As part of the World Religions and Cultures Project students shared their traditions & values. ### 2nd Year History Trip:

On Monday 24th of October second-year students visited Independence Museum Kilmurry. History was brought to life for the students as they were able to view a collection of the Irish War of Independence and Civil War Artefacts. The students were told the story behind many of the artefacts on display. They were very impressed to see General Tom Barry's suitcase and an original wheel from a Black and Tan Crossley Tender burnt at the Kilmichael Ambush. The students all commented about the calm atmosphere in the museum which made the tour even more enjoyable.

After the museum, the students visited Béal Na Bláth where Mr Daniel Cronin told them about the events that led to the ambush of Michael Collins and some other local history of the area.

On the first day we went on a bus tour and a Thames boat tour, so we got to see and hear about all the famous sights. We also visited the National Gallery. One of the main highlights of the trip for me was the next day, when we visited the Harry Potter Studios. The sets and props were amazing, and it was fascinating to see how the films were made. Afterwards, we went to the London Dungeon, a somewhat bizarre but very enjoyable thing to do in London. To finish off the second day, we went to the Lyceum Theatre to see the Lion King. On the last day, we went to Madam Tussauds.

### Learning & Study Skills:

On Monday 24th Super Generation, leaders in

study skills and youth leadership seminars, visited McEgan to deliver workshops to all students in 1st 2nd 3rd 5th & 6th.

The timing of the workshop was apt as students were reflecting on recent assessment results received in October and setting target grades for the upcoming Christmas exams.

First years had a two hour workshop which provided them with strategies that will assist them in structuring and recalling information. Second- and third-year students were introduced to a unique study system using what is called the POKER methodology. Content included creation of study plans, note taking with a lot of emphasis on mind maps and memory techniques.

Senior cycle workshop focused on enhancing their existing study skills while introducing other elements such as Learning styles, active reading and well-being.

Participants of all programmes were provided with a study journal which they can continue to use to assist them throughout the remainder of this academic year. It is hoped grades going forward will reflect the benefits of hosting this initiative.

**Climate Detectives:** On Thursday 27th TY students travelled to Cork Mart, Fermoy to participate in a research workshop on developing a research question for their Climate Detective's project. They got time to explore their ideas and got advice from scientists on how to tackle a local environment issue in Macroom.

They met with scientists who shared their research on the effects of various farming methods on the environment at Teagasc/ Vistamilk, Moorepark, Fermoy. Research included the use of white clover to reduce the amount of chemical fertiliser needed,the genetic breeding of nitrogen efficient cows and the use of bacteria to convert whey (a waste product of cheese making) to lactic acid (used in cosmetics and food flavouring).

As students walked through the farm, they gained further inspiration whilst speaking with working scientists, on how to tackle the pressing issue of climate change. Climate Detectives is an initiative supported by the PDST and European Space Education Research Organisation & Science foundation Ireland

They also learned about the many manuscripts available in the library for viewing and copying which would be made available for local history research.

Best dressed Staff Member – Ms Queally Best dressed Junior Student – Grace Mehigan Happy Halloween from all at St Mary's





# A big congratulations to Shane on his All-Star award, from everyone in De La Salle.

## Do you prefer playing outfield or goalkeeper?

Probably outfield because you're probably in the action more compared to being goalkeeper. Importantly, the consequences are less, if you make a mistake like dropping the ball in midfield compared to in goals. Not that I don't enjoy being a goalkeeper but I probably prefer being outfield.

### You played soccer growing up, what is the biggest difference between playing as a goalkeeper in soccer compared to GAA?

I suppose, in soccer the emphasis is on shot stopping, where as in GAA the emphasis is on restarts and kick outs. Compared to soccer, shot stopping is a very minor part of the game in Football.

# How good did it feel to win an All-Ireland after losing one in 2019?

Relief was the major feeling! it was obviously something I had dreamt about since being a child. You can believe it will happen this year, this game, but it can be snatched away in the last minutes by one kick of a ball. So when the whistle blew, first it was relief, and then total joy.

### Did you prefer playing the All-Ireland final in the Summer instead of the season ending in September?

I preferred playing it in the Summer. It allowed me to have August off and go on holidays, seems trivial but I've never got to have a Summer holiday before. Now I can also now focus on my club football in Kerry.

# Does playing outfield for Rathmore help you in goals for kerry?

As everyone can see, the role of the goalkeeper in GAA is changing. A lot of keepers now are scoring from play and it's not even a thing people are questioning. It helps you sharpen your skills and use your right and left leg. I have the confidence that my skills are there when playing in goals when I need them thanks to playing outfield.

### When you were younger you had Soccer trials for Nottingham Forest and you choose not to stay, Why not?

I spent four days in Nottingham with my father and brother. I felt very homesick. I didn't see it as something I wanted to pursue in my professional career. When I came home from soccer I had to decide between soccer or GAA, I loved Kerry and I loved GAA so when I came home from Nottingham I decided to quit soccer altogether.

### Would you rather beat Cork or Dublin in an All-Ireland final?

I'd rather win an All-Ireland full stop.

# How did you recover from losing the All Ireland final in 2019?

2019 was my first year with Kerry and it was the same for a lot of lads on the panel. We were going up against a Dublin team, possibly the greatest team of all time, with the game going to a replay made it even tougher. You try to take little bits from every game and you learn more from losing than winning, but we always knew we had a good squad capable of winning, so I suppose a bit of luck last year and good work ethic helped us win. But it did take a couple of weeks to recover in 2019.

# Do you ever think you'll ever play for Kerry outfield?

Tried it before in the U21's and tore my hamstring 3 times in 5 months! It's something that I'd love to do, but that ship has sailed I'd say!

# Macroom Irish Countrywomen's Association (ICA) Revival?

Will the ICA re-establish a Macroom Guild?

Cork ICA Federation hosted a meeting In Macroom Library on October 15th, 2022, to gauge the possibility of re-establishing a Macroom ICA Guild. Ms Monica O'Shea and Ms Annette Crowley, Ballinora ICA members, presented the case for a Macroom Guild. Two sister-members from Ballinagree Guild lent their support. Monica outlined briefly the history of the ICA, what its current activities are and the great benefits a local guild would bring. Apart from Ballinagree, the next nearest guild is in Boherbee. So, yes, definitely there is a space for a guild in Macroom. Annette showed an array of beautiful, handcrafted goods, some of which she created.

ICA's predecessor, The United Irishwomen (UI) was founded in Wexford in 1910 by two local Protestant women who wanted to address social issues. It guickly became aligned to the Irish Agricultural Association Society, better known as the Co-Operative Movement under Horace Plunkett. Co-operatives played a leading role in developing farming, farm-related activities and country living. Despite the disruptions of WW1, The War of Independence and the Civil War, the UI survived, was revived and flourished. Its principles of being non-sectarian and non-party-political, and the goals of women's development and social advancement stood it in good stead. In 1934, it was renamed the ICA. Thereafter it developed into a vibrant, effective and influential national organisation. For example the ICA was to the forefront of the rural electrification scheme and the provision of internal running water in rural houses. These two projects transformed rural living and reduced women's drudgery in running their houses and rearing families.

A Macroom ICA Guild was formed in 1953. In the first years, seventy to ninety women attended monthly meetings. While numbers reduced after a while, the Macroom ICA Guild remained very strong well into the 1980s. Sheila Sheehan has brilliantly and importantly preserved the Guild's minute books from its inception. The meetings gave a safe and acceptable place for women to meet. At that time, a woman's primary role was to in the home, be a wife and produce and rear children. Going to the pub or the cinema or plays on their own was not seen as behaving well. Attending Mass or church-related activities or shopping were often the only social

outlets for many women. Outside activity was frowned upon. From a socialization point of view, the ICA in Macroom must have been a godsend for more-or-less housebound women. Macroom Guild built a home of its own, An Grianán Beag, in 1958 but this was damaged by falling stone from Macroom Castle in 1967 which left the ICA again homeless. A high proportion of Macroom women initially enrolled and attended the ICA meetings: women from all walks of life were members. The minute books give a great insight into Macroom's life at that time as the Guild addressed many issues of the day. Its remit covered running meetings, public speaking, debating, arts and crafts, running card drives and helping various local charities and causes. Co-operating with other local clubs was a hallmark of its activity and it gave great assistance to Macroom Show Committee, the GAA Club and the Youth Club to mention but three. It undertook joint projects with the Tidy Towns' Committee and the GAA Club. Other features of the monthly meetings were monthly competitions, a roll-call and an entertainment section. Competitions were about old letters or button flower decorations or home-made Christmas cards and so on; the roll call was very democratic and allowed each woman to offer individually her opinion on such matters as 'the worst household chore' etc. An entertainment or social section was an integral part of the meeting and many a good night of singing, music and dancing, and story-telling was enjoyed. Enthusiasm and membership waned as time passed due to a number of factors. The advent of television, the improved economy, the changing place of women in society, especially more women working outside the home, and the choice of rival attractions such as playing bridge are reasons cited. A new ICA Hall was officially opened in 1976 and it was again a great boost to the Guild. However, numbers continued to fall. Despite valiant efforts s by women such as Eileen Collins, Peggy Buckley, Kathleen Murphy, Sheila Sheehan, Katie Dineen, Joan Kelleher and others, the Macroom ICA Guild was wound up in 2015.

Just seven years later, the void left by the cessation of ICA activity is increasingly felt and an attempt is being made at revival. Even since 20154, there have been major changes in society. The sad period of Covid emphasised the need for people to meet and mingle, talk and chat, and share times and activities with each other. While modern times demand a fresh approach, the ICA has been adept in the past in changing and adapting. Hopefully a new, vigorous and progressive ICA guild in Macroom will fill the void and provide a forum for women from Macroom and environs to come together in friendship and community activity.

Monica O'Shea's talk and Annette Crowley's display were very encouraging and great reasons for Macroom ICA Guild to re-form and renew some of the brilliant work of the past.

'Well Done'to the 'old' Macroom ICA, 1953-2015 and wishing the 'Best of Luck' to the new model, if and when it takes flight.





# Kilmurry Active Retirement Association News

### She asked us a question

She asked us a question. Now that is an unusual thing to find in an annual report. It is often enough that annual reports are less than stimulating. But then Anne Drury, President of Active Retirement Ireland, is a Westmeath woman. I have a long personal experience of the necessity of taking notice when a Westmeath woman asks guestions!

Our President's question to around 500 Active Retirement Associations around the country with about 24000 members was this. The 17

Sustainable development goals "were adopted by the United Nations in 2015 as a universal call to end poverty, protect the planet, and ensure that by 2030 all people enjoy peace and prosperity. I now pose the question; what can our organisation and members do to combat climate change and contribute to the implementation of the SDGs?"

It's a format familiar to me. What are we going to do, and then what are you going to do? Most often my usual reaction, is to think to myself, am I not retired? This seems like a big task for a retired man! But in this case, we notice that all we have to do is to make a contribution. We are being asked to make our contribution as an association, and for each of us to make our own contributions to the goals.

So, let's see what we can do. Now I expect that each of you could rhyme off the seventeen goals like the two times tables. So, just for my sake, let's have a look at them.

Now, if we were to achieve all that, wouldn't it be a better world! So, what can we contribute?

To start, perhaps we could have a discussion on just that at a meeting of our associations. Let's say we were to select the most relevant to retired people.

Perhaps these three could be considered most relevant, Goal 3 - Good Health and Well-being: Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages, Goal 4 - Quality Education: Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all, and now also I suppose Goal 7- Affordable and Clean Energy: Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all.

Could we focus on them and take it from there? We would not be alone in doing this. Many associations have been and are doing this. Can we learn from them? The Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications has set up the SDG Champions programme. In 2020 there were twelve champions. The purpose of the SDG Champions Programme is both to raise public awareness of the SDGs, and also to show practical ways in which organisations and individuals can contribute to achieving the SDGs, using Champion organisations' practices as examples. Each individual Champion promoted specific SDGs, so each of the twelve campaigns were distinct in terms of the goals they championed. However, all twelve campaigns are built around the core message that the Sustainable Development Goals are for everyone in society and that everyone can make a contribution, large or small, to their success. Men's Sheds are one such SDGs champion.

So, is that one option we could consider? Pick what is relevant to us, focus on those. Anything is better than **24 0**1100k 03.11.22

But wait, hold on there now!

Let's say we focussed on the three goals most relevant to us. Now let's imagine that each organisation and everyone in the world with equal enthusiasm did the same. And also, let's assume that at global level each goal was chosen with equal frequency. That would be a great achievement, but yet it would mean that just 3/17 (17.6%) of us would be focusing on each goal. That doesn't sound to me like a recipe for achieving the goals by 2030. So, what we are really being asked to do is to contribute to and support all goals, those that are relevant to us and equally those that are not, if there is to be a realistic chance of achieving them by 2030. It is in effect being suggested by the United Nations that it is our duty as global citizens to do so. Now that may seem like a big ask of everyone, and not just a retired man! One could see the SDGs as both a snapshot of the aspirations of humanity and the secular morality of our age.

It is always hard to argue against such a holistic approach. Yet I think we do need to be practical too. Some goals are just more urgent than others. There is a hierarchy of needs, and a hierarchy of rights. Climate change is according to António Guterres, Director-General, United Nations an existential threat. If this is so, and if we don't act, then none of the rights and goals that we may now hold dear may have relevance for our descendants. Nonetheless, let's not neglect combating hunger. Those in absolute poverty are either hungry or have no security that they will not be hungry. For these our other goals and rights are practically meaningless as life is the prerequisite for any quality of life. A threat to future unborn generations, and perhaps even an unquantifiable existential threat to human survival, certainly may trump many quality-of-life goals, but in my view does not trump our obligation to real people living but dying from lack of food now. In terms of rights surely the actual must trump the potential. So, it is absolute poverty and climate change that are the most urgent. We can notice now, that when we are thinking of ourselves, what we think is most relevant is not the most important. So, surely, we can agree with the focus of our President, Anne Drury. Let's end (extreme) poverty and protect the planet. My experience of Westmeath women has been vindicated!

We surely can't deny that working on all the SDGs is both a worthwhile and meaningful thing to do. We must learn, and we may have to invest. However, with climate change perhaps we all do know some things that we could do where no investment is required. We (semi)retired mightn't be sticking around here for as long as others, but we have been around longer! We have an advantage. Our advantage is that in some instances, we don't have to imagine, some actions required of us just need us to recall our earlier days.

I am far from being a global warming sceptic. However, I do believe that the United Nations are overstating when it refers to an existential threat. Even if the earth burns or freezes, we have the technology and know how, to build underground air-conditioned caves with the capacity of supplying essentials. There would be a very high probability that a remnant of the human race will continue. When we look around, we see such beauty

and abundance of life. Wouldn't it be devastatingly disappointing if this were to be the peak of our human civilisation?

It goes against everything we had believed, had hoped, to think that countless generations of our descendants may look on us now as their ancestors that lost their legacy, their garden of Eden.



### **COMPOSTING MADE EASY**

Today I have the great pleasure of speaking with Donal O'Leary of Waste Down. Donal is an environmental trainer who specialises in composting. He also sells composting supplies and makes and sells compost.

As the subject can be off-putting to some people including myself, I asked him to explain about composting in simple terms.

He told me that composting is the conversion of once-living materials from plants and animals into organic soil (humus). Sounded like a lot of work to me, but Donal put me straight.

The work is done for me by decomposing organisms, such as bacteria, fungi, moulds, millipedes and worms.

I did want to believe Donal, but I have experienced a very sludgy smelly mess when I have tried composting in the past.

It turns out that my compost needed moist airy conditions, with a mixture of 'green' and 'brown' materials.

The 'green' materials are kitchen and food waste, fruit and veg. peelings as well as grass cuttings. As I felt I had been OK with my green waste, I was interested to hear about the 'brown' materials. These include small twigs, sawdust, autumn leaves, paper, cardboard, and straw. These materials add bulk and structure to the compost to allow air to filter through and prevent the pile from being too wet. I began to realise that it was the lack of 'brown' materials which caused my smelly mess.

Donal lets me know that a 50/50 mixture of green and brown materials should solve my problems by providing enough moisture and air spaces. Composting was beginning to make sense to me!

I even got a few extra tips. I can add water if things get too dry, and if it seems to be too wet or becoming smelly, I could turn everything over, and add more dry brown material.

So practically I was still unsure what to do with my fruit and veg peelings, my husband's numerous tea bags and our coffee grounds?

It turns out I could mix them into the compost pile (in a bin or open heap), with lots of brown materials, or even consider a 'wormery', which is a method of composting food waste quickly using composting worms.

I had heard it was not good to put cooked food, meat or dairy in my compost bin, but Donal told me about the 'Bokashi' method of pre-composting which is a means of fermenting food waste including meat and dairy, so that it can be added to compost either in a wormery or buried in a compost pile, without stinking or attracting pests. For my own needs, I might wait a while before trying the 'Bokashi' method for cooked food, meat and dairy until I have got more confidence.

However, it was good to learn that my grass cuttings could be spread out and allowed to dry which allows them to become more 'brown'... and it sounds as if I could avoid my smelly mess that way. To compost fresh green grass cuttings, they should be mixed 50/50 with 'brown' materials, turned frequently and watered as necessary to maintain a moist but not too wet compost pile. The pile is best kept covered. On the subject of cutting grass, it is noticeable recently that lawns that are cut short and the cuttings removed are suffering much more from drought than those that are allowed to stay a bit longer and where the cuttings are mulched back into the lawn. To promote local biodiversity and to reduce our climate impact, Donal says that we really should look at managing our grassy areas differently - cutting minimally and allowing the naturally occurring diversity of flowers and grass types to grow, flower, and go to seed.

I reckon even I could give composting another go with Donal's advice and I would like to thank Donal for giving us some insight into the world of composting.

I am looking forward to speaking with him in the future and learning more from him in relation to grass-cycling and making leaf-mould.





# Rambles in Eireann - Inisheer (Inis Oirr)

From my earliest childhood years I was always fascinated by three special things namely Football, Hurling and people who lived on the Islands off our coasts. Maybe it had something to do with the fact that the great Mick O'Connell has lived all his life on his beloved Valentia Island. He was special and different. He trained on his own, lived all his life with his close friends and neighbours and when he went to train and play for Kerry he had to "Row the Boat" ashore."

So when my daughter, who resides in London, said "Dad let's do something different this year - I have booked a short vacation on the Island of Inis Oirr," my heart as the song says "skipped a beat" and I was excited at the prospect of this adventure. From my school days with Maistir O Loingsigh at Scoil an Gurán Clondrohid I knew that the Aran Islands of Inis Mór, Inis Meáin and Inis Oirr were off the coast of Clare and in the territorial waters of Galway Bay. It was to prove a most enjoyable holiday. Collecting my daughter from Cork Airport to where she had flown from Stanstead which is on the outskirts of London, we travelled North through Mallow, Buttevant, Charleville and on to County Limerick all part of the Golden Vale. The new motorway allowed us to skirt around Limerick City through the Tunnel and onwards past the Cliffs of Dooneen and the beautiful landscape that is the west coast of Clare.

Soon we were on Doolin Pier and our trawler was far removed from the "lonesome boatman". The skipper regaled us with stories of his adventures with his Underage Soccer Squads. Before long his full contingent of enthusiastic holiday makers were on their way across the 8 kilometre passage to reach the pier of Inis Oirr and land safely on the island. The weather was beautiful and the scenery was fantastic as we jumped on our pre booked bicycles and embarked on our trip around this unspoiled place. The narrow twisty roads added to the mystique of the Island with its high limestone ditches enclosing the green pastures where the cows and calves grazed contentedly under the clear blue sky.

Inis Oirr is a small magical Gaeltacht Island off the mouth of Galway Bay. It is the most easterly of the three Aran Islands with close on 300 residents. To the North is Connemara, to the West is the wild Atlantic Ocean and on the South is the renowned Burren. It is sometimes the small things in the smallest places that have the most magical effect. The Island boasts of a spectacular landscape. The peace and tranquillity is enhanced by the beautiful but fragile language and culture of Inis Oirr where you can still hear the Irish language being spoken by locals daily. This special place contains stunning peaceful walks with amazing views of the Cliffs of Moher in Co Clare and the other Aran Islands. Visitors can spot the Kerry mountains to the South on a clear day and generations of "Fr Ted" fans love to check out the "Plassey shipwreck" which looks out on the Burren. This is the rusted remains of a freighter that washed ashore in 1960, set on a rocky beach with scenic views.

The magnificent Fordurris Point Lighthouse is an active 19th Century building and a huge attraction. The ancient Cill Gobnait Church ruin is no doubt associated with our own local St Gobnait. She, we were told had been residing in Inis Oirr which she was visited upon by an Angel from Heaven and informed to build her Church where she came upon nine White Deer. Her journey eventually brought her to Clondrohid and finally to Ballyvourney.

With its white sandy beach, distinctive stone walls and excellent accommodation and eating options in the small main village, it is easy to understand why many people return to this unspoilt island year after year.

The Island has a School, Church, Football pitch, Shops, friendly Bars and Restaurants which cater for residents and visitors alike thus allowing it's very welcome guests to relax and enjoy their stay. All of the three Aran Islands combine to form their own Gaelic Football teams which compete successfully in the Galway League and Championship and of course in Comórtas Peile Na Gaeltachta. Being a GAA player on the Aran Islands is not exactly straightforward. Take for instance a typical match day. Players take the Ferry to the mainland at 10am and have breakfast. At 12noon they will do their warm up before the game throws in at 1pm. After the match the players will eventually get the Ferry back home at 6.30pm in the evening.

After a busy three hours cycle we came back to our excellent accommodation and completed the evening with a few drinks and lots of jovial entertainment. Musicians, singers and storytellers dropped in and a wonderful session passed all too quickly. We made a small contribution to the evening's entertainment and our poem "Miceál Mór" was well received. As we left the haunting sound of the tune "Inis Oirr" played on the Harp will remain long in my memory.

Next morning, after a hearty full Irish breakfast, we again took off for a cycle and a last look around the area. Following the return of our bikes to their owner we reluctantly began our return journey to the mainland with wonderful memories of an enchanting and very special experience.

Footnote: Inis Oirr is a hidden gem of unspoilt rugged beauty and well worth a visit. Eighteen months later in December 2017 as I proudly escorted my youngest daughter up the aisle on her Wedding Day, I shed a tear as I again listened to a harpist play that beautiful tune "Inis Oirr". Nach Iontach an tSaol í, Buíochas Mór le Dia na nGlora - It's a wonderful world.



# MEP KELLEHER ASKS CENTRAL BANK TO INVESTIGATE BANKS AND THEIR MORTGAGE SWITCHING PROCESSES

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said it is very concerning that Irish banks are taking so long to process switcher mortgage applications, and that the Central Bank should investigate to ensure that all regulatory requirements are being adhered to, and that banks are not purposely dragging their feet to frustrate the process.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economic and Monetary Affairs Committee, was commenting after it was reported in the national media that customers are being frustrated in their attempts to secure lower interest fixed term loans by processing delays in the banks.

"This really is not acceptable. Customers are rightly seeking to find lower interest rate loans for their homes and to reduce the impact of rate rises on their disposable income.

"Every month of a delay is a month of a higher interest repayment. That's money that should be in a customer's wallet rather than being given to a bank for interest. "We need to find out who or what is slowing down the process. I can't imagine it's the new bank as they want new customers on their books as quickly as possible.

"The Central Bank of Ireland updated its mortgage switching rules in 2019 to try to ease the process and to encourage homeowners to consider mortgage switching. Under these rules, banks are required to give switchers all the information they need and be fully transparent on how long it will take.

"Only this month, the Central Bank announced a further review of these rules. Clearly there is a problem with mortgage switching in Ireland with just 1% of mortgage holders planning to switch this year according to a recent Daft mortgages report.

"Now is the time for a quick reaction from the Central Bank. Our mortgage market is lethargic and it's costing customers money.

"I will be writing to the Central Bank of Ireland's Consumer Protection Directorate requesting that they investigate this matter to determine whether banks are respecting their duty to be transparent about the process and, more importantly, if they are being reasonable about how long it will take. I would request the Central Bank to remind banks of their obligations and duties to their customers.



"Home owners are under serious financial pressure right now. If someone finds a better, cheaper mortgage option, they need to have their applications processed and dealt with as quickly as possible. Every month counts in terms of money in people's pockets," concluded Kelleher.


Welcome back dear student "Rise up, O God, and scatter Your enemies. Let those who hate God run for their lives. Blow them away like smoke. Melt them like wax in a fire. Let the wicked perish in the Presence of God. But let the godly rejoice. Let them be glad in God's Presence...filled with joy. Sing praises to God and to His Name! The Lord will deal with our enemies, and He will work out every situation once we hold on to the hope we have through faith (Hebrews 10:35). Jesus is our Redeemer.
