COLLEGE SOCIETY NAMES AFTER FORMER MACROOMPIAN

A new college society of Labour Youth in MTU Cork has been named after Tim (Tadgh) Quill, who became the youngest member of the Dáil in 1927. Quill was a native of Clondrohid, and, uniquely, won election to Cork County Council and Cork Corporation simultaneously, also becoming Deputy Lord Mayor of Cork. As a young man, he was also vice-chairman of the old Macroom UDC. He served as a board member of numerous local and national bodies. The branch was named in recognition of the fact that Quill was a renowned orator and organiser, presiding over the establishment over approximately 140 'labour clubs' in the city and county between 1925-1945.



NYCI Storytelling Session – Budget 2025 By Katie Cronin MacEgan Senior Branch

Recently I attended a storytelling session via Zoom with the National Youth Council of Ireland as part of the Youth Work Changes Lives campaign. 

Field Trip to Cnoc an Tobair

Updates on Island Park

The KHAA's field trip to Cnoc an Tobair took place on the traditional day of the 8th September where for generations people from far and wide visited the holy well and prayed the rounds (sometimes referred to as a pattern day). While this custom has largely died away, a few still faithfully visit the site on the feast day of the Blessed Virgin's birth and this year, it falling on a Sunday, we marked the day in organising a field trip to this prehistoric and early Christian site.

A group of over sixty people made their way to the hilltop, which is 590ft above sea level, where Bridget Goulding and Terence McSwiney gave an outline of the religious significance, history, archaeology and folklore associated with the area. Boulder burials and partial radial stones nearby have been dated to c.2000 to 2500BC. The spring well itself is likely to have been adapted to a holy well early in Christianity where people prayed for cures and a resolution of problems. Although the day was quite blustery in the open fields, the site itself is a sheltered haven for pilgrims, visitors and nature alike and it, being a clear day, was an ideal opportunity to view the surrounding countryside from such a spectacular vantage point.

The KHAA would like to thank everyone who attended on the day. A special word of thanks to Albert and Mary Murphy on whose land the site is located. Generations of the Murphy family have preserved and maintained this special place and we appreciate their continued support and permission in granting access to the site itself. We are also grateful to the surrounding landowners who permit access through their properties, all of whom value and have pride in this important early Christian and archaeological site. We would like to thank, too, those who were kind enough to drive those of us unable to undertake the climb.

This site has been very relevant to the people

of Kilmurry Parish for centuries and it is hoped that it will remain relevant in the modern world and

that its uniqueness will remain cherished in the locality for generations to come.

KICKBOXING

5 Junior athletes from the *West Cork Kickboxing Club* competed the week before last at the World Junior Kickboxing Championships in Budapest Hungary. Cathal Fogarty Lithgow, Markuss Bogdanovs, Dorinda Roberts, Evan Collins and Nathan Cronin were accompanied by their coaches lan Kingston and Tony Stephenson. They all qualified for the Irish team back in March this year by competing in the Irish national championships and earning their right to wear the green and represent Ireland at these world championships 2024. This was a prestigious championship with over 65 countries taking part with over 2200 athletes competing over the different disciplines and weight categories throughout the week.

All athletes were put through their paces every week all summer long with intense training in their home gym in Skibbereen as well as in Macroom and Ballingeary with one-to-one training session with their coaches Tony and Ian. From training with their club team mates down in west cork, to training with the national team regularly in Dublin on weekends no stone was left unturned by this team.

Throughout the week in Budapest these athletes came up against top nations from Spain, Poland, China, and Argentina. The young Nathan Cronin won his first fight against Bosnia Herzegovina in very close and hard-fought match. This was his first year on the national team and fighting abroad. He bowed out in his second bout his Armenian opponent. Dorinda lost out to Croatia. This was also her fight time competing internationally, but she learned some valuable

experience and will use if this experience in her years competing to come. Markuss the 16-year native to Latvia living in Ballyvourney stepped into the Junior male division ages 16-18 for the first time this year and fought excellently making his way to the semifinals defeating countries such as Greece, Spain, Argentina, and Even Latvia. He lost out to Slovenia in the Semifinals earning himself a Bronze medal. Cathal bested countries such as Hungary, Spain and Poland over 2 divisions but Ultimately lost out to in both Finals earning himself 2 silver medals for Ireland. The last Irish fighter of the week was Evan Collins from Skibbereen who after winning 7 fights met his Hungarian Rival in the final. Evan had lost previously to this athlete at the world cup in May out in Rimini Italy, but Evan would not be denied this time. Evan lost the first round but ultimately turned the tide coming back in the second round to win convincingly and becoming world champion. From 5 athletes the west cork kickboxing club earned 1 bronze, 2 silvers and 1 gold for Ireland.

Through the 5 athletes that competed so well coach lan and Tony hope to inspire more kids from west cork to take up martial arts, learn self-defence, cultivate inner toughness with as well as promote confidence, discipline and resilience.

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


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THE PALACE CINEMA (1853-1988) AND THE BRIERY GAP THEATRE, (1999-2015, 2024 -)

Briery Gap II and the new Macroom Library will be officially opened on Saturday 21 September 2024 and hallelujah for that. Unfortunately, Briery Gap I was burned in 2015; after nine years, the new theatre and cultural centre is about to be launched. Since its demise, there has been a gaping cultural hole in Macroom. This was so because of the magnificent work done by Briery Gap I and the many impediments and delays to reconstruction. Finally and happily, next Saturday's opening will be the official start to a great new cultural era for the town.

The Briery Gap is built on the site of the Palace Cinema and this article will detail the story of Macroom's third cinema and until Briary Gap I showed films again. The two prior cinemas were The Olde Picture House (1911- c.1932) in School Lane/ Barrett Place and the Castle Cinema (1932-1956) in the Castle Grounds, and now part of McEgan College campus. As far as the author knows, the Palace cinema site had been a chemist shop previously, and at one stage a man sought to build a dancehall there. The Palace Cinema, Main Street, showed films from 1953 to 1988, and Scaramouche was its first. Kathleen Murphy and her late husband Nick attended on opening-night. When built, it was a state-of-the-art building, with a 500-seat capacity, heating, air-conditioning and a balcony. Jerry Lucey (nicknamed 'Poor Luce'), local entrepreneur and character, was the principal promoter and managing director. Cinemas were hugely popular at that time in Ireland and were 'windows to the world'. Jerry and his brother's Danny's families lived in adjoining houses in Railway View. The brothers had made money drawing turf from Tipperary to Cork hospitals during the Emergency; Jerry was charismatic and his family became synonymous with Macroom cinema. Later, he and others ran the Montrose Ballroom, 1964-1970. Like many small-town halls, the cinema was multi-purpose and hosted a Paddy Crosby radio show, concerts and other gatherings. It featured singers such as Bridie Gallagher and Eileen Donaghy, big stars of the 1950s/1960s. Perhaps most famously the great and famed Macroom soprano Rita Lynch and Scotsman Canon Sidney MacEwan did a wonderful concert in 1955 there. Later again, it staged Macroom's 'Tops of The Town' competition for several years. Denis and Breda Murphy managed the Palace after Jerry Lucey's sudden death (1979) until it closed in 1988, with Crocodile Dundee its last film. When the Briery Gap Theatre opened in 1999 on the same site, it showed films again. Inspector Gadget was its first, screened on 15 December 1999. Films were also shown in schools, halls and other venues



within Macroom and in surrounding villages. Entertainments in Macroom in the first half of the twentieth century were scarce. Arguably, pubs, dancing and cinema-going were the most popular. Pubs were largely men-only spaces and dances had strict supervision. A waltz was considered a 'closedance' and there was no public dancing during Lent. Official Ireland and the Churches vigilantly watched what transpired in and near the halls. Films and their content were consider 'threats' to the moral welfare of the people and they were strictly supervised. Films were banned or severely cut on an industrial scale from 1923 to about c. 1970. Gone with The Wind and Casablanca were banned, and later shown with cuts. Ireland did not get Telefís Éireann until 1960s and 2RN/Radio Éireann was benign, banal and conformist. Macroom had a population of 2,277 in 1951 and was West Muskerry's market town, with a hinterland of about 20,000. The area sustained a cinema from then until 1988. Initially films at the Palace were shown every night, except Sunday nights (in contrast to the Castle Cinema - Sunday night was its busiest night) and apart from Holy Thursdays to Easter Saturdays, marking a change from using Sunday nights for entertainment. From 1980, films were screened on Saturday and Sunday nights; very popular films ran through the week. Most locals attended the Palace at some point although absent records preclude precision on how many went. Elizabeth Lucey-Kelleher (b. 1949), Jerry's daughter and later a

university graduate, worked at the ticket-desk from about 1960, effectively becoming the cinema's bookkeeper. Her father did lodgements and paid wages. Evidence that the cinema did well is provided by Lucey financing the university education of his three eldest children and commercial courses for six others – another became a plumber. Before university grants were introduced in 1968, fees and maintenance were privately funded. Commercial college/schools were excluded from the grant scheme for many years.

In spite of a background of repression and censorship in the country, most people accepted it as 'normality'. Everyone understood 'the rules' and that they did not need to be enforced except in exceptional pregnancy-outside-of-marriage circumstances – being a notable example. The Lucey children attended town schools. Elizabeth is unaware of any adverse comment about the cinema from local teachers. religious or lay, in schools. She recalled that for some 'big' films, queues extended about seventy yards down Main Street; The Ten Commandants (1958) was one such, Mise Éire (1959) another. Exhortations to attend religious films by local religious and clergy to attend increased attendances: it may have been 'wiser' for pupils to go. She recalls many regulars and was sure that most were adult-males. Seán Ó Riada and Ruth Bean Uí Riada were regular patrons. Westerns were popular - particularly those featuring Audie Murphy. The cinema was busy until the 1970s as television access accelerated. From 1962, homes increasingly had TV sets. Further, around 1970 filmdistribution was centralised, and the cities' and large towns' cinemas received preference; small venues such as The Palace waited. As prosperity increased, more car-ownership enabled people to see films in Cork. When later shown locally, many had already seen them. Elizabeth recalled that when The Sound of Music (1965) came in 1967, the Palace was obliged to show it for two weeks. Many potential patrons had already seen it; it was a loss financially. On many nights, Elizabeth remembered 'twiddling her thumbs'. Jerry Lucey died unexpectedly in 1979, and after his death, Elizabeth was relieved that her cinema work ended. Denis and Breda (née Lucey, Jerry's niece) Murphy assumed management. They owned Spar Supermarket, Macroom and he was a prime mover of Macroom Mountain Dew Festival (1976-1982) that featured Ireland's first open-air rock concert. The 1980s in Macroom were grim, marred by high unemployment and emigration; entertainment was badly affected. Commercial videos-players were introduced to Ireland about 1980 and later, with the availability of films on tape, damaged cinema-going;

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Macroom had at one point five 'video clubs/shops'. Though expensive many people acquired videoplayers. Rentals were costly but for collectve homeviewing, it was cheaper than going to the cinema. Swapping took place. Videos allegedly showed uncut and banned movies, and some pornography; copying took place and a black market existed. Government was slow to legislate and it had an inevitable impact. Staging underage discos and holding auctions supplemented income. However, it was not enough; the Palace Cinema showed its last film, Crocodile Dundee 11 in August 1988.

Perhaps another sign of Macroom 'progress' related to some couples' behaviour there which contrasted with that of Castle Cinema patrons. Much as Montgomery, clergy and respectable opinion feared, the back row(s) of the Palace cinema ground-floor became a place for couples to cuddle and kiss. 'The courting area' was behind internal door entrances and ideally suited for the activity. As a precaution, 'scouts' were sometimes on duty. What occurred was patently well known by the usher and owner but the activity continued.

From the Palace to the Present.

Seven years after the Palace's closure the Sulán/ Sullane Film Society was founded by Cormac Shiels, Iggy Sylvester, Tom Kelly, John Creedon and Paul Lynch in 1995. Before that, John Creedon (b. 1947), a house-painter and amateur film-maker with the Lana Film Society, had shown a film to Macroom Historical Society in 1981. Creedon readily agreed to make available his 65mm projector to the society and became projectionist. Súlan's debut showing, in November 1995 featured Creedon's The Last Picture Show, a documentary on The Palace Cinema; Hal Hartley's romantic-comedy, Amateur was also shown. The venue was Ó Riada's Night Club and Shiels recalls making the room as 'cinemaesque' as possible. There was a membership of about forty, with roughly equal numbers of men and women, and most were in the twenty-thirty age group. He did not recall any 'senior' members. Sulán was delighted to get Trainspotting and Mighty Aphrodite. Aligned with the Irish Film Societies' Association, it showed many interesting films over the following years. Films shown in 1995-6 were Withnail and L a cult movie and Three Colours Red. In the following season Smoke, Trainspotting and Woody Allen's Mighty Aphrodite were featured. These were followed by Farinelli II Castrato and Beautiful Thing, adapted from a 'hit'West End musical. The appendix samples 199 films from '53, 60, 75 (1 January to 18 July) and '88; 69% and 20% respectively came from the US and UK, and because of their origin, were viewed by state and churches, especially the Catholic Church, as corrupting agents of Irish identity, nationalism, Christianity and purity. The other 11% came mostly from Europe. Despite strict censorship, especially before about 1965, a 'protected' Macroom saw films set mostly in the US and Britain but also in France, Mexico, The Caribbean, China, Japan, Russia and Rome. The context and locale were strange. Apart from emigrants or merchant or Royal navy sailors, almost no Macrompians were likely to visit these exotic places. Many westerns and gangster films had casual violence- again strange in Ireland. Hereto, Irish violence was generally personal or political. Racism, for example against Native Americans and Black people, was a given in movies and contrasted with Irish 'racism' directed towards the British and, to a lesser degree, Jewish people (politicians Dan Breen and Oliver Flanagan come to mind). Even the anarchic, 'smutty' and irreverent Carry-On films were a revelation to obedient and compliant Macroom Catholics. When In Rome (1952) cleverly showed the city in its Holy Years but also a priest in awkward situations - both aspects were interesting to Macroom's Catholic patrons.

But it was in the area of romance, male-female



relationships that films showed pointedly a different way of behaviour. Show Boat was a great musical but featured racism, and a mother and daughter deserted because of the father's gambling addiction. As well as being spectacular, The Greatest Show on Earth circus film, relates the jealousies and romantic entanglements of its performers and Jimmy Stewart's clown character having 'helped' his suffering wife to die. In 1960 screenings, issues such as abortion and right to life were explored in The Right to Be Born. In The Middle of The Night dealt with a sexual relationship between an older man and younger divorced woman, and adultery. In 1975, Justine and Juliet, a Swedish film, had as its theme a Marquis de Sade story about two sisters trying to kill a man through pleasure. The Last Picture Show was also screened that year; it was a coming-of age film in a small Texas town and involved a young man in a relationship with an older woman. Zee and Co was 'adults only' in Macroom and portraved a married couple in a love-hate relationship where she (Elizabeth Taylor's character) becomes very jealous of her husband's (Michael Caine) new 'pure' romance. These indicated what was then presentable in Macroom and of an expanding knowledge of how other societies behaved differently. Boundaries were further extended when the graphic scenes of Fatal Attraction and the underlying motive of obsession appeared on the Palace's screen. Incest between siblings featured in Flowers in The Attic.

Leading ladies were almost always glamorous and depended mostly on physical attractiveness. Ursula Andress in The Blue Max is typical. Maureen O'Hara's Mary Kate Danaher is feisty in The Quiet Man but the role is caricatured, and at one stage she receives a kick in the posterior, denoting physical violence and women's subservience.

Because of their provenance and content, films acted as an antidote to the narrow nationalistic, GAA-centred and Catholic ethos of 1920-70 Ireland, ridiculed so well by Dermot Morgan's hurley-wielding pioneer-pin-wearing GAA 'fanatic'; in ways films led Ireland's liberalisation. The popularity of films was essential in that process, especially in small towns such as Macroom. Towns needed brave entrepreneurial characters to rent/ or build cinemas and show films and Macroom had them. Television and radio with more open and less deferential attitudes built further on the process.

An improved economy and focused, dedicated local activists allowed the Briery Gap, a cultural centre, to open in the late 1990s. Though mainly used for theatre, pantomime and concerts, it also screened pictures once weekly. The Sulán Film Society also showed films there. A fire in 2015 destroyed the building but after prolonged legal and other difficulties, the centre re-opens in 2024.

Thousands of films were shown in Macroom from 1911 to 1999, perhaps as many as 8,000. Videos

became popular from the 1980s and many people watched films at home on videos or on television. Montgomery, Hayes and Brennan were from the Revolutionary generation; the Catholic faith, the Ten Commandments and Irish Ireland-ism were their touchstones; they were appointed and supported by the State; the Catholic Church and the vast majority of the people agreed publicly with decisions of the Censor and the Board of Appeal. This consensus was circular. What films and which versions were shown in Macroom and elsewhere were dictated by the censors. Censors 'cut' much as well, often distorting films' storylines. From c. 1965, censorships draconian days were over.

Cinema spread rapidly from invention to Macroom; its powerful allure ushered in a new age which changed how the world was presented and perceived. Before Irish television, cinemas were the most effective means of showing the 'outside' world. Cleverly, it did it through storytelling. Films educated, informed, shocked and addressed controversial topics. Macroom's cinema/films' experience is not unique but has particular features. It had a cinema first in 1911 and two ran simultaneously in 1953-4; apart from 1988-1999, it had functioning cinemas. Macroom, pari passu with the western world and Ireland, came under cinema's influence and was changed by its powerful presence. The effect of cinema and its importance in Ireland's and Macroom's history and social progress is understated.

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History

MACROOM HISTORY GROUP

Macroom History Group held its AGM on 2/9/2024. Before a decent crowd, the group reviewed its year, elected officers and a committee, and outlined plans for the year ahead. New members Catherine Coughlan and Alan O'Rourke were warmly welcomed to the fold and will enhance the group.

The outgoing chair Con Kelleher welcomed those present and thanked founding member Seósamh Ó Críodáin for his trojan efforts over the last two years; unfortunately he has other commitments. Thanks were also expressed to the Castle Hotel for its excellence, and in particular to Paul for his endless help at all stages. Both Mick Walsh and Cope Adult Centre members were especially commended for distributing posters. The Group is much healthier compared to 2023 and all members are active and have brought a broad range of skills, and much experience and wisdom. The constitution is a 'work in progress' that will contain a mission statement (James O'Callaghan). Brendan O'Brien cautioned on care with regard to publications and their ethical and legal implications.

Secretary Douglas Kidd reported that the group had seven events - very different and all interesting and well supported. Michael Galvin gave an informed account of The Civil War, especially on the British mindset at the Treaty negotiations, Jim Cooney spoke entertainingly on T.C. Murray with some great slides. Prof. Tom Dunne spoke beautifully about his friend and colleague Prof. John A. Murphy and he covered many aspects of one of Macroom's most brilliant sons. Songwriter and singer Declan O'Rourke has written two historical novels set in the Great Irish Famine in Macroom, and it was enthralling to hear him relating his knowledge of the period and the process of writing the books. After Christmas, James O'Callaghan gave a memorable lecture on Macroom's architecture and traced its roots back to Greek and Roman roots. Con Lynch has done enormous work

on St Gobnait history and legacy. His presentation reflected the depths he went to and his passion for the topic. He drew the biggest audience of the season. Other activities were Town Historical Walks in July and August, participation in the Heritage Fortnight and a trip to Kilmurry Museum.

Douglas too was treasurer and reported that the group is in a sound financial state. Income is derived from charges for our talks, and small grants from Cork County Council (equipment) and the local Macroom-Millstreet Municipal Council. Their help is much appreciated.

The group is a member of the West Cork History Societies Association which enables an exchange of experiences and knowledge between groups and their. Colum Cronin and his son Shane (Coppeen), and Mary O'Mahony and Noel Howard (Kilmurry) are outstanding neighbours in this regard.

Gerry Kelleher said that he and James had a good meeting with Macroom Community Hospital Matron Bernie Buckley with regard to erecting a memorial to all who died and suffered grievously in Macroom Workhouse, often unrecorded and un-named. Macroom Community Hospital is built on the same site and ground. Subsequent to the meeting a letter was written to the HSE official in charge and progress has been made.

Mick Walsh gave an account of the Macroom Schools' History exhibition. Macroom Youthreach's, St Mary's and McEgan College's presentations were excellent and revealed exciting new evidence and angles on topics close to their families and places. Paula Grey, Gemma Hurley and Christine Cronin/Nessa Bonner deserve great credit for their efforts in getting their students to produce work of such a high quality. Hopefully De La Salle will participate next year.

The technical group has worked hard on recording our talks and making them available on line via the Group's website.

Speakers/topics for the 2024-25 season include Joe Creedon (Inchigeela), Bozena Cierlik (UCC), Mary Davies on her mother Rita Lynch, Prof. Hannah Daly on Climate Change, The History of Macroom Golf Club's 100 Years, Dan Cronin on his extensive GAA memorabilia, with perhaps another topic added later. It is planned to have a 2025 Schools History Exhibition. The first talk is by Joe Creedon in the Castle Hotel at 8.00 p.m. on 16 September and Dr Bozena Ciernik (UCC), an expert in Eastern European politics and history, will speak on the Russian invasion of Ukraine and its background on 7 October, 8 pm in the Castle Hotel.

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80% drop in the number of patients on HSE waiting lists asking about treatment abroad

Over 12,000 people are on waiting lists for outpatient and inpatient appointments at University Hospital Kerry. Yet, figures released to Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú show an 80% drop in the number of patients on hospital waiting lists inquiring about availing of treatment abroad under the EU Cross Border Health Care directive. The same figures show a 55% decrease in the number of Irish patients getting reimbursements for medical procedures abroad under the Cross Border Health Care directive between 2018 and 2023.

Figures released to Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú by the HSE show a dramatic decrease in the number of Irish patients who may be on hospital waiting lists opting to avail of the Cross Border Health Care Directive and seek the treatment they need in another EU country.

Under the EU directive, the HSE will reimburse patients who travel to another EU country for the medical procedure they are waiting for but will not cover travel and accommodation costs. The HSE spent \notin 9 million euros in 2023 reimbursing patients who were on waiting lists here but opted to have the treatment carried out in another EU country. That figure is down from just over \notin 15 million in 2020.

Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has called on the HSE to launch a nationwide publicity campaign,

"There are over 700,000 Irish people on hospital waiting lists for treatments such as surgery, orthopaedics, and gynaecology. Many of those would avail of the chance to have that treatment paid for in another EU country but we can only surmise that patients on waiting lists do not know about the scheme"

Ní Mhurchú has called on the HSE to write to patients on waiting lists and advise they have the right to have their procedures carried out in another EU country and that the HSE will cover the cost of the medical treatment. That will have the dual impact of reducing our hospital waiting lists but also giving patients the options to travel abroad for treatment.

Of more concern to Ní Mhurchú is that healthcare professionals are not aware of the right of patients to seek cross-border healthcare, paid for by the HSE. Ní Mhurchú praised the HSE's Cross border Healthcare office in Kilkenny for taking a proactive approach to rolling out the directive but has called for more resources for the office to further publicise the benefits of cross border healthcare for Irish patients. Ní Mhurchú feels that one of the weaknesses of the scheme is that the upfront costs of the medical procedure must be borne by the individual and he/ she then seeks reimbursement for the cost of the healthcare upon return to Ireland. That can typically take up to 14 weeks. The Credit Union have launched a specific Cross Border health care loan which covers the cost of the medical treatment until the HSE reimburse it. Travel expenses will not be provided by the HSE who will only cover the cost of the medical treatment itself.

Mhurchú pointed out that this scheme will not suit all patients.

"If a patient has been waiting for a procedure for a long time or feel that another EU country has more of a speciality in their particular ailment, then they should look into this scheme. Travelling to another country with a substantial outlay of costs may not be an option for all patients, but for others it could mean a life changing procedure without the wait.

According to an EU report from a number of years ago, only 11% of Irish people knew of the existence of the the Cross Border Health Care directive.

Ireland South MEP Billy Kelleher has said that Ireland needs to get its act together when it comes to the issue of permitting for renewable energy projects otherwise it risks falling even further behind when it comes to climate targets and investment opportunities.

Kelleher was commenting as it was reported that the Draghi Report into EU competitiveness cited Ireland as having some of the slowest permitting processes amongst the EU's 27 Member States.

"We are one of the slowest at finalising applications with regards to wind and photo-voltaic energy projects.

"This analysis is nothing new. For years, I have been highly critical of our planning and permitting processes in this country. Now, the EU has also confirmed it is taking place. "Ultimately, archaic, lethargic processes, usurped by a failure to adhere to the principle of making decisions based on the common good, is risking Ireland's attractiveness as an investment hub for renewable energy.

"Worse still, our failure to deliver at speed and at scale renewable energy projects will see Ireland struggle to hit its 2030 climate targets.

"Ireland should be the top investment hub for renewable energy projects in the EU. Yet, we are not. Global investors look at Ireland and sadly conclude it just simply takes too long to get to shovel ready stage. They cannot tie up their investment capital for years on end waiting for decisions from Irish regulators and authorities. "The status quo cannot be allowed to continue. Major reforms and changes are needed and I will be articulating such changes to my Fianna Fáil colleagues who are drafting the party's general election manifesto. Ireland needs to turn the page on its lethargic attitude to renewable energy, and Fianna Fáil should be the ones to drive that change in mind-set," concluded Kelleher.

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

Think Globally, Act locally ECO-DYING – AND WHAT CAN WE DO WITH ALL THOSE FLEECES?

Hi! Chris Barrett back with you.

Today I have the pleasure of speaking with local artist Joan Hewetson, who has a particular interest in ecodying. Eco dying, she explained to me, is a method of dying, using mainly hedgerow plants. These wild plants give us gentle colours. By taking on the lovely soft palette of nature, they reflect the landscape from which they come.

Joan trained at the Crawford College of Art and Design, and graduated from the Contemporary Applied Art Degree Course. Her time at Crawford gave her a particular interest in working with nature. She began using natural materials such as sheep and alpaca fleeces.

As a matter of interest, animal fibres are classified as protein fibres, and plant fibres are mainly cellulose fibres, such as cotton and flax.

Joan gets her sheep fleece from a local farmer. Then she will first 'skirt' the fleece. She goes around the edge of the fleece by hand, taking away the parts of the fleece which are not suitable for artistic use. Joan tells me that these dirty unsuitable edges can be used in the garden as a mulch.

Once the fleece has been 'skirted', Joan will carefully wash it in plenty of water.

Sheep's fleece, once thoroughly cleaned, can also be used as insulation in buildings. Wool produces thermal and acoustic insulation. The wool fibres form millions of tiny air pockets that trap air and slow the transfer of temperature.

Sheep wool is often a sustainable option as it makes a short journey from farm to house as it can usually be sourced on local farms in ireland.

The wool grows naturally on sheep and at the end of its life it can be used as compost.

Wool does need to be sourced responsibly because there is a risk of anthrax which means a regulated source is desirable. Stewart Mcpherson is a Quality Control Building Surveyor in Newcastle U.K and he says that once the wool is cleaned it should be



treated with borax before it is installed and tightly packed.

There is a belief that this use of wool can be uneconomical because its preparation and cleaning is so labour intensive. Cleaning the fleeces to the correct standard is very time consuming but hopefully this will change.

The maths is depressing. Currently farmers are lucky to be paid at all. It can cost 3 euro to shear a sheep

and the fleece may sell for 25c a kilogram.

For crafts people working with the wool, who are prepared to do the work, once the wool is washed, it is spun into hanks. These can be dyed with wild plants found in hedgerows or even in your garden.

Very often native plants surprise us with the colours they give us in the dying process. It is worth noting that foxglove, ragwort, nettles, blackthorn and whitethorn bark leaves and fruit can all be used.

Joan tells me that she had an old shawl she dyed with madder-root to achieve a beautiful sunset colour, which gave a much appreciated lease of life to the old shawl.

Sheep's fleece can also be used in felting, which is a technique used in art, pictures and home accessories such as pot holders. Felting is achieved with clean unspun wool which can be used in 'wet -felting' or felted by using specialised steel felting needles. These needles have barbs on the end so they compress the wool into the desired shape.

Joan has also woven a rug from sheep's wool using a floor loom. She then dyed it using bark from the blackthorn and whitethorn tree and found it to be a very successful experiment.

As mentioned earlier the advantage of using these native plants is that they bring the beautiful safe and natural harmonious colours of nature into our homes. In a world where chemical colours and materials are ubiquitous this is an exciting alternative and in the Lee Valley, the materials are all around us.

I really enjoyed learning about wool and its potential from Joan. For an inspired student, with or without farming knowledge, I see a great "Young Scientist" opportunity here. I am hoping to hear more from Joan in the future and maybe a local student will get back to me next year!

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SAFEFOOD TIPS FOR HEALTHY EATING

Healthy eating often starts with the choices we make at the supermarket, so planning your weekly shop is important. Also planning the food you buy can help save money and reduce food waste.

The best advice to do a healthy, value for money food shop is to check what food you have and do a weekly meal plan, stick to your shopping lists, check useby dates and make the best use of the food storage available to you. Here's our guide to healthy food shopping.

Before the shops

1. Plan your meals and snacks

Take time each week to make a meal plan for meals and snacks. When deciding on meals and recipes, check your cupboards, fridge and freezer to see what ingredients you have already. This can save money and reduce food waste. However always throw out food past its use-by date.

When making your meal plan, try to pick recipes that use the same ingredients or leftover ingredients, for example leftovers from roast chicken could be used to make chicken stir fry or chicken fajitas the next day. Here's information on using leftovers.

And, if you have storage space, buying tinned and dried food in bulk can save money as they have long-shelf lives. Here's our guide to cupboard essentials.

Including a couple of meat-free meals in your meal plan is good for your health and can help reduce food bills. You can replace meat with beans, peas or lentils which are healthy, can be cheaper than meat or diary and often have a longer shelf life.

Your meal plan should include snacks to eat at home and when you are out and about. Having healthy snacks handy means you are less likely to eat treat food, which is high in sugar, salt and fat, when you get hungry between meals. It can also cut down on the money you spend on food when you are on the go. Portable healthy snacks like fruit, popcorn or nuts are great options.

2. Make a shopping list

When you have completed your meal plan for the week, make a shopping list. This will help you buy what you need and avoid impulse purchases.

3. Shop alone and when you have more time

If you bring your children shopping, set clear rules on what they can put in the trolley before you go into the shop. And if you can do the food shop alone to avoid children asking for food not on your list. Try to go food shopping at a time when you're under less pressure, don't feel stressed or hungry. If you shop later in the day supermarkets often reduce the price of fresh food which can help reduce your bills and food waste.

At the shops

4. Stick to your list Once you make a shopping list, stick to it. This means you will avoid buying food you may not need.

5. Know your labels

Compare food labels to pick the healthiest item and the best value. Check:

Sugar, fat and salt content

Serving sizes and amounts Prices

To help you make healthy choices here's a guide to understanding nutrition labels.

Check use-by dates to buy food that will last longer. These dates tell you when you have to have eaten the item. Keep in mind this phrase: "Treat Best Before as a guideline and Use By as a deadline". Here's more on use-by and best-before dates which will not only reduce food waste but could help you save money.

6. Beware of special offers

Avoid "special offers" unless they are on your list. Our research as shown that a third of foods on special offer are high in sugar, salt and fat. That said, offers on healthy food can be cost effective, so use your judgement.

7. Avoid prepared food

Prepared fresh food, like chopped vegetables or grated cheese, can be more expensive as it often costs more for a smaller amount.

8. Check food packaging

Don't buy food with damaged packaging. Cans should be free from dents or bulges and other packaging should be free from damage or leaks.

9. Bag your groceries safely

Pack cold foods together and separate raw meats, poultry, and seafood from other foods. Regularly cleaning reusable bags in the washing machine, will help avoid bacteria contaminating food.

After the shop

10. Get cold foods home fast

Take frozen and chilled foods straight home to the fridge and freezer. Use a coolbag or coolbox to keep your groceries cold during the trip, particularly in warm weather or if you have a long journey. Never leave food sitting in a hot car.

11. Store your food carefully

Storing food properly is important to keep it safe to eat for longer, reduce waste and food bills. It's also important to put meat raw meat, fish and poultry on the bottom shelf so that they don't touch other food. Don't over pack a fridge which could make it difficult for the cool air to circulate. Here's our guide to getting the best use out of your fridge.

Freezing is a great way to store food and freezing cooked meals can help you stick to your meal plans. You can reduce waste by freezing food if it is near its use-by date – do check packaging to see if it is suitable to freeze. If food is properly frozen it will stay safe to eat indefinitely, though after a time the taste and texture may suffer. Here's our guide to getting the most out of your freezer.

How to read nutrition labels

To make healthier choices, you need to be able to make sense of food labels.

Understanding food labels can be tricky. It takes time and practice. Start at home by getting familiar with labels on the foods you eat regularly. Then when you are shopping, compare labels of similar products to find the healthiest option. Here are the things to look out for.

What's on the label?

Nutrition information can be found on the back/side of food labels. Sometimes you will also find a snapshot of this information on the front of pack.

Nutrition information is displayed per 100g and sometimes per recommended serving.

Use the per 100g column to compare products. Look at the recommended portion size. This may be more or less than what you actually eat. How do I know if a food is low, medium or high in fat, saturated fat, sugar and salt?

Some labels use colour coding to show at a glance if a food is high, medium or low in fat, saturated fat, sugar and salt.



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
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MEMORIALS AND REMEMBRANCE



"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil, for You are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me" (Psalm 23:4).

Welcome back dear student, to follow on from last week's study of Jesus, the Light of the world - let's talk about darkness. How many were, or are, fearful of the dark? Often as children certain things made us afraid: walking home alone in the dark, waking up in a power cut in complete darkness, seeing shadows in the corner, or hearing strange noises. These were tangible forms of 'darkness' and those fears were understandable, but most people outgrow their fears as their understanding matures. Nowadays we have more lights than ever, yet our world is in greater darkness. Sadly, darkness is celebrated, and wickedness and evil are being promoted as good (Isaiah 5:20). It's deception and delusion, but God's goodness leads to repentance, and this is what we pray for: that the blindness that has shrouded people's hearts would be shattered by the Light of His Truth to exposes every work of darkness (Ephesians 5:10-14). At this time of year loneliness and fear of the dark nights can try to bring a person down. You can be surrounded by people and yet feel isolated and alone. The twenty third Psalm brings freedom from both loneliness and darkness. The Spirit of God inspired David with insight to see parallels between his work as a shepherd for his father's sheep, and the way that God looks after his children with protection, provision, and restoration. As David understood God's care and love for His people you can hear the sound of Hope and Joy released through those verses.

Dear friend, you are never alone. The Lord promised us that He would never leave us or forsake us. Our faith is activated and productive as we study and meditate upon the promises in God's Word and trust in His Faithfulness to carry it through (Joshua 1:8-9). "The grass withers, the flowers fade but the Word of our God will stand forever" (Isaiah 40:8). This means that no matter what, God will never go back on His Word! People break their word all the time – it's just human nature, the fickleness of some. But God promised that He would always be with us, and He means it. David witnessed the evidence of this when God rescued him from danger as he protected his sheep. It was those early experiences that later gave him the faith to run out on the battlefield against the giant Goliath. "The Lord Who rescued me from the paw of the lion and from the paw of the bear, He will rescue me from the hand of this Philistine" (1 Samuel 17:37).

When you trust in the Lord Jesus, having repented of sin and turned to Him for Salvation, you can be sure that God is with you right there in every situation you face as your Deliverer and Friend (Proverbs 18:24; Isaiah 30:15). "The Lord is my Light and my Salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the Stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" (Psalm 27:1). God tells us to cast our cares upon Him for He cares for us and will sustain us (1 Peter 5:7; Psalm 55:22). This is the essence of a healthy relationship – where each one knows that the other is totally with and for them. It causes peace to dwell in the heart and stabilise the life. The Lord advised us to keep our minds upon His faithful Love and the end result will be Peace that cannot be compared (Isaiah 26:3; Philippians 4:6-7). Choose to believe Jesus and enter into His Rest.
