





#### GO ON JOE – UP KERRY

When Joe O'Connor passed away in August 2018 it cast a shadow of gloom over the Parish of Farran/Ovens and his native Brosna in North

Joe was a great character, larger than life and endearing to all his acquaintances. Though living at Aglish Farran for the major part of his life he never forgot his Kerry roots and always quietly supported the Green and Gold. His employment as a Psychiatric Nurse brought him to his employer The Southern Health Board at Our Lady's Hospital at Shanakiel Cork where he was deeply involved in their GAA Club both as a player and mentor.

With his dear wife Margaret and family T.J. and Deirdre he settled in easily amongst his adopted neighbours. Being a man of many talents he was always ready to give a helping hand and the Magnificent Marina Shrine at Farran church is testament to his many abilities. Before long he was involved in the Éire Óg GAA Club, again both as a player and mentor and played a huge part in the development of the younger players, being a vital cog in their many triumphs.

His training sessions were always enjoyable and his famous phrases are oft times repeated. These included "kick the high balls in low" and "lads, will ye pair off in 3's around the field". He was always at hand to treat any injured players with his soft hands and medical experience which complimented his famous "magic" potion. We never found out the exact mixture of his potion but we had a strong suspicion that Joe may have added a large portion of poteen to the mixture.

Being a loyal supporter of Kerry football his initial duty each year was to purchase the famous match

tickets for the Green and Gold itinerary and he travelled the length and breadth of the country with his beloved brother Mike and his many other Kerry friends.

Joe was a regular attendee at the weekly traditional entertainment sessions at the local Farran Well pub where he danced the night away with Polka sets and Kerry Slides. Being a man of the people he was always happy to help out in any situation and spent many hours at the Éire Óg Club carrying out repairs and improvements including the refurbishment of the Club bar as well as preparing the pitches for upcoming games.

The idea of an Annual Football challenge in his honour was first mooted when his many friends from Brosna crossed the County bounds to pay their final respects to our own Laochra Gael. This finally came to pass recently on Saturday February 10th and a fine crowd witnessed an exciting game of competitive Adult Football between Brosna and Éire Óg. Well refereed by Ted Hayes and his officials, it ended in a narrow victory for the hosts on the scoreline of 1-10 to 0-11. The Man of the Match Award went to the very impressive Adam Barry who gave a great display at centre forward for the Brosna side. The Joe O'Connor Trophy was presented by his wife Margaret to the winning captain Brian Hurley. Afterwards players, mentors, and supporters joined the O'Connor family for refreshments in the Club Pavilion and the musical entertainment concluded a very successful day. The Éire Óg boys will make the return trip over the border in 2025 and this is eagerly awaited.

One abiding memory of our farewell to Joe is of the funeral cortege leaving his home at Aglish on that beautiful August afternoon in 2018. As the hearse moved slowly down the roadway his brother Mike gave a strong thump on the roof and exclaimed " Go on Joe - Up Kerry" - Ní Bheigh A Leithead Ann Arís Go Deó. By PO'C

### New Cup named after 1930's Farming Leader

The Munster Agricultural Society, which has the distinction of being a nominating body for the Seanad, recently launched a new silver cup. This cup is named after a well-known national farming leader from the 1930s, who was based in mid Cork. The Patrick J. Manley Perpetual Cup honours the achievements of 'Packie' Joseph Manley (1905-1975), who gained national recognition in his early twenties as an agricultural organiser, and served as a member of the national executive of the Farmers' Party (which became defunct during that decade). Manley actively participated in and established numerous local and national committees and boards related to farmers. He was a well-known mediator and lobbyist who frequently facilitated fruitful communications involving representative bodies and the government. As the head of the Cork Farmers' Union, which was connected to the Irish

Farmers' Union, he performed a crucial part in the farmers' guerrilla campaign during the 1930s. This campaign was driven by opposition to annuities, widespread bankruptcy, farm repossessions, and severe economic circumstances. Historian Tim Pat Coogan has pointed out that this campaign was particularly intense in County Cork. In 1934, Manley was abducted prior to his scheduled appearance before a military tribunal in Dublin. Now, nearly a century after his peak in political activism and agricultural importance, this newly crafted silver cup will honour his legacy.

Manley was a strong proponent of agrarianism and actively contributed to numerous farming and dairying magazines and journals. Additionally, he was the father of Rena Manley, a highly esteemed camogie player for the Munster team. Rena gained national admiration in the 1960s for her exceptional individual talent. Later on, Rena resided in a historic property on a vast farm in East Cork. Interestingly, she formed a friendship with Angela Lansbury, the renowned Hollywood actress, who moved to Conna in the 1970s and became her neighbour.

'Packie' has recently garnered attention in the field of agricultural heritage. He was a younger cousin and neighbour of Timothy Manley, a prominent leader of a War of Independence internee group and later a South Cork Fine Gael TD. Despite being a teenager during the War of Independence, Packie was apprehended by the 'Black and Tans' while returning home from rugby training in Cork City. They mistakenly believed he was an older IRA 'spy' and detained him in a prison cell for four days. It is worth noting that Packie had achieved the distinction of winning the Schools' Senior Cup with CBC Cork around 1920.

### MACROOM HISTORY GROUP (MHG) ACTIVITIES Con Lynch Talk on St. Gobnait, 12 February, 2024,

Stand: MHG took a stand at Macroom Lions 'Meetthe-Clubs' Day at the 2024 event, together with about sixty other clubs and organisation. This is as very worthy project and there was great activity and a super buzz in the Sports Complex.

The MHG stand exhibited historic photos, items and literature and activities of the Group over the last two years. Much effort was needed in collecting material and erecting the stand. Paul Lynch's (McEgan School) display board was immensely helpful. Margaret Lucey and Douglas Kidd erected and decorated the board and display unit. Other members who helped were Pat Sheehy, Seosamh Ó Críodáin, Jerry Kelleher, MicfWalsh and Con Kelleher. Most interest was taken in old photos such as those of Macroom anglers, Macroom pantomime performers and the burning of Macroom Castle. Would that it were still intact! Attractive items were a bottle bottom with the print of Abraham Morriss, Hanover Hall, nemesis and possible killer of Art Ó Laoghaire and a rifle that replicated one used in the American Civil War. Guns and violence are intrinsic parts of Irish and Macroom's History. Also available were minute books from the ICA, Macroom GAA and Golf clubs, as well as records from the Macroom Pioneers. A 1911 All-Ireland medal, won by John Lynch, was on view as was his Irish War of Independence medal. A history book on Macroom Workhouse was on display as were Charlie Browne's and Stephen Brady's insightful volumes.

St Gobnait's Feast Day fell on 11 February and Ballyvourney celebrated it in style with lectures, masses and rounds. Pilgrims came from far and wide. Con Lynch has published a book on the topic and spoke in the Ballyvourney commemoration. He shared is insights with the MHG on the 12 February before an audience of over fifty people. His depth of knowledge and meticulous research and preparation were remarkable.

Castle Hotel, Macroom.

His talk had three parts - an introduction, a recount of her travels (or 'aistear') through Munster and her legacy. Con outlined her historical background and the time and milieu in which she existed - sixth century Ireland. He then traced her journey through Munster, from Clare through Limerick, Waterford, Kerry and Cork before settling in Ballyvourney where she found the nine white deer. There are signs of devotion to Gobnait in many places marked by wells, churches, shrines and stained-glass windows and schools. She was a remarkable woman by any standard. That she is still venerated in so many places is evidence.

For the final section, Con spoke of Gobnait's legacy which is essentially spiritual. For Gobnait, devotion and dedication to God and the Church, trust in God and acceptance of His Will were the touchstones of her faith. He also emphasised that her spiritual legacy lives on and is present and active. Considering Con's work in tracing her journey, her spirit is alive and well in Con. Following a lively questions-and-answers session, Con and his wife, Marie, met attendees, signed books and posed for photographs. His book, 'St. Gobnait' is in its second print and all profits are donated to charity.

Tea, coffee and biscuits were served and raffle prizes were won by Kathleen Murray, Claire Dineen and Jim Coonev.

Town Plan: MHG met Ms Karen Lysaght, South Gate Consultants, who is drawing up a Macroom Town Plan. Knowledgeable of the history and geography of the town and area, she is very keen to make the town centre a community area, where people can stop, chat and 'pass the time'. In a way she wants to look back, recapture the good things of the past and, by using them judiciously, make the town better for all in the future. The town is steeped in history and has accounts of the The McCarthys, Bishop McEgan, Malachy Duggan, William Penn, The Famine and Workhouse, TC Murray's works, The War of Independence/Kilmichael Ambush, Kilgobnet Killings and so on. This omits the social history of the town - cinema, pubs, card-playing, dancing, ICA, pantomimes which are another treasure chest of knowledge. There is so much history about the town. Some of Karen's ideas are very ambitious and there seems to be money available to realise them.

Hopefully people will see the greater good of the area, and keep in mind the overall welfare and future of the town.

## Think Globally, Act locally

Hi! Chris Barrett back here with you.

Today I have the pleasure of speaking with my friend Majella O'Riordan who is a Herbalist and Holistic therapist from Dandelion Health, and is also the mother of two young children.

Majella reminds me that we are all part of nature even though so many of us lose that full understanding which was so integral to us when we were younger. Young children are so open to and totally feel part of the natural world. For many of us who have moved so far away from a child's simple relationship with nature, it is really vital that we do not diminish our children's relationship with nature by trying to get them to see it through jaded adult eyes.

Someone walking with her very young daughter

saw the daughter pick an ivy leaf.
Daughter: Why is it growing on the tree?
Mother: It's protecting the tree.
Ivy is good for grief.

Daughter: What is grief? Mother: It is sadness.

Daughter: I think I'll keep it. I know a boy who is sad at school and misses his mammy.

This interaction reminds me that it is all too easy to overlook children's relationships with nature and how our children are totally in touch with nature.

As you crouch down close to the earth with a child, away from the demands of work and the phone, you are helped back to being grounded.

A child's contact with nature is intuitive and Majella feels that they can absorb a huge amount of knowledge without being painstakingly taught the names of plants, for example.

To this end she is working with a friend to see if they can put together a group of three Saturdays to watch and learn from their small children's (aged from about 3-10 years), responses to nature.

Saturday 1 would involve a little walk where the children would be shown an easily identifiable plant such as a dandelion or nettle ,and would bring some home to create a craft, food or medicine.

Saturday 2 would take the children on a repetition of that same walk and see what they remember of what they saw previously and the follow-up.

Saturday 3 would be an opportunity for the children to lead the walk and for everyone to see and appreciate how it evolves.

Obviously, it really hopes to know your child well and to make these times in nature as appropriate for them and their age as possible.

Majella gives talks to sdults as part of The Good Lives Project and participants are asked to remember two things from a talk that matter to them, so that might be something to emulate.

Games where 5 or 6 natural items are looked at before being hidden under a blanket to be remembered, is a fun game at this level and it could, for example, be taken a stage further by asking the child to find and match the same item in the garden.

Children are not naturally afrraid of soil on their hands and are happy to feel the difference between a dry and mushy touch.

Their energy is close to the ground and it is good to let them take their socks and shoes off when the weather allows so they can feel it more fully.

Majella has planted seeds, garlic and bulbs with her children so that they can be more closely involved with the miracle of growth.

Children are naturally perceptive if given the time and when Majella was at the playground with her daughter, she felt the tree with her small hands and noticed that it was peeling.

When she wanted to give the tree a hug, that was encouraged, not at all found to be a bit strange as some of us sadly feel when we get older.

This natural desire is untaught behaviour and reminds us that a love and connection with nature is within us all.

When enjoying nature with children, Majella feels it is important not to be too preachy. We get so much information from screens and phones that we can get very disconnected from nature.

It is essential to share outdoor time completely, when a child is open to nature, and turn off phones so as not to allow distraction etc.

Nature offers a space of solace if things are hard, and an early experince in nature teaches self-calming.

Just recently the children's father took the kids on an organised treasure hunt in St. Gobnait's wood where they looked for 9 white deer.

Everyone benefited! It was a bit wet and it was good to be reminded that the kids don't feel the rain like we do.

They don't get stressed by what we consider to be bad weather.

They can be outside in all weathers. There is no bad weather say the Scandinavians...just bad clothes! Gardening, like walking, allows families to be together to plant herbs and flowers and learn what is good to eat. Children have a natural intuition regarding nature which can be lessened by adult fears.

The truth children remind us of, if given the chance, is that nature is simple. It is vitally important for everyone's health in so many ways. To go back to

the nettle. It is full of iron and it can be seen to change with the passage of the year, growing big enough soon for the tips to be used as a really useful, blood strengthening, green vegetable in a short while

When plants are identified early, children get to understand their potential and get to know which can be unsafe. They learn that some plants will give us tea.e.g mint leaves. Majella reminds me that blackcurrent leaves have more antioxidants than green tea albeit with rather less marketing.

Once outside all senses can be involved. Listening to a bird and see if it sounds like one heard before, or looking at the length of a bird's tail or flight is good for everyone.

When working with the ETB Majella was told that her students admitted to buying nettle tea when they had it in the garden. Our children have not been blinkered by this sort of learning and still see nature from the ground up whereas we tend to look down on it.

Above all when involving ourselves and our children in nature Majella believes in the importance of remaining positive. We have the opportunity to empower our children to be somewhere really special.

Nature provides a playground which we cannot build. Encouraging children to find their own special place/house within a garden, where they can relax and use their imagination is a real gift to them

A child's energy is special. It is also special for adults to remember their own childhood and being able to tap into the freedom and enless space of a child's imagination is something we would do well to emulate, for our own mental health. So Majella feels, as do I, that we should respect our child's connection with nature and learn from it. Our task is to allow it to happen without spoiling it. Muddy hands and boots do not matter, but teaching a fear of earth by calling it 'dirt', does. Our children absorb nature through their pores by being present in it and are physically and mentally more resilient as a result.

Remember that even if you have no garden or park available you can create a green space with a pot on a balcony. Nature is everywhere if you keep your mind and soul open.

## Macroom Motors Mid Cork U21 Football Championships 2024 'A' Championship Final:

### Ballinora 3-11 Naomh Aban 0-9

Ballinora GAA made history at Ovens when their U21 footballers won the Macroom Motors Mid Cork U21 A Football championship title for the very first time ever, and did so in style. The final winning margin of eleven points is more than a little unfair on the efforts of Naomh Abán however as the Gaeltacht side had recovered well from a disastrous first half performance to cut a deficit of 1-10 to 0-4 back to a mere five points with five minutes remaining but then the new champions struck for a second goal slightly against the run of play, and added further lustre to the scoreline with another goal just before the final whistle.

Ballinora inflicted major damage in the first half. Early points from Michael and Robert Quirke got them off to a grand start and a goal from Andrew O'Sullivan in the 10th minute had them really buoyant. Shane Kingston was dominating midfield for the winners and the forwards thrived on the supply of quality ball coming in. N Abán danger man Ed Ó Mir was starved of possession and after opening his side's account with a 5th minute point was not to score again until the 22nd minute by which time Ballinora led by 1-8 to 0-2. Andrew O'Sullivan, Robert, Ivan and Michael Quirke and Kevin Werner were all on target for the winners and when Ó Mír added two more points to the N Abán tally, Ballinora matched them and so led at the break by 1-10 to 0-4. The game looked over as a contest as the Gaeltacht side were struggling.

Naomh Abán rearranged their line out at the interval and were a transformed side in the second half. After Ballinora added a point to their tally from Ivan Quirke, the fight back commenced with a point from team captain Danny Ó Ceallaigh and Ó Mír and when Jack Ó Donnchú and Ó Ceallaigh added further points the western side had momentum though Ballinora still leading by 1-11 to 0-8 in the 43rd minute. The pressure on the Ballinora defence continued with Jack Ó Donnchú driving N Abán on from midfield and Ed Ó Mír cut the deficit to five points in the 50th minute as Ballinora struggled to re-impose their earlier superiority. Naomh Abán had chances of a goal which were not availed of, and in a break up the field Ballinora struck a lethal blow when Andrew O'Sullivan got in for his second goal in the 55th minute, 2-11 to 0-9 now the score and Ballinora back on top. Cork suffered two successive opening league defeats for the first time in five years at SuperValu Páirc Uí Chaoimh, losing to Kilkenny before an attendance of 16.274.

Eight points behind after 20 minutes, Cork went ahead with 12 minutes to go but they were left to rue a hat-trick of missed goal opportunities early in the second half as a Kilkenny point in additional time proved the difference.

Blarney's Mark Coleman made his first appearance since 2022, one of a few positives for Cork who now face a challenge to avoid being demoted to Division 1B next season.

For two-thirds of the first half, Cork's play was dreadful. Kilkenny, on the other hand, were sharp and hard working. Kilkenny led by eight points by the 20th minute and were 0-13 to 0-4 ahead by the 26th minute. U16 Div 5, Macroom A 7 Leeside B 2



## Macroom Girl/Laochra Óg Player won an All-Ireland camogie medal in 2023.

'What is rare is wonderful.' Irish seanfhocail: 'An rud is annamh is iontach.'

Ava McSweeney won an All-Ireland U-16A medal with Cork in 2023. As a Macrompian, she is unique or very rare in that achievement - most probably the first female to do so. It is also a significant accomplishment for Laochra Óg Camogie and Hurling Club, founded in 2014.Macroom has produced many winners of All-Ireland football medals at all grades but rarely in hurling or camogie. (Danny O'Donoghue won an All-Ireland Vocational Schools' medal with Cork in 1971). A pupil of St Mary's School, Macroom, Ava is now in transition year. Her parents David and Ursula are both Macrompians and there is no strong history of sporting excellence on either side of the family. Thankfully, girls now play field games almost as much as boys and Ava played football and camogie and this became her beloved sport. She also plays golf. Luckily for Ava, there was a club at hand. Neither is there a strong history of hurling/camogie in Macroom - according to Paul Rouse sports historian, hurling/ camogie survived in areas that had flat land, East Galway, Tipperary, Kilkenny, Limerick, Offaly, Wexford and East Cork. Before the GAA was founded, cricket was popular in Ireland, in the same areas and for the same geographical reason.

The Laochra Óg Club (Young hero/heroine) was born ten years ago and is thriving. Unusually in this area,

the club draws players from Ballyvourney, Clondrohid, Kilnamartyra and Macroom parishes – a type of 'united nations' which in itself is great for socializing. So successful has the club been that it has a new home, essential for any club, and a beautiful newly-built pitch in Ballymacorcoran. It hopes to stage matches there in the near future. The vista from the grounds is magnificent.

Ava has, as Liam Slattery said, grown-up with the club as she began camogie at eight. With interest and dedication, she blossomed as a player. This year she was part of a Laochra Óg U-16 team that won a county league. The Cork selectors noted her abilities and picked her for the county panel. As a slight player, Ava depends on her skill and speed. At inter-county level, most girls are big and strong. Being selected is but the beginning of the story and the commitment for club, school and county is daunting. Ava enjoys it enormously and is lucky to have devoted parents and a great club to back her. Her parents drive her to matches and training.

St. Mary's currently has a strong camogie team – it won two county titles last year and Ava played. When previously successful, St. Mary's drew its players mostly from Canovee, Coachford, Aghabullogue, Cloughduv, Farnanes and other camogie-playing areas – one thinks of the Dunlea sisters and Briege Corkery. Now, Laochra Óg supplies many members of its team.

On February 11, 2024 Ava was practicing in the new grounds - her father was present and club chairperson lan Keoghan was on hand. Having provided the background, they posed for some photos. David and lan are justly proud of not only Ava's achievements but of the club's wonderful progress to date. Despite many obstacles, they and their colleagues have created a club, provided an environment and now a place where young boys and girls can socialize and develop as people and players in a healthy environment.

## CREDIT UNIONS TAKING ON THE BANKS IN THE MORTGAGE MARKET WILL HELP FUTURE HOMEBUYERS - MEP KELLEHER

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that new legislation enabling Credit Unions to more coherently take on the banks in the mortgage market will help many potential homebuyers due to the lower rates they offer.

Kelleher, Chair of the European Parliament's Credit Union Interest Group, was commenting ahead of the first phase of implementation of the 2023 Credit Union (Amendment) Act, with the second phase expected in April. This is the first piece of Credit Union specific legislation in over 12 years.

"We all know how important credit unions have been in terms of supporting families with personal, car, holiday and other loans. Now, with the enactment of this Act, we will see our credit unions be able to greatly expand their offering in terms of mortgages.

"While some Credit Unions are already offering mortgages, 1800 in 2023 were drawn down, the new

legislation will enable non-mortgage lending credit unions to refer their members to other credit unions.

"Additionally the law will allow the credit union movement to collaborate nationally on mortgages by developing and marketing a national brand and a national mortgage rate.

"This is something I very much support. As I have previously stated on many occasions, our traditional banking sector is too small. A lack of competition pushes interest rates up.

"With more and more credit unions getting into the mortgage market, it will increase competition and improve services for us all.

"The Credit Union movement is strong in Ireland. There is significant member loyalty with member unions of the Irish League of Credit Union holding over €310 million in savings alone.

"However, the ability of credit unions to issue

mortgages is still limited by Central Bank of Ireland regulations which impose a cap on lending relative to the credit union's assets.

"With the Credit Union (Amendment) Act the Department of Finance has opened new opportunities for credit unions. It is now the job of the Central Bank to step up and play its role.

"I would urge the Central Bank to review these lending limits and consider whether they are proportionate and well calibrated or whether raising these limits could stimulate more competition in the market," concluded Kelleher.

Welcome back dear student through this weekly study you are growing in wisdom. 'Wisdom is the principal thing' (Proverbs 4:7). No matter what age, in everything we do, we all need Wisdom. Wisdom, or the lack of wisdom, is a key factor in how one's life plays out. Many associate it with older generations, but that's not always the case; younger people are often far more astute than given credit for. Certainly, as we grow older we become more experienced: learning 'I won't do that again!' - for hindsight is a wonderful thing.

But what is Biblical Wisdom? "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom" (Proverbs 9:10). Really Wisdom is God's knowledge given to us through the Person of the Holy Spirit Who lives inside of every believer in Christ. So, it's like an internal antenna wired direct to God bringing discernment, understanding and intelligence that's supernatural - not from the flesh. It's the Power of God to help us navigate this life to make smart and right decisions as a result of our Creator's input.

James put it this way ".... if you need wisdom, ask our generous God, and He will give it to you. He will not rebuke you for asking. But when you ask Him, be sure that your faith is in God alone. Do not waver, for a person with divided loyalty is as unsettled as a wave of the sea that is blown and tossed by the wind. Such people should not expect to receive anything from the Lord. Their loyalty is divided between God and the world, and they are unstable in everything they do" (James 1:5-8).

Later James went on to lay out the difference between earthly, sensual wisdom and God's Wisdom.... "If you are wise and understand God's ways, prove it by living an honourable life, doing good works with the humility that comes from wisdom. But if you are bitterly jealous and there is selfish ambition in your heart, don't cover up the truth with boasting and lying. For jealousy and selfishness are not God's kind of wisdom. Such things are earthly, unspiritual, and demonic. For wherever there is jealousy and selfish ambition, there you will find disorder, and evil of every kind. But the wisdom from above is first of all pure. It is also peace loving, gentle at all times, and willing to yield to others. It is full of mercy and the fruit of good deeds. It shows no favouritism and is always sincere. And those who are peacemakers will plant seeds of peace and reap a harvest of righteousness (James 3:13-18).

Wisdom doesn't mince her words. The world's culture has sugar coated truths, Julling people into a false sense of security when they should've been alerted to the danger they're in. Perhaps this is the reason reality to shows are so popular - it's much easier to analyse, judge and mock others instead of examining oneself. God's Wisdom, which is more to be desired than gold, calls out to each of us daily — 'alerting the inexperienced and those easily misled to seek common sense and prudence, warning those who are closed-minded (self-confident fools) to seek the insight and self-discipline that leads to godly living' - "...for I speak the Truth and detest every kind of deception. My advice is wholesome. There is nothing devious or crooked in it. My Words are plain to anyone with understanding, clear to those with knowledge. Choose My instruction rather than silver, and knowledge rather than pure gold. For Wisdom is far more valuable than rubies. Nothing you desire can compare with it" (Proverbs 8:1-11; Proverbs 3:13-26).
