by Dr William O' Connor, on Eco Fact News desk state that "The Freshwater Pearl Mussel Margaritifera margaritifera is a (freshwater) bivalve listed under Annex II and V of the EU Habitats Directive. It is legally protected in Ireland under Schedule 1 of the Wildlife Act (1976) (Protection of Wild Animals)." (O'Connor, 2015).

The fluctuating water levels and poor site management, lead me to the question, could development of a boardwalk (be it floating or fixed) of the site hinder or encourage preservation of the site?

In view of all that has been mentioned so far, a limitation observed from my study is the disparity between EU legislation and the implementation and maintenance of the Gearagh at national and local level. In an address to the Oireachtas on 29/09/2020, the then Deputy for Culture, Heritage, and the Gaeltacht, advised that "At the request of the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government, the Department's National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) completed and published detailed site-specific conservation objectives for the Gearagh SAC (000108) in September 2016. A management plan scoping exercise was undertaken by ESB International on behalf of the ESB (who are the main landowner) in 2016/2017. The NPWS took part in the stakeholder group that contributed to the report produced because of that exercise. "Owing to the constraints and exigencies arising from the Covid-19 pandemic, it has not been possible to pursue the matter further at this time. The Department will seek an update on progress in the coming weeks.". Investigation via online websites and resources and through a series of FOI requests and interviews, has determined, that there is no management plan in place to implement and maintain the legal requirements of conservation for the site. In an email with Jay Cornish, Conservation Ranger for the Mid-west Area he goes onto say "The ESB are currently writing up a management plan in line with the Conservation Objectives of the site so it may very well be worth getting in touch with them". The is an important issue for any future development of the Gearagh.

Presently, the ESB are operating without conservation objectives, as a result, they're'ensuring high levels of environmental management' are not being met. In an Interview, with Kevin Corcoran , who cited the recent European Action against the state for as proof of this. Given that the ESB's financial statements for "the year ended December 31st, 2018, reporting an operating profit before exceptional items of €455 million, profit after exceptional items, interest and tax of €60 million



and capital investment of \in 1.2 billion in long term electricity infrastructure. Despite challenging market conditions, which required ESB to reflect a \in 140 million exceptional non-cash impairment charge on generation assets.".

Despite the ESB's profits, there are no investment in erected signs at the site to show the public it is protected under EU directives, and Irish Law, there is also no signage again to inform potential entrants to the site that shooting of wildfowl and fishing of freshwater pearls are prohibited which would support their environmental management of the site.

Currently the ESB are working on implementing a management plan to ensure protective measures, it is necessary to have a plan in place to consider development of the site further for eco-tourism. Positively, research has shown that the ESB has ample resources at its disposal to fund or co-fund an eco-tourism development at the site. Involvement of the ESB at the development of the site, could be seen as a social responsibility coup from a social marketing and PR point of view and encourage a sense of 'giving back to the community' Following suit to this, this project explored how many visitors when contacted, Macroom/Blarney municipal district and Cork County Council were not able to provide tourism figures for the region (O'Neill, 2020).

In terms of developing a site which is SAC and SPA protected, my research identified that Sports Ireland required development and permission granted by the National Parks and Wildlife Service to proceed. An assessment of natural heritage would identify which sections of the proposed trail fall into these areas. It would also exclude activities which could be detrimental to the site (Sports Ireland, 2019).

Furthermore, Natura 2000 goes onto support funding opportunities for sites under the following ""It is therefore agreed that, in this exceptional case, a contribution by means of Community co-financing should be provided for within the limits of the resources made available under the Community's decisions" "land-use planning and development policies should encourage the management of features of the landscape which are of major importance for wild fauna and flora."

My research has shown overwhelmingly that development of recreational trails is of great benefit to the local economy, environment, community, and visitors (Sports Ireland, 2019). This was further bolstered by the success of a comparative study of the Acres Lake floating boardwalk (Leitrim

County Council & Waterways Ireland, 2017). The Acres Lake floating boardwalk 'is a prime example of how government funding can generate economic growth within rural communities.'

The primary aim of my initial proposal was to to explore the possibility of developing



an eco-tourism amenity for the Gearagh, which incorporates a floating boardwalk as the focal point to connect the main pathway to ancient alluvial woodland islands. Certainly development of the current pathway at the Gearagh would certainly benefit the site, the environment and community alike. Research showed that without an engineer's and NPWS report, it is not possible to advise on the suitability of a floating boardwalk at this stage and further work is required on this. Alternatives to a pontoon way could be explored such as timber frame walkways, boardwalks, greenways, and/or updating the current route.

The site would benefit from a counter, which would gather more accurate information on footfall figures. This would assist in giving accurate figures and could be utilised to support further development of the site.

More work needs to be done on finding a single cohesive proposition for the site. The core focus on any future proposition, I felt should include conservation, preservation, and education at its core. The creation of a development group, feasibility study and risk assessment need to be undertaken as part of the next stage.

Research showed that lack of a management plan by the state-run organization ESB, that the community were unable to develop the site further. The study also found that trails are highly beneficial and a value-add proposition and investment in the local economy. Given, the success of the Blueway development at Acres lake, the socio-economic benefit such a development could have on the local community of Macroom cannot be underestimated. Between 2018 and 2020 there was an increase of 38,995 people to the Acres Lake site, with 134, 511 people using the site in 2020 (Waterways Ireland ,

2019). Such a development in Macroom, would boost the local economy, lead to job creation, which in turn, would bring new awareness, understanding of a SAC, SPA, Natura 2000 and Ramsar site of National and European importance.

The research has indicated that the site is in a prime location, 40 minutes from Cork and Killarney and close to the wild Atlantic way and the Ring of Kerry. In a quote from Kevin Corcoran, in the film Rive Runner "If we refocus our attention on nature, everyone will benefit socially, financially and most importantly ecologically."

In the end I propose the site should be allowed proper, marrying the principles of its unique heritage, preservation, ecological importance with that of providing socio economic benefits to the region but to do so in a way that supports and sustains the environmental importance of the area. Is a floating plastic boardwalk the answer? I don't think so. Is a tarmacadam greenway the answer, I don't think so. Not all great trails need to be over developed.

Could a timber boardwalk along the fringes of the easterly side be the answer, perhaps? Could very basic improvements on access and signage make a big difference at low cost, immeditaely? 100% Could the westerly side of the SAC site up to toons bridge which is seeing some regeneration be protected further? 100%

Starting simply by improving signage and seating would be a great beginning. Signs could include not not limited to the socio cultural history of the site (imagery & stories of the people who lived there and their way of life), the environmental importance of the site (explaining the alluvial forest & why it was deforested) and also the unique bird, flora and fauna found there.

Ultimately, the Gearagh needs to be put back on the map. In the midst of our climate change crisis, we are sitting on the shores of Irelands most important natural river forest. Nurturing its regeneration is of national importance.

Surely, with the ESB's sizeable profits and national and local funding available, we could manage this much?

The Macroom and District Environmental Group Think Globally, Act locally

New Shoes. Do we really need any more?

Hi! Chris Barrett here talking about shoes! A traditional rule of elegant dressing recommends that people should own 7 pairs of shoes. Due to the weather and countryside we experience locally, I feel it is only fair that we in the Lee Valley, should be allowed to add wellingtons and walking boots to a list designed for 'elegant' living! So how many shoes do people own?

Reuters and Shopsmart did a poll and found out that an average woman owns 19 pairs of shoes. On average, a woman will purchase 4 new pairs of shoes a year, yet they tend to use only 4-5 regularly (Source: Daily Mail and Voucher Codes Pro.)

In addition, 43% of women reported having been at least moderately injured by shoes and 18% reported serious injuries like sprains or breaks due to shoes. (Source: Shop Mart Survey).

The average American man owns 12 pairs of shoes according to a survey, and the average British man owns 9.

Some teenagers own 8 pairs of trainers and at least 30% buy a new pair a month, according to another survey.

Whether these figures are true for Ireland is unclear, but two facts stood out for me. Firstly, most people are likely to own more shoes than they can regularly wear, and secondly, at a time when we are looking at higher prices, a huge amount is being spent on shoes which might not always be needed.

It is possible to prolong the life of shoes and some advice people were aware of in the past, has been forgotten. For example, leather shoes should rest between each wear to prolong their life, and it is best not to wear the same shoes two days in a row. Leather is organic and dynamic and is sensitive to the environment, humidity and pollution..just like us!

Readers may not be aware that brogues came from Northern Ireland, and reflected the local needs. They were originally made from several pieces of leather, with the perforations (brogueing), allowing the rain and mud to drain away.

So with these thoughts in my mind, I wanted to know what to do if my favourite most comfy shoes

looked as if they were reaching the end of their life. I decided to speak with Olan Buckley.

Olan owns The Shoe Repair Shop in The Shopping Mall, South Square, Macroom.

Olan tells me a little about how he got started in the shoe repair business. At the age of 16 he went to work in Roche's Stores and there he spend 12 years learning how to repair shoes. He and his father then opened their own shop in Bandon and he also worked in Cork before opening up in Macroom 36 years ago. Some readers may remember that he was initially based in Castle St and moved to The Square before moving to The Shopping Mall when it was built.

Olan feels that in the past, more people were in the habit of repairing their shoes and that shoes tended to last longer because they were made of a better quality leather. Nowadays it seems that manufacturers respond to consumer wishes by prioritising style over quality. The result of this is that shoes don't last as well as they used to.

Olan tells me it is important to shop for shoes with awareness.

Ensure you get a rubber or leather sole. There are a lot of plastic soles being sold currently and these crack very easily. He advises you to check the sole particularly because even if a shoe has very fine uppers it may still have a plastic sole which means that the shoe will not last.

You should always make sure you have a perfect fit. Some people suggest shoe-shopping in the afternoon, as by then your feet are likely to be at their most swollen. A small bit of space is best to avoid the tightness that can cause blisters, bunions, or poor gait. And of course if you buy heels you should be able to balance easily in them. Some research has pointed to long-lasting knee and other problems being caused by consitent use of high heels.

If you have somehow managed to buy a pair of shoes that are slightly tight, Olan may be able to stretch them for you to a perfect fit with his 'stretcher' machine, but it is not always possible to do this if you bought shoes that were far too tight initially.

A piece of advice Olan gives, to stop shoes

cracking, is to use polish on leather shoes, and cream on patent leather.

Olan stocks 'Dobbin', for walking boots . This is rubbed on with a brush and not only stops the boots cracking, but also makes them waterproof. If people have much-loved well-worn comfortable shoes, he might be able to save them for you, by replacing leather, rubber or plastic soles. He could also replace Ladies' and Gent's heels. All these actions would extend the life of much-loved shoes and would also be a huge financial saving.

Olan sells such things as laces, and fleecy insoles which help to provide warmth and comfort.

Readers may not know that if a favourite handbag needs a new zip, strap or restretching, then Olan may well be able to help them out.

Olan fixes belts too. He is able to mend or replace a buckcle and although it is easier to punch holes to make a belt longer or shorter, he has on occasions added a piece of leather to a man's belt to make it bigger. He can punch holes into a handbag strap to adjust the length for convenience and he can also help by adding a new zip or strap to a handbag or repair it with restitching. Fasteners can be added to open leather or cloth bags for security.

Olan finds yougsters will get heels etc fixed just before parties, and if you bring a pair of shoes to be reheeled or resoled, and if he is not too busy, you could pick them up after you had done your shopping.

He tells me that he has regular customers who have come to his

shop regularly over the last few decades, and I am not surprised.

I noticed during my time with Olan, that he always took time to chat and advise his customers.

What a wonderful service he offers!

People power in West Cork communities

For Caroline Corkery of Rusheen Community Group, meeting up with fellow volunteers every month to clean up the area isn't a chore.

"It's a good sense of community, while we're working, we're having a laugh. We've a lot done but a lot to do as well," she explains.

The group of up to 25 volunteers meet every month to roll up their sleeves, clean, weed, and make sure areas are well kept.

"It's a lot of cleaning, making the place nice. We built a beautiful stone wall and do general clean up and make the area look a bit better."

The group has been in existence for four years and Caroline says getting volunteers is not the problem, but additional resources have been holding back their work.

"We have a beautiful rural setting here and we have a load of volunteers that are always willing. Any time we send out a text we always get about 15 people, with shovels, wheelbarrows, brushes, everyone has pride in their own place."

The group were recently successful in applying for funding from the Clashavoon Dunmanway Community Benefit Fund, established by EirGrid, the operator and developer of the national electricity grid. The \in 5,500 in funding will now be put towards new signage, landscaping and equipment to support the 'Keep Rusheen Clean!' initiative.

"The Clashavoon Dunmanway funding will help big time. We're volunteers, we don't have a lot of resources to carry out the big projects but when something like this comes up, we have the volunteers to do all the work, but it [funding] will make an awful difference to the area," says Corkery. Another West Cork group to benefit from funding was the Macroom Senior Citizens' Housing Association's Meals-on-Wheels service.

Chairman of the voluntary organisation, Pat O'Connell explains just how important the service is to people in Macrom and the Lee Valley area.

"We deliver up to 60 meals a day, seven days a week. Especially during the Covid period the numbers went up drastically because people were cocooning."

The organisation received $\leq 20,000$ towards buying an electric vehicle for the meals-on-wheels service and Pat says it has changed the service for the better.

"The funding we got from EirGrid to buy the van will have a huge impact because at the moment we have a van that is 20 years old so this new electric van will be a big improvement for us and have a big impact on the sustainability of the service. We don't have to think about the cost of fuel now."

Meanwhile, Michael Murphy from Carrigadrohid Community Association understands the difficulties in securing community funding, having been involved in many organisations in the area for some time.

"Funds are always a stretch to get," he notes.

Projects in the area also received funding from the Clashavoon Dunmanway Community Benefit Fund recently and plans are now in place to make good use of the injection of funding.

"The old school is used as a community hall and it's in need of repair, the floor and structural work needs to be done on it," Murphy explains.

There are big plans in Carrigadrohid, along with refurbishment works to the hall, there are plans for a community playground, and heritage investigations on a local monastic settlement to name just a few.

One thing is certain in these West Cork communities, there is no shortage of enthusiasm or dedication, and, when people come together and are supported great things can be accomplished.

larla Ó Lionáird, Cór Chúil Aodha, Muireann Nic Amhlaoibh with Gerry O'Beirne, Cormac Begley and Páidí Mhárthain Mac Gearailt will be amongst the musicians taking part in this very special occasion, which will be presented by Kerry broadcaster Sláine Ní Chathalláin, together with colleagues from the station's Donegal and Conamara stations, Michelle Nic Grianna and Neansaí Ní Choisdealbha. The concert will be broadcast live on radio at 7 pm on Saturday 2 April, and also streamed live at rte.ie/gaeilge.

Courage, identity and pride of place are the primary themes for the commemorative concert, titled RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta 50, reflecting the station's origins within the civil rights movement, its history as a regional and national radio service, and its vital role in sustaining and promoting the Irish language and culture over the last fifty years, with artists from all across the Gaeltachtaí taking part.

RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta came on air for the first time on 2 April 1972 - Easter Sunday. The result of a long campaign by the Gaeltacht Civil Rights Movement, who asserted the right of the Gaeltacht and greater Irish-language community to a daily radio service in their own language, the station has acted as a vital bridge between the Gaeltacht communities. Since then, RnaG has played a vital role as a platform for the Irish-language and all aspects of the culture, including traditional music, sean-nós singing, Gaelic games, literature, oral arts, and contemporary Irish-language songwriting, as well as providing a daily regional, national and international news service in Irish.

Gearóid Mac Donncha, Ceannaire, RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta, says: "At its heart, this concert will demonstrate the vibrancy, courage, pride, confidence, and rich heritage of the Gaeltacht and Irish-language community. It will be a celebration of that community, those who campaigned with the Gaeltacht Civil Rights Movement, those who founded the radio service in the early 1970s and



past and current staff, our loyal listeners, everyone involved in Gaeltacht life and the Irish language community, and the young people growing up today who will keep the flame alive into the future."

"This concert will be a very special event, broadcast live from the heart of the Gaeltacht, with local, national and international artists, young musicians, dancers and singers having the unique opportunity of playing on stage with the RTÉ Concert Orchestra. It is a privilege for RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta to have gathered such esteemed musicians together in the Gaeltacht to mark the station's 50th anniversary."

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TCM is a system of medicine partly based on the idea that an energy, called Qi, flows along pathways in the body. In this belief, if the flow of Qi along these pathways is blocked or unbalanced, illness can occur. Any imbalance to Qi can cause disease and illness. An alteration in the opposite and complementary forces that make up the Qi is thought to be the most common cause of this imbalance; These are called yin and yang.

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• ACUPRESSURE, which uses the hands or fingers to apply direct pressure to points along the body's meridians.

DIET. Yin and yang foods can help restore the balance in the body.
MEDITATION: a way to sit quietly and calm your mind

• **MOXIBUSTION:** which uses small amounts of heated plant fiber (moxa, or Chinese mugwort) on specific areas of the body.

• **QI GONG:** exercise with slow movements and focus on the breath

Traditional Chinese medicine has been found to be useful for a number of illnesses around the world, varying from all different avenues. It's difficult to apply Western scientific principles to traditional Chinese medicine because its diagnosis and treatment methods vary from those used in Western medicine.

In Western medicine, for example, any two

individuals with the same infection (such as sinusitis) may be treated with the same antibiotics. In traditional Chinese medicine, each person might receive a different treatment for the same illness depending on the person's own Qi and yin-yang balance.

Tom Clarke had a tobacco shop on the corner of Parnell Street, Dublin. His wifes name was Kathleen

and after Tom's death she was a founder member of Cumann Na mBan. She became a TD and later a Senator. She then became the first female Lord Mayor of Dublin (1939-1941)

Welcome back dear student, what is going on in Ukraine is utterly distressing. What is also upsetting is seeing the indifferent response of other nations against it. Last year, I heard the Lord ask 'where are the David's?' I believe He is still asking that - in the church, marketplace, governments and the nations (Psalm 2). David was a young man who, to natural eyes, looked like he was going to be destroyed, yet he bravely ran out onto the battlefield to take on the giant Goliath, without armour or battle weapons. All the experienced warriors of Israel cowered as this wicked giant came out every morning and evening to curse them - challenging them to fight him. No one dared because they were afraid. David dropped supplies to his older brothers who were in the army and heard the giants words, but instead of being intimidated by his size and bullying behaviour, a righteous anger rose up in David at the audacity of this giant to curse God and frighten His people.

Without a second thought, David volunteered to fight the giant! Everyone laughed at him - his brothers were embarrassed by him. King Saul, who had long since lost the anointing of God's Spirit because of disobedience (1 Samuel 15:22-26), decided to allow David to go out and fight Goliath. But David refused to wear Saul's armour. Instead he ran to meet the giant with only his slingshot and five stones he picked up from a nearby stream. He knew that God had anointed him and was with him, and he was motivated to defend the honour of the Lord of Heaven and Earth from the taunts of His enemies (1 Samuel 17:31-44). Goliath cursed David and mocked him as he came towards the giant, but David shouted back "you come to me with sword and spear but I come to you in the name of the Lord of Heaven's Armies - the God of the armies of Israel, Whom you have defied. Today the Lord will conquer you, and I will kill you and cut off your head. And then I will give the dead bodies of your men to the birds and wild animals, and the whole world will know that there is a God in Israel! And everyone assembled here will know that the Lord rescues His people, but not with sword and spear. This is the Lord's battle, and He will give you to us!" (1 Samuel 17:45-47 NLT)

As the giant came close it must have been frightening, but David carried something inside that Goliath knew nothing about. He had experienced the goodness of God while shepherding his father's sheep. God had delivered David from danger many times, and His Spirit ministered to David so that he knew God as his Friend and Protector (Psalm 23). The giant may have been bigger and better armed, but that was merely human strength which is no match for the Power of Almighty God (Psalm 18; Psalm 27; Psalm 28). David pulled one stone from his pocket and slung it at the giants head. It hit him right between the eyes with such force that it knocked him down and out. David took the giants own sword and killed him. We pray that the people of Ukraine will call upon the Lord Jesus who rescues from the lion and the bear and prevail over their enemy, in Yeshua's name, amen (Psalm 91:15-16).

Slowly, Cork began to find their feet, with Alan Connolly scoring three points from play and earning one of the seven frees that Patrick Horgan converted and five points in a row in as many minutes had Cork level at 0-9 to 1-6 by the 22nd minute, but a lead score couldn't be found and Kilkenny struck for another goal on the halfhour and led 2-12 to 0-14 at half time.
