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
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### Editor's NOTE

Laura passionately spoke about her particular path which first lead her to qualifying Secondary school teacher before realising that her passions lie elsewhere and she detoured along the route of working in the pharmaceutical industry. 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

### MACROOM FC ASTRO AND COMMUNITY WALKWAY PROJECT

There was much excitement for Macroom FC at our home ground of Murrayfield on Saturday morning last, as the official launch of the club's Astro Pitch and Community Walkway Project took place.

The beautiful weather lent itself perfectly to the occasion as the schoolgirls, schoolboys, members and supporters were on hand to kick off the next big chapter in the 45-year history of the club. Put simply, our aim is to provide a state-of-the-art sports facility in the centre of Macroom town by mid 2023.

Macroom FC is currently one of the biggest volunteer run organisations in the area with almost 600 playing members across 26 teams. Club Chairperson Denis Murray outlined the thought process behind the new development." As a club we have decided that the best way forward for all members is to develop a full-sized all-weather Astro Pitch at Murrayfield. The development will include full lighting, fencing and a community walkway around the pitch. The club hopes that the Astro build will resolve the issue of unplayable pitches leading to cancellations, in particular during the winter. It will also mean that teams will no longer have to travel outside of Macroom to train during the winter months" he said. In relation to the build of the community walkway, Life President Willie O' Riordan said " the community walkway will be a great facility, which will provide a safe walking environment for the people of Macroom and beyond".

The cost of this substantial development for our club will be up to €550,000. While this is a huge amount, Macroom FC feel that the long-term benefits for Macroom and the wider area will be well worth it.

With the positive progress of the Macroom Bypass and the ongoing Briery Gap Theatre rebuild, the Macroom FC Astro and community walkway will significantly add to the appeal of the town and the greater Lee Valley area. The club will need to raise a large amount of the costs for the project through sponsorship and the following are the three categories (and their benefits) through which we hope to raise the funds:

A: €3,000-Pitch side sign (8ft x 2ft) for 5 years and advertising through our website and social media platforms.

B: €1,000-Sign (A4 size) on Friends of Macroom FC Wall.

C: €100+ - Your name on display on Supporters of Macroom FC list.





Unfortunately, it is true in that our processing speed slows, and we are slower at learning new things. An example given is that of an older surgeon, she has a broader range of knowledge and experience than when she was young. She may now be a slower learner than her younger colleague, her hands may not be more steady, but, if we had the choice, many would opt for her. I am not implying that we are better or wiser than the younger generation. No. But it seems true, in my case anyway, that we are wiser than we once were! In many circumstances fast decision making is demanded. But I think in more circumstances, slower but more creative, and so better, decision making is preferable. If this is so, perhaps it is time for us older people to consider refraining from adding to an ageist stereotype, if not for our own sake, then for the generation that fallows

### Glass Milk Bottle Delivery

Hi Chris Barrettt here again.

It is of concern to many people that it used to be really hard to buy milk without some sort of plastic being involved in the process of making it's container. Plastic containers both large and small are found everywhere and even the innocentlooking tetrapacks have plastic openings, and the packaging has to be disposed of.

I was very happy to hear about a couple, Liz and Kevin O'Donovan, who are based at Gloun Cross between Kilmichael and Dunmanway, and who are leading the way in glass milk-bottle delivery in our part of the world.

Currently they cover an area comprising Mitchelstown, Cork city, Castletownbere, Kenmare and everything in between.

This is an exciting business and I was interested to hear how they got started. In 2016, they were supplying milk to the Co-op but the price they were getting for all their hard-earned milk was very low.

At that point they started to look around to see what else was available to them. They had been advised by experts to get into yogurt and cheese, but they felt there were a lot of other people in that market and that it would be very hard to break into it.

They did research including looking at glass-bottle milk delivery in the UK, and decided to go into bottling their own milk. Very few people were

providing glass milk-bottle deliveries in Ireland in 2016, and they are still the only people covering the areas in Cork that I mentionned earlier. There are more recently a few people starting doing glass-bottle milk delivery up the country.

Kevin and Liz have found their business was growing and they now have now five or six people employed in delivery etc, so not only are they providing a sustainable container for their milk but they are also providing employment.

Kevin tells me that one of the reasons that he and his wife started the business with the glass-bottles was to avoid all that

plastic.

Nowadays, they also supply buttermilk, butter and cream. Though they started small, they worked very hard to make

the business grow. Now they can send out everything that they produce themselves.

The starting up of the business was by no means easy. In fact, just the opposite. It was really hard for them in the first three years. They found the regulations and paperwork were particularly challenging. Although things have got easier for them in this respect, it is still by no means easy to deal with all the paperwork that is involved.

So how does it work? The cows are milked. The milk is pasteurised three days a week. The milk is cooled down, bottled and taken immediately to a cold-room. They pride themselves on a very fast turn-around. Milk that has come from the cow today, could be processed today and sent out for

delivery tonight or tomorrow. The very short time between milking and delivery is something they are really working hard to achieve constantly.

As for delivery, the milk is brought right to your door and the empties are collected. I wondered if there was a big loss through breakages or non-return of bottles, but Kevin tells me that this is not really an issue. There is very little wastage as they get about the same amount back as they deliver.

Delivery is door-to-door in Macroom town and its hinterland on two nights a week. They supply to Supervalu, Centra, Gala and a variety of shops. They also supply coffee shops and interestingly that is the main part of their business. In fact, coffee shops come looking for them!

I feel very fortunate to have been able to speak with Liz and Kevin O'Donovan. Because they are so busy, I didn't get to speak to them till abou 8.30 on a Sunday night, but I am so happy that I did, because they are inspirational and really work to be environmentally sustainable.



Over the past couple of weeks, I've been delighted to welcome some new members and I've updated membership for some people who have come back to the library after a bit of a break.

One lady said to me she loves to read and constantly found herself buying books, sometimes throwing a couple of paperbacks into the trolley while grocery shopping or picking up offers here and there but that she found the books were getting expensive so she decided to give the library a chance. She was worried that all the books in the library would be 'ancient'. I was very pleased to introduce her to the new releases section where there is a lovely selection of books recently published in 2022 and 2021. There is also a selection of older books that are very popular but there's nothing you could describe as 'ancient' here except for some of our rare books in the reference section, and I know my children would say I might fit the bill but I don't feel quite that ancient either! Of course, all members also have access to the extensive national catalogue and can request books for collection at their nearest branch. This service is very popular in Ballyvourney Library and customers regularly call in to collect books they have ordered, once they get a text or email to say the books have arrived.

Some of the family groups who visit the library feel it's very good value to borrow books and have the opportunity to change them regularly and never have to worry about the cost. It means the family entertainment budget can go towards other things including day trips and holidays. Lots of families with children starting school in September were delighted to receive a My Little Library Bag full of freebies. The branch has also had many winners in the various competitions that are run through the Cork County Council Library Service

People often call to Ballyvourney Library when they are researching their local area or doing their family tree or trying to learn more about the history of their locality. I try to be as helpful as possible but sometimes I just don't have the information to hand

in the detail that it is required. However, help is at hand because Cork County Council's Library and Arts Service, Local Studies Library, has launched its remodelled website www.corklocalstudies. ie. Following a major overhaul of the existing website, the new www.corklocalstudies.ie provides enhanced access to a wide range of resources, including recently digitised material such as the Irish Tourist Association files and Standish Barry Estate maps. There's a dedicated schools page. history podcasts and information on family history research. 





# Daphne Pochin

Children, when learning to colour pictures, are often told not to colour outside the lines. And yet, how is someone supposed to live life to the fullest, to follow their dreams, unless they do precisely that, colour outside the lines? Daphne Pochin Mould, author, broadcaster, geologist, photographer, pilot and Ireland's first female flight instructor, described as 'a magnificent woman in her flying machine', lived her life to the fullest, colouring outside the lines, unaware that there was any other way to live.

Born on 15 November 1920 in Salisbury, Wiltshire, in the very heart of the 'Englishry', as she called it, she was the only child of Walter Mould, a teacher, and his wife Marguerite. Daphne had a problem with her eyesight, which led to her being mostly homeschooled, by her aunt, a Greek scholar. This led to her education being what education in the truest sense should be, being something that is created, not something that is prescriptive. At home she was introduced to classics such as Homer's Odyssey and, later in life, wrote: 'With the urge to write, I also had an urge to study science, especially the natural sciences. I used to go out in the country and identify the plants and trees, watch the birds, go quietly through the English woods so that the red squirrels came playing past me, unnoticed.'

She understood at a young age that science is, quite simply, constantly questioning new evidence as it comes in, and repeatedly reexamining prior conclusions: 'Science for me meant the discovery of truth, reality, the nature of being, finding out what things were, what life was about'.

Having learned to drive at the age of 17 when a cousin lent her his Horch car, Daphne drove on a visit to Scotland and the Highlands the following year, in 1938. As war was breaking out in 1939, she enrolled for the BSc course in Pure Science at Edinburgh University. Even a life-threatening heart condition could not derail this rebel's graduation in 1943. She joined the ARP (Air Raid Precautions – or Civil Defence) but soon transferred to the Volunteer Car Pool (a pool of cars and drivers used mainly for emergencies such as blood transfusions and emergency births).

As she was not called up for full time war service, due to her heart condition, the Ministry of Labour decided Daphne could take up a research fellowship for a PhD in Geology. In 1946 she was awarded a doctorate for her thesis entitled 'The geology of the Foyers Plutonic Complex and the surrounding country'. How she came to be awarded a doctorate from the University of Edinburgh illustrates the kind of person Daphne was. Her Director at the Department of Geology at the time suggested she gather what was known on the rocks at Foyers, in

the middle of the Highlands, so she paid a visit to the Geological Survey in Edinburgh. The smallscale map she found there did not correspond in the least to what she found, so she rectified the situation, studying those one hundred square miles of Scotland with the attention to detail that characterized everything she did throughout her life.

Daphne was always more interested in writing than in academia, and so, captivated by the Scottish Highlands, she took out a lease on a dilapidated house overlooking Loch Ness. Her mother came to live with her permanently, while her father spent time there during school holidays until his retirement, when he also came to live there.

Not only did Daphne clear the overgrown garden, but she also reclaimed the adjoining three-acre field, growing oats potatoes and other vegetables. She learned how to plough with a two-wheel 'walking' tractor with a 3.5 HP engine, as well as how to harrow, from her neighbour. Daphne's first book, The Roads from the Isles, the story of some of the old cross-country tracks of the West Highlands, was published in 1950 when she was 30 years old.

After this, Daphne's path became more spiritual, much to her bewilderment. Writing about the islands of the Outer Hebrides, she encountered Catholic life and thought for the first time. She then embarked on a book about the Inner Hebrides, including Iona of St. Columba (an Irish saint who lived from 521 to 597). She said her intention as an agnostic was to show up the saints and the Church for what she thought they really were, but 'to attack the Church meant finding out just what was to be attacked'. As she already knew some of the Benedictines at Fort Augustus, she sought information from them. In Daphne's own writing: 'That reason could enter into religion was a completely new idea to me. I fought hard against accepting any such possibility, but after a year of struggle and argument was received into the Catholic Church on November 11, 1950.'

In 1951 the lease on the house in Scotland was up, so Daphne and her parents decided to move to Ireland. At first, they lived in Connemara, Co. Galway, but in 1952 Daphne and her parents rented a large house near the Church of Ireland church at Aherla, Co. Cork. In addition to writing prolifically, she discovered what was to become another passion, namely, flying. She learned to fly at Farmer's Cross Airfield, near Cork Airport (built in 1961). Not knowing how to do anything by halves, Daphne became the first female flight instructor in Ireland, and then the only female class-one chief instructor, a most popular one, by all accounts. She joined the Hibernian Flying Club and Farranfore Flying Club. Flying helped Daphne to understand the key value of aerial photographs to archaeology (aerial photography of archaeological monuments began in Northern Ireland in 1927 and was first used in the Republic in 1934), so she took her camera on flights to photograph various archaeological sites. Imagine being a student of hers, learning to fly, as she took both hands off the control in order to lean out the window with her camera to take photos, as she apparently did on a regular basis! Childhood visits to nearby Stonehenge drew her to archaeology and geology: 'When I was very small, I tried out my climbing instincts on its stones - to be immediately

hauled off by an irate official!' Her entire collection

of photographs is now held by the Muckross House

Trustees in Killarney, Co. Kerry.

Always writing, Daphne published 25 books, including Scotland of the Saints (1952); The Celtic Saints, our heritage (1956); Saint Brigid (1964); Saint Finbar of Cork (1965); Ireland From The Air (1973); A Book of Irish Saints and Irish Saints' names (1975); Mountains of Ireland (1976); The Monasteries of Ireland: An Introduction (1976); Aran Islands (1977); Discovering Cork (1991) and West over Sea (1999). She also published a number of articles, not least for Sherkin Comment, a quarterly publication of Sherkin Island Marine Station (Sherkin Island is offshore from the fishing village of Baltimore, Co. Cork). Daphne also wrote and produced a series of radio programmes entitled 'The islands of Munster' (1959-60) with Síle Ní Bhriain (broadcaster & producer with Radio Éireann, the highlight of whose career was covering the visit to Cork on 28th June 1963 of US President John F. Kennedy), as well as contributing to radio series such as Sunday miscellany and Seascapes. In 1993 UCC awarded Dr. Daphne Pochin Mould an honorary doctorate, to add to her one of 1946, describing her during the ceremony as 'a scientist and a free spirit, a courageous pioneer and an outstanding woman warrior'.

She was much loved by those who knew her. Even those who did not know her, or know her well, were





appreciative of her rich contribution to Irish life. Despite her English background, she once wrote that she was 'so long out of the country, out of contact with its thought and way of life, that going back there in recent years, I found I passed readily enough for a born Irishwoman!'

A fiercely independent spirit, Daphne's final years were difficult for her to bear. In January 2007, at almost 87 years of age, Daphne was found unconscious in her Aherla, guarded by her two beloved Alsatian dogs and was removed to Cork University Hospital. She wasn't expected to survive, but, in typical Daphne style, after nearly two months in hospital she signed herself out, having had enough. Good for her! She booked herself into a guesthouse. Over the next seven years Daphne moved from guesthouses to hotels to nursing homes. A natural nomad, she had to be on the move, even as her body grew more frail, because her mind remained as alert and sharp as ever.

Arthritis set in, making it impossible to write and difficult to type, and yet continue to type she did. Just because someone gets older, it doesn't mean that their wisdom and experience should not be valued. Daphne still had a lot to say, and said it even though she had no access to her notes and material, such was the depth and breadth of her encyclopedic knowledge. Never being concerned with material possessions, Daphne survived on her small pension - and support from her friends. In her final months she was confined to bed. As her friend, Matt Murphy, director of Sherkin Island Marine Station, wrote: 'One must understand that for nearly ninety years this indomitable lady was a free spirit and to be confined was like being a caged lioness.' She died on 29 April 2014 in Cork University Hospital and donated her body to medical science.

Daphne was someone who made a valuable


contribution to her adopted country. She made the effort to become familiar with Ireland, she made the effort to give back, and was loved all the more for that. The dust jacket of her book, Irish Pilgrimage (1957, New York, Devin-Adair Company) describes her perfectly:


'Miss Mould, an English girl who has made Ireland her home and her way of life, has written an exulted guidebook through many realms of her fabulous adopted country...Most important, she is in love with Ireland, with its antiquities, its traditions, its






culture, and she imparts her devotion to the reader. She has not only lived with the people; she has joined them in their faith and gone on pilgrimages with them, the length and breadth of the country. She has climbed mountains in the predawn and rowed out to holy islands. She lives and moves in the Ireland of a thousand years ago and the Ireland of today, bringing it all to the reader with ease of style and with competent scholarship.'

### **MUM'S 'INCREDIBLE' RECOVERY**

### from stroke she mistook for hangover

A mum-of-two who mistook her stroke for a hangover, is gearing up for a 10k to thank the Cork medical teams which helped her reclaim her life.

Hairdresser Francesca Murray, 45, suffered paralysis on her right side and lost her ability to walk after the terrifying emergency - but has gone from managing a few steps by her hospital bed to training for next month's Women's Mini Marathon. Her stroke was spotted by her childhood friend a nurse who called emergency services, sparking a dramatic helicopter-airlift to Cork University

"It was supposed to be my friend Natasha Flynn's wedding but she cancelled because of Covid and 30 of us went down to Kerry in June 2020 to celebrate anyway," said Fran.

"We had a session in her house in Ventry and went to bed. I got up, felt a little groggy and decided to have a painkiller and went back to bed.

"Even getting sick a short time later was no different to a bad hangover."

When Fran deteriorated and began slurring her words, bride-to-be Natasha, a Tralee-based nurse, called 999 and she was airlifted by a Coastguard crew to CUH, beginning a lengthy process to learn how to walk again and recover her eyesight.

"I couldn't speak, I had right-side paralysis and couldn't move, I couldn't swallow, had to be spoonfed and had a catheter in," said Fran, from Dublin's

"I remember the doctors around the bed saying I had had a stroke. It was horrible. But what doesn't kill you makes you stronger. It gave me a whole different outlook on life.

"They [medical teams] said they had no way of telling at the time how permanent the damage

In CUH, Fran's care was managed by the stroke and physiotherapy teams as she gradually rebuilt her strength, underwent speech therapy but also battled extreme fatigue and the stress of restricted movement.

"I don't think I understood the severity of it. They had me walking from one end of the bed to the other, then progressing to the corridor, I'd only manage a few steps before I had to rest.

"Losing my peripheral vision meant instead of walking straight, I'd walk to my right."

She spent almost a month in CUH before being transferred to St James's in Dublin and now only relies on medication as part of her recovery.

"I'm nearly there. Now it's like I'm working on myself, I've joined a gym and I'm reclaiming my life," said the stylist in Manor Hair Studio in Palmerstown.

"You have to remember how lucky you are to have

"I decided to do the mini-marathon on June 5 to raise funds for CUH Charity because CUH are the



ones that got me walking again."

Fran's experience had another positive spinoff - her daughter Jasmine, 25, is embarking on a nursing career after being closely briefed by medics on her mum's progress.

Glen Arrigan, one of Francesca's Clinical Nurse Specialists at CUH, which sees more than 600 stroke patients a year, described her recovery as "incredible".

"What she has achieved in the last two years is an incredible story and we need to hear more stories of people like Fran," he said.

"Courage, bravery, resilience; she has managed to get through this frustrating and uncertain time and has come out the other side.

"By telling her story, it will hopefully raise people's awareness of stroke and reduce the risk of this happening to somebody else."



Words – Change: Macroom and some recent changes. "There is nothing permanent except change." –Heraclitus (A Fifth century BCE (pre-Christian) Greek philosopher). "Change is the law of life, and those who look only to the past and present are certain to miss the future" -John F. Kennedy.

"The measure of intelligence is the ability to change" -Albert Einstein.

Heraclitus, 540-480 BCE, of Ephesus (in modern-day Turkey) was an ancient Greek, pre-Socratic, Ionian philosopher. Ephesus was then part of the Persian Empire. Little is known of Heraclitus' life and most of the stories about him are thought to be later fabrications. However, some of his writings and sayings survive – and he got 'change' absolutely correct. Kennedy and Einstein develop the point.

Since 2016 Ireland has been commemorating events that took place 100 years ago and honouring many who took part. Centenaries act as markers and enable us to reflect and to notice and quantify changes that have or are taking place.

Having lived most of my life in Macroom, I have never seen or experienced as much change. Historically, the Great Irish Famine (1845-1852) was the seminal event in modern Irish history; from 1841-1901 the Irish population fell from 8.2 to 4.46 million, and the population of Macroom Union by 63%. The Cork-Macroom Railway line opened in 1867 and transformed business; for example, butter could now be transport to Cork from Macroom in hours rather than days. The War of Independence and the Civil War radically changed the country. The advent of electricity, the radio, television and the internet have had equally profound consequences. Thankfully, despite many setbacks, the country is now one of the wealthiest in the world - 14th according to Global Finance Magazine in 2021 - and we are able to help those currently less fortunate than ourselves, such as our Ukrainian guests. On a world level, global warming, diseases such as Covid, wars and aggression pose many dangers and necessitate change. Dangerous politicians have shown how destructive they can be – look at how the Russian Invasion of Ukraine has badly affected a peaceful country and affected prices in Europe and Ireland. While we have to adapt to these circumstances as well as possible, we are also seeing and feeling changes nearer in Macroom.

Recent local changes are/have been large, medium and small. The greatest is probably the bypass: it will have enormous implications for the town. Roads to Ballyvourney and Clondrohid have new roundabouts with Coolcower's nearly ready. The expectation is that we will have fewer or no traffic snarl-ups and the centre will be infinitely more attractive to residents and visitors. The town's population will continue to rise and its demographic will alter. Many more non-Macrompians will come to live here, and the increased number of people will pose challenges for schools and other service providers. Already, many new residents

find it difficult to get a Macroom-based GP, a basic right and no fault of our doctors.

A new fire service station is near completion in Gurteenroe and it will be state of the art. This will be the fourth building to house Macroom fire brigade. First it was under the Town Hall, where toilets are now situated. People like Joe Murphy, 'Knockie' Cronin, Pat Coughlan, Christy Leahy and Donal Lehane were involved. Later it relocated to a building near the old gated entrance to the Castle Grounds, at the back of the Castle Ballroom. Martin McCarthy, Johnny 'Sloppy' Looney, Donal 'Gump' Buckley', Billy Casey and Johnny O'Driscoll served there. When the Castle Ballroom became a sports complex, the area was re-configured and the brigade moved to the front portion there. Tony Dunton, Peter Leahy, Niall Cronin and Jerry O'Leary among many others gave sterling service to the town and area. New boys', girls' national and secondary schools were recently built in Macroom and McEgan College was extended. Some might argue that it's a missed opportunity that a Community School such as those in Millstreet, Dunmanway, Clonakilty and Bantry was not built.

A new district Garda Station is to be built on an adjacent portion of the same site, and over the fence from Gurteeroe House. Everyone is delighted to see this, and it is a far cry from 1918-1921 when the RIC, which used the current Station, and were ostracised by the community and attacked by the IRA.

In 1933 Canon Barrett invited the De La Salle Brothers to Macroom; they founded a secondary school and took charge of the Boys' National School. Originally the numbers were small with as few as five or six boys sitting the Leaving Certificate until the 1950s. Free secondary education was introduced in 1967 which saw numbers growing rapidly. By 2000, numbers had reached 300. Now the school will move to Sandy Hill and a new era begins.

Five new housing estates have either been completed or are being built - Páirc Uí Mhuirithe/ T.C. Murray Park (near Oakwood), at Meadowlands, two on the Millstreet Road and another expansion at Lios na Fea. Older properties such as Murray's New Street (home of T.C. Murray) are being renovated and Mrs Purcell's former Railway View residence was revamped and is currently occupied. In the same street, Cope has opened a hub in O'Neill's former sports shop. Cope's aim is to make its clients more visible and more integrated in the community. (The house was formerly the home of Barry and Hancy Neville and their family). In Main Street, Murrays' former butcher shop and home and the Bush Craft have been sold and presumably new activities will take place there. Tom Heffernan's Auctioneer's office has closed and the former Polish shop is now Kool Café, hoping to become a meeting place for young people. Before this, the house was the Tangneys' family home. Mrs Teresa Tangney's parents, Denis and Bridget O'Sullivan lived there and had a grocery shop.

Further up the street, the Briery Gap is being reconstructed and hopefully, it will be in use soon. An application to restore and re-use St Colman's Church of Ireland church (the 'Protestant church'), Castle Street, as a heritage centre has been submitted and is expected to get approval soon. St Colman's Church was deconsecrated in the 1990s and has been decaying since. The state of its main doors is evidence of this. Now in the ownership and care of Cork County Council, hopes are high that its development will significantly enhance the town.

Girls' and women's wider participation in sport is another huge and great change in Macroom's behaviour. I recently saw Macroom Girls U-9s play Éire Óg in the Castle Grounds and both sides had many fine players and the match was of a good standard. Just fifty years ago, the idea of girls playing a football match was unthinkable. The Ladies Gaelic Football Association was founded in 1974. Macroom GAA Club, Macroom Soccer Club, West Muskerry Athletic Club, Macroom Golf Club and Laochra Óg are doing tremendous work in promoting girls' sport participation.

Not all changes are for the better. Many of our small shops have disappeared. Once we had more than fifty public houses, possibly too many; now we have seven, probably too few. Occasionally it is hard to find officials in banks to answer queries, and if you can't use computers, you are in big trouble. In the 1950s there were three dance venues in Macroom – the Town Hall, the Castle Ballroom and Codrum Platform, as well as many platforms and village dancehalls nearby; now there are none. Macroom first had a cinema in 1911; hopefully, when the Briery Gap re-opens, it will show films again.

The above are but some of the changes that we have; most are improvements, but not all qualify for that description.

As far as Macroom is concerned, Heraclitus's observation that 'change is permanent' is true, and the town's evolution and change are consistent with Kennedy's observation that 'change is the law of life'. Whether the saying 'that Macroom never reared a fool is absolutely true – 'never' is a very strong word' - the town has the ability to change and is thus 'intelligent' by Einstein's metric.

Addendum: The word 'change' comes from Old French and Anglo-French. There are many variations of its use word in English; money we receive back in shops is called 'change' – this too is changing with the use of credit cards. A 'change-over' means using a different system. 'Changing' gear or colour means altering intensity or changing sides. The 'change-of-life' is another frequently-used term; it signifies the differences – physical, psychological and social - that affect women when menstruation/periods cease. Irish mythology has a theme of 'changeling' whereby a child is replaced by an elf-child left by the fairies.



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# KEY VOTE NEXT WEEK IN EP TO BAN CARBON-EMITTING CARS BY 2035 - MEP KELLEHER

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that he is hopeful that the European Parliament will adopt a proposal next week to ban the production of carbon emitting vehicles by 2035 following discussions between political groups.

"Next week's plenary debate and vote on CO2 emissions from cars and vans is a pivotal part of the European Commission's Fit for 55 package of measures to secure a 55% reduction in carbon emissions.

"While the Irish Government has agreed to ban the sale of petrol and diesel vehicles from 2030, next week's vote is pivotal as it will fundamentally end the production of such cars across the whole

European Union," added Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's ENVI Committee.

"Road transport accounts for roughly 15% of all GHG emissions. Progress must be made quickly in this sector if we are to achieve our overall targets as an economic zone.

"Personally I would prefer it if we moved much quicker, but in a Union of 27 different economies, many of whom produce cars, this is the best that could be achieved.

"Of course, electric cars are great. However, until the electricity being used to power them is renewable, we are only halfway to where we need to be.

"The Irish Government must move with greater

speed and zeal to implement its offshore wind generation strategy. We need to

private and public funding to ensure we become net exporters of electricity. "Next week's vote is an important moment. I will be voting for the most progressive way forward to ensure the EU meets its

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

Welcome back dear student last week in our study of healing we saw how a hard heart hinders us from receiving healing. Often it's wrongly perceived that someone who is hardhearted must be a ruthless, cruel person, but this is not always the truth. People who have endured difficult things in life can develop a hard heart in certain areas hidden deep inside. A person who has been wounded or betrayed by another can make an inner yow to never trust anyone ever again. This then twists their perception to always view people or situations through that lens. Another instance can be if someone has prayed to God for a certain thing and then it doesn't work out the way they had planned. the disappointment they feel can develop a hard heart towards God and His Word. For the person with the hard heart life is continually skewed, and the walls they build up just keep getting higher - keeping out those they want nothing to do with, but those walls also hem them into a lonely, helpless place. This is not God's will for anyone and His Holy Spirit will bring transformation (John 15:7-15; Romans 12:2). The first step to overcome hard heartedness in any area is humility (James 4:6-10; 1 Peter 5:6-8). To acknowledge 'I have a problem, and I want to overcome it'. In order to revive the spirit of the humble and to revive the heart of the contrite overcome with sorrow for sin (Isaiah 57:14-15 Amplified Bible). Repentance and humility opens the door for God's healing for every human being who, for whatever circumstances, has felt far from God. "...I have seen his wilful ways but I will heal him. I will lead him also and will restore comfort to him and to those who mourn for him...and I will heal him (making his lips blossom anew with thankful praise)" (Isaiah 57:18-19 AMP)

Life can be very lonely for those whose hearts have been hardened for whatever reason. Even though there may have been great wrongs done to us, we still have a choice to make - 'what will my response will be?' If I decide to live embittered and resentful my life is not going to be either peaceful or blessed. But when I bring the pain and the sorrow and anger to the Lord Jesus and I am honest before Him, His Holy Spirit will lead me through His Word to identify the areas that I need to repent, or release and make right, including breaking down those walls of hostility that I have allowed to be built (Hosea 10:12). This may leave me feeling vulnerable, but God promises "...do not fear anything for I Am with you. Do not be afraid for I Am your God. I will strengthen you and I will help you. I will uphold you with my Righteous right hand (Isaiah 41:10). God WILL do it - because He loves you.
