

What a night of nostalgia and pride in the production, with almost all of the original cast back on stage and again directed by Ann Dunne. The beautiful new theatre, the familiar faces on stage, the unbelievable talent and energy on show, the superb production and the commitment by everyone to get to this production and project over the line was truly amazing. We look forward to many more nights like this in the near future.

The very successful Danone Schools Cook Off in the marquee again provided the highest of standard of food produced by all schools that reached the finals. ## THE INAUGURAL CONCERT

#### AT THE BRIERY GAP, MACROOM, 21ST SEPTEMBER

For the first live performance on 21st Sept 2024 in the new Briery Gap Theatre, the Lee Valley Entertainers, the brainchild of producer Ann Dunne reprised the variety show of thirty years ago broadcast LIVE on RTÉ One's Gay Byrne Hour, compered by Joe Duffy from the assembly hall of McEgan College, Macroom. The prize money for winning the Gay Byrne Hour/ Quinnsworth/Crazy Prices nationwide competition was used as a starter for the campaign to have a purpose-built Theatre in Macroom, which became the Briery Gap.

The seed that sprouted into the audition began as a result of a phone call between Peggy Buckley & Ann Dunne after hearing the announcement on the Gay Byrne radio show about an all-Ireland variety competition. They decided very quickly to bring a show to fruition and to compete for the £10000 prize

The original broadcast in 1994 was around 45 minutes duration and was truly a variety show, including songs from the musicals, some opera, classical instrumental, light jazz, traditional Irish, and comedy. The 2024 performance was broadened to two hours to include a mood-setting repertoire of songs from the 1950's to a montage backdrop of photos of the Palace cinema built in 1954 on the site of which the Briery Gap Theatre now stands. It included comedy sketches and a tribute to the composer, singer, musician Jimmy McCarthy, part of the extraordinary McCarthy family living only a few doors down from the theatre.

The tickets for the concert on Sat night were booked out primarily by word of mouth. I knew the seriousness with which this concert was being planned through my husband, musician John Philip Murray. Weeks before rehearsals were called, he was, as is the form for all professional musicians, practising, practising, practising. No-one sees the work behind the scenes needed to get any production on stage whether amateur or professional.

Entering the theatre on the evening of Saturday 21st Sept 2024, there were smiles from one to another, friends and people unknown — there was a palpable feeling that 'this is a very special night'. Personally, I don't remember the concert 30 years ago as I was minding a three-year-old! John Philip got an audio recording of the 1994 broadcast from Ann Dunne in early Sept 2024. As I listened, I was amazed at the variety, the professionalism and the smooth transition between each number. It was easy to hear how they had won.

The concert on Sat 21st Sept 2024 was also a winner. There was a feeling of something in the air that seemed to hold fragments of the concert from 30 years ago. This was mainly due to the cast being practically the same as in 1994. The other ingredient was the audience — a number of whom would have been in attendance in 1994 at McEgan College and later at Cork Opera House. For those who missed this year's concert, RTE Nationwide made recordings of the show and interviews with some members of the cast and audience to be broadcast before the end of

We all had our reasons to want the Briery Gap rebuilt and reopened. I was looking forward to meeting other writers of our First Friday writing group at the library, and pop in to have a chat with Lorraine or another librarian whilst borrowing or dropping back books. This library is also a social hub, one that we are privileged as a country to still value. For the rural community who have lost a lot of their post offices coming into the local town is an important event and having a permanent base for the library with such wonderfully supportive librarians is a most welcoming home from home. The library reopened in August and the books, librarians and readers are slowly settling in shoosh...quiet please!

Films are now back at the Briery Gap via the Irish Film Institute (IFI) starting with 'That They May Face The Rising Sun', an adaptation of the final novel from John McGahern. Having films back in the Briery Gap brings to mind dark evenings of autumn and winter at the Film Club and post film discussions over a drink in Gerard's or standing not wanting to leave even if we were all frozen.

And the theatre? The old Briery Gap theatre also provided a myriad of shows over the years from comedy, drama, musicals, concerts and the now yearly transition year programme. I think of all the memorable theatrical productions I have seen there including Tom Hickey in 'The Gallant John Joe' by Tom Mac Intyre, Kevin McAleer's drollery and the premiere of a Thomas Kilroy play. On the evening after the 2024 inaugural Lee Valley Entertainment concert, the Briery Gap held a musical evening by Ensemble Baroque de Rennes with a workshop on the following day. No doubt plans are cooking for further drama and musical fun in the months ahead.



#### First Year Camogie Blitz




#### TY Activities: TY Ploughing

# Winners of the 2024 Irish Language Book of the Year Publishing Awards Announced

Last night (Monday, 23rd September 2024) at a celebration of publishers and writers of Irish-medium books in the National Irish Language Theatre, An Taibhdhearc, Galway, An tOireachtas, in conjunction with Foras na Gaeilge, announced the winners of the 2024 Irish Language Book of the Year Publishing Awards. Three (3) awards were presented: Gradam Uí Shúilleabháin (the Irish Language Book of the Year for Adults), Gradam Réics Carló (Irish Language Book of the Year for Children) and Gradam de Bhaldraithe (publications translated to Irish).

Gradam Uí Shúilleabháin was awarded to publishing house, Dingle Publishing, for their work Crainn & Toir written by Máirín Uí Chonchubhair. Publishing House, Futa Fata, received the Gradam Réics Carló Award for Na Trí Mhuicín, written by Áine Ní Ghlinn and illustrated by Paddy Donnelly. Gradam de Bhaldraithe was awarded to Éabhlóid for their work Athmháthair, a translation by Máire Nic Mhaoláin of the Italian book Accabadora by Michela Murgia.

Twenty (20) books in total were shortlisted this year over the three categories. These annual awards are sponsored by Foras na Gaeilge. The 2024 winners received their awards from Foras na Gaeilge CEO, Seán Ó Coinn alongside the 2024 Oireachtas President, Pádraig Mac Fhearghusa. "I wish to extend my heartfelt congratulations to this year's

award-winning publishing houses, Éabhlóid, Futa Fata and Dingle Publishing", said Máirín Nic Dhonnchadha, CEO of An tOireachtas. 





After the event I felt much more informed on how IGG operates and all the opportunities that are **Enrolment Ceremony for Ardilaun Guides** 



### **European Commission must ensure procurement framework** respects taxpayer money - MEP Kelleher

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher, has called on the European Commission to ensure its proposed new Procurement Framework respects taxpayer money and enables Member States to secure value for money when entering into large infrastructure projects.

Kelleher, a member of the Economic and Monetary Affairs Committee, was commenting after it was reported that the Irish Government is having difficulties with construction company, BAM, with regard to the development of the much-needed National Children's Hospital in Dublin.

"What should have been a €640 million project to be completed by 2020, is now likely to cost €2.2 billion with a new expected completion date of 2026.

"At the start of this year, Member State ministers highlighted improvements in procurement as a means for reinvigorating competitiveness in the EU. President Von Der Leyen did, to her credit, take heed of these concerns and committed to reviewing the EU procurement framework to favour EU products and to give a fair chance to EU

"Only two weeks ago, Mario Draghi, in his much lauded report on competitiveness, also called for an overhaul of how the Union, and its Member States, handles procurement.

"However, while boosting competitiveness is essential, I believe we must also do a radical review of the assessment criteria to ensure that contracts are only awarded to companies that will truly respect, and bring value to, our taxpayers'

"The Irish Government has clearly signalled its unhappiness with its ability to hold companies to account for clear contractual breaches.

"The European Commission must grasp the opportunity to not only use the framework as a tool for boosting competitiveness but also for delivering efficiency and value for money for tax-payers. The review must also examine the assessment criteria and must enable Member States to give due consideration to the past performance of companies. Private companies earning public money must be held to the highest standards, especially if they want to secure future contracts," concluded Kelleher.

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### **Kilmurry Active Retirement**

#### Support to stay healthy

Life expectancy has improved dramatically. You may have many, many more years to come. Unfortunately, longer lifespans also mean more opportunity for illness, chronic disease, pain, suffering, depression, and dependence on others. Consequently, an important question arises for each of us as individuals, and for our society. Since science has helped us to live longer, are we to be gifted with much more life in those added years, or are we to be doomed to have more morbidity and to be much longer dying? According to the palliative care nurses that I have asked, the death process is significantly extended over the past twenty years. Our creaking hospitals suggest that the same applies to morbidity. The increase in lifespan and its impact on our health service is rarely out of the news. We are told that we should expect and plan to spend more and more billions treating more ageing people. But we should plan too, and with more determination than we are applying, to add more life and less morbidity to those added years. We are lucky that we can increase the proportion of "healthspan" within our lifespans. Studies indicate that following a healthy lifestyle, increases lifespan by about fourteen years for women and ten years for men. But are we adding healthy years or more years of morbidity? To answer this crucially important question, a study at Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health in 2018, took three common diseases as a proxy for morbidity: heart disease, cancer, and diabetes. Their study showed that a healthy lifestyle added on average ten more years free from these diseases for women, and eight more years for men, in comparison with those who did not follow the healthy lifestyle.

Isn't more healthspan precisely what most people want? Hardly any health worker, civil servant or politician would disagree. Yet, funding for initiatives to help older people keep fit and well is a pittance as each voluntary committee of an Active Retirement association knows. Increasing healthspan takes investment too, but it represents exceptional value for money. We are thankful for Cork Education and Training Board which has been, for years, funding tutors to enable us to provide courses on health, wellbeing, and diet, and for us to provide a wide range of exercise programmes, as well as social connection - actions which according to extensive scientific research increases healthspan in our communities. No fault of theirs, due to increased demand and a fixed budget, the consequential funding restriction resulted in our pittance dropping to half a pittance since last year. For this autumn term their support to us has a value of about €1000. We have almost eighty members, so about €12.50 per member. To put this in context, should just one of our members end up in hospital for this term it would cost the State about €54,000, while a public nursing home would cost over €18,000. If our activities are successful in encouraging our members to adopt a healthy lifestyle, we may add up to eight hundred healthy years to our health-spans, saving the State, and our families, many tens of millions. We are just one association. Imagine now the potential impact of our five hundred associations around the country. There is no more effective or cost-efficient means of taking pressure off our health service than adopting healthy lifestyles. We were disappointed with our reduced allocation. When I was a younger man, I could get angry at such things. But don't we know that those working in education, in the health



service, and our decision makers are committed to doing their best for us. They are captured by the urgency of crises. Crisis is the enemy of rational long-term planning. We wouldn't do any different. We too understand that an elderly patient, say our family member, lying three days on a trolley waiting for admission, trumps a training course in West Cork that may be effective, depending on the inclination of attendees, but where its most positive effects are years ahead.

Which brings me at last to the point. We must see and accept that the main responsibility for directing a greater proportion of our added years to healthspan rests with us as individuals, and with us in our communities. It is we who are best placed to provide sustained encouragement and supports to our friends and neighbours. It was always and will remain to be so. Yet a bit more assistance surely wouldn't go astray and would help us to keep despondency at bay.

On the 18th of September thirty-seven of us headed off to Aultagh, Dunmanway, to the private garden of Les and Christine Wilson. What an impressive garden it is. It was obviously a labour of love, organically emerging, from when they moved to the area in 1990. Our group was really appreciative of the warmest welcome and the generosity of our hosts. On the way home we pulled up at Barrett's in Coppeen, fuelling ourselves rather than the bus! We were blessed with the weather, and we all had a lovely day out.




#### **MUINEFLIUCH NS**

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



This book is a first-hand personal account of the Irish war of independence where mountainy men have sown. This gives a personal account of the fight for Irish freedom in west Cork from 1916 to 1921.


It's a chronicle of social and military aspects of the war of independence and describes the IRA activities in the area from Macroom to as far west as Ballingeary and Coolea and covering Ichigeelagh to Ballyvourney and the Derynasaggart (mountains).

Micheál Ó Súileabháin joined the army struggle for freedom in his local area of Kilnamartyra at the age of 13 years he describes the attack on an armed police patrol, barracks and a largescale engagement against the elite of Britain's specially recruited fighting forces in Ireland. The infamous Auxiliaries - all ex - commissioned officers and decorated veterans of the First World War.

This is a personal record of ambushes ect, carried out by young volunteers who did not wait to be confronted but went on the attack against better armed and trained men, and the emerged victorious and won.





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


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### NATIONAL YOUTH COUNCIL OF IRELAND

Young people from Cork call on elected representatives to increase funding for youth work services ahead of Budget 2025

Yesterday, the National Youth Council of Ireland (NYCI), which represents organisations working with young people nationwide, held a special event bringing young people face to face with members of the Oireachtas to discuss funding for youth services. Taking place at Buswells Hotel in Dublin, the young advocates were able to speak directly to key decision makers ahead of Budget 2025.

Mair Kelly from Mizen Head said: "I really enjoyed meeting our local representatives and sharing with them some of the amazing experiences I've had with NYCI. There's so much important work happening in our local area to support young people and I want to make sure that our local representatives carry that message to the national level, so that youth work in our area and beyond gets its fair share come budget time."

NYCl is calling for a €15 million increase in funding for youth work in order for the needs of young people to be met. The advocates present at today's event, many of whom were NYCI Local Champions, told policymakers about the vital role these services have played in their own lives and how this funding is essential to keep these supports running.

Kathryn Walsh, NYCl Director of Policy and Advocacy, said "The National Youth Council of Ireland is devoted to advocating for young people and youth work to receive the necessary investment and support they deserve. This event was a great opportunity for policymakers to hear about how youth work can transform young people's lives. We hope that this has made its value clear and that our elected representatives will commit to increasing funding in this year's budget."

According to the NYCI, this investment of an additional €15 million is needed to secure the future of crucial youth work services, which would have a significant positive impact on local communities. Enhanced funding for universal and targeted youth work would ensure that growing local demand is met, giving every young person in the community access to essential support. Capital investment in physical youth work spaces would help maintain accessible, welcoming facilities in towns and neighbourhoods, making it easier for young people to engage with these services. Furthermore, strengthening Youth Information Services would provide local communities with a vital resource to ensure young people have access to accurate and trustworthy information that can benefit their development and wellbeing.

### Macroom Indian Community Onam Festival Celebration 2024

Macroom Indian Community has been in existence since 2022, and it represents Indians living in Macroom and District. Numbers continue to increase and now has about 200, including children. Almost all are from Kerala, a costal state in South-West India, facing the Arabian Sea. Many work in Macroom Community Hospital and in Care Choice and Cahereen nursing homes and some travel to work in the acute hospitals in Cork. Without them it is very likely that any of the three local services could function in Macroom.

India is the most populous country in the world

with about 1.4 billion people: Kerala has about 33.5 million people, almost as many as Poland or Ukraine. About 7.2 million people currently live in the island of Ireland. One relatively small state in India has almost five times as many people as Ireland and perhaps more Catholics - c. 6.6 million. Like Ireland (of the Saints and Scholars), India/Kerala has a long and ancient history of learning and scholarship. Today Kerala has the highest rate of literacy and the highest levels of education of Indian states. Interestingly, the population has about 50% Hindus, 25% Muslims, 20% Catholics or Orthodox, and the remainder are Protestants, Jains, Jews, Buddhists, non-religious etc. All seem to live in reasonable harmony. Unifying factors are geographical isolation, a lovely climate - apart from monsoons, its own language Malayalam (and English as India's lingua franca). All sectors 'buy into' the region's mythology and it is from there that the Onam Festival originated.

Onam is an annual Hindu harvest festival, one of three major annual celebrations. It honours the Vamana avatar of Vishnu, the homecoming of legendary King Mahabali and the myths of Kashyapa and Parashurama. 'It is something beyond a harvest; it is a festival of Kerala's cultural identity, solidarity and the soul of giving' (The Economic Times). It lasts for ten days, and each has a name and special place.

### The ten days of Onam

Ireland had its Lúnaghasa (Irish for 'August) autumn or harvest festivities; places such as Bengour has held harvest festival for many years. This year's Macroom Oman Festival took place in Clondrohid Hall on 21 September. Ms Melba Vilson was MC for the day and one of the principal organisers. A centre piece was a beautiful traditional floral arrangement - the Pookalam. People gathered from twelve on and activities began at about two p.m. About 125 attended and they were mostly parents and children; younger attendees ranged from babies to third-level students, toddlers to teenagers. To me it seemed that all partook whole-heartedly. There were some older people too; all agegroups blended seamlessly in a gentle, friendly and embracing atmosphere. There was an air of fun and excitement but without agitation. Children had great enjoyment but in a calm and pleasant fashion. Courtesy and kindness were the order of the day. The colourful clothes worn by men and women, boys and girls were elegant and classy, enhancing the occasion. Women wore saris with embroidered wraparounds and many of the men wore traditional mundus. Jewellery was dressy without being gaudy and bright bracelets decorated many wrists. The jet-black hair was impressive, and the ladies were often adorned with intricate headpieces. Keralan music was played on a sophisticated sound system which added greatly to a vibrant atmosphere. 'Spoon-and-lemon' races, with the spoon held in the mouth, generated serious contests and tight finishes. For the under fives, a 'scramble' for sweets spread on the floor was hotly contested and eagerly watched over by their parents. After, a traditional meal, of many items, was served; spices, fruit, herbs, rice and bread were the main components - it looked and tasted beautiful. I had my chaperone, Ms. Susan Jijo (CNM 2 CUH) sitting beside me and she explained all the components on my plate. It took three sitting to feed all. Luckily, I was

supplied with a spoon, but the Keralans used their fingers deftly and made small, combined portions before eating. All served and cleared

The formalities came next. Key-note speaker Dr. Shyam PS Nair formally invited all and explained the significance and history of Onam; then 'King' Mahabali, Mr.Lijoy Divakaran, entered ceremoniously and majectically, and took his place on the stage. He had spear, crown and traditional dress. Next yours truly, as the invited guest, spoke and thanked Melba and her colleagues for the invitation, courtesy shown and the privilege of being present. The contrasts and connections between Ireland and India/ Kerala were referenced. Common features to Ireland and India/Kerala are shared colours in our national flags, colonial pasts, a love of learning and education and of music, dance and film, emigration and Catholicism. Kerala is known as 'Land of the Lamps' and lighting a special lamp is an essential part of the Onam protocol. Various representatives came from the audience and ioined the 'Emperor', chairperson and invited quest to ignite the lamp. There next followed a beautiful, graceful and intricate formal danced, the Thiruvathira Kali (as informed by Silpa) which was performed by eight women - Sreekala, Tintu, Soumya, Soumya KJ, Shilpa, Ashna, Nitha andf Limna). With formalities over, dancing and singing continued but in a less formal way but still in an Indian fashion.

The Kerelan Macroomians have brought a wide range of skills such as in nursing and patient care and IT and have founded cricket and chess clubs. Most strikingly, and as witnessed and experienced by the writer, they have brought gentleness, composure, kindness, competence and intelligence in abundance - tributes that will enhance our community. Happily, they are delighted to be in Ireland and most reported that they have been well treated and respected. The party continued long into the night, until tired children and parents went home exhausted but exhilarated after the full and active day of fun and reverence at the Onam Festival. The town is fortunate to have such a vibrant and talented group in our midst.

### THINK GLOBALLY, ACT LOCALLY

Joe Creedon Daniel Corkery Summer School

Hi! Chris Barrett back with you.

Today I have the pleasure of talking with Joe Creedon about the Daniel Corkery Summer School which I had the delightful experience of attending in July 2024.

The Daniel Corkery Summer School continues the tradition of Summer Schools which have been run for decades in the hotel in Inchigeelagh. Daniel Corcorery would stay with Joe Creedon's grandparents in the village from 1920 to 1926.

In 1925, Daniel Corkery published his bestknown work, 'The Hidden Ireland', which will be 100 years old next year. Daniel Corkery was a professor at U.C.C. and also a great influence on Sean O Faolain and Frank O'Connor, two of our best known Cork writers. He was not only a colleague of Terence McSweeney, but also a propagandist, nationalist, musician, playwright and watercolour artist; and he achieved all this, enduring a lifelong disability which affected his mobility. It was this disability which led him into the field of Education. He was initially a Primary school teacher and latterly a lecturer at U.C.C.

Daniel Corkery ran his famous Summer schools in the village of Inchigeela between 1922 and 1926. He promoted the Irish language through his various classes and was intensely aware of Irish culture. An example of this can be seen in his book, 'The Hidden Ireland', where he discussed the oral traditions of the local people in the 17th and 18th centuries. This old tradition existed everywhere, but was hidden by the Penal Laws. Joe tells me that he felt it was a touchstone of our Irish culture which continues with the very Irish tradition of story-telling.

In the current Summer School all these strands are given an outlet. Over the week there is an Art Exhibition which can include work by local artists. In 2024 Tom Campbell, local artist, exhibited the most recent collection of his personal creations.

Every year the hotel tends to fill up every year with repeat enthusiasts from the U.K and Europe. Each year there is a theme. This year there was a theme of 'Reconciling History'. Joe tells me that they like to involve history most years. This year they chose a local story. This concerned an R.I.C family. They were the last remaining R.I.C police family in the village of Inchigeela. Their family name was Moore and Michael Moore resigned once the Civil War began. The family originally lived in Macroom but they were forced by the IRA

to get out of the country even though they were native Irish people. They arrived in Manchester. There Michael Moore died and his wife, his widow, got their eldest son into Vickers, a British Engineering company in Manchester, where he was trained. From there he was appointed to the University of Liverpool, and into the nuclear research facility there. He ended up being one of the Manhattan team that developed the atomic bomb in Chicago.

The whole experience had a big effect on him. As a result, he ended his life being a politician and he was awarded an OBE for Service to Science. He became very outspoken about the effects of the atomic bomb, especially on the military.

The family have a grave in Inchigeela and the grave is of the older and younger infant brothers and sisters of George Moore. There is the intention to put a plaque on the grave telling the story of the family.

The evening of commemoration in the 2024 Summer School was presented by Michael Horgan from Ennis, who is a science teacher who gave a very clever analysis of the story of the atomic bomb. But the story does not end there. Michael's own great grandfather was the RIC sergeant prior to the Moore appointment, who was tragically murdered at the hotel in

Inchigeela in August 1920.

In an earlier summer school, there was a reconciliation commemorating that story with the Moore family and with three local families who were involved in the IRA at the time. Michael, himself has been a regular visitor to the Summer School and to Inchigeela ever since, and has found that whole process to be very healing for their family.

It is also a recognition of local history in which these two events are remembered and Joe tells me he hopes for a continuation with another story from the War of Independence. This will hopefully happen next year. This lecture will be delivered by a great grandson of Cecil Guthrie who was the last auxiliary to die at the Kilmichael ambush on 28th November 1920.

The Summer School always likes to touch on Irish history and early in the week this year there was a talk on the life of Rose Dugdale who was very instrumental in the activities of the IRA during the '70s. She is best known for the extraordinary robbery of the Beit paintings in 1974. This is now known as the Russborough House Art Heist which included the robbery of works by Goya, Gainsborough, Hals, Reubens, Velazquez and Vermeer. She served a prison sentence for that in Limerick and her partner was one of the big bomb makers in the IRA at the time. He was also one of the Colombia Three, part of the gun running business that was going on in the 70s and 80s.

Later on in the week there is an annual concert, and that concert takes place due to the enthusiasm of Ursula Williams who is a member of several music groups in London. They bring 8 or 10 colleagues over to Inchigeela from England every year and they provide the Summer school with a wonderful concert. This year the concert showcased the work of Stanford, dealing particularly with his Irish Airs. Grateful thanks go to Tom Shorter for his invaluable assistance at these concerts.

For the last number of years a play has been a very popular addition to the Summer school provided by the experienced award winning Cratloe County Players. These plays have gone on to become one of the most popular events at the summer school. This year they put on an abbreviated version of, 'A Wake in the West', which like other events, played to a full house. Cork County Arts Office are the sole supporters

Due to the wonderful support and great expectations of the regular attenders, exciting plans are already afoot for next year.

Outside of the Summer School, concerts are promoted several times during the year in the hotel. Ned's Shed is also a popular haunt at weekends and for social events, and the local Active Retirement group can often be found in the hotel enjoying events. There is a popular monthly folk evening, held on the second wednesday of the month and often songwriters gather to give performances of their work. There are ballad sessions, and on Saturdays there is live music in the bar for youngsters.

Over the years the Hotel has seen many family events including, sadly, Funerals. There have

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






### 70th Anniversary of Flooding of "The Gearagh"

It is 70 years since The Gearagh was flooded to facilitate the building of two hydro-electric dams in Carrigadrohid and Inniscarra. It is long past the time for this nature reserve to be protected and given the resources it needs, and I have been raising this in the Dáil over the last number of years. The issue has also been passionately raised in the Seanad, at European and County Council level which will add to the case for The Gearagh. I believe The Gearagh should be designated a national park as it would result in greater biodiversity and would also be of huge benefit to tourism in the area. This strange and mystical habitat is somewhere I hold close in my heart and a regular place I visit and enjoy.

Recently the Minister for State, Malcom Noonan, confirmed to me that a meeting between the ESB and the regional and scientific teams in the National Parks and Wildlife Service will be taking place to discuss the draft management plan now on the table. This is something I have been raising over the years and I am delighted that finally it has been confirmed to me that the final Management Plan will be published. The Gearagh is primarily owned and managed

by the ESB and has extensive legal protections as a Special Area of Conservation, a Special Protection Area and a designated Nature Reserve. The view of locals need to be part of this plan as many have raised with me directly the requirement for major improvements to be put in place to maintain trails, litter control, improved signage and parking. The Lee Valley deserves to have its tourism potential realised and I will continue raising this with the Minister.

New Strategy Seeks to Transform Pharmacies

### INTO DYNAMIC HEALTHCARE HUBS

30 September 2024 – The Irish Pharmacy Union has launched a new White Paper, outlining a policy framework to transform pharmacy care in Cork by turning pharmacies into key healthcare hubs, improving access to community care. The IPU says, that with the right strategy and resources pharmacies can play a greater role in improving access to community healthcare.

TD's Padraig O'Sullivan, Michael Collins, Aindrias Moynihan and Pat Buckley attended the event held to mark World Pharmacist Day in Dublin this week. Speaking at the launch Tom Murray, President of the IPU, said, "With 78 million visits

per year pharmacies are the most accessed part of our healthcare system. However, the absence of a national pharmaceutical care policy limits their potential."

To enable the rollout of this vision Murray said "pharmacy care will require the appropriate level of resourcing. Many pharmacies, particularly those in rural areas, are facing financial difficulties due to outdated payment structures and rising costs."

"The average pharmacy receives almost twothirds of its income from the State for providing care through the community drug schemes. The fees provided for this care have been frozen since 2009, and pharmacies like every other business and individual, have experienced soaring operational costs."

In conclusion Mr Murray said, "There is so much exciting potential in pharmacy care. It is possible to revolutionise our pharmacy care services within a few short years, but it will require vision and, above all, the proper resourcing of our pharmacies to make this a reality."

In an exciting quarter final of the MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior Hurling Championship at Kilmichael, an injury time free, struck over magnificently by Darragh O'Brien from his own 65m line, was all that separated the teams when the final whistle blew shortly afterwards. The scoring was dominated by the respective freetakers, O'Brien for 'Scarra with 0-7 and Adam Dinan for Donoughmore who accounted for 0-9 of his sides tally but the key score of the game, the goal for Inniscarra in the 44th minute resulted from a short puck out from the Donoughmore goal which was intercepted and blazed to the net by Daniel Murphy. Conditions at Kilmichael were excellent and there was a fair sized attendance. Inniscarra started well with a point in less than a minute from a Darragh O'Brien free and Daniel Murphy doubled their tally minutes later, scooping the sliotar over from close range. Adam Dinan opened the Donoughmore scoring on 6 but Inniscarra were slightly dominant and added points from an O'Brien free and Ardal O'Connell from play to lead by 0-4 to 0-1 after ten minutes.

Donoughmore were assisted by the breeze and began to settle, driven on by Aidan Corkery, Mark Foley and Frankie Honohan in defence. Adam Dinan pointed a 60m free in the 11th minute, Mark Lucey hit over from the half way line, Shane Sexton struck a huge point from a free in his own half to level and Dave McDonald put Donoughmore in front in the 16th minute. Daniel Murphy equalised for 'Scarra, Dinan pointed to restore the slender lead for Donoughmore in the 19th minute and his side suffered a major loss when full forward Mark Lucey had to retire injured soon after. In the ten minutes before the break, Donoughmore continued to force the pace, points from Colm O'Callaghan and Dinan increased their lead to 0-8 to 0-5 but a brace from Darragh O'Brien, one from play, in answer to a converted '65' from Dinan left Inniscarra just two points adrift at half time, Donoughmore leading by 0-9 to 0-7.

Donoughmore lost Pádraig Buckley to injury shortly after the restart and Darragh O'Brien fired over two points from frees to level matters at 0-9 each by the 39th minute. Dave McDonald hit a sweet point to put Donoughmore back in front but then disaster befell them. Donoughmore had been lucky to escape on a few occasions with short puck outs but came badly unstuck in the 44th minute when another was fumbled in front of goal, Daniel Murphy swooped and got a clear shot at goal from short range with inevitable consequences, a goal which swung the game Inniscarra's way and left Donoughmore chasing the game thereafter.

Kieran Rice had a point immediately to open up a three point advantage for 'Scarra, 1-10 to 0-10 and with their defence performing well with Mark Linehan, James Buckley and Shane Buckley rock solid, Kieran Rice, Darragh O'Brien and Jerry Roche very hard working



### YOUR ANNUAL LEAVE ENTITLEMENTS **FROM WORK**

Many of us are looking forward to our summer holidays and some may have questions about their employment rights in relation to taking their annual leave. The following are some common queries

### Should I be paid by my employer while I am on annual leave?

Annual leave is paid time off work. Holiday pay must be paid in advance at your normal weekly rate. If your pay changes from week-to-week (for example, because of commission or bonus payments), your holiday pay is the average of your pay over the 13 weeks before you take holidays.

#### Are all workers entitled to paid annual leave?

Yes, all employees are entitled to annual leave, including full-time, part-time, temporary and casual

### How much annual leave am I entitled to?

Your annual leave entitlement depends on how much time you have worked in a leave year.

The statutory leave year runs from 1st April to 31st March. Most employers use the calendar year (January to December) instead of the official leave year to calculate your entitlement for administrative reasons, but this does not affect your statutory leave entitlements. Your employer should tell you when your leave year begins and ends.

There are 3 ways to calculate your annual leave entitlement. You can use whichever method gives you the greater (biggest) entitlement

- 1. If you have worked at least 1,365 hours in a leave year, you are entitled to the maximum of 4 working weeks' paid annual leave. You cannot use this method if you changed employment during
- 2. Calculate 1/3 of a working week for each calendar month in which you worked at least 117 hours.
- 3. Calculate 8% of the hours you worked in the leave year, subject to a maximum of 4 working weeks.

### How do I calculate my annual leave if I am a part-time worker?

Generally, annual leave for part-time workers is calculated using option 3 above. This means you can get 8% of your hours worked. If you work full time for some months and part-time for the rest of the year, you should calculate the leave for the full-time and the part-time periods of work separately.

### What happens my annual leave if I am off on Maternity leave or Parental Leave?

Annual leave is not affected by other types of statutory leave (that means leave provided for by law). Time spent on maternity leave, paternity leave, adoptive leave, parental leave, force majeure leave and the first 13 weeks of carer's leave is treated as though you have been in employment. For example, time spent on parental leave can be used to accrue (build up) your annual leave entitlement

### What happens my annual leave if I leave my job?

If you are leaving a job without taking all the annual leave you are entitled to, your employer must pay you for the days you have not taken.

### Can my employer force me to take annual leave?

Usually, employees can ask to take annual leave at specific times. Your employer can accept your request, or refuse your request. Your employer decides when annual leave may be taken, but this is subject to a number of conditions. Your employer must take into account your family responsibilities, as well as the available opportunities for rest and recreation. Your employer must discuss your annual leave with you (or your union) at least one month before you are to take the leave i.e. your employer cannot tell you on Friday that you must take annual leave the following week.

### Can my employer offer to pay me extra in lieu of taking my annual leave?

It is illegal for an employer to pay an employee extra instead of allowing them take the minimum statutory annual leave entitlement, except where the employment ends and the employee has earned unused annual leave days. In that case the employer should pay the employee for any outstanding annual leave and public holidays.

### What if I get sick while on annual leave?

If you are sick while you are on annual leave, you should get a medical certificate from your GP (doctor) as soon as possible to cover the days you were sick. Give the medical certificate to your employer as soon

This way, the sick days will not count as annual leave, and you can take your annual leave at a later date. Your employer cannot make you to take annual leave for time you were on certified sick leave.

### Can I 'carry over' annual leave to next year?

Annual leave should be taken within the leave year. Depending on your employer, you can agree to take your annual leave within 6 months of the relevant leave year. Any further carrying-over (also called holding over) of annual leave would need to be agreed between you and your employer.


If you are on long-term sick leave and cannot take your annual leave due to illness, you can carry it over for up to 15 months after the end of the year it was earned. If you leave your job within these 15 months, you should get payment instead of the leave you did not take due to illness.



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### **FAMILY CARERS IRELAND RESPONDS TO BUDGET 2025**

Family Carers Ireland welcomes the positive measures announced in Budget 2025 relating to income supports and see these as a significant step towards how the State should recognise and support the invaluable contributions of Ireland's 500,000+ family carers. Whilst acknowledging announcements on respite and additional home support hours, the charity has genuine concerns around how these will be delivered given deficiencies in current schemes. Further detail is needed.

Reacting to today's announcement, Family Carers Ireland says the decision to increase the Carer's Allowance income disregard to €625 per week for a single person and €1,250 per week for a couple will ensure thousands of family carers will qualify for the payment for the first time while those on a reduced rate will receive a higher payment. These are significant first steps towards abolishing the means test completely.

Among the financial supports for family carers announced today are a €12 increase in core social welfare rates, double payments in October and November, along with the Christmas Bonus, an increase in the Carer's Support Grant from €1,850 to €2,000, a one-off additional payment of €400 to Carer's Support Grant recipients, and a €20 monthly increase in the Domiciliary Care Allowance.

Family Carers Ireland welcomes the decision to extend the Carer's Benefit to the self-employed and to make Carer's Allowance a qualifying payment for the Fuel Allowance—two issues the organisation has campaigned on for many years. We particularly wish to acknowledge the work of Social Protection Minister Heather Humphreys.

In addition to these measures, other supports announced include a €150 increase in the Home Carer Tax Credit, a €300 rise in the Incapacitated Child Tax Credit, a €60 increase in the Dependent Relative Tax Credit, and €100 million in grants to adapt homes for individuals with mobility challenges.

The Budget provides funding for 768 additional special education teachers and 1,600 special needs assistants (SNAs), 600,000 extra home support hours. Additionally, a €336 million increase for Disability Services will facilitate more residential care beds, expanded respite provision, and additional home support hours. While these announcements are welcome, there are longstanding recruitment challenges, particularly in the home support sector, that need to be addressed.

Catherine Cox, Head of Communications and Policy at Family Carers Ireland, said: "The increase in payments and expanded eligibility for Carer's Allowance, Carer's Benefit, and the Fuel Allowance are positive steps forward. However, while lump sums and financial support increases are welcome, they still fall short of ensuring a fair and adequate income for those providing care at home. Research from before the cost-of-living crisis showed that caring households faced additional costs of €244 per week, so more needs to be done.

"We appreciate the Minister for Finance's recognition that carers play a 'fundamental role in our society' and pledge that 'Government is committed to supporting individuals and families with caring responsibilities'. Family Carers Ireland will continue to hold this Government, and future governments, to account to ensure carers receive the recognition and support they need and

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

# A Word of Victory

"How wonderful and pleasant it is when brothers live together in harmony! For harmony is as precious as the anointing oil that was poured over Aaron's head, that ran down his beard and onto the border of his robe. Harmony is as refreshing as the dew from Mount Hermon that falls on the mountains of Zion.

And there the Lord has pronounced His blessing, even Life everlasting" (Psalm 133)

Welcome back dear student an exciting date for your diary is the "March For Jesus" which takes place in Dublin later this month on Saturday 26th October from the Garden of Remembrance to Dáil Eireann at 2pm. With worship and prayer, we will lift up the Name of Jesus in one accord. These March For Jesus events have been held in major cities worldwide, and it's an opportunity for Christians from all backgrounds to celebrate their love for the Lord Jesus and pray together for our families and our nations. The oil represents the Anointing of the Holy Spirit — the Power of God and His Presence for transformation, healing and deliverance. In this powerful lesson, Jesus is aiming to convict the hearers to leave behind pettiness, criticisms and pride, and discover instead the call of God on each one of us: to freely give (Luke 6:27-38).

"His divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him who called us to His own glory and excellence" (2 Peter 1:3). The enemy has cleverly used paranoia, tradition and pain to keep multitudes isolated, divided and weak causing the Body of Christ to live far below God's plans. 


