I'd love to see our whole area come together and develop an integrated tourism strategy to get people off the bypass and immersive themselves in an area rich in culture and heritage.

Launch of Historic Town Maps for Macroom & Millstreet Bilingual

Historic Town Maps for the towns of Macroom and Millstreet were recently launched in Macroom's Town Hall and Millstreet's Carnegie Hall respectively.

The project was led by Cork County Council's County Archaeologist with significant input by Tidy Towns representatives and local historians from each town. In Macroom, local representatives included Cllr. Martin Coughlan and John Lyons from Macroom Tidy Towns, together with local historian Barry O'Brien. In Millstreet, the local representatives included Derry Sheehan and Gordon O'Keeffe from Millstreet Tidy Towns, together with Seán Radley, curator of Millstreet Museum.

In Macroom, some of the key locations included are Macroom Town Hall, Castle Gates, St. Colman's



Church and Macroom Bridge. Sites included for Millstreet include Carnegie Hall, Drishane Castle, Tangney's Drapers, Mount Leader and Vernacular House, Killarney Road.

Mayor of the County of Cork. Cllr. Danny Collins welcomed the new publications, "These maps highlight the key locations of significant historic and heritage value within each town and will be a very useful tool for locals and visitors. The quality of the finished map with the beautiful illustrations and graphics show the effort and consideration that has gone into the production and everyone involved in the finished product should be very proud. These maps are for the local people and will be a great historical tool for generations to come as a reference to key historical sites unique to each town." The production of each map involved great consideration of the sites to be included which ensured that each town map showcases key buildings and locations, all illustrated by Rhoda Cronin Allaniac and described by writer Elena O'Brien Turk.

Copies of the maps are available in Macroom Town Hall, Carnegie Hall Millstreet, Macroom and Millstreet Libraries and will also be distributed to local schools and hotels in the area.

The Historic Town Maps are available on the Council's website.

The maps were funded by Macroom Municipal District through Cork County Council's Town Development Fund.

Béal na Bláth - The local story

As we come to the end of the decade of centenaries, marking the events of the 1912 -1923 period of Irish history, the civil war of 1922 to 1923 gives much pause for reflection on that most calamitous event in the history of our nation, where disagreement between former comrades led to their taking up arms against each other. The Independence Museum Kilmurry is located near the ambush site at Béal na Bláth, where Michael Collins was killed on 22nd August 1922. The story of Collins' visit to Cork that culminated in his death at the hands of those who had been colleagues and friends has been the subject of many books and a film. Kilmurry Historical and Archaeological Association (KHAA) have set out to tell the local story of that journey. They are re-printing a book by a local man, Edward O'Mahony, Michael Collins: His Death in the Twilight, first published in 1996 to run alongside an exhibition 'Béal na Bláth - The local story, at the museum, and a bus tour bringing to life the dramatic events of that fateful day.

The Irish Civil War was at its height on the 22nd August 1922 when Michael Collins left Williams Hotel (now The Castle Hotel) in Macroom to begin the journey through his native West Cork. The day went well, meeting comrades, family and friends. Collins and his comrades had reason to be pleased with a successful day's work as they began their journey back to Cork that evening via Béal na Bláth. However, an ambush party there would result in the death of Michael Collins and a

disordered journey back to Cork.

Bus Tour

KHAA will run a bus tour on Sunday, 4th September, retracing the route the Collins convoy took through the parishes of Kilmurry, Newcestown and Ovens on the morning and evening of that fateful day. From his first encounter at the townland of Ballymichael where the armoured car in the convoy - the 'Sliabh na mBan' - initially failed to climb the steep hill, to Newcestown church where Collins waited, having become briefly separated from his escort vehicles. We will proceed to the ambush site at Béal na Bláth where local historian, Sean Crowley, will give an account of the ambush. After which, we will follow the route taken by the convoy on its sad journey back to Cork via Cloughduv and Killumney, outlining the difficulties they encountered on that sad journey.

The exhibition covers: Commander-in-Chief Michael Collins' journey through Cork on the day

Commemorating the local anti-Treaty Volunteers killed that July in the Battle of Limerick.

And will be accompanied by a display of artifacts particular to the local details of the ambush.

"The (Béal na Bláth) ambushers stopped a Clonakilty man, Jerh. "The Leaguer" O' Brien, who was taking empty mineral bottles in a long horsedrawn scotch-car (dray) to the West Cork Bottling Company in Bandon. The car was commandeered and one of the iron-rimmed wheels was removed and thrown up on the crates of bottles. With the shafts facing east and resting on the ground, the long scotch-car was strategically placed across the road directly beyond a slight bend, so that the anticipated on-coming convoy travelling from Bandon would be brought abruptly to a halt. Jerh. "The Leaguer" was directed towards Foleys' farmhouse west the bóithrín. He was ordered to take his horse there and to remain there throughout the day"

A debt to a Ukrainian

On a Wednesday night in 1978 or 79 you may have seen me. You'd need to be going to the dance in the Tara club on D'Olier street in Dublin. I'd be collecting the money at the door. That was Ags night. The operators of the dancehall had accepted the very tenuous conjecture that the many country girls working in Dublin could be interested in meeting us agricultural science students, nearly all from the country. So, we got a few chores and a tiny part of the door receipts. The money collected was to go on a tour somewhere, anywhere, just after we had done the final exams. For the time, we were adventurous. In July of 1979 around forty of us headed off to Moscow. From there we headed southwards, to see the rich land of Ukraine and learn of their methods. and then to that beautiful seaside city of Odessa, to do what one does in Odessa, but that is a story for another day.

Contrary to my usual luck in the Tara club, as soon as our bus arrived on to a collective farm somewhere between Kyiv and Odessa, there was a line of beautiful girls, all with a ring made from flowers. They each chose one of us by putting the ring over our heads and led us off to a meal. That meal had a dozen or more courses. Music and dancing followed thereafter. Those of you who are wondering how we could have communicated when we had no word of language in common have forgotten the resourcefulness of youth!

So, recently when I visited my new neighbours, up to thirty-five or so who have arrived in our parish as refugees from Ukraine, in no way could I hope to match the hospitality shown to me. One lady I met was from Odessa, and I was reminiscing on my experiences there, but when the conversation turned to the present, I soon became speechless. I couldn't find the words. I am like that, no problem gabbing on, - until it comes to the important. The same happens to me at funerals, I say what I don't intend to say and not what I do. It's one of my many shortcomings.

Most of us who have an appreciation of our own history, accept that we have a duty to welcome those fleeing from their war-torn communities. We need no further reason. Nonetheless, we all share an additional reason to welcome Ukrainian refugees. We owe a debt to a particular Ukrainian. I am guessing that most of you have not heard of Pylyp Orlyk (1772-1742). I hadn't, but I recently learned of him from an article by Hilarius Bogbinder, a Danish born writer and translator, writing in the Philosophy Now magazine. Now he's a man I'd enjoy meeting. Pylyp Orlyk studied philosophy in Kyiv. His interests lay in theology, history, politics and in legal problems. On leaving his college he became advisor to the 'Hetman' the leader of the Cossacks. The Cossacks were originally a semi nomadic tribe and known as excellent horsemen. They later

developed remarkable democratic institutions at around the time that Russia was sinking into tyranny under Ivan the Terrible. His successor, Tsar Peter the Great, wanted to get rid of the Hetman, so Orlyk helped build an anti-Russian coalition, which included Sweden. The Hetman soon died and Orlyk became the new Hetman. That didn't last long. The Russians prevailed over the Ukrainians and Orlyk fled and never got to return to his native land.

That may sound like a sad story, and it is, but as luck would have it, good things can come from bad events. In 1710 Orlyk wrote what is known as his 'Konstytutsiya' (Constitution). It was not actually a constitution, rather it was an essay on what should go into a constitution. We all know that democracy has its roots in ancient Greece. With larger groups we can't all be voting on everything all the time like they did, so we have a representative democracy where our representatives act on our behalf. Orlyk saw how this type of democracy can be captured so easily and can drift into tyranny where too much power is held by the same person or group. So, the concepts of freedom of discussion on the rulers' decisions, the system for the democratic removal of the leader, and incorporation of checks and balances by division of government into the executive, the legislative, and the judicial branches are first recorded there. This predated the American Constitution in 1788, which was influenced by James Madison, who also had studied Philosophy and law. Madison had a particular interest in the European Enlightenment thinkers. He believed that the best means of protecting people from the potential of an oppressive government was a representative government and a separation and balance of powers among competing branches of government. The American Constitution influenced the later development of most western democracies on similar lines. We too have these

principles enshrined in our Constitution.

Many may think that we should support the Ukrainian aspiration as a fledgling democracy hoping to develop so that it can earn its place one day with us established democracies. In doing so we should not underestimate the influence Ukraine has had on the design, and the robustness of our type of democracy that too often we take for granted. Yet in a way we should take it for granted, as it was indeed granted to us, both by our own and others. So, thank you Ukraine. Orlyk was a man ahead of his time, but also of relevance to this time. While he has influenced the world for the better, it is distressing to consider the plight of his native country. His stated reason for writing his Constitution was that 'the Moscow State, by its numerous guilty methods, violated the rights and freedoms....' and 'being able to fulfil its evil intentions...always wanted to annex our towns to her provinces'. Ironically, the homeland of this visionary is at war three hundred years later.

Ukrainians are a lovely friendly people. Russians are so too. But systems of government vary. How great it would be if all peoples and all nations would appreciate their system's strengths and address their weaknesses. In other words, how great it would be if all could envision as Orlyk envisioned. It was fitting, I think, that Sweden returned the original copy of Orlyk's 'constitution' to Ukraine in 2021.

While my tongue-tied feeble attempt was indeed totally inadequate to welcome our new neighbours, I am lucky to be a member of a group, the Kilmurry Active Retirement association. The association consists of a great bunch of people with a lifetime of experience, expertise and the broadest of skill sets. The association in partnership with our new neighbours are now in the process of organising a get-together. I expect that will be interesting. More about it later.

We are also planning a garden visit to Glanmire for hopefully around mid-August. Let's hope that we will have the weather and the opportunity for nice photos.

Our association is open to all. Our philosophy is that age makes no difference, but health does. So, let's do what we can to keep healthy and challenged in body and in mind over the summer period. Perhaps consider joining us or another organisation in your area. We are better together, and it is easier. You will be kept as busy as you choose to be and positively engaged in your community, and we think you will enjoy it.

What Do You Do When you Get a Headache?

What do you do when a red light comes up on the dashboard of your car? Do ignore it by placing a sticker over it or do you call a mechanic?

Ignoring it or placing a sticker on it is the same as when you get a headache and you take over the counter medication to numb the pain or hide it.

A headache is your body's way of telling you that something isn't right and it's vitally important if you have recurring headaches to pay heed to these redlights.

Yes headaches are common but they are not normal.

A study^{*} produced in the mid-1990's revolutionised headache research. A Russianborn researcher named Dr Nikoli Bogduk determined that all headaches shared a relationship with the neck.

He noted that every single headache sufferer shared an important connection; abnormal nerve function in the upper neck. Dr. Bogduk embarked on years of study and published numerous findings that proved the connection.

The Macroom and District Environmental Group Think Globally, Act locally

"Hedgerows - Functions and Benefits and Pale Primrose Blossoms"

Hi, Chris Barrett here again.

We are fortunate today to be able to continue learning from our Local Heritage Specialist, Ted Cook, regarding Hedgerows. Ted reminds me that in the article at the end of June, we explored briefly the origins of Ireland's Field Boundaries and the 1667 Enclosure Acts- truly "Art on a Vast Scale" - such that one is prompted to recall the Liscease limestone "Cave Art" of our primitive forebears in Southern France. Long-horned black cattle are depicted browsing ivy and leaves in woodland shade.

Their closest related genetic descendent, our "Kerry Cow," though long adapted to grazing monoculture grass swards, yet demonstrates preference for the "Forest Verge" with it's diversity of herbs and elevated calorific value of the lateral under-canopy that hang heavy with buds, foliage, twigs, wild fruits, lichens and mosses.

All known "Bovines", descendants from the ancient (1 million years) Chinese Oxe (Bos primigenius) yet cannot say "no" to Ivy and fellow "Epiphytes" that include Dog Rose and Honeysuckle. "Shock wire" doesn't resonate with their genetic memory of nature because the "Browse" provides anti-biotics; anti -virals; fungicidal and powerful anti-septic chemical actives. Critically it provides shade and shelter from unprecedented ultra-violet solar rays. Linear Tree canopies provide staging for our transworld migration of Birds; Butterflies and Insects for peening (otherwise preening) which is the ability for birds to change their pro-vitamin D reserves into active Vitamin D.

Thus, egg laying and reproduction ensures nature's "Pesticide Control Corps", bar none, be possessed of a future.

For our rural and Town-dweller who long for the countrysid blooming, our woody enclosures comb atmospheric pollution particles of less than 2.5 microns – freely providing our best aerial scrubbing machine - cleansing and ionising the air that we breathe. Noise pollution is markedly reduced by the "shock- absorbing" thicket. Apart from not being the only things trying to stay alive, as E.U Citizens Article 10 (Habs. Directive 1992) commits Ireland, "in its land use planning and development policies" to protect and wisely

manage landscape features, "such as Rivers and their banks and traditional systems for marking field boundaries"- "as stepping stones so essential for the migration and dispersal and genetic exchange of wild species".

Our government's recent unfurling of a 1.5-billion-euro ACRE scheme (Agri. Climate Rural Environment) aimed at reversing Hedgerow and Riparion Woodland loss since 1956 is the last chance saloon for the dream of green meadows and bye-ways o'ergrown and Summer's air laden with perfume of flowers where songbirds sing loud and our honeybees roam. It has been a pleasure to become more inspired by the wonder of hedgerows and I am once again indebted to Ted for sharing his knowledge with us.

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THE ORIGINS OF LEE VALLEY'S POINT TO POINTS

This county of Cork has a long and proud history as the origin of point to points in Ireland, particularly that of mid and north Cork. The race of 1752 between Cornelius O'Callaghan and Edmund Blake is credited as being the first recorded steeplechase run in Ireland. The steeple of St.John's Church in Buttevant was the starting point, and some 4.5 miles later over a course of natural obstacles, the finish was located at St. Mary's Church in Doneraile. However, the official recognition of point-topoint races in Ireland did not take place until the establishment of the National Hunt Rules of 1889 approximately 137 years later.

History

The first record of a point to point being established in Muskerry under this new regime was the Macroom Steeplechase, which took place on 29 November 1892, run by the Irish National Hunt management committee. It had been the first horse race of its kind in many years in the area, with a newspaper report stating that "the forthcoming event will be something of a novel attraction" and that "the course - an undoubtedly fine one - has a capacious covered stand erected on a portion of it that commands a magnificent view." The old Cork and Macroom District Railway ran a special train from its terminus, the Cork Capwell Station (based at Summerhill South Road, Cork City) to Macroom town for the event.

The inaugural hon. Treasurer of the fixture was Mr. W.H Garde and the hon. Secretaries were Mr. Samuel Baldwin and Mr. R.C Williams, with the press writing in the race's aftermath that "success of an unqualified character crowned the efforts of the promoters of the Macroom meeting." A large attendance complimented the nice course and good ground. Four races, each called the Mount Hedges, Farmers', Macroom and Stewards Plates respectively, displayed large entries. The following year's point-to-point, held in September 1893, took place under beautiful weather and a larger attendance, with provision to travel to a pointto-point in Lismore, Co. Waterford the following day, was also made available. Dr. Charles Kearns Deane Tanner, an Irish Parliamentary Party MP for the original Mid-Cork (Westminster) constituency. acted as a voluntary steward for the early Macroom steeplechase.

In January 1897, a large and representative meeting was held in Matehy to establish a point-to-point fixture for Inniscarra, with Mr. J.M Ryan, P.L.G, presiding. Mr. Thomas C. Regan kindly offered the use of suitable land on which to hold the races. The steeplechases occurred in the vicinity of Vicarstown on 16 February 1897. O'Brien served as the fixture's

president, with Denis Murray acting as hon. Treasurer. The hon. Secretaries were Timothy O'Brien and PJ Kelleher, all locals. Again, with beautiful weather being present, a large attendance was reported by the press. Those who did not travel in carriages availed of the presence of a large marquee at the venue. The reporters missed their evening train from Fox's Bridge back to Cork City, on account of not being familiar with the area (although they did catch a later train). However, the 1898 fixture was heavily criticised in the press, claiming that "the management seemed to have overlooked the merest details, and the meeting was carried out with a beautiful disregard for punctuality and sad convenience." The article also believed that "the course was not a well selected one, and the going was extremely heavy as a consequence. Fields ruled small, and the racing, except in the opening event, could not be termed exciting."

Further west, the first reports of a modern point-topoint taking place in the Millstreet area date back to 1897, where the Millstreet Steeplechases were held on Thursday, September 9th of that year, under the rules of the Irish Racing Association. It hosted five races, being the Mountleader, Tows, Coomlegane, Farmers', and Consolation Plates. All courses were the same distance of an estimated two miles. Mr T.Y Hennessy acted as the honorary Secretary.

In the 1920s, an annual point-to-point fixture was established in Dawstown. In one race, in the early 1950s, two horses uniquely tied in first place in what was deemed to be a dead heat. It was found to be impossible to distinguish between the performances by Sheila's Cottage and Roland Rye. However, both went onto prove their worth in later races. Rolands Rye won the Welsh Grand National, and Sheila's Cottage won the Irish Grand National. The point-to-point disestablished after 1955, but a revival thirty-nine years later took place in April 1994. What began as a management committee of 12 enthusiasts grew into a mass effort of over 60 local people. The old course was reconstructed with the help of these volunteers.

By the 1980s, steeplechase meetings had become a regular feature of life in Aghabullogue. In January 1988, the first Aghabullogue Point to Point as we know it today was held under the auspices of the Muskerry Foxhounds Club, and the local organisers were praised for their "splendid organisational work." For this particular event, Mr. John M. Murphy provided use of the land, and a large entry of horses was evident, with roughly 35 for different races. The event was well supported by a very large attendance drawn from several parts of Co. Cork. All races were three miles in length.

It is evident that we have marvellous local stories to tell about sporting and athletic activities in Muskerry, and point-to-points appear to be one of them.

Clúid Housing opens tenancy applications for the first cost rental homes in Cork

The 73 new cost rental homes – the first in Co. Cork – are a mix of one- and two-bedroom apartments, located in Lancaster Gate, Cork City. Under the Government's Cost Rental Scheme, rents are targeted at a minimum of 25% below open market value, with prices for Lancaster Gate homes starting at €990 per month – approx. 45% below local market rates. Residents will also be provided with long-term security of tenure. Applications officially open on www.clúid.ie on Tuesday 19th July 2022, with the first homes available to move into in October 2022. The apartments, developed by O'Callaghan Properties, will form part of the already popular Lancaster Gate development, located on the banks of the river Lee.

Cost Rental - a new form of tenure

Cost rental is a new form of tenure in Ireland, whereby residents pay rents that are solely based on the cost to build, manage, and maintain the homes. €70m was allocated in Budget 2022 for the delivery of 700 Cost Rental homes by Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs), through the Cost Rental Equity Loan (CREL) mechanism. A target to deliver an average of 2,000 cost rental homes per year was included in 'Housing for All', the Government's housing plan for Ireland over the next 8 years. Under the Affordable Housing Act 2021, the Cost Rental Scheme will enable Clúid to set rents for this development in Cork City as per below:

• 1 bed apartment- €990 per calendar month

• 2 bed apartment- €1,100 per calendar month Today's announcement follows on from Clúid's launch of cost rental schemes in Dublin and Kildare – the first in those counties.

Location and amenities

The Lancaster Gate homes are conveniently located in Cork City, they have the benefit of all the amenities offered by the city. The city centre, with its array of shops, bars and restaurants, is only a few minutes' walk away. The development is also close to a number of schools, University College Cork, and the Mercy University Hospital.

The A-rated, energy efficient properties are semifurnished, allowing tenants to furnish their homes to their own taste. Each home includes white goods, including a fridge freezer, a dishwasher, an oven and hob, a microwave, and a washer dryer as standard. Roller blinds are supplied including blackout blinds in bedrooms, in addition to laminate flooring throughout, and tiled bathrooms. Eligibility

Applications open on Tuesday 19th July and close on Tuesday 26th July. To apply for the cost rental homes, applicants are obliged to provide evidence of the following eligibility criteria:

• Net household income is below €53,000 per annum

• Not in receipt of any social housing supports (including Rent Supplement or HAP)

Do not own a property

• Household size matches the size of the property advertised (All members of the household must be living in Ireland at time of applying.)

• Applicants can afford to pay the cost rent for the home

Household has only entered one application for a specific cost rental property

Should more applications be received than properties available, completed applications will be selected at random. The random selection system is automated and auditable, to ensure a fair application process for all.

Financing of up to €100m

Clúid was one of three AHBs selected (along with Respond and Túath) to deliver the first cost rental homes in Ireland, as part of a competitive assessment process. The Cost Rental Scheme is administered by the Housing Agency, on behalf of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. The Housing Agency oversee the administration of the loan arrangements, including the drafting of the agreement for the Cost Rental Equity Loan (CREL) to fund the purchase of each property. The Housing Finance Agency (HFA) has also made financing of up to €100m available to support the delivery of cost rental homes. These 73 new homes are being purchased by Clúid Housing from homebuilder O'Callaghan Properties.

Fiona Cormican, Clúid Housing's Director of New Business, commented:

"We are delighted that Cork City's first cost rental homes are open for application from today. These stunning new apartments will provide residents with high-quality, affordable homes in the heart of the city.

With rents of around 45% below market rates, these new homes here in Lancaster Gate offer excellent quality, long-term, secure rental options for middle income households and those struggling to rent on the open market.

We have worked with a range of partners to deliver this new development in Lancaster Gate, including the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, the Housing Agency, the Housing Finance Agency, Cork City Council and O'Callaghan Properties. We hope these cost rental homes will be the first of many in Cork City and provide greater choice in the housing sector.

We are proud to have been the first AHB to deliver cost rental homes in Ireland and we are ready to assist the Government in achieving their target of 2,000 cost rental homes per year and 18,000 by 2030 as set out in Housing for All."



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51% of Dog Owners Say their Dog's Death was Like Losing a Family Member

offers advice on how to cope with the grief of losing a dog.

We are a nation of dog lovers as 72% admit to having more photos of their dog on their phone than their partner, family or friends.

Dogs Trust, Ireland's largest dog welfare charity have launched their poignant 'Not Just a Dog' campaign to highlight the devastating effect a dog's death can have on their owners. The charity is appealing to employers to consider offering compassionate leave to employees should their beloved pet pass away.

Research carried out by Dogs Trust revealed over half of dog owners felt the grief they experienced after losing their dog was similar or worse to the loss of a family member, with a further 38% stating they were surprised by how deeply they were affected.

Almost three quarters of those surveyed admitted having more photos of their dogs on their phone than their partner, family or friends so, it comes as no surprise that over 58% said it took them a year or more to start to come to terms with their dog's passing.

Psychologist, Neuroscientist and dog lover, Dr Sabina Brennan explained: "When a dog passes on, no matter how prepared we are for it, how old the dog is or how long or how short a time they spent with you, the loss can be overwhelming. I think the most important aspect of coping with the loss is to allow yourself to grieve and accepting that what you're feeling is normal. Surround yourself with people who understand and if you're struggling, please seek professional advice."



After discovering 66% of dog lovers worry about their dog's passing, Dogs Trust is urging owners to visit their website DogsTrust.ie for advice on how to prepare for a dog's passing, coping with grief, ideas to memorialize your dog and tips on how to broach the subject with children.

Speaking about the passing of his own dog, Comedian and Broadcaster, PJ Gallagher said: "Is there a greater feeling in the world than coming home to a dog who is delighted to see you, even though you only popped out to the shops? It's tough when that's gone. I had Lylo, my Collie Cross who I adopted from Dogs Trust for 10 fantastic years. She was my best friend, and I was devastated when I had to say goodbye to her. We need to recognise how crushing it is for dog owners when their dog dies and it's important that people feel they can talk about it, without being told to get

over it, it's just a dog."

Becky Bristow, Executive Director of Dogs Trust Ireland continued: "Many people spend more time with their dogs than anyone else in their life and have a unique bond with them. As a dog welfare charity, we understand the impact the loss of a dog can have, so we offer our employees a day's paid leave in the event of the death of their dog and we would love to see other employers offer the same." MEP KELLEHER SEEKS STUDY INTO HOW BANKING RULES AFFECT FINANCING OF AGRICULTURE SECTOR

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher is seeking a detailed study into how the EU's finance and banking regulations are affecting the agricultural sector in terms of its ability to secure access to credit.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economic and Monetary Affairs Committee (ECON) has co-tabled an amendment, along with Dutch MEP, Caroline Nagtegal, requesting the European Banking Authority to undertake a thorough assessment of the impact of the Capital Requirement Regulation (CRR) on agricultural financing over the next number of years and again by 2030.

"For years, we have seen how farmers are losing out

in terms of their engagements with the banking system. I firmly believe there must be a realisation that agricultural financing is not the same as many other forms of commercial financing. The financing of farms is in no way comparable to the financing of other economic activities.

"My amendment would also require the European Commission to draft a legislative proposal, if deemed necessary, to amend the CRR to mitigate any negative effects on agricultural financing.

"Access to credit for farmers is one of the key issues affecting the viability of family farms in Ireland. The dogs on the street know that banks are very slow to lend to farmers, and I believe this is due in no small part to the banking legislation in effect right now.

"My amendments are the first step in addressing the challenges farmers face in terms of securing access to credit.

Over the next number of months, I will w or k closely with my colleagues to secure the changes we need to support our agricultural community," concluded Kelleher.

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Welcome back dear student. "Study to show yourself a worker approved" - the apostle Paul wrote this to Timothy, his spiritual son. Much like an apprentice, Timothy learned from Paul and carried on the work that God had begun in him. This letter from Paul is like a download for Timothy on successful living – warning of the pitfalls, and providing a scaffolding support for advancing. There is no one in life that does not need to study to improve themselves at some time. If we did not study there would be no doctors, nurses, lorry drivers, engineers, hairdressers, teachers, lawyers, secretaries etc... It doesn't matter what your walk in life – you had to learn it somewhere. But no knowledge is gained unless one puts in the hours of learning and study. Once someone has been educated in their particular calling they are then able to go and put that into practice in a job. And then as the years go on, experience and expertise is achieved and that one can teach others what they know. It's a wonderful thing to be mentored and taught by those who through skill and endurance have learnt their trade, but equally one can be impacted negatively by being led the wrong way.

Last week we looked at the power of influence and of feeding on negativity and how it can affect a person's life and in particular their health. The context that Paul is teaching Timothy here is in line with just that. "...Keep reminding God's people of these things. Warn them before God against quarrelling about words; it is of no value, and only ruins those who listen. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth. Avoid godless chatter, because those who indulge in it will become more and more ungodly. Their teaching will spread like gangrene or cancer...causing them to deviate from the truth...and turning others away from the faith" (2 Timothy 2:17-18).

What has this got to do with healing? We must learn to correctly handle the Word of Truth. You know people study the form of race horses, they study the weather forecasts, they study how to put outfits together, they even study how to clean and organise their homes with Mrs Hinch, yet the one thing that can bring ultimate success in life they do not study - the Scriptures. Often people pray for a miracle and never see answers to their prayer. Then they get disappointed and lose heart and the devil obliges them with thoughts of 'well God must not like me' or 'He does not exist - just as I suspected'. But God's Word is clear 'My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge' (Hosea 4:6). The knowledge we lack is of the Truth (John 8:32). God is not a spiritual vending machine dishing out whatever we need on our terms. Knowledge is power and this is why we study the Word of God. It is in the devil's best interest to keep people ignorant of the promises of God by duping them into believing that the Bible is not relevant or exciting. Nothing could be further from the truth which is why, when people do start to develop their relationship with Jesus by studying His Word, they are shocked and amazed at God's tender love and the peace they suddenly experience from knowing Him as Lord.

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Government plans to introduce exclusion zones sets a very dangerous precedent, says PLC

Commenting on the news that the Government intends to bring forward a bill to impose exclusion zones outside abortion facilities, Eilís Mulroy of the Pro Life Campaign said:

"The Government's plan to introduce exclusion zones outside abortion facilities sets a very dangerous precedent for denying freedom of expression and the right to peacefully assemble in public areas. The proposal being put forward is a wholly disproportionate response to the risk that a tiny number of people may at some point in the future engage in harassing behaviour close to an abortion facility.

"No one wants to see people harassed when

approaching a hospital or GP surgery. Were such incidents to occur, the authorities already have wide-ranging powers to deal with the situation under existing public order laws. Senior members of An Garda Síochána have repeatedly made this clear to the Minister for Health, yet he persists in pressing ahead with this regressive and draconian proposal, for no other reason than to appease a group of radical pro-abortion campaigners who have lobbied non-stop for such a law.

"The fact that citizens could be jailed under this proposal for silently expressing a position in public is utterly alarming. Minister Donnelly even acknowledged on 10th February in the Seanad that introducing such a law "pushes up against civil liberties", but persisted with it regardless. The Government's proposal has nothing to do with public safety and everything to do with singling out a particular category of people, namely those who oppose abortion, and criminalising the expression of their views. In the interests of basic civil liberties and the constitutional right to peacefully assemble, the Government's proposal must be opposed every step of the way."
