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



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Credit Unions focus on sustainable futures

macroom credit union of friendly face

A group of six Credit Unions in Cork recently launched a Green Loan product to help members with home energy efficiency improvements.

The credit union Green Loan product was officially launched by Kieran McCarthy, Civil Engineer, Co Presenter of RTE Cheap Irish Homes and owner of KMC Homes based in Cork, at an event in Rochestown Park Hotel on Tuesday 9th April. Also in attendance, Mary O' Sullivan from the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) who spoke about the range of grants available.

The Credit Unions involved in the scheme are Macroom, Cathedral, Our Lady Crowned (Mayfield), Gurranabraher, Blackpool and Farranree. They represent a membership of 57,140 in the Cork and county area. They are offering a dedicated green loan rate of 6.5%* for loans.

Speaking about the product, Seamus Hogan, CEO of Macroom Credit Union, said,

"We are delighted to be in a position to offer a green loan product to our members. With the increased focus on environmental issues and the need to reduce energy consumption, we feel that this is an ideal time to launch this product".

The Credit Union Green Loan product will work with members who are eligible for a SEAI grant and help with the costs while the home energy work is being undertaken. Home Improvement works can include all types of attic insulation, solar panels, external and internal insulation, or installation of heat pump systems, etc. The minimum loan value is €5,000, and repayments can be arranged to suit the member's needs.

Kieran McCarthy added, "It's great to see a finance option like this available in Cork. Whether you are opting for Solar PV or a whole deep retrofit of your home, it is likely that even with all the SEAI Grants available today, you may still need additional finance, and that is where a Credit Union Green Loan can come in. They can step in to meet the bridging costs while the work is undertaken and can also support any remedial work that may be needed. This longterm investment in your home can help lower energy bills and create a healthier living environment for all". The green loan product is offered over a 10-year term and can be repaid earlier if the member wishes. All eligible loans are covered by Loan Protection Insurance cover at no additional cost. All works must be completed by a SEAI registered contractor if grant aid is available.

Josephine Maguire, Sustainable Energy Finance Programme Manager at SEAI stated;

"SEAI are always pleased to see more advantageous financial products being offered to consumers to help them upgrade the energy efficiency of their homes and meet Government climate targets."

Mr Hogan added, "We are happy to partner with SEAI to support the delivery of home energy upgrades for our members. We would encourage any members considering some home improvement work to talk to SEAI initially and find out what steps they need to take.

On April 22nd five of our volunteers attended an event in Cork County Hall to celebrate the 125th Anniversary of Cork Co. Co. The Minister for Finance, as well as Simon Coveney were among the speakers. The four weeks of Macroom Spring Clean ended last Saturday, we would like to thank everyone that attended over the month, it was very much appreciated.

The Cork County Council Anti-Litter Competition is back again this year. The first judging period is taking place from May 13th to May 22nd, second judging period is taking place from May 27th to June 5th, with the third and final judging period taking place from June 10th to June 19th. During the judging, selected stretches on the main streets, lane ways and square will all be checked, the focus being on litter. The number of pieces of litter found will be counted and marks will be lost accordingly. On each of the three judging periods, one estate will be selected for judging. The estates to be judged this year are Lios Na Fea, Sullane Weirs and Oakwood. These estates will be notified in advance as to when they will be judged so they can ensure that their area will be litter free when the judges arrive.

The Tidy Towns manage the cutting of approximately 15 acres of grass in the town's environs with three volunteers and this can be very challenging to reach all the allocated areas within a certain time frame. The machine used for the estate cutting is getting



older and more expensive to maintain and in the next while it will eventually give up, and at some stage it will fall on the residents to cut the green areas themselves or pay a contractor to do so as some estates already do. The Council themselves cut the picnic area in Coolcower, Hartnetts Cross, and the road edges on the Millstreet Road and Killarney Road, though not as regularly as years ago, partly to aid biodiversity and help pollinators. Thinking Old

I can't really blame Simon Harris. Let's face it, with politics the way politics is, it won't be long until there will be enough blaming him. Nonetheless, for a little while I wasn't thinking straight, and I felt like blaming him. You see, I had the crazy thought, and thankfully a brief thought, that I was old. But then I caught myself on and gave myself a good stern questioning, the outcome of which is that sure enough I am not old at all. The root of my problem was that Simon, and no fault to him as he hadn't much part in the decision making, was born after and is therefore younger than my youngest child. When the leader of your country is younger that your youngest it is possible to fall into the trap of thinking as I did. But there is another solution, which I also find hard to accept, and that is that my son is no longer young. But it is now easy for me to see the most logical solution. No, a thirty-seven year old is not young while at the same time, no, a sixty-seven year old is not old. So, all is good!

But is it? Active Retirement Ireland has said in a report recently published, that one thing covid has clearly shown is that ageism is rife in Ireland. I must admit, I hadn't embraced that on reading the report. I supposed that most 'isms' are alive and well in most countries. But ageism rife? That wasn't apparent to me. But my initial reaction to Simon's accomplishment, the feeling it generated was clearly not logical. So, I wanted to analyse what produced that reaction. Could it be a taking on board of an assumed societal attitude, an imposition onto myself of what I considered my society tells us. Ageism refers to the stereotypes (how we think), prejudice (how we feel) and discrimination (how we act) towards others or oneself based on age. Nobody made me feel as I did. I imposed that on myself. So, I must admit, for a little while there, I was indeed ageist. I confess, and I hope to avoid such stereotypical thinking in the future, and I will need your help with that. I think it is important to do so. It is clearly inappropriate for those of us who have accumulated much experience of life to attribute the blame for ageism to others while we are ageist ourselves. I would like my children, grandchildren, and Simon to live in a world free from ageism when they approach the then life expectancy. The people that can do most about that is not Simon and crew, but we, here now. So, let's make a world that when we are reaching our hundredth birthday and we want to celebrate by,

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

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Think Globally, Act locally - RETURN of THE BRIERY GAP

Hi! Chris Barrett back with you. Today I have the great pleasure of speaking with Mike Ryan, the new Artistic Director of the Briery Gap Cultural Centre, Macroom.

My initial question was regarding his background, and what led him to take on the role of Artistic Director. He replied that "I grew up in a rural part of Tipperary, and I don't come from a very artistic family, but despite that I've still been involved in the arts since I was old enough to hold a tin whistle. I studied Music and English at UCC, which is where I became very involved in Theatre. Since then I've worked as a script reader for the Abbey Theatre, and as Artist Liaison for Cork Midsummer Festival, along with writing, directing, and occasionally performing in my own projects. I think I was drawn to the role because of my very varied artistic background, and because I think that the new Briery Gap has almost unlimited potential when it comes to engaging with and supporting local community projects, as well as bringing exciting artists, events, and projects from across the country to Macroom."

I then asked what was his vision for the future of the Briery Gap.

"My vision for Briery Gap is to create a space that the local community are proud to call their own, and which they are proud to welcome others into. It is my hope that Briery Gap will be a space that champions all artists, and to do that we need to not only bring great art to Macroom, but to also support the development of local and national artists in a meaningful and tangible way."

In particular I knew readers would be interested in specifically how the layout of the interior, and types and frequency of events etc would be similar to and differ from those that existed previously.

"The theatre is nearing the final stages of construction at the moment, so even I haven't seen the finished interior yet, but from what I have seen I think it's going to be one of the most beautiful, intimate spaces in the country. Our plans are to start slow this Summer with what we're calling our 'Soft Launch'. We are hoping to hold some smaller events so we can test out the facilities and hire all the necessary staff, and then build towards a proper programme launch later in the Summer. By then I would hope that we will be hosting 3-4 events per week, but that will only be sustainable if we do our job correctly and give our audiences something that they want to come and see.

I also asked what issues he envisages as Artistic

Director and if he would be willing to share a fairly typical working day with readers. "There's no such thing as a typical working day as artistic director. For a long time I was the only staff member, so I was managing every aspect of the project. A day could include meeting with artists, writing funding applications, researching fridges for the bar, drafting policy documents for the building's operations, attending networking events and arts festivals, writing job descriptions for our staffing requirements, meeting members of the board to discuss our progress, watching videos of films or plays that might appeal to our audience, negotiating with contractors or with card payment companies... the list is never ending really, but I love it, and I'm excited to get to work every single day. Thankfully we have been slowly hiring our core team, so some of that stuff has been handed over now and I can start to focus on the art itself for a bit."

It is obvious to readers that there has been a big increase in the population of Macroom and that many people have never seen the Briery Gap open. There will be increased parking issues, and changes due to the by-pass, and I wonder if these have been

"The population increase is very evident in the last few years, but I think the town itself has adapted beautifully to it. Every day I pop out for a coffee and see the town buzzing with people. Macroom is a beautiful town to spend the day in, and we hope that once the Briery Gap is open again that it will be a fantastic place to spend the evening in. Parking is of course an issue. I struggle to find parking myself most days. Hopefully along with the bypass there will also be an increase in public transport and sustainable travel options, meaning that those who can avail of public transport can leave the car at home, and parking will be more available for those who need it.

I then asked him to let readers know a bit about the hold-ups so far, and when he feels is a realistic date for the Opening.

"There will always be delays with a project so big and complicated. An arts venue has a lot of moving parts and more intricate technical requirements than most buildings. Cork Co. Council and Cumnor, the building contractors, have been doing a fantastic job to limit delays and ensure that the finished building will be one that the whole community will be proud of. I'm in frequent communication with them, and I'm hopeful that we will have our first 'soft-launch' performances some time during the summer, with a full opening some time in August or September. But it's impossible to say for certain with projects like this."

I wondered if we might be given a hint as to the expected first performance and why it has been chosen.

"I'm afraid I keep my programming plans very close to my chest. All I'll say is that I've been speaking to some incredible artists over the past 7 months, and there is no shortage of enthusiasm to perform in Ireland's newest arts venue. I think the first few acts will have to be something very, very special though, don't you? Hopefully I'll be able to pull off a few surprises at our official opening later this year." I asked Mike if he would be happy to update us later in the year and to let us know how the people of Macroom can follow the progress of The Briery Gap story, and offer their ideas and support.

"Yes, of course. Our website and social media has been very quiet while we're getting up and running, but I expect that to start to change drastically over the coming months, so people can keep an eye there for updates. I'm also very used to being stopped on the street and interrogated at this stage. I can't promise you'll get much out of me, but I love meeting our potential audience members and hearing their enthusiasm for what's to come at Briery Gap."

I am very grateful to Mike for sharing so much with readers in the Lee Valley and I know that readers want to offer him their support and encouragement as he takes on this exciting challenge.

Semi Final at Killarney Kerry 0-18 Cork 1-12

Cork lost out to Kerry in the Munster senior football championship on a scorching hot Saturday afternoon at Fitzgerald Stadium and the wait goes on for a Cork win in the Kingdom, the last back in 1995.

Cork started superbly and for most of the first half, they were the better side. They then appeared to turn defensive and allowed Kerry to get on top and when Kerry took the lead in the 50th minute it seemed inevitable that they would prevail to the finish, which thery did.

Cork took the lead in the second minute when Corbett pointed from a chance where a goal was a possibility. Two minutes later Cork found the back of the Kerry net, when Paul Walsh had the simple task of tapping home, after Ian Maguire playset up 5the4 chance. Kerry got off the mark from a free, and followed with three points in a row by the 10th minute, level terms, 1-1 to 0-4. Brian Hurley doubled Cork's advantage from a free on the restart, but Kerry were level on 43, and points were exchanged, again Hurley for Cork. Hurley pointed another free, with O'Sullivan replying.

With 50 minutes gone, Kerry went in front for the first time through David Clifford, 0-13 to 1-9. Points were exchanged, Brian Hurley for Cork, to leave only a point between the teams and when Kerry had a point Corbett replied for Cork from a mark. Kerry dominated possession added two further points and had three to spare at the final whistle.



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"...But I am like an olive tree flourishing in the house of God; I trust in God's unfailing Love for ever and ever. For what You have done I will always praise You (for You have rescued me and kept me safe). In the presence of Your faithful people I will hope in Your Name, for Your Name is Good." (Psalm 52:8-9)

Welcome back dear student, the olive tree in the Bible symbolises: (1) Hope and Safety in God's Promises - the dove brought back an olive leaf to Noah after the flood (Genesis 8:11). (2) Peace - 'extending an olive branch' for reconciliation. (3) Longevity - there are olive trees in Israel hundreds of years old. (4) Eternity – its leaves are evergreen, and its wood is strong and enduring. (5) Fruitfulness - the oil is a precious commodity valued for thousands of years to light lamps, cook with, and for medicinal purposes. (6) Prosperity and Provision — the olive tree thrives even in desert conditions — it is robust and deep rooted, producing abundant harvest (Jeremiah 17:8). (7) Fertility and Blessing – God promises the people who walk in His ways will be blessed with children and will live to see their children's children (Psalm 128). (8) Salvation - Isaiah chapter eleven prophesies the coming of Yeshua — Messiah Jesus (the Shoot of Jesse), bringing God's Wisdom, Counsel, Power, and the Knowledge of His Glory to this earth.

Jesus taught that a tree is known by its fruit (Matthew 7:15-23). Note in the Scripture above that the olive tree is symbolic of a person flourishing in the Presence of God, in intimate relationship with the Lord, and this relationship is based upon His unfailing Love or Lovingkindness - known as 'Chesed'. The Hebrew Word (pronounced Hess-ed) means covenantal, unbreakable Love and Mercy. In ancient times 'Chesed' was entered into by two parties as an everlasting agreement, always sealed in blood. The stronger party upheld the Covenant supporting the weaker partner, even at great cost to himself. The Lord Jesus brought us the New Covenant - based upon God's Mercy and Loving kindness, not works (Hebrews 8:8-12; Ephesians 2:4-9).

The New Covenant was sealed with the precious Blood of Jesus, God's Son, Who gave His Life so that whoever will believe in and obey Him, will be saved from the consequences of sin - which is death and separation from God forever in hell (Romans 5:5-6; Romans 6:23). His Blood still speaks for us upon the mercy seat in Heaven. God doesn't require one to gain favour with Him by just being 'a good person', or doing nice things for others, but through believing only in His Son Jesus the Messiah, acknowledging Him as Lord, and repenting of and turning from sin (John 3:16; Mark 16:16; John 14:6). God's Chesed is spoken of throughout the Scriptures. It's vital to understand the true meaning of this Covenant with our beautiful God. He is the stronger partner! He knows our weaknesses, yet His Love is unconditional (Psalm 103:14-18). 'Agape' Love is quite different from 'fickle' worldly love. In order to save us Jesus laid down His Life, putting into action the greatest Gift ever given - forgiveness and right standing with God. Messiah means 'Anointed One' - the Anointing was done with sacred oil from the olive tree. To produce oil, the olive must be pressed upon with incredible pressure. The Lord Jesus was pressed with suffering beyond what any human being ever endured to deliver the Promise of His Spirit for us (Isaiah chapter 53; Luke 22:44). 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NATIONAL FORESTRY STRATEGY MUST BE REVIEWED IF WE ARE TO MEET OUR TARGETS - MEP KELLEHER

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that an urgent review of the State's forestry strategy is needed if we are to meet our new planting target of 8000 ha/annum.

Kelleher was speaking after meeting with and engaging with stakeholders and experts at a special meeting hosted by the Irish Farmers Association in Cratloe Forest Park, Co. Clare.

"In the short term, foresters and farmers are very worried about the impact of the bark beetle on Irish commercial forestry. Added to the issue of Ash Dieback, foresters are concerned about their viability into the future. "What is most concerning is the lack of confidence in meeting the State's forestry targets. In recent months, we are seeing incredibly low planting levels. Unless something changes, I do not see how we can meet our national targets.

"Some of the ratios in terms of tree types do not make an attractive commercial option. This needs to be looked at if we are to make progress on our targets.

"In bilateral meetings I organised, farmers and foresters just don't see a path forward for their enterprises unless a review takes place and changes are made.

"Central to their concerns is the feeling that there are too many impediments in their way, and this is causing significant levels of uncertainty in the sector.

"On the issue of Ash Dieback, it is essential that a compensation scheme is announced.

"Forestry has the capacity to provide alterative income sources for farmers and landowners. It can help meet our

climate targets. However, the strategy needs to be workable. It's time for a review," argued Kelleher.
