



The Minister enjoyed a lively chat with the lads at the Men's Shed where she saw first-hand the fantastic work being done by this community. The men expressed the benefits of having the Shed in their community and reflected on how tough it was during the pandemic.

Deputy Moynihan commented, "It has been a very difficult couple of years for the communities that support the Men's Sheds because of the pandemic and the social distancing that came with it. As mental health amongst men is an ongoing issue It is extremely imported that these social outlets are supported and kept going."

At Macroom Hospital, the Minister was given a tour by the staff and the construction workers of the new hospital building that is at an advanced stage. The new extension will almost double the number of rooms for residents.

The Cork North West TD also added, "This new extension to Macroom Hospital means all residents will have more comfort, space and privacy. Its completion will be a significant victory for the town".

Finally, the Minister was brought to St. Colmans House and Macroom Senior Citizens to meet staff and residents and view the extensive services being provided.

A postcard on which the child can write & draw & send to their new teacher or bring & give to the teacher on their first day at school.


Their very own library card & special "My Little Library" cardholder.


These kits contain five practical energy saving tools so that you can carry out a mini energy audit of your home and find the easiest and most important areas to save energy.

KILMURRY HAA

SUCCESSFUL LAUNCH INDEPENDENCE MUSEUM KILMURRY

On Friday, 27th May, local historian Michael Galvin's latest book - In the Shadow of War Kilmurry 1939 - 1945 was launched by Niall Murray, independent historian, researcher, and journalist. It was wonderful to see a large attendance at this event.

Michael Galvin is well known for his in-depth historical knowledge of Kilmurry parish and surrounding areas. There can be very few parishes in the country that are lucky enough to have its history so professionally researched and documented as Kilmurry and this is due to the hard work and commitment of Michael Galvin, who has published sixteen books to date, all of which describe national and international events and how they impact on the local community.

Michael is very generously donating the proceeds from the sale of this publication to the Independence Museum Kilmurry, and books can be purchased at the museum, Sheila's Shop, Kilmurry; MacSwiney's Shop, Crookstown; Fitzgerald's bookshop, Macroom and Bandon Books.

BATTLE OF DESHURE

This year is the 200th Anniversary of the Battle of Deshure and the sad sequel - the hanging of five men at Deshure Crossroads on 1st March 1822. Some years ago Kilmichael Historical Society erected a monument in Terelton to mark this grim chapter in local history.

The men hanged were members of the Whiteboys - an organisation of poor Catholics who banded together and fought against the terrible hardships which people were enduring. In 1822 the worrying spectre of famine was already stalking the land and the Whiteboys (well organised in the Macroom area) fought against the terrible oppression people endured.

On Friday 25th January 1822, Colonel Mitchel of the Rifles Brigade, Macroom got word that a large group of Whiteboys had assembled on the side of Deshure Hill. He and his men descended on the site and a battle ensued. Twenty-nine members of the Whiteboys were arrested. Court cases ensued and several death sentences were handed down. Eventually, five men were sentenced to die on the gallows in Deshure - four local men and one man who was involved in Cath Céim an Fhia on 21st January. The local men were Richard Dromey, Daniel Cronin, Timothy Hallahan and Denis Murphy. The fifth man was Edward Brien.

Kilmichael Historical Society will mark this anniversary at a ceremony in Terelton on Sunday 26th June at 4pm. All are welcome to attend.

MICHAEL COLLINS BUS TOUR


Independence Museum Kilmurry will host a Michael Collins Bus Tour on the 16th/17th July and 23rd/24th July retracing the route that General Michael Collins took in the parishes of Kilmurry, Newcestown and Aherla on the 22nd August 1922. Tour guides will be provided with a talk at the Beal Na Blath site.

TWO CUPS NAMED AFTER MUSKERRY NATIVES UP FOR GRABS AT SHOW THIS JUNE

We are again reminded of the history of North Cork, as two memorial cups named after Muskerry natives are up for grabs in the Bovine section of Cork Summer Show this year, organised by the Munster Agricultural Society. The first of these is the Timothy Quill Perpetual Challenge Cup for Friesian Senior Cow. Born in 1901, Quill, a native of Clondrohid, was an early TD in the 1920s (being the youngest member of that Dail) and was a renowned orator. He was also endorsed by Maud Gonne MacBride and was uniquely elected to both Cork County Council and the Cork Corporation simultaneously. By the time of his death in 1960, he had held high ranking positions nationally in the various co-operative, trade union, and agricultural movements in this country. Quill possessed the largest herd of Friesians in Ireland and make records for recording the highest milk output per livestock unit in Ireland, then going on

to break his own records.

Meanwhile, the Tadah Ouill Perpetual Challenge Cup for best Friesian Heifer is named after his son, Timothy Stephen Quill, who was better known as 'Tadgh' to his friends and family. Born in 1932, he qualified as a veterinary surgeon and went on to become a person of note nationally, despite his pre-mature death due to cancer in 1970. Quill jr was known for his study on carcinogenic plastics which were beginning to phase out old glass bottles during the 1960s. His studies resurfaced during the last few years during a period of increased environmental awareness. He too, was also noted for his scientific contributions to Friesian breeding and was a well-known writer on veterinary matters. 'Tadgh' was the subject of a book, published in the 1980s. Those who remember him can fondly recall his unwavering commitment to charitable and voluntary

The online course 'The Science of Health and Happiness as We Age' which was provided by the Royal College of Surgeons, and which some of us had been doing, has come to an end.

It was packed with interesting information useful to us ageing people. If you are not ageing, then this is not for you, so no need to read on!

If you want to enjoy a happier life, or to put it in the more formal holistic way, to enjoy well-being, the scientists say you need several things. One currently popular theory, PERMA, lists five things -Positive emotions, Engagement, Relationships, Meaning and Accomplishment. There are other theories too, they vary a bit, but Relationships are stuck there somewhere in them all. Even the medics come up with six for Lifestyle medicine - eat healthy, be active, improve sleep, manage stress, avoid risky substances, and stuck in there somewhere is, Focus on Relationships.

So, the last episode of the course, with the suggestion that it may perhaps be most important, was Well-Being and Relationships.

Now as a man who often thought, that for peace of mind, many people are best avoided, I have been shook out of my complacency. Not only have I learned that social connections are very important to happiness, but worse still we should actively focus and invest in them. Now if that sounds like too much work to you, I empathise. But an inconvenient truth is that science is science, and I have noticed that I prefer to be happy than miserable.

So, let's see can we use science to tackle this dilemma. The good news is that social connections come in all shapes and sizes, from the intimate to just lifting your index finger from the steering wheel to acknowledge some other human's existence, and they can be virtual as well as in what we call the real world. And all such connections can be good for us. In fact, scientists have found that 'micro conversations' can add much to our well-being. These are 'the passing the time of day' conversations that most of us are familiar with. It is not what is said, it is that it is said. So, I have decided to remember to add a sentence at the check-out or wherever I may encounter another of my species. So far, I thought this is not too bad, I can handle that.

Then we came to investing - investing time, effort, and energy in establishing and deepening relationships. Now when it comes to investing, I have become accustomed to establishing first and foremost whether the investment pays. I have learned that this investment delivers a good immediate return from the outset and delivers handsomely in the long term too. A Gallop poll of 15 million employees found that the 30% who had

a good friend at their workplace were seven times more likely to be positively engaged and reported much higher well-being. The World Happiness Report has consistently, year after year, shown that self-reported happiness is strongly correlated with strong connections.

We hear, perhaps not often enough, that we should prepare and invest for our security after retirement. Money is very useful, it can enable us to do that which we may want to do, to live a fulfilling life, and to be happy. We know though that while it may enable us, it does none of those things for us. Perhaps no previous generation has been so enabled to do that which we may want to do, while at the same time, so many do not know what to want to do.

In this episode of the course, we were given ten tips for 'investing' in relationships. The list seemed fairly familiar to me but there was a little surprise for me in there too. If you are interested in finding out more, the good news is that the full course can still be accessed online, but I understand just for the remainder of this year.

At the end, our presenter gave his top strategies which he says are based on evidence.

Ask others what matters and listen to them. Spot the strengths in others and celebrate them. Be intentional about bringing hope. Don't just be kind, do kind. Value play, particularly within our adult relationships. Last and not least make sure to look after your own selfcare so that you can do those things well.

So, can you now expect me to change, to listen more

and talk less? Perhaps, I would like to, but those who know me well will probably know not to expect too much better of me. They are already my friends, so I won't need to exceed their expectations! Nor would I be too wise to try out any tips on my best friends, no matter how good those tips indeed are. I would expect to be told where to go and what to do with myself!

In other news ten have started our card making course, and I have been told they are enjoying the creativity.

There is a change in venue for our gardening talks which are from 2-4pm on the 14th and the 21st June. They are both now to be held in the Heritage room, Independence Museum.

We have an important membership meeting on the 20th again in the Heritage room. We are planning our Autumn schedule of activities, and we may yet be showing a portion of one of the episodes of the online course referred to above. New members will be made very welcome, we may start with the tea! Our philosophy is that age makes no difference, but health does. So, let's do what we can to keep healthy and challenged in body and in mind. We want you as we know we are better together, and together it is easier. We think you will enjoy it.

Macroom Library Supporting Sustainability

Hi, Chris Barrett here again,

Today I have the pleasure of speaking with Lorraine, one of the librarians in Macroom.

The Library in Macroom is always happy to support sustainability, and it does this in a number of ways. The most recent development is a 'Home Energy Saving Kit', which is also available to borrow from Bantry, Clonakilty, Mallow, Middleton and Mitchelstown, as well as from Macroom.

Currently Macroom has a kit supplied by CODEMA. It is available in Macroom to all over 18s for a 2 week lending period. These are the contents:

Energy Saving kit: *Fridge/freezer Thermometer *Thermal Leak Detector *Temperature & Humidity Meter *Plug-In Energy Monitor *Radiator Key *User's Manual

Currently there is only one kit available to borrow from Macroom Library so people may have to wait their turn.

I was fortunate enough to borrow the kit and I am able to share my findings with you below.

Fridge/Freezer Thermometer:This showed the temperature of our fridge was as it should be. However our freezer temperature was not as low as it should be (-15)

Our freezer showed -10.

Thermal Leak Detector:This showed which parts of our house were colder than others. This was not very surprising as we did

this on a sunny day when doors to the outside had been open for a lot of the day. The results would be more revealing if our research had been carried out on a Winter's day. We found this tool easy and fun to work with. In our house the south-facing windows made more difference than the internal insulation, and the building was warmer upstairs. Temperature and Humidity Meter: This showed the temperature and humidity to be fairly constant throughout the house. As before we found it would be less informative on a warm day when windows had been open, So as before we would recommend doing this test on a cold day.

Plug-In Energy Monitor: We found a few downsides to this. It is very challenging to read the output of a socket at ground level in a tight space... without gymnastic qualifications. You are also unable to measure the energy usage of an item which is not plugged into a 3pin socket.

There is a tiny re-set button , and after some fiddling about, we found we could re-set it by pressing with my fish-hook earring. We were surprized to discover that our fish-tank, which runs a pump and a long fluorescent bulb all day, uses no more power than the laptop I am writing on now. Radiator Key:The radiator key was an item we already had in our home and we have always found it useful in getting rid of air- locks which cause cold areas at the top of our radiators.

User's Manual: We found this was very accessible. There is plenty to read in an additional booklet if you are interested.

We also chose to complete the optional survey which was not too challenging.

Anyone who borrows the kit will receive a 4 page survey form which people are invited to complete, if they wish.

In addition to this service, Macroom Library covers a range of sustainable themes through their book stock both for adults and children. These range from Plant Sciences to Positive Recycling habits. Children often take a lot of books out on Natural Disasters and Recycling; whereas adults tend to take out more books on restorative practices such as Yoga, Meditation, Mindfulness and Gardening. These latter books have recently gained even more popularity, particularly post-Covid.

Macroom Library is able to offer a very diverse range of books. By way of example, Merlin Sheldrake's Entangled Life is a fascinating book on funghi, recommended by Ted Cook, our Local Heritage Specialist.

You may be unaware that all the libraries in the state can now lend to each other, so this gives the reader even greater access to more titles. Musical instruments are also available to trial.

There is an audio service offering a range of nonfiction and a large-print selection.

The Library also puts on programmed events throughout the year, that reflect cultural and environmental heritage, alongside usual Library events. Prior to Covid, the Macroom and District

Environmental group (MDEG), was very grateful to avail of this facility and meet in the Library on a monthly basis.

Other events include a Children's Story-Time on Saturday at midday and Tots-Time which is held on the last Friday of the month at 11am. Creative Writing on the first Friday at 11am is currently hosted by the Cork County Writer-In-Residence, Matthew Gedden.

The knitting group, The Purlies, do knitting for various charitable projects and produce seasonal window displays for the library. They meet on the 1st and 3rd Thursday of every month.

There is an Irish language group which meets on the 4th Thursday of each month at 11.30 for a fun chat in Irish. This is hosted by Nora Leavis.

In the past, there have been music mornings on the 2nd Friday of every month which were very well attended social mornings os music and chat starting at 11am. Hopefully, these will be revived in the not too distant future.

The Library also offers access to Planning Regulations and general Reference Material.

If you want to found out anything further in relation to Macroom Library's Sustainable Information, or any other Information you are most welcome to call into the Library or phone them on 026 42483. They are open Tuesday to Saturday. You can email them macroom.library@corkcoco.ie

To keep up to date with any sustainable initiatives within Cork County, you could go to www.corkcoco.ie

There is no longer a charge to join the Library and there are no fines on late returns.

This removes any barriers to joining the Library, and the books seem to be coming back.

What a wonderful way to make libraries sociably accessible to all and promote civic life.

I am hugely grateful to Lorraine and her colleagues for helping with this article.



Book Launch

'Kilmichael The Life and Afterlife of an Ambush'

by Eve Morrison (2022).

Kilmichael Ambush on 28 November 1920 was a critical event in the War of Independence and arguably changed the course of Irish history. In the ambush sixteen British soldiers were killed, another who escaped was caught and subsequently and only one, Fredrick H. Forde survived. Three IRA Volunteers - Michael McCarthy, James O'Sullivan and Pat Deasy lost their lives. Denis O'Sullivan, Coolderrihy was shot in the following days. The ambush occurred one week after the assassination of British intelligence officers and others in Dublin and the massacre at Croke Park later that day. It clearly demonstrated that British forces no longer had the Irish rebels 'by the throat'.

From the outset the ambush has caused controversy and consternation, centering on the nature of what happened and, especially, the issue of the 'false surrender'. Propaganda and false reporting muddied the water as did the subsequent reprisals. In times of war, truth is most often a casualty. Different participants gave different accounts and many varied their versions over the years. Most recently, Peter Hart's book stock a debate that became polarised, personal and bitter.

Dr Eve Morrison has devoted a considerable amount of her distinguished academic career in Trinity College and Cambridge studying the topic. She has published the above volume and she has produced a masterpiece. As well as her academic skills, she has through locals Colum Cronin, Don Woods and others become very familiar with the terrain, the area, the people of the area and the families of those concerned.

Her approach is to review dispassionately the evidence of the ambush, the subsequent reporting - military, governmental and public - and the subsequent literature on Kilmichael. She is fair and open-minded and 'plays the ball and not the player'. The opening chapters give a forensic account of what occurred, all precisely researched and referenced. Her chapters, 4,5 and 6, on 'Barry versus Deasy', Issues and Participants' and 'Tellings and Retellings 1921-80' are lucidly written, informative and insightful. Her outline of Tom Barry is objective and rings true.

Her Appendices are very helpful in appreciating Kilmichael Ambush, its place in Irish history and the subsequent controversies. She presents respectfully the evidence directly to the reader.

Macroom aspects are well covered. The British soldiers left Macroom and their bodies were returned to The Castle. Dr Jeremiah Kelleher, GP, South Square did the post mortems and presented his findings to the relevant inquiries. Thomas Grainger, his neighbour, in South Square, was involved in subsequent legal compensation cases. Stephen Brady's book has very good insights on the incident from a town perspective.

The book was launched in Castletown Kinneigh Community Hall to a good audience on 29 May, 2022. Colum Cronin introduced the meeting, was the guest speaker and sang the 'Boys of Kilmichael'. With a scholarly and entertaining address, he enlightened us (the audience) further on the Ambush and book, and explained the provenance of the ballad - a very interesting story in its own right. Dr Morrison then spoke and explained the background to her research, her efforts and the obstacles she encountered. One was impressed with her intelligence, meticulousness, craft, determination and, most of all, her fairness. In a

following discussion, she reinforced these impressions.

Among the audience were distinguisher authors Seán A. Murphy, Michael Galvin (Kilmurry) and Mary O'Mahony (Kilmurry). The very pleasant occasion was capped-off by a very welcome cup of tea and a chat.

For anyone interested in the history of Kilmichael Ambush, this superb volume is essential and, for me, it is the definite account to date. I highly recommended the book.

Macroom has witnessed many historic events over the centuries and many were associated with the town centre. This tour tries to outline some of these events and concentrates on activities from the War of Independence but tries to give context to these actions. An alternate tour may be held.

The origin of the town - its location, why it evolved there etc.

The meaning of the town's name.

The interface of Gaelic culture to the west and English/British culture to the east.

Macroom Castle - Lady Ardilaun, the contribution of Richard Hedges Eyre to the town.

An t-Athar Peadar Ó Laoghaire's plaque; his association with the town and his contribution to Irish Literature.

Aspects of Art Ó Laoghaire's life and how he was affected by the Penal Law; The Caoineadh.

The contribution of Stephen Brady's book'The Briar of Life' to the history of the town.

The Protestant Church and graveyard and the Protestant National School.

Aspects of Kilmichael Ambush; the funeral cortege of the British casualties and the coffins.

The part played by Charlie Browne, Dan 'Colder' Corkery' and others in the War of Independence.

The story of Prof, John A. Murphy, Macrompian and eminent historian

The story of the Victoria /Terence/Penn Hotel and why its name changed.

The contribution of Harry Murphy to the War of Independence.

Incidents that occurred in William's Hotel (now the Castle Hotel) - Michael Collins' presence on the day of his death and the presence of a local man in his convoy to Bandon that morning. The tale of the arrest and execution of British intelligence officers in Kilgobnet in 1922. The visit of Major Bernard Montgomery to Macroom on 2 May 1922 in his attempts to resolve the Kilgobnet kidnappings; the funeral cortege of the British casualties and the coffins.

The involvement of Thomas Grainger, solicitor, South Square in a civil action taken by Frederick H. Forde, the only British survivor of the Kilmichael Ambush.

The story of Dr Jeremiah Kelleher, South Square, and his involvement in the War of Independence and World War 1;. the IRA assassination of his son Philip in Kiernan's Greville Arms Hotel, in October 1920

Local Walks

Warrenscourt walk



Warrenscourt walk is nestled in a gently sloping woodland overlooking the Buingea river and the rich farmland that surrounds it.

The main feature is the trail that runs beside a little bubbling brook and the green area that is popular with young families. It is linked with another parking area and picnic site on the outskirts of Kilmurry village. Interesting to note that a section of the old 'Butter Road' that was used by farmers to bring their butter to the Cork market, used to run through the forest and is still in use today.


Views open and close in this forest depending on the forest cycle. At times, the Derrynasaggart and Boggeragh mountains are visible with clear views of the Paps, Mullaghanish, Mushera More and Mushera Beg. Well worth a visit! Family and dog friendly.

Mullinhassig



The Glashagarriff River courses its way through this small woodland of circa 8 hectares. Mullinhassig or Poll an Easaigh in Irish, translates to head or pool of waterfall. This probably refers to the pool that is formed at the base of the impressive waterfall towards the north western end of the property. Local folklore had it that the bottom of this pool cannot be found. There are a number of imposing rock outcrops throughout the wood, most notably on the top trail. Douglas fir, Oak, Sitka spruce and Japanese larch are the main tree species here. There was a tacking mill to the south east of the property at one time.

Rossacroo Wood walk



Rossacroo na Loo to give it it's full title, straddles the Loo river and valley. The wooded slopes come right down to the river from both sides. The wood carries a mixture of broadleaves and conifers. An old railway line that operated between Kenmare & Headford junction (1891-1959) ran right through the wood parallel to the river. This line is still in existence and makes for an enchanting walk through oak, birch and hazel scrub. The focal point of Rossacroo is the Millennium forest site. This is an area of 40 hectares with Sessile oak in the valley bottom and lower slopes and a mixture of Oak and Scots pine, Sitka spruce and Lodgepole pine on the upper reaches. Across the road from the millennium forest is another car park and picnic facilities. The largest section of the forest is on this the northern side of the valley. There are 15 km of forest road in this block to whet the appetite of the walking enthusiast. As one ascends the hill vantage points are to be found here and there which open up the panorama of the valley below. For the really adventurous Crohane lake is to be found on the most northerly tip of the forest. Suitable clothing and footwear is advised.





VOTE TO REJECT NUCLEAR AND GAS BY EP COMMITTEES IS DISAPPOINTING AND SHORT SIGHTED - MEP KELLEHER

Today's vote to object to the inclusion of nuclear and gas in the EU's Green Taxonomy is incredibly disappointing and short sighted. When it comes before the full parliament in July, I will once again vote to include both in the EU's energy future," says Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher.

Kelleher was speaking following a vote at a joint meeting of the ECON and ENVI committees today in the European Parliament where an objection to the Commission's proposal was adopted by 76 votes to 62.

"The inclusion of nuclear and gas is a no-brainer in my opinion. While its inclusion or non-inclusion does not stop countries investing in these types of facilities, it does make it less attractive for investors. It also reduces opportunities for investment into nuclear research - research that could make it even

"Gas will be an essential component of how eastern European countries move away from coal and oil to renewables. It is a transition fuel and should be treated as such. The Commission's proposals are quite clear on that matter.

"Europe needs to be honest with itself. 50% of all carbon-free electricity produced in the EU comes from nuclear. It's an essential part of our move to zero emissions electricity production.

"Those in the left-green bloc in Irish and European politics need to ask themselves what's more important - being ideological pure or reducing our carbon emissions?

"I'm not advocating for Ireland to start building nuclear power plants, but I am saying we need to stop being hypocrites. We are currently building a transmission cable under the Celtic Sea between Cork France. Electricity, and generated by nuclear, will flow into Ireland and will power our homes, our e-cars and our offices. "My vote was a vote to

be realistic and honest with ourselves. I am hopeful

the full parliament will vote reject this simplistic objection next month so we can get on with doing what is necessary to save our planet - ending our dependence on fossil fuels," concluded Kelleher.

Cork 0-16 Kerry 0-7

CORK were crowned TG4 All-Ireland Ladies senior football champions for the seventh time in eight seasons at Croke Park. A dominant display crushed Munster rivals Kerry in the showpiece decider at GAA HO. 16,998 spectators watched Cork collect the Brendan Martin Cup for the second successive year and since 2005, Eamonn Ryan's all-conquering players have lost just one championship match, against Tyrone in 2010. That Banagher defeat was described by Ryan as a "pebble in the shoe" and it's ensured that the Leesiders have bounced back to claim back-to-back All-Ireland titles.

Kerry, contesting a first All-Ireland senior decider since 1993, suffered a first-ever defeat in the showpiece fixture, as Cork maintained their unbeaten record in senior finals. Kerry packed their defence but as a result, they struggled desperately for scores at the other end. Sarah Houlihan carried the fight to Cork in attack and goalkeeper Edel

Murphy kept a clean sheet but overall, this was a chastening experience for Kerry. For Cork, wing backs Briege Corkery and Geraldine O'Flynn were in magnificent form, surging forward from defence and putting their opponents on the back foot. Three of Cork's six starting forwards failed to register a point from play but the scoreboard kept ticking over with regularity nonetheless. Doireann O'Sullivan was a revelation at centre forward, notching four points from play, while Valerie

Mulcahy collected six of her seven points from placed balls.

The free count heavily favoured Cork - 32-11 and Kerry Manager William O'Sullivan admitted his displeasure with some decisions against Kerry after the game. But O'Sullivan acknowledged that Kerry could have no complaints with this latest defeat. They went fourteen minutes without a score in the first half and trailed at half-time by 0-3

Kerry did land two successive points early in the second half but they never looked like launching a revival. It was the ideal scenario for Castletown, underdogs, underrated and determined to atone for the previous year's final defeat when they were the odds-on favourites to beat Kinsale out the gate but who themselves came a cropper on that occasion.

Early points from Ciaran Sheehan, Daniel Goulding and John Dineen had Eire Og in a three-point lead in the opening ten minutes. Back came Castletown with five points in quick succession to lead by 0-5 to 0-3 by the end of the first quarter but two points from Daniel Goulding, one a free, the other from a '45', had the sides level in the 17th minute. Andrew O'Sullivan, the Castletown midfielder and a former Cork senior panellist, lashed the spot kick to the net and when he followed on with a point from a '45' in the 38th minute the Beara men were four point clear, 1-8 to 0-7 and a surprise began to appear possible. Back came Eire Óg with a point from Daniel Goulding, his fifth, and Castletown were reduced to 14 men when they had a forward red carded after receiving two earlier yellows. Daniel Goulding had a superb point from a long range free and at the three-quarter mark pointed from play to leave only a point between the teams and it was now anybody's game. In the 48th minute the teams were level when Ciarán Sheehan won possession at midfield and parted to Kevin Hallissey who kicked over and Eire Óg hopes

soared once again.

Castletown dug deep however and Alan O'Regan put them back in front from a 53rd minute free and they followed up with two further points to lead by three with five minutes remaining. Aidan O'Connor had a point for Eire Óg in the 57th minute, and two minutes later Kevin Hallissey cut the deficit to a single point after taking a pass from Dineen. As the game went into two minutes of injury time Eire Óg kicked a wide and then Castletown broke up field and their wing back kicked over a point to ease their situation. The final whistle brought joy to the Beara men and major disappointment for Eire Óg.

Kilmurry then battled their way back into contention and they led by a point at half time having denied 'the Rock' any further scores in that first half. It was the Duhallow champions who dominated the second half however and Kilmurry went scoreless until the 53rd minute by which stage they had fallen two points in arrears. 

Would You Like to Contribute to the Heritage Towns and Villages of County Cork Publication?

County Cork has an extensive network of settlements, which have evolved through centuries of growth and change, to provide a rich variety of unique settlements of varying scale and character. These locations have their own unique history and an upcoming publication will bring their stories together.

The development of urban settlements in the county dates back to the Viking and then Norman settlements of the 10th, 11th and 12th centuries. The Normans had walled towns at Cork, Kinsale, Youghal and Buttevant as well as numerous smaller settlements particularly in the east and north-east of the county. The urban pattern we have today was largely created in the first four decades of the 17th century and many, if not the majority of the buildings in our towns and villages today, date back to the 18th/19th century.

In this upcoming publication on the Heritage Towns and Villages of County Cork there will be a general introduction to the historic developments of the main periods and how these impacted on the development of the county's urban network. There will be numerous illustrated examples to show this story as it evolves. MA in Local History (School of History U.C.C.)

Applications are now being accepted for admittance to the MA in Local History degree programme beginning in September 2022. Lectures are specially tailored to provide a practical guide to the writing of Irish local history, indicating the main sources, their location and how best they might be exploited.

Lectures will cover the introduction to sources and archives, approaches to Local History, reading the landscape, maps, census and parish records, Valuation Office records, Estate Records, sources for urban history, oral history and folklore, historiography, landscape and material history, gender and history, labour history, military and political history, cultural history, economic history, demographics, religion and much more.

She felt utterly helpless and cried out to the Lord Jesus (Romans 10:13). She knew that if she moved the car might fall off the cliff. Next thing, a tiny red car screeched to a halt by her side. Four huge men all dressed in matching boiler suits jumped out of it. It was such a peculiar sight - she wondered how they had fitted inside the small car because they were all so tall!

One of the men approached her window to speak to her. Let me go back though - when she had those encounters with the Lord as a small child He would always call her 'little one'. Ok - fast forward again to the cliff - the man in the boiler suit looked her straight in the eye as she sat there petrified and, with a glint in his eye, he said to her 'you're in trouble little one'. The four men lifted her car back upon the road, got in their own tiny red car and sped off. When she finally reached the village at the top she enquired where they were as the road through the village was a dead end and no other cars had passed her on the road. No-one there had seen any red car drive through, and had seen no men in boiler-suits working in the village. They were all puzzled but this lady knew that God had sent His angels to rescue her confirming it by using the special name He always used to address her 'little one' (Isaiah 43:1).

The Scriptures have much to say about angels. How God sends them to protect believers who know Him and seek Him. "For he will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways." (Psalm 91:11). But we are not to worship angels! They are ministering spirits sent out to serve (Hebrews 1:14). John was given revelation of the end times by an angel. He fell down to worship him but was quickly told "You must not do that! I am a fellow servant with you and your brothers who hold to the testimony of Jesus. Worship God." (Revelation 19:10; Exodus 20:3) Don't talk to your angels - talk to the Lord Jesus, and listen to His voice (Hebrews 1:1-8; John 10:4+27).
