

Back in 1991 Macroom scored 181 points out of 250 in the Tidy Towns Competition. This now makes for an interesting read and is intriguing to see how far Macroom has come over the last 35 years.

Judges then commented on the volume of traffic going through the town, which is now thankfully a thing of the past. We were commanded on our tightening of litter control around the town environs and most commercial buildings were well presented. The restoration of the graveyard at the former church of Ireland was highly commended with the comment that the former church itself was a most impressive piece of architecture. The project that year was the redevelopment of the square and was a very worthwhile project. The judges recommended the removal of the wirescape and the out of scale lighting standards and replace these with lamp posts.

This is a famine memorial and a seating area to commemorate those who could not get into the poor house at the time and camped by the river, some of whom died there and whose bodies were taken to Carrigastyra and buried in a mass grave. This memorial is being funded by the proceeds of book by Sean and Maire Mac Suibhne, 'Muskerry through the Mac Suibhne Lens' which was sold in many outlets in the Lee Valley Region. The current work involves building a proper capping on the existing stone wall and screening off this development from the Industrial premises immediately behind. The council are planning a new riverside pathway from the car park here, past the memorial and down beyond the entrance to the Fairy Garden and this will be a major asset when completed.

To mark the ending of our academic year

(September 2023 - June 2024) C.D.Y.S Adult learners spent some hours exploring and learning about the bird life (resident and migratory) that live, forage, rest, nest and breed along the River Sullane. Our Dippers (a unique fish hunting species) that swim under water foraging the river bed. Swifts like boomerangs skimmed the water surface in search of insects. We enjoyed watching acrobatic swallows and dancing grey wagtails also.

Nosey Rooks accompanied us upriver as we made our way to the weirs from the new bridge as did our Lón dubh (Blackbird). Kingfishers hid from view. Shoals of Trout were visible in the clear water. We identified typical river bank vegetation including Sallies, Alders, Ash, flowering plants like Cow Parsley, Hemlock and Water-dropwort and discussed their benefits to pollinators.

Upon reaching the weirs we had a very pleasant picnic under a glorious solstice eve sun (Wednesday June 19th) absorbing the beauty and meaning of our surroundings and the "Sally River".

We would like to thank Ted Cooke for educating our learners, the G.A.A. and the trustees, for their support of our learners since we commenced working with Ted.

We would like to say a huge thank you to Karen O'Callaghan who after 10 years with C.D.Y.S Good Lives Project has decided to move on. Her work and dedication to the project and to the students during her time here was immense. We wish her all the best for the future.

### MEET ME AT THE GRAVEYARD PART 3. - MOVIDDY AND CROOKSTOWN

On Saturday, August 17th, the KHAA will continue the popular series of tours to local cemeteries with a visit to Moviddy Graveyard in Crookstown, one of the most historic sites in the district.

The ruined church within (St Helen's) was used for worship by members of the Church of Ireland until the early 1960s. In the attached graveyard lies the remains of people from both the Church of Ireland and Roman Catholic religions and is unusual as the graves are together and not in two different areas as is often the case.

The talk will be given by Síle Healy Hunt who has



written extensively on Moviddy and the families buried there and is sure to be informative and entertaining. On this occasion, the graveyard talk will be preceded by a short walking tour of Crookstown given by local people who will enlighten listeners with stories such as the Olympic medal winner who was once proprietor of what is now Clifford's Bar; the restoration of Clodagh Castle in the 19th Century: history of local businesses and the autobiography of a well known singer that described Crookstown pubs as having the best singsongs in Cork!!

Join us in the carpark of Crookstown Hall at 3.30pm on Saturday 17th August for an interesting afternoon. Event will take place rain or shine. See you there!

### MACROOM COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS GROUP OVERVIEW

The Macroom Community First Responders (CFR) group, established in March of this year, The group is made up of local volunteers that live in the Macroom area and coordinated by local paramedic Seán Delaney.

They have made significant progress and aim to be operational by August. This voluntary organisation collaborates with the National Ambulance Service to provide crucial emergency response service to 999 calls in the community. Group members are trained in essential life-saving techniques such as CPR and managing choking incidents at present.

### **Operational Goals and Training**

Once operational, the group will respond to live emergency 999/112 calls, initially focusing on cardiac arrest and choking incidents. With additional training, the group plans to expand its range of emergency responses. The CFR operates under CRITICAL with the guidance of Edward Walsh (head of operations) This is a charitable organisation originally founded as Irish Community Rapid Response in 2009. In 2019, CRITICAL launched Ireland's first and only charity air ambulance, and in 2023, they shifted their focus to expanding the network of Community First Responders across Ireland and rebranded as CRITICAL continuing their work with ground-based services, including CRITICAL

### & Enhanced Care Doctors

Member Qualifications and Public Engagement



All CFR (Community First Responders) members are Garda vetted, have passed many comprehensive assessments, and have undergone extensive scenariobased training to ensure preparedness for emergency situations that may arise. In March, a public meeting was held to discuss the group's objectives, operational procedures, training programs, organisational structure, and funding needs. The meeting was wellattended, resulting in widespread community interest and active recruitment, at this time the group chose to come under the CRITICAL CFR initiative.

### **Training Programs and Certification**

Members are divided into groups based on their

training progress. The training program includes both online and in-person components. Online courses cover topics such as PPE usage, stress management, infection control, and child protection, with certificates awarded upon completion. In-person training involves hands-on practice of CPR and choking interventions for adults, children, and infants. CRITICAL has generously donated Adult/Paediatric/Neo-Natel mannequins, two AED trainers, and a Samsung tablet to aid in this training.

### **Ongoing Training and Future Plans**

Members engage in continuous training to keep their skills current. Training scenarios include the recovery position, resuscitation, patient assessment, managing chest pain, stroke response, risk assessment, and infection control.

### Conclusion

The Macroom Community First Responders group is poised to make a significant impact on emergency response in the community.

Through rigorous training and strong community support, the group is well-prepared to provide lifesaving assistance when needed.

We as a group would like to acknowledge and thank The Castle Hotel Macroom for their continued Support in facilitating our training needs and to our dedicated member Lisa Manning to making this article possible.

Michael Dan Lucey, Four Mile Bridge (or Inchinashangane), has recently been selected for the Junior World Rowing Championships in, Ontario, Canada in August, rowing in a coxed Men's (U-19) X4, an international rowing event.

He is a member of Lee Valley Rowing Club (LVRC) and has achieved this call-up because of outstanding results, the fruit of talent, hard work and dedication. Both of Michael's parents are well known locally; Frank is a dentist and works in Bandon and was originally from Railway View, and Olivia lived at the Millstreet Cross and works in banking. Michael attended primary schools in Macroom and is now a pupil of Presentation, Cork; he will sit his Leaving Certificate in 2025. His first name is a combination of those of his grandfathers.

Rowing is not a sport readily identifiable with Macroom; apart from Padraigh Duinín, a Coolcower neighbour, no other Macroom rower comes to mind. Especially since the initial Olympic success of Paul and Gary O'Donovan, rowing has increasingly entered our consciousness and hopefully even more so in the next fortnight - the Olympics. Rowing and boxing are the sports that are those most likely to yield Irish medals. Natalie Long, Coachford and Holly Davis, Ballincollig, fellow members of LVRC, will represent Ireland in Paris Olympics and I wish them the best of luck. They are part of the Women's 4s squad. Their selection is a marker of the success of LVRC.

Rowing in Ireland has a long history. 'Currachs', 'neamhógs', hookers and other boats have been raced in Ireland since time immemorial and the Dingle, Baltimore and Galway Regattas/Boat Races are descendants. Cork Harbour Boat Club held a regatta in 1870. Irish rowing was initially formally organised in Ireland in 1899 at a Dublin Hotel meeting and has survived since. Even before that Trinity (University) Boat Club was a founder member of the initial British London Metropolitan Board which codified rowing rules and begot the worldfamous Oxford-Cambridge Annual Boat Race, Henly Regatta etc. Though always there, it has only since recent rowing Olympic, World and European successes that the sport here has become so strong. The GAA, soccer, golf and rugby are the 'big beasts' of Irish sport - this Sunday (21 July '24) 80,000 will watch live the Cork-Clare All-Ireland Hurling Final, and will be joined by several million television watchers - but many minor-interest sports in Ireland have never been stronger. This is reflected locally by the existence of a Macroom Cricket Club. It is in this context that Michael's rowing achievement is so meritorious.

Lee Valley Rowing Club was founded in 1989 and is based in Farran Wood. Nearby is the Irish National Rowing Centre, in Inniscarra. In its short time it has achieved remarkable success and having 2024 Olympians is a crowning glory. The presence of the Centre close-by was a great stimulus. However, Shandon, Cork, UCC and Lee Boat or Rowing Clubs were Cork city predecessors and there are clubs in Bantry and, of course, the remarkably successful Skibbereen and in other places. Michael's team-mates in Canada will be Evan O'Byrne (St. Michael's), Mattias Cogan and Dominic Casey (both Skibbereen). The cox is Luke Fitzgerald (Castleconnell). The opening ceremony is 17 August and they will race over the course of the week, with the final on Sunday 25 August.

Though a lover of several sports Michael Dan, with difficulty, opted for rowing: "I realised that there was no way I could dedicate the time to play rugby and row competitively. In my wildest dreams, I never thought I'd be selected to row in a World Championship, wearing the green. It's a testament to my coach Mick O'Callaghan who has been wonderful to me; without him and everyone at Lee Valley Rowing Club I wouldn't be going to Canada. We are lucky to have such a great facility so close to Macroom. There's a great atmosphere in the club, and the support and good wishes that I have received since my selection are fantastic". Rowing has taught him self-discipline and dedication, as well as what sacrifice is necessary to be successful. He normally trains six days a week; now, that is gone to seven days at the National Centre. Living with his team-mates for five weeks pre-competition will enhance for focus, camaraderie and bonding.

In what spare time he has, Michael Dan likes to play the guitar, electric and acoustic. In this, he follows in his father's football steps, who himself was an accomplished guitarist. Further, his Dad won Minor Mid-Cork and County football medals with Macroom (St. Colman's).

Congratulations to Michael Dan on his selection and becoming Macroom's latest international and Best Wishes in Canada.





# Dont ditch radio from new cars

# Ní Mhurchú to ask car manufacturers

Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has echoed calls by the Independent Broadcasters of Ireland to ensure that car manufacturers do not remove radios from all new cars that are produced. The moves come in the wake of some car manufacturers replacing the humble radio with internet only options on the dashboards of new cars.

According to Ní Mhurchú, radio should continue to be available to those who wish to listen to it and she pointed to the fact that 41% of people listen to radio whilst in the car. She argues that taking radio away would limit consumer choice, force people to use subscription services only and have a negative impact on broadcasters who are providing an effective news, music and current affairs service.

"This is an unnecessary move on behalf of the car manufacturers. Many consumers listen to radio in their cars on a daily basis. They get news, local weather alerts, traffic and local information and music. Why force people to listen to subscription only options when we should be providing the option of both to car drivers. All I am saying is that manufactures should continue to offer customers the choice - as they have always done"

"I am today calling on car manufacturers to see sense. This should not require legislation at EU level but if it does, then this is something I would investigate in cooperation with my colleagues in the European Parliament"

Ní Mhurchú pointed to the fact that radio in Ireland has always been free to listen to and should continue to be so going forward. She maintains that Irish radio stations provide a vital service for the community and in the fight against disinformation.

Ní Mhurchú said that car manufacturers should be giving their customers the choice to listen to radio if they wish and pointed to a move in the US Senate in 2023 where a bipartisan group of federal lawmakers introduced a bill forcing car manufacturers to retain AM frequencies in new vehicles at no additional cost to consumers.

"Nobody wants to go down the route of legislation here but the hope is that car manufacturers will engage with organisations like the Independent Broadcasters of Ireland and their colleagues in Europe, the European Broadcasting Union. The European Parliament has a mandate to protect consumers and as lawmakers, we will act on that mandate should it prove necessary.

# MACROOM WILDLIFE WITH ST. COLEMAN'S **COMMUNITY AND TED COOK**

A blustery Thursday morning provided the perfect setting for a few hours with Ted.

Beginning our journey at the Courthouse Ted pointed out Fairy Toadflax, Rustyback and Maidenhair ferns growing in the cracks of the

Making our way along the riverbank we encountered Valerian (which has pink and white flowers). Valerian provides modern medicine with the chemical active molecule in Valium.

Hogweed plant, which was cultivated for feeding pigs is widespread along the bank.

From the New Footbridge to the Weirs we recorded, from the same botanical family Queens Anne's lace, Cow Parsley and Hedge Parsley which are important for pollinating insects such as Butterflies, Bees and Hover flies.

Across both banks Brambles blossom in full bloom. Bramble flowers for 16 weeks and is full of pollen and nectar.

We are looking forward to collecting juicy blackberries later in the summer. Of course there's no escaping the "dreaded" stinging nettles, however, they are a great source of iron and its other name is the Hungry Gap. It played a big role during the Famine in providing people with food.



Butterflies also love nettles.

We encountered Ragged Robin mixed in with Dandelions in full flower making a spectacular sight.

Standing on the bridge below the Golf Clubhouse and looking down river, we spotted Dippers, Swifts (who will leave us for Africa shortly), Grey Heron but our Kingfishers nesting on the South bank declined honouring us with their magic.

Many water based plants including Crow's Foot, Hemlock, Water Drop Wort, Water Parsnip and Watercress were noted.

Several wild grasses such as Yorkshire Fog and Cocksfoot also featured.

Elderflower in full bloom was observed in the Castle Demesne across from the Town Park.

We recalled our 2023 trip and were able to note the antioxidant properties and the richness of Vitamin C which elderflowers possess.

Strong smelling Wound Wort and Ragwort were noted along the banks. The word "Wort" derives from ancient Saxon meaning a plant of medical significance.

Taking in lunch at the Weirs, after our 3 hour wildlife exploration in the fine "sea air" which whetted our appetite, we met Mary and her lovely dog taking a walk.

Making our way back to town we learned of the importance of dead standing trees in providing habitat for Ireland's most endangered insects.

It's amazing to think that each of the named plants and animals, themselves alone, are entitled to call themselves native to Ireland and have been here since the Ice Age, 10,000 years ago.

We arrived at McEgan College, tired but full of wonderment.

A final treat - the lovely display of Lady Ardilaun roses in full bloom outside the college.

Go raibh míle maith agat, on behalf of St. Colman's House.





The local lads put up a great battle in the county junior B final but unfortunately came up against a very strong physical team from Buttevant. We are very proud of their performance, especially considering they are coming from an area traditionally not known for its hurling.

# PÉIST: also known as serpent, worm, eel, river monster

The péist's return is a project of Friends of the Dripsey Rivers (FODR), a community group concerned with all aspects of the Dripsey rivers, particularly the little monsters that live in it.

The FODR group grew out of an on-line course run by IRD Duhallow during covid. Since then the members have spent a lot of time in rivers and under bridges, kick-sampling to assess the water quality. This is done by seeing what populations of little monsters are living in the particular spot of the river being sampled. But here is a problem: the river monsters are very small, just a centimeter or two, so it is hard to see what they are like, or even how many bits and pieces they have got. The group therefore started making bigger versions of some of the monsters the flattened mayfly larva, the stonefly, the green caddis larva - enlarged to human size, wearable versions capable of running about scaring people.

These monsters have become part of the educational branch of FODR, which also includes more serious activities such as producing a booklet about the river, and commissioning an ecologist to do a survey of the catchment to inform future work.

The monsters will appear at various points along the Lee as the Péist Returns. This project is based on the story of St Finbarre who banished a troublesome monster from the lake at Gougane Barra, and its

wriggling and writhing carved a channel through the land all the way from Gougane to the sea, thus forming the bed of the river Lee. (See the current Crawford exhibition 'Source to Sea', though it is a bit short on monsters.) In Finbarre's time expelling monsters was a worthy activity, but now we understand the value of the little monsters as vital in the river's life, as many bigger things eat them and get eaten in their turn, and so on up the food chain to fish, kingfishers, otters and us.

The biggest Péist involved in returning up the Lee is

a 6m long green monster, modelled on a particular green caddis fly larva found under the Dripsey Bridge one sunny summer day. It will be accompanied by its smaller attendant monsters, and they plan to make their appearance at a number of events coordinated with other community groups along the Lee.

Starting from Cork City there is a fun festival in The Glen, a beautiful haven on the city's northside. This is on Sunday July 28th, from 12 noon to 2pm. This will start the monster off on its journey back up the river Lee to the lake at Gougane Barra.

Then in the week of august 5 to 9: the monster be further up river and will join in with a Ballingearybased art-in-the-community event called 'Where Mountainy Men and Women have Sown'. Lughnasa fires on the Lee are promised!

Finally the monster will be welcomed back to Gougane (thanks to the Gougane Barra Hotel) on Water Heritage Day, Sunday 25th august, 4-5pm, where, after 1500 years of banishment, it can finally rest, and possibly hatch.

### Think Globally, Act locally - SO WHAT IS THE P.P.N.?

Today I have the pleasure of speaking with Tadgh Quill-Manley who is the PPN representative for Macroom and the surrounding district.

Before you get put off by the letters I will explain that I have recently learned they stand for Public Participation Network.

This network was set up as a forum for Community Groups. In County Cork, this would include Environmental Groups, Resident's Associations, Tidy Towns, Community Councils, Choirs, Arts Groups, Youth Groups, Active Retirement Associations, Sports Clubs, Heritage and History Societies, Men's sheds, Autism Support Groups and many others.

So how does Tadgh fit into this situation?

First Tadgh will be sent information which will enable him to set up meetings with all community groups, some of which will already be registered PPN members.

If you are a member of a group you should know that any group can join for free. They can do this by going on to the website and finding 'Participate' .From there it is possible to find a link to sign up. Obviously the group must be genuine with some sort of constitution or guiding document which reflects community membership.

The PPN is supported by the Department of Rural and Community Development and Tadgh is the intermediary between the Department and the various groups. He will receive information which he will pass on to the various groups.

Tadgh comes with Community experience which belies his 22 years of age and this is why he was elected to the role by community groups.

Groups can get together to make submissions e.g. regarding Environmental plans. There is a Community charter which groups can submit to the PPN. This is a separate channel into the Department.

The advantage of groups working together is that they can be more productive. Tadgh will be on the look out for common aims amongst groups. e.g. Tadgh tells me that the Gearagh campaign has

been involved with this in the last few weeks.

Through the PPN, the Department has provided a lot of support and opportunities . They will be announcing more programmes and schemes in the next few months.

Tadgh is willing as a volunteer to enable Community groups to put forward their best applications.

He feels it is a very worthwhile project to be involved with as sometimes it can be hard to know how best to approach the Council. Now locally with Tadgh and the PPN there is a direct supportive

In fact the PPN is entirely volunteer run. There are people from every district in the County who are nominated by their local communities to represent those communities.

I am very grateful to Tadgh for giving up his time to explain a little about the PPN.



### MORGAN MCSWEENEY, MACROMPIAN AND BRITISH ELECTION GURU

The Labour Party in Britain had a landslide victory in the July 4th United Kingdom General Election. Sir Keith Starmer's victory was made possible by the ineptitude and arrogance of recent Tory governments and Brexit. But another factor was making Labour electable again. Jeremy Corbyn and his far-left socialist policies stood little chance of gaining sufficient seats. When he was ousted, Starmer set out to change Britain by changing Labour. The mantra was coined by Morgan McSweeney and, with Starmer's backing, the policy was adopted and brilliantly executed by them. Morgan's is now in charge of government communications

Britain urgently needed a change of direction but the inherited difficulties are enormous. The much vaunted National Health Service is creaking, the economy is performing sluggishly and there is widespread poverty. Policemen, nurses and teachers are regular visitors to food banks. The numbers of billionaires on one hand and those living in poverty have increased exponentially. Poverty is widespread, especially in the North of England, Scotland and other less prosperous areas. As well as these internal problems, the UK is trying to repair damaged relationships with Europe. The prospect of Trump's probable election as US President spells more problems. Trump is very right wing and he rates socialists/socialism as near 'the lowest of the low'. The resurgence of the extreme right wing and nationalism is widespread with Orban in Hungary, Wielders

in Holland and The National Front in France in power or strengthening. Further afield are wars in Ukraine, Gaza, Yemen and Sudan.

However, it is Nigel Farrage's Reform Party in Britain that lies the greatest potential threat. Like Trump, Farrage spews populist rhetoric that is high in demagoguery but low in sympathy, analysis and thought-out solutions. With that approach Farrage won over 14% of first preferences and five Westminster seats. Perhaps more worryingly, Reform was second in about another hundred constituencies, most where Labour won. The Tories response will be interesting; will it become like Reform or will it return to the centre political

Patience is not a great feature of modern life and politics. At the previous General Election in Britain, Britain Boris Johnson romped home; this time the Tories were lucky to finish a distant second. So much depends on Starmer's government doing well, through competence, honesty and clever policies. So far it has had a fair wind. Coupled with that, it will need good communication to keep the public on its side. Morgan did brilliantly in getting Labour into power; his next task is to keep it there and especially to see-off the threat from the right. It is a singular honour that Morgan has been chosen for this task and a reflexion of his great abilities.

Before the election it was noted that Morgan was an essential part of Starmer's team. Now it seems that what many serious British newspapers write is true: Morgan may be the most important nonelected political figure in British politics. That is a tremendous achievement for a Macroom man.

Morgan is married to Imogen Walker who was elected a Labour MP for Hamilton and Clyde (Scotland). She has been appointed parliamentary private secretary to Rachel Reeves, Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Congratulation to Morgan, Imogen and the McSweeneys of Macroom - Tim, Carmel, Alex, Evelyn, Mary, Mickie, Jeremiah, Joe and Donie; their cousins, friends and well-wishers. Relations between Taoiseach Simon Harris and Prime Minister Starmer will be helped by the presence of Claire Mungovan and Morgan McSweeney, first cousins and Macrompians, oiling the wheels of cordiality and friendship

Our Muskerry hurlers, Seán O'Donoghue, the Cork captain from Inniscarra, Mark Coleman and Shane Barrett, both of Blarney, gave their all for the Cork cause in this final and all through the championship season and can be assured that the hurling supporters of Muskerry are appreciative of the wonderful joy and pride their efforts brought to all who followed them this year. Well done lads and thank you.

### Cork 1-34 Clare 3-29 AET

Being rated as one of the greatest ever All-Ireland SHC deciders, it was Clare captain Tony Kelly who climbed the Hogan Stand steps to collect the Liam MacCarthy Cup.

A compelling contest, that raged with intensity from first whistle until last, ended in a Clare triumph. Cork brought similar industry and passion, but Clare, inspired by the brilliance of captain Kelly, triumphed. Kelly's 1-4 was crucial for Clare, who overcame a shaky start to earn a first All-Ireland since 2013.

Where do you start? Cork's blistering opening? Clare's gritty revival? Kelly's genius? Patrick Horgan's ice cool composure? John Conlon's leadership? Those were only some of the issues peppering the conversations before extra-time. Then further drama unfolded.

A burst of four points without reply in the second period of extra-time carried significant weight. It was sufficient to get Clare over the line. Just about because Cork posed questions in the dving embers themselves. Clare stayed resourceful and resilient.

Initially, everything was going so smoothly for Cork. Inside 15 minutes Cork had struck nine shots, accumulating 1-8. It was razor sharp stuff from Pat Ryan's team, who led 1-8 to 0-4 following Mark Coleman's splendid point.

The goal, a sensational effort, from Rob Downey had arrived in the 12th minute. Downey gathered a Clare puck out before embarking on a mammoth run from deep, the finish was equally sweet.

Cork's blistering beginning was reflected on the scoreboard, 1-7 to 0-3. Aidan McCarthy and Coleman traded scores, and it was subsequently Clare's turn to enjoy a productive spell.

Clare's mission was boosted by a 17th minute McCarthy major following inventive work by Shane O'Donnell, who manufactured space. O'Donnell rifled over a couple of points and David Fitzgerald trimmed the deficit to the minimum 1-8 to 1-7 in the 22nd minute.

Horgan drilled over a couple of frees as Cork pulled three clear again, but Clare were gutsy. McCarthy, Rodgers, and David Reidy all nailed points to edge the Banner in front on the cusp of half-time.

Darragh Fitzgibbon mustered a reply to ensure the teams departed deadlocked, 1-12 each at the interval. Gripping it most certainly was.

After the restart it remained keenly contested and thrilling, in equal measure. A gorgeous Tim O'Mahony point steered Cork 1-15 to 1-14 ahead, but then Clare pounced.

Mark Rodgers' supplied a splendid 40th minute goal, but Cork were back trading on terms, 2-14 to 1-17, as Alan Connolly and O'Mahony struck points.

Reidy and Horgan swapped scores ensuring the teams were level again, 2-15 to 1-18, when Kelly returned to centre stage. Kelly's third goal was a perfect cocktail of skill and speed in the 51st minute. Four of the next five points were scored by Cork with Séamus Harnedy restoring parity on 58, but it ebbed and flowed. Fitzgerald, Rodgers, substitute Ryan Taylor, and Diarmuid Ryan contributed scores for Clare, who were 3-20 to 1-23 clear with six minutes of normal time left.

Horgan (free) and Coleman trimmed the deficit once more. With the issue delicately poised, Horgan slotted over a pressure free. It continued to blaze, though, as Kelly fired over a remarkable over the shoulder point to nudge Clare one to the good. Cork needed a response with Horgan clipping the equaliser, 3-21 to 1-27 meaning extra-time was necessary.

Reinforcements were required with substitutes lan Galvin and Shane Kingston swapping points. Aidan McCarthy, who returned to the fray for Clare, put Clare ahead, but Coleman and Kingston replied. It was that sort of encounter with the teams deadlocked, 3-25 to 1-31 at the end of the first period of extra-time.

Robbie O'Flynn guided Cork into the lead, but then a crucial spell occurred. McCarthy (2), Kelly, and Shane Meehan thumped over vital points for Clare. During that stint O'Flynn had a goal attempt thwarted by Eibhear Quilligan too.

In the closing seconds Horgan rifled over two frees, and O'Flynn sent a last gasp effort narrowly wide as Clare held out for an immensely satisfying success.






