

Katie, a member of MacEgan Senior Branch was selected to be picked as a member of IGG's Senior Branch National Contingent trip to Adelboden, Switzerland at the start of July. Activities included a scavenger hunt around the village of Adelboden and playing mini golf in a nearby hotel and completing some of the camp challenge by doing some arts and crafts. During the trip, the group visited Kandersteg International Scout Centre and spent a day doing some backwoods skills which involved identifying different fire set ups, lighting fires, and chopping wood which was Katie's favourite activity and the highlight of her trip. The group visited the Girl Guide's world centre, Our Chalet, where they got a history lesson, tour of the centre, and a wonderful pinning ceremony with some enrolments! Katie said "It was an amazing chance to see what international opportunities there are for guides across the world. During the week we hiked higher than ever to visit the local wood carver where woggles engraved with our names were waiting for us and on our way back, we walked through Choleren Gorge and visited the village again in the evening for some souvenir shopping. For our last day in Adelboden we took cable cars across the village to different viewpoints, one being high above the mountains with a giant swing surrounded by the sounds of goats and cow bells. The leaders were very kind to us and surprised us with a visit to the Lindt Chocolate Museum in Zurich where we enjoyed lots of delicious chocolate and a history of the making of it all. Liadain, Juliette and Emily of Ardilaun Guides were among the IGG Guide National Contingent to Adelboden Switzerland in the last two weeks.

Juliette described her experience as follows "The trip began with an early start in Dublin Airport at 4:30am on Saturday the 13th of July. Travelling presented no problems and we arrived at our chalet in Adelboden later that evening. Exhausted, we had a quick dinner, showered, and went straight to bed. The next morning we were split up into teams, given a map and sent

orienteering to get to know the picturesque village of Adelboden. We got back in time for lunch and spent the afternoon getting to know each other. Each day was a new adventure that usually involved hiking some way or another. Some of my best memories include the Adelboden Swing, our visit to the woodcarver's and our tour of Our Chalet. We made lifelong friends, some from Ireland and some from other parts of the world. All in all, it was a wonderful experience, and we are very thankful to everyone who made it possible."

Emily described her trip as follows "In July, I and two other guides from the Ardilaun Girl Guide unit travelled to Adelboden in Switzerland with twenty other guides from all over Ireland along with four leaders. Adelboden is a Swiss village in the Alps and is a popular hiking and ski resort. We were kept busy every day with fun, outdoor activities. During the first few days we went on cable cars and ski lifts up to the Adelboden swing as well as going to the Adelboden Adventure Park where we had fun on the ziplines through trees and over a river. During the middle of the week, we hiked through a gorge to get to the woodcarvers where we all got wooden woggles with our names on them. Each evening, we relaxed at the outdoor pool in Adelboden which overlooked the beautiful Alpine valley below us. Sometimes we were treated to pizza afterwards. On our second last day we visited Our Chalet, one of the five world centres. There, we went on a tour, and we met a girl guide from the U.S.A. In Our Chalet we placed flags from our countries in a log and where we each got an Our Chalet pin. We

learned about the history of the centre and why it was built in Adelboden. On our return journey we stopped off at the Lindt chocolate factory where we got and ate lots of lovely Swiss chocolate. It was one of the best trips I have ever been on, and I made great new friends. Switzerland is a beautiful country, and I would definitely visit it again."

Liadain described Adelboden as a lovely town with beautiful scenery. Highlights of the trip included meeting up with the other guides of the national contingent and completing the activities such as taking the cable cars, hiking, visiting Our Chalet and taking the official photo on the famous steps of Our Chalet. The girls had a fantastic trip and would like to thank the leaders who accompanied the national contingent on the trip.

Deirdre Henley and Joe Willis of Macroom Guides were also part of a contingent that visited Adelboden in the last few weeks with a group from another region. Highlights of the visit to Adelboden included revisiting Our Chalet where Máire, a Leader and friend from North Longford, is volunteering for four months; standing above the clouds looking over at the peaks of the Jungfrau, the Eiger and the Mönch; chatting to the woodcarver and hiking around Oeschinensee in the crisp clear air.

AMAZING RECOGNITION FOR CANOVEE POET DAVID NASH

Congratulations to David Nash as the winner of this year's Seamus Heaney Centre First Collection Poetry Prize!

At the award night, Nash said: "Seamus Heaney was the first poet of my life, in many ways, so to win a prize bearing his name is momentous to me both on a poetic and a personal level. I am extremely grateful to the Legacy Project, Queen's and the Arts Council, and of course to the judges, for selecting my book and for seeing in it what I had hoped would be seen. It really means a great deal to me."

This year's judges were Nick Laird, poet and Seamus Heaney Professor of Poetry at Queen's; Jenny Browne, Professor of English and Creative Writing at Trinity University, Texas; and Stephen Sexton, poet and lecturer in Poetry at the Seamus Heaney Centre at Queen's.

Laird said: "David Nash's No Man's Land is a book of return and renewal. Over and over the poems scrutinise modern Ireland with an insider's easy familiarity and an outsider's fresh perspective. Nash has technique in spades, a wry tone, an interest in formal ingenuity, and these poems set themselves ambitious aims which they invariably achieve."





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Why Do I Wake Up With Neck Pain?

Sometimes described as a "crick" or "kink" in the neck, pain on waking in the morning is a common complaint from patients that come into our office.

The result is not only pain but an overall decrease in the range of motion of the neck. **So, how does this happen?**

The main cause of neck pain upon waking is poor sleeping position. People who sleep on their stomachs typically have the most issues with their necks. While sleeping on the stomach for 6-8 hours each night the head is rotated to the left or right when laying on the pillow.

So, imagine standing or sitting with your head rotated in either direction for up to 8 hours. Another way to develop the "kink" or "crick" is by sleeping on more than one pillow or a pillow that is too large. This will cause the neck to either be pushed forward or to the side too much where it is not aligned with the rest of the spine resulting in misalignment, muscle pulling and pain.

To have a "crick" or a "kink" is a term used when the bones, (vertebrae) in the neck are severely misaligned and putting pressure on the nerves leading to pain and decreased motion. Some people like to refer to this as a "pinched nerve". The misalignment of the neck will also cause muscle pulling over a period of time that can lead to spasm and inflammation resulting in pain.

How does the "kink" get fixed? As chiropractors we help to treat the problem in the neck with an adjustment. This will allow the bones to be restored to their normal position in the neck which results in reduced nerve pressure. After an adjustment, range of motion

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and pain will be improved but inflammation is still taking place. The use of ice for periods of 15-20 minutes at a time will help with decreasing swelling and pain between adjustments.

Be sure to consult a chiropractor after feeling a "kink" or "crick" in the neck and do not allow the injury to try and heal over time.

Even if the pain subsides, the chances for re-exacerbation are high because the nerve pressure still exists.

It's important to remember, painkillers work to numb the pain but never resolve the underlying issue.

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



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

How to use your meat thermometer

Using a meat thermometer couldn't be easier. Just take the meat off the heat, insert the thermometer into the thickest part – when it reads 75 degrees Celsius, it's cooked through and safe to eat. Safefood's 7 top tips for a safe barbecue

If you're planning to hit the grill this summer, follow Safefood's expert advice to enjoy a safe barbecue. 1. Keep perishable foods like salads, coleslaw, and quiche in your fridge until you are ready to serve them.

2. Burgers, sausages and kebabs, pork and poultry must be cooked all the way through – take your food off the heat, pop the thermometer in the thickest part of the meat and when it reaches 75

degrees Celsius, then it's cooked and ready to eat. Steaks can be served 'rare' as harmful bacteria are on the outside only (and not in the centre). If you don't have a meat thermometer, follow the three checks of ensuring barbecue meats like burgers, sausages and chicken are cooked until piping hot, with no pink meat and the juices running clear.

3. If you like to marinate your meat, make sure any marinade used on raw meat is not then used as a sauce to coat vegetables or cooked meat as it will contain raw meat bacteria.

4. If you choose to barbecue any frozen food, it must be completely thawed first on the bottom shelf of your fridge before you cook it.

5. When handling raw meat and poultry, wash your hands thoroughly and frequently, most importantly before going on to prepare salads and other ready to eat foods.

6. Once your meat is cooked thoroughly, make sure to keep cooked meat separate from raw meat and to use separate chopping boards, cooking utensils and plates. Harmful bacteria in raw meat, poultry and their juices can cross contaminate cooked food and lead to food poisoning, something your family won't thank you for.

7. If you have barbecue leftovers, let the food cool, then refrigerate it within two hours of cooking. Consume leftovers within three days and reheat them only once. Always remember with leftovers - if in doubt, throw it out.

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

Think Globally, Act locally - SUMMER ORCHARD PRUNING

" Pruning is the most difficult of the skills practiced by fruit grower"s -Masanobu Fukuoka - The Natural Way of Farming



Hi Chris Barrett here. Today I am hearing about this most challenging of fruit grower's skills from Paul Lynch, who has a wealth of skill and enthusiasm in this area...

Do not despair if you find pruning a bewildering task. Masanobu Fukuoka, the celebrated Japanese plant scientist turned natural farmer, philosopher and icon of the 20th century environmental movement describes it as "the most advanced skill in orcharding".

My orchard pruning career started in my teens trying to make sense of the instructions given in regular gardening books. This was long before I came across Fukuoka's works. Looking back I can see that the conventional advice is generally limited to specific situations and is lacking in a more general philosophy and understanding of fruit trees.

Just like us, each tree has its own history, is at particular stage of life and has particular living conditions. Giving general advice regarding tree pruning is as dangerous as giving general medical advice - we are all different and have different circumstances. I try to take a holistic approach and aim to restore the health of each individual tree with regard to its circumstances.

For the last eight years I have provided orchard care across county Cork in hundreds of orchards and gardens on thousands of different individual trees. Much of this is done in the summer months which may come as a surprise. In fact some of the most common problems I encounter are from too much winter pruning and the conditions this causes must be balanced out by summer pruning.

Is Apple Pruning Necessary?

The biological reproductive and photosynthetic aims of fruit trees can differ from our humancentered aims of high yield, the taste we like and large accessible fruit. Almost all apples we eat come from trees that have been grafted. This gives us the variety of apple we want on a tree whose size and disease resistance characteristics will suit the site it will be grown on - if the orchard is well designed that is. Grafting also however fundamentally upsets the natural growing pattern in the early stages of the life of the young tree.

For the above reasons it usually becomes necessary to prune for healthy productive trees. My general approach where possible is to intervene to reestablish the natural growing pattern of the tree. In this case however a little knowledge can be :

dangerous - your tree will usually be better off untouched than pruned without the appropriate tools and knowledge. With that warning, please read on for a little knowledge on the subject.

The Natural Shape of Fruit Trees

Most fruit trees grown from seed that are never grafted, pruned or cut will grow to a fairly conical shape and will grow with one trunk called a central leader in orchard terminology. The classic Christmas tree shape is a good example of this form of growth. Such a tree is growing to a natural pattern that doesn't need human maintenance, as we didn't interfere in the first place. When we deviate from this, which we do in every fruit tree which is grafted, we are setting up some work for ourselves in re-establishing the natural tree shape and growing pattern again. When we want to maintain an unnatural shape as in the case of the popular open-center shape then we are setting up perpetual maintenance work. The more unnatural the shape, the more work involved.

Winter Pruning

In the winter the sap will have fallen and the tree stores its sugars in the roots. Pruning done in the winter will not really rob the tree of its energy, and so increased vegetative or leafy growth can be expected during the spring and summer after winter pruning, as a full tree's worth of energy tries to express itself in the reduced tree size. I use winter pruning to give structure and direction to younger growing trees and increase leafy growth in (generally ancient) trees that are lacking vigour. I winter prune apple, pear, medlar and cobnut trees generally from November to February. It's a good time for disease removal as canker spores are less active. I winter prune mature trees to a limited extent and they may require subsequent summer pruning to re-balance the trees energy levels.

Summer Pruning

In the summer however, more of the sap is up in the branches and leaves, so if we prune now we will rob the tree of some of its energy. This is very useful if the tree has too much leafy growth and too little fruiting wood or if a tree has outgrown its allocated area. Summer pruning is useful if it is desirable to limit the trees size for any reason. You can thin out apples too now if you want bigger apples (from the ones remaining on the tree).

Summer pruning is generally more important for mature trees. Dead and diseased wood can be a little more obvious in the summer due to an : please contact me chrisleevalley@gmail.com

absence of leaves, but removing this can be done in the winter also. The overall structure of a tree is easier to assess in the winter for the same reason. I carry out summer pruning on mature apple and pear trees and all prunus species trees which includes cherries & plums.

Regularly winter pruning of apple trees into maturity often sets up an imbalance in the tree growing pattern generating an excess of vigourous upright leafy growth and very little fruiting wood. Such trees may need many years of summer pruning before calming down and becoming productive fruiting members of the orchard again.

Circular Economy

In addition to pruning I sometimes temporarily tie young flexible fruit tree branches to recreate the natural shape so as to minimise future care. For years now I've only used old bicycle inner tube cut into strips. They have many advantages being flexible and ultimately degradable (but not biodegradable I think) in the sunshine when stretched, so they will cause less damage than the other options if forgotten about as the tree grows. I stock up on a couple of boxes of old bike tube inners every year as they have endless uses especially if you do orchard work. The people in the bike shop I go to are happy to give them away for free as they are otherwise a waste item that they pay to dispose of. They are happy to divert their material to good uses. Circular Economy - it would be a great name for a bike shop.

Dangerous Ties

I've come across many different materials used to tie the branches of trees to train the growth habit. The list includes bare wire, plastic covered wire, cut-up tights, cable ties and the plastic tying wire found for sale in garden centers. All ties have the potential to wound the tree as it moves or as it outgrows the tie. It is also a disease focal point as the tie may reduce ventilation to some degree, as well as cut into the tree. Of these examples I think the cut-up old tights are probably the least harmful being somewhat soft and flexible, but so far I think the inner tubes are the best solution...

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


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
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

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"She had heard about Jesus, so she came up behind Him through the crowd and touched His robe. For she thought to herself 'if I can just touch His robe I will be healed. Immediately the bleeding stopped, and she could feel in her body that she had been healed of her terrible condition" (Mark 5:27-29).

Welcome back dear student last week we saw that as people heard about Jesus they came to Him for healing; how the demons causing sickness and torment had to leave for Jesus had authority over them as He was without sin. We learnt that He paid the price for our sins to be forgiven, for us to be cleansed by His Blood, and that healing results as we humble ourselves to receive Him as Lord and obey His Word. This is the Good News. God loves us so much that He took care of everything. We could never save ourselves from sin, death, and eternal doom. The Gospel is simple and brings freedom, hope, and security for those who will accept the Lordship of Messiah Jesus (Isaiah 61:1-3). The encounter in the Scripture above is a beautiful depiction of all mankind – our sin made us unclean, unworthy, and hopeless without Yeshua. In the context of the day this woman was 'unclean'. She shouldn't have been out - according to the law, until her bleeding was over. But this poor lady had been haemorrhaging for twelve years; her suffering was an ongoing, never-ending torment. She was utterly weak, sick, and broken. She had nothing left – all her strength and money was gone looking for help that never came.

But then, she heard about Jesus! Specifically, the accounts of those who had been miraculously healed by His touch. It struck a chord of hope in her heart, igniting her faith in God's goodness. She knew she faced being stoned to death for appearing out in public in an unclean state, but she had nothing more to lose, and her life to gain. So, she made a plan that she would only touch the bottom of the garment that Jesus was wearing. That would be enough for His Healing Power to deliver her. When she got there, many others were all trying to touch Him (she must have been battered and bruised crawling on the ground under their legs), but she reached out and touched His robe. Instantly, she knew she was healed. The bleeding stopped, and she felt the Power of Jesus. People have been wrongly taught to believe in a 'cure' - where they touch something that belonged to some godly person to get healed. It was her faith in Jesus alone that healed her, not His robe you must understand.

Something amazing happened - Jesus stopped, and said... 'Who touched Me?' (Luke 8:45). His disciples couldn't understand what He meant — they reminded Him that multitudes were touching Him! But Jesus knew someone with faith had encountered Him, because He felt the Power going out from Himself, just as the woman had. Now, she faced a major decision. She could have just crept away and said nothing, but trembling, she came forward as He was still looking to see where she was. She admitted she was unclean, tormented, sick and helpless. And that her plan was to only get a touch from His clothing. Her humility, her confession and her worship resulted in Jesus telling her — "your faith has made you whole!" (Mark 5:34). This was more than healing — this was a new beginning, and restoration of all that was stolen from her — her health, her joy, her peace, and provision. Hallelujah! It's there for you too friend — call upon Jesus and come to Him now.
