



The following day we went to Shakespeare's Globe, Chinatown, Leister Square, the Science Museum and went on a Jack the Ripper tour around London. While staying in Pax Lodge we met some of the

other guests who were from the US and they told us about Girl Scouts in America. The volunteers in Pax Lodge were from Australia and Ghana. I really liked Pax Lodge as it was quite homey and was very welcoming."

In the coming months other members of Ardilaun Guides will be taking part in further international trips as part of national contingents. The Guide age range is from 10-14 years. Camping, indoor weekends, outdoor activities and international travel are all part of the Guiding experience for this age bracket.



It's great to see that the new GP surgery in Coachford is now operating at its new premises, however its forced relocation from the village centre to the eastern end of the village means that anyone who needs to walk to the surgery is walking on an unprotected road without a footpath for over 200 meters and without a pedestrian crossing in an extremely busy and fast section of the road.

This section of our expanding village is another area that needs urgent action before someone gets

When Cork County Council was asked to look at extending the footpath they claimed that they had insufficient funding and this safety measure was not a priority for them.

#### Over 70 homes planned for Coachford village

Two planning applications have been lodged for two housing schemes for the centre of coachford Village. Cork County Council are looking to fast track 26 homes at a site on the Mallow Rd. The council owned site just north of the village has remained empty for over 20 years. The development apparently does not require an Environmental Impact Assessment which is puzzling considering the amount of flooding that Coachford suffers each year and this development will surely add to this issue. The new housing estate, if approved, will consist of 10 two bedroom houses, 10 one bedroom apartments and 6 three bedroom houses. According to Cork County Council a footpath to the village is also going to be installed but where that footpath is going to end remains unclear and if it will involve installing a pedestrian crossing to link it to the other footpaths and services is unknown.

TFT Construction have resubmitted a revised planning application for 46 homes of various sizes at their site opposite the Garda Station. The site is of major ecological value and is a vital element in slowing down the flow of water to the village from the surrounding hills so whatever development is approved for here will need to be considerate of all these issues.

#### **Good Friday Village Clean Up**

Well done to all the volunteers and Coachford Tidy Towns who took part in the An Taisce Spring Clean on Good Friday. Bags and Bags of rubbish were collected by people who got out and cleaned up all around their own areas and dropped the overflowing bags to the Coachford Post Office where they will be collected by Cork County Council. The recycling bins were also given a through clean and are now spick and span.

Coachford AFC have launched the details of their Golf Classic in May. This major event for the club is being organised to raise funds towards developing an all-weather training and playing area at their grounds at The Glebe, Coachford. This is a major new development for the club and the wider community.





#### The power of powerlessness

At one of our recent events a member was being congratulated on her new car. I had to look at its back to see the model. It was a Toyota Corolla, and it has little resemblance to the second generation E20 model the first corolla model to be sold in Ireland following Toyota Ireland being set up here in 1973. My thoughts went back those fifty-one years to that day when I had first sat in one.

Most of my siblings had gone to third level education. My school report of summer 1973, the year before my leaving certificate, wasn't too complementary of my application to work. I heard little enough but the powers that be, diagnosed that the mixed day school was a problem and a boys' boarding school was the solution. There was talk of a school in Mullingar, but for reasons unknown to me it soon was decided that I was to go instead to De la Salle, Dundalk. My sister was teaching in a convent school there, we would rent together in between the schools and the hunker sliding would somehow be brought under control.

It was a great thing for us both that my sister met her future husband that year. I spent some weekends in Dundalk but on occasion my suggestion that I could go to Dublin to another sister proved to be acceptable. So, one very cold Saturday morning I found myself thumbing, carefully fine-tuning that action to be seeking yet not aggressive. Nonetheless I was stuck for a long time on the road somewhere outside Dunleer. Eventually, as I got into that first Corolla, I couldn't determine a difference between legs and ground. I couldn't talk. So off we sped in silence. Soon I came to, and recognised the man, a man with high national profile, a frequent guest on the Late Late Show, and in a position of high authority. Outside Julianstown there was another chap thumbing. I felt deep gratitude for my comfort as we sped by. But then to ruin it a pang of guilt. About a half a mile on I spoke my first coherence, 'it's awful cold out there'. No comment. After a further half mile or so my driver made a U-turn, went back,

and picked up that hitch-hiker. I was at the time a shy sixteen-year-old who had little or no self-confidence. I understood that driver had already done his good deed, I had no right to ask. Had that hitch- hiker been just a mile from where I was picked up, I don't think I would have ventured to say anything. I would have been feeling pain and those in pain can find it difficult to see the plight of others. But that bit later and it was a recent yet past experience of the coldness that I had felt. I could empathise.

On reflection, I think I may have learned a lesson that day. Sometimes, indeed most times, we feel powerless to have any impact on the difficulties others face in this world. Yet those of us who have many years behind us do have some experience of pain and suffering and some of you have had much. We may not have the resources, power, or capacity, nor are we the decision makers. Yet it can be what we have not, others may have. We can always speak up, and that may just prompt someone who is able to act. It is good for us too, at any age, not to give in to powerlessness and to maintain hope and faith in others.



#### WEST CORK HISTORY SOCIETIES ASSOCIATION - FOUNDED 2024

"History is who we are and why we are the way we are". David McCollough, American historian.

The West Cork History Societies Association (WCHSA) was founded on 24 February 2024 in Dunmanway. William Casey is chairperson and he has four committee members to help him. The Association arose to promote, collectively, the research, recording and publication of West Cork's history.

West Cork is steeped in history – to mention but a few events: the Battle of Kinsale (1601), O'Sullivan Bere's March, to the French Expedition in 1798 - destined for Bantry which led to the elevation of Richard White to become Earl of Bantry, to the events of the Famine (1845-52). Skibbereen's recorded history of the time is beautifully narrated in its Heritage Centre. Parnell had support from the 'Bantry Gang' - Tim Healy and others. William Martin Murphy, owner of the Irish Independent and leader of the employers in the famous/infamous Dublin Lockout (1913). West Cork was an epicentre of the War of Independence and the Civil War. Incidents included ambushes at Kilmichael, Crossbarry, Lissarda, Lisacreasaigh and Béal na mBlath. West Cork produced leaders such as Michael Collins, Tom Barry, Liam Deasy, the Hales brothers, Charlie Hurley, Dick Barrett and many more. Their actions changed Ireland's history. West Cork was ravaged

by poverty and emigration through the 19th and 20th century; Philip O'Regan's recent book on Drinagh Co-Operative chronicles how West Cork fought back, survived and prospered. West Cork is unusual in the county in that it continues to have a large Protestant community that adds an essential ingredient to the area's character. Dunmanway was Sam Maguire's home but its Protestant population suffered grievously with the Bandon Valley killings. In Macroom, April/May 1922, in the Kilgobnet Incident in which the then Colonel Bernard Montgomery turned tail: with a different outcome, it may have prevented the Civil War. Four British soldiers were executed and their deaths were discussed in the House of Commons. The above events indicate the rich and diverse history of the area.

Thankfully, many groups are active within the district and include societies in Skibbereen, Castlehaven, Dunmanway, Coppeen, Clonakilty, Beara, Kinsale (2), Bandon, Rosscarbery, Kilbrittain, Kilmeen-Castleventry, Ballincollig and Macroom and were represented at the meeting. Other places have flourishing groups and hopefully they will soon join the WCHSA.

The purpose of the group is to preserve and record the history of West Cork and to make it available to

everyone. As cited above, David McCollough, the U.S. historian, once said: "History is who we are and why we are the way we are". The WCHSA hopes to address that task on a regional basis. If the adage of 'two heads are better than one' is true, what can fifteen, twenty or more achieve? Like-minded members can meet, discuss and exchange ideas and bring back suggestions to their own groups. Societies will still be entirely independent. As well as exchanging knowledge and experiences, collectively, West Cork will benefit from the many grants and schemes available - as the Irish saving has it - 'Ní neart go cur le chéile', translated as 'strength in unity'. Envisaged are projects such as seminars, walks and West Cork historical research. Membership for each society is €30.



## St. Therese Of Lisieux

2nd January 1873 - 30th September 1897

#### Marie - Francoise - Therese Martin was born in Alencon, France on January 2nd 1873.

She was the youngest of nine children born to Louis Martin and Zelic Gurin .she moved with her family to Lisieux in 1877.

Therese entered the Carmelite convent, Lisieux, at the age of fifteen. Therese had plans to travel to the missions in Africa or China, but ill health curtailed these plans. At the young age of twenty four, Therese died from the effects of tuberculosis. The impact of her short autobiography "the story of a soul" was tremendous and it revealed her deep spirituality. It was printed and distributed a year after her death and she rapidly became one of the popular Saints of the twentieth century. Therese was canonised on May 17th 1925 by Pope Pius XI. Her feast day is celebrated in 1st of In 1977 Pope John Paul II declared St. Therese of Lisieux a doctor of the church.

18th October 2015 Therese's parents Saint Louis and Zelie Martin were canonised by Pope Francis. St.Therese is the patron saint of the missions.

## Think Globally, Act locally - The town's Best-kept Secret

The town's Best-kept Secret Hi! Chris Barrett here again! Today I have the pleasure of speaking with Tony and Kristen Miller who have been involved with Macroom Country Market for a number of years. I would also like to mention Catherine Sheehan and Jutta Zahl who have both been involved with the Country Market in Macroom for about thirty years from the time it started, and are still members who are trading there. They have seen more than 80 people, from around the local area, come and go during that time; but the basic ethos of the Market has remained unchanged. If a market could welcome you with a smile on its face this would be what it would look like. It is a small friendly indoor market, something which has proved invaluable as it continues to provide a warm welcome-even in heavy rain! The members, who produce goods for sale, come from a radius around Macroom. For them, as well as their customers, the Tuesday market is a very important day of the week. Everything is home-produced with very little packaging, and recycling is encouraged as much as possible, with no resold goods. From March to December the Market runs every Tuesday in the GAA hall from 11.15 to 1.15. The Country Market will also sell you a token for 1euro which will allow you to park for the day at half price. Country Markets are a countrywide organisation with markets in many towns in Ireland. They have been going since the 1940s. If you would like to join as a seller, there is an initial membership fee of thirty euro and twenty five euro payable annually after that.

This is payable to the head office of the Country Market Association for insurance and accounting. This works out cheaper for sellers than most local Farmers Markets. In addition there is a tradition where new members are very much welcomed and supported and it is a very social group to join. Macroom Country Market is run collectively and members share duties between them. There is one checkout and a payment is made monthly to each member. In one competition against other Country Markets, showing off best produce, Macroom Country Markets were runners up in the final. Displays are always done with care and pride for appreciative customers and the Macroom Country Market has also taken part in the St.Patrick's Day Parade. Produce for sale, currently includes fresh chemical-free seasonal vegetables, sweet and savory baking either to take away or to eat in the cafe area or at tables outside. The delicious baking includes full cakes and slices, with gluten-free and sugar free options and everything is made in member's kitchens. Breads include sourdough and soda breads, as well as yeast and seeded breads. Savoury treats can include pasties as well as pizzas and quiche which can be purchased whole or by the slice. After choosing from fresh eggs, jams and chutneys to take away, customers can relax with their friends over home-made vegan soup, teas, coffees and irresistible cakes. Vegetable seedlings and bedding plants are available seasonally, as well as varied and unusual plants and shrubs for the garden. Crafts such as home-made cards often

depicting the local area, knitting including Fairisle and colourful jumpers hats and scarves sometimes made with homespun alpaca wool and sheep fleece are available. Ceramics include hand-built and wheel-thrown items including mugs, bowls and wallplaques. These are bespoke items which make great gifts and start with a very affordable price range. One-off paintings, painted stones and other art and craftwork is also available. The market creates an inclusive, very friendly atmosphere where it is possible to meet new people, as well as catch up with old friends. Everyone is made to feel welcome and potential new sellers can call in on a Tuesday morning, have a look at what is going on, and discuss their ideas with other members. Who knows? They could decide to become involved with a very special historical enterprise, and become part of a very special gem in Macroom. I would very much like to thank Tony and Kristen for speaking with me, and all those sellers and customers who have made the Country Market such a long standing success for Macroom. #### **PUBLIC HOLIDAYS**

#### Q. As an employee, what are my entitlements in relation to Public Holidays?

Most employees are entitled to paid leave on public holidays. There is an exception for certain parttime employees. If you qualify for public holiday benefit, you are entitled to one of the following:

- · A paid day off on the public holiday
- An additional day of annual leave
- An additional day's pay
- A paid day off within a month of the public holiday

You can ask your employer at least 21 days before a public holiday, which of the alternatives will apply. If your employer does not respond at least 14 days before the public holiday, you are entitled to take the actual public holiday as a paid day off.

#### Q. As a part-time worker, what is my entitlement to in relation to Public Holidays?

If you work for your employer for at least 40 hours in the 5 weeks before the public holiday and it falls on a day you normally work, you get paid for the day even if you don't work. If you have to work that day, you are entitled to an extra day's pay.

If you don't normally work on a certain day but it's a public holiday, you should get paid one-fifth of your weekly pay. Even if you never work on public holidays, you still get paid a fifth of your weekly pay as compensation for the public holiday. Again, you must have worked for your employer for at least 40 hours in the 5 weeks before the public holiday.

You can count time spent on annual leave as 'time worked' when calculating the 40 hours worked in the 5 weeks before the public holiday.

#### Q. What is my entitlement if the public holidays falls on a weekend?

When a public holiday falls on a day which is not a 'normal working day' for that business (for example, on Saturday or Sunday), you are still entitled to benefit for that public holiday.

For example, you may get an extra day of annual leave, or an additional days pay, or a paid day off within a month of the public holiday. However, you do not have any automatic legal entitlement to have the next working day off work.

#### Q. Is Good Friday a public holiday?

Good Friday is not a public holiday. While some schools and businesses close on that day, you have no automatic entitlement to time off work on that day.

#### Q. How is the date of Easter Monday set each year?

Easter Monday is the only public holiday that can vary significantly from year to year. The date of Easter moves every year. Easter should be the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after 21 March. This means the earliest possible date for Easter Sunday in any year is 22 March, and the latest is 25 April. Easter Monday falls on 1 April 2024 and 21 April 2025.

#### Q. What are my rights if I am on sick leave on a public holiday?

If you work full-time and you are on sick leave during a public holiday, you are entitled to benefit for the public holiday you missed. Your employer can also choose to regard you as not on sick leave on the public holiday and pay you as normal for the public holiday. If this is the case, the public holiday is not counted as a sick leave day. If you are a part-time worker and you are on sick leave during a public holiday, you are entitled to benefit for the public holiday, once you worked for your employer for at least 40 hours in the previous five-week period.

However, there are some exceptions. You are not entitled to pay or time off for the public holiday if you are on sick leave immediately before the public holiday, and either of the following apply:


- You have been off work for more than 26 weeks due to an ordinary illness or an accident
- You have been off work for more than 52 weeks due to an occupational accidentQ. What can I do if I am not getting my public holiday entitlement?

If you are not getting your public holiday entitlement, you should discuss this with your employer. You can also complain to the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) under the Organisation of Working Time Act. You must make your complaint using the WRC's online complaint form within 6 months of the dispute or complaint occurring. This time limit may be extended for a further 6 months, but only where there is a reasonable cause which prevented you from bringing the complaint within the normal time limit. You should contact your local Citizens Information Centre for information and assistance re making a complaint to the WRC and the WRC Adjudication process.

If you need further information about any of the issues raised here or you have other questions, you can call a member of the local Citizens Information Service in West Cork on 0818 07 8390. They will be happy to assist you and if necessary arrange an appointment for you.


"The Lord God is my Strength [my source of courage, my invincible army]; He has made my feet [steady and sure] like hinds' feet and makes me walk [forward with spiritual confidence] on my high places [of challenge and responsibility]" (Habakkuk 3:19 Amplified Bible).

Welcome back dear student, last week we saw how Jesus, the Lord of Hosts is strong, mighty, and invincible in battle (Psalm 24:8). On studying the word 'invincible' in the Bible, God's title 'The Lord of Hosts' is translated: Invincible Warrior or Champion. At various stages in life people feel invincible, especially the young. It's great to live unafraid and feel you can accomplish anything, but sometimes feeling invincible can foster reckless behaviour ending in catastrophe. Life is fragile and everything can change in a moment. Self-reliance as promoted by gurus - that universal (god) power is within yourself is untrue and will never sustain long term. It wrecks a person's confidence in a crisis to find that they were not invincible after all. And when confidence is lost, strength to fight is gone. Therefore, faith must be fed constantly (Romans 10:17). This is why we need to know our Champion - our Advocate, and Mighty Warrior - the Lord of Heaven's Armies and His promises. What a great comfort to know that Jesus has your back instead of having to rely on your own power! We all make mistakes – we are human beings, and God knows all our insecurities and our weaknesses. Yet flaws are not what He focuses on, for His ways are higher than ours. His unbreakable Covenant of Love has been paid for in full with the Blood of His Son Jesus. The Lord is your greatest Cheerleader. Knowing that Jesus is for you and not against you, that He has forgiven you, calls you His friend and that He is backing you, gives one confidence to keep going and not give in to sin, fear, or the threats of the enemy. It's a confidence that will not be shaken, though everything around may be shaking (Hebrews 10:35; Hebrews 12:27) Because of the strong foundation built upon the Love of Jesus Christ you will be able to stand firm in the midst of every storm. People talk about angelic protection: angels are often wrongly depicted as whimsical

fairylike creatures. Jesus is called the Angel of the Lord in the Old Testament - note the capital 'A' (Exodus 20:20-22; Daniel 3:28). He is nothing like a fairy! Jeremiah saw the Lord standing with him when he was struggling... "but the Lord stands beside me like a Mighty (Fierce) Warrior, before Him my persecutors will stumble. They cannot defeat me. They will fall and be thoroughly humiliated. Their dishonour will never be forgotten" (Jeremiah 20:11). The Lord always shows up for His people! He fights the battle whilst making our enemies fall (Exodus 14:13-31). Read about Moses, Gideon, David, Jehosophat, Esther, Daniel, Nehemiah just to name a few. All cried out to God for help, believing that God's supernatural Power was the only answer, acknowledging, in humility that in themselves, they had zero power to defeat their enemies (2 Chronicles 20:10-17; Psalm 60:12). Conversely, there are also plenty of examples in the Bible of those who felt they were un-beatable as they attacked or oppressed God's people (2) Kings 6:14-23). But they soon found out the Truth. The Lord of Hosts watches over those whose hearts are His, and He defends them (2nd Chronicles 16:9). And it's no weakling that causes our enemies to fall - it's the Invincible Warrior Himself - Jesus Christ - He Who "is the same yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). Hallelujah!

U21 Football has already been concluded, U21 Hurling provisional last weekend of October and have a straight knockout.

Remembering the 1890s

A recent commemorative event in Dublin had special significance for two Mid Cork clubs, Aghabullogue and Clondrohid, each of them represented at the ceremonies

Clonturk Park in Drumcondra in Dublin, was the venue for the All-Ireland finals in both hurling and football for 1890, 1891, 1892, and 1894 was marked by the unveiling of a Dublin City Council commemorative plaque recently by Lord Mayor of Dublin Daithí De Róiste and Uachtarán CLG Jarlath Burns.

The matches included landmark occasions such as Cork's first All-Ireland championships in hurling and football, and Dublin's first football title, as well as Kerry's victory in the 1891 All-Ireland senior hurling

final.

After Clonturk Park's era as the preferred GAA venue in the city came to an end, the All-Ireland finals of the 1895 Championships were the first to be played a short distance away on Butterly's amusement grounds on Jones's Road, the venue now better known as Croke Park.

The matches were played at a time of upheaval for the fledgling GAA and in an age where the Association was in danger of fading only a decade after its foundation. It makes the significance of the Clonturk Park finals even more worthy of celebration as they represent the GAA's spirit of survival against the odds.

GAA President Jarlath Burns said: "In this the 140th anniversary of the foundation of the GAA it is wonderful to see this plaque at Clonturk Park being unveiled and with it the chance to remember and acknowledge the important contribution made by the players and officials who kept our games alive during this period and ensured they could grow and prosper. Our thanks to Dublin City Council and local residents for their support. It is good to know that the warriors who played out their own epic contests here for All-Ireland honours will be celebrated once more." Speaking at the unveiling of the commemorative plague, Lord Mayor of Dublin Daithí De Róiste said: "Clonturk Park is a site of national sporting significance, and it is also a crucial part of the Dublin GAA success story. Gaelic games in Dublin predate the formation of the GAA itself in 1884. The presence of Dublin teams in Clonturk were part of a Dublin

revival. And while it was common for Dublin teams of this time to be comprised of many country players working in the city, the success of Dublin teams fed the expansion of the GAA in the city and later the new suburbs that rose up in the early decades of independence. I wish to commend the GAA with more than 90 clubs in Dublin today. This presence owes much to the inspiration that can be traced back to the players at Clonturk Park."

The decision to erect the plaque was made by the Dublin City Council Commemorations & Naming Committee following an application from the GAA History & Commemorations Committee for a plaque commemorating Clonturk Park as an historic GAA venue. The plaque has been placed on the wall of the pavilion of Drumcondra F.C. in Clonturk Park.

Councillor Vincent Jackson, DCC Naming and Commemoration Committee Chairperson said: "The Commemorative Plaques Scheme allows the City to formally commemorate people who have made a significant contribution to the life of Dublin. We welcome suggestions from the public for people and events to be commemorated and full details are on the Council website."

An information panel giving more details on the games played there will follow in the coming weeks. An event to mark the staging of the 1893 All-Ireland finals in football (won by Young Ireland's of Wexford) and hurling (won by Blackrock of Cork) will take place in the Phoenix Park this July.

# MEP KELLEHER CALLS ON GROCERY RETAILERS AND CO-OPS TO ACCOMMODATE FARMERS SUFFERING DUE TO POOR WEATHER

#### - THIS IS ABOUT SURVIVING 2024 AND BEING BACK IN BUSINESS IN 2025 -

"Grocery retailers in Ireland, as well as suppliers to farmers, such as co-ops, must be more accommodating to the Irish agricultural sector in light on the ongoing bad weather which is having a serious impact on productivity," says Fianna Fáil MEP and Ireland South Candidate Billy Kelleher.

"The last number of weeks and months have been incredibly tough and stressful for Ireland's farmers. Whether it is our tillage and horticulture sectors that have been unable to plant their crops, or our dairy, sheep or suckler farms who have been unable to put their animals out on their land due to it being so wet and paying through the nose for fodder, Irish agriculture is in difficulties.

"Rainfall for the country in March was approximately 140% of the average with certain parts of the country

receiving even more rainfall. The bad weather has hampered spring operations such as planting. Farmers have been forced to keep their animals in sheds rather than putting them out to graze. This is costly for farmers who must now pay for feed rather than using the ample supply of grass in their fields.

"I am calling on our grocery retailers to be more generous with their pricing at this time. Perhaps a short-term solidarity payment can be made to affected farmers to alleviate their challenges.

"Additionally, those suppliers of Irish agriculture need to be understanding in terms of payments and prices. There's no point making a higher profit off of a farmer this year when he or she is in trouble financially if your actions might put them out of business next year. We all need to think about the long term.

"While I have no doubt the government will step in and support farmers with their own measures, I believe the sectors that rely on a productive and profitable agricultural sector, i.e. coops and retailers, have to do more to support farmers.

"This is about surviving 2024, and making sure all of our farmers are still in business for 2025. It's in everyone's interests for that to happen," concluded Kelleher.




