

The tidy towns have started a new initiative to gain support from businesses in the Square and Main Street areas. The request is to meet every Monday evening at 6pm outside the Vodafone shop to do a little Tidy Towns work in the town centre. The first judging period for the Cork County Council Anti-Litter Competition has finished. We are in second last position receiving 913.7 points out of a thousand. The problem areas were along the Main Street, between De La Salle College and the Courthouse and lanes. Oakwood and Glen Park were also judged, and they fared out very well. A big well done to them for keeping their area in pristine condition. The second Judging period is taking place from May 27th to June 5th with the third and final judging period taking place from June 10th to June 19th. During each judging period, selected stretched of the main streets, lane ways and square will be marked. The focus is on litter and the number of pieces of litter found and marks will be lost accordingly. On each of the two remaining judging periods two estates will be selected for judging. The remaining estates nominated this year are Lois Na Fea and Sullane Weirs and we request that the residents ensure that their area is litter free when the judges arrive.

There are still premises looking dirty and it would only take 5 minutes for the owners or the workers to improve matters significantly. Thats not too big an ask to show your support for the volunteers who have to look after so many things and public areas etc.



U 16 Football.



New regulations risk putting childminders out of business – Ní Mhurchú

Ní Mhurchú concerned that new regulations for childminders will push hundreds of childminders into the black economy, or worse, out of the business, leading to a crisis in our childcare sector.

Ireland South Fianna Fáil MEP candidate Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has called on Green Minister Roderic O'Gorman not to inadvertently push childminders out of business with the upcoming Childminding Regulations 2024. Ní Mhurchú is calling on Minister O'Gorman to revisit the concerns of existing childminders before implementing a raft of new regulations around childminding which Ní Mhurchú feels could lead to an exodus of childminders from the industry.

According to Ní Mhurchú, "The stakes are very high. This morning I was speaking to one child minder who has exited the business entirely because she feels that the new regulations will be unworkable and may lead to a crisis for parents of young children across the country who depend on childminders"

The National Action Plan for Childminding 2021 -2028 sets out a phased approach to the regulation and registration of childminders. Central to work under the National Action Plan has been the development of new regulations that are specific to

Childminders that have spoken to Ní Mhurchú have said that the regulations will be too onerous on small scale childminders.

"One childminder told me that the new regulations will force childminders who have been minding children for 10 years to complete an advanced first responders training course which requires them to take two days off work and costs close to €300. They already have paediatric first aid in many cases. Another told me that the new regulations will require childminders to get fire and theft insurance above and beyond the existing insurances that childminders have in place. This is an extra cost and burden"

A third regulation that childminders have raised concerns with Ní Mhurchú is around proposed regulation 12, which imposes a limit of 6 children in his or her care at any given time, including his or her own children until they have completed primary education. Childminders feel that their own children should not be counted once they enter primary education at around 5 years old.

According to Ní Mhurchú "If childminders have to count their own children, then it will automatically reduce the maximum number of children they can look after - making their business less viable"

Ní Mhurchú described some of the proposed regulations as red tape dressed up as child protection. "Regulation 16 requires the childminder to produce a handbook that outlines their policies and procedures. This is completely unnecessary and disproportionate to the work of a person who is minding children in their own home, not running a corporation"

Ní Mhurchú said that regulation of the sector is



welcome but it has to be proportionate,

"The idea is to protect children. We can do this effectively without introducing a raft of new red tape which may have the unintended consequence of driving childminders into the blackmarket or out of business altogether."

Under the proposed regulations, childminders will have to register with Tusla before 2028. The rules are expected to be in place before the summer recess.

According to Ní Mhurchú "Most existing childminders are already insured, Garda vetted and very experienced and we risk losing them if the industry becomes over regulated. I just want Minister O' Gorman to sit down again with ordinary childminders and work out a set of regulations that are easy and uncomplicated but work to protect our children and the industry"

SPORTS AWARDS

As Chairman of Macroom-Millstreet Municipal District (previously known as Mayor), I have the option to recognise exceptional sporting achievement by members of local clubs under the age of 18, and individuals up to the age of 21.

I decided to take this opportunity, and in February 2024 I invited nominations from clubs in the Macroom and Millstreet areas. When I presented these awards previously, during my term as Mayor in 2018/19, there were 250 nominations. I hoped to extend this recognition to more sportspeople if possible.

In fact, this year the number of nominations trebled to 750. Instead of presenting the awards on one night, we ran two presentation ceremonies in late April. We couldn't invite everyone to attend, due to pressure of numbers, so teams had to send representatives to accept certificates on their behalf. I was able to visit some clubs afterwards and present the awards in person, which was a very pleasant duty.

There was a fantastic atmosphere on both nights. I was delighted to see so many young people attending, and it was a privilege to be in a position to give them official recognition of their achievements on behalf of their local Municipal District





PUBLIC REALM WORKS, MACROOM TOWN CENTRE

Macroom town centre is to get a major faceliff, thanks to funding of €7.2 million from the Town & Village Renewal Scheme. This will include a new paved plaza and seating area in front of the Briery Gap. Traffic will still be able to access the back square, but the plaza will give pedestrians a place to sit and enjoy. This is part of Cork County Council's emphasis on improving the 'public realm' of our towns, making them more pleasant for townspeople and visitors alike.

The €7.2 million of funding will also cover the cost of refurbishing the interior of the old Protestant church in Castle Street. Over €150,000 was spent in 2022 restoring the outside of the church and tower, making the whole structure weatherproof. Now more money has been allocated to the inside of the church, so that it can be turned into a vibrant community facility. Work is due to begin on both of these projects in 2024





MACROOM LIBRARY & BRIERY GAP THEATRE PROJECT REACHES KEY MILESTONE

I was honoured to deputise for County Mayor Frank O'Flynn at an important local event in recent weeks. Cumnor Construction were handing back the keys of Macroom's Briery Gap building to owners Cork County Council, marking the end of the construction phase of the refurbishment work there. Phase one of the work has been engoing since January 2022, and the next phase which involves the fit out of the library and theatre is due to begin in the coming weeks.

It is just eight years since fire damaged the old Briery Gap, and left Macroom without a cultural centre for so long. The re-opening of the newly-refurbished facility, which cost in the region of €8 million to complete, is due to happen in the autumn, and will be widely welcomed by the people of the town and the wider mid-Cork region.

The building looks impressive from the outside, but on the day of the handover I was lucky enough to get a tour of the interior as well. Even before being fully fitted out, it was clear that this will be a facility to be enormously proud of, I for one can't wait to attend performances and events there later this year





ANNOUNCEMENT: 70 FREE CAR PARKING SPACES IN MACROOM TOWN CENTRE

Over the past number of years, as a Councillor for this area, I have been highlighting the need for additional free parking spaces to serve Macroom town centre. I could see that the GAA car park in the Castle grounds would be the ideal place to have free car parking spaces for the public. I approached the GAA and asked if they would be willing to meet with Cork County Council officials to discuss this idea. I'm delighted that I was able to bring the two parties together, and now an agreement has been reached. Macroom GAA will allow the club's car park in the Castle grounds to be freely available for public use. This will provide 70 free parking spaces, within a short walk of the town square

The existing car park will be lined and prepared, and it is hoped to have the additional free parking spaces available very soon. While this is excellent progress, I will continue to seek out other potential car parking spaces in the vicinity of the town centre.

MACROOM TOWN PARK

This year the trustees of Macroom Town Park gave Cork County Council permission to apply to the Department of Sport's Capital Funding Programme for grant aid to build a skate park in the Town Park. The list of successful applications will be announced later in the year, but I am hopeful that Macroom Skate Park will be included. The facility would make a huge difference to young people in the town. The new skate park will be located near the gate of the Park on New Street, but on a raised platform so that it will not be affected by the river even when the level of the water is higher than usual.

The public playground at the top of Sleaveen Road was upgraded in 2023 at a cost of €150,000, with new equipment installed and existing equipment reinforced. This facility is well-loved by the young children of the town and by their hardworking parents!





NEW PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT INVER

Cork County Council has drawn up a design for a new pedestrian crossing at the Inverfuel station on the Millstreet Road. The need for this is something I brought to the Council's attention more than once in the last. couple of years. There is a lot of new housing in that part of the town and the amount of traffic there has increased a lot for that reason, and also because this is one of the key access roads to the Macroom Bypass. Funding is in place for the new crossing, and it is expected to be completed this year.



MILLSTREET CROSS

Long before the Macroom Bypass opened in December 2022, I could see that access to the Bypass from Millstreet Cross would be problematic for large vehicles travelling from the west. I raised this matter at meetings of Macroom Municipal District Council several times. Because the Millstreet Road is at an acute angle from the Cross, turning left there requires a truck or other large vehicle to come across into the westbound lane in order to clear the comer safely. This is not easily done at any time of the day, and certainly not at peak times. For that reason, it was clear that trucks might well end up coming through the town and accessing the Bypass at Coolcour instead of from the Millstreet Road junction.

Since the Bypass opened, in my conversations with local people and with hauliers it emerged that this was in fact the case. Trucks regularly travel through the main street of Macroom because it is too difficult to turn left up the Millstreet Road. This defeats the whole purpose of the Bypass, and needs to be addressed. Several months ago I raised the matter with the roads authority Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII). Surveys are currently being carried out there on behalf of the TII, to establish the best way to resolve the situation. No design has been put in place as yet, but planning for modifications to that junction is at an advanced stage.

NEW BUS STOP, GURTEENROE

I have made representations to Bus Éireann several times over the years about the fact that there is only one bus stop in Macroom, and that is in the heart of the town at the bus station near Macroom Mills. I'm delighted that new bus stops are to be introduced just west of the entrance to the new Macroom Fire Station. with bus shelters on either side of the road at that point. This will make a huge difference to bus users from the western side of Macroom town and the surrounding areas, making it easier for people to access public transport which is a key objective of Cork County Council.



MASSEYTOWN IMPROVEMENTS

Another project to be funded by the Town & Village Renewal Scheme is the restoration and repurposing of the Mill Race in Masseytown. The mill race has been defunct for more than 40 years and that section of the roadside in Masseytown is completely overgrown. Cork County Council has received planning permission to carry out a complete revamp on that area. The existing footpath will be removed, the mill race and the bank above it will be fully cleared and a new footpath will be constructed where the mill race once operated. The newly-cleared bank will allow passers-by to see the architecture of the courthouse and the Garda station.

Another long-standing issue in Masseytown has been the traffic bottleneck which happens so often at the end of the mill race, where the terrace begins on the western side. The Council now plans to widen the road at that point so traffic can flow more freely.

Work is due to begin on these two projects in Masseytown by early 2025





I understand that part of the solution could be to remove the corner on the western side of the junction to make it easier for vehicles to turn left at Millstreet Cross. A pedestrian crossing is also needed there, to facilitate the growing population of this area. I expect to hear more about this project in the coming weeks, and I hope that the work can be done there in the next 12 months.

ROAD RESURFACING HARTNETT'S CROSS TO TOWN CENTRE

Like all motorists travelling in and out of Macroom, I'm very much aware that the road surface is poor in many places including the stretch outside Twomey's butchers and a section near Murray's Bar.

Cork County Council had planned to carry out resurfacing works on the main road from Hartnett's Cross to Sleaveen East, but now additional funding has been sourced from the Active Travel Fund so the Council is seeking tenders to resurface the road between Hartnett's Cross and Main Street. This project will also involve widening footpaths on the eastern side of the town, to facilitate pedestrians.





SOCIAL HOUSING PROJECT -SLEAVEEN ROAD

The acute shortage of accommodation in this area has been very hard on single people, with very few one-bedroom units available. This is a matter I have been raising with Cork County Council ever since I first became a Councillor in 1999. I'm happy to see that there are eight new one-bed and two-bed apartments almost completed on Sleaveen Road, and construction work has begun on another 16 units on an adjacent site. These will also be mainly one and two-bedroom units, which are badly needed.



KILNAGURTEEN FOOTPATHS

Cork County Council has drawn up a design to construct new footpaths on either side of the Kilnagurteen junction, to facilitate pedestrians. This is something I have been working hard to progress for some time, as I live in this locality and I am very much aware of the danger to pedestrians because of the lack of a footpath.



Though there is already a pedestrian crossing in place outside the Costcutter shop in Masseytown, a number of residents contacted me to express their concern about the speed of traffic on that road and the need for traffic calming measures there. The County Council is planning to construct a raised pedestrian crossing at that point, which will help to slow down the traffic and offer an enhanced level of safety to pedestrians. This project is with the Council's design office, and a design is due to be confirmed in the coming months.



NEW MACROOM GARDA STATION

This is the site for the new Garda station, which will be a Divisional Headquarters, on Gurteenroe Road, adjacent to the new fire station. It will be a large building - 4,338 square metres in total. The accommodation there will include public office, staff offices, conference facilities, staff support facilities and custody areas.

The Department of Justice is currently completing the tender process for the construction work, which is due to begin by the end of 2024. The new Garda Station, along with all the extra facilities associated with a Divisonal Headquarters, should be in use by the summer of 2026.



PRIVATE HOUSING

Rás an Mhuilinn is another new housing scheme currently under construction in Gurteenroe, Macroom. The 90-house development was visited by An Taoiseach Simon Harris recently. This is a welcome addition to the town, as it will provide 3,4 and 5-bedroom houses for buyers who want to make Macroom their home. The new post-Bypass era has begun, and this is reflected in the demand for these houses.



MAJOR REFURBISHMENT COMPLETED AT MACROOM HOSPITAL

It is great to see that the newly-refurbished and extended Macroom Hospital is open and in full use now. This is a project that had been long-awaited, and it was badly needed. The facilities at Macroom Community Hospital were criticised in HIQA inspection reports over a number of years. Staff there provided a very high standard of care in spite of the challenges posed by the facilities. It is excellent to see that the new building is providing residents and staff with a modern, fully-equipped and spacious place to live and work.

After extensive works costing approximately €8 million, the hospital now offers 38 bed spaces arranged around three courtyard gardens, along with upgraded and extended communal spaces including recreation, sitting and dining rooms. There have been improvements to ancillary areas too - reception, offices, the kitchen, staff areas, stores, treatment rooms, sanitary facilities and plant



MACROOM FIRE STATION

The opening of Macroom's state-of-the-art new fire station in September 2022 was a major step forward for the Mid-Cork region. The old station, located inside the Castle gates, was no longer appropriate to serve the fire-fighting needs of Macroom and surrounding areas. The new station allows easy access to the Macroom Bypass, a key factor in getting fire fighters to the location of a fire in the shortest possible time. The fire service here responds to about 150 incidents per year including house fires, road traffic collisions, chimney fires as well as gorse, hill and grass fires.

The new fire station is connected to the national network of fire service mobilisation and communications centres. It's a facility that is equipped to meet the needs of the town and the wider area for the coming decades.






COMPLETED SOCIAL HOUSING **PROJECTS**


While providing more social housing remains very high on the priority list for us all at Cork County Council, it is good to look back and see how far we have come. It is great that three social housing schemes have opened in the town in recent years. In early 2022, tenants moved into 52 new houses at Páirc Uí Mhuirithe (behind Oakwood) which were constructed under a Public Private Partnership.

Around the same time, Cork County Council launched two other social housing schemes on the Millstreet Road which the Council had constructed through its 'turnkey' housing model. These were Ard an tSuláin (12 units) and An Goirtín Rua (14 units). It is heartening to know that our housing lists are gradually being reduced, as families get homes of their own.




















IMPORTANT DAY FOR PALESTINE; PROUD DAY FOR IRELAND - MEP KELLEHER

Think Globally, Act locally - THE LIVING SOIL

Hi! Chris Barrett here again. Today I have the pleasure of speaking with Dermot Robinson, who together with his family grow chemical-free vegetables in Cloughduv. You may have been fortunate enough to see their use of the land for yourself during one of their many Farm Walks which are held annually. Their vegetables are freshly picked and sold in Macroom Market on a Tuesday and Coal Quay on a Saturday.

Dermot believes that the full range of life under our soil has not yet been fully discovered. Rather like the current James Webb telescope which can see far more than the Hubble Space telescope which was launched in 1990, we have a lot more to learn about the detailed intricate composition of soil.

Currently we know that soil consists of bacteria, viruses, fungi and nematodes on a microscopic level, which is not so different from our human composition. Plants create a microbiome to suit themselves and have very similar nutritional needs to our own.

This relationship can be seen if we take and sniff a handful of healthy soil . Our brain responds to endorphins and we can enjoy the feel-good factor.

These exciting events cannot be observed by the human eye either in ourselves or in the soil and we often fail to appreciate the many links between us and the soil.

Without the use of a microscope we can observe earthworms, grubs, insects, spiders, beetles, centipedes, woodlice etc which depend on plants, bacteria and each other for survival. Basically, soil has its own ecosystem composed of what we can and cannot see. A healthy soil is fundamental to our survival. It is better able to recycle nutrients and make them available to plants, crops, flowers, shrubs and

trees. It helps to filter water and prevent flooding. It makes the land more resilient to drought. In addition, all living material consists of carbon which is retained in healthy soil. As gardeners we know earthworms do a lot of our work for us. However these earthworms require bacteria, fungi and plants to function at their best. If soil remains covered for too long, earthworms will not be present. Paving, tarmacing and crushed building rubble not only create an impermeable surface but also destroy the sponge underneath.

Soil is undoubtedly resilient and has survived for millions of years, but the excessive use of nitrogen fertilisers reduces the soil's organic matter and integral structure.

These nitrogen fertilisers significantly change the microbiome of the soil and its ph which in turn increases the need for other soil ingredients such as lime, which is added to counteract the acidifying effect of the fertiliser. This doesn't seem very different to me from a human patient having to take a second medication to counteract the effect of the first.

To improve your own soil, kitchen compost, your home-made compost (as described in previous Lee Valley Outlook articles by Donal O'Leary, the Composting specialist of 'Waste Down'), and farmyard manure are great to be incorporated once they are well-composted. Ideally it should be stored under cover so that the rain does not wash away the nutrients. The compost adds its own biological life and organic food for soil life.

Spraying pesticides to clear weeds by using chemicals such as Roundup has a very detrimental effect on all soil organisms as well as insects such as bees. Fungicides, pesticides and herbicides all affect more of life than their intended target. Bees

cannot navigate their way back to their hive if they are affected by certain pesticides. To quote Albert Einstein, "If the bee disappeared off the face of the Earth, man would only have four years left to live." We should never underestimate our pollinators and our responsibility for their health. Healthy soil can also act as a cushion against climate change induced weather by improving water-holding capacity and nutrient recycling, in addition to the sequestration of carbon. It is up to us to show our children and grandchildren respect for the wonders of soil life. Teachers have a responsibility not to reinforce negative perceptions. e.g. by ensuring that soil is not referred to as dirt by children.

Rather we can all show children the pleasure to be gained from the cycle of planting seeds including the harvesting and resowing of the resultant seeds. The link between healthy soil and healthy food needs to be demonstrated. Readers may be interested in a book Dirt The Ecstatic Skin of the earth by William Bryant Logan. To conclude, we know that food grown locally and seasonally in good soil is known to be beneficial for us and for the planet. While I was speaking with Dermot, we were joined briefly by Grace O' Sullivan, our local MEP. who negotiated between 2019 and 2020 to get Soil Legislation into the EU.

It was debated and 'A monitoring Framework for Healthy Soil' ensures there is now Soil Legislation in the EU. I am very grateful to Dermot and Grace for speaking with me today. 

MACROOM SCHOOLS HISTORY EXHIBITION 2024

Macroom History Group organised the 2nd Schools History Exhibition on Monday 20 May, 2024 in the Castle Hotel. St Mary's, Macroom Youthreach and McEgan College showed 14 exhibits; the latter two were joint efforts with three girls presenting McEgan's project and two boys and two girls Youthreach's. Grace Mehigan and Katelyn Cronin from St Mary's spoke on their topics: Aisling Ní Cheallaigh, Oliwia Raba and Aoife Kelleher for McEgan and James, Jack and Chloe O'Driscoll and Toyosi Odlinium spoke on their subjects.

The Exhibition is modelled on that of The Young Scientist of The Year gigantic event in Dublin but Macroom's is non-competitive. The aim is to encourage participation. As part of their junior certificate cycle, students have to complete a history project on some local topic or matter connected to their home place or family. The value lies in looking at what interests the students, getting them to interrogate their locality or family's past; the area of research is widened and can draw on many more sources. Appreciating local history hopefully leads to a better understanding of the world. As American historian David McCullagh wrote: '(H)history is who we are, and why we are the way we are'. All of us are part of history and we all have stories and histories to tell. This year some of the findings were enlightening.

Among the topics covered were Macroom Mountain Dew Festival, Mountmassey House, The Civil War, stories of how World Wars 1 and II affected family members and Colonel Hutchinson's murder in Codrum House and Malachy Duggan's infamous role. The Mountmassey piece offered a new explanation as to how Macroom's anthem, 'Mountmassey The Flower of Macroom', originated. Other Macroom projects were Bealick Mill, Macroom's Railway and Ballincollig Gun Powder Mill. Fittingly, Macroom Railway was researched by Youthreach as the old Railway/Bus Station will be its new home. Hopefully the project posters will find a permanent home there. There was a great project on Art O'Leary with its background of Penal Law times in Ireland. Ambushes covered were those at Lisacreasaigh, Kilmichael, Cúl na Cathrach and Lissarda. Places/buildings investigated were Bawnatemple, Carrigadrohid, and Nenagh Castle this student has strong connection with the area. The Kilmichael Ambush project had interesting new information on Auxiliary Guthrie who escaped from the ambush scene but was caught in Annahala Bog and shot there. He was eventually buried in Inchigeela; his pregnant wife was in Macroom at the time, and believed for a long time that he would come home. Those involved in his shooting suffered too from keeping silent about the issue and from taunting by locals at school etc. War has ramifications on many levels. Sadly, similar scenes and worse are currently played out every day in Ukraine, Gaza and many other places.

The Exhibition took place because of the wonderful co-operation of teachers Ms Gray (St. Mary's), Ms Hurley (McEgan) and Ms Cronin and Ms Bonner (Youthreach). Their skill, enthusiasm and commitment were impressive and made the hard work involved pleasant and interesting. Their endeavours and encouragement resulted in excellent projects. Youthreach kindly prepared the posters and certificates. Brendan O'Brien was a polished MC and he presented a Certificate of Merit to each participant. Parents and grandparents attended which added to the excitement and enjoyment of the evening. Afterwards, the participants enjoyed a tasty meal beautifully prepared by the Castle Hotel kitchen. Other hotel staff - Paul, Trish and Kay and others were very kind and helpful. Brendan thanked Macroom Cope Hub attendees for distributing our posters. Inchigeela National School with much time, effort and inconvenience provided stands and Tony Kelleher (Lions Club) kindly helped. Finally Mick Walsh and Douglas Kidd ensured that the Exhibition took place and were ably assisted by other members of Macroom History Group.

Congratulations to all involved and looking forward to 2025's Exhibition.







Cork footballers travelled to Ennis deeply conscious of their Munster championship defeat last year at the same venue and resolved not to slip up again as victory here was absolutely essential if the Rebels hoped to get out of their group. Cork did survive the test but not with any degree of ease and they endured some stressful moments in the second half after looking like being impressive winners in the first quarter.

There was a slow start to the Clare game and the first score did not come until the sixth minute when Cork's Conor Corbett had a fine point to be followed points by Colm O'Callaghan and Brian Hurley. Clare got their first point from a free after 11 minutes. Cork scored a smashing goal after 17 minutes when O'Callaghan parted to Seán Powter who palmed the ball over the head of the advancing Clare goalkeeper into the net. Points were exchanged leaving Cork leading by 1-4 to 0-2 after 20 minutes.

In the run up to half time Clare began to get to grips with their problems, kicked two of the next three points and had Cork under pressure. A fisted point from Chris Óg Jones helped Cork to a 1-6 to 0-4 lead at the break.

On the resumption, Clare had a point, Cork missed an open goal on 38, Clare had another point but Paul Walsh for Cork pointed after 42 minutes, 1-7 to 0-6. A minute later it Clare's Aaron Griffin had a goal, points were exchanged and it was hectic stuff now with the Clare supporters in the small 3500 attendance sensing possible victory. A point from a Clare 45

brought Clare level at 1-7 aside on 58 but in fairness to Cork, the players refused to panic or capitulate. Tommy Walsh fisted a point and sub Steven Sherlock landed a point from way out but Clare had a point to cut the gap to a single score again with four minutes left.

Mark Cronin pointed a Cork free to give the Rebels a two-point advantage going into added on time, points were exchanged before Cronin pointed to push Cork 1-13 to 1-10 ahead. A Clare point reduced the lead down to two points but despite late intense Clare pressure, Cork survived.

Tipperary 1-20 Cork 4-30

After an outstanding Cork performance, illuminated by Alan Connolly's three goals, the Rebels had their biggest championship win over Tipperary since 1898. There was massive Cork support at the game in the 44,000 attendance at Thurles and after an even first half, Connolly struck for a goal just before the break to send Cork to the dressing rooms ahead by 1-15 to 1-12 and buoyant, and they tore Tipperary apart in the second half.

Their reward was continuing Rebel interest in the All Ireland series and if they can maintain their rate of improvement then they will trouble any of the teams still in contention for honours.

The first half was evenly contested and after only 15 seconds Tipperary had the sliotar in the Cork net. Cork reacted well and had seven of the next ten points, Shane Barrett's second point in the tenth minute putting Cork ahead for the first time, 0-7 to 1-3. Cork went into a 0-12 to 1-7 lead but Tipperary fought back and led 1-12 to 0-13 on the half-hour before a clash between Cork's Ethan Twomey and Ronan Maher necessitated both players having to be replaced. When the action resumed, Cork outscored Tipp by 1-2 to nil, Connolly's vital goal, after a strong surging run, the final score before the whistle for the interval giving Cork a 1-15 to 1-12 advantage.

After the first four points of the second half were evenly shared, a short Tipp puckout was turned over by Connolly who carried and got a lovely shot away to beat Barry Hogan. Though Tipp replied with a longrange free by Ronan Maher and Conor Bowe's second point, the third Cork goal, set up for Connolly by Luke

Meade, came just after that and finished Tipperary. That goal made it 3-17 to 1-16 and eight unanswered Cork points followed – four of them from the stick of Kingston in the space of less than three minutes.

Cork were rampant, a fourth goal followed as Shane Barrett set up Patrick Horgan for a lovely finish and Horgan had another later goal disallowed incorrectly. A great day for Cork, and for the Mid Cork players, and how the supporters celebrated!

Kerry were crowned TG4 Munster Senior A ladies football champions for the first time since 2017 at Mallow.

The Kingdom started well before falling behind to

Cork, but a goal from Emma Dineen just before halftime got them back in contention.

When she raised her second green flag with nine minutes to go it was the killer blow, as they led by six points at that stage and there was no way back for Cork. Add in a simply outstanding display from Danielle O'Leary, who scored 10 points for Kerry and was the deserving winner of the player of the match award, although Kayleigh Cronin pushed her close. Danielle O'Leary (who was to finish with 0-10)

opened the scoring for Kerry in the fourth minute and had made it 0-3 to nil before Katie Quirke got Cork off the mark after 14 minutes and from the restart, Rachel Leahy got their second point to make it 0-3 to 0-2.

With 16 minutes gone Cork were back on level terms through Melissa Duggan, Quirke got her second from a free to put Cork in front for the first time after 19 minutes play and Laura O'Mahony, put Cork two up as the Rebels improved. Quirke pointed from

Cork were crowned Munster senior camogie champions after a hard-fought win over Waterford (who defeated them last year in Munster in Cork before losing to the Rebels later in the All Ireland final).

Amy O'Connor's first half goal proved to be a crucial score, with Laura Hayes, Fiona Keating and Meabh Murphy also impressing for the winners.

Waterford opened the scoring in the second minute, Amy O'Connor got Cork off the mark from a free after seven minutes.

Waterford were enjoying the better of the opening exchanges, 0-4 to 0-1 in front, after 11 minutes. Cork were denied victory by an umpiring error when William Buckley's shot was fumbled in the air by the Tipp goalkeeper who rammed the ball up into the net inside the crossbar - in clear view of everybody and of the TG4 tv camera. Play was allowed to continue and no score was awarded. much to Cork's chagrin, but such is sport with human error always a possibility and this error cost Cork their Munster and All Ireland crowns.

It was pity that the Rebels lost in this fashion as they had played well and with great heart against a team which had defeated them soundly in the group stage. The sides were level an 11th time with William Buckley's free in the fourth and final minute of added time but in the few remaining seconds, the Toomevara star's 10th point proved the difference.

The teams were level seven times in the first half before Tipp took a one point lead at half time, 0-10 to 0-9, Cork wasting a 20m free with a futile short pass. Cork with two points went one up on the resumption before Tipp jumped back into the ascendancy with a 1-3 burst, 1-14 to 0-12. Cork had more chances and with their speedy subs began to wear down Tipp as they reeled off four in a row, with corner-back Darragh O'Sullivan pushing forward for a brace to cut the gap to one. "The king's heart is like streams of water in the hand of the Lord; He turns it whichever way He wishes. Every man's way is right in his own eyes, but the Lord weighs and examines the hearts [of people and their motives]. To do righteousness [what is right] and justice is more acceptable to the Lord than to offer Him sacrifices repeatedly" (Proverbs 21:1-3).

Welcome back dear student, well next week's elections are fast approaching. Last week we spoke on how love never fails. There is so much hatred and division being stirred up currently and we know who is behind it — Satan. Jesus said, 'a kingdom or house divided shall not stand' (Matthew 12:22-28). Our motives, attitudes, and beliefs are weighed by His standard – His Love, and His Word. It's a warning for us — because right now the god of this world Satan is twisting and perverting truth, and people are sucked in by lies, ungodly motives and outward fakery. Don't ask yourself what great works these politicians or leaders have done — pray and ask the Lord — 'what kind of heart has this person? Is integrity, honesty, righteousness, and justice at work here?' Let God direct your steps as you vote.

Currently we are reaping the rewards of decades of corruption, greed, and injustice in our nation. People ask, 'why can't problems be fixed?' They know little of spiritual matters, because if they did they would be hollering from the rooftops of society in repentance.

This is not every politician — of course there are godly women and men, but they need to take a courageous stand for what is right, even if it's not popular opinion. And it's not just those involved in politics — but the entire civil service, and also the church at large. Those who carry out laws: whether administratively; in policing; in education; and in health. You have a voice — and God has placed you here for such a time as this! (Esther 4:14). Instead of listening to the angry screams of the ungodly about being on the wrong side of history — friend: make sure you are NOT on the wrong side of God.
