

Study Skills Week: Our 6th year students have been very lucky to have Alex Linehan, Founder of Nextstepuni.com, come to spend time with them twice in the past 6 weeks. Alex set the 6th years up on Nextstepuni's online course and gave them a talk around goal setting, building effective study systems, and how to make the most out of your time while in Second Level. His key point is how short term sacrifices can be used for long term gain He touched on making short term sacrifices for long term gains, and how thinking about where you will be ten years in the future if you continue what you are doing now can be a huge motivation when it comes to changing behaviour. Alex himself grew up in a disadvantaged area and attended a DEIS school. He never saw college as an option for him and ended up failing his Junior Cert. After one of his childhood best friends passed away from drug related reasons he realised he needed to make a change to alter his life trajectory. To start, he read scientific papers on the most effective ways to learn and how to build a growth mindset. He realised he was studying wrong, he was using rereading, rewriting, highlighting and cramming when he should have been using active recall, spaced repetition, interleaving and combining these with a growth mindset. Through his new learning system Alex went from failing his Junior Cert to obtaining the highest Leaving Cert points his school had seen in over a decade, and he became a UCC Quercus Scholar. The online course has 11 dynamic modules topics include. The most effective learning techniques; Misleading study methods that may seem helpful but aren't ;Proven exam-taking strategies; How to develop efficient study systems . Each module is designed to empower students with the tools they need for academic success! Nextstepuni was built in collaboration with high performing students and is backed by science, and Alex hopes he will be able to boost our students' academic performance and increase their progression into third level education. It's a wonderful opportunity for the students. Exciting times are ahead and the students are very optimistic about the future of our great, young, future leaders.



#### **BT Young Scientist**



#### **Smart or Wise**

Do you tell your offspring that the older you get, the wiser you get? Perhaps, you do, but don't really believe it. You may think that the older you get the more you don't know. You would be in good company. Socrates, famously declared that all his philosophising had taught him that the difference between others and he, was that they do not know, while he knew he

When I was at school much was justified on the basis that it was for our own good. I never dared to ask, what is my own good. I now assume it was to get a good education, so as to get a job eventually, to make a good living, to get on well in the world. Perhaps the implication was that I would have fulfilment and happiness as a result, though I doubt that. Such concepts were not well known to us, and perhaps were not the experience of our teachers either. It was clearly relayed though that the smart ones and the dedicated ones had the advantage. Those of us that occupied the back row, and preferred to chat, or to provoke, were sure to bring trouble on ourselves now and later.

I read recently that a study published in the Journal of Experimental Psychology found that people who were better at wise reasoning did better in nearly every area of life. They were happier, had better relationships, and were even less likely to die in the next five years. It was a surprise to me then to learn that greater education and intelligence, is largely unrelated to wise reasoning. In fact, it may possibly be a disadvantage. The reason according to David Robson who wrote the book 'The Intelligence Trap' is that "Intelligent and educated people are less likely to learn from their mistakes, ....or take advice from others. And when they do err, they are better able to build elaborate arguments to justify their reasoning, meaning that they become more and more dogmatic in their views. Worse still, they appear to have a bigger 'bias blind spot,' meaning they are less able to recognize the holes in their logic."

So, you could have an IQ in the top few % and it wouldn't help make you wiser, healthier, or happier. Apparently, wisdom isn't about 'cognitive ability' it is about cognitive style, that is, what you actually do with your ability. And one of the most important things we can do is to develop self-critical thinking. Robson recommends that when making important decisions we should ask ourselves, how we may be wrong, what am I missing here. We should make as good an argument as we possibly can to ourselves - for the opposite. Step back then and make the decision as a judge weighing up the alternatives and be prepared to justify the decision. This helps to make our decision making more rational.

Not all smart people of course, but many, find it hard to doubt themselves. They are not too good at taking advice from those whom they consider slower at thinking than they. We should always seek out others' opinions, whatever our opinion of our own abilities. A differing opinion is often just what we may need to see our weaknesses. Our opinion is often just one option, not the only. This stimulates thinking. Often others may not change our mind but nonetheless they help us refine our own point of view. So, we are advised, don't get lazy, stay open-minded, remain curious, and stay aware that, not just others, but our own minds can play tricks on us.

Unfortunately, most of us think we are smarter than we are. They say the definition of those that are average are those who think they are not. The philosopher, Montaigne, I think caught it well when he jested that good sense must be the "most evenly distributed thing in the world". This was only because it seemed to him that no one is dissatisfied with their own share of it!







## Boil Water Notice - Macroom, Carrigadrohid and Canovee

The ongoing boil water notice affecting the residents of Macroom, Carrigadrohid and Canovee has highlighted a significant communication breakdown with Irish Water. This situation is not only fustrating but unacceptable, as locals have a right to timely updates and tranparent information about Irish Water's resolution process and to ensure the current boil notice is lifted for locals.

I continue to be fully committed to voicing your concerns and have sought critical details, including recent water quality test results and the timeline for lifting the notice. Additionally, I have requested a meeting with Irish Water's management team for Macroom water supply to press the urgent need to expedite the new plant's development. Your right to safe drinkng water remains my top priority.

This boil water notice, which was intially issued on August 27 following consultations with the Health service Executive (HSE), was briefly lifted on September 25 before being reinstated on September 30 due to adverse weather conditions affecting water clarity and supply. This pattern of repeated boil water notices has been a recurring issued during the winter months in recent years, leading to my calls for more effective communication and action from Irish Water.



# Fond Memories of Castle Ballroom School Ceilis

In 1974, Bro Anselem, a De La Salle Brother arrived in Macroom as principal of St. Coleman's Boys National School. Brother Anselem was a native of Castleisland and most of his family were by then in Chicago. He proved to be a wonderful, far-sighted headmaster with great ideas to keep young people happy.

In August that year, Brother Anselem called to me and said he had a good suggestion for 5th and 6th class boys. The girls were learning dancing, but the boys had no social activity outside of football. Their legs were uneducated as regards dancing - unlike the girls. He came up with a stunning suggestion to solve the problem. He was going to run a "ceili dancing class" for 5th and 6th class boys and girls. He had it all planned to perfection.

- · he would take charge of the boys
- a nun would take charge of the girls
- · he was going to ask Rita O'Sullivan to teach the dancing (a great choice)
- and I Mort would look after the music, with my music pupils
- · he was going to use the good old Castle Ballroom from 4.00 to 5.30 every Wednesday evening for the Ceilis

A minor hiccup occurred at the very beginning - the convent National School were not interested. Brother Anselem said this was not a problem since it was after school - he had a plan. He would get the boys to invite the girls - this plan worked 100%.

The very first evening, all the boys and girls turned up promptly - aided and abetted by their parents. Some of the pupils were all "dolled up". Some boys were shaking with excitement. Could you imagine the thought of taking a girl out to dance, when you "couldn't put one foot beyond the other on a dance floor". Some were very shy at the thought of dancing with a girl.

Rita O'Sullivan did a great job in getting the boys on the dance floor to do their basic steps "one-two-three, one-two-three" and in no time she had them doing the "waltz" with the girls - oh my God - what excitement and enjoyment. Things really took off. After a couple of evenings, Anselem could not believe his eyes - Sister Peter (one lovely kind nun) arrived in. She said the girls "had demanded" that she should "come to the Ceilis" and that she could not refuse.

At this stage Anselem had to instigate a few simple

1) No running (rushing) across the floor to ask a girl to dance (you had to have manners and walk)

2) You had to put out your hand and ask properly "may I have this dance please" No grabbing of the sweater and pulling a girl out on the floor. When this happened Anselem made them all sit down and then start all

over again.

3) You were not allowed to REFUSE to dance with a person - the reason was "we were all equal in God's eyes" (according to the Gospel). Anselem was very strict on this.

Rita did a brilliant job in teaching the regular dances that were danced at the time namely:

- Waltz Siege of Ennis The Barn dance Foxtrot
- · Ouickstep · Military Two-Step · Valeta Waltz · Two Parts of the Kerry Set

\*The Ceilis took off big-time, enjoyment hit the ceiling, and everybody was happy.

As time progressed, we added a few variations like, 3 "Celi Mors" in the year, Christmas, St. Patrick's night and Easter. We invited the parents to these Ceilis and for many, these were very nostalgic occasions having them back dancing where they spent many happy enjoyable nights dancing in their youth. The highlights of the nights were:

- Every daughter had to take her dad out for a waltz
- · Every son had to take his mother out. The children were delighted with themselves "showing off" how well they could dance.
- · Another highlight was the children competing against their parents in a waltzing competition. The result was usually a "tie" (bad judging I suppose)

The good that this dancing did for the boys was amazing. Thanks to Rita's teaching, the boys had the confidence to take a lady out on the floor to dance and they were able to dance. There was also a bonus for my music pupils - they learned all the tunes and had to play in strict tempo for the dancing.

Addendum to the Castle Ballroom Ceilis

As a result of having many pupils in the Secondary schools, who were well able to dance, Rita, Brother Bernard (another Castleisland brother) and myself decided to start a Secondary school ceili every Friday night from 8 – 10pm before the Showband dance. The problem was, the showbands used to arrive in the middle of our ceili and were surprised at what greeted them. It was my duty to talk to the band leaders and

explain that we would finish at 10pm and inform them that they did not need to start playing until 11.30pm. I found the showbands very supportive of our efforts and I never once during those years got a crib or hassle from any band leader. They were great times.

My next move always was to call out a "Siege of Ennis" and the older girls used to ask the bands members out to dance. Some band members could dance and were only delighted but other members who were not used to dancing and possibly could not dance or were too shy would refuse. The girls would politely tell them that they cannot refuse according to "Anselem's Gospel" and they used go out on the floor and walk around. My observation was that some band members would benefit from a few classes with Rita.

The nice offshoot from all this was the show bands "that knew" arrived early the next night for the "Hooley" and would join in.

It would be remiss of me if I didn't compliment the great work that Rita, Sister Peter, Brother Bernard and Brother Anselem did. It's also important to point out the wonderful behaviour of all the dancers. Not one person ever gave trouble or misbehaved.

The musicians were wonderful. They practiced hard to play their best and learned all the necessary tunes. I'm glad to say that many of them are still playing regularly. There are too many musicians to name but they certainly deserve our thanks. I hope the dancers are still enjoying the dancing!

Lastly, I must thank the hall committee for their encouragement and support and the use of the Castle Ballroom.

I will finish by quoting Mary Hopkins No.1 hit from top of the pops 1969,

"Those were the days my friends,

we thought they'd never end".

BUT The Castle Ballroom entrance was converted into a garage for the Fire Brigade

and that was the END......

FOOTNOTE: Since the De La Salle brothers left Macroom in 1990 Brother Anselem used to call back and stay with me in Codrum. We would visit his relations and friends in Kerry. During his last visit ten years ago, the four of us involved in the National School Ceilis had breakfast together in the Castle hotel.

Namely:

• Rita O Sullivan • Sister Peter • Brother Anselem • Mort Kelleher

Since then, Sister Peter and Brother Anselem passed to their eternal rewards.

### THE WORLDS FIRST (and still only!) HUMAN CENTIPEDE CHARITY CRAWL? YES! - IN MACROOM TOWN 1978...DID YOU WITNESS IT?

A unique charity event took place in Macroom town centre in April/May of 1978.

Every year, the fifth year ( that was a doss year back then!) pupils of Coláiste losagáin boarding school in Ballyvourney did a charity collection in Macroom town, the nearest large town. This collection was the usual standing outside shops with boxes and stickers.

However, in 1978, a number of the 5th year class studentswere keen to do something a bit more "active", a bit different, a bit entertaining, an effort to do something daft in return for folk donating to the charity concerned.

After considering a number of options they came up with the idea of the class crawling on all fours around the centre of the town while the collectors moved with the crawlers hoping to drum up the cash. The idea was presented to the De la Salle Brother in charge of the event and ,while somewhat amused, permission was granted.

It was a Tuesday (mart day back in those days) damp, dull, a bit chilly but thank heavens it was not raining. The class was bussed from the College to the town square, a variety of self-made knee protectors (mostly foam tied to the knees - no fancy builders knee protectors in those days!) were fastened to knees,

collection boxes were donned, charity stickers at the ready and on the given order, the column of crawlers set off in single file around the square, down past the Castle Hotel, the post office, Fitzies, across the street and back up to the square via the old cinema. To this day I can remember the various remarks made by the bemused locals ..."ahh ye're daft out", " what are ye doing at all", " have ye no sense", " why are'nt ye in school".....

Well, we thoroughly enjoyed ourselves. I can vividly remember the wonderful atmosphere on the bus back to Coláiste losagáin and in the classroom as we counted the rather substantial takings from our crawl that morning in Macroom. While Coláiste Iosagáin was very close to Macroom town, being a boarding school very few from Macroom attended losagáin. On the day of the crawl, the only "locals" participating would have been Denis Hurley, Ballingeary ( Lee Valley Clothing), Edmond O'Sullivan, Lake Hotel Inchigeela, the Twomey triplets (Eamonn, Enda and Sean) of Twomeys Feed Mill in Ballyvourney, and Willie Cotter from Aghinagh.

A sincere thank you to all the generous people that were in Macroom town that morning in 1978 for the world's first and only human centipede charity crawl!

### FREE ENERGY UPGRADES (WARMER HOMES SCHEME)

The Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) provides free home energy upgrades to homeowners who get certain social welfare payments. These upgrades help improve the energy efficiency and warmth of your home and are also known as the Warmer Homes Scheme.

The scheme prioritises the oldest and least energy efficient homes. You can apply for the free upgrades again if you've already had work done under the scheme, but your home would benefit from more upgrades. To access the scheme again you must still meet the gualifying criteria.

If you do not qualify for the free upgrades, the SEAI provides other grants to help with the cost of upgrading the energy efficiency of your home. The National Home Energy Upgrade Scheme provides grants to bring your home up to an energy efficiency rating of B2 or above, using a private company to  $manage\ the\ work.\ Or,\ you\ can\ get\ individual\ energy\ upgrade$ grants, if you only want to do certain upgrades, and would prefer to manage the process yourself.

### What energy upgrades are available through the Warmer Homes Scheme?

The scheme covers these home energy upgrades:

- Attic insulation
- · Wall insulation including cavity wall, internal wall and external wall insulation
- Draught-proofing
- Lagging jackets
- Energy efficient lighting
- Energy advice

New central heating systems and replacement windows are also occasionally covered by the scheme. Your windows will only be replaced if your walls are being insulated at the same time and the existing windows are single-glazed windows. The SEAI decides if replacement windows are needed on a case by case basis.

### Do I qualify for the scheme?

To qualify for this scheme you must meet the following criteria:

- You must own your home and be living in it
- Your home must have been built and occupied before 2006
- Your home must have a BER of C,D,E,F or G
- · You must be getting one of the following social welfare payments:
- Fuel Allowance
- Working Family Payment
- Jobseeker's Allowance for over 6 months and have a child aged under 7
- Disability Allowance for over 6 months and have a child aged under 7
- Domiciliary Care Allowance
- One Parent Family Payment
- Carer's Allowance and you must live with the person you

If you don't have a BER for your home, the SEAI will do a free BER to check that your home meets the qualifying criteria of having a BER of C or lower.

### How does the scheme work?

There are 4 steps to this process:

- 1. Apply for the scheme online or by completing an application form and sending it back to the SEAI. You must ensure you meet the qualifying criteria above when applying. You can use the SEAI online portal to check if you qualify.
- 2. Have an SEAI surveyor check your home is suitable for the works and recommend upgrades. The SEAI will do this if you
- 3. Get the works done by a contractor appointed by the SEAI 4. Get the works assessed by the SEAI once the works are completed. This will include a new BER assessment and may involve a quality inspection.

#### How can Lapply?

You can apply online. Alternatively you can download and complete the application form from seai.ie. You can also get an application form from your local Citizens Information Centre. You must meet the qualifying criteria. You can use the SEAI online portal to check this or speak with your local Citizens Information Centre.

You need to provide evidence that you qualify for the scheme. Full details of the information needed are on the application form.

If you are getting a qualifying payment other than Carer's Allowance, you no longer need to get the Department of Social Protection to complete part of the application form. The SEAI will check your eligibility with the DSP.

If you qualify for the scheme because you are getting Carers Allowance, you must also complete the Carer's Allowance Confirmation Form , which you can get from your local Citizens Information Centre or download from www. seai.ie

### How long does it take to get work done under the Scheme?

The process from application to completion of works usually takes between 24 and 26 months, though this may vary.

#### How will I know if my home is suitable?

The SEAI will review your application and check if you are eligible. They will then assess if your home is suitable for the work. A surveyor acting for the SEAI will arrange to call to your home to do this. They will complete a survey of your home, which involves:

- Walking around the inside and outside of your home. including the attic
- Assessing the overall suitability of your home for energy efficiency upgrades
- · Measuring, photographing and recording information about your home
- · Discussing their findings with you, outlining what work you should get and answering any questions you have

### What happens after I have been approved for the Scheme?

If your home is suitable for the upgrades a contractor will be appointed by the SEAI to do the work on your home.

The contractor will visit your home to assess the works needed. They will then explain their recommendations to you, and agree a schedule for the work. You should have a written contract with the contractor, which clearly states the work you have agreed to.

When the work is completed, the contractor will give you documentation about the work, including any warranties. It is important to keep these safe, as you may need them in

A Building Energy Rating (BER) is carried out on all homes after the works are complete to assess the building's energy performance. A BER certificate and advisory report will be sent to you and will also be published on the SEAI's national

Some homes will also be inspected to ensure that the works meet the required standards.

### How much will it cost?

You will not be charged for work done under this scheme. However, if you sell your home within 5 years of getting the work done, you need to tell the SEAI. You should inform them in writing at least 30 days before your property is sold. The SEAI may ask you to repay some or all of the grant. This is at their discretion.
