Track Reopening Provides a Much-Needed Sports Facility for Munster

Munster Technological University officially reopened its athletics track at the MTU Arena in Bishopstown following resurfacing works. The eight-lane running track is now up to international standard and is ready to welcome local, national and global athletes. The reopening of the track sees the return of a muchneeded sports facility for athletes across Munster and has reopened in time for the 70th Cork City Sports event on the 9th of July.

The track was officially reopened by Thomas Byrne T.D., Minister of State for Sport, Physical Education and the Gaeltacht. Also in attendance were CEO of Athletics Ireland, Hamish Adams; President of MTU, Professor Maggie Cusack; MTU Vice President Finance & Operations, Paul Gallagher; Chair of MTU Governing Body, Jimmy Deenihan, and President of MTU Students' Union Cork, Richard Noonan.

Speaking at the official opening in Cork, Minister Byrne, said: "As Sport Minister, I am delighted that my Department was in a position to provide substantial funding for this wonderful athletics project, which is of regional significance. The opening of Phase 2 of the MTU project also arrives at an ideal time for all fans of athletics in Ireland, following Ireland's historic performance at the recent European Athletics Championships in Rome, and with the Olympics and Paralympics games just around the corner, they will no doubt inspire more people to use facilities such as this. As a Government, we are determined to invest in our athletics infrastructure and the significant funding allocated to the MTU project is a further demonstration of this commitment. I want to also wish the very best

to all athletes using this facility tomorrow as part of Cork City Sports International meet."

Patrick O'Donovan T.D., Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, commented: "These are exciting times at MTU. I am delighted to see the completion of the athletics track upgrade and this, along with the recently opened sports arena, will provide for exceptional athletics facilities in the Cork region. I am also delighted that there are some major infrastructure developments that are ongoing in MTU Cork. These include a new Learning Resource Centre, the upgrade and retrofit of the Melbourne Building, and the ongoing plans to renovate and extend Blocks D and A under the Technological Sector Strategic Projects Fund programme. This shows the commitment of my government to provide the required infrastructure for learners and staff in our Technological Universities which will allow them to continue to be key economic drivers in their regions."

The track reopening was carried out in partnership with Athletics Ireland. Hamish Adams, CEO of Athletics Ireland, said, "Athletes in Munster and beyond will be overjoyed to see the MTU Athletics Track reopen. The region has been lacking a high-quality athletics facility for some time now, so this state-of-the-art running track will be indispensable to them."

MTU President, Professor Maggie Cusack, welcomed the track reopening, commenting: "Following a number of delays, including record bad weather last July and August, it's wonderful to see the track reopen for the benefit of everyone from local sports clubs to

athletes preparing for the Paris Olympics. This is a very special day for athletics in general but also for MTU and the wider community."

MTU's Vice President Finance & Operations, Paul Gallagher, added: "Our athletics facilities have come on leaps and bounds in the last few years. The funding through the Large Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund has been transformative in enhancing MTU's sporting amenities. This track will be a fantastic resource for our students and all of those who come to MTU for stateof-the-art sports grounds."

MTU's Governing Body Chair, Jimmy Deenihan, commented, "We are delighted to celebrate the reopening of the MTU Athletics Track today just in time for tomorrow's 70th Cork City Sports. The reopening of the track is a testament to the successful relationship we've had with Athletics Ireland and our local City and County Councils and Cork County Board Athletic Association of Ireland (AAI). It's really a great asset of international quality for sporting talent across Munster."

The improvements to the athletics track were funded through the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media's Large-Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund, with these works marking the completion of phase 2. Phase 1 saw the completion of the MTU Sports Arena last year. Phase 3 is expected to see the development of a high-performance indoor athletics training centre, which will involve an approximate 5,000m² expansion of the MTU Arena.








BROOMHILL VINTAGE CLUB COACHFORD FAMILY DAY

Registration for the run takes place at the Aghabullogue GAA grounds with cyclists pedalling their way to Peake and Dripsey before returning to the Coachford village. The bikes, dating from the 1920s, are a real challenge to master. Registration opens at 4pm and is free. Everyone with a High Nelly is welcome to dress up in their costumes of yesteryear and travel to Coachford on Saturday July 13th. Later Saturday evening the festival will host the annual Broomhill Dog show which is always very popular family event. The registration opens at 6pm at the Aghabullogue GAA grounds. A big show returns to the festival on Saturday night with the Queen of the Festival Competition taking place in the Coachford Community Hall. Fourteen Queens representing local businesses will take to the stage to entertain and delight the crowd. Each queen will be attended by fourteen fabulous escorts. A great night is promised. Doors open at 8:30pm. This year the vintage show day on Sunday July 14th will commemorate the introduction of two milestone tractor series. The Broomhill Club will celebrate the 60th anniversary of the introduction of the Ford Pre-Force tractors and the Massey Ferguson 100 series tractors. 



MOUNT MASSEY HOUSE (1920-21) ITS BURNING AND COMPENSATION CASE

Masseytown is an area of Macroom that developed around Mount Massey House. Though part of the town it was distinct from it too. It had its own aristocracy and its own fairs, which alternated with Macroom's.

Fairs were good earners as a toll was charged for participation. Timmy 'Cooper' Kelleher held sportsdays in the Fairfield in the late 1950s/early 1960s. Now, the field is home to houses and The Family Resource Centre.


Macroom's anthem is 'Mountmassey, The Flower of Macroom' and there are different theories as to its origin. Mount Massey House was the seat of the Massey/Massey-Hutchinson family and was very beautiful at various points; the Masseys were granted lands in Limerick in the 17th century after service to Oliver Cromwell whose his vicious Irish campaign still lingers in the Irish psyche. However, it was not until Hugh Massey married Alice Hutchinson in the late 18th century that family members settled in Macroom. It was about then that they were granted the rights to hold fairs etc. Gradually, they acquired land and at one stage, owned more than 13,000 acres in the Ballinagree, Carriganima and other areas. However, the family's fortunes waxed and waned - for a more extensive account please see Marcella Ní Chríodain's masterly presentation (Nov. 2022), available on Macroom History Group's website. Stephen Brady's 'The Briar of Life' references various members.

Because of the catastrophic effects of The Great Irish Famine, the House was used as one of two Macroom auxiliary workhouses (from about 1847-'50). An 'inmate' (as residents were called) was murdered there by attendants - killed because he had broken into food stores. The Buckley Family, Derryleigh, stayed there before the parents, Tadhg ant Cáit, escaped following the death of their two children. After reaching home, their bodies were found the following morning with her feet clasped to his breast - his effort to keep her feet warm. The story was first recorded by an t-Athair Peadar Ó Laoghaire in 'Mo Scéal Féin' and subsequently became the inspiration for Eavan Boland's poem 'Quarantine' and Declan O'Rourke's song 'Poor Boy's Shoes'. The Massey family's fortunes continued to decline and the 'coup de grâce' came

when it was burned in December 1920.

The relatively short War of Independence (21 January 1920 –11 July 1921) was at its height when Mount Massey House was burned. Kilmichael Ambush had taken place three weeks before, on 28 November 1920, just a week after Croke Park's Bloody Sunday and a week before the burning of Cork city. Locally, due to the efforts of Catholic Dean Higgins and Church of Ireland rector, Reverend Brady, and Lady Ardilaun's acquaintance with General Tudor, head of the Auxiliaries, Macroom was spared after Kilmichael Ambush. Charlie Browne's house, New Street was the only Macroom house torched at that time and even then, a benign British Officer helped to quench the fire. Other reprisals took place around Macroom such as the burning of houses near the ambush site, the killing of an innocent man at Kilmichael Post Office and of Canon Magnier in Dunmanway. As was their wont, the Macroom IRA, though not directly involved in the ambush, melted into the background; in the fervid prevailing atmosphere, their volunteers were very unlikely to mount any action in Macroom or surrounds at that time. An indicator of tension in Macroom was that shops and businesses were closed and shuttered and Macroom Boys National School recorded that no pupil attended the week after the ambush.

The Evening Echo reported on Tuesday 21 December 1920 that Mount Massey had been 'burned to the ground' the previous night. Mr Massey, the owner, was arrested by the Auxiliary police and charged, the accusation not specified.

The article noted that the house was 'historic', had been occupied by the military and it was rumoured that the Auxiliaries were to move in. The house and grounds had hosted band promenades in association with the Cork and Macroom Railway Line. On the following day, The Irish Independent confirmed the burning and added that sensationally H.H. Massey, the owner and his travelling companion, Mr Aitken, an inlaw, 'had been taken into custody'. A few years before, Massey had 'attained his majority', that is he became legally competent. Following the fire, Massey lodged a compensation claim for £10,000, heard in Macroom Quarter Sessions on Saturday 15 January 2021. The compensation claimed is worth about €662,000 today.


The Cork Examiner 17 January 1921 gives a long account of what occurred at the hearing. Solicitors and barristers represented the various clients. Key witnesses were Cornelius Kelleher, a nearby tenant; Browne, the Mount Massey estate caretaker; Massey, the claimant and Captain Bannerman, an Auxiliary Captain. The judge cross-examined. Kelleher and his sons were renting the land from Massey. They had previously been falsely accused of, among other things, sending up a Versey flare – these had been used in World War One as warnings etc. When it was obvious to locals that the military was about to quit Mount Massey – there since May 1918, the Kellehers strongly suspected (as most Masseytown residents did) that 'something might happen' and took the precaution of informing their solicitor, Mr Creed. Creed in turn informed the Macroom RIC and the Auxiliaries, based in Macroom Castle, who wrote to Massey about the concerns expressed. The Kellehers' rationale was presumably to prevent any event and to absolve themselves from blame.

Browne (no first name was cited), the caretaker, visited the House on the 20h December, the day of the fire, at midday and at 5.00 p.m. The property was fine on both occasions but he noted a back window had been broken by 5.00 p.m.

In Massey's evidence it emerged that he and Aitken had been in Macroom about a week before the fire and had stayed in William's (now the Castle) Hotel. Because they were non-residents and the tense prevailing atmosphere, Auxiliary

officers interviewed them. The officers found them inebriated, insolent and evasive - observations denied by Massey and Aitken. The two were ordered out of town by 7.00 p.m. The duo returned on the day of the fire, this time armed with a military permit. They again stayed in William's Hotel and went to see the Kellehers in the evening. The ongoing lease was discussed but oddly outside of the house. While discussing the matter, Cornelius Kelleher, the father, Massey and Aitken smelled smoke and the house was on fire. As it was too dangerous to intervene themselves, they informed the RIC and The Auxiliaries. However it was too late and the House was destroyed. Following the fire Massey and Aitken were arrested on suspicion of arson. Massey said that when they reported the matter to the Castle and that a Colonel Smith had left orders that 'nothing should be done'.

Bannerman's evidence seemed crucial. Incidentally, Bannerman was the Auxiliary Officer who organised help to douse the fire at Charlie Browne's house on 29 November, the day after Kilmichael Ambush. In the search of their rooms in William's after the fire, notification from the authorities, was found informing Massey of the military's impending vacation of Mount Massey. Bannerman flatly contradicted Massey's testimony on Colonel's Smith's instructions. Apparently, Massey had spoken to a sentry. Massey had received a hand-delivered note informing him of the military's departure.


The judge commented that police evidence

in the case had '(T)thrown a lurid light on the matter, and not to the advantage of Mr Massey'. In summing-up he said 'that that there was a strong motive in the case, and if Mr Massey was innocent in the case, his conduct had brought suspicion on himself'. The judge quoted the interests of the ratepayers in footing the bill. Despite his reservations the judge awarded Massey £7,355 (or about €423,000 today). To reflect his misgivings, he further refused to give the claimant expenses and costs and compensations for several items outside the principal item.



Think Globally, Act locally - Could Our Gearagh Help Save the Curlew?





Hi Chris Barrett here, with information on an iconic Irish bird. Today we have the good fortune to learn from a regular and valued contributor, Tom Jordan.

The Eurasian Curlew Numenius arquata was once a common feature of the Irish landscape and its plaintive call was very familiar. Lists of common farmland birds almost always included curlew and the Schools Collection of Irish folklore contains a typical reference from Ballydehob: "The curlew's nest is supposed to be never found because St. Patrick blessed the Curlew when he was asleep by the bank of the river, the curlew saved him from being drowned."

A brown speckled bird with long legs and a distinctive hooked bill, the curlew is Ireland's largest wader. Its call gives it its name, which may derive from the old French curliu, related to courir, to run. Certainly curlews have inspired a lot of poetry and song, which gives them iconic status. WB Yeats seems to have prophetically penned the lines, "O curlew, cry no more in the air, Or only to the water in the West", because 98% of Ireland's breeding curlews have disappeared since the 1970s.

Alongside other ground-nesting species like lapwing, golden plover, grey partridge, red grouse, corncrake, hen harrier, snipe and skylark, curlew numbers have dwindled dramatically in the past five decades. The advent of high-performance rye-grasses and innovative early silage harvests sounded a death knell for many of these birds. Traditional hay-making was a slow-moving, late-summer activity. This allowed diverse meadow plants and insects to thrive, so

ground-nesting birds had plenty to eat and enough time to fledge. The first silage harvesters devastated these meadowlands, robbing the Irish countryside of much of its birdsong and colour.

At the same time widespread landscape changes occurred. These included drainage and/or afforestation of wetlands, uplands and rough pastures, large-scale pesticide usage, overgrazing and excessive burning. This has vastly reduced suitable areas for ground-nesting birds. Political indifference, or unwillingness to stymie agricultural intensification, has allowed the problem of declining bird numbers to fester long after it was first observed.

Only in recent years has the biodiversity crisis become a topic of discussion in Ireland's media. Debates about how to address this daunting challenge rage, with farming and forestry representatives sometimes stoking unnecessary fears among their members. They forget that the terrible cost of inaction will be widespread extinctions, which presumably nobody wants to see. Any reversal of ongoing declines requires habitat restoration as a first step. This need not be controversial or economically costly. Finding creative ways in which to balance the needs of stakeholders is imperative, and farmer-led initiatives like the Bride Project and Burren Life have already demonstrated scaleable models for success.

While migrating curlews are still a common winter visitor - it is possible to see them in coastal and watery reaches like the Gearagh – native Irish curlews are rare indeed. When a report from 2017 warned that their extinction was imminent, it led to the creation of the Curlew Conservation Programme (CCP) that year. The CCP worked with landowners to protect nine surviving breeding grounds from disturbance and predation, while using an innovative 'head-starting' technique, whereby one egg from each nest was hand-reared by National Parks staff and later released to supplement adult bird numbers.

In its final report in 2023, the CCP indicated mixed results. Curlew numbers remained stable at 48 breeding pairs in 2023, two more than when the scheme was launched in 2017. This was seen as a success because the scheme had managed to halt a sharp downward trend in breeding curlew numbers. With the CCP scheme now closed, the role of protecting curlews and other ground-nesting birds has been handed over to ACRES, the latest agrienvironment scheme, and other similar initiatives. It remains to be seen whether or not the Department of Agriculture has either the expertise or the interest, to ensure that land owners are sufficiently incentivised to save endangered species by giving them what they need to survive. As the final CCP report ominously concluded: "Ultimately, conservation efforts have come at the 11th hour (or beyond) and landscape scale changes are urgently required if there is to be a future for Curlew in Ireland."



An electric afternoon at GAA headquarters, culminated with Cork earning an All-Ireland SHC final berth.

Limerick, admirably courageous until the bitter end, responded on numerous occasions throughout an absorbing encounter, but Cork still found a way to survive. A repeat of the 2013 national decider now

From the first whistle the Drumcondra venue rocked. Cork went 1-8 to 0-6 ahead by the 20th minute, but Limerick replied to lead by two at the interval.

Then in the third quarter Cork enjoyed a productive burst, accumulating a seven point advantage before Limerick came thundering back. It was that sort of game, but Cork had the answers.

Level at 0-6 each after 14 minutes, Cork subsequently struck 1-2 without reply. Séamus Harnedy, industrious and inspirational, rifled over a point that was quickly followed by a goal from the brilliant Brian Hayes.

The Barrs man rattled the Limerick net following a Shane Barrett assist. When Hayes added a point, Cork were five to the good.

What happened next? Limerick struck five points in a row. Tom Morrissey, Diarmaid Byrnes, Cathal O'Neill, Cian Lynch, and the splendid Aaron Gillane contributed scores to restore parity.

During that enterprising Limerick spell, Cork custodian Patrick Collins made an excellent save to thwart Gillane.

It continued at a decent clip, Hayes pointing for Cork, but two Gillane efforts were sandwiched either side of a Reidy score. Limerick were hugely effective in the second quarter, eventually departing armed with a 0-16 to 1-11 lead.

In the 12 minutes after the restart, though, Cork regained composure. Demonstrating real class, Cork were landing immaculate scores. Darragh Fitzgibbon, Patrick Horgan, Barrett, Alan Connolly, Declan Dalton,

GAA NEWS and Hayes delivered in style as Cork pulled 1-21 to

0-19 clear. Gillane lofted over a point for Limerick, but Cork were motoring smoothly. Harnedy thumped over two beauties with Horgan nailing a free, ensuring

the gap was a sizeable 1-24 to 0-20 with 19 minutes remaining.

Limerick ploughed on, with substitutes Shane O'Brien and Adam English occupying central roles in the comeback mission.

The margin was paired down to four in the 62nd minute, but points from Horgan (free) and Hayes, following another Harnedy contribution had Cork 1-28 to 0-25 in front.

In the dying embers Gillane (free), O'Brien, English, and Gearóid Hegarty registered points for Limerick, but sufficient Cork damage had been inflicted. Limerick's greatness since 2018 meant that this was a cherished win for Cork, who return to the Jones Road theatre in a fortnight.

Managers Comments:

Cork manager Pat Ryan praised Limerick for bringing hurling to 'a new level' following the absorbing All-Ireland SHC Semi-Final at Croke Park.

"I suppose first of all I have to pay tribute to Limerick, what champions they've been since 2018," Ryan remarked. "I mean, what they've given to the GAA itself, to the Limerick public.

"It was '73 when they won their last All-Ireland before the lads got involved and what they've achieved, it's absolutely superb.

"They've brought the game to a new level and they're testing all of us to get better and to bring things to a new level and raise standards both on and off the field and look, we were lucky to get over the

Ryan was adamant that Cork would deliver a dynamic display. "I didn't have any doubt that we weren't going to perform today, to be honest with you," he added. "You could see it in training, obviously it was a lot made of maybe lacklustre performances against Offaly and Dublin, but look, from where we came from after losing the first two games in the championship, that took an awful lot of energy, emotional and physical energy to get over Limerick and Tipperary in those games.

"There was a lot of preparation needed to get us back into the championship and look, we've driven on from there."

With Cork and Clare contesting the All-Ireland SHC decider, Ryan acknowledges that there will be a significant buzz in the counties for the next fortnight. "The crowd that was up here, there's going to be fantastic excitement in Cork over the next two weeks and there's going to be fantastic excitement in Clare,"

"It's going to be hard to keep the hype down in both counties. There hasn't been a different Ireland champion since 2019. So, look, there's going to be fierce excitement.

"From our point of view, we'll just have to do our best to keep it down. I said this when I got into the job, fellas asked me what would be the success of this job? If you're a Cork man, you have to win an All-Ireland. Simple as that.

"If you don't do it, it's not successful. And look, there's been fellas before me that have done fantastic things and got to All-Ireland finals and have been very unlucky in those days. But look, we judge ourselves in Cork on winning All-Irelands so we need to get back to that."







"For God watches how people live; He sees everything they do. No darkness is thick enough to hide the wicked from His eyes" (Job 34:23).


Welcome back dear student one of the translations of the Name of God in the Bible is EL ROI — the God Who sees (Genesis 16:13). As young children we were often told 'Holy God is watching you'. Often it was enough shock and awe to turn the child back in the fear of the Lord. Sadly, it was mis-used by some parents and leaders who, having no fear of God themselves, didn't live righteously and hurt others by their actions. Their hypocrisy turned many from believing in God, for people, especially children, recognise the authentic. God does see everything though! "The Lord is watching everywhere, keeping His eye on both the evil and the good" (Proverbs 15:3). As we studied recently, God examines the heart while human nature focuses only on the outward appearance. A funny decorative sign often seen in homes says... 'Remember - as far as anyone thinks, we are a nice normal family - you better keep it that way!' Folks may be behaving one way in private but project a different persona in public. God is interested in our character becoming like His, 'from Glory to Glory' (2 Corinthians 3:18). What is God's character like? Truthful; Holy - Righteous and Just; Faithful; Ever-Loving (Kind, Merciful, Patient, Gentle); Wise; Humble and Unchanging. How do we become like Him? By living His Word.

Obedience is not a popular word, but it is the requirement that Jesus said shows we love Him - "If you love Me, you will obey My commandments" (John 14:15; John 15:10). We can talk all we want, but where the rubber hits the road is in our behaviour - which displays our character. "For the Lord sees clearly what man does, examining every path he takes (Proverbs 5:21). Where is character developed? In private. What we do in private will define who we are in public — for good or bad. There is discipline needed in developing character. But the flesh wants to bypass character formation, craving pleasure instead. "For I know that nothing good lives in me, that is, in my flesh; for I have the desire to do what is good, but I cannot carry it out" (Romans 7:18). Paul bared his soul here - telling how he tried to do what is right at various times, but his flesh failed him. All looked lost as he cries out - "oh what a miserable person I am! Who will free me from this life that is dominated by sin and death? Thank God! The answer is in Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 7:24-25). Confessing and believing in Jesus as Christ his personal Messiah, is what delivered Paul, and it's the same for you and me (Romans 10:9-10). We need the Saviour because we can never make ourselves acceptable to God without the shed Blood of His Son Jesus. Knowing Jesus, rather than knowing about Him, is the key: for when we truly know Him, we love Him and want to please Him, and to be with Him.

The discipline we learn in obedience to the Word of God shapes us to live like Jesus. Then we become vessels of God's Holy Spirit Power that He can use to bring His Life, His Peace, and His Joy everywhere we go. We live the same way in public as we do in private, with nothing to hide - radiating the Love of God in all we do (1 Corinthians 10:31; Colossians 3:23-25). Sinful flesh no longer has a hold over us, so we can bring Glory to God in all we do and say. Freedom!


