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

It was a great morning of celebrating, 132 people ran,jogged and walked the course (2nd biggest attendance ever!) and 28 volunteers ensured that it all happened safely. Once people completed their 5k they were treated to a large selection of treats, tea, coffee, water, fruit and plenty other things in the GAA Clubhouse. A short background on getting to 500 events, Macroom was the 3rd parkrun established in the Republic of Ireland; the 1st outside of Dublin. The first event was held on 18-May-2013 and 11 and a half years later we celebrated our 500th event. 4 people that were at the first event were there on the 500th, Tom Cuddihy, Richie Fitzgerald, Enda Kiernan and Aoife Lucey. The event was first setup by Conor and Mark McMahon and Donal Twomey who had participated at a number of parkruns in Belfast and thought that it would work well in Macroom. How right they were!


Jimmy Barry-Murphy and Liam Hayes Launch Aghinagh Club History



the initiative. Our Junior pupils did some fantastic work on their 'Maths Hats' based upon concepts such as number, shapes and patterns which they modelled for their classmates.



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Welcomed upcoming Changes for Housing Adaptation Grants

Starting from January 2025, Housing Adaptation Grants for Older People and People with Disabilities will see significant enhancements. Minister for Housing Darragh O'Brien confirmed an over 30% increase in grant limits and a 25% rise in income thresholds, allowing more individuals and families to benefit. Cork County Council confirmed to me directly that these increases will be implemented in January 2025.

This announcement follows the Report on the Review of the Housing Adaptation Grants, which advocates for these changes. Grant limits will increase by €10,000 in some circumstances, which will be welcome news to many.

With projections indicating that the population aged over 65 will exceed 1.3 million by 2040, these grants will assist older individuals and those with disabilities to maintain

their independence. The revised means testing will consider only the income of the owner/tenant and their spouse, streamlining the application process.

Since taking office, the Fianna Fáil government has increased investment in these grants by over 27%, from €73 million in 2020 to a projected €93 million in 2024. These changes aim to enhance access and improve the quality of life for many

As we approach January 2025, this initiative promises to make a meaningful difference in the lives of many, allowing them to thrive in their homes.

Together, we can build a future where everyone can live independently and with dignity!

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
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




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Think Globally, Act locally PROPOSED BIO GAS PLANT FOR MACROOM

Hi, Chris Barrett here talking with Tom Jordan regarding a proposed bio-gas plant at Kilvoultra, Macroom which has stoked concern among local residents who organised a well attended public meeting in Clondrohid Community Hall on Wednesday 23rd October. At the meeting, attendees were briefed on plans by Nephin Renewable Gas (NRG) to build a large bio-methane plant at a disused piggery adjacent to a cluster of homes in the area.

No formal application has yet been lodged, but some local residents and landowners have been approached by Nephin representatives. The lack of detailed information on what is proposed has fueled suspicion about the project.

Anaerobic Digestion is a process by which biological waste such as slurry can be broken down into fertilizer pellets and methane gas. The fertilizer is mainly used to grow crops to aid the digestion process, while the gas goes towards electricity generation. It's a process that has been successful in reducing both pollution and emissions from intensive farms across mainland Europe, but mainly through the publicly-funded construction of small, locally fed installations.

NRG is a private company owned by the Canada Pension Plan Investment Board, one of the world's largest private equity investment companies, with over €427 billion worth of holdings. NRG plans to build up to 20 large-scale AD plants across Ireland, to feed a massive installation it already runs in Co Mayo, which supplies 30% of Ireland's gas energy. At present this gas mainly comes from the nearby Corrib



natural gas field, but with Corrib gas not expected to continue yielding commercially viable supplies for much longer, biogas is seen as a way to maintain current operations.


While there are strong arguments in favour of biogas in principle, the industrial scale of this proposal will inevitably result in resistance. Based on other plants being planned, the proposed installation is expected to handle around 90,000 tonnes of waste per annum, all of which would be trucked in. In addition, gas would need to be piped or transported for refining elsewhere. All of this brings increased risk of spillage and leaks, or even worse, devastating accidents. Furthermore, crops needed to supply the biogas plant will take up much needed agricultural land, supplanting food production. It would also lock us into an intensive farming model which, environmental and climate experts already argue, needs urgent reform.

While battling big business can feel a little bit hopeless, a planning application for a similar plant in Gort Co Galway went through several courts before being finally rejected, after a successful judicial review was taken by Gort Biogas Concern Group. But it's an expensive and daunting prospect. Recent disputes involving wind energy companies have shown that local resistance to large infrastructure projects can divide communities, causing bitterness, anxiety and financial burden in equal measure. The imposition of large scale projects, even where everyone is in agreement about the need for climate action of some kind, can only be successful if communities feel involved in the decision-making process. That is why we should be calling for small scale biogas supports instead, as it is done in Europe. While some biogas can play a role in our climate strategy, it is not a viable long term solution, nor is it a clean energy. Ultimately we need to divest from all fossil fuels, including gas, so planning goals must reflect this reality.

I live close to this proposed plant and I am very grateful to Tom for his well researched contribution to this article and to Con Kelleher for the photo he provided

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BOZENA, DR CIERLIK'S TALK ON MID AND EASTERN EUROPE -CONCEPT AND HISTORY.





Dr Cierlik is Polish and is a UCC lecturer in Polish and Eastern European history and politics. She secured her Ph D in UCC and has published on the contrasts and comparisons between Irish and Eastern European history and politics. As well she is fluent in Polish, Russian and English and is an expert in maps and statistics.

Macroom and district has many nationalities with perhaps the highest numbers coming from Poland, India and since 2022 Ukrainians. When I was growing up in Macroom in the 1950s/'60s people from other parts of County Cork were considered strange. Polish began settling in numbers from the 1990s and the Ukrainians for the past two years. Both groups came for political but different reasons. With the demise of the USSR in 1991 new freedoms flourished behind what was once the Iron Curtain. Poland and its neighbours threw off the yoke of Russian over-lordship and new countries such as Ukraine and Georgia emerged. Many Polish people emigrated and settled in places all over Ireland such as Macroom, Adventure, a new and better life and a fear of reversion to the old order were the motivations. The Ukranians largely came because of the Russian invasion of 2022.

Dr Cierlik neatly explained this situation and did so effectively with the use of maps and referencing the area's recent history and geography. The Russian Empire disappeared as a result of WWI and the communists took over and set up a totalitarian regime. It was beaten by Poland in a short subsequent war. Stalin consolidated power and spread communist influence to neighbouring countries by sponsoring local communist groups whose loyalty was to communism. The German Empire too vanished after

WWI and the harsh terms of the Versailles Treaty and grim economic times allowed Hitler and the Nazis come to power. They set up a parallel if different totalitarian fascist regime. It too had expansionist ambitious which ultimately led to WW2. Squeezed in the sandwich of two totalitarian regimes were the minnow countries of Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Romania etc. At the beginning of WWII Germany and Russia had a pact that divided the Baltic and Eastern European countries and split Poland. This situation was only breached when Hitler surprisingly attacked and invaded the USSR in June 1941. Remember, the Dunkirk evacuation had taken place in May/June 1940. With Germany's defeat and the Russian advance to Berlin, Stalin's policy was to control Eastern European countries and have a buffer to ensure that Russian would never again be invaded or become a battle field. Ukraine's independence was swallowed and Stalin encouraged the migration of many native Russians leaving substantial Russianspeaking and Russia-loyal minorities in 'conquered' countries.

Geographically, the USSR/Russia was/is European and Asian, divided by the Ural Mountains. The European part is more settleD, with a more moderate temperature and controls the rest. The Asian section is vast, barren, in-hospitable and has vast resources. The whole area too has a huge population that needs to be fed and Ukraine is Europe's 'breadbasket' and so an essential asset. Most if not all of Russia's ports are icebound during the winter, hindering trade and its navy's manoeuvrability. Its eastern ports are many miles and hours away. So, access to ports such as Odessa and in Crimea is essential, as Russia sees it, for commerce and security. Dr Cierlik's vividly illustrated

Her maps also catalogued the changing borders of Eastern European countries from time immemorial but especially since WW1. For example Poland was once a powerful king, then was divided between three empires, was briefly restored after WWI, then divided by Hitler and Stalin and then fell under the USSR's influence until the advent of the Solidarity movement and the dissolution of the USSR. Since independence, Poland has become a member of the EU but its last government had autocratic tendencies. Other Eastern countries have ongoing rifts as to whether to become more aligned to the EU or to Russian. Hungary and Georgia are examples and Byelorussia is allied to Putin and Russia.

In a topic that covered a vast area and a long history, the talk explained in a comprehensible if simplified manner what is happening in Ukraine, and other Eastern European countries and why it is unfolding as it is.

The crowd was enthralled by the talk and enlivened by Bozena's humour. Those present were impressed by her knowledge and her ability both to condense and make 'digestible' her broad topic. The audience left wiser and with a better understanding of our Polish, Ukrainian and other immigrants in our town and area. We should be kind and accommodating because it is the right thing to do, a great asset to the locality and not least because of Ireland's history of emigration. James O'Callaghan was MC and he made a presentation to Dr Cierlik after the talk.

SUPPORT FOR LOW-INCOME FARMERS

What is Farm Assist?

Farm Assist (FA) is a means-tested payment for low-income farmers.

There is a similar social welfare payment for fishermen and women called Fish Assist.

To qualify for Farm Assist, you must:

- · Be a farmer
- Be farming land in Ireland
- · Be aged between 18 and 66
- · Pass a means test You are considered a farmer, if you farm land that you own or lease and that you use for the purpose of husbandry. Husbandry means working the land with the aim of taking produce from the land.

How is income is assessed for Farm Assist?

In a means test the Department of Social Protection examines all your sources of income. To get FA, your income must be below a certain amount.

The some of the items included in the means test are:

- Cash income that you or your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant may have. There is some cash income not included in the means test. You should speak wit your local Citizens Information Centre for more information on this.
- Capital, for example, the value of savings, investments, shares or any property you have (but not your own home). The first €20,000 of your capital is not taken into account. Contact your local Citizens Information Centre to find out more about capital not included in the means test.
- Maintenance paid to you..

You can find detailed information on how all sources of income are assessed in the means test for Farm Assist on aov.ie.

How is Farm income and other income from self-employment assessed?

Farm income and other income from off-farm self-employment is assessed at 70%, with additional annual disregards of €254 for each of the first two children and €381 for the third and other children. (The disregards for dependent children are applied first and 70% of the balance is assessed.)

Your income from farming is assessed as gross income that you, your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant may be expected to receive minus any expenses you incur to earn that income. Your income from the previous 12 months is used to assess your likely future earnings. However, it is not simply assumed that your previous year's earnings will be repeated the following year as farmers can have significant variations in income from year to year.

When you apply for Farm Assist, a social welfare inspector will call to see you and ask to see various documents. For example, accounts prepared for tax purposes, creamery returns, cattle registration cards, details of headage payments and area aid. They will also want information on the sale of crops, cattle, milk and other produce. The inspector will then assess the costs actually and necessarily incurred in connection with the running of the farm. These costs may include rent, annuities, the cost of inputs like feed and fertiliser and the depreciation of farm machinery. Labour costs are taken into account, with the exception of the labour of the farmer and their spouse, civil partner or cohabitant. You are entitled to receive a copy of this farm income calculation. If you or your spouse, cohabitant or civil partner has other income from self-employment, this is also assessed, taking into account the costs incurred in the business. The income from farming and other forms of self-employment is added together and the costs involved are deducted.

You may be liable to pay Class S contributions on your income from self-employment.

How is income from farm schemes and direct payments assessed?

- · Expenses incurred in complying with these measures are deducted
- The balance is assessed as means.

You can find a full list of farm schemes that qualify for the disregard on gov.ie.

Under the Direct Payment system, a farmer's payment can be a combination of payments under 4 separate schemes. These are the Basic Payment Scheme (BPS), the Greening Payment, the Young Farmer's Scheme (YFS) and Aid for Protein Crops. Direct payments do not get the above disregards.

How is income from leasing of land treated?

If you have leased part of your land, the income from the leasing is assessed in full. It is not included in the assessment of income from farming as described above. If you have leased all your land, you are not eligible for Farm Assist.

How is income from employment assessed?

Your assessable weekly earnings (gross income less PRSI, union dues and superannuation fees) are usually assessed on the basis of the 13 weeks before you claim. Not all of your income is taken into account. €20 per day (up to a maximum of €60) is deducted from your assessable weekly earnings and then 60% of the balance is assessed as weekly means.

Any income from an occupational pension is assessed in full. If you have seasonal work, you are assessed on your earnings only during the period you are actually working.

Your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant's income from employment is assessed in the same way (€20 per day with a maximum of €60 is deducted and 60% of the balance is assessed as weekly means).

People who were getting Farm Assist before 26 September 2007 and who were still in payment on 26 September 2007 may be assessed differently.

What are the weekly Farm Assist rates in 2024?

Maximum weekly personal rate: €232 - Increase for an adult dependant: €154

Increase for a child dependant: Child under 12 €46 (full rate), €23 (half rate) Child aged 12 and over €54 (full rate), €27 (half rate)

An increase is payable for each child dependant if you are getting an increase for a qualified adult. If you do not qualify for an increase for a qualified adult, you may get a half-rate increase for a qualified child dependant.

How can I apply for Farm Assist?

To apply for Farm Assist, fill in form Farm 1 and return it to your local Intreo Centre or Social Welfare Branch Office. You can get this form at your local Intreo Centre or Social Welfare Branch Office or Citizens Information Centre.

If you are not happy with a decision on your application, you can appeal. You must appeal within 21 days of the decision.

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

MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior Hurling Final Ballinora 1-8 Ballincollig 2-5 a draw

Champions Ballinora, in pursuit of four MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior Hurling titles in a row, have been living dangerously all through this campaign and they will be mightily relieved not to have tripped up on this final hurdle. The rains poured down, the winds howled, the fine crowd in attendance for this final under lights at Ovens, gathered in the stand or braved the elements on the bank, just as the players had to do on the pitch. It is a tribute to the teams that in such miserable conditions a thrilling contest was served up with the outcome in doubt right up to the final whistle.

The contribution of match referee Diarmuid Kirwan and his officials to the enjoyment of this contest cannot be understated as local derbies in trying conditions can be difficult to handle but sensible refereeing without conceding firm control was clearly in evidence and the players responded to provide an exhilarating contest.

One could only sympathise with the players as they stood for the National Anthem lashed by the elements. The game had scarcely commenced when Ballinora mid fielder Shane Kingston, the dominant player of the opening half, pointed a free but Ballincollig's marksman, team captain Dave Bowen, quickly relied with a levelling point and it was The Village which took the lead in the 7th minute when Paul Cooney pointed another free. Scores were at a premium, defences tight and quick tackling, and it was no surprise that free takers were the main source of rewards on the scoreboard. Shane Kingston levelled for Ballinora with a free from a long way out on 15 but Dave Bowen had Ballincollig back in front two minutes later, again from a placed ball.

The game turned the way of the reigning champions in the ten minutes before half time. Ballincollig net minder Ronan Cambridge made a smashing save from Tommy Burns on 17 but Kingston equalised from a free two minutes later and then Kingston lashed in a goal in a crowded goalmouth to send his side a goal clear, 1-3 to 0-3. The Ballinora man then pointed a free from out near the sideline and a point from Alan O'Shea in the 24th minute opened up a five point gap. When Shane Kingston had another pint in injury time to bring his personal tally to 1-5 for the half hour, Ballinora were in a happy place at the break, leading by six points, playing well and with the benefit of the swirling wind to assist them in the

Ballincollig made two changes to their lineout for the second half and were in very determined form, contesting every ball and providing huge support for colleagues in trouble. Still their revival was assisted by Ballinora not availing of early chances from free

pucks, none of them easy but three wides from scorable chances left Ballincollig hopes still alive and they grew in determination as the game progressed. They needed a break to ignite the challenge and it came in the 35th minute when Dave Bowen gave a short pass on to Evan Cooke and the substitute palmed the ball on into the net for an unusual goal but vital goal. Ace marksman Dave Bowen added a point from a free on 40 and three minutes later Ballincollig were in ecstasy when they had a second goal - a superb effort. Dave Bowen in the left corner with a pin point pass picked out Brendan O'Brien standing all alone in front of goal ten metres out and the centre forward crashed an unstoppable rocket to the Ballinora net. Ballincollig now led by a point, 2-4 to 1-6, a sensational turn about in fortunes for the teams.

The game lasted another twenty minutes, only three points in all were scored but the rains eased off and there was a rip roaring conclusion with everybody reasonably happy at the finish. Ballinora substitute Ben Mayer had a point from play in the 49th minute, the champion's first score of the second half to level matters and a minute later corner forward Alan O'Shea put them in front with a fine point. 
