



The cattle mart's in action I better not be late As a deal on a good Dexter cow In the next lot I await


A good time to grab the paper And some salted butter too

On December 18th Tidy Towns and a Tiny Feet Fairy Garden volunteers had an end of year get together in TP Cotters. Chairman, Martin Coughlan made a presentation to John Lyons who stepped down as Tidy Towns Secretary after 38 years, but remains on as an active member.

Brian O Sullivan made a presentation to Mikey Burns who has retired from both the Fairy Garden and the Tidy Towns. Lisa Manning made a presentation to Frances Lyons for all her much-appreciated support to John over the last 38 years and Shelia Murphy made a presentation to Peter Burns representing his mom Margaret, who has been a great support to Mikey over the years. Also, a word of thanks to Jack and Breda Cotter who sponsored the food and for the use of the venue for the night.

Some tips for the winter months are: Spread a thick layer of compost or well-rotted stable manure on beds, then leave the worms to work it into the soil. improving your soil structure ready for the year ahead. Provided Soil isn't frozen or waterlogged, you can plant shrubs, trees and hedging now while plants are dormant, giving roots time to settle in before winter. Watch for the first spring bulbs. Winter aconites, irises, snowdrops and the first early daffodils all start appearing around now, so be careful where you put your feet when you're in the garden. Keep bird feeders topped up with high energy food like sunflower seeds.

Some ideas for your garden over the coming year include:

- 1) Embrace Organic Gardening This means avoiding synthetic pesticides and fertilizers and opting for natural alternatives. Consider using compost to improve soil fertility.
- 2) Store and use rainwater Install rain barrels to collect rainwater and use it to water your plants. Rainwater is also rich in nutrients, beneficial for plant growth.
- 3) Foster Native Plants Native plants are adapted to local conditions and generally require less maintenance, water and pesticides. They also promote biodiversity by attracting local wildlife.

- 4) Composting for Healthy Soil Compost improves soil structure, increases organic material and provides essential nutrients to your plants.
- 5) Edible gardens and herb beds opt for fruit and vegetables that thrive in your climate zone and consider establishing a herb bed. Edible gardens not only provide fresh local produce, but also reduce the need for packaging materials and transportation.
- 6) Promote Biodiversity Encourage biodiversity by attracting plants that are beneficial to pollinators such as bees and butterflies. Consider installing insect hotels and bird feeding stations to welcome diverse wildlife into your garden.

Tidy Towns volunteers took a well-earned break over Christmas and will start back again on the 13th of January at 9:00 In the Hub in Masseytown. We would ask you to consider joining in and helping in this year's Spring Clean in some weeks time. This will be well advertised in advance and will focus on litter picking all over town, but in particular the main road from Coolcower to Carrigaphooca, between the 2 new by-pass roundabouts.

racing, face painting, music, food stalls, Teddy Bears Picnic and much more. Lots of events were free and over 150 medals were won by young and not so young! Luckily the weather was on our side and the day was a massive success.

In September a donation was made to The Hope Foundation on behalf of Transition Year Students from St. Marys Convent and to Childhood Cancer Ireland on behalf of Aoife Lucey who abseiled down Croke Park. Both have helped us in the past.

In November we had An Evening of Flora and Song with The Macroom Branch of The Irish Guide Dogs for the Blind. The talented 'Local Vocals' provided fantastic music and songs, and Maureen and Deidre from Betsy's were a huge hit with their fun and knowledge on Flower Arranging. A large crowd attended and were immensely entertained. Shane Casey from The Young Offenders attended the event and was a huge hit with everyone there. A total of €4564 was raised for The Irish Guide Dogs for the Blind on the night.

We also launched our collection of used spectacles which is ongoing. We have around 300 pairs collected so far. Collection Points are available at various businesses and locations around Macroom. In December we had our Christmas Food Appeal in Dunnes Stores and SuperValu. We collected over 30 large boxes of food and raised €4300, which all helped make Christmas easier for a lot of families. We also donated to The Macroom Defibrillator Group to purchase a new Defibrillator and other items for maintenance purposes.





THE GEARAGH. COUNTY CORK'S 1st NATIONAL PARK?






Hi! Chris Barrett back hearing from a local hero of mine, the Ecologist, Kevin Corcoran, author of 'Saving Eden' a book in which so much of the history and woodland culture of the Gearagh is documented. On 15 August 2023, I was fortunate enough to be able to attend his fascinating talk in Macroom Library concerning the Past Present and Future of the Gearagh, which was illustrated with slides. The talk led to much discussion in the audience afterwards and was inspiring throughout. due to Kevin's passion and research. Kevin started his talk by reminding us that just outside Macroom we have the very last intact stand of Primeval temperate deciduous rain forest left in Western Europe. He reminds us that other sites such as The Burren and Killarney have been able to benefit hugely from the protection received, due to their National Park status. He told us that the Gearagh is an extraordinary multi-channelled river system delta. Deltas would usually be formed where a major river meets the sea. Because the Gearagh river forest system occurs inland it is quite simply an extraordinary global geological marvel. This unusual system which produces holes big enough to swallow a horse has made it very hard for people to clear wood to put in cattle, and this has helped in its survival. The Causeway, still much loved by many local walkers was the main route to the South, and lime was still being removed until the 1950s. Kevin reminded us that despite the extraordinary high biodiversity, the Gearagh is very

fragile scientifically. The fresh water pearl mussel and the freshwater sponge, which is very sensitive to pollution are examples of unusual species which can survive due to the over-head forest canopy and the lack of plants within the Gearagh streams. Some of the help given to the Gearagh comes from unexpected sources. Natural rewilding currently occurs because the water levels are being kept so low. The surviving stand of temperate rain forest still exists up to Toon's Bridge, but needs protection. It is impossible to ignore the rewilding that is going on. The regeneration upstream is incredible and it is creeping down. The genetic material for the regeneration of the Gearagh was never lost. But windfarms are destroying the uplands, and 90-95% of the meadows are gone. Our old woodland, meadows and wildlife are part of a biodiversity crisis. The last 50 years of damage caused will take hundreds of years to repair. But there is hope. A 500 year old oak in the Gearagh has a huge number of organisms on it. (It should be realised that it will be supporting more species than 500 oaks of 100 years old). Similarly a 500 year old alder and more species still exist and need protection. Kevin's proposal is to restore the Gearagh, and develop it's outstanding natural gifts for the Lee Valley, as Cork's first National Park. A Greenway or wild way. through the forest, would also give the Gearagh protection, so it could regenerate. On a larger scale, the Carrigadrohid dam, which is 95% owned by the state (E.S.B) could be dismantled as it is now

obsolete and blocking rather than encouraging nature. Iniscarra is a far more important dam in the provision of water for Cork. The potential for a recreational route out from Cork city to Gougane Barra is exciting and could be a massive tourist resource for the area. Carrigadrohid 15th century Castle could even be bravely purchased (it seems to be in an ownership limbo) and turned into a state of the art Interpretive centre. Those who care about local nature, safe in the hands of qualified experts, can work to create not only a National Park for Cork but also a Greenway and maybe even a blueway that would track the route of St Finbarr from Cork to Gougane Barra. What a project to put to the EU LIFE fund which has funded a great many nature conservation projects across Europe! Who cannot see the amazing potential of gifting a true Environmental legacy to the care of the people of the Lee Valley, a jewel they can proudly share with the world. 





Four-Week-Old Puppies Found in Plastic Bag **Handed in to Dogs Trust**

Following a record number of surrender requests in 2023, the charity fears they will see more dogs abandoned and in need of rescue.

Dogs Trust Ireland is highlighting the worrying increase in the number of dogs needing their help after they took in a litter of defenceless four-week-old puppies that were abandoned in Co. Dublin.

A shocked member of the public spotted one of the tiny puppies in the middle of the road and when he got out to help, he discovered a plastic bag containing the puppy's six siblings nearby. The pups were soaking wet and distressingly, two of them were already dead.

The veterinary team at Dogs Trust did their utmost to treat the puppies but given their age and the condition they arrived in, despite their best efforts, only two survived.

Veterinary and Welfare Manager at Dogs Trust Ireland, Niamh Curran-Kelly, explained: "Cases like this are incredibly upsetting for everyone involved. At just four-weeks-old, puppies are still heavily dependent on their mother and wouldn't be fully weaned yet. They were far too young to be separated from her, let alone to have been left outside in the cold and rain. Despite receiving the very best care, we were saddened that only two of the puppies have survived this ordeal. Thankfully, these two little fighters are thriving, and both have recently been adopted."

Last November, Dogs Trust launched their 'Save the Next Dog' campaign highlighting the abandoned dog crisis in Ireland. The charity had almost 4,000 people contact them in 2023, seeking to relinquish their dog into their care. This was the highest volume of such requests Dogs Trust has received since



opening their doors in 2009. The charity fears that even more dogs will need their help in 2024.

We Are Unprepared for Climate Change Weather



Undoubtally, If we have learned anything from the recent flooding, it's that our current flood defensive systems and the management of our rivers and streams are totally inadequate for climate change weather.

Clearly Local Authority's and the OPW has a lot of work to do to bring our waterways, rivers and streams up to standard to cope with the consequences of climate change. The recent flooding from storms Babet and Ciaran brought enormous hardship and suffering to a multitude of homeowners in many parts of Cork County

It is now crystal clear that the climate experts who predicted storms and extreme rainfall for Ireland from climate change are 100% correct. Of course, this is poor comfort for residents in Midelton, Killeagh, Glanmire and the eight home owners in Ballinhassig, whose houses were devastated when the Owenabue river burst its banks. it is however an indisputable reminder to all the relevant authorities including Government on just how serious climate change will be.

Clearly the consequences of climate change will have to be dealt with urgently, not only at local level but also at Government level. This will require much more commitment than a few visits to flooded areas by top members of Government, culminating in photo ops and expressions of sympathy towards the affected home owners. The Government must tackle this issue with a compelling sense of urgency, similar to their covid crisis response.

This will require tackling the actual reasons why many flood defensive systems are not already in place, and in other situations are delayed, or deliberately postponed on account of environmental compliance with EU directives - that have now become futile with the advent of climate change. In one situation flood remedial work on the Owenabue river which included the replacement of an old bridge was postponed because it would have upset a colony of bats (a protected species) that were roosting under the bridge. In other situations, essential remedial work to rivers is banned because of the presence of otters in the rivers.

While most of us greatly appreciate wild life, clearly the wellbeing of human beings must always take precedent. Otherwise, residents in those areas that are prone to flooding can no longer live there. This will lead to enormous hardship and could eventually lead to flooding migration.

Clearly, the Leaders of the three-party coalition Government need to deal directly with this pending crisis and must put an urgent plan in place to cope with the impact of climate change weather in the future. Any plan must ensure that the wellbeing of human beings will supersede now purposeless EU directives - that were implemented 25/30 years ago, which was long before the emergence of climate change.

Coping with cold, snow and ice How to stay safe and avoid a breakdown this winter



Breakdowns and accidents are more common in the winter when road conditions are challenging. Here are our top tips for driving in winter and staying safe on snowy and icy roads.

How to drive safely in snow and ice

The roads can be dangerous in winter when there's snow, ice or sleet. Our top tip is to take it slow. Stopping distances can be 10 times longer when it's icy. Gentle manoeuvres and slow speeds are the key to safe driving in ice and snow.

In the season of winter colds, don't drive with a cold if you're feeling unwell and are on any medicine that could make you drowsy. It could affect your reaction times.

Before you set off

Allow extra time for winter journeys.

Plan routes around major roads, which are more likely to be cleared and gritted.

Try to get up at least 10 minutes early to give you time to de-ice the car.

Wear comfortable, dry shoes for driving so your feet don't slip on the pedals.

Check fuel levels - have at least a guarter of a tank in case of unexpected delays.

Clear all windows using a scraper and de-icer and wait until the windscreen's fully demisted. If you drive an automatic, check the handbook - some have a winter mode or recommend selecting '2' in slippery conditions.

Learn what to do if your car heater's not working.

Driving on winter roads

Pull away in second gear, easing your foot off the clutch gently to avoid wheel-spin.

If you have to use your brakes, apply them

Driving uphill – leave plenty of room between other cars or wait until it's clear so you don't have to stop part way up. Keep a constant speed and try to avoid having to change gear on the hill.

Driving downhill - slow down before the hill. use a low gear and try to avoid braking. Leave as much room as you can after the car in front.

If you get stuck in snow or ice

If you get stuck, straighten the steering and clear the snow from the wheels.

Put a sack or old rug in front of the driving wheels to give the tyres some grip.

Clear your windows of snow, ice and mist

Don't drive like a tank driver with just a tiny patch of windscreen to see out of. Make sure all your windows are clear of ice, snow and condensation before you set off.

Keep the windscreen and other windows clear of dirt and snow to avoid a fine.

Clear snow from the roof - it can fall onto the windscreen and block your view.

Air-con demists the screen faster and reduces condensation.

Replace worn or damaged wiper blades.

Don't leave your wipers on auto when you park up if there's a risk of frost. If the blades freeze to the screen, you could damage the blades or wiper motor when you turn the ignition on.

Use a suitable additive in your screenwash to reduce the chance of it freezing.

Here's some more advice on how to defrost a windscreen during the winter months.

Make your car visible in poor winter weather

With shorter days and more chance of rain, sleet and snow, there can often be poor visibility when driving in winter.

Make sure all car lights are working and the lenses are clean.

If the roads are really mucky, you might have to clean your lights after every trip.

Keep number plates clean, to avoid fines.

If you have to clear snow, don't forget the lights - front and back.

You must use headlights when visibility is seriously reduced. If you use fog lights, remember to switch them off when visibility improves so they don't dazzle other drivers or obscure your brake lights.

Choose the right winter tyres

We recommend at least 3mm of tread for the

Don't let air out of your tyres to get more grip it doesn't work, and it's unsafe.

Only use snow chains if there's enough snow to prevent damage to the road.

Think about getting winter tyres or all-season tyres – these are made from a special rubber that gives better grip in cold, wet conditions.

Look after batteries and electrics

Car batteries rarely last longer than 5 years. There are extra demands on them in the winter thanks to lights, heating and wipers. Here are some tips to prevent a flat battery in winter:

Turn off electrical loads like lights, heated rear window and wipers before trying to start the engine.

Use the starter in short 5-second bursts.

If the engine doesn't start quickly, wait 30 seconds between attempts.

If you don't use your car often, give it a regular overnight trickle charge.

Top up your antifreeze in cold weather

Antifreeze only costs a few pounds, but a frozen and cracked engine costs hundreds to repair. You need a 50-50 mix of antifreeze and water for the winter – this protects your engine down

Most modern cars use long-life antifreeze but some types of antifreeze need changing after only 2 years. Make sure you use the right type and check your service schedule.

Troubleshooting car problems in winter

A continuous squealing noise when you start up probably means the water pump's frozen it's the fan belt slipping on the pulley. Stop the engine straight away and let it thaw out. This could take days unless you can move it into a heated garage.

If your car overheats a few miles from home, it's likely that the radiator has frozen. Stop straight away so you don't cause more serious damage.



Cill na Martra (Cork) 2-10 Castlerea St Kevin's (Roscommon) 0-15

Cill na Martra from Gaeltacht Mhuscraí will be trotting out on the hallowed sod of Croke Park on Sunday January 14th to meet Cullyhanna in the All Ireland Club Intermediate Football final, the end of a magical journey for the club and its supportive community. Present day Cill na Martra has risen from Mid Cork Junior B grade, winners 1985, to become Mid Cork Junior A champions 2002, then Muskerry and County Junior champions 2003, followed by the County Intermediate A title in 2018 and then the winning of the County Premier Intermediate title in 2023. It has been a long journey but one of constant progress, with some disappointments along the way but always hope for the future and for better days ahead. The brand of football played has been attractive, the commitment outstanding and the dedication of the club officials unwavering. All Ireland Day in Croke Park will indeed be a proud day for the players, management, and the whole Cill na Martra community, whether at home or in foreign fields, and the club carries the good wishes of all of Muskerry GAA as it seeks to make more history and gain further fame and glory.

This latest triumph was hard earned and the result turned on a golden minute on 39/40 when the Cork Gaeltacht men found the Castlerea net twice to open up a five point gap which they ultimately needed to survive a gallant rally by the Connacht champions. At that time, Cill na Marta had only 14 men on the field but in a sweeping attack Ciarán Ó Duinnín cut through and sent over a perfect pass to the lurking Micheál Ó Deasúna who palmed the cross into the St Kevins net and give his side a two point advantage. The St Kevins goalkeeper made a mess of the subsequent kick out, his attempted short pass to his corner back falling short and into the welcoming arms of Maidhchí Ó Duinnín who did not look a gift horse in the mouth and quickly transferred inside to Dan Ó Duinnín who sidestepped the goalie and landed the ball into the net once again. Cill na Martra now led 2-8 to 0-9 and were never to be led subsequently, though they had to endure some nervous moments as they held on for a victory which was greeted with

delirious joy by their very numerous band of very vocal supporters.

The sides were level at 0-3 each after the first quarter and at 0-6 each at the half-time break and Cill na Martra would have felt they should have done better with their long periods of superiority. They looked the better side but the Roscommon champions got maximum return from limited possession and also overcame the disadvantage of losing a man to a black card for ten minutes

Cill na Martra kicked four first-half wides, and got no return from a couple of gilt edged opportunities of scores. John Evans' men were lacking urgency as if they believed their pre match tag of overwhelming favourites was justified and that victory would come automatically. They went into the 10-minute period of numerical advantage 0-4 to 0-3 in front and came out of it level at 0-5 apiece.

Maidhchí Ó Duinnín, Daniel Ó Duinnín, Micheál Ó Deasúna (0-2 frees), Colm Mac Lochlainn, and Damien Ó hUrdail all scored points as Cill na Martra never trailed at any stage in the opening half but they never led by more than two points despite their control.

On the restart St Kevins went in front, Tadgh Ó Corcora levelled for the Cork men, Mike Ó Deasúna from a free put the Muskerry in front, St Kevins levelled on 36 and went in front by a point in the 39th minute. Then

came the Cill na Martra goals, from Mike Ó Deasúna and Daniel Ó Duinnín, which had them in a strong position but they were not to score again for another 14 minutes. Castlerea kicked three points on the trot, which brought the gap back to two on 48.

Damian Ó hUrdail kicked an invaluable point on 53, Kevin's replied, Shane Ó Duinnín sent over to restore the three point advantage on 57. Cill na Martra lost Danny Ó Conaill to a black card as they defended desperately, goalie Pádraig Ó Críodáin distinguished himself, points for St Kevins on 59 and 64 followed, before the final whistle brought blessed relief for the Muskerry team and supporters and passage to the All Ireland Final.



2017 Macroom Motors Ltd Mid Cork U21 A Football Championship Final Replay:

A FIRST for CILL NA MARTRA

Cill na Martra 3 - 16 Kilmurry 2 - 15 - aet.

'Would the replay be as good as the drawn game?' was the inevitable thought of many in the big attendance at the Macroom Motors Mid Cork U 21 'A' football championship decider at the Castle Grounds, Macroom. The answer came quickly as the teams, so evenly matched in the first game, were again locked together on 0-3 apiece after an exhilarating opening quarter. The pattern established continue all through until the end of normal time when first one side, then the other, seemed to be getting on top only to be reined in again by battling opponents. Eventually it took extra time to separate the teams when the older age profile and accompanying strength of the Cill na Martra men brought them a mighty victory, their first ever in the 'A' grade at this age and a reward for years of dedicated attention to under age football in Cill na Martra.

Both teams were a credit to their clubs and parishes and there were some outstanding performers for both sides. Daniel Ó Duinnín who scored all three goals, and four points also, for Cill na Martra was the star performer as all his scores came from play, all were wonderful scores and all three goals in particular came at vital stages and were major boosts to the new champions. Mike Ó Deasúna, despite playing with thirteen stitches in his leg after a work accident, contributed a massive 0-9, 0-6 from frees, and was heroic in his endeavours in the circumstances. Kilmurry had possibly the better balanced team but were on average a year younger than their opponents and this was vital in the end when strength and stamina became a factor in extra time.

Kilmurry started well and led by 0-3 to 0-1 early on but by the end of the first quarter it was level, John Mullane, Seán Warren and Oghan Clifford scoring for Kilmurry, Tadgh Ó Corcora and Ó Deasúna for the Gaeltacht side. Seán Warren edged Kilmurry back in front and then in the 20th minute Ó Deasúna parted to Dan Ó Duinnín in full flight and the Kilmurry net was bulging. Ciarán Ó Duinnín added a point but back came Kilmurry with points form Warren and Seán Curzon and they were in front 1-6 to 1-4 when John O'Mullane forced the ball home from close range in the 28th minute. A minute later Cill na Martra replied with a stunning goal, Dan Ó Duinnín again the scorer, Damien Ó hUrdail supplying the final pass. Cill na Martra led by 2-4 to 1-6 at the break after a great opening half.

The teams were level four times in a second half of tremendous excitement. Tomás Collins levelled matters, Clifford put Kilmurry in front, Mike Ó Deasúna equalised again and then Dan Ó Duinnín struck with his third goal, soloing through the defence from 50 metres out in the 36th minute. Back came Kilmurry with points from Liam Wall and Clifford and an equaliser from Joe Ryan in the 41st minute and two minutes later a low cross from Joe Ryan was met at the far post by James O'Mullane who slid the ball home to put Kilmurry a goal clear. Chris Ó Meachair pointed for Cill na Martra, Liam Wall belted over a '45' for Kilmurry, Mike Ó Deasúna's free was answered by a point from play from Seán Warren to leave Kilmurry three points in front with ten minutes remaining, 2-13 to 3-8. Cill na Martra scored three points to draw level, Dan Ó Duinnin on 51, Mike Ó Deasuna from a free which saw Kilmurry lose a defender to a second yellow card and in the 58th minute Ó Deasúna kicked over the equaliser, 3-10 to 2-13, from another free. The excitement was unbearable for the animated supporters of both teams!

For the twenty minutes of extra time the floodlights were called into use and Ó Deasúna and Brian Hinchion had an early exchange of points before

Dan Ó Duinnín put Cill na Martra back in front and Ó Deasúna added a point from a free to open up a two point lead at the interval. Another Ó Deasúna free yielded a point on the restart and Dan Ó added a superb point from play. Kilmurry were clearly tiring but Joe Ryan gave them hope with a point from a free. Dan Ó Duinnín crowned a magnificent display with another point which settled the issue finally.

Adapting a Home for a Person with a **Disability or an Older Person**

Q. How much is the Housing Aid for Older People grant?

The amount of money you get depends on your gross household income for the previous tax year after any disregards and deductions are applied. The maximum grant available is €8,000 or 95% of the cost of the work approved by your local authority. The grant covers some of the cost of work needed, but not all of it.

This maximum grant of 95% is available to people with annual household incomes of less than €30,000. This reduces to 30% for those with annual household incomes of €50,001 to €60,000.

Q. What is the Mobility Aids Scheme?

This scheme provides grants for basic work designed to address mobility problems in the home, such as the purchase and installation of grab-rails, an accessible shower, access ramps, a stair-lift or a fixed track hoist. The scheme is primarily for older people, but people with a disability can also apply for it. It is available to people with a household income of less than €30,000 a year.

The maximum grant is €6,000, which may cover 100% of the cost of the works. However, you may not get the maximum grant. This is because the grant is paid by your local authority, and is dependent on what funding they have available. They will decide whether they can pay you the full grant, or a percentage of the grant. The grant does not cover VAT on the work.

Q. How do I apply?

You can get the application form from your local Citizens Information Centre, or download the application form from gov.ie . You can also get the form from your local authority. The one application form is used to apply for the three different grants mentioned above which are available for older people and people with disabilities to adapt their homes.

The form contains detailed information about the scheme's conditions and a checklist of documents that you must include. You can also contact the Housing Section of your local authority for information about the eligibility rules in your area, which may differ from those in other local authority areas.

Q. What happens if I start the work before I get grant approval?

The grant will not be paid if you start work before you get grant approval. However, it is expected that the work will start within 6 months of your grant approval. If this does not happen, the local authority may allow a time

Q. I received one of these housing grants previously, can I apply for a further grant?

In general, the work done on your home is expected to be appropriate to your future needs as well as your current needs. However, if your needs change substantially over time, you may find that further works are required. You can apply again and your application will be assessed in the normal way. There is no minimum time limit between the payment of a first and second grant.



There is a way of living at rest, and it is in the arms of our Living Saviour Jesus (Psalm 61). People get busy at the beginning of the year setting goals and writing their vision and projections for the coming months. How would life be if we stopped for a moment and thought about our spiritual goals? Putting God first reaps rewards that will blow anything the flesh can achieve out of the water. It starts, like everything, with small steps.

First, make reading your Bible a priority every day. Even if it's only five minutes daily - seek the Lord Jesus and spend time with Him. Ask the Holy Spirit to speak to you from the Word of God. Look up the Scriptures referenced here and sign up to a daily Spirit-filled devotional from ministries like Angus Buchan, Derek Prince, or UCB Ireland's 'Word For Today' to help. Secondly, pray about everything. Things that stress us will turn out very differently if we pray instead of worrying. "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7). Bringing the Lord Jesus into our daily lives lifts off the burden to know all the answers, for they are no problem to Him at all! "Come to Me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).
