
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

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# **MACROOM GIRL GUIDES**

#### National Guide Award: The pinnacle of Guiding achievement

Over 120 members of Irish Girl Guides (IGG) travelled to University College Dublin on Saturday 12th October to receive the highest award a Guide can achievethe Trail Blazer Award—at the National Guide Award ceremony.

Girls aged 14-15 came from all over the country, bringing their families and Guide Leaders to witness this milestone in their Guiding journey. Each girl was awarded a Trail Blazer gold pin by IGG President Deirdre Henley and a National Guide Award certificate by IGG Assistant Chief Commissioner Caroline Flanagan. These awards represent the spirit of the outdoors, learning life skills, and gaining confidence.

Deirdre Henley, Irish Girl Guides President, stressed the hard work of these girls: "Earning the National Guide Award is no mean feat. It reflects a level of excellence, resilience, teamwork, and leadership, and shows the capability to achieve great things when you set your mind to it."

Ardilaun Guides were well represented at the National Guide Awards with four of our guides, Juliette, Abi, Gráinne and Catherine receiving their Trail Blazer pins. 

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On 25 August 2024, Michael Dan Lucey, Coolcower, Macroom was part of the Irish U-19 coxed-four crew that rowed in a world final. Although the team finished outside the medals, it was a fantastic achievement.

For Michael Dan it was 'the best experience of his life'. In a previous article, Michael Dan's progress as a rower and his selection for the Irish team was documented. Michael credits Michael O'Callaghan, Lee Valley Rowing Club with his rowing development to date -'he was there at every step' - and John Armstrong for his wonderful coaching of this group.

The World Rowing Mega Finals took place in St Catherine's, Canada which is on the outskirts of Toronto. It is Canada's premier rowing centre. The 'mega' means that the seniors, Under-23 and Under-19 competitions for women and men took place at the one regatta. This also necessitated that the event was longer than usual. Paul O'Donovan won the men's senior singles and confirmed that he is now probably the best rower in the world and is probably Ireland's best-ever rower. His presence in the Irish squad was inspirational for Michael Dan and his fellow rowers. According to Michael Dan, what was most impressive about O'Donovan was his calmness, quietness and confidence and his fantastic discipline. Though small in stature, O'Donovan is enormously strong, extremely fit and has a wonderful stroke. In down time, he spent much time reading.

Michael's team raced twice on the 21st and 25th of August. The team consisted of Evan O'Byrne (St. Michael's, Limerick), Mattias Cogan and Dominic Casey (both Skibbereen). The cox was Luke Fitzgerald (Castleconnell) and the coach was John Armstrong. They arrived on 17 August and stayed in student accommodation which was lovely. Everyone had a private room. They ate on site and there were 'lashings' of food. Though tempted by some of the lovely fare, as athletes, they had to adhere to their strict diets. Until the races were over, it was basically 'train, discuss, eat and rest'. The temperatures were in the seventies and all the facilities with regard to boats, course lay-out, officialdom etc. were of a very high standard. Like many of the other rowers, Michael Dan's parents Olivia and Frank, and sister Frankie were there. The Irish supporters were visible and vocal and the Irish tricolour was prominent. This gave great support to all the Irish competitors. Most of the media attention went to the senior rowers and O'Donovan's achievements, attitude and relaxed demeanour drew him much focus. Having the spotlight elsewhere helped the younger athletes. The team's first race was on 21August - in effect a semi-final, with three boats to qualify out of six. Ireland came third and duly gained its final place. While the team was satisfied with its performance, there was room for improvement and they had four days to fine-tune. It was back to competition routine. However before the final, misfortune struck, Michael Dan contracted a throat infection with fever and was quite ill and his and the team's ability to compete were threatened. (There were no substitutes available; even if there were, because of the sport's nature, it would not have worked). With medical treatment, the illness abated and the team was able to row in the final. Michael Dan thought the team performed better but were beaten by better crews. Everyone gave of their utmost and, while a little deflated, all were satisfied that the team had performed to its potential. Michael Dan explained that rowing in Ireland is a small sport numbers and resource wise. Countries such as the U.S., Australia, Britain, France, Germany, Italy all have many participants, long traditions and are very well resourced. Ireland has continuously 'punched above its weight'. In the U.S., rowing is an Ivy League University sport where rowers win scholarships and have access to full-time coaching. Oxford and Cambridge Universities similarly have very strong support structures. So, all-in-all, it was a satisfactory performance.

Because of the focus on the competition, there was little time for diversion. The team visited the nearby Niagara Falls and that was enjoyable. Again, as time was a constraint, there was some but not much interaction with athletes from other countries. But Michael Dan's first-hand interactions vouched for their impressive resources - and this was reflected in the conditioning and physiques of their rowers. Many were university students and almost semi-professional.

For Michael Dan it was a brilliant, perhaps once in a lifetime experience. It has whetted his appetite and, if time permits, will continue to train and compete. He will sit his Leaving Certificate in 2025 and that will equally demand his concentration and commitment. Already, some universities have contacted him and he may follow that path. Here again, Paul O'Donovan provides an inspiration: he is a qualified medical doctor and graduated with First Class Honours.

Well done to Michael Dan and best wishes for the future in the path he follows. Whatever road he will travel, his World Final preparation and participation will stand him in good stead. By Con Kelleher

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# **Naughton Award Recipient**



# **Kilmurry Active Retirement -**

#### **Funny for some**

It is not funny if you suffer from dry eye syndrome. It is often a chronic condition primarily caused by poor quality or quantity of tears. The symptoms most commonly are a dry, or gritty, sandy sensation in the eyes. They can include redness, mucous discharge, fluctuation of vision, contact lens intolerance, and strangely excess tearing. However, it can usually be controlled with treatment.

The results of a study carried out in an eye university in China was published recently. The researchers aimed to assess the effectiveness of a laughter exercise. The research involved 299 patients with symptomatic dry eye disease who were randomly assigned to receive either laughter exercise, or a common treatment, eye drops (with 0.1% sodium hyaluronic acid) four times daily for 8 weeks. Participants in the laughter exercise group watched an instructional video and were requested to repeat "Hee hee hee, hah hah hah, cheese cheese cheese, cheek cheek, hah hah hah hah hah" thirty times within 5-minutes, for their four sessions.

The result was that at the end of 8 weeks, the disease index score reduced by 10.50 points in the laughter exercise group and by 8.83 points in the group prescribed eye drops. At 12 weeks, patients in the laughter exercise group showed a significantly greater reduction in the disease index score than those in the group that were prescribed eye drops.

So, it has been proven (in this particular case anyway), that laughter is the best medicine!

#### Meeting up with friends

On Wednesday 9th October we had friends from the Knockavilla Friendship association joining us at the Independence Museum. There were about fifty of us in all and a very enjoyable day it was. Wonder that it is, the lad that never played bingo, took upon himself, and greater wonder, was allowed to act as the caller outer or something like that. 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# Think Globally, Act locally A SLICE OF GARDEN HEAVEN

Hi! Chris Barrett here. Today I am sharing some wonderful and practical advice I received from my good friend Mary Moore whose garden is a hidden sanctuary in Masseytown, Macroom.

I have always felt at peace in her small but very special garden and was particularly interested to hear how she went about creating such a beautiful space. It not only produces edible plants, but is perfumed, colourful and relaxing, whilst providing a haven for wildlife.

She has achieved this success even though her starting point was an uninspiring jungle of weeds growing from a pile of rubble on a tiny triangular site at the end of a terrace.

It turns out that this tiny garden is merely 45′, in length. Although the plot is 14' wide nearest the back door, it narrows to a mere 3' at the far end. Running down the garden on one side there is a beautiful stone wall, giving a partial view of an ancient monument, with a more modern fence erected opposite.

I was intrigued to hear how Mary got started on such a challenging site. It was, she explains, initially only piles of rubble hidden by a jungle of weeds, and dominated by a very large well established fennel plant.

What was required was a massive clear out, which included digging out large stones from the ground, and that is exactly what happened.

The next job was to create a terrace area next to the house, by widening what was really only previously a step. Nothing that could be re-used went to waste, and those dug up stones were used to create the little terrace walls, and also to form the paved area in the

lower garden area. Steps were built from about 20 concrete blocks, which were left over from another project. These steps enabled accessible flower beds to be created on either side.

A lower bed was brought to life using soil and compost from the recycling which had started life at the furthest end of the garden. This compost was also used in pots for choice plants and herbs. There was a major emphasis on herbs right from the commencement of the project. These were to include the words of the well known song, parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme as well as coriander and basil. The prolific and long lasting basil (grown indoors by the large window) has also provided copious amounts of pesto over the years.

Various environmentally inspired decisions were made, and perfumed and flowering plants were chosen for their bee and insect-friendliness. The shed was made as conveniently as possible by incorporating the wall as one side of the shed, and using recycled wood to make a potting bench and shelves. The roof of the shed was made of seethrough plastic panels, with either gaining light through a door and window.

The shed design which is designed so well to fit into its individual environment is particularly weather resistant, and shows how thinking in advance about the location and structure of such a building can pay huge dividends.

The shed doors allow hidden access to three bins, a storage bin, refuse bin and a compost bin.

Spent soil from pots gets emptied into the compost bin along with kitchen waste and it all gets recycled.

The shed also accommodates a much used seasonal dog basket.

Tomatoes and flowers have been grown from seed in the shed, and the transparent roof has been of great assistance in providing light in this regard.

Outside, winter jasmine and swiss chard grow particularly well, and creeping periwinkle winds its way down the wall, whilst other colourful flowers have been grown such as poppies, violas and lamb's

Various annuals have been grown successfully from seed, including sweet peas and nasturtiums.

Along the wall and fence two climbing and two shrub roses also add their beauty and scent, and a large buddleia, grown from a cutting, is especially popular with butterflies. A mountain ash was planted when it was very small, but has grown to provide fine leaved height along the side of the garden.

Mary has been fortunate in that the trees outside her garden boundary enhance the feeling of spaciousness within.

With her vision and design, Mary has used every inch available to her, and has created a garden which is truly a haven for humans and nature. I am very grateful to have learned how she achieved this and I am sure she will have encouraged readers to reconsider their own small and challenging spaces.

# NÍ MHURCHÚ APPOINTED CHIEF NEGOTIATOR ON NEW EU LAWS TO STRENGTHEN PASSENGER RIGHTS FOR IRISH HOLIDAYMAKERS

PROPOSED NEW EU LAWS WILL GIVE IRISH PASSENGERS MORE RIGHTS WHEN BOOKING FLIGHTS THROUGH AN INTERMEDIARY, WHEN BOOKING A PACKAGE HOLIDAY AND FOR THOSE TRAVELLING WITH A DISABILITY.

Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has been appointed the Chief Negotiator, of the Renew Europe political grouping, in the European Parliament on new laws which will strengthen passenger rights and better protect Irish holiday makers against disruptions during their journey. Her appointment comes as a new study, by Irish travel insurance firm Multitrip.com, shows that 70% of Irish holidaymakers are planning to travel outside of peak summer times in a bid to save money on their holidays.

According to Ní Mhurchú, the Covid pandemic highlighted many weaknesses in how passengers were treated by travel and tour companies,

"During the pandemic, consumers faced mass cancellations and often struggled to get refunds from tour operators and travel agencies for cancelled packages. These new proposed laws will look to add protections for travellers with a disability, those booking package holidays and those booking flights through an intermediately service. We will formulate new rules to protect passengers using different types of transport, like buses, trains, and planes, all in one trip, including on minimum connecting times between different transport services"

### New protections for those booking package holidays.

Ní Mhurchú said the European Parliament learned a lot from the collapse of British tour operator Thomas Cook in 2019 when it declared bankruptcy on a Sunday evening leaving hundreds of thousands of Irish and British travellers stranded, putting 21,000 jobs at risk. The new laws will look to bolster insolvency protection in the event of something like this happening again. Other new measures for package holiday bookings include that upfront deposits paid on package holidays cannot be more than 25% of the overall package price, except in cases where a package tour operator can justify a higher deposit based on extenuating circumstances.

Under the proposals, package holiday operators may not ask for the total payment for the holiday earlier than 28 days before the start of the trip. Those travelling under a package holiday will also receive clearer information on who is liable if there are problems with a cancellation of one part of the package, and their rights in that situation.

### Travel with a disability

The new proposed EU laws will focus on improving passenger rights for those with disabilities. For example, airlines often oblige a passenger with disabilities to travel with a companion. This is because the passenger with a disability may need assistance to comply with aviation safety requirements. Under these new proposals, the airline will be obliged to transport the accompanying person free of charge, and when practical, seat this person next to the passenger they are assisting. This right already exists when travelling by rail, ship or bus.

### Seamless Travel

The new laws will oblige travel providers to publish information which will make travel easier for passengers, such as whether bikes can be taken onto a train, and whether the mode of transport is accessible or not.

13 billion passengers travel by plane, train, bus or ferry in the EU every year.

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# RITA LYNCH (1914-2009), MACROOM'S "GOLDEN VOICED SOPRANO". HER LIFE AND LEGACY

Rita Lynch was Macroom's most successful singer. She grew-up in Park View House, Millstreet Cross; when she won the John McCormack Competition in 1939, which was broadcast live on radio, she became a national star. The following year she made her opera debut 'L'Elisir d'Amore'. Unfortunately her musical training was interrupted by the onset of World War II - she was about to go to Italy for operatic-singing training. Despite this, she had a glittering career 1935-1955 and toured the United States and Britain. Her daughter Mary Davies (née Shaw, Mary D.) has assiduously preserved her memorabilia - letters, diaries, programmes, photographs, costumes and recordings. In this she was greatly facilitated by Evelyn Grant, Lyric FM who dedicated a programme - 'Digitising Rita' - to her memory. This article records Rita's life and achievements, the influence of her widowed mother Mary L., and how Mary D. ensured that her mother's legacy and memory survives.

Ireland in 1914 was at a crossroads and faced possible/ probable Civil War. The Irish Home Rule Bill had been passed in 1912 in The House of Commons but was vetoed by The House of Lords; the Unionists under Carson and Craig mounted ferocious resistance. The Ulster Volunteers were armed much better than the Irish Volunteers and had the support of the British Army and the Conservative Party. A highly likely civil war was averted by World War I breaking-out in August 1914 and Redmond's and the Irish Parliamentary Party's decision to advocate Irish participation on the understanding that Home Rule would materialise automatically after its conclusion. Many Irish Nationalists joined the British Army thinking they were securing Irish freedom. Contradictorily, Unionists were fighting to preserve 'the Union and British Empire'. Macroom contributed many British Army recruits and at least forty locals lost their lives in the conflict (Pat Sheehy, Macroom, 10 January 2022 Macroom History Group Presentation). Otherwise, in the town, cars were scarce but some homes and businesses had domestic electricity. The railway operated but the Macroom Golf Club based in Sandy Hill, ceased to function. The Mercy nuns ran the only secondary school in Macroom - it was for girls only; Macroom previous several disparate national schools were united - in the convent for girls and boys as far as first class, and the Boys' NS in Railway View. Ironically, WW1 was a boon for Irish agriculture and country towns alike.

The Lynch family lived in a fine if not quite a Big House. Rita's parents, Mary and Dan were married in 1903. Her father Dan was a Macroom Workhouse Union clerk. Dan came from Ballyvourney and played the fiddle. John O'Shea (Mineral Waters) New Street had three children - Mary, Curry and Janie - and gave each a property thereby making each one independent. Janie and Mary, already well-educated, became women of substance and confidence. As time would vouch, Mary L. proved to be a very resourceful woman. Before he gave Mary Park View, it had been rented to the Royal Irish Constabulary for about six years. Curry, the great Macroom footballer, 1909-1913, received New Street and the Mineral Waters, and Janie, the Railway View Hotel, now Macroom Bookshop/Fitz-Gerald's. Janie married Timothy C. Bird, grandfather of RTE's Charlie Bird, recently deceased. Curry's daughters Maureen (O'Riordan), Janie (Warren), Paddy (Walsh), Anna and Kathleen became like Rita's sisters. Anna was a talented musician and led the orchestra for Macroom Gilbert and Sullivan operettas in the 1940s and Coachford pantomimes in 1950s/60s. Janie and Eddie Warren ran a pharmacy in the North Square. Park View garden was much bigger then now and incorporated the area to the west of the house, stretching back the Killarney and Millstreet Roads. Rita was the fifth child - she had four older and four younger brothers – Dan, John, Jerry and Con; after her came Denis, Pat, Jim and Tim. Though mild-mannered, Rita was well-able to hold her own with her brothers. Sadly her father died at a young age and importantly, before a widow's pension was payable. Thus Rita's mother had to care for nine children and she had no income. A friend, another Daniel Lynch, in New Street and no relation, provided support and helped in many ways. Mary L. had little self-pity and despite widowhood she got on with supporting her young family. Mary D. Recounted a War of Independence (W.o.I.) episode related by her mother: that on one occasion during 'the troubles' - Rita was about six - rowdy British soldiers knocked at the door and demanded money from her mother Mary L. to buy 'drink'. Although money was tight, she gave them some. The following day an officer returned the 'demanded' money and apologised. Unfortunately, the W.o.I. brought trouble in many guises - the fear of killings and reprisals, difficulty going to shops and schools and the interruption of normal commerce and socialisation. Macroom was a hotbed of guerrilla activity. This is vividly illustrated by Macroom's empty schools and blank roll-books after Kilmichael Ambush (28 November 1920). It was in this inauspicious environment that Rita was born and grew up. Luckily she was talented, born into a musical family and had a resourceful mother. Two brothers, Pat and John were well known Macroom figures. Pat ran a grocer's shop and wore a tan-coloured coat, often had a cigarette in his mouth, was an avid angler and was a founding member of St. Colman's Angling Club, a breakaway from Macroom Anglers. John was a rates-collector and had an office next to Eileen Hegarty's/Hackett's Main Street hair saloon where now a pet-shop fronts the premises, two-doors down from the newly refurbished Briery Gap. Garda Con Leahy, his wife Eileen and family lived upstairs and Neville's Bakery had a cake-shop downstairs, run by Nora McCarthy. John too smoked and was noted for his piety, austerity and his car. The car was big and oldish, a Model-T Ford, I think, with the diminutive John barely visible when driving. He drove very slowly and cautiously, and amused us as children growing-up on Main Street. Denis, another brother was a banker, served in Bantry and Skibbereen and was a member of Glengarriff Golf Club before his transfer to Dingle, Kerry.

Rita attended national school in the Convent of Mercy, Macroom where she received piano lessons and secondary education in the Ursuline Convent, Blackrock, Cork. There, she came under the musical care of Mother Peter and Mrs Mary Sheridan. Not only was she an exceptional singer, she was an accomplished hockey player and represented Munster. When Rita left school in 1933, Mary continued to teach her. She was a regular performer on 2RN and RÉ - the Cork studio was in Sunday's Well, in the old Women's Gaol. Rita won multiple Feis Maitiú medals and trophies. Later she had further success at the Dublin Feis where she won the Soprano Gold Medal and the Geoghan Cup in 1938. Adjudicator Topliss Green said her 'breath-control was nigh perfect'. But, as she wanted to develop her career, she moved to Dublin in 1939, sharing a flat with her two older civil servant brothers. That year she won The John McCormack Competition, broadcast live to a record audience, and that brought instant national fame. She sang 'The Last Rose of Summer', a song with which she became synonymous. Hearing it played recently in Mary D.'s house was very moving. In 1941, Rita won The Lieder Prize, Dublin Feis's most prestigious award. When in Dublin, she was spotted by Miss Jean Nolan, a voice coach who offered her services free and Rita went from strength to strength. It was Nolan who arranged her opera début in Dublin's Operatic Society's (DOS) Donizetti's 'L'Elisir d'Amore' in 1941; in 1942 she won a principal role in the Dublin Grand Opera Society's (DGOS) bi-centennial staging of Handel's 'Messiah'. This was a big event with a 230-strong chorus. Rita was impressed and impressive – according to the Irish Times 'she sang with an exquisite tone and a delicate artistry'. (Opera in Ireland website, cited 7 September 2024). She, next spring, played the role of 'Susanna' in 'The Marriage of Figaro'. When the opera was brought to Cork, the gods were not with Rita. First there were a five-hour delayed train trip from Dublin; then, when staying in the Victoria Hotel, Rita was trapped in a lift for several hours. Between the unpleasant experience and calling for help, her voice was not at its best but she sang well nevertheless. Following that, she was offered recitals and concerts in Cork and countrywide. And she retained a persistent and abiding distrust of lifts thereafter - a problem when visiting the US.

During the following years Rita travelled all over the country, sharing top billing with other outstanding singers, musicians and performers. When singing at a Cork concert, Paddy Shaw and his friend George Kenefick were in the audience; after the show Paddy got himself backstage, made Rita's acquaintance and secured a date with her. Love blossomed and eventually they married in 1945. Her coach Jean Nolan and musical authority Margaret Burke Sheridan were dismayed at the prospect as they thought it would be fatal for her career. At the time, a woman's major role was 'to bear and rear' children - it was enshrined in the De Valera's 1937 Constitution, However Rita met

the right man in that Paddy was very supportive and facilitated her in every way. Rita's mother was always there in the background. After the war, Rita sang widely in Britain including Sheffield, London, Manchester and Birmingham. Her career was avidly followed by Macrompians and her appearances were recorded in Macroom Notes and News and other similar columns. The Cork Examiner (4 April 1942) records her voice as being of 'exquisite purity' singing in Handel's 'Messiah'. P.J. Lyons in a Southern Star (22 August 1953) article on 'Romance of Macroom' mentions Rita in the company of other illustrious people associated with the town such as T.C. Murray, an t-Athair Peadar, William Penn, Seán Rua etc. The Evening Echo (14 February 2009) carried a lovely piece when Rita passed away and has a 1998 picture of Cara O'Sullivan looking adoringly at her on the occasion of the Cork launch of 'Love and Music The Glorious History of the Dublin Grand Opera Society'.

On foot of her popularity and excellence, Rita was offered a recording deal. The Cork Library's Rory Gallagher Archive (Cork City Library) gives a succinct description: 'In 1948 Rita recorded 3 x 78" records at the H.M.V. studios, London. The songs included : Mozart's 'Lullaby', 'The Spinning Wheel', 'The Fairy Tales of Ireland', 'Home Sweet Home', 'I Will Walk With My Love' and of course 'The Last Rose of Summer'. Recently, Seosamh Ó Críodáin, New Street, very kindly loaned me a CD of Rita singing and it was a very great pleasure listening to it. Her voice was pure, sincere and moving, qualities her peers were unable to equal.

Though by now a mother of Harry, her three-year old boy, Rita was invited by a Chicago radio station to tour the U.S. in 1949, and she duly accepted. She was away for about three months. The Cork Examiner reported that she landed safely back in Ireland '... returning to Cork on 27 June after a very successful tour of the United States. But there were incidents leaving and landing - suffice to say is that all ended well. Miss Lynch sang at the Symphony Hall, Boston, under its famed conductor Arthur Fiedler to an audience of 2,000 people. Fiedler confessed to knowing only one Irish person and that quirkily was Jean Nolan, Rita's teacher. Later Rita sang in Chicago for the Corkmen's Association, and in New York. During her tour she met Michael O'Duffy, the Derry tenor and Countess McCormack. Miss Lynch/Mrs Shaw was met at Cork airport by her husband, Mr. P.J. Shaw, Cork. When in the US, she also appeared on television - that was the first time she had seen a television set and television. At interview, she was quite satisfied at how she looked and was wearing a green dress. While mildly-mannered, she was confident, composed and articulate - no mean feat for an Irish person of the

Following her return, Harry was followed by the births of Mary, Marita and Salette, called after a French saint. Initially the family lived near the Sunbeam factory in Blackpool, where Paddy Shaw was a manager before eventually settling in the Model Farm Road. Rita continued to sing at numerous concerts and charity events. Paddy was always accommodating, and her mother Mary was an always-available stand-by.

As Rita's career continued, Mary D., as a young child accepted that this was guite normal: occasionally her mother put on pretty dresses and make-up and travelled to far-away places. Paddy was fully supportive, aided by housekeepers and Rita's mother. It was then very unusual for a woman to pursue her career after marriage and becoming a mother. However, Rita accomplished this with the staunch support of her husband and mother. A highlight of this was a concert Rita and the famous Scottish tenor Canon Sidney McEwan gave in the Palace Cinema, Macroom in 1956. The cinema had opened in 1953 and was state-of-the-art with a 500-seat capacity. Mary D. has photos, a programme and correspondence that mark the occasion. When Rita's career quietened, she bought a shop in Magazine Road, which was also was the family home. Quickly she realised that it was a mistake but kept it for several years before selling. Later the children, if they wished to annoy her, called out 'Shop, mother' to which she responded.

As time passed Rita continued to perform but had conflicting obligations with running her shop for a period and rearing her children. Later she became a singing teacher, which she enjoyed. Other activities included becoming involved in the Old Ursulines Past Pupils Union and the Cork Sorptomists. Her last public performance, aged 62, was at the Fianna Fáil Golden Jubilee Celebration 'Grand Celebrity Concert' at the City Hall, Cork on 23rd October 1976. Niall Tobin and Frank Patterson also performed. The programme was introduced by Jack Lynch, Party Leader and the address was by given Lord Longford (Rory Gallagher Archive). She continued to sing at family and private gatherings.

She enjoyed her less busy time and became president of both the Old Ursulines Past Pupils' Union and the Soroptimists in Cork. Another hobby was oil painting which she enjoyed in the 1980s/1990s. In 1995, Rita received the Margaret Burke Sheridan Medal of the Vocal Heritage Society of Ireland, marking her contribution to singing in Ireland.

She passed away at her home on Model Farm Road, Cork, and was pre-deceased by her husband Patrick J. Shaw and son Harry, and is survived by her daughters Mary, Marita, and Salette.

Mary's custodianship: Mary Davies lives in Monkstown with her husband Peter, and her married daughter lives nearby. When I called, Grandad Peter was enjoying Mechano with his grandson. He is the gardener and his work is exquisite. Mary D qualified with a B.A from UCC but taught mostly in a private school she founded. The education system left a substantial number of people not able to read or write. Mary studied the area and successfully taught many to achieve their goals of literacy. She too has a pleasant voice and sings in choirs. She performs solo as well, with or without her guitar, and is often the 'leader of the band' and singsongs in Monkstown Golf Club. She continues to play golf off a 15 handicap and recently won prizes, including the longest drive.

Both Rita and her mother Mary L. collected and retained many keepsakes and memorabilia of her life and career but they lay dormant in boxes in Mary d's (Davies's) attic for many years. Because of circumstances, the lot of minding the items fell to Mary. She sorted and categorized the contents. 'It's a big leap from boxes in my attic to a New York's radio showpiece!", Mary said. "The sifting, sorting, cataloguing and curating of approximately 2000 items which included photos, programmes, correspondence, contracts, fan mail and recordings on acetates, 78s and cassette tapes began on my sitting room floor in late 2013." That year there was official recognition at Cork City Library where in a tribute to Rita her memory was honoured and highlighted. The collection took shape and others involved were Dr. Orla Murphy of UCC and Masters student Eibhlín Hegarty, soprano Cara O'Sullivan, Cork City Library's Liam Ronayne and Kitty Buckley, former Lord Mayor of Cork, Mary Shields and ably abetted by the technical skill of Tadhg Kelleher and Harry Bradshaw. In 2019 with the generous help of Dr Evelyn Grant and others, Lyric FM recorded a programme that included interviews with Mary and Rita and her recordings. The programme 'Digitising Rita' was presented in New York Festival's Annual Radio Awards that year. Sixtyseven years previously, in 1949, Rita Lynch had sung in New York. The Lyric radio documentary made the finals – a fitting tribute to Rita and her daughter Mary D. who has beautifully preserved Rita's voice and legacy and made it accessible to the public. Mary D. has also presented much archive material to Cork City and County Library, Great William O'Brien Street, Cork and would be delighted if there were some suitable Macroom home for more of her memorabilia.

Rita Lynch was a wonderful singer and her memory should be honoured and commemorated much more publicly and proudly in Macroom, her native town. Macroom has recently given new estates and streets obscure names: why not call them after great Macrompians of the past such as Rita? 'Rita Lynch Road' is an example of what could be used.

I am very grateful to Mary Davies for preserving meticulously Rita's items, for sharing her knowledge and for being so welcoming and enthusiastic about the project.

### **HOW TO DISPOSE OF AN END-OF-LIFE** VEHICLE

An end-of-life vehicle (ELV) is a car or light commercial vehicle (of less than 3.5 tonnes) which is due to be disposed of or scrapped. So, when a car gets old and can't be used anymore, it becomes an ELV. It's important to recycle and dispose of ELVs properly so they don't harm the environment.

You must dispose of an end-of-life vehicle using licensed authorised treatment facilities (ATFs). These are also called permitted scrapyards. End of life vehicles contain hazardous materials that can damage the environment. They can pose a risk to public health if not disposed of in a safe manner. For example, vehicles that contain lead acid batteries, lubricating oil, coolant, brake fluid, and catalytic convertors.

To make sure that old cars are disposed of in a proper way, there is a compliance scheme (ELVES) in place. This is to help improve standards in disposing of end-of-life vehicles.

You are committing a criminal offence if you (or an authorised treatment facility) dispose of an end-of-life

There is no charge for disposing of an ELV at an authorised treatment facility. When you have given your vehicle to an ATF, you should get a certificate of destruction.

If you (or an authorised treatment facility) dispose of an end-of-life vehicle illegally, you are committing a criminal offence.

### Where can I bring my end-of-life vehicle?

You must leave an end-of-life vehicle at an authorised treatment facility. You will find details of these facilities on elves.ie

Each vehicle manufacturer or importer must have a national collection system in place. It must be with at least one treatment facility in every city and council area.

These facilities provide a free take-back service for vehicles of that producer's brand. Independent treatment facilities are also available.

If you leave an end-of-life vehicle at an unauthorised facility, you will not get a certificate of destruction. You may remain recorded as registered owner of the vehicle on the National Vehicle File.

Authorised treatment facilities are not responsible for transporting your vehicle. You will have to arrange to bring the ELV to the facility yourself.

When you have left your vehicle at an authorised treatment facility, the owner or operator of the facility will:

• Issue you (if you are the registered owner) with a certificate of destruction

• Forward the details of the certificate of destruction to the National Vehicle and Driver File. These records are kept by the Department of Transport

### What services must an authorised treatment facility provide?

An operator of an authorised end-of-life vehicle treatment facility must:

- Issue the registered owner with a certificate of destruction (either electronically or in paper form)
- Make sure the facility is operated under an appropriate waste licence or permit
- Meet the minimum technical requirements for the storage, treatment and recovery of end-of-life vehicles and the storage of components containing fluids, spare parts, etc
- Keep records of end-of-life vehicle materials for reuse, recycling, recovery and disposal and report these records to local authorities annually

The vehicle must be treated within 10 days of being deposited at the facility.

Treating the vehicle includes:

- Removing the battery or batteries
- Removing the liquefied gas tank
- Removing (or neutralising) potentially explosive parts (including air bags)
- Removing, collecting, and storing fuel, oils, and other fluids (for example, brake fluid)
- Removing any parts containing mercury

All other parts of the car should, where possible, be recycled.

### How much does disposing an end-of-life vehicle cost?

You cannot be charged for leaving an end-of-life vehicle at an authorised treatment facility, if:

- You are the reaistered owner of that vehicle and
- The vehicle is intact

If important parts of your car are gone (like the engine, gearbox or transmission), or there is waste inside vour car, vou miaht be charaed.

### What documents do I need to bring with me?

You must bring the vehicle registration certificate or log book with you.

### Can I claim a refund of motor tax?

You may be able to claim a refund of motor tax if there is more than 3 months unexpired tax. You need a certificate of destruction from an end-of-Life vehicle authorised treatment facility. Contact your local motor tax office for more information.

### How do I find an authorised treatment facility?

ELVES, the industry compliance authority has a searchable database of authorised treatment facilities (or scrapyards). The website is www.elves.ie

### Are there penalties for illegally disposing of an end-of-life vehicle?

You are committing a criminal offence if you (or an authorised treatment facility) dispose of an end-of-life vehicle illegally.

If you do not take your car to an authorised treatment facility, you can be fined €100. If you don't follow the rules about getting rid of your old car, like getting a certificate that says it was destroyed, you might have to pay a fine of  $\neq 1000$ .

The Environment (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2015 introduced fixed payment notices (on the spot fines) for certain offences.

Other penalties for offences are set out in Regulation 35 of the Regulations and are:

- Summary conviction: a class A fine or 12 months imprisonment (or both)

Ballinora, Mid Cork champions for the past three seasons, are through to another MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior Hurling final, four late points turning impending defeat into a rather sensational victory, in a semi final played under lights at a wind blown and very wet Ovens venue. Both teams, and referee Diarmuid Kirwan, deserve massive credit for overcoming the horrible elements to produce a stirring, hard fought but sporting encounter with the outcome uncertain to the finish. Ballinora, pushed to the pin of their collars by Donoughmore in the quarter final and now barely surviving the Grenagh challenge, will certainly be battle hardened for the final but whether they are improving or not remains a matter of conjecture.

My conscience is clear but that doesn't prove that I'm right. It is the Lord Himself Who will examine me and decide" (1 Corinthians 4:2-4 NLT).

Welcome back dear student, while visiting a sports arena recently, I noticed outside an alcove area with much debris from a homeless person who had taken shelter there. Inside the building was pristine and warm and much fruitful activity was taking place. The misery of the people who were hanging out there at night after everyone was gone home, seeking a refuge from the weather filled me with sadness. It must feel like an enormously hopeless situation to be in. I thought to myself 'well there will be a steel fence up here pretty shortly to keep them out'. That's how these broken people are dealt with for often they refuse help. But the humanity of some shredded clothing, litter and cardboard impacted my heart. Building more homeless shelters is only bandaging the hole in the bucket — hurting people need real solutions from the Truth - to know that there is a Saviour Who loves them, Who died for them, and Who longs for their deliverance because He - Jesus, paid for all that for each one of us. People get deceived falling into drugs, alcohol and other addictions resulting in destruction, lost relationships, and paralyzed lives from all kinds of pain. The Lord Jesus came to set the captives free, to heal the broken hearted and bind up their wounds - to bring healing and restoration. "When they cried out to the Lord...God sent His Word to heal them and delivered them from their destructions" (Psalm 107:19-20).

Hearing of how our Government has been flippantly spending money would make one's blood boil when there are so many services needing provision. It seems like only the on-trend issues are being funded. I believe there are many people who are fed up, and I sincerely pray for mercy for this nation - and our leaders. Ireland has long been enriched by legal immigrants who came here to work and make a better quality of life for themselves, but we cannot save the world - only God can do that! Getting back to the Scripture above, I love the Apostle Paul's humility — you can hear his heart for pleasing God alone. What he speaks is the Truth — all of us will give an account to God one day sooner than many might imagine — of every word we have spoken, and of how we used God's provision, blessings, and resources, including the Gospel. Last week we saw that God owns everything. Every owner wants a return on their investments. The Lord is no different. It may be easy for government to waste taxpayer's money, but ultimately, it all belongs to God. So, they are setting themselves up for judgement if they are not stewarding His stuff effectively - to bring about God's will: to free the captives; to help those in need, and to love others.

Reminder: The March For Jesus takes place on 26th October next - that's the Saturday of the Bank Holiday next weekend, at 2pm in Dublin. It will be a wonderful family day out with amazing worship, prayer, face painting, balloons etc.. to celebrate Jesus from every denomination. I know it's a big journey, but it will be worth it to see our nation impacted for the Lord. It will send a loud message to government pre-election from the heart of our nation and will bless God's heart.


