





### SUCESSFUL BOOK LAUNCH

It was a packed Community Hall in Donoughmore on Friday 24 May last brimful of energy and vitality. The occasion was the launch by the Lord Mayor of Cork Cllr. Kieran McCarthy of a new publication Land War to Civil War 1900-1924: Donoughmore to Cork and Beyond by Gerard O' Rourke

The Lord Mayor in a wide-ranging address said it was a very impressive book that contained over 100,000 words and one would go far and wide to find a book so detailed. Reflecting on this he added that stories from the past can disturb you, impress you, make you curious and remember and indeed make you forget. All these emotions are in the book with the depth of storytelling incredible. Some stories were disturbing, especially around the Civil War era where comrades became very bitter. One thing he most liked in its 480 pages was the focus on daily life highlighted by fantastic images portraying that period. The meticulous detail in the publication drew on what he called nostalgic currency and was woven together in spectacular fashion. He was stricken by the sense of place and the bringing together of the community by the book launch and thanked the author for generating this identity. He stressed the importance of archives and the potential of finding material in attics across the county. Encouraging everyone to make themselves aware of such hidden records, he urged them to make them available to researchers. In thanking Mr O'Rourke for all his work he was delighted to formally launch the book.

Cllr. Michael Looney deputizing for the County Mayor, also spoke thanking the author for bringing history to the ordinary people and more importantly preserving that record. Gerard Forde had very interesting discussions with Bernadette Wallace, a niece of the Wallace sisters and a grand-nephew Ted Murphy. These women operated a 'little shop' in St Augustine St Cork that was a front for the Cork No.1 Brigade. Other interesting interviewees included Bob Honohan grandson of J. W. Honohan who was a pivotal member of the United Irish League and All- for- Ireland League at county and national level. Brian O Donchu grandson of Frank Busteed Vice O/C of the 6th Battalion Cork No. 1 Brigade talked about his grandfather's time spent on the run. Matt Healy remembered fondly his father Dan Healy, a prominent local volunteer. John Arnold, well known Echo journalist and storyteller said the book was a wonderful production. There was great bitterness after the Civil War, he said, but organizations like Macra na Ferime and the GAA brought people together again proving that people with different viewpoints can still work and tolerate each other.

The author thanked the invited guests and everyone who helped in a great community effort. He trawled through the various segments of the book

'This book takes us through one of the most turbulent periods in Irish History. Cork at the turn of the century was very much part of the British Empire and when King Edward visited Cork in 1903 it was not rebel flags that flew in the city but Union Jack flags. Gradually, a reawakening of Irish nationalism notably the emergence of the GAA, Gaelic League, and a literary revival energized and transformed the Irish people. National independence was driven by a constitutional process with Irish MP's fighting the cause in the British Houses of Parliament. The 1903 Land Act afforded small tenant farmers an opportunity to purchase their own holdings while the Labourers act provided labourers with improved habitation from their existing hovels.

It was also a period of dissension and infighting amongst various political groups with the Irish Parliamentary Party the butt of criticism. Their constitutional strategy of seeking independence was becoming outdated for many of the separatist movements. A feature of the time were hotly

contested elections which were ferociously canvassed; rallies were attended by vast crowds with travelling contingents going to various parts of the Mid Cork area accompanied by local bands. Results were celebrated passionately with victory parades, men carrying pikes with lighted turf sods, and unashamed delirious shouting and taunting. So, today's councilors who are facing an upcoming election will appreciate that they are very fortunate in working in what we can, a more subdued environment.

With the 1st World War interrupting a long-awaited Home Rule Bill, the emergence of the Ulster Volunteers and the resulting formation of the Irish Volunteers brought a potentially dangerous situation to the island of Ireland. What followed was the Easter Rising and the subsequent execution of its leaders. This brought a huge outpouring of national grievance reflecting in much opposition to British Rule leading to the War of Independence. The volunteers of Donoughmore and Cork seemed to have a renewed focus in determining their own and their families' fortunes. On this occasion they were not going to be reminded of their non contribution to a failed Easter Rising and immersed themselves in the war. Many of those families suffered greatly for their input enduring bereavements and economic distress.

There is always an amusing story amid all the mayhem. One concerns the Easter Rising in Dublin where a certain zealous priest having heard of wholesale thieving in the city centre decided to attempt to stop the looting. He met a boy who was bent down with the weight of some twenty pairs of boots. Having asked the boy where he had got the boots the youngster looking over his shoulder and conscious that he need to hurry on answered' In Tylers Father but you'll have to hurry up or they'll be all gone'.

Meanwhile, Irish soldiers who fought for the Allies and recruited by Britian in the 1st World War did so in most cases to survive. Living in poor conditions and with no prospect of improving their prospects they faced a difficult decision. When they returned to Ireland, they faced resentment and were ostracised from society. Many years later this was reflected on by a more passionate and considered viewpoint, most notably from former Taoiseach Sean Lemass.

During the War of Independence, Donoughmore and the greater district became international news with the executions of Mrs Lindsay, Major Compton Smith and the aftermath of the Dripsey Ambush when five volunteers were executed and one died from wounds received. These fatalities were debated on the floor of the British parliament and became headlines across the international press. Meanwhile, over in Manchester, Mary Healy, a little-known girl from this parish became one of the leading women in the IRA helping De Valera not alone to escape from Lincoln Jail but shielding him in her own house for a week thereafter. She accompanied Dev on his evening walks in a manner that depicted them as a happy couple and never arousing suspicion.

The tremendous contribution of women to the war is epitomized by the Wallace sisters from Kilcullen who from humble beginnings on an evicted farm in Kilcullen fronted a little stationery shop neat St Augustine's Church in Cork that concealed what was the official headquarters of the Cork No 1 IRA Brigade. I am delighted to see their niece Bernadette Wallace here tonight and grand -nephew Ted Murphy. Many safe houses were instrumental in helping the weary volunteers continue the fight, but spies and informers were always a danger and day-to-day living became a constant source of stress.

The resulting Civil War was a complete disaster with brother against brother and resulted in many years of what could only be described as an atmosphere of venom and toxicity. In a complete transformation the heroes of the War of Independence were vilified and became the subject of animosity. The execution of William Healy from Lackabawn, Donoughmore was a low point, he was the last prisoner to be executed in Cork Gaol. The subsequent struggle of many volunteers in applying for pensions and the emigration of other volunteers led to an enhancement of this discontentment and resentment. A reluctance by survivors of the Civil War to reflect and relate their stories contributed to an air of uncertainty and inaccurate portrayals.

Happily, with more records becoming available the picture becomes clearer and a more informed analysis can be reflected on. 100 years later who would have thought that these civil war parties would now be at one forming a government and guiding the state. The question obviously arises then what would the Civil War veterans think of it all.

This night is bitter sweet as we are missing one very dear person, my wife Tricia. She was an inspiration for this production and wanted it to be published and it is fitting that it is now a tribute and legacy to her memory. 15 euro of each copy sold will be donated to cancer care services in Cork and this is a legacy to her kindness and concern for other people. It is somewhat ironic when one reflects that this book about war and suffering is now a catalyst for promoting healing. I would respectfully ask you to encourage your families, friends and connections at home and abroad to buy this book and this will achieve a significant sum for such cancer services. The power of social media and direct contact was brought home to me just yesterday when a family member asked me to hold 20 books after posting details to a whats app group. Many of you have been affected directly and indirectly in some way with this illness and have availed of the wonderful services out there but unfortunately, they need money to continue that great work. I would hope in some


#### **COMHGHAIRDEAS**

### THE GREAT DEPRESSION & THE FARMERS' MOVEMENT IN MID-CORK

An unconventional struggle transpired amidst the consequences of the 1929 Wall Street Crash and the subsequent Great Depression of the 1930s, during which bailiffs confiscated family farms and animals, output stumbled, and prices for goods plummeted. Credit availability was virtually nonexistent, and the 'Economic War' between the Irish Free State and Great Britain, accompanied by annuities, exacerbated the problems. Militancy in our area is famously associated with the IRA, but another form existed. Farming militancy, although now forgotten, was a major part of the economic and political scene in Mid-Cork during this decade. A boon of such activity occurred.

The Cork Farmers' Union, and the affiliated Farmers' Party, had been active in Mid-Cork throughout the 1920s, returning members to the Dáil and Cork County Council. However, support from farmers was also shared amongst Fianna Fáil, Labour, and Cumann na nGaedheal. The Union offered a different flavour of politics. A meeting of the CFU's East Muskerry branch, which took place at Cloughduv, in December 1928, was addressed by Mr. D.J Curran, an official at the Department of Agriculture, in which he warned of potential economic challenges facing farmers over the coming years. As everyone would later learn, it proved to be prophetic. By the turn of the 1930s, branches were now active in most villages around the district.

In June 1932, at the general meeting of the Carriganima branch, in which Mr. James Lucey presided, saw the suggestion of a grouping of local branches under a district secretary as the main topic of the evening. However, the conclusion of those present decided that supporting such an idea would "militate against the branch" and that their present system of local organisers was already "sufficient." Nonetheless, the IFU's full-time district organiser for Co. Cork, Mr. T Murphy, opined that, while there were signs of new life, that he was uncertain of whether or not the Farmers' Union was properly "strengthened and fortified" for the coming year. Despite this apparent conflict, it was agreed by those present to organiser lectures and events relating to farming.

A July 1932 meeting of the Cork Farmers' Union, held in the Imperial Hotel, Cork City, read out a letter to the organisation from Éamon de Valera, President of the Executive Council of the Irish Free State, in which he denounced them and told them that "instead of pious resolutions deploring the conditions of farmers, they give their wholehearted support to the Government in their present struggle" against the British during the infamous 'Economic War' of the

1930s. The letter went down like a lead balloon, and, Richard Henrik Beamish, an incumbent city councillor, former TD, and proprietor of the famous brewery bearing his family surname, challenged de Valera's letter. Although several farmers became Fianna Fáil supporters following the affiliated Farmers' Party's merger into Fine Gael in 1933, a hostility towards de Valera's insistence on the economic war against Britain held true as the majority sentiment.

A large crowd turned out to an October 1932 assembly held under the auspices of the Farmers' & Ratepayers' League, held in Macroom Town Hall. T. Murphy presided. The Canon Barrett addressed the group, and said that while people ought to pay their debts, any unjust burden, such as that which had been presented by the annuity crisis, was contrary to the Christian concept of justice and harmful to those struggling following the onset of the Depression. Furthermore, meetings of the Dunmanway branch of the Cork Farmers Union, held in late 1932, saw the proposal for the establishment of a co-operative creamery in the district discussed. There existed a large attendance, and the proposal had previously received unanimous support. The intricate details of the logistical aspects of establishing the creamery were investigated, with Mr. Vincent Crowley elected provisional chairman of the creamery, as the project developed. However, the suggestion of a potential auxiliary creamery, without an accompanying store, was the subject to some controversy. The group had succeeded in sourcing the necessary capital, and calculating that a base of 1,000 milking cows would be required for it to prevail as a going concern. The branch was assigned support from the Irish Agricultural Organisation Society (IAOS) in its formation.

By the mid-1930s, the situation had turned so sour, that a quasi-querrilla campaign was underway in Cork. This featured the infamous August 1934 fatal shooting of 22 year old farmer, Michael Patrick Lynch, at an auction yard for repossessed animals in Cork City. In October 1934, a mass "round-up" of farmers, which had occurred elsewhere in the county, began in the area. A 'Cork Examiner' article reported that "a number of farmers in the Mid-Cork district were arrested by detectives from Union Quay, Cork, under the direction of Inspector O'Sullivan and Detective-Sergt. James Moore." Most of these men were detained at the old Coachford Barracks. A February 1935 article announced that several farmers from the Muskerry region had been jailed.

Most farmers across Cork rallied around Patrick J. Manley, who, at a relatively young age, had become one of the foremost farmers' organisers in the

country. Manley had served as chairman of the Cork Farmers' Union. He was a founding board member and chairman of the Cork Farmers' Union Abattoir & Marketing Co-operative Society, which possessed several branch stores and premises across the city and county. Although a hardened activist, Manley was simultaneously a practical and business-like individual, and held in high regard by the 'merchant princes' of the city (the Manleys had previously held an interest in the old Cork Savings Bank). By the late 1930s, newspaper reports of the society's AGMs suggest that the 'economy shop' (as it was dubbed) had been very successful in providing higher returns for farmers' produce. At least three board members were from the Muskerry area.

It appears that, by the late 1930s, the 1933 fusion of the Farmers' Party into Fine Gael was not satisfactory to some. In July 1938, a local branch meeting in Macroom mulled over the proposed creation of a new party for farmers, and regarded the re-organisation of the Farmers' Union "as a sort of trade union is a very essential movement," because "the absence of definitive aims and a definitive objective amongst those who make a living from the land has rendered them a rather impotent force in politics for the past few years." The meeting notes finished by asserting that "to keep the movement free from politics is a desire of many, who feel the need for a new organisation, but it is almost humanly impossible to keep an organisation of the kind entirely aloof from politics." As history shows, this party did not come to fruition, and the mainstream became the norm.



### **Summer Driving:** Hazards To Watch Out For

Summer is in full swing, with many of us already complaining that it's "too hot" or we're "absolutely melting"! Summer months also bring a lot of long drives. While the (hopefully) good weather is certainly something to enjoy, driving during the summer months can present some unique challenges. With this in mind, we're warning motorists of the dangers of driving in hot weather and some signs to watch out for that your car is struggling with the summer sun.

### Glare

The glare from the sun has been known to cause collisions, particularly under clear skies at dawn or dusk. It can be particularly dangerous when you're driving at speed and all of a sudden you're blinded by the sun.

The best way to protect yourself against the sun's glare is to make sure the windscreen is clean, both inside and out and remove smears, which will catch sunlight and impair vision. Don't forget, windscreen wipers only last about a year so it might be time to change them. A pair of unscratched sunglasses are handy as well.

### Overheating

The heat can cause all sorts of problems under the bonnet too. One of the most common problems seen by AA Membership, our roadside rescue service, during hot weather, is overheating. AA patrols deal with many vehicles with low coolant levels, leaking hoses or broken electric cooling fans. Any of these issues can make the car overheat and this can lead to expensive damage. The best way to avoid a breakdown during a

heatwave is to keep an eye on your temperature gauge and top up your coolant fluid regularly. It might also be time to get your car serviced. Remember a car service is just as important during the summer months as it is in winter.

### **Tyres**

High temperatures can aggravate any existing damage to the rubber in your tyre. It's very important to check the condition of your tyres and regularly make the trip to the fuel station to check the tyre pressure. Under-inflation causes friction and therefore heat, and the greater the heat, the greater the effect on weak-spots in your tyre. If you combine heat, under-inflation and weak spots, you'll find the perfect recipe for a tyre

### At the beach

Coastal roads are likely to be very busy during hot weather as people flock to the beach. If you are going to the beach it's important to take care of your belongings. It's very easy to lose your car

keys in the sand and every year AA Membership receive calls from people who have gone into the sea with their key fob in their pocket, only to realise that remote control access to their car doesn't work when it's time to go home.

### Dogs

We're not the only ones who suffer in extreme heat, our four-legged friends feel it just as much, if not more than us. Never leave your dog in a car during hot weather, even if it feels cool outside. As soon as the engine is turned off and the cool air is not being pumped into the vehicle, it can get extremely hot. If you do have to bring your dog with you, try to avoid long journeys and the hottest time of day, make sure you have plenty of water and consider using a car sunblind to provide shade.




















#### Think Globally, Act locally - FLOWERS AND BEES


Hi Chris Barrett here, today I have the great pleasure of speaking to Tom Jordan whose integrity and understanding of nature comes through clearly in today's article. Here is what he has to share with us . The keeping of bees was once a common practise among Ireland's rural dwellers. Most farmers and many town dwellers kept a couple of hives to supply them with honey and beeswax. Today this form of traditional bee-keeping has almost disappeared. As wild honey-bee populations have collapsed due to introduced diseases, pollinator-dependant growers like fruit farmers typically invite commercial bee-keepers to bring their hives on-site during the flowering season. The natural world can no longer provide a reliable pollination service. This reduction in the number of beekeepers has also led to a loss of knowledge about native plants, which was once general. Honey bees thrive in wooded areas because trees provide much of their pollen and nectar. On the other hand, bumble bees are much more dependent on garden flowers, flowering fruits like currants, as well as smaller annual and perennial wild plants. Common weeds like dandelion, herb robert and cow parsley are very important to bumble bees. To attract them and help them to thrive, it is therefore unnecessary to plant wild flower mixes from the supermarket, as tempting as this often is. Leaving some areas in their natural state will suffice. Sometimes if left alone borders will be overtaken by briars, docks and nettles, but this is not a disaster. These are dominant pioneer




species of rich soil and the first stage in what would be its ultimate conversion to woodland. Sometimes planting native trees will satisfy this natural intent by creating cover and taking up excess nutrients, but where woodland is unsuitable there are alternative management approaches that can be used. The humble briar is one of the most important wild flowers and its fruit feeds many species too. It grows extremely fast, but can be cut back at the end of the season or throughout as required. Docks support numerous species, from butterflies and moths to shiny dock beetles who munch them to bits, while nettles are a haven for butterflies like the red admiral, peacock and tortoiseshell. Accepting the presence of these common weeds is not easy for everyone, but can be rewarding for all. It is possible to develop a thriving wildflower meadow or verge by mowing once a year, at the end of summer. Importantly, the cuttings should be taken away and composted for the kitchen garden. Reducing soil fertility will increase species diversity over time, so the docks and nettles will lose their dominance, giving smaller flowering plants a chance to appear. Yellow rattle, a parasite of grasses, is an important part of this process as it further reduces competition, allowing delicate annuals to prosper. Over time the meadow will become a haven for rare insects, which in turn will be food for rare birds. Best management for wildlife depends on the needs of land users, but this approach allows growth throughout the summer, giving plants the opportunity to flower and seed, which in turn provides important food sources for birds such goldfinches and declining animal species like harvest mice and shrews. We only need to train our eyes to see the beauty of a diverse and thriving natural world, which is far more interesting and absorbing than any planted scheme. When we let go our need for control, we find that nature provides an endless palate of beauty.



#### YOUR ANNUAL LEAVE ENTITLEMENTS **FROM WORK**

Many of us are looking forward to our summer holidays and some may have questions about their employment rights in relation to taking their annual leave. The following are some common queries which arise.

#### Should I be paid by my employer while I am on annual leave?

Annual leave is paid time off work. Holiday pay must be paid in advance at your normal weekly rate. If your pay changes from week-to-week (for example, because of commission or bonus payments), your holiday pay is the average of your pay over the 13 weeks before you take holidays.

#### Are all workers entitled to paid annual leave?

Yes, all employees are entitled to annual leave, including full-time, part-time, temporary and casual

#### How much annual leave am I entitled to?

Your annual leave entitlement depends on how much time you have worked in a leave year.

The statutory leave year runs from 1st April to 31st March. Most employers use the calendar year (January to December) instead of the official leave year to calculate your entitlement for administrative reasons, but this does not affect your statutory leave entitlements. Your employer should tell you when your leave year begins and ends.

There are 3 ways to calculate your annual leave entitlement. You can use whichever method gives you the areater (biaaest) entitlement

- 1. If you have worked at least 1,365 hours in a leave year, you are entitled to the maximum of 4 working weeks' paid annual leave. You cannot use this method if you changed employment during the leave year.
- 2. Calculate 1/3 of a working week for each calendar month in which you worked at least 117 hours.
- 3. Calculate 8% of the hours you worked in the leave year, subject to a maximum of 4 working weeks.

#### How do I calculate my annual leave if I am a part-time worker?

Generally, annual leave for part-time workers is calculated using option 3 above. This means you can get 8% of your hours worked. If you work full time for some months and part-time for the rest of the year, you should calculate the leave for the full-time and the part-time periods of work separately.

#### What happens my annual leave if I am off on Maternity leave or Parental Leave?

Annual leave is not affected by other types of statutory leave (that means leave provided for by law). Time spent on maternity leave, paternity leave, adoptive leave, parental leave, force majeure leave and the first 13 weeks of carer's leave is treated as though you have been in employment. For example, time spent on parental leave can be used to accrue (build up) your annual leave entitlement

#### What happens my annual leave if I leave my job?

If you are leaving a job without taking all the annual leave you are entitled to, your employer must pay you for the days you have not taken.

#### Can my employer force me to take annual leave?

Usually, employees can ask to take annual leave at specific times. Your employer can accept your request, or refuse your request. Your employer decides when annual leave may be taken, but this is subject to a number of conditions. Your employer must take into account your family responsibilities, as well as the available opportunities for rest and recreation. Your employer must discuss your annual leave with you (or your union) at least one month before you are to take the leave i.e. your employer cannot tell you on Friday that you must take annual leave the following week.

#### Can my employer offer to pay me extra in lieu of taking my annual leave?

It is illegal for an employer to pay an employee extra instead of allowing them take the minimum statutory annual leave entitlement, except where the employment ends and the employee has earned unused annual leave days. In that case the employer should pay the employee for any outstanding annual leave and public holidays.

#### What if I get sick while on annual leave?

If you are sick while you are on annual leave, you should get a medical certificate from your GP (doctor) as soon as possible to cover the days you were sick. Give the medical certificate to your employer as soon

This way, the sick days will not count as annual leave, and you can take your annual leave at a later date. Your employer cannot make you to take annual leave for time you were on certified sick leave.

#### Can I 'carry over' annual leave to next year?

Annual leave should be taken within the leave year. Depending on your employer, you can agree to take your annual leave within 6 months of the relevant leave year. Any further carrying-over (also called holding over) of annual leave would need to be agreed between you and your employer.

If you are on long-term sick leave and cannot take your annual leave due to illness, you can carry it over for up to 15 months after the end of the year it was earned. If you leave your job within these 15 months, you should get payment instead of the leave you did not take due to illness.

#### Cill na Martra 0-18 Cill Chartha 2-18 (aet)

Cill na Martra may have some regrets that they did not get the better of the ultimate champions Cill Chartha from Donegal when the sides met in the semi final of Comórtas Peile na Gaeltachta at Páirc Uí Chuana but they at least can have the satisfaction that they contributed hugely to a smashing game of football, of a high standard of play and of sportsmanship. In normal time, Cill na Martra led by three points in the 58th minute, Cill Chartha without a score at that stage for ten minutes, but in the time remaining a despairing Cill Chartha mounted a final rally and point by point drew level, the equaliser coming with almost the last kick of the game, 0-13 a-side the score which necessitated extra time.

This was a win to remember for Cork footballers, their mentors and supporters, who have longed for such a day. "Lord, my heart is not proud; my eyes are not haughty. I don't concern myself with matters too great or too awesome for me to grasp. Instead, I have calmed and quieted myself, like a weaned child who no longer cries for its mother's milk. Yes, like a weaned child is my soul within me. O Israel, put your hope in the Lord - now and always" (Psalm 131).

Welcome back dear student, 'Fear Is A Liar' is a song by Zach Williams and it's so true. Fear paralyzes, hinders and stunts (Psalm 143:4). When someone endures trauma or pain that person may be emotionally, mentally, and physically affected opening them up to torment, oppression, dread of the future, or a negative mindset. Fear is a lack of Love — specifically, the Love of God. "There is no fear in Love; but Perfect Love casts out fear because fear involves torment. But he who fears has not been made perfect in Love." (1 John 4:18).


Recently we studied the 'fear of the Lord' - that is reverence and love for God: obedience to His Word, bringing God's blessings and joy. The devil uses 'fear' to terrorise and destroy. The fear of the Lord is positive and productive, but Satan peddles his fear to bring dysfunction. The Lord Jesus said... 'My sheep hear my voice, and they follow me...they do not follow the voice of the stranger' (John 10:5-27). Do you recall 'stranger-danger'? Parents warn their children so they don't fall for the cunning deception that a predator could trick the child with.

Jesus warms about listening to the enemy's voice. We hear the Lord's voice as we study and get to know His Word. The Bible is not to be read as a novel or literature - it's much deeper (1 Corinthians 2:14). "The Word became flesh and dwelt amongst us" (John 1:14). The Word is a Person - Jesus, and we get to know Him by looking into His eyes -His Word. It's a relationship that no one can take away from you friend. And the more you grow to know Him, the less you will fall for the stranger's fearful voice. Jesus exposed the devil's character - a murderer, thief, liar, and a deceiver (John 8:44). Satan uses dirty tactics to pull people under. Lies, slander, accusation, shame, manipulation, aggression, and strife: to name a few. The Psalm above is quite short, but punchy. There's growing up required to live an overcoming life. Pride keeps us from addressing areas of weakness in character, but facing the Truth brings growth. Often our struggles are rooted in some underlying fear.

This Psalm pictures the growth of a child. A tiny baby has a cry that is piercing — when he or she is hungry - you better have that milk ready because they want it NOW! But as the child grows and gets understanding, learning to feed him or herself, they start to relax a little, gaining some patience and self-control. Fear of not being fed isn't as big a problem as when they were newborn - they know where the food is now, and how to help themselves. We must grow spiritually as well as physically to succeed in life. Sure, there may have been difficulties in the past, but by humbling oneself in repentance before God, and believing His Word there is huge breakthrough (John 14:1; Mark 5:36). No longer do we need to succumb to the fear and lies of the enemy, but instead we learn to trust that God will work everything out for good - as we live in obedience to Him. His loving voice brings us into safe pastures (Psalm 23): "...He leads me by still waters".
