

SEC (Sustainable Energy Community) RETHINKING ENERGY AS A COMMUNITY

The Macroom Tidy Towns group has been approached by the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) in order to gauge interest in establishing a Sustainable Energy Community - a system under which we could work collectively in the Macroom area in the interests of greater efficiency, and the adoption of smart and innovative solutions where these may be appropriate.

Ideally we would act in a cross-sectional way, incorporating the various sports clubs, businesses, schools and other organisations within the town. The hope is that we can make savings both in financial and energy terms. SEAI will support the community by assisting the members with capacity building and skill sharing.

The arc proposed is a 'Learn/Plan/Do' approach, whereby networks and tools are built up in the

first instance, including the possible use of surveys or energy maps; the planning phase entails the establishment of a time frame, tools and a 'master plan'; finally, the 'Do' phase of implementation will involve putting the plan into practice, leveraging funding sources - identifying suitable grants and supports to help achieve the project aims.

Network members will be assigned an SEAI mentor who will be able to assist and advise on feasibility and approaches. National and regional events will also be organised to allow members to gain insights and share ideas and expertise.

Dedicated SEAI funding will be available to support planning phase operations, as well as for the development of core competencies of the group.

For those who may be interested in smart and sustainable energy, and in helping to move

forward as a community in energy terms, the SEC (Sustainable Energy Community) model provides a very worthwhile framework for developing skills and knowledge, building networks and connecting across different groups within the community in order to move forward in a strategic way that allows everyone in the local area to reap benefits in terms of both energy and economic savings. We warmly encourage anyone interested in learning more about the SEC and SEAI to make contact with the Tidy Towns group by chatting with our volunteers or by getting in touch through our Facebook page. We are by no means experts in this field, but we are excited by what there is to be learned and gained by exploring our possibilities as a community.



On the 14th of October, our TY students received a fascinating talk about windmills and wind farms from John Lyons, an expert in wind energy and sustainability. He is an ambassador for Orsted, the Danish energy company who have provided our local areas with windmills over the years. John Lyons talked about how sustainable wind energy is and how we should back it. The TY students learned a lot from this presentation and had a keen interest in the topic. After John Lyons' brilliant presentation, the TYs travelled to Caherdowney Wind Farm in Carriganima, Macroom, where the girls were able to go inside the windmill and the power station. Here they learned about how the windmills work and how important the power station is. The students thoroughly enjoyed themselves and were pleasantly surprised with how interesting the presentation was.

The staff at the windfarm kindly surprised the girls with an environmentally friendly goodie bag. It was a fun and innovative way to promote sustainable practice, and to get the girls excited about the importance of caring for the environment. The goodie bag was simple but effective. It consisted of a tote bag, a reusable water bottle, a pen, some wildflower seeds, and even some jellies. These

Although these are very small changes within our school, they are still important. It has widely reduced the amount of plastic bottles and plastic bags used by the TYs daily. These are simple changes that require minimal effort and are achievable for nearly every teenager. The goodie bags were definitely a huge hit

The TY trip to the wind farm is one of the many environmentally educational actions that St. Mary's is taking part in at present. For example, our first years have also started preparing and growing a

garden on the convent grounds near our school. This is to promote the importance of the upkeep of plants and flora as they contribute to the oxygen levels in the air. They're also learning how to grow their own vegetable patches in order to live more sustainable lives and reduce their carbon footprints. Connecting with nature is another advantage of this wellbeing programme and it is soon becoming a highlight of the school week. To complement this practice, the first years are also running a composting initiative during their lunch breaks to encourage the school to compost their food waste. The girls aim to turn this into the fertiliser needed to keep their plants, flowers and vegetables fed in their garden.

There have also been whispers of a sustainable fashion show within St. Mary's. This would be a fashion show of second-hand clothing, to promote the importance of reusing and recycling clothes as discarded clothes contribute to the landfills of rubbish that are currently destroying our planet. These are only some of the many things the staff and students of St. Mary's do daily to make sure we are playing our part in helping the environment and though we've a long way to go, these projects are definitely good places to start.





The Macroom and District Environmental Group **Think Globally, Act locally** THE IMPORTANCE OF BEES



Hi, Chris Barrett back here talking about a subject which is very dear to me.

I want to look at ways in which if we can become involved in caring for bees without having our own hives.

I have written this article following discussions have had recently and over the years with local bee keepers. I am also grateful for information from the article, "Honey – The Food of Light", by Marguerite McQuaid.

Bees are very much part of our History

If we look back, we can see that bees have been revered since ancient times. They appear in the Bible, the Islamic Quran and the Jewish Torah. The mention of a land of milk and honey reminds us of a world where people can be healthy and flourish. Ireland used to be famous for honey, and Beekeeping was common to the self-sufficient household.

Bee-judgements were the subjects of many tracts in Brehon Law. Such was the reverence for honey that it was not even sold in Ireland till the 19th Century.

Wax seals candles made from bees wax would have been common-place in our past.

Locally, of course, there is the long-standing local connection between bees and St. Gobnait of Ballyvourney. If you visit the shrine in Ballyvourney, you can see St.Gobnait standing on a bee-hive, though this is not something I would recommend you emulate as a mere mortal who wants to make a good relationship with bees. However, this local well-documented local tradition of St. Gobnait's connection with bees, should encourage our awareness and enthusiasm for helping these special insects.

Bees have pollinated our crops down through the centuries, but now they are at risk from pesticides and need us to help them more than ever before. SO WHAT CAN WE DO TO HELP BEES?

If you have even a small amount of land, you could plant it with bee-friendly plants, and maybe even trees. Honey bees, like bumble bees, carpenter



bees, solitary bees, butterflies and birds are all great cross-fertilisers. They do far more than just provide honey. Our native Irish honey bee is Apis Mellifera Mellifera and bee-keepers or wouldbe bee keepers should never import non-native aueens.

Some flowers have a simple ring of petals with visible pollen-covered anthers and these are beneficial to bees. A lot of flowers bred for decoration have a dense head of petals which decrease the amount of pollen available to bees. This larger number of petals also makes it more difficult for the bees to enter the flowers.

Flowers which are good for bees include our own local wild flowers, and a lot of favourites, e.g. Lavender, Sunflower, Foxglove, Crocus, Marigold, Borage, Bee-balm, Purple Cone-Flower, Joe-Pye Weed, Black-Eyed Susan, Golden Rod, Oregano, Catmint, Honeysuckle, Cornflower and Comfrey. In fact all herbs are good to plant for bees, I am told. Gardeners will notice that these plants appear at different times of the year although some are annuals, making just a single appearance.

If you plant wild flower mixtures, which is a great idea, I am advised that you should plant only native wild-flower mixes.

There is a shrub which is so popular with butterflies that it is called The Butterly Bush or Buddleia, but bees also love it.

Native trees are hugely important too.

The Holly and the Ivy produce inconspicuous, but very useful, flowers for bees. Crab-apple, Hawthorn and Willow are all important early in the year and Sycamore trees are really important when in flower. Bees love them. Such was the loud buzzing near me one year, I was convinced I had a swarm in a nearby Sycamore. I discovered that it was just the bees having a wonderful 'bee fest'.

If you do find a swarm in your garden, you should immediately make a call to a local beekeeper or put out an alert on social media.

Remember that bees in a swarm are not dangerous. Unlike wasps, bees can live happily alongside people.

Most importantly, do not interfere with the swarm in any way.

A great further help to bees would be to avoid mowing.

If at all possible, adhere to the rhyme:

Don't Mow, Let It Grow!

It is so good to see local councils and some Twin Towns setting an example here.

Species rich grasslands can return after being decimated.

Don't use pesticides which act as a kind of nerve gas on bees, and they act on us too.

Avoid Herbicides and Fungicides.

When you are shopping you can practice examining labels. Don't buy useless sugar fortified syrups that pass for honey.

Why do Bees Matter?

BEES POLINATE OVER 40% OF ALL THE FOOD WE EAT.

WE NEED BEES TO SURVIVE!

Honey has been used to treat wounds during wars and even today honey patches are used for leg-



ulcers.

Honey is proven to be a wonderful salve for burns and it speeds healing. Honey is both anti-microbial and anti-bacterial.

The World Health Organisation recognises honey as a cough supressant and demulcent, reducing inflamation in membranes.

Honey is a great food as well and I add it to my porridge and herbal teas, and use it instead of sugar in cooking.

Unless you have an allergy, bee stings can be good for you.

Bee venom acupuncture has been used in the treatment of Rheumatoid Arthritis and among other studies a recent one in February 2022 indicated that the active compound in Bee venom, Melittin, may be useful as a therapeutic treatment for chronic diseases.

WHY DO BEES NEED OUR HELP?

We have already talked about how we are reliant on the pollination of bees and their honey.

Put simply, bees need us to help them to help us. It takes 6 honeybees six weeks of foraging to produce a single teaspoon of honey.

Billions of bees are imported thousands of miles to California each Spring so that we can have almonds and almond milk. This has been likened to the practice of sending bees to war. Bees are amazing. We need to stay aware of the plight of bees.

They are the 'canary in the coalmine', in terms of climate change.

We can all learn to treasure bees, and we have so much to lose if we do not.

Thank you to everyone who has helped open eyes as to the importance of bees.




Welcome back dear student. "When my anxious thoughts multiply within me, Your comforts delight me" (Psalms 94:19). Well here we are in the final month of the year! And of course Christmas is coming as they say, and the goose is getting fat. I remember years ago listening to the late Gerry Ryan's radio show when a woman wrote in asking for advice. He was greatly bemused at her dilemma. It was September, the children had just gone back to school, and it suddenly hit her that Christmas was coming - and that meant entertaining the in-laws. And she was in utter distress. Gerry was amazed - because this topic opened the floodgates. Suddenly the phone lines lit up with others all saying the same thing - they hated Christmas for one reason or another (but mostly having to entertain family members who treated them badly). Another theme that caused equal stress was worrying about spouses drinking too much and turning nasty, ruining Christmas for yet another year. People dread this time of year for lots of reasons - perhaps not having enough money to get everything they need; or pretending to keep the bright side out even though they may be grieving a lost loved one; or battling sickness or depression. It's hard to be sparkly when there are heavy things on your mind.

Jesus said "come to Me all you who are heavy laden and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). One of the Names of the Lord is the Wonderful Counsellor (Isaiah 9:6). Often, we don't know how to deal with these issues, but the Lord Jesus will help you (Psalm 54:4). There is no greater Friend than He (John 15:15; Proverbs 18:24). We need God's wisdom and comfort, and He is very willing to give it. The Lord does not want His children living in dread and fear. It is not His will for you to struggle and be overwhelmed about the future. Life is precious – it is a great day any day you wake up alive! But the devil wants to make you dread and fear and waste your life focussed on negatives. Remember, negatives get developed in the dark. But you don't have to live in darkness. So, if there are issues that are causing you to get stressed with anxiety bring them to the Lord Jesus and ask Him to help you.

Kilmurry are Ross Oil Mid Cork Junior Football Champions for the first time since 2017, after their win over reigning champions Aghinagh in the final played before a big crowd at Coachford. Aghinagh, who had defeated Kilmurry on their way to last year's victory, scored first and the sides were level at 0-3 each as late as the 27th minute but then Man of the Match Pádraig Berhanu struck for his first goal and Kilmurry had added three further points before the half time whistle sounded to lead by 1-6 to 0-3 at the break and it was fairly clear at this stage that Kilmurry would emerge the ultimate winners.

Kilmurry were to dominate the centre of the field area, largely curtailed the threat of Liam Twohig the Aghinagh centre forward, so often their match winner, and had the Aghinagh defence under severe pressure with long probing balls into the dangerous attacking inside trio of Berhanu, William Buckley and Joe Ryan, and the pace of Liam Wall on the '40' made life very difficult for his opponents

James O'Mullane quickly added a point and with the score at 2-7 to 0-3 and with Kilmurry in the ascendancy all over the field there was only going to be one outcome.
