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
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

WORKBASE COWORKING HUB to open on Main Street Macroom this December

In more good news for the town of Macroom, it has been announced that a new Coworking Hub will open above Deasy's Pharmacy on Main Street.

The hub will be a collaboration between Cormac Deasy of Deasy's Pharmacy and the operators of the HQKerry and Workbase Hubs in Kerry and Limerick

The new hub will see the opening of a state-ofthe-art Hotdesking facilities for remote workers, along with purpose built Office and Wellness suites opened in the heart of the town. The team behind the Workbase Hub already operate four hubs across County Kerry and Limerick under the Workbase and HQKerry brands, and this is their first such facility in County Cork.

Speaking about the new Hub, Ken Tobin Director of HQKerry and Workbase said "We are excited about this opportunity to open our first hub in County Cork and were delighted when Cormac Deasy reached out to us about developing the potential of his space in the middle of Macroom. We have been operating hubs since 2016, and have seen the positive economic impact our

have seen the positive economic impact our hubs have had on the towns we have located in. Our hubs directly bring new employment into the town, as well as providing valuable spend in local businesses. Particularly our hubs provide an opportunity for Remote Workers to work locally,



as well as providing a chance for a town to attract new businesses.

A key for us in the development of any new hub is to work with local business leaders and public representatives to attract new companies into a town"

Cormac Deasy, of Deasy's Pharmacy outlined "Since we began planning this new hub I've begun to appreciate the huge opportunity this provides for people to work locally. The hub will have dedicated HotDesk spaces, along with purpose-built office suites for different size and types of businesses. We are providing all of the modern services you can expect in any large city office base.

Obviously being above our own Pharmacy here in Macroom, there is a unique opportunity for businesses in the Health, Wellness and Treatment industries to base themselves here, but also, we have modern offices for Freelancers, Professionals and Technology companies".

With an official launch in the pipeline, the hub will be open for businesses and remote workers to move in from early December this year, and the team are now welcoming expressions of interest for businesses and remote workers looking for a space.

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Old Mac Suibhne negatives have positive impact for cancer charity

Black and white photos which capture life in Macroom and the surrounding Lee Valley hinterland from the early to mid-1980s are now available to buy locally with a share of the cost of each print purchased going to the Irish Cancer Society's Night Nursing service.

The images, all taken almost 30 years ago by Sean MacSuibhne, have already provided members of the public with a nostalgic trip down memory lane through their publication in batches for months on the 'Macroom Yesterday' Facebook group.

Other photos released to group members also appeared in the family's 'Muskerry through the MacSuibhne Lens' photographic collection which was launched almost two years ago. The entire proceeds of sales of this book went to Macroom Tidy Towns.

The recently shared collection on the nostalgic Facebook page includes pictures from sporting and social events, Scouts, Guides, Macra, Drama events and so much more from 1983 to 1986. The photos are numbered and are now available to order and print for €10 each through 'The Bigger Picture' in Macroom. €6 from each 8" x 10" print sold goes directly to the charity. The remainder covers costs incurred by the photo printing shop.

Sean and his family took photos for local papers from 1983 up to 2002. After that, Sean and his late wife, Maire, volunteered as photographer and editor with the Lee Valley Outlook for almost 18 years. They only stood back when Maire fell ill in late 2019. The donations to the Irish Cancer Society Night Nursing service are made in lieu of the support the family received in Maire's final days in June 2020.

Sean says it's been a pleasure to share the photos. "There was no point keeping the negatives in the attic, never to be seen again. It's great to help raise funds for this charity. These photos have brought so much joy to so many people. My son Micheal has scanned thousands of negatives and has been



releasing them in batches on the Facebook page. "About 3,000 have already been shared and there are another two or three thousand to come from this era," Sean explained.

Irish Cancer Society Head of Fundraising, Rosemary Simmons, said; "We're so thankful to Sean and Micheal for their efforts in preserving and sharing these beautiful photos, both in memory of Maire and as a way of providing valuable support to our Night Nursing service.

"Our Night Nurses provide end-of-life care to cancer patients in the comfort of their own home, where they can stay in the company of their loved ones in their final days, and the service relies mostly on donations which are so important to continuing this crucial work."

Micheal said: "There's a reference number on each photograph on the Macroom Yesterday Group and all the scanned files are at The Bigger Picture. If someone wants a print it can be bought through their website or the shops.

"Just as Vinyl Music Records are making a comeback, printed photographs and indeed 35mm photography are also in vogue. In the negatives scanned from 83-86 there are many pictures which were never published or printed before. They are bringing great joy to people."

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


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MACROOM SENIOR CITIZENS FUNDRAISING EVENTS

Berrings, his people were from Derrynasaggart and Clonkeen and his connection to this gealtacht area was strong. He attended De La Salle college in Ballyvourney where his love of the Irish language was nurtured and after his third level education in U.C.C. he became a secondary school teacher in Irish and History. After several years teaching, he became a Primary School's Inspector and was relocated to Abbeyfeale in West Limerick and then Ennis, Co. Clare. His passion for place, history, language and sense of oneself never waned until his death in February 2022.

MACROOM GOOD LIVES PROJECT

This year's work placement ran between February and April and marked the fourth year in which some of our learners have used the Castle Demesne as an optional venue for the work placement module.

During the learner's time spent in the castle Demesne they were able to learn new skills such as Wildflower ID, Tree ID, and planting within a designed landscape. This year we were delighted to work on a new site next to the GAA pitch where our learners could hone their skills in the planting of a number of different trees (Apple, Rowan and Oak). The learners helped set up a tree nursery under the supervision of Ted Cook, on one of the

sites where they planted two different types of saplings, oak and apple which they then staked off with wire to protect from the number of wildlife which has made the Demesne their home. We can return and lift them at a future date and plant them on site within the Demesne. We would like to thank the trustees of the castle Demesne for their consent

MACROOM POPULATION GROWTH LEADS TO REVISION OF PLANS FOR NEW SCHOOL

The Department of Education has revised the size of the original plan to build a new school on Sandy Hill for De La Salle College Macroom.

The review completed by the Department is based on the expected future demand and allowing for projected housing developments in the future. The Department is now proposing to increase the accommodation brief for De La Salle College Macroom, which will result in the new school being able accommodate up to 500 pupils, plus four ASD classrooms. In addition, the design team will make provision to accommodate further expansion should the need arise.

The Department is now making arrangements to revise the existing brief. Rogerson Reddan Associates Ltd have been appointed as the project management team for this 7,000m2 structure. The revised size will, among other things, result in additional classrooms, Science Labs and practical rooms for Graphics and Technology. Additional social space for our students will be warmly welcomed, as will the PE Hall facility, which will extend beyond 1000m2.

The Department of Education's review came about as a result of the huge amount of investment in the development of Macroom, in both infrastructure and housing, in recent years. The Location of a Macroom Town, being 20 minutes from the Cork City boundary and 30 minutes from Killarney, now make it the most attractive commuter town for the 2 locations for a variety of people of various age profiles.





MACROOM SECTION OF N22 BYPASS TO OPEN IN DECEMBER

It has been announced that the Eastern Section of the new bypass from Coolcower to Carrigaphooka will be officially by An Taoiseach Michael Martin TD and the Mayor of Cork County Council, Danny Collins on Friday December 9th, 2022. The 8Km section of the road includes a tie-in roundabout at Coolcower on the eastern side of Macroom, a grade separated junction on the Millstreet Road at Gurteenroe on the Western end of Macroom and a temporary tie-in roundabout at Carrigaphooka allowing traffic to merge with the existing N22. Macroom has being waiting for this bypass for many years' said Pat O'Connell, Chairman of the

Lee Valley Enterprise Board who welcomed the new section of the road being opened and paid tribute to our local T. D's, local County Councillor's/ Macroom Municipal Council and former members of Macroom Town Council who went on several delegations to different Ministers for Transport in Dublin to secure a bypass for Macroom.

Macroom has now an opportunity to develop and expand and the bypass Sub Committee of the Lee Valley Enterprise Board will be working with Fusion Communications over the next 12 months to support the Public Relations, Communications and Marketing of the town. Macroom has a massive

catchment area and a large amount of free parking spaces so hopefully with all the heavy traffic gone from the town it will encourage people to come into Macroom where you will find some fine Retail Stores, Restaurant's, Hotel, B&B's Café's and Bar's. At present the New Briery Gap Theatre and new County Library are being constructed and hoped to be open in 2023. Funding has also been secured for the continued restoration work on the former Church of Ireland in Castle Street.

This was facilitated by various workshops, presentations, and discussions. The recommendations from the assembly were presented to Minister D. Calleary on the day.

Emily will be a member of the National Youth Assembly until August 2023 and is looking forward to attending further assemblies.

The launch of Bridget Goulding's book, Fallen Leaves, drew a large crowd at Independence Museum Kilmurry on Thursday, 3rd November on what turned out to be a most enjoyable evening. Michael O'Flynn, CEO of the O'Flynn Group was the guest speaker. Other speakers were Michael Galvin, local historian; Mary O'Mahony, Chairperson KHAA; John Fitzgerald, Honorary President KHAA and Dr. John O'Mahony, SC.

Fallen Leaves is Bridget's second book, following her 2016 publication of Kilmurry Felds. Based on her genealogy research, this new publication tells a broad range of stories about her ancestors. Ranging from her grandmother in Cumann na mBan to a shoemaker grandfather who was sentenced to 5 years in an industrial school aged 13 years. Another grandfather was a gardener on the Warrenscourt Estate. There are relatives who left Kilmurry to work in the mines in Butte, Montana, while eight of the eleven children of her great-grandparents emigrated to Massachusetts from Dunmanway. While the girls of this family assimilated well into new lives and a new environment, America was not all it promised for their three brothers. Although having German fathers, there were sons who fought Germany in both WW1 and WW2. With links to a 500-year-old castle (tower house) in West Cork to a Lord Mayor of Cork and a particular landmark building in the city, these are all too human stories of failure and success, of tragedies and loss, the trials and tribulations of ordinary people who lived in extraordinary times. With many reunions of descendants across the Atlantic, one of whom, Drew Allison, was instrumental to the publication of this book, Bridget encourages families to discover their roots and firmly believes that long-dead ancestors want to be found.

Medicine Plants of the Hedgerow and River Bank







Hi! It is good to be back in the Lee Valley after spending a number of weeks away with my husband travelling around Northern Europe.

Due to the wonders of the Internet, I was able to prepare articles in advance, and send them in at the appropriate time over my phone. I equally was in awe when I was able to see for myself in the Netherlands how many people happily use bicycles every day. This is in part because the Dutch have clearly marked smooth cycle paths, with separate lights and signs for those on two wheels. In many cities the paths are completely segregated from cars. At roundabouts, those using pedal power have priority, and cycling proficiency is a compulsory part of the Dutch school curriculum.

As of 2019 it was estimated there were about 22.9 million bikes in the Netherlands which has a population of 17.1 million people...and before you say Ireland is too hilly, this includes some 2.4 million electric bikes.

36% of Dutch people list cycling as their most frequent way of getting around on a typical day, as opposed to the car (45%), and public transport

It was then no surprise that even 17% of over 65year olds cycle every day. No excuse for me then! In the Netherlands there is at least 33,000 to 35,000 kilometres of dedicated cycling infrastructure which must be so beneficial to all humans and nature, including trees.

And when I think of trees, my mind is drawn back to enormous numbers of trees, I saw in Germany particularly. Seventy-seven species grow in German forests with Spruce, Pine, beech, and oak taking up almost 3/4 of the forest area.

Forests in Germany cover 32% of Germany's surface area, and so

they shape the character of the country's cultural landscape. They fulfil a variety of functions for nature and society and play an important role in the context of climate change.

When in 2020, more trees died in Germany from droughts, bark beetle and forest -fires than in any

year before, the Government set up a support programme worth 1.5 billion euros to help private and municipal forest owners cope with forest damage, invest in reforestation and adapt forests to climate change.

This enthusiasm for trees is one of the reasons I am always so keen to hear from Ted Cook in relation to our own trees in Ireland. In this article he will speak on one of our most commonly encountered Irish species, the Willow.

He tells me that readers who would like to check out the chemicals in Aspirin, will note that Salicylic acid is the pain-relieving active ingredient.

Salicilin was identified in 1828 in the leaves and bark of the Willow/Sally tree by a French pharmacist, Henri Leroux. The Italian chemist Mr. Pina succeeded in separating the Salicilin into its pure state in 1839. In 1896, a German chemist created the version we know today by creating the Willow extract which he marketed as 'Aspirin'.

Of Ireland's five indigenous (native) willow species, our Grey willows appear our most commonly encountered variety along damp field boundaries and riverbanks (riparian zone). Our Sullane River (Saille Abhann or Sally River), flows through Macroom Town and Grey Willow comprises most of the riparian linear woodland as seen from the Town Park's western bank and upstream of the footbridge.

Some hundreds of Willow Tree species have been introduced from overseas to Britain and Ireland. We know of over 500 species and sub-species in Europe. Because most Willows cross and back cross 'promiscuously', our Willows are nearly impossible to classify. The introduced 'White willow' mostly gives us our basketry.

Willows flower before their leaves emerge, to facilitate pollen dispersal by wind during very early Springtime. The golden male flowers yielding rich pollen protein for our hungry bumblebees during mid-March. Like Rowan, Yew, Aspen, Juniper and Buckthorn, male and female flowers occur on separate species. Our two oak species, and their hybrid swarm, support most native insects, but our Willow comes next, supporting 266 native insects. The latin or scientific name for Willow is 'Salix' (Saileach in Gaeilge).

At the present time, Willow, all species, are especially relevant. They colonise toxic sites where little or nothing else can grow. They uptake heavy metals which is of huge help to nature. They restore soil health and water quality to areas of intensive agriculture and Plantation Forestry with their associated phosphate leachate.

I am pleased to hear that Ted is working on future article where he will talk about Meadowsweet and Honeysuckle, which also contain Salicin.

In 1905 a book was published by the Irish Book Company, Staraidheacht (History): pieces for recitation in Irish, containing poetry, prose, and songs from the crème de la crème of Irish language literary tradition. As was to be expected, the slim volume contained literary treasures such as Eibhlín Dubh Ní Chonaill's Caoineadh Airt Uí Laoghaire (The Lament for Art Ó Laoghaire), in addition to works by An tAthair Peadar Ó Laoghaire and Eoghan Ruadh Ó Súilleabháin. These luminaries were all associated with the Lee Valley, which was quite an achievement, yet perhaps an even more remarkable achievement was the inclusion of a song, Íde an Ghandail, by Mícheál Ó Tuama (Michael Twomey), more widely known by a completely different name, George Curtin.

Born on June 22nd, 1877, in Slabs, possibly Leaca na Stuaice, near Knocknagree, very little is known about his life, which has given rise to much conjecture and even legend. Some say he was born in Lisscarrigane, Clondrohid. His father, Donncha, died before he was born, and his mother, Ellen, was 48 when she gave birth to Mícheál / George. Some say George's parents were not married. As we can see, nobody is sure of any of the details of his life, apart from his undeniable talent in composing poetry and songs.

George received very little schooling, with accounts ranging from one day at Carriganima school, to not progressing beyond one book. Whatever the truth may be, it is certain that George did not, to paraphrase Mark Twain (It is easier to fool the people, than to convince them they have been fooled. No man's life, liberty, and property are safe while the legislature is in session), let his schooling interfere with his education.

Life was physically arduous. The injustice of the expropriation of Irish land fundamentally impoverished the Irish people. Hunger and poverty were the order of the day in the countryside. For George, this was compounded by the fact that his mother was semi-invalided, which meant George was the main income provider, probably before he was ten years of age. That was quite a heavy responsibility for the young shoulders of a child to bear. There is a sense of how dismal home life was:

George Curtin - Curtins' Hotel, He lives in a long low thatch house, lived inside with cobwebs, soot and paper, Plenty water for irrigation but no place to irrigate.

Work was similarly hard and unrelenting: Long fasting in drains It plagued those men The blood in their veins Grew pale and thin.

Yet, despite such hardship, George was astute, sharply witty, and always ready with a guip. One has to smile at the following, which captures the idea of the 'Irish mammy' perfectly:

Barney Leary has his mother And whilst he has her, He'll get no other!

George Curtin



Conscious of his lack of formal education, George seems to have attended some Irish language classes when possible. A native Irish speaker, he composed songs and poetry in both Irish and English. Some songs of his, known as macaronic songs, contained half of every verse in Irish and English. One example of such a song is My pup came home from Claedach, which he is said to have composed instantly, in front of a group of people who were talking about that very thing:

If you were to see him 'twas really astonishing What little time a sheepdog without feeding would be vanishing.

Ní raibh siúil na slí ann, a chroí na chliabh 'bhí ataithe,

A chosa ' bhí tanaí is a phíb siúd ' bhí greadaithe, 'S nach mé ' bhí go mórálach nuair a tháinig sé abhaile chugham.

(There was no walking of the way, his heart of the basket was swollen,

His feet were thin and his pipe was those that were

And I was not proud when he came home to me.) Of George's many compositions, it is Ide an Ghandail / The thirst of the gander that has received the most literary acclaim:

Osna mo chroí, mar tá gam le hinsint Go bhfuil sé gan bhrí, lag, traochta Táim creachta gan puinn de shaibhreas an tsaoil 'S is baolach, dá dhroim, go n-éagfad.

I am wounded without a penny of the riches of life And in consequence, I am in danger of extinction. Renowned Irish language scholar, Ant Athair Peadar Ó Laoghaire knew George well, even providing an English translation of Íde an Ghandail. He also said the following in 1901 of George: 'However, the poets are beginning to speak again.... that young poet has beaten Burns (Robert Burns, who wrote Auld Lang Syne and is known for saying the best laid plans of mice and men often go awry). Given what esteem An tAthair Peadar held Robert Burns in, that is high praise indeed. During this speech, said to be the first Irish language speech to be written down in shorthand, George Curtin / Mícheál Ó Tuama was also compared favourably by An tAthair Peadar to Thomas Moore (Irish writer,

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
All of George's songs and poems were about the people he knew or local stories he had heard. Na Cleaganna, Mike Sullivan's Clock, Jerh Foley's Boat and The Two Donkeys are among his numerous compositions. That is what makes his song The Man that came home from Pretoria all the more curious:

I worked like a bugger to come back again On board an oul lugger midst tots of rain, And the roar of the surges near drove me insane Said the man coming home from Pretoria. After forty days sailing we came to Dundalk My limbs they were aching I scarcely could walk, And the peelers they gazed with the eye of a hawk On the man coming home from Pretoria.

Ostensibly, this is a song about the Boer War, or the South African War (1899-1902), as it is known as today. There is said to be no evidence that George fought in this war (the Boer War concentration camp system was the first time that a whole nation had been systematically

targeted, and the first in which whole regions had been depopulated. The war claimed the lives of 25,000 Afrikaners, 22,000 British and 12,000 Africans. The origins of the war, like most wars, were complex and stemmed from more than a century of conflict between the Boers and Britain. Of course, there was also the question of who would control the very lucrative Witwatersrand gold mines, as control of natural resources and war are often highly correlated), and that the story of his fighting there was a figment of his imagination. One reason given for this composition is that George visited an aunt in Cardiff, Wales, who gave/ left him some money. It is said he drank this money away and that it took him some time to return home, so he composed the song to hide his shame and explain a two-year absence. While it is true there is no evidence to suggest that George fought in South Africa, neither is there any evidence to suggest he didn't. Theories abound, yet nobody knows.

Many people believed he must have been happy, as he was gregarious, constantly composing songs. Maybe this was the case. Yet, even at an early age, his poetry and songs would seem to suggest otherwise. We never really know, do we, the innermost workings of the human mind? There

is the stoic face that we present to the public, and then there are the private sufferings, often exacerbated by loneliness and isolation.

George is said to have become withdrawn later in life, which, in hindsight, probably provided a clue as to his state of mind. It seems that he may have taken his own life on September 12th, 1927, at the age of 50. Reports suggest he may have self-harmed and fallen into the nearby river. The community must have been shocked and yet, in the way that close-knit communities do, people rallied together, burying him in Reilig Naomh Gobnait / St. Gobnait's cemetery, Baile Mhúirne. The location of his grave is unknown, as it is most likely an unmarked grave. What a sad end to an unusual life. No life is ordinary.

George's life deserves to be remembered, and this led to a wonderful event to celebrate the life and work of George, called George Curtin Remembered, which can be seen on YouTube https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=-T2U1lpSqzl, recorded by LTV Services Limited (LTV, local television, is an underrated community resource which will prove invaluable in the future, as a prime example of intangible cultural heritage).

One of the many things that remains unknown about George's life is why he was known as George Curtin. Why the change of name? What prompted this? It was not a matter of the disposing of identification documents while travelling to Ireland from abroad, for example, as he travelled back to the place he was from, where everyone knew his name - both his birth name and his assumed name. Whatever the reason, what is clear is that George made an immense contribution to Irish folklore and the Irish language. In the place where he lived, a memorial exists that is lovely in its simplicity. In this month where people in many parts of the world remember and honour their ancestors, perhaps it is time to think about a memorial in/near the place where he is buried? Doesn't George deserve to be honoured?

The message George left us is really about the human spirit. Like the tree that grows out of rocks on a sharply inclined mountain, with little nutrition, facing into the wind, George's determination, from the time he was a boy, was to simply be.

ELON MUSK MUST COME BEFORE EU LAWMAKERS TO DISCUSS TWITTER REFORMS AND SACKING OF STAFF - MEP KELLEHER

- Twitter has obligations under EU's Digital Services Act that it can't ignore -

Fianna Fáil MEP has joined with his Renew Europe colleagues in the European Parliament to request that the new Twitter CEO, Elon Musk be invited to attend a parliamentary hearing with MEPs to discuss his reforms at the company and how he will adhere to existing EU regulations.

Kelleher, an MEP for Ireland South, added, "The letter sent to the Parliament's President, Roberta Metsola by my political group, the centrist liberal Renew Europe, is an important and crucial first step. "What Mr. Musk has done so far is concerning. Twitter, whether we like it or not, plays a critical role in our democratic processes. Any weakening of standards could damage the fight against election interference, misinformation and hate speech.

"From an Irish perspective, I am incredibly concerned and angry about the manner in which Irish employees of Twitter were informed about job losses last week. Mr. Musk must accept that Twitter, by operating in, and locating itself inside, the EU must adhere to our strong employment rights legislation. We are not the United States. We respect workers and their rights.

"Twitter has obligations under the Digital Services Act and the 2022 Code of Practice on Disinformation. This is non-negotiable. Twitter cannot become a dystopian hellscape. It would be bad for democracy and bad for society.

"European values and laws must still apply to Twitter irrespective of Mr. Musk's personal views. He might be the world's richest man, but no one is unaccountable.

"President Metsola should invite Mr Musk for a hearing

in the European Parliament to lawmakers to scrutinise his actions and intentions. As a liberal, free speech is essential but I and Renew Europe will not tolerate a return to the digital Wild West," concluded Kelleher.

APPOINTMENTS AND NOTICES



HELP WITH PRESCRIPTION CHARGES

There are some schemes available which assist with the cost of prescribed medications and appliances and the qualifying conditions for each scheme is different.

Q. Do I have to pay for prescriptions if I have a Medical Card?

A. If you have a medical card, there is a charge for prescribed medicines and other items that you get on prescription from pharmacies. The prescription charge is €1.50 for each item that is dispensed to you under the medical card scheme, up to a maximum of €15 per month per person or family. For people aged over 70, the prescription charge is €1 per item, up to a maximum of €10 per month per

Q. If I have a GP Visit Card does it cover prescription charges?

A. No. Prescribed drugs are not free but may be covered by the Drugs Payment Scheme.

O. What is the Drug Payment Scheme?

A. Under the Drugs Payment Scheme, you and your family only have to pay a maximum of €80 each month for approved prescribed drugs and medicines, and certain appliances. After you register for the scheme, you will get a plastic swipe card for each person named on the registration form. You should show this card whenever you collect your medication or appliances from the pharmacy. The HSE Primary Care Reimbursement Service provides a list of medicines or aids provided under the Drugs Payment Scheme. You should use the same pharmacy in a month to avoid paying more than the maximum €80. You do not have to register with a pharmacy for the scheme.

You can apply for the Drugs Payment Scheme online at mydps.ie or by completing an application form which you can get from your local Citizens Information Centre or Local Health Office.

Q. What is the Long-Term Illness Scheme?

A. If you have a medical condition covered by the Long-Term Illness Scheme, you can get free drugs, medicines and medical and surgical appliances for the treatment of that condition. The qualifying conditions include Diabetes, Epilepsy, Parkinsonism and Multiple Sclerosis. You can get a full list of the conditions covered under this scheme from your local Citizens Information Service.

You must be ordinarily resident in Ireland to qualify. This means that you are living here and intend to live here for at least one year. Students from outside the EU do not qualify for the Long-Term

The Long-Term Illness Scheme does not depend on your income or other circumstances. You may also be eligible for a Medical card or GP visit card, depending on your circumstances.

Q. Can you tell me about the Discretionary Hardship Scheme?

A. The HSE Primary Care Reimbursement Service (PSRS) provides a list of medicines or aids provided under the medical card or Drugs Payment Scheme. These products are approved for the schemes by the HSE. Some items that can be bought over the counter are not included in the free or subsidised schemes. If you have a medical card and are prescribed an item that is not on PCRS list, your pharmacist or Local Health Office can apply for it to be paid for by the Discretionary Hardship Scheme. If the hardship scheme does not cover the cost of the medicine and you have to pay for it, you may want to check with your doctor to see if there is an alternative medicine. You can get more information about the scheme from your pharmacist or Local Health Office.

Q. Is there any tax relief for medical expenses?

A. If you pay medical expenses that are not covered by the State or by private health insurance, you can claim tax back on some of those expenses, which includes tax relief on medical expenses for prescribed drugs and medicines. You can claim tax relief online using Revenue's myAccount service.

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
















A Word of Victory




