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CLINICS THROUGHOUT MUNSTER

MINISTER VISITS MACROOM SENIOR CITIZENS

The Minister of State for Mental Health and Older People Mary Butler visited Macroom Senior Citizens where she met Pat O'Connell and Evelyn Mungovan who showed her around the Complex.

Pat O'Connell explained that in Sullane Haven we have 13 en-suite residential units, Chiropody room and Sitting room and the Fr. Ryan Hall consists of Dining Room, Kitchen and Community Hall. Our Kitchen prepares all the meals for our Residents as well as preparing food for our Meals on Wheels Service which operates 7 days weekly. Evelyn Mungovan informed the Minister that our Community Hall facilitates various events for the Elderly during the year such as Bingo, Bridge, Socials and Musical Evenings, Tai-Chi Classes and Fundraising Events. The group then made their way across to our Sheltered Housing Complex, Sullane Place where we have seven houses and the Minister was impressed by the lovely gardens laid out by the residents. We also dropped into our "Shopeen" Charity Shop which raises the necessary funds to keep our services up and running. Minister Butler stated that all the service

which Macroom Senior Citizens have in place were and the 24 Volunteers who help to run the services excellent and she thanked the Management, Staff : on a weekly basis.

Can you tell me where you're from and how you ended up in England?

I'm from Codrum, Macroom. I trained as a nurse in the North Infirmary, Cork but when I was unable to study midwifery in Ireland, I went to England in the 80's and still live here in London.

Can you tell me how you got into volunteering and what the recent award is for?

I started volunteering as a Games maker during London 2012 Olympic Games. After the Games an organisation called Join In was set up to link Volunteers with sports clubs/events to make it easier for volunteers to join events but mainly for clubs, especially as grass roots sports level, to have access to volunteers to support their events/ clubs. I'm also very fortunate to live close to Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, where the 2012 Games were held, and I volunteer regularly there as a park Champion supporting a variety of events eg Hockey, Netball, Basketball, Cycling, Swimming, Baseball and concerts held within the stadium as well as volunteering with their Conservation team. The recent award was given to staff recognising their commitment and resilience in coordinating and delivering the national Covid -19 vaccination programme in North East London. There was a shortage of nurses to support the delivery of the vaccination programme so I returned from retirement to work as a nurse in the local Vaccination Centre. The centre I worked in (and still do) is a Mass Vaccination Centre and we were administering between 1500-1900 vaccines daily.



We worked 12-hour shifts and the centre was open from 08.30-19.00 daily. When the vaccinations were extended to include 12-16 year olds we arranged for teams to go to schools and set up a 'pop up' vaccination clinic. The work is very rewarding supporting a programme which had to respond to the pandemic was challenging as both staff and the public were still concerned about leaving their home, being in close proximity to other households. People were also very concerned about the vaccine and in some cases, people also had needle phobia which we had to deal with. Can you tell me how it makes you feel and where

you see volunteering going for you in the future? All events I volunteer at are different (some are

local, some international) but everyone works together to make the event a success. There's always a positive attitude and they are always good fun. People can decide how much time, what events to volunteer at so volunteering can fit in to everyone's lifestyle. Volunteering is a great way to meet new friends, be an active part of your community and also help with mental and physical health. There is such a variety of events/ activities to volunteer at some I volunteered at this year are small and local eg Parkrun, others are international eg Soccer aid, Commonwealth Games coming up in July, Women's Euro Football, Athletics in Munich.

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Ukrainian refugees, 2022

A refugee is 'someone taking refuge (seeking safety) in a foreign country from religious or political persecution, or from war or natural disasters such as earthquakes' (Collins's The Concise English Dictionary). Throughout mankind's history, the phenomenon has been present. Examples are what occurred during the Crusades - on all sides, and more recently, what happened in the two world wars. More recently again Syria, Ethiopia, the former Yugoslav countries, and now Ukraine have refugee issues. Certainly, the Ukraine invasion and exodus has captured the worlds and Ireland's attention. Perhaps it is our own history of emigration, accelerated after the famine when Ireland's population fell from 8.2 million in 1841 to 4.6 in 1911. Now, there are about 40,000 Ukrainian refugees here. A commentator wrote that Ireland's response is better this time because Ukrainians are white and Christian, and that the Russian invasion is a threat to Europe and the world (Irish Times, 19 June, 2022). Be that as it may, Ukraine's situation is sad and grim.

Since Russia invaded Ukraine on 24 February 2022, an enormous calamity has unfolded in that country. The confirmed figures are stark: 4,677 Ukrainian civilians have been killed, including 320 children, and at least 5,829 injured (United Nations). The real figure is likely to be much higher. Both Russia and Ukrainian military casualties have been high but no exact figures are available – the truth is often the first casualty in war. Russia has claimed that it has killed 23,367 Ukrainian soldiers and the US estimates that 16,000 Russian (and their allies) have lost at least 16,000 people. Casualty numbers nearly always exceed the numbers killed. People displacement is another huge and awful by-product of the war/invasion.

Pre-invasion, Ukraine had a population of about 42 million. Since February, more than 7.5 million (or c. 18%) have fled the country; internally, another 8 million have left their homes but are still in safer parts of the country (Evening Standard and UN). {5.1 million is the preliminary 2022 population of the Republic of Ireland, the highest in the 26 counties since 1841, and that was before the famine).}. Most of the refugees have gone to neighbouring countries – Poland had 3.3 million by May, and Romania, Hungary, Moldova and Slovakia have taken large many. The rest have relocated to many other countries throughout, Europe, Asia and America. So far, Ireland has about 40,000 refugees and they continue to come. The

overall displacement is the biggest in Europe since WW2 and has entailed a huge amount of suffering and heart-break for those involved. While delighted to be here and safe, refugees have not come by choice. Many Ukrainians would have barely heard of the country before February, and most have little or no English. The vast majority are women and children as, without strict exemptions, all Ukrainian men 18-60 are banned from leaving the country (CSO).

There are some Ukrainian refugees in Macroom and throughout the country Cork and Kerry, with relatively big numbers in Midleton, Killarney and Kenmare. EU countries have been particularly good at accepting refugees and Ireland has been very much to the forefront in supporting Ukrainians in this regard. Some are lucky and have been able to get houses. Others live in hotels or modified buildings such as the Green Glens, Millstreet or share in private homes. There is a suggestion that student accommodation may be used. With our rising inflation, housing crisis, and previous asylum-seekers, many problems will be encountered to house decently our latest guests. Because of the suddenness of the change and relocation, loss of family, home and home-place, many are stunned and are suffering from grief, anxiety and distress. One woman commented that 'she just wants her old life back; she wants to live her life again'. Since their arrival in April, one family has lived in Cork, Meath and Cork again. Apart from language difficulties, there are also many other barriers. One ten-year old was petrified going to school on his first day - he just wanted to be at 'home' and going to his own school with his old friends. Another example is that their medical system is different to ours. There are no GPs in Ukraine and people present to various specialist centres, as needed. Ukraine is a vast country with many remote communities, and health care requires travel to the nearest available centre. Here, accessing social welfare and medical cards needs a permanent address but movement leads to extra delays and 'red tape'. Obtaining driving insurance is another difficulty. Quickly, the EU recognized Ukrainian driving licences but the insurance companies were slower to follow. One barrier cited was that Ukrainian drivers were not credited for their driving experience. Now, that situation has changed with some companies. For cheap older cars – often the only ones in possible buying range for refugees - guotations exceeded the price of the cars. For third-party insurance, quotations of \in 3,000 and \in 2,500 were offered for cars worth less than that. With some help and some research, prices offered have been reduced to about \in 400 in at least one case.

Many refugees are well-educated, very clever and experienced in business. In one family, mother was a law graduate and a successful business woman; her daughter is a trained actress. Her second daughter (15) is a talented cook and will attend school, in transition year. Her ten-year old soon has enrolled in a local national school. Both schools were superb in welcoming and facilitating their enrolment. If supported well and properly now, many will be great assets to our country. Many are very proud and feel embarrassed by being in a dependent position. Getting them settled and integrated will benefit both them and the community.

Having met some refugees, my impression is that they are delighted to be safe and appreciative of their warm reception in Ireland. But at the same time, they are stunned, bewildered and grieving for their previous life and existence. They want to be with their families and loved ones, to be at home with their community and to enjoy their previous peaceful existence. As evidenced by people returning to the war-ravaged country, many are not sure that they have made the right decision. Their immediate and long-term future depends on the length of the conflict, and nobody can predict that. Their lives, while safe, are 'suspended'.

The word 'refugee' comes from the Latin word 'refugium'. In Western history, the term was first applied to French Protestant Huegenots looking for a safe place against Catholic persecution after the Edict of Fontainebleau in 1540 (Tom Holland, 2012). In World War 1, the term was applied to people in Flanders, Belgium, who fled from their country because of fighting during the war. Unfortunately, the problem of refugees persists and, in many ways, is worse than before.

War with its attendant death, destruction and its child of mass displacement and refugees is madness. The hope is that Putin and his ilk are replaced and that the better face of humanity again prevails. It is obscene that enormous amounts money is spent on weapons to kill fellow people instead of combating poverty and providing better housing, health care and education to as many as possible.

And all the while our one world burns.

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CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION

After a break of 3 years, the Inchigeela Procession was held again to the delight of many. The village looked splendid and credits go to the great effort made by all. The choir were in great voice and religious music was provided by members of the Ballingeary Pipe Band. First Communicants provided colourful flowers and petals on the road ahead. The familiar stewards saw to it that all went off safely. Well done to all.

TIDY TOWNS

The Tidy Towns people have done some Trojan work recently in preparing the village for the Procession and for the Tidy Towns adjudication which could occur at any time. They were especially thankful to about 10 willing painters who turned out and did some super work at different areas in the village and nearby.

FESTIVAL

Preperations for the end of summer Inchigeela Festival are at an advanced stage and court permits for same are awaited.

Those of us who have been doing the online course 'The Science of Health and Happiness as We Age', provided by the Royal College of Surgeons, have learned just how important relationships are in promoting both health and happiness.

In the last lecture we were given ten tips on establishing and maintaining relationships. I agree with all initially but now nine out of the ten. The one I am having trouble with is related to an upgrade of the Golden Rule. The Golden Rule is here a lot longer than you or me. It is the principle of treating others as one wants to be treated. Various expressions of this rule can be found in the tenets of most religions and creeds, and it can be traced back as far as 2000BC Egypt.

You can imagine my surprise then when we were told about a paper published this year, four thousand years later by a renowned psychologist which suggests, well, it's not right.

I now understand this has been called the platinum rule, platinum being more valuable than gold. I was intrigued. This does sound like common sense. After all, aren't we all different? Why then would I treat someone the way someone else (me) would want to be treated? Yes, I thought, this is better indeed. It is plausible. There is additionally here. You ask, listen, and then respond accordingly. I must admit I tend to be a little excited by interesting ideas that are new to me.

Then as the days went by, I found myself being at first a little uneasy, and then a little unsure. I did not quite know why, but I think it was triggered in me by the thought of all the great intellects in those thousands of years that had got it wrong. I knew I would not settle until I thought this through.

The more scenarios I considered the more uneasy I became. Making little progress, I did the wise thing. I went to bed.

Those of you who know me well, know that I'm tone deaf, and not much into music, so on awakening it was a surprise to me to find myself thinking of Meat Loaf, an artist I do like, and one of his songs, though not my favourite, 'I would do anything for love, but I won't do that'.

So, that's when the thought came to me, we cannot treat people as they would like to be treated when it would conflict with our own sense of morality. That would always remain the limiting factor, so consequently perhaps the additionality I perceived was illusion. And if I would like to be asked, listened to, and others to act accordingly, and I could expect all would like the same, then

there is nothing additional there either. We are all experienced enough too, to have learned that just because something is plausible does not mean it is true. Otherwise, no one could lie to us successfully. And what we think is common sense can be what resonates with our level of ignorance.

Nonetheless, I think that psychologist's point is interesting, and she has clarified something for me. So now, (on my best days anyway), I will try to treat people how I would like to be treated, (having now recognised that, since I would like others to establish first how I would like to be treated, the golden rule dictates I should establish first how they would like to be treated, and then treat them accordingly, but subject to not compromising my value system). In summary, I can't see anything, other than clarity, that has been added. I think at best they are in essence one and the same. So, in my case, on this occasion I will abandon the attraction of the new and stick with the old.

What I'm wondering though is, what do you think of her assertion. I won't be for long, it's bedtime! Tomorrow is a new day. Oh, the joy of it. Who knows what exciting idea, perhaps old yet new to us, will it bring our way?

In other news, the 'staying fit for the future course' is finishing Thursday 7th July for the summer. We are continuing the Aqua fit course until the end of July. Hedgerows And the Law

The delisting of Ireland's Hedgerows and Field Boundaries as "Protected Structures" under our 1963 Planning Act, by 'Big' Phil Hogan on September 8th ,2021, drew the above statement from Taxonomist and U.C.C. Nuclear Botanist Graduate, Diana Beresford.

2022 marks MDEG's 30th Anniversary of its, "National Hedgerow Campaign" launch, jointly conceived with Dr. Daphne P. Mould. (We applaud Ms.O'Sullivan's poignant profile of our deeply revered Daphne – Lee Valley Outlook, June 2022). It is dispiriting that it took our Oireachtas 33 years to transpose the 1979 E.U. Wildbirds and 1992 Habitats Directives into our domestic law – via the 2011 Regulations.

"The big print doth giveth- but the little print doth taketh away"

sang Tom Waites.

The media fanfare surrounding the enactment in 2011 of the Wildbird Regulations eclipsed the small print in a separate enactment that "delisted" Hedgerows – our Wild Birds primary

Habitat, and transferred responsibility for Ireland's largest man- made monument to the Dept. Of Agriculture.

In 1972, Ireland's 20 million acres supported

c.780,000 miles of Field and Roadside Hedgerows, (pers. comm. Dr. P. Mould, 1992) - making their collective territorial cover, Ireland's largest Nature Reserve.

The bulk and origin of this vast wildlife corridor dates from the 1667 Cattle Act that prescribed Blackthorn, Whitethorn, Holly, Crabapple, Furze and Privet as the main plant species to be planted whereby fields (Old Saxon "Felled", as in Forest) were enclosed.

Field enclosures came later to Muskerry's marginal shallow acid uplands – c.1810 -1840.

View our online First Edition O.S. (6. inch 1849) and note the tens and tens of thousands of miles of, "Sportive lines of woodland run wild." (Wordsworth)

In addition to "Men and Machines" looking for something to do – by the mid 1980s J.C.B.s and Track machines were in demand. Electric shock wire paddocked grazing enclosures – actively encouraged by our Farm Advisory Service (Teagasc), which service has cost the Taxpayer €80 million in wages.

The accelerating "clearance of nature" has been incentivised because of the E.U. Basic Farm Payment – no E.U subsidies are payable for any land under "scrub, woods/ditches, wetlands, streams, rivers etc. etc."

Irish Taxpayers were recently fined €180 million by the European Commission for "ineligible land" E.U Subsidies.

Six hundred plus native wild flowers and their associated "Precious Pollinators" shelter beneath our lovely wild hedges that adorn Ireland – our shrews and hedghogs abide there and rest. Section 40 (Wildlife Act 1976), as ammended by Section 46



Hedgeho

(Wildlife Act 2000), prohibits

"CUTTING, GRUBBING, BURNING OR DESTRUCTION BY OTHER MEANS OF ANY VEGETATION GROWING ON UNCULTIVATED LAND OR IN HEDGES OR DITCHES",

from March 1st – August 31st. Exemptions include Health and Safety, Noxious weed removal, Central Fisheries and Roads Operations. Our Wildlife Service (N.P.W.S.ie) request,

"the assistance of the Public in bringing any unlawful cutting to attention, by reporting details to An Garda Siochana or to the local NPWS Ranger". But "The Land of Milk and Money" lobby, with only the briefest Public Notice (Christmas Week 2014) forced (in the small print of the Heritage Act 2016) the removal from the Wildlife Statutes of the "Closed Period" (March 1st – August 31st) and the vesting in the Minister of extraordinary powers to vary and determine "the Birds and Wildlife Nesting and Breeding Season".

"Plough your fields busy farmer – sow the wheat and the grain. By the sweat of your brow shall the needy be fed.

But leave us our hedgerows our sad hearts to gladden. Man lives not by bread alone, have you not heard it said?"

True, there were only 14 pupils, no indoor toilets, old- fashioned linked bench-desks, no phone or SNA, just a very inspiring teacher! It was a bit of a shock to me as I had been teaching in large schools in the UK.

However, we decided to go with our gut feeling and sent our two sons to be educated there, and it was an education that remains extraordinary in its compassion and excellence.

When my oldest son started as that Junior Infant, Mrs Kelly was the Teacher, Principal, Secretary, Nurse, Problem-solver, Cleaner and often the Chauffeur. The atmosphere resembled that of a large family and every child was taught at their level, and encouraged to the very best of their potential.

As I was privileged to work there as a Resource Teacher, I was also able to see from the inside what an amazing school it is. It was and still is, the most dynamic, forward-looking and extremely caring educational establishment I have worked in over 40 varied years of teaching. Tragically, the school had a sad shock with the untimely death of Mrs Sheila Kelly in 2009.

It is a consequence of her caring legacy that the school was able to rally under the new Principal, Mrs Eileen Foley, who had

worked with her for years as her Deputy Principal. With her own very dedicated approach, Mrs Eileen Foley rallied the school and guided it into an era of even greater environmental awareness, I.T., etc, whilst increasing the numbers on the roll, Teachers and SNAs, not to mention over-seeing the building of two extensions and a loft-extension which have added so much to the capacity of the school.

Under Mrs Foley's leadership, pupils would take pride at excelling in Music, Speech and Drama, Science, I.T., Sport, Quizzes and much else.

Many a larger National School would have dreaded coming up against a calm and well-prepared Muinefliuch, in quizzes over the years.

Both Sheila Kelly and Eileen Foley guided Muinefliuch, not only with their own flair and enthusiasm for teaching and guiding teachers, parents and pupils, but did it with humility regarding their great achievements. We know how fortunate we were to have had them as our principals. On behalf of all who knew them, Colleagues, Parents, Parent's Associations, Boards of Management, and especially the children who attended Muinefliuch school under their watch, we send our heartfelt thanks and wish Mrs Eileen Foley a much desrved Happy Retirement.

We now look forward, and offer our support to our new Principal, and send a very warm welcome to Muinefliuch.

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History

The Civil War & Reconciliation: The Case of Collins and Mitchell



During this current period of commemorations, we are learning ever more about our past, as well as unearthing fascinating local information and accounts which had begun to fade from our combined memory. During the Civil War, which broke now out a centenary ago, families and friends were irreversibly divided by their respective viewpoints, yet, attempts at reconciliation were made many years later. One such story of local interest is that of the relationship breakdown between Anti-Treaty IRA leader, Commandant-General Herbert Sean Mitchell, and pro-Treaty military leader, Michael Collins. Mitchell, who was well known nationally, lead a number of ambushes across Muskerry during the Independence and Civil War period.

After the Anglo-Irish Truce in 1921, Mitchell found himself as one of the few remaining high-ranking

officers in Cork, and developed a strong friendship with Commandant-General Tom Barry, which would last throughout their lives. Between them, they helped to establish Cork as a Republican stronghold during the Civil War. Their old ally, Michael Collins, was under pressure to find bright individuals who were influential in Republican circles in order to lead the newly-formed National (Free State) Army. He invited Mitchell to Moore's Hotel in Cork City, where he personally offered him Command of the Southern Division of the Free State Army. However, he was not successful in persuading Mitchell. An argument ensued, and Mitchell stormed out of the hotel. That was the last time in which they would ever speak together. Mitchell was later captured in the aftermath in the Battle of Ballyvourney, being detained in the old Macroom Barracks, and then imprisoned in the old Gaol located at Sundays Well,

Cork City.

However, several decades later, Mitchell's youngest daughter, the late Dr. Ruth, who herself was credited with introducing clinical art therapy into the mainstream of Irish psychiatric services, as well as the transition from the old asylum network towards community socialisation, received a rather kind gesture from one of Collins' grand-nieces. The gift, a China piece, was offered to Ruth as a token of reconciliation for the terrible falling-out which had occurred several decades earlier. The piece is still in existence today.

As this country faces greater challenges in light of new economic problems, perhaps it is a reminder that we can achieve great things together.

History

Macroom History Group's Field Trip to Béal na Blá, 26 June 2022

In its first field trip, Macroom History Group visited Béal na Blath and other locations associated with Michael Collins's shooting there almost 100 years ago. The erudite Michael Galvin was the guide and he attracted a good crowd of twenty, with others popping in and out at various stages.

The tour traced part of the route travelled by Collins on that fateful day. The trip began at Dooniskey Station; Collins's convoy had reached that point by a circuitous route from Macroom, guided by Timmy Kelleher (The Garage) who was then a driver at Williams Hotel and who had originally lived near the Gearagh. There was a breakdown near Ballymichael House and Collins was about to speak to the owners, the O'Mahony's

, when the convoy's motor problem was solved. The cavalcade then went to Kilmurry and, along the way, met a local who refused to move his ducks out of the way. Eventually, the convoy reached Kilmurry and, passing where the Kilmurry GAA pitch now stands, went to Béal na Blá. Near the Diamond Bar, the convoy stopped again to enquire directions and Collins was spotted by Dinny The Dane. A meeting of anti-treaty Republicans was taking place nearby and they received the information. De Valera was in the vicinity and, despite his opinion, it was decided to set up an ambush if the convoy returned that way. It is not certain if Timmy Kelleher was still guiding at this stage. The convoy stopped again at Newcestown Catholic Church.

The entourage then went to Bandon, Clonakilty and Skibbereen and returned to Bandon again. Emmet D'Alton was the party commander and it was decided to go to Cork, and fatefully, it was decided to retrace their route. This is considered unwise in war situations. The local IRA was strongly



Republican and the danger was high. An ambush was laid, just in case. Two previous attempts on Collins's life had been made.

When the convoy returned to Béal na Blá, it drove into the ambush; surprisingly it decided to stay and fight, Again this is, according to Michael Galvin, considered unwise as you are fighting on the enemies' terms. The received wisdom is to get out of the situation as quickly as possible. Further, while Collins was brilliant in many ways, he was inexperienced in combat situations. Whatever the reasoning, the convoy stayed and fought and Collins was killed by a bullet to his head.

After the ambush, Collins was rushed to Cork and there was an incident in Cloughduv about receiving absolution, where a shot was fired at the local parish priest; luckily it missed. Eventually Collins corpse was received in the Military Hospital in Cork. No proper post-mortem was done.

These and many more details were disclosed by Michael during his very informative, entertaining and perceptive commentary. His brilliant grasp of the larger picture was combined with many telling local details. Being there and following the route enhanced the understanding of his very interested audience.

From a Macroom's perspective, this seminal event in Irish history was intimately connected with the town. Collins was in Macroom on that fateful and fatal morning, he had a local on his journey to Bandon; Timmy Kelleher's son Michael lives in Coolehane. In more recent years, a grand niece of Michael Collins lives in the town,

Macroom History Group is very grateful to Michael for giving his time and sharing his deep knowledge on Collins's death at Béal na Bláth. And a special word of thanks to Mary O'Mahony, Chairperson, for allowing us the use of Kilmuurry Museum for the concluding talk and the very welcome 'cuppa'. The audience's very warm round of applause at the end summed up the outing. **Con Kelleher**

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MEMORIALS AND REMEMBRANCE



Welcome back dear student we are looking forward to some sunshine. Do you notice though that when the sun shines in, it highlights all the dust and dirt inside? God our Creator lives in unapproachable Light (1st Timothy 6:17; Malachi 4:1-2). Jesus identified Himself as the 'Light of the world' in John's Gospel (John 8:12). A woman who had been caught in adultery was thrown down on the ground in front of Him for judgement while He was teaching in the temple court. Jesus appeared not to listen to the condemnation that was being levelled at this woman by those accusing her, instead He was writing in the sand (John 8:1-11).

When they finished their accusations Jesus spoke. (Anyone caught in adultery at that time was to be stoned to death once judgement was passed. The scribes and Pharisees didn't want to pass the judgement – they wanted Jesus to condemn her and lose His popular following, or, better still - if He let her go, they would have reason to kill Him too.) His answer though, left them speechless and took the energy out of the fight. He told them 'sure, that's what the law says, but I say to you whoever among you has not sinned, let him be the first one to cast a stone at her'. This answer stumped them and they dropped their stones and walked away one by one – beginning with the elders! Jesus pointed out to them what we tend to overlook in life – that we all have sinned and have no way of saving ourselves (Romans 3:23). It very easy to examine others under a microscope while glossing over our own failings (Matthew 7:1-5).

Jesus then raised the woman up from the dirt, a beautiful picture of His Mercy and Love (Psalm 113:7). He asked her who was now condemning her. She answered 'no-one Lord' and by that one word she acknowledged that she needed Jesus as her Lord to save her, and thus she entered in to receive the free gift of Salvation that Jesus was about to pay for on the Cross (John 3:16-17). Jesus answered her 'neither do I condemn you - go and sin no more'. He did not excuse her sin, and He does not excuse ours, which is why repentance is vital to our right relationship with God, but Jesus paid the ransom that was due for our sins so that we could be forgiven and set free from the curse of sin which is death (Romans 6:22-23). That is why Jesus had to die because, if He didn't die, every human being would have to spend eternity in Hell as a result of our sins; never forgiven nor reconciled to God. God is Holy and sin cannot dwell with Him. And God did not leave it there - He raised Jesus from the dead as a seal and guarantee that He will raise you and me from the dead to live with Him forever. This is the promise of Salvation in Christ (Romans 10:9-13). It was after this encounter with the woman condemned by the world as a hopeless sinner that Jesus revealed Himself as the Light of the World. "God is Light and in Him is no darkness at all" (1st John 1:5). Light guenches darkness and exposes what goes on in the darkness (Matthew 4:16-17). Repent - turn from sin and be saved because the Kingdom of God is at hand!
