



This is such a fantastic opportunity, well done girls and thanks to Ms O'Donoghue for helping the girls with this competition.

Maggie Gough Competition

This year we had a very exciting Maths week in St Marys! The Irish Maths Teachers Association 'Maggie Gough' was one of the competitions run during the week. All 2nd, 4th and 5th years from the school entered. Of the approx 16,000 entries nationwide, Chloe Lehane, a 4th year student, achieved 94/100 and has been awarded a Maggie Gough medal from the IMTA based on her outstanding results. Well done Chloe.

BT Young Scientist

Two of our 4th year individual projects are by Chloe Lehane and Ellen Murray. Ellen's project is called: "Eochracha Agus Droichid" - A Sociolinguistic Investigation Into How Grammatical Gender Affects The Thought And Cognition Of English And Irish Speakers. She aims to examine if and how the use of grammatical gender in the Irish language and genderless nouns in English affect thought and perception. Chloe Lehane's project is titled "The Silent Struggle: An Investigation Into Irish Women's Attitudes Towards A HRT Scheme For Menopausal Symptoms".

Her project aims to assess the potential impact of the National HRT scheme and lack of awareness and support of women's health issues in Ireland. Camogie Update:

One hundred years ago, in 1924, the junior players of Kilmurry lifted the county title for the first time, a remarkable victory amid the shadows of a turbulent Ireland. Today, as we commemorate a century of that historic achievement, it is made even more special by this year's triumph: Kilmurry taking home the premier junior county title, one hundred years after the first. The echoes of that historic win resound even louder as today's players carry forward the dreams and aspirations of those who came before them. As we celebrate this achievement, we also remember the team who played against unimaginable odds in an Ireland scarred by conflict, unrest, and economic hardship.

Ireland in 1924: A nation reeling and recovering

The Ireland of 1924 was far from the stable and thriving country we know today. It was a nation still bearing the deep scars of war. The War of Independence had only ended three years earlier, followed almost immediately by a brutal Civil War that tore communities apart and pitted friends and families against each other. Ireland's infrastructure was in ruins, with roads, bridges, and buildings destroyed during years of fighting. Many communities were left in despair, grappling with the loss of loved ones and the destruction of their homes and livelihoods.

In the midst of this, strikes and labour unrest were widespread, as workers protested poor conditions and low wages. Thousands of political prisoners filled the jails, and hunger was widespread. 



Kilmurry Active Retirement

'Supporting and Safeguarding our Family and Finances'

Thirteen members from our association and many more from our neighbouring associations were among the packed attendance at this AIB sponsored event in the Castle Hotel, Macroom on the 26th of November. One of our members posted on our chatroom later, 'it was a very informative meeting and very interesting, vital for our age group' which sums it up better than I could. Starting the proceedings, Macroom branch manager, Alberto Martin, said that when he took up his role, what surprised him most was the lack of financial preparedness of so many customers for the inevitable. Consequently, the branch had organised an event last year which was very well received, and this was expanded following consultation with local active retirement associations. The first speaker was Sean Cahill from C.W. Ashe Solicitors. He focused primarily on the fair deal scheme. He emphasised that many people will not qualify for the scheme due to lack of timely planning. Any property or funds that you dispose of by gift at least five years before you apply for the scheme is not counted. But if you leave it too late and must apply within five years of the disposal, it is as if you had not disposed of it, it is taken into account and that may well disqualify you from the scheme.

I think that making plans does not bring death a day sooner, and planning can greatly ease the financial worries of loved ones left behind. Many work hard all their lives and then let those earnings disappear from their families when, in many circumstances, there may be an alternative. People do tend to retain resources for the contingency that they may end up needing a nursing home. That may be what ends up disqualifying one from the fair deal scheme. A private nursing home can cost about €1500/week(78k/year). At that rate it won't take long to burn through the nest eggs of many, at which point you may then qualify. It appears that having savings is not always an advantage when it comes to nursing homes, unless of course you are not there long, or if you have so much that you won't qualify anyway.

Another of the issues mentioned by Sean was the Advance Healthcare Directive (AHD). An AHD is a written statement about the type of medical or surgical treatment you want or do not want, if in the future, you are unable to make these decisions. An AHD is only used if you lose capacity, and you can no longer communicate your wishes yourself. I have been wondering about this but have done nothing yet. I don't think I would want aggressive treatment if the prognosis were poor, yet, I think, I would want more than just palliative care to treat my symptoms. We are all different. While I like living, I have lived almost 25000 days already and so far, they have all ended the same way. On the day I die, that will be different. It will be interesting I think, perhaps it will make an exciting change, and I would not want to miss it. I wouldn't want to be distracted from the process by some fellow breaking my ribs trying to get my wornout heart going again... unless of course it is not worn out. While most don't want to consider such things the alternative is that someone else will decide, and that may not be fair on them. It can lead to disagreement and family disputes, which is not the legacy we would want to leave.

Following Sean, next up was John Vaughan from Crowley & McCarthy Accountants who concentrated mostly on the complexities of gift and inheritance taxes. He explained the new tax exemption bands, 400k for a child, 40k nieces/ nephews/brothers/ sisters, and 20k for others. Then the tax rate applied is 33%, but special tax reductions (90%) may apply in particular circumstances for farms and businesses.

Then Helen Harrington from AIB outlined the extensive range of supports available from the bank. She emphasised how convenient it is, for the surviving partner, if the account is in joint names. Otherwise, the administration process applies before the survivor/ beneficiaries can get access to the funds, which takes some time. However, one thing I learned on the night, is that an exception is made for funeral expenses. If the bank is made aware of the death, they can pay the undertaker directly from the deceased's sole account. This is often a big cost and one that the family is often concerned about. This is a good facility, and knowing about it should relieve some stress at a very stressful time. At one point Helen said that she liked answering questions, and it proved lucky that she did! At the end she summed things up well, if you have any concerns or want help with financial arrangements, just ask them.

On behalf of our members and I am sure all those present, I would like to thank AIB for their initiative, and for providing, free of charge, this important and valuable service to the local community. Well done all at AIB, Macroom.

History

DANIEL (DAN) CORKERY


Arthur Schopenhauer (1788-1860), a German philosopher, once said 'There are very few who can think, but every man wants to have an opinion; and what remains but to take it ready-made from others, instead of forming opinions for himself?' Daniel Corkery was definitely one of the few who could think, being described by Macroom man, historian John A. Murphy (1927-2022) as having an interesting independence of mind.

Born on the 20th of September 1883 in the parish of Clondrohid, Daniel (Dan) was the youngest of two sons and one daughter of James Corkery and Johanna (née Buckley). He went to primary school in Macroom. In those days, primary school involved a wide-ranging and extensive education, with a perusal of exams from the time revealing that exams in subjects such as Maths and English were more complex than some university exams today. These subjects were essential for shopkeeping, which was Dan's livelihood. Typical of Dan's quietly determined nature, when his shop was destroyed by British forces in April 1921, he ensured it was rebuilt.

Like many men in the area, Dan joined the Irish Republican Brotherhood in the early 1900s. This was a secret organisation, that wanted an end to British rule in Ireland and for an Irish republic to be established. He subsequently joined the Irish Volunteers in 1914, quickly being made an officer. The Irish Volunteers was a military organisation established in 1913. in response to the formation of its Irish unionist counterpart, the Ulster Volunteers in 1912. Its main objective was 'to secure and maintain the rights and liberties common to the whole people of Ireland'. Dan was one of the founding members of the Macroom branch of the Irish Volunteers in 1915, as well as Commanding Officer of the Volunteers that paraded in Macroom on Easter Sunday 1916. This led to him being swiftly being imprisoned, being moved from place to place, including Frongoch in Wales. Frongoch was originally used for German prisoners of war, but they were moved to make way for the Irish fighters of Easter 1916, among whose number were Michael Collins, Tomás MacCurtain and Terence MacSwiney. With leaders such as Michael Collins, who was also imprisoned there, giving lessons in guerrilla tactics, the internment camp became known as Ollscoil na Réabhlóide, the University of Revolution.

Released at the end of July 1916, imprisonment didn't deter Dan – he was sent to Dundalk gaol for six weeks for continuing to organise the local Volunteers. None of this could have been easy for his wife, Mary Murphy (1884–1923), who he married in 1915. However, as the head of Cumann na mBan (an Irish republican women's paramilitary organisation formed in Dublin in 1914) in Macroom, she knew what he was fighting for, as it was her battle, too.

During the War of Independence, Dan was OC (Officer Commanding) of the 7th Battalion, 1st Cork Brigade. This meant he was one of the main IRA officers during the Coolavokig ambush on 25th February 1921. The IRA flying column had been unsuccessfully attempting to ambush the British Auxiliaries in the area for a couple of weeks beforehand, which meant their position became known, leading to a force of 70 Auxiliaries and 7 RIC (Royal Irish Constabulary) constables moving in. The 62 IRA volunteers included units from the 1st, 7th, and 8th battalions of the 1st Cork Brigade, and was divided into sections under Sean O'Hegarty, Dan Corkery and Dan 'Sando' Donovan. The four-hour battle was important because it signified the end of

British patrols and raids in the area.

Dan entered politics, while continuing to fight for freedom. He was elected in July 1921 to the second Dáil, as a Sinn Féin TD for what was then the 8-seat constituency of Cork Mid, North, South, South-East, and West. Being Dan, he wasn't afraid to speak his mind, as we can see in this speech 6 months later, in January 1922, against the treaty:

'I rise to vote against this Treaty; I believe if I voted for this Treaty I would be voting against the independence of my country; I am not prepared to do that. I believe, also, if we go into this British Empire we will go in there as a prop to hold up a rotten Empire. We have heard a lot here of the alternative to this Treaty— terrible and immediate war. Well, I have the honour of representing Mid-Cork in this Dáil, and I think this guerilla warfare was started in Mid-Cork; I believe the first lorry was attacked in Mid-Cork; the people have been with us all the time up to the Truce and they never flinched though they often heard the angry crack of the rifle and machine gun. The people down there do not want war, but they are not half as much afraid of war as the people from other counties who have not fired a shot yet. I am against this Treaty.'

Having been interned more than once, and having had first-hand experience of fighting, his viewpoint was that freedom had to mean complete, not partial freedom. He was re-elected for the same constituency in the election of June 1922, though didn't take his seat in the third Dáil, in common with other anti-Treaty TDs. He had the courage of his convictions. Dan was once again elected in August 1923, this time for the new constituency of Cork North, while in prison. This must have been an extraordinarily difficult time for Dan, in a long list of difficult times, as he was also in prison when his wife, Mary, died a month earlier. He was granted a one-day parole for his wife's funeral. This must have weighed heavily on his mind, given that he and Mary had three young children, two sons and a daughter.

Dan participated in the mass hunger strikes in 1923. The hunger strike stems from an ancient Irish tradition of shaming an enemy, by publicly fasting in protest at their actions. It had a legal basis in the Brehon Laws, the statutes which governed life in early medieval Ireland. In October 1923, more than 8,000 political prisoners went on hunger strike. They were opposed to the Anglo-Irish Treaty and were protesting their internment without trial. The Free State government did not issue a general amnesty to the internees until 1924 (Dan was released in 1924), leaving many republican prisoners interned long after the ending of the war. Although the fighting was mostly over, the bitterness of the Irish Civil War continued.

True to form, Dan once more topped the poll in Cork North in June 1927, when he stood as an independent republican candidate, following this with another resounding electoral success when and again came top when he stood for Fianna Fáil in the September 1927 general election. Losing his seat in 1932, he quickly regained it the following year. Changes in constituency boundaries resulted in his failure to be elected for Cork West in 1937.

MACROOM_SOCIAL_RUN



Dan was a Fianna Fáil member of Seanad Éireann between 1938 and 1944, for the industrial and commercial panel, and was a member of Macroom urban district council from the 1920s to his death on April 23rd, 1961. Apart from politics, he was also an avid GAA (Gaelic Athletic Association) man, a talented footballer. He won county championship medals for Macroom from 1909 to 1913, even playing on the Cork team that won the Munster title in 1907. What is noteworthy is that he remained active in Macroom GAA after the Civil War, as sport helped bring opposing political sides closer to reconciliation.

A second marriage, to Madge, a cousin of his first wife, Mary, was also tragically short, as they married in 1929, and Madge passed away a short year later, in 1930. Dan threw himself into doing what he could for his community and constituency. He promoted afforestation, and was always supportive to farmers, having grown up on a farm, and having signed an electoral promise to his constituents, along with fellow Corkman, Seán Moylan, in 1933:

'The land of Ireland belongs to the Irish farmers who fought for it.'

He also helped implement the home-grown tomato policy of the 1930s. The 1930s were catastrophic for agriculture and many other industries, worldwide. In Ireland, cattle prices fell, as did exports, and farms and livestock were subject to forced sales, due to debt. The home-grown tomato policy hoped to encourage selfsufficiency, instead of relying on imports.

Dan also helped found and promote The Irish Press, a national daily newspaper published between 1931 and 1995. In keeping with his interest in the GAA, the first issue was published on the eve of the 1931 All-Ireland Senior Hurling Championship Final between Kilkenny and Cork (Cork won the title, a 5-8 to 3-4 victory over

Kilkenny, in a second replay of the final). The Irish Press quickly established a reputation of holding official Ireland to account, with its editor prosecuted by an Irish Free State military tribunal in Dec. 1931 for publishing articles alleging that Gardaí had mistreated the opponents (Anti-Treaty republicans) of the Irish Free State government. Indeed, the Irish Press was not allowed to be on the train which delivered newspapers from Dublin to the countryside!

What isn't perhaps as well-known is that Dan was instrumental in setting up Mallow sugar factory. Mallow sugar factory closed in 2006, with 320 workers losing their jobs when Greencore shut the plant, under an EU Commission scheme to eliminate unprofitable sugar production, when the plant was actually profitable. In 2010, the EU Court of Auditors held the closure to be 'needless', precisely because it was profitable, and cost more to close than it would have to keep it open. A 2018 report in agriland.ie found that equipment from Ireland's closed sugar factories in Mallow and Carlow was sent to aid the resurgence of the sugar industry in southern Ukraine.


Dan was a courageous man, who cared deeply about the Irish people in general, and his community in particular. This was evident in his statement to the Bureau of Military History:

'It would not he right to conclude this statement without paying tribute to the civilian population, particularly in the poorer and mountainous districts where small farmers fed and housed the columns - often making their own rations available without thought of recompense. The men and women engaged on intelligence work for us supplied accurate information regarding enemy activities, and, in many cases, at great personal risk...'

This simple and heartfelt acknowledgement of the sacrifice of ordinary people for freedom for themselves and future generations gives pause for thought. It is to be hoped it awakens some of those who slumber, while around them the structure so courageously created and guarded is being disassembled.

Let us give the final word to Dan, who understood that politics is meant to serve the people, not the politicians, in a statement that rings prophetically true a century later. He understood that no one should accept living with no heating, fuel, food and lowered living standards because of politicians' choices. What a compassionate statesman:

...this thing has come to breaking point with the people living in the poorer districts. They are barely existing at present, and it is the duty of the Government to see that some means be devised by which they will be able to live at least in some kind of comfort.

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

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

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Think Globally, Act locally Energising the town of Macroom



Hi! Chris Barrett here again.

Today I have the great pleasure of speaking with the prize-winning Landscape and Equine Artist, Micheal O'Muirthile who is combining his appreciation of local artists with practical and much appreciated support for them by providing free exhibition space at his studio at 41 Main Street, Macroom.

Macroom has a history of Art Exhibitions. I remember space previously provided by the Town Hall, the old Briery Gap Library, and by John Quinlan, upstairs above his shop on the Western side of town.

Michael himself, is in the strange position of being the final artist to display his work in the old Briery Gap Library before fire damage closed it for the best part of a decade.

He phoned Ann Dunn the day after, from Kerrry ,to ask if she could retrieve his work as he was out of Macroom. She said she was unable to get into the building due to a fire. It took her a while to convince him that she was not codding him. And fortunately, a few months after he had intended, he had his art works back again!

Having spent a lifetime involved with art, Micheal bought the shop on Main Street with the aim of spending more time with art, and sharing his passion with others.

He had always been interested in the shop where he lives now, and so he was particularly enthused when his daughter told him that it was for sale.

The shop which is opposite Chapel Hill, dates back to 1820. It has survived famine times, and has a wonderfully preserved frontage of two timber framed display windows, which are either side of two colourfully glazed doors. This increasingly rare and beautifully preserved historical world is accessed through retractable railings, and affords a welcome opportunity to experience architecture which has been lovingly brought back to its former glory with sensitive attention to detail. Inside, the old patterned floor tiles seem as good as they were when first laid, except for a line of marks reflecting the time when the building was sub-divided as dictated by the needs of a hairdressing salon.

It seems that early on, the building at 41 Main Street Macroom, was a public house, becoming a shop in the 1900s and most lately the afore-mentionned hairdressers.

Micheal has renovated the area behind the shop for his own private living space and it is now an impressive stylish family home. The work he undertook raised the BER, taking it from a G rated to an A rated house which is no mean achievement. There are some grants available which assist in renovating buildings like this, but mostly the resident must bear the cost.

It seems to me that this is a wonderful example of how the charm of an old building can be preserved and yet reach the highest standards of modern living.

In a town like Macroom where accommodation is needed urgently, yet where empty properties are hidden above and behind shop fronts, Micheal has set a wonderful example of how renovation can be achieved in a manner that benefits artists, residents and architecture. The feel good factor associated with beautifully restored rather than destroyed history is palpable when you enter, and remains in the memory when more boring ubiquitous buildings are readily forgotten.

Michael's Art Studio is open to the public on Tuesdays and Saturdays and true to his dream, at those times, he shares his Studio space to help promote local artists and their art.

Unusually and to the great gratitude of the artists and public, he does not charge any commission or other fees to the artists involved. Due to a lack of space he has to limit the display area for visiting artists to approximately six pieces in one of the front windows and another four pieces inside. Each artist is given a full calendar month to display their work.

Micheal's own work which depicts landscapes, portraiture and equine art is much sought after and costs between forty five and fifty nine euros for limited and stamped edition prints, with originals costing upwards from four hundred. His work reflects his love for local scenes as well as retaining the shop front in a style as close to the original as possible.

Micheal's enthusiasm for promoting local artists has been very well-received and he is always on the look out for more local artists. He is acutely aware that there are many varied and talented artists around Macroom and he is interested in promoting them all. This selfless sharing brings a much needed service for the town of Macroom which previously enjoyed the availability of other galleries which no longer exist. Particularly now that pedestrianisation is on the cards, people will relish the opportunity to wander into his studio to purchase a piece of art as a unique present, or as a much loved gift for themselves. All of this can start with a look at the monthly changing window display.

The work on display in the right hand window has already included rural scenes by Bernice Corcoran, and a picture of the Gearagh in watercolours by Noran Lehane. Demelza Nowell has produced watercolours of landscape, myth and folklore. Ann Mechelinck has shown her circular weaving here, James Driscoll did mainly photography of local scenes. Liam Forde specialised in portraits and landscape, and John Flynn, under the influence of folklore, produced imaginative work on the stones of Ireland. Una Keating created landscapes in felting and Siobhan Duggan produced oils and watercolours of the local area. Katie Buttimer reflected local scenes in oil, acrylic and watercolour. Both Inga J. Luse and Annette Connolly brought us abstract work using acrylics.

If you have missed some of these amazing artists you may be able to find their work online, but it would be better still to study, in person, the achievements of an artist in the window of 41 Main Street, especially on a Tuesday or Saturday when you are also warmly welcomed inside Micheal's studio. For those of you who are not familiar with Micheal O' Muirthile, the following information should be of particular interest whilst for others it will bring back fond memories of past art experiences around Cork. Before Micheal chose to live in Macroom, he lived in Ballytrasna for about thirty years. Prior to that he lived in the Blackrock area, and before that in the old Marsh area of Cork city. Remembered by his National school peers as a 'doodler', he was about 17 when he was commissioned to do a crest for a clay pigeon organisation.

Later in the 1970s, he went on to do a series of portraits commissioned in relation to the Irish Language. In the 1980s he got involved with Community Arts with a company called 'CAFE' (Creative Arts for Everyone) which fostered networking and linking with Community Organisations e.g The Triskel which went on to produce 'OPEN ART SURGERY' in the early 1990s which highlighted the fact that there was a tunnel coming to the Mahon Peninsula. The 'No.2 BUS PROJECT' highlighted what was seen and unseen from the bus and murals were done with the GAA and Youth Development Projects. Around the 1980s Micheal became an art teacher with the 'Circle of Friends' art group in Canovee. About the same time, he won the Munster MOYGLARE award three times in a row, finally winning the National prize for depicting race-horses in action. The Cork Civic Trust awarded him a prize for scenes of Cork city. His own favourite was an oil painting of a folly on Ben Dunne's property in Mahon. Micheal won the PURCELL Award in Kerry about five years ago for an oil painting of a peaceful cottage near Killarney, a copy of which I am proud to own. Micheal's work has appeared in the quarterly 'Little Gems' magazine, 'Cork and County Living', and 'Ireland's Heart', which shows a picture of Thoor Ballylee castle in Gort

The painting of Thoor Ballylee was commissioned by the last child to leave the Blasket Islands, whose name is Gearoid O'Cathain. When Gearoid launched his book, 'The Loneliest Boy in the World', that picture was included because Gearoid was aware that President Michael D Higgins was a poet with an enduring interest in W.B.Yeats and that his book was being presented to the President.

Micheal's original painting of Thoor Ballylee now proudly hangs in Aras an Uachtarain, a fitting tribute to a man who has given so much to so many.

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
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

Aghabullogue hurlers were relegated to Intermediate A status for next season after losing a tough relegation play-off replay at Glantane. With so much at stake, both sides went at it real hard, plenty of yellow cards dished out by a busy referee, but Kilworth prevailed in a marvellous second half that had nine minutes of injury time.

Kilworth opened the scoring with a fine point, but they were rocked a minute later when a move involving Colm Gillespie and James Foley set up Luke Casey for a smashing Aghabullogue goal and it set the tone for the rest of a cracking contest.

Points soon had the winners level but with John Corkery, Gillespie and Shane Tarrant on song, Aghabullogue were well up for it as they led 1-3 to 0-3 after the opening quarter.

Aghabullogue, playing with the strong wind, had points from Cian Furey, two from Bradley, and one from Daniel Dinneen put them 1-7 to 0-5 clear at the break.

The second half produced real full-blooded championship engagement with both sides giving their all in pursuit of salvation. Two points for Kilworth had them motoring, 1-7 to 0-7 on 35, Aghabullogue replied with a point from Mathew Bradley, but in the 38th minute a Kilworth sideline cut was flicked to the net and a point followed a minute later to level the scores, 1-8 apiece. Kilworth went in front, Daniel Dineen levelled for the Muskerry men, all square on 46. Again Kilworth went a point up, again Aghabullogue levelled through Mathew Bradley from a free. Two points in guick succession saw Kilworth go clear and they struck for their second goal in the 51st minute to make it 2-12 to 1-10 and Aghabullogue may have been in trouble now but they were up for the challenge.

An Aghabullogue point from Mathew Bradley was matched by one for Kilworth, and in the 58th minute Bradley again pointed for the Mid Cork men. With the clock on 60 minutes, a goal from Daniel Dineen had Aghabullogue to within a point of their opponents, 2-13 to 2-12 now, but Kilworth hit back instantly with a third goal at the other end to regain control. John Corkery had an Aghabullogue point which was answered to maintain the four point advantage for the North Cork side and it was Kilworth who prevailed and they will be competing in Premier Intermediate again next season.

A superb third quarter display from Fr O'Neill's which turned a five point deficit into a two point lead was the major factor in the victory of the East Cork side in the Cork County Junior B Hurling Championship final played under lights at a wet Páirc Uí Rinn. In an exciting final quarter, Aghabullogue fought back hard but could not undo the damage done earlier and were three points adrift at the finish.

The first half exchanges were tame and the teams managed to share only two points between them, tellingly Aghabullogue hit seven wides in the same period. Fr O'Neill's then went in front and the sides proceeded to share the next four points evenly between them, Aodhán Healy on target for Aghabullogue from frees. A further two frees from Healy eased Aghabullogue into a 0-5 to 0-4 lead and then Niall Barry Murphy struck over another point to put his side three clear.

Aghabullogue now led by two, the biggest gap so far between the teams, and the Mid Cork champions extended that to three with Healy's fifth free, 0-7 to 0-4, before the half-time break.

Fr O'Neill's scored first on the restart but within three minutes, Aghabullogue scored three more points to increase their lead to five points, two from Aodhán Healy frees and one from Daniel Dineen from play.

The Aghabullogue dominance was quickly ended. Fr O'Neill's fought back, 0-10 to 0-6 on 35, followed by points on 40, 43 and 45 to cut the gap to a single point, 0-10 for Aghabullogue, 0-9 for Fr O'Neill's and within a minute, the East Cork side's star performer, young Tadgh O'Donoghue Brosnan, scored a wonder goal to put his side two points clear. Aohdán Healy pointed a free to reduce the deficit to the minimum, Fr O'Neill's matched this and then scored another to go there clear, 1-11 to 0-11 on 49.

Three times in the final ten minutes Aghabullogue scored to reduce the deficit to two points, Aodhán Healy, Odhran O'Connell and Aodhán again, each time Fr O'Neill's hit back to maintain the three point gap and that was the difference between the teams at the finish.



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
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


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CLONTURK PARK RE-VISITED AND THAT FOOTBALL FINAL OF 1891

It was Tim O'Connor who first put the thought into my head as we chatted about the history of Clondrohid GAA Club and their saga with the All Ireland Senior Football championship of 1891.

"Did you ever travel to Clonturk Park the venue for the Final against Young Irelands of Dublin? " he gueried adding that he had made the visit and that the venue is situated in Drumcondra a mere 15 minutes walk from Croke Park. My curiosity was aroused and I decided immediately to make the trip. Arriving in O'Connell Street Dublin I boarded the bus for the Airport from which I disembarked at Fagan's Pub (a venue well known to Bertie Ahern and his many faithful colleagues) on Richmond Road Drumcondra. Crossing the road to the nearby Tesco Supermarket there it was Clonturk Park. It was the venue for the All Ireland Hurling and Football Finals of 1890, 91 and 92 and also the All Ireland Hurling Final of 1894.

The playing pitch at Clonturk Park is still in pretty good condition. It measures 150 yards by 80 yards approx. and apparently has changed very little since the Final of 1891. It was a marvellous feeling to walk across the green sod of this hallowed ground where our forefathers had played an All Ireland Final 130 years ago. It is now the home of Drumcondra AFC and is used for underage training and games.

Tolka Park, just across the road, was also used by Drumcondra during their halcyon period in the 1960's in the League of Ireland series. Tolka Park is currently the home ground of the current League of Ireland champions Shelbourne.

On the 23rd March 2024 the GAA unveiled a commemorative plaque at Clonturk Park to mark the staging of the seven All Ireland Finals played at the venue. The ceremony was performed by Daithi De Roiste Lord Mayor of Dublin and Jarlath Burns President of the GAA.

On the 10th September 1891 the first GAA Athletics meeting was held at the nearby Jones Road venue now known as Croke Park. The first official GAA game was played at Jones Road on 21st March 1896 while the All Ireland Finals have been played there since 1913.

Back to the year 1891, the records tell us that Cork were the Munster Football champion, Dublin the Leinster champions, Cavan the Ulster champions while the Connacht championship was not completed. The 1891 All Ireland Senior Football

championship was the 5th staging of Ireland's Premier Gaelic Football knockout competition. From 1887 to 1891 the Club county champions were the representatives in the Inter County series. The County winners on record show the following Cavan: Slashers. Cork: Clondrohid, Dublin: Young Irelands, Kerry: Ballymacelligott, Kildare: Mountrice Blunts and Waterford: Dungarvan. In the Cork County championship of 1891 Clondrohid defeated Nils 3-6 to 0-2 in the Final at Cloghroe with many complaints by the Nils over the pitch size prior to the game. The Munster Semi Final saw them get the better of Ballymacelligott at Killarney by 2-5 to 0-2. In the Final at Youghal they overcame Dungarvan 3-2 to 1-1. Interestingly, for those games, the Clondrohid team and supporters would have travelled by train from the nearby Millstreet and Macroom stations.

The concluding stages of the All Ireland Hurling and Football competitions were initially fixed for 21st February 1892 but these games were postponed by a week due to a heavy snowfall. The Final day arrangements were as follows: Football Semi Final -11am Dublin: (Young Irelands) V Cavan: (Slashers), (2) Hurling Final -12.15pm: Kerry (Ballyduff) V Wexford (Crossbeg) and (3) Football Final -1.30pm: Cork (Clondrohid) V Winners of Semi Final. Clondrohid were the only team to go the All Ireland


Final not knowing who their opponents would be

as Dublin had first to play the Ulster champions. Dublin duly won that encounter but the Hurling Final went to extra time and the Football final did not commence until after 3pm. The game was clouded in controversy from the start. The appointed referee failed to turn up and the substitute referee J T Whelan, a Dublin man, took charge. After a game full of incidents, the score at the final whistle was Clondrohid 2-9 Young Irelands 2-1. At 7.20pm that evening, as the Clondrohid team and supporters were about to board their train, came the news that Mr Whelan had disallowed the first Clondrohid goal leaving the Dublin team as victors. Remember, at that time, a goal exceeded any number of points.

Clondrohid immediately lodged an objection. After much discussion at County Board and Central Council it was decided that the game should be replayed. It was finally arranged for Thurles on the 2nd Sunday of April 1893. Neither team put in an appearance at Thurles and the records list Dublin as the All Ireland champions of 1891.

Included on the team panel of 1891 were: Con O'Leary (Capt) Lackaneen, Dan Kelleher (Vice Capt) Moulnahorna, Denis O' Leary (goalie) Lackaneen, Jack O'Leary Lackaneen, Corney Duggan Glantane, Jack Duggan Glantane, Jack Kelleher Moulahorna, Mick Kelleher Moulahorna, Con Kelleher Ardeen, Jeremiah Ahern Munifluigh, Dan Duggan Glantane, John Murphy Schranard, Timothy O'Shea Carriganima, Timothy O'Riordan Gurranecarney, Denis O'Sullivan Carriganima, Andy Desmond Coolacoosane, Pat Desmond Coolacoosane, Michael Quill Moulahorna, Jer Kelleher Moulahorna, Denis Corcoran Kilvoultra and Reddie Walsh Carriganima. The team Manager and Board delegate was Tim Creedon and the team trained at the football field on Tim Creedon's land at Gortavranner.

Interesting Finale: The Dublin young Ireland's team were based in Guiness Brewery. In conjunction with a local festival in Clondrohid 100 years later on 25th July 1993 a team from Guinness Brewery graciously accepted an invitation to partake in a mock replay of the Final. Both teams togged out in their County colours and on this occasion the Clondrohid boys were victorious on a scoreline of 1-18 to 0-10. Referee Paul Kingston had no reservations about the Clondrohid goal and declared them the worthy winners





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
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LEE VALLEY OUTLOOK



"The words of the righteous are a life-giving fountain; the words of the wicked conceal violent intentions" (Proverbs 10:11).

Welcome back dear student, here we are post-election and facing the close out of the year. Already lots of people are burnt out and the Christmas partying hasn't even begun. There used to be an advert for tea awhile back, with the parting shot that certain people are "all talk". It was funny because it's true. We have been listening to much talk, analysis, promises and fluster. We sure love to talk - often, just for the sake of saying something. Then there are the few who say little - when they talk it's worth listening to. "The wise say very little and those with understanding stay calm. Even fools seem to be wise if they keep quiet, if they don't speak they appear to understand" (Proverbs 17:27-28). Last week we spoke on the danger of unforgiveness and offence, and a major factor in all strife is - talk! Our enemy the devil is very talkative - constantly whispering evil trying to influence individuals to turn from God and do bad things. But we do not have to listen or pay heed to him! In fact, believers have authority over what we choose to listen to. Sadly, people don't know this and give in to the lies of the devil believing him. We see bad things happening and wonder how people could do such wickedness or behave so horribly - they are under the control of who they are listening to and engaging with. If it's not God's voice, they're in trouble. Porn, violence, rape, gossip, slander, and all kinds of evil are being pumped out of devices daily, and foolish people who engage and listen think there's no harm in any of it. No friend, we must set a guard over our eyes and ear gates for that is what they are - gateways (Matthew 6:22-23; Mark 4:24-25). Any farmer who does not have secure gates is asking for trouble right? In the same way we need strong boundaries and godly principles otherwise anything can happen.

There is a demon called Leviathan, one of the hordes of hell who attacks people's conversations specifically to disrupt relationships: marriages, workplaces, and friends. Folks often wonder why something they are trying to say is misheard or misunderstood by those they are sharing it with, causing offence. It's the effect of Leviathan. The Lord calls him the 'king over all the sons of pride' (Job 41:31-34). Pride is sin to God - it was the reason Satan got booted out of heaven (Isaiah 14:12-20; Ezekiel 28:12-19). He was in rebellion to God, and figured he could do a better job than the Lord. He managed to convince other angels to join him. Sin cannot dwell in God's Presence and so Lucifer (that was the devil's name in heaven) and those who sided with him were thrown out. Those other angels became what we know as demons. They are agents of Satan's army with specific orders to attack and bring chaos to the earth, destroying families, communities, and nations. When Jesus sent out His disciples to heal the sick they came back rejoicing at what they had discovered. "... even the demons are subject to us in Your Name!" (Luke 10:17).

Everywhere Jesus went He took authority over Satan - He cast out demons with 'a Word' (Matthew 8:16). He gave them no opportunity to speak, because that's what the devil does best - mouthing off proud, lofty words that cause chaos and fear. But we have the authority that Jesus paid for with His Blood (Luke 10:18-20). Lord, may we must use and choose our words wisely in agreement with God's Word to see deliverance and restoration.

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
