9 Signs Your Spine May Need Attention

The soles/heels of your shoes wear out unevenly.

Paralympian Monica's medals shine Bright

Her 40 years

Forty years after USA president Ronald Reagan presented Cork's Monica O'Kelly with her Paralympic silver medal, she gathered with her fellow residents at the HSE-run Farranlea Community Nursing Unit to celebrate - and watch the 2024 Paralympics.

In 1984, Monica celebrated her 21st birthday by winning a silver medal for swimming and three bronze medals for shot putt, club throw and slalom at the Paralympics in New York. The following year, she won two gold medals for swimming at the European Championships in Vienna and competed internationally for eight years in total.

Four decades later, staff at the HSE Farranlea CNU staff hosted a green, white and gold-themed garden party for all 80 residents to coincide with the start of the 2024 Paralympics, which has 4,400 athletes competing in 549 medal events, across 22 sports.

Monica has been a resident at HSE Farranlea CNU since 2013: "Coming from home to here was nervewracking, a huge change, but I found ways to settle. I get a lovely breakfast every day and I feel a lot better now. The staff are very good to me. My family is very supportive as well."

Clinical Nurse Manager, Mini David, says Monica loves life: "Monica is so famous, such an inspirational lady! She just loves her family and social life; putting on her make-up and going out with her brothers for a sneaky KFC. She's such an intelligent lady, always doing quizzes and she loves Elvis."

Monica's brother David O'Kelly said: "Monica was one of the first residents of the Cedar Unit at Farranlea in 2013 and we are so grateful to the team who care for her multiple needs so well. They are absolutely fantastic with her, so professional, and there's great communication between us and the care team. She's very lucky and this party was a great celebration."



Another of Monica's brothers, Vincent O'Kelly, says: "I was always her sidekick as we are the two youngest and I remember well travelling every week to training camps and sleeping on the floor! We are always very proud of her and her achievements."

Monica grew up on the Old Blackrock Road in Cork and started representing Ireland young: "I loved horse-riding and when I was nine, I was picked to go to Amsterdam and ride in front of the Irish Ambassador to The Netherlands," she recalls.

In the summer of 1983, Monica was invited by Cerebral Palsy Ireland to train at the Sandymount Clinic: "I travelled by bus every weekend and slept in a sleeping bag on the floor in order to train and reach Paralympic standards," she said.

When Monica was chosen for the Irish Paralympic team, her family rallied to fundraise for her and others to make the trip, organising a bike ride from Shannon to Cork. Local sponsorship and support also came from local businesses and sports clubs.

"My mother and aunt came with me to New York and I spent three weeks there. The athletes got up every day at 5:30am and trained until 4pm; the only breaks were to eat. It was tough but then Ronald Reagan opened the Games and it was brilliant experience," Monica said.

"I am looking forward to this year's Paralympics in Paris. I did watch the Olympics and was very happy with the swimmers who won medals for Ireland, Mona McSharry and Daniel Wiffen. Who is my favourite? Oh the man Daniel!" she laughs.



But there was another amazing connection with the past: the man who presented the lecture Michael Horgan, is the grandson of Sergeant Daniel Maunsel, whose shooting dead on the street in Inchigeela over a century ago, brought replacement Sergeant Thomas Moore to our barrack. Day 3, Music night was on the work of Charles Villiers Stanford, "Songs of old Ireland"with pre- concert talk by Dr. Adele Commins.

This was indeed very enjoyable and the acoustics of Inchigeela's Lee Valley Outlet was ideal for a very special, memorable night. For the final evening, the award winning Cratloe, Co Clare drama group nearly brought the house down with "A Wake in the West". The owners are great supporters of mine so to give something back is important and he is a special horse who has won a

CNOC AN TOBAIR


In preserving local history and customs, the KHAA is leading a field trip to Cnoc an Tobair on Sunday 8th September at 11 am from Independence

Think Globally, Act locally - THE VITAL IMPORTANCE OF HEDGEROWS

Hi Chris Barrett here once again. This time I have the pleasure of picking the brains of Dermot Robinson from the Robinson Farm in Cloughduv.

Some people will already regularly enjoy the vegetables that are produced throughout the year on their farm and which they have sold for about 25 years in Macroom on a Tuesday, and Cork city on a Saturday.

I was fortunate enough to attend a farm walk on their land in Mid July this year, and to hear from Dermot how hedgerows are fundamental to what they produce both outdoors and in their tunnels.

Dermot reminds us that the most important feature from an agronomic perspective (his choice of language - not mine!) is that hedgerows shelter a field.

They do this by slowing wind speed. The reduced wind speed also has the additional advantageous effect of slowing the spread of pests and diseases. This is because hedgerows also act as a barrier.

Anyone who has put washing out on the line in a day of reduced wind will be well aware that there will be less drying, due to less evaporation. So reduced wind speed, though annoying to a clothes dryer, is beneficial to crops as it stops the soil drying out so quickly.

Hedgerows can provide a wildlife sanctuary for insects, bugs, bees, worms and fungi which may not find a well-tilled field will provide such a haven for them.

Larger animals will use hedgerows as wildlife corridors, and these will suffer negatively if there are too many breaks in hedges for access points and driveways etc.

An additional aspect of hedging is that as well as bringing greater biodiversity into a farm, it will hold carbon in the ground.

Dermot and his family have been discerning with their choice of hedging plants. They choose to plant different hedging plants depending on the location on the farm. An example of this will be seen on higher land, where they have planted Scots pine and Sitka Spruce for shelter in these higher fields. When they plant hedgerows they always plant for bio-diversity rather than taking the position of being over-reliant on one species of tree. The reasoning behind this over-reliance on one species reminds us of the devastation caused

in the potato famine. We can learn from this today. There is a blight that effects the trees in Kilmurray woods (Phytophthora). This blight has already caused enormous economic losses worldwide. And of course we need to be aware of Ash dieback.

There are also threats from the pine-bark beetle to Sitka spruce, and in the future, Fireblight could be damaging to our hawthorn.

It seems to me that if we had not imported so many plants from outside Ireland in the past, we would not also have imported so much potential for disease. But I put my hand up as someone who has grown non-native plants for decades and I believe we have to be realistic as we cannot shut the stable door after the horse has bolted. We must rely on constant vigilance and good hedgerow management.

The mixed Hedgerow planting advocated by Dermot demonstrates reasons to "Hedge your bets" (pun intended).

The geographical definition of working areas would be defined by hedgerows both in the past, and currently. In the past you would have seen more one and two acre fields bordered by hedgerows. These would have been dictated by the rotation of stock and crops. Nowadays most fields have their hedgerows taken out. Dermot has consulted Land Registry maps for their farm dating back to the 1800s. These maps show where three fields once existed there is now only one large field. Dermot has decided to turn this field back into two fields by planting a hedgerow down the middle.

Prior to the arrival of the Robinson family onto their farm, many other hedgerows had been removed and they are now working hard to put them back. Dermot reminds me that there are rules about how much hedgerow farmers can remove, but farmers are not always aware of this ruling, which is also not being currently enforced.

The movement of making larger and larger fields was for the benefit of larger and larger machinery. In small fields you may forfeit more growing space by the need to turn the tractor.

The negative effect of a bigger field is also apparent in the increased wind speed, and reduced shelter for animals and crops. You will see cows huddling by hedges to avoid wind or burning sun if there is a heatwave. Squash for example requires sheltered fields and even hardier crops such as potato or winter broccoli do better if they are not blown about.

Some people use hedgerows as a space where excess water can be soaked up or even as a drain. In terms of fixing nitrogen, the alder tree can fix nitrogen in the same way as clover. Willow and poplar not only help dry out wet fields, but they can also suck up and retain excess nutrients. There is so much to learn and

Pat O'Connor was born in November, 1946 into an established Macroom family. O 'Connor's Main Street pub came into the family's possession in 1902 and is now a busy bookie office. It was bought by John O'Connor (Carrigagulla) - 'Connors' leaving but 'O'Connor' returning - changed by the Yanks -Pat's grandfather, when he returned from the U.S., and in turn it was owned by his son Jeremiah, Bridie-Jeremiah's widow, their son Michael and now Kevin, Pat's son. Pat was the second eldest of a family of six but his elder brother, Bernard died at three days old, possibly of some congenital condition. Pat was born next and was followed by Michael, Dermot and twins Nora and Joan. Only Michael was not sent to boarding school. His passions were music, reading, crosswords, quizzes and sport. He died suddenly some years ago. Pat spent almost all of his life in Macroom and 'made a difference'.

John O'Connor and three his brothers emigrated to the U.S; John was in Boston from about 1890-1902 and was a train-driver. He was a contemporary of TP Cotter there, and both returned and bought pubs in Macroom in 1902. A brother of his returned home by boat every third year, beginning in 1903, but sadly, his ship was sunk by the Germans in WW1 in 1915. (Pat noted that there was no person named 'O'Connor' or 'Connors' on the Lusitania.) John's sister was married to Denis Murphy, Carrigagulla and the Coakleys, Rahalisk, are also relations. When John died in 1940, Pat's father Jeremiah took over the business. Pat's father was a kind, hard-working and clever man, Jeremiah married Bridie Kelleher, (The Pats's, Clondrohid) in the early 1940s and as stated above they had six children, five survived to adulthood. To me as a child, and living next door, he was reserved and appeared austere: when noise of play became too loud he ordered: 'Kellehers - go home'. FitzGerald's was where he went for a pint. Bridie was an able woman and as well as rearing her family she worked in the bar and shop. Her pastimes were card-playing and the ICA. When Jeremiah died in 1960 at just fifty-seven, Bridie took over and ran the home and the business. Pat remembers her as being very brave and formidable and she'would stand-up to anyone, man or woman'. Madge Horgan, Barrett Place, was her housekeeper and she was almost part of the family; she was particularly devoted to Nora, Joan and Dermot (Dermie) whom she fondly called 'The Dreamer'. Dermot stoically bore a debilitating illness for many years before passing away unexpectedly. Nora married musician Willie Burke and they ran a pub in Kilnamartyra before selling and Joan and George Buckley are together a long times. Joan worked in Macroom Hospital for many years.

Jeremiah's brother, Michael, was quite a character. He attended St Colman's College, Fermov and later taught as a National Teacher in Dublin. An avid Fine Gaeler, he became Richie Ryan's election agent (Ryan was a former Minister of Finance and 'Richie Ruin' of TÉ's Hall's Pictorial Weekly satirical sketch). Michael was a frequent visitor to Macroom and retired there, living in John Browne's former home in New Street. He often walked about with a newspaper under his arm and frequently attended at his sister's shop - Mrs Shine's, Chapel Cross and at Denis O'Callaghan's shoe shop. World, national and local matters were discussed and dissected at the latter.

As was usual for the time the shop was a pubgrocery, and as you entered, consisted of a bar on the left and a grocer's on the right. There was a slicer for rashers and ham and a scales with weights on the counter. Tea and sugar came in chests and were dispensed in brown paper bags. At the back of the shop were the kitchen and an adjacent store held meal, coal etc. A larger scales in the store-

room measured flour etc. The backyard had sheds and five piggeries - three below and two above. Behind that again was an orchard that stretched as far as the Convent Grounds' wall. The O'Connor family was 'comfortable' growing up as evidenced by their children attending boarding school.

Pat attended school in St Joseph's NS and St. Colman's BNS and boarded in Rochestown College, 1958-63. Sisters Thadeus, Peter and Michael were his first three teachers. His schools were 'fine' and he enjoyed them all. A picture of his sixth class classmates accompanies this piece and some have unfortunately passed away. He enjoyed Mr John Browne in fifth class and was delighted to have avoided Br Ferdinand in sixth class because of his fearsome and fact-based reputation. His replacement, Br Leopold, was soft by comparison. Michael 'Joe' Lucey, Donie McSweeney, Sheamus/ Shay and Kay/Charlie Buckley, Dan O'Connell, Johnny Lucey (Barrett Place), Richard Neville, Connie Shannon and Paddy Ring were among his classmates. Academic stars of the class were Con Kelleher (Mountmassey), James Lucey (Codrum) and Tom Russell. The first two went farming while Russell did well in the Department of Foreign Affairs and represented Ireland diplomatically abroad. When growing-up Pat's outstanding memory is of playing on the street and roaming the Castle Grounds. During holidays, he and other children were out of home from early and returned for meals. 'Chasing' and 'releasing' were played and 'hides' were in the Castle Grounds' Witches Wood and all over the golf-club area. Because of the paucity of traffic and cars, soccer games were played in The Square, with the area under the balcony as the goal. The Fire Brigade was once resident there and when it moved to a new Castle Ground building, the Athletic Club used it to store pole vaults, highjump equipment etc. Holding bazaars and staging plays was then other common children's pastimes; in one 'production', one boy doing a hanging scene, with a tie around his neck, had a chair kicked from underneath him but fortunately was saved.

Next Pat attended Rochestown College 1960-65 and happily spent his secondary schooldays there. Rochestown College is a Catholic boys' secondary school that once kept boarders. It was run by the Capuchins and had strong Macroom connections.

James Kelleher, brother of Dan Joe, Cork St., taught there (and in UCC), obtained an MA and has a wonderful book 'Memories of Macroom' about the town of his youth, about 1915-1930, and early adulthood. His presence was an advantage for Macrompians in his class as it was easy to divert him by mentioning 'Macroom'. Kelleher's nephews Peter and Pat were pupils there as were Martin Fitz-Gerald, Jack Cotter and Dinny Molonoy - the latter was a novitiate monk for a period. The blazer was a dark brown, its colour similar to the Capuchin habit, and it had an impressive and distinctive crest. Michael did not follow Pat there but Dermot did, but for a year or two only before he completed his education in Macroom. Rochestown school was relatively small and the regime was benign. However for Pat, it began a period of 'absence' from Macroom that still causes him a gap in his knowledge of Macroom people. During the holidays Pat worked in the shop and bar but never had a liked it. He also played football and was a member of a very good minor (U-18) team in 1964, captained by Barry O'Brien that lost a County Final but memorably beat a vaunted Clonakilty team along the way.

After his Leaving Certificate, Pat trained as a Psychiatric nurse in Our Lady's Hospital and this necessitated more time away from home. He liked the work and made great friends there - many became later golfing buddies and included Pat Lehane, John Joe O'Donovan and Pat Connell. Work took him to Youghal, back to Our Lady's again and finally to Macroom. When the De La Salle Brothers left Macroom, their monastery became St. Colman's House and Pat transferred there. At this time large psychiatric hospitals such as Our Lady's were phased-out and patients settled in the community. This was a big change for patients and staff alike and they had to overcome the barrier of 'institutionalisation' - that is living in enclosed regimented area for many years. The new regime was a great improvement - patients had freedom to walk out, could buy what they wished; St Colman's provided shelter, meals, company and medical care.

Catherine O'Riordan, Cork St., the middle daughter of three girls, also trained as a psychiatric nurse in OLH; love blossomed and they married in 1976. They set-up home in Railway View and had three children in due course. Catherine's sisters Gabrielle (O'Leary) and Mary (Noonan) live locally but unfortunately their brothers John Joe and Martin (who was married to Martina Kelleher) died prematurely. Her parents and the girls suffered grievously. Pat and Catherine have three children, Karen, Kevin and Alan and have 5 grandchildren - Karen's Eoin, Conor, and Darragh and Kevin's Isobella and Alex. Karen lives in Dublin and Kevin and Alan locally.

Apart from his work, Pat was keenly interested in sport. He served as a selector for Macroom's Minor football team, was involved with his brother Michael in Macroom Soccer Club but his greatest sporting passion was golf and specifically, Macroom Golf Club. He enjoyed his weekly games with Pat Lehane and co., but significantly, he made a huge contribution to score-keeping. Pre computers, Pat's experience and knowledge was invaluable and an accepted reference. His memory and knowledge of the sometimes labyrinthine ways of scoring and handicaps became legendary and essential for the smooth running of competitions. In that sphere he was the authority. Pat's contribution was acknowledged when he became President in 2002 (having declined the captaincy on several occasions). Subsequently he was conferred with Honorary Life Membership for the great work he had done. Of course, golf clubs are about much than golf; essentially, they are social clubs where people meet and mingle, and where skills of all sorts can contribute to clubs' common good and be acknowledged. This was another area in which Pat excelled and he has resultantly, a wide circle of friends. Pat saw the expansion of the club from nine to eighteen holes, the building of its fine clubhouse, surviving some rocky periods along the way, to become the thriving club it is presently. Pat's contribution was important and significant.

Pat likes to have a 'pint' and Browne's, Railway View was one of his haunts. Sadly, that like his home and many other Macroom pubs are now of the past and much to the town's loss and disadvantage. The town has altered much and Pat and Catherine have witnessed the changes. As well as the increased number of houses and people in the town, the multiplicity of nationalities is striking. Pat's daughter-in-law, Gabriella is Hungarian. It is interesting to see the town evolve and change, and it is a far-cry from the smaller closed society that was Macroom in his childhood. Catherine and Pat delight in having their lovely grandchildren about. After some recent medical bothers, Pat has made a great recovery, well cared-for by Catherine. He visits the Golf Club most days and provides answers to the frequent queries. He keeps an eye on the town and its happenings and continues to enjoy his pint. It is people such as Pat who give 'character' to towns, and Macroom is lucky to have had Pat O'Connor as an active resident for so long. As is in his alma mater's, Rochestown College's motto, 'Make The Difference', Pat made a difference to Macroom, a very positive difference.



Remembering Bridie Gallagher the girl from Donegal

Bridie Gallagher was known as the girl from Donegal. She sang everywhere from The Royal Albert Hall in London to Carnegie Hall in New York to Sydney Opera House. She was born in Creeslough Co. Donegal, her first single was recorded in 1956 it was "A Mothers Love is a Blessing". She was Irelands original pop star she sang songs like the boys from the County Armagh, the Girl from Donegal, the Green Glens of Antrim and A Mothers Blessing, When Cardinal Tomas O Fiaich was asked on a radio programme what his favourite song was? he said, "The Green Glens of Antrim", by Bridie

Another great song by Bridie was the Homes of Donegal.

I just stepped into see you all, III only stay a while, I want to see how you're getting on, I want to see your

I'm happy to be here again, I've missed you one and all, there's no place in the world there's just like the homes of Doneaal.

I long to see your happy faces smiling at the door, the kettle singing on the crook as I walk across the floor, and soon that teapot's filling up,

My cup its far from small your hearts are like your mountains in the home of Donegal. I long to spend a while with you, to bide away the night, with tales of yore and fairies beside your fireside bright, and then prepared for me a shake down by the wall, there is repose for weary wanderers in the homes of Donegal.

I was told the most popular cowboy actor was Audie Murphy a decorated soldier in the 2nd world war. Films were also shown for school children the beautiful "Nuns Story" with the great actress Audrey Hepburn. The 10 Commandments was also shown.

Dennis Murphy (Spar) also organised "Disco Dances" in





the Palace Cinema for the young people of the town and beyond. I remember them all too well because I won the disco dancer of the year competition. It was a great night we were surrounded by the press and photographers. I was also told that the Mont Rose ballroom in Coolcower drew large crowds over the years with the popular showbands of the day. I'm so glad to be back writing a small bit again. I would like to thank everybody who sent me cards, letters, good wishes, prayers and telephone calls. I just want to let you know I'm getting better day by day Thank God. Loophole in EU law leads to surge in imported dangerous SUVs on our roads - Ní Mhurchú

Ní Mhurchú calls for the closure of a legal loophole which is facilitating the importation of oversized SUVs and Pickups from the US into Europe. Ní Mhurchú says these cars are a danger to other drivers and bad for the environment.

Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú, a member of the EU Transport committee, has backed calls by the European Transport Safety Council to close a loophole in EU law that has seen a 20% increase in oversized SUVs and Pickups imported from the US to Europe.

Nearly 5,000 Dodge RAMs alone were brought into Europe in 2023, up 20% compared to 2022. US pickup trucks and SUV imports are availing of a loophole in our laws whereby they are not required to comply with all EU safety and environmental standards as they are imported through a back-door channel called "Individual Vehicle Approval". Ní Mhurchú has backed calls by a number of EU transport lobby groups on the EU commission to close the loophole. According to Ní Mhurchú some cars are just too big for Irish and European roads and car parking spaces, "Due to a loophole in the law, these trucks coming in from the US can bypass current EU environmental and safety regulations. Many of these bigger trucks don't fit in our car parking spaces in Europe, they don't fit on our rural roads and they pose a danger to other drivers at a time when Ireland is struggling with

high road deaths. Dodge RAMs make up 60% of these IVA imports, and have 3 to 9 times higher emissions than the average new European car"

Ní Mhurchú described some of these imported Pickup Trucks as a danger to small children,

"Many of these trucks have dangerously high bonnets, with the vehicle's leading front edge often standing 1.3 metres from ground level. The result is that children up to 10 years old standing or walking in front can be obscured by the vehicle's bonnet height, and therefore unseen by the driver"

Ní Mhurchú has welcomed news that the EU Commission is aware of the issue and is promising reform of the loophole.









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


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



















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
