

Former Macroom Guide Mary H O'Connor has been appointed IGG's Southwest Regional Commissioner Mary has recently been elected as Regional Commissioner for the Southwest Region of Irish Girl Guides, an area that covers Cork, Kerry, and West Waterford.

Mary is currently a Guide Leader in Boherbue and spent a number of years also as a Senior Branch and Ladybird Leader in the Boherbue Units. She was Area Commissioner for the Blackwater Area prior to her election as Regional Commissioner. Mary has previously been a Guide Leader and District Commissioner in Tralee and served two terms of office representing the Southwest Region on the national Guide Branch committee.

A member of Guiding in Macroom for many years, Mary achieved the highest award in Guiding – the Gold Cord Award and as a member of MacEgan Rangers completed all three Gaisce – The President's Award, Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards.

In 1988 Mary was selected as a Ranger of the IGG team as well as Deirdre Keenan from MacEgan Rangers to attend Eurofolk in Italy; in 1989 she was selected as part of the IGG team that sailed on the "Queen Gadrielle" Sail Training ship from Dublin to Glasgow and in 1994, Mary was again selected as IGG member of the youth delegation to the World Conference in Denmark. "I was honoured and delighted to be a member of this team and gained great experience from this trip," said Mary. In 2019, Mary travelled to Our Chalet with Macroom and Boherbue Guides as a member of the Guide Leadership Team and acted as M.O. for this event. "A group of 30 travelled and we took part in the "Action on Body Confidence" programme. Another wonderful experience" says Mary.

Mary is an avid outdoor Leader and camper, has attended the three IGG international camps in Ireland and will be taking a group to next year's international camp in Kildare. Mary has also been Joint Camp Chief for two regional camps in the past few years.

Mary - Greatest Memory, it is difficult to pick out just one. Camping in Killarney racecourse, outdoor cook competitions and being picked to go on the Queen Gadrielle Tall Ship training vessel and sailing to Glasgow - This was a great week.

Dara – What is the importance of being involved regionally for your women in Guiding?

Mary - It is very important for the younger members to be involved Regionally. It is their Region, as well and they need to shape it the way that they want it to be. It must be a combination of experience and youth, working together will make for a bright, dynamic region.

Dara – What is your favourite thing about our Region? **Mary** - We have a great region. We have big numbers of both girls and Leaders. We have a big geographical spread also which brings variety. My favourite thing about the Region is the girl's spirit, from Ladybird to Senior Branch. This was proven to me at Regional Camp last July when they persisted in the pouring rain for 3 days to make the camp a success. They truly lived up to the Guide law - A Guide sings and smiles under all difficulties.



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Macroom Credit Union reaffirms commitment to local community with relaunch of Coachford branch

Macroom Credit Union officially celebrated the relaunch of its refurbished Coachford branch on Friday, 17th January, marking a significant step in its ongoing commitment to serving the local community with enhanced facilities and services.

The event featured a ribbon-cutting ceremony led by local sports star, Emma Flanagan, who played on Cork's All-Ireland winning senior camogie team, as well as for Aghabullogue; drawing members, neighbours and community leaders together for the special occasion. The upgraded Coachford branch boasts enhanced facilities and services, and now features a dedicated meeting room for private consultations with loan officers and advisors, ensuring members can access personalised service in a modern, welcoming space.

The branch has also introduced extended hours, providing greater flexibility for its members. It will now open from 9.30am - 4.00pm every Friday, as well as retaining its existing Thursday opening hours from 4pm - 7pm. These extended hours will allow members to access a full suite of services, including personal loans, car loans, and cultivate farm finance; as well as mortgages, member current accounts, and debit cards. Members also have 24/7 banking access through the Macroom Credit Union mobile app.

As part of the relaunch, Macroom Credit Union presented €500 to each of the three local primary schools, Aghabullogue, Coachford, and Rylane, demonstrating its continued dedication to supporting the local community.

BT Young Scientist and Technology Exhibition 2025 4th year students Finn Yore and Simon Condon recently participated in the final of the BT Young Scientist and Technology Exhibition in Dublin. Their project was titled 'What makes a rocket fly straight? An investigation into the effect of stabilisation on the flight path of a model rocket'. Their project was presented in the Chemical, Physical and Mathematical Sciences category and it gathered huge interest from everyone at the exhibition.

The boys had a great few days in the RDS presenting their project to the judges and the general public. They also had some free time to explore the exhibition, conducting interviews for companies like Explorium Ireland and making friends with like-minded students from all over the country.

All their hard work paid off as they were awarded a Highly Commended Award for their project. This award signifies that the exhibit was strongly considered for a main award in their category. They have been encouraged to build on their project and consider entering again next year.

This is an amazing achievement that truly highlights the incredibly hard work that Simon and Finn put in over the last few months with fantastic guidance and support from their teacher Ms Shannon Walsh.

These two young men can be immensely proud of their achievement and we look forward to seeing what these future engineers may achieve next. BT Young Scientist De La Salle, Interview with Finn Yore and Simon Condon

1. Why did you pick your topic?

We both have an interest in engineering, and both find aeronautical engineering fascinating. Since primary school we always wanted to build a model rocket, and this would be a step in the direction of pursuing a career in engineering and possibly in the field of aeronautics.

2. What makes your project special enough to make it through to the competition?

We put a lot of time and effort into the one-page proposal and out of 8 groups in the school, we were the only ones who officially got through. We feel that this project is unique as on the BT Young Scientist website, there had never been a project like this done before.

3. What area of science does your project specialize in?

Our project is under the heading "Chemical, Physical and Mathematical sciences"

4. How does BT young scientist encourage teenagers to engage in sciences?

We feel the BT young scientist's competition helps to encourage young people to express their creativity and also attain an interest in all science and technology topics by allowing them to create a project of their choice.

5. How do you think your project will compare to your competitors?

We hope to make it to the final but compared to the

projects we've seen from previous years we know it will be a tough competition.

6. What real-world problem does your project aim to address?

We hope that it will teach us the importance of wings on rockets and help prevent rocket related accidents in the future.

7. What challenges did you face during your research or project development and how did you overcome them?

At first, we planned on using potassium nitrate to fuel the rocket, but the school did not have any on hand and would take too long for it to arrive if we were to order some so, we used model rocket motors as an alternative.

8. What makes it unique or innovative?

To enter the BT young scientist competition, you must submit a project that has not been done in the past. Each year tens of unique projects make it to the final of this contest, and we feel ours is no different.

School Outing



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

As part of the day they learned about the story of chocolate and how it is sourced sustainably. They were then given an opportunity to make and decorate chocolate crafts from the chocolate which is manufactured on the farm itself. This was followed by a tour of the farm where they explored the facilities, went to the pet farm section in the evening and had fun in the playground. Theresa Leahy, owner of Leahy's farm gave a detailed presentation and students learned a lot about the start-up of a business, how to do costing, market research, interview processes and training. Tidy Towns minearce So care to cheine

Macroom Tidy Towns has taken a lead role in helping protect and improve our Environment and promoting biodiversity in recent years and as we start a New Year in 2025 it is important to realise that everybody has a part to play. This week's article hopefully will help also. Some ideas that can help in protecting the Environment can include;

Use of refillable water bottles and coffee cups, buy second hand clothing and consider hiring clothing, only buy what you need and use what you buy. Buy loose fruit and vegetables and avoid items that are heavily packaged, sign up to paperless billing or banking, buy products with refillable packaging and if you are able to, try home composting your food waste. Over recent years we have encouraged people to learn more about Biodiversity, Sustainability and Pollinators. Beside the Fairy Garden we have developed a biodiversity garden with loads of information on signs and display Boards relation to trees and also Pollinators.

Pollinators are needed for Life Cycle, Ecosystem Survival, Diversity of Animals, Diversity of Plants, Climate Regulation, Stable Soil, Reduced Flood Risk and Human Health. Some pollinator friendly flowers include Clovers, Vetches and Daisies. Pollination can happen through Self Pollination, Cross Pollination, Water Pollination, Wind Pollination and Animal Pollination.

199,000 species of Invertebrates contribute to pollination Some examples include Bee, Butterfly, Moth, Wasp, Ant, Fly and Bat. Also 1000 species of Vertebrates contribute to pollination, the likes of Birds and Deer.

Pollinators provide pollination services to over

180,000 different plant species and more then 1200 crops. Of the different crops that provide 90% of the food supply, 71% of the crops are pollinated by bees. They are 101 species of bees in Ireland. Over 920 bird species pollinate plants.

On February 1st the Tidy Towns, Fairy Garden and the Men's Shed will have stands at 'Meet the Clubs Day which is taking place from 12-3pm in the Leisure Centre in the Castle Grounds. This is organised by the Lions Club and we are looking forward to seeing ye all on the day.

Over the last few weeks volunteers have been busy taken down Christmas Lights around town, Litter picking, general maintenance around town and in the Fairy Garden.





CARRIGANIMA'S CONNECTION TO ART O'LEARY

Art O Leary was riding his chestnut mare something he loved on the evening of May 4th 1773. Just outside Carriganima he was ambushed, and shot down, at the young age of 26, by a group of soldiers led by the local magistrate. A local Carriganima woman tended to Art by placing her shawl over him. His chestnut mare bolted for home in Raleigh, with blood on his flanks to alert his wife Eibhlin Dubh Ni Chonaill. It has been said that he was waked that night in Carriganima.

Arts only crime was, that he owned a horse exceeding £5 in value, this was against the Penal Laws of the time. As a catholic it has often been said that Art and Eibhlin sowed the seeds for Irish Freedom, for generations to come in the Muskerry Gaelteacht. Carriganima today is a lovely village with a beautiful church and I have admired the beautiful crib in the church. Well done to everyone involved.



Kilmurry is a rural Roman Catholic Parish in the Diocese of Cork and Ross. It spans both sides of the main Cork-Killarney road for about 10 Km between Ballincollig and Macroom. It includes the villages of Farnanes, Aherla, Cloughduv, Crookstown, Lissarda, Canovee and Kilmurry, four schools, three GAA clubs and approximately 3,000 parishioners and is also one of the largest parishes in the Dioceses of Cork & Ross. Ireland has a very strong missionary tradition, and since the 1800s, many Irish missionaries have been travelling to all parts of the globe, spreading the Gospel message of love and working to improve the quality of life of those most in need. This is an attempt to record a little of the lives of almost 100 Missionaries, from the Parish of Kilmurry, ordinary Irish men and women who lived and worked far from home, giving the very best of the values that had been instilled in them from their childhood, to foreign communities in far off lands.

The filmmaker James Creedon, a journalist based in Paris, who works for "France 24", and spent a year recording the memories of the late Sr. Paschal O'Sullivan from Cloughduv, said at a screening of the documentary he had made on her life "It struck me that there had been so many others like her, forgotten in the mists of time, who had been such marvelous ambassadors for our country. She also made me question the values that have been left to one side with the implosion of the Catholic Church's influence. A vacuum has now emerged in its place, society now encourages young people to seek wealth and success and the focus, is on self-interest and entertainment." The documentary is entitled 'Thanks to Your Noble Shadow'

In 2002 my daughter, Siobhan did a project in Primary School under the guidance of her teacher Rita O'Brien, the title of the project was "The Missionaries of Kilmurry Parish" In it, she collected much information on many Missionaries, Priests, Sisters, Brothers and Lay people who served as Missionaries both at home in Ireland and in far off lands. In fact these Kilmurry people ministered in many parts world, China, Japan, Australia, Tasmania, South America, India, South Africa and many other countries. When Lockdown began to bite, I pulled out the project, dusted it off and cleared away the cobwebs and attempted to update it. Unfortunately for me some of the key people who were instrumental in providing information for the original, had by now passed away. Mrs. Kathleen Murphy, Nora O'Leary, Kathy Quinlan and many others who between them supplied long lists of names and much information. I have by now almost one hundred names, and many fascinating stories of people like, Sr. Pascal O'Sullivan from Cloughduv

Sr. Pascal O'Sullivan remembered shots being fired through the school windows in Cloughduv School during the Civil War and later as a teaching Sister being interred by the Japanese during the Second World War. She was to go on and teach English in Tokyo for the next 63 years; in fact she spent seventy five years of her life in Japan, and her School, the Denenchofu Futaba was to become one of Japan's most prestigious girls' schools.

Another parishioner, Sr. Kathleen O'Sullivan from Oldfort was a Medical Doctor working in Africa: she worked in Uganda, and Kenya, and was awarded a Gold Medal by UCC in acknowledgement of her outstanding medical contribution to the people of the slums of Kilbera, Nairobi. For 25 years she worked in the Order's hospital at Nsambya, in the Ugandan Capital of Kampala. During that time the city changed hands violently three times as successive Dictators overthrew their rivals. In one of these episodes the rival armies shot at one another for four days through the hospital grounds, while the Sisters operated on, and tended the wounded from both sides.

Another parishioner, Jeremiah Joseph Doyle was born in 1849 and was ordained in 1874 for the Diocese of Armidale in Australia and after an eventful sea voyage (he was shipwrecked in the Bay of Biscay) he arrived in Sydney in November 1874. He was later to become the first Bishop of Lismore, New South Wales in 1887. As a public figure Bishop Doyle's contribution to the Lismore community was extraordinary. Renowned for his organizational abilities he promoted the development of a water and gas supply in Lismore, helped establish a municipal government in the town, campaigned for the extension of the railway line, personally organized the installation of the telephone exchange, the establishment of Lismore Base Hospital, the School of Arts, the Agricultural Society and the acquisition of the reserve at Rocky Creek to ensure Lismore's future water supply. He gave evidence to Parliament three times on vital Public Works and economic development issues.

Michael Murphy was born in 1911 at Shandangan near Lissarda and was ordained in 1936. Four years later he and three other Missionaries of the Sacred Heart (MSC) went to Papua New Guinea to minister to the people there. He spent the next two years working in local villages, celebrating Mass, hearing confessions, baptising children, and being with the people, who came to know him as "Fr. Mike". In June 1942, at the invitation of the Japanese Army, he travelled to source more medicine for his community. He was never to return. On September 11th of that year, Fr. Michael, greatly weakened by malnutrition, sickness, and months of captivity, was executed by the Japanese and buried on an uninhabited island.

Sr. Marian O'Sullivan was born in Canovee in 1932 and joined the Dominicans in 1951. In 1953 she went as a teacher to South Africa, and the school she taught in was attended by many Catholic Children, but like all other Catholic schools worldwide, it was open to all faiths and none, therefore it comes as no surprise that about fifty percent of her pupils were Protestants. At this time South Africa as a country, had White Schools for the White privileged children, Black Schools for the native children and Coloured Schools for mixed race children. In this present time when we hear a lot about racism, it is worth noting that in 1972, Sr. Marian was appointed to a school in Pretoria, teaching in what had been once a Dutch colony, here she broke the rules in order to educate both coloured and white students during the apartheid struggle. It became national and international news.

These stories are but a snapshot of their lives, and the lives of almost one hundred other forgotten heroes. If anyone reading this has any information on any Missionaries from the Parish of Kilmurry, Lay or Clerical, I would love to hear from you.

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


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Liscarrigane

Its Culture, Composers, Connections and Characters

"Liscarriaane mv childhood home. alas 'tis far away Tho' wet and dirty was the bog and cold and bleak the ray Yet the little stream that crept along from Gloundav's lonesome Glen Made sweeter music in my ears that I ever heard since then".

That is the first verse of a poem written by Margaret O'Leary sister of An tÁthair Peadar while living in Boston at the age of 84.

The townland of Liscarrigane is situated at the Western end of the Parish of Clondrohid. It is an integral part of Gáeltacht Muscraí and over the centuries has been the home of many outstanding people. Indeed, over a hundred years ago many a football match was played on the banks of Dan Sullivan's Inch.

The area is rich in the very best of Irish culture including writers, poets, musicians, athletes and much more. This article just includes a random selection of them. Liscarrigane Cross was the home of Michael Twomey alias "George Curtin" one of the finest poets of his time in the earliest years of the 20th Century. Jerry Creedon was his neighbour known as "Creedon the Runner". He was a member of the Irish team that came 2nd in the first ever World Cross Country Race in Glasgow in 1903. In 1905, Curtin and Creedon were planning to build a City in nearby Ullanes with streets, hotels and skyscrapers such as were going up in New York at the time. In 1906, however, Creedon emigrated.

A song by George a farewell to "Creedon the Runner" written in persona poem style takes in the entire neighbourhood

"Goodbye Johnny Sheain our conversing is done no more will we speak of our City

Never more will we speak of the wrongs of our Isle Never more will I enter the field for a mile

Or dance on the Hills of Erin's Green Isle where I met comrades lighthearted and witty".

On the Northern side of Liscarrigane Cross was the home of Johnny Twomey and his wife Mary. Retired farmers they had moved from Lisbue Mór Kilnamartyra and it was the meeting place or scoraichting house for the people of the area on the long Winter nights and many a good story or yarn was spun around that friendly fireside in the 1950's and 60's. Indeed it was also a great place for house dances with the music supplied by local musician Con Walsh.

A short distance away was the homestead of the O'Leary family. That household's favourite son was An tÁthair Peadar O'Láoghaire. He was born in April 1839 and today he is regarded as one of the founders of modern Irish literature. He grew up speaking Munster Irish in the Muscraí Gáeltacht. He attended Mavnooth College and was ordained a priest in 1867. He became a Parish Priest in Castlelyons in 1891 and it was there he wrote his most famous Irish story Séadhna and told it as a fireside story to three little girls. Well known for his support of "Caint Na nDáoine" he preferred the real Irish of the people. This he relates as follows in his Autobiography Mo Scéal Féin which has since been translated to English. Before I left Liscarrigane I had never heard such phrases as "Tá Mé", Bhí Mé, Bhí Síad". I always used to hear Táim, Bhíos, Bhíodar etc. An tÁthair Peadar died in Castlelyons in 1920. Over the years many commerative events have been held in his honour at Liscarrigane. One hundred years later in 2020 Séamus O'Láoghaire, with the help of a local committee, published an excellent book "Ár Scéal Féin, Ó Charraig An Ime Go Dí Caislean Ui Líathain" to mark his anniversary.

In the Northern side of the townland lived a number of Murphy families. These included "The Foxy Murphys" with three boys named Johnny, Dan and Patsy. The family moved to the Blarney area near Cork City and Johnny recalls that one of his first enterprises there was delivering milk by pony and cart in the Northern side of the city. They also got involved in the taxi service. All were great musicians and founded the very popular Blarney Céile Band in the 1950's. Dan Murphy's grandson Shane Barrett was Centre Forward on the Cork Senior hurling team last year. Shane was playing a starring role in the All Ireland Final before an unpunished intervention curtailed his activities!!!! but sin scéal eile. Also on that Cork team was All Star Wing Back Mark Coleman whose mother Áine Creed, hails from Carrigaphooka. For good measure on the Cork winning Camogie team last year we had Maeve Ring whose grandfather Jim came from Ardeen.

Jack Murphy was a next door neighbour of the aforementioned other Murphy family. He had a family of five girls and one son Patrick J born in 1912 and fondly known as "Paddy Jack" Little is known of his sisters Helen born in 1909 and Bridget born in 1917. Julia was born in 1910 and emigrated to London where she married William Cahill from Tipperary in 1936. Johanna Marie was born in 1914 and also emigrated to London where she married Norman D Ettridge from Enfield Middlesex in 1945. Hanora was born in 1916, later moved to London, where she married Richard Caton from Bermondshy in 1958.

All attended Carriganima National School four miles

distant. However, they often swopped the dusty roads sandv to make the trip to school through the fields which was a much shorter journey. This entailed crossing the immediate valley and upwards through Curraleigh downhill from and there through Gortnagishaugh and over the footbridge of

the river Foherish to reach the Schoolhouse.

Paddy remained at home on the farm amongst his many friends and neighbours. In those days the saving of turf was an annual part of life and Paddy excelled at cutting the sods with the Sleán and also turning and footing the turf. He played card games at the nearby Tim Shea's formerly the home of the O'Láoghaire family and attended many house dances in that area so rich in musical culture. He was also an intellegent card player excelling at the games of 35 and Poker. He was a wonderful Draughts player where his guick mind would sweep you off the board in the twinkling of an eye. He was a man of deep religious faith making the annual bus trip to Knock Shrine and also travelled to see Pope John Paul at Limerick Racecourse in 1979. With his trusty bicycle he travelled to Ballyvourney, Clondrohid and Macroom and all the surrounding areas. He paid frequent visits, travelling by bus, to Blarney to catch up with his former Murphy neighbours. Also residing nearby was another musician Donal Ring and Paddy got ample time to practise his dancing steps on those trips. In later years he attended the many Christmas parties in Clondrohid and Ballymakeera where he was always on the floor for the jig sets, two steps and waltzes.

Both of his nieces Angela and Pat together with his nephew Dough and wife Jen have made frequent visits to Liscarrigane. Actually, Angela, Doug and Jen continue to enjoy an annual trip to Cork staying at Findus House Kilnamartyra and visit lots of relatives in the area.



(N Pádraig win 3-1 on penalties after extra time) After 80 minutes of football and a penalty shootout, Kilmurry's great run in the championship came to an end at Parnell Park in heart breaking circumstances. Kilmurry, Cork and Munster champions, looked to be the better side for a long time and were in a commanding position as the game entered extratime, but a late penalty scored by Naomh Pádraig earned a reprieve and a one point lead and Kilmurry did well to get an equaliser before the final whistle. The awarding of that penalty will be a matter for debate whenever this final is spoken of as Kilmurry contend that the foul was committed outside the area, the referee thought so also but his umpires were adamant that the offence was inside the box and the referee took their advice.

In the penalty shoot-out the Ulster champions were decisive winners and scored three of their first four kicks against only one converted for Kilmurry, ending the game without the necessity of the fifth scheduled penalty for either side. Conor Kelleher was the only Kilmurry player to score from the spot.

Kevin Doherty opened the scoring for the Donegal side with a free, Kilmurry quickly responded through Liam Wall's free, but Doherty restored Naomh Pádraig's lead. Kilmurry struck a major blow in the 11th minute when on the right Denis O'Mullane linked up with his brother John, whose pass across the goalmouth was palmed home by Lawrence Aisling giving Kilmurry a 1-1 to 0-2 lead. After a scoreless period a long ball in from John O'Mullane in the 20th minute found Lloyd Aisling who sent over but N Padraig's reduced the deficit with a point which was cancelled by another point from a Liam Wall free, 1-3 to 0-3 on 24. In the 29th minute N Pádraig had a point from a free and Kilmurry simultaneously lost a defender to a black card and their half time lead was 1-3 to 0-4.

On the resumption, the Donegal side were level within four minutes and went a point in front in the 37th minute and doubled their advantage to two

points, 0-8 to 1-3 in the 42nd minute. A point apiece from Liam Wall and Denis O'Mullane had Kilmurry on level terms at the three quarter stage and Lawrence Aisling's point on 48 had Kilmurry back in front but they lost a man to another black card and N Pádraig drew level in the 53rd minute, 1-6 to 0-9 the score. A point from Rory Duggan edged Kilmurry in front as the game entered time added but a late 45 yielded an equalising point for the Ulster men and so the game went into extra time, 1-7 to 0-10.

Lloyd Aisling kicked Kilmurry into the lead in extra time, and when Rory Duggan quickly added a fine goal the Muskerry men were flying, leading 2-8 to 0-10. A Naomh Pádraig point was matched by one from Seán O'Leary, another N Pádraig score made it 2-9 to 0-12 at the interval. N Pádraig had a point two minutes into the final half and two minutes from time had their goal from the controversial penalty. Denis O'Mullane did very well to kick an equaliser from a late free, 2-10 to 1-13, and a late, late effort from Lloyd Aisling agonisingly went wide off the upright so the contest was to be decided on penalties.

In March, Seán Kiely of Ballincollig was selected as the first winner of a monthly award for his displays with Ballincollig U 21s (Mid Cork Champions), Cork U 21's, and the UCC Sigerson Cup winning team. Seán later went on to make a massive contribution to Ballincollig footballers in the winning of their first ever senior county championship in October.

The April winner was Fintan Goold of Macroom and Cork who starred with Muskerry footballers when they shocked a very highly rated UCC team in the opening round of the county championship in a game played just two days after the Allianz National League final. Fintan later was outstanding with Muskerry against Duhallow, St Nicks and Ballincollig and with his club.

John O'Callaghan of Inniscarra was the winner of the June award. John was corner back and captain of the Cork Intermediate hurlers who won the Munster and All Ireland titles and has been a stalwart with his club. Micheál Ó Croinín, Cumann Peile Naomh Abán, was winner of the July award in recognition of his outstanding performances with his club in the Premier Intermediate championship. Micheál was a wonderful

player in the Cork jersey for many years and has been the outstanding forward with Naomh Abán for over a decade. His commitment to his club has earned him the respect of all as was evidenced by the reception he received at the Awards ceremony.

Peter Kelleher of Kilmichael is a young hurler from a club not associated in the mind with the code but which has made massive strides in hurling in recent vears and reached the Mid Cork A final this season for the first time ever. Peter's contribution to that historic achievement was recognised by the judging panel by making him the August award winner.

In September Cork won the Camogie All Ireland and Rena Buckley, who plays her club camogie with Inniscarra, made a huge contribution to the win. Rena was thus winning her 5th Camogie All Ireland and later in the month Rena, a member of the Donoughmore club, won another All Ireland with the Cork Ladies Football team to take her medal tally to 14, similar to Briege. Inniscarra also benefited from Rena'a prowess, the club only losing out to All Ireland champions Milford.

In October, Ballincollig stunned the football world by winning the Cork County Senior Football Championship for the very first time. 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


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

Think Globally, Act locally LOSS IN THE GEARAGH (AN ARTIST'S PERSPECTIVE)

Hi! Chris Barrett back with you hoping all is going well for you at the start of 2025.

Regular readers of the Lee Valley Outlook will remember a previous article written (21/03/24), where I reported on a very well-attended talk on the Gearagh given by Kevin Corcoran and Harriet Burgess and hosted by Kilmurry Museum.

In today's article I am speaking with a very good friend of mine, Maria Healy who also shares a passionate interest in the Gearagh.

This interest is reflected in her detailed painstaking dealings with the flooded Gearagh and the locals who lived there.

These she empathetically translates into varied, bespoke and passionate art pieces.

Maria starts our talk by telling me that while doing her research on the human impact on the submerging of the Anahala community to make way for the Lee Valley Hydroelectric scheme which flooded the Gearagh, she felt very privileged to meet some former Gearagh residents.

Their recollections and stories brought the ancient world of the Gearagh to life for her. Now, as she walks there, she has a new added dimension which she would like to share with everyone.

One of these residents was Kathy McCarthy, who had lived there from the age of four till ten years with her grandmother, Mrs Hennigan, who was then subsequently evicted. She had lived across the road from Horgan's shop. Kathy recalled her childish adventures of those times with deep tenderness. She summed up her life back then in one word, idyllic.

Another resident, Neilus O'Mahoney, aged 92 in 2018, had a fantastic recall of the flooding of the Gearagh and its aftermath. He described Horgan's shop as,

'being the centre of their universe, for supplies, local news, passing messages and most importantly having a radio for the GAA matches'

People would gather together to listen there and later discuss the results.

Maria also met Tommy Murphy RIP, with whom she walked, mapping house sites and benefitting from his incredible local and historical knowledge. She tells me how Tommy also spoke of the wonderful dancing and music at the crossroads held there on long sunny Summer evenings.

Kevin Corcoran, known to us for his lifelong love of the Gearagh and his related book, 'Saving Eden', deals with the Future of the Gearagh and its role as an incredible inland water delta home to incredible species. He reminds us that it is a rare case of a surviving primeval forest and this helps to make it such a magical place. Kevin was only a toddler in his grandmother's arms when she and his mother joined other local women and residents in a Chaonineadh (an ancient Irish collective weeping) as they stood on Sleveen Hill watching the water rise to cover everything they had known and loved, forever.

Maria is indebted to each and everyone of the

inhabitants who freely shared such poignant narratives. Without this valuable local knowledge she feels that people would miss out entirely on some of the most fascinating elements of the amazing place which is the Gearagh.

Since settling in the Macroom area, Maria has fallen in love with the Gearagh area and has been intrigued by its historical atmosphere of sublime and absent presence.

She is fascinated by the deeply multi-layered terrain of remains, memories and histories; which take on another reality with the knowledge that much of the area is under a body of water which hides a once loved submerged village.

On attending a Crawford Art college degree course and graduating in 2020, Maria focused on the Gearagh for her final year thesis. In that, she was able to focus on the loss of home, community and heritage. Through the mediums of glass, textiles, ceramics and photography she has sensitively explored these various themes. Sometimes she combines and experiments with several mediums together when required by her creative process.

Maria finds that glass works well as a metaphor for water so she prints her own photographic images and drawings and burns them on to glass in the kiln.

It is as if the water holds the memories frozen in time and space. She uses the idea of 'Mise-En-Abyme', a condition in a work of art where a fragment replicates an entire composition. One of the techniques she has used and explored was 'Pate de Verre', which is fragments of crushed glass, pasted together in a mold and fired in a kiln. This process lends itself very well to her theme of fragmentation and the resulting work is very delicate and almost ephemeral in quality.

When Maria is weaving, she uses threads as a metaphor for connection. In this way she weaves past into present involving colour and texture. With her work, she remakes and rebinds metaphorically, the lost connections and the ties that bind us to our past, our memories of people and places.

I am reminded that it is very rare to obtain images of the Gearagh before the flooding. Maria is constantly on the look-out and was thrilled to come across photos belonging to Rodger O Sullivan taken of his aunt and family in Annahala village and surrounding land (part of the Gearagh area) in the 1930s and 1940s. Not much had changed in the life and culture of the area by the 1950's and these additional old photographs hold a valuable historic starting point.

Maria's current work in telling the story of the Gearagh is focusing on making the past ever present. She is doing this by juxtaposing Rodger's historic images over contemporary images of her own. Using her own photographs as a starting point, she digitally manipulates them to produce a double exposure final image. As always she strives to ensure that the loss of home, community and culture in the Gearagh will not be forgotten and consigned to the history archives. Maria would love to eventually see some sort of digital tag installed on the site of the Gearagh so that by accessing it on a smart phone one would have a page open up which would give any visitor an overview of what actually existed in the whole place before it became the nature reserve it now is. She is already processing some ideas for this and would welcome any further ideas from interested individuals to make this a reality.

Maria spent six months on an Erasmus course in Tartu, the second city of Estonia, in 2018. The experience gave her incredible exposure to different creative ideas, techniques and skills and fostered a new passion for tapestry and weaving which she compares to painting with threads.

She also likes to incorporate the idea of the threads or the ties that bind. These have a particular significance when working with themes of loss and separation. Maria has also incorporated Dutch reeds into a paper pulp to paint onto, sew into, or use in a tapestry to make it site specific and authentic.

She finds that the Gearagh is the gift that keeps on giving in terms of creative inspiration. Seasonal and daily weather changes, along with water level variations lend a variable lens through which to explore.

Some of Maria's earlier inspiration came from the renowned UK Land Artists and sculptors, Richard Long and Andy Goldsworthy. She found their approach and appreciation of the natural world around them very new and innovative. Sometimes their work was of a temporary nature as they had a short window of time and only a photograph would remain of the work produced. But that image became all the more important and poignant because it was a record of what isn't present anymore. So, the memory only survives in an image. This approach resonated with her and her old Gearagh photos. Maria feels there is a massive creative opportunity for local artists to make permanent artworks and sculptures and installations denoting what happened there, using site specific material and installing them in the site of the Gearagh for everyone to enjoy and remember.

Until that happens, readers will be happy but not surprised that they will be able to view a small sample of Maria's work in February 2025 at Micheal O'Muirthile's gallery at 41 Main Street, Macroom.




