



## Why Do I Wake Up With Neck Pain?

Sometimes described as a "crick" or "kink" in the neck, pain on waking in the morning is a common complaint from patients that come into our

The result is not only pain but an overall decrease in the range of motion of the neck. So, how does this happen?

The main cause of neck pain upon waking is poor sleeping position. People who sleep on their stomachs typically have the most issues with their necks. While sleeping on the stomach for 6-8 hours each night the head is rotated to the left or right when laying on the

So, imagine standing or sitting with your head rotated in either direction for up to 8 hours. Another way to develop the "kink" or "crick" is by sleeping on more than one pillow or a pillow that is too large. This

will cause the neck to either be pushed forward or to the side too much where it is not aligned with the rest of the spine resulting in misalignment, muscle pulling and pain.

To have a "crick" or a "kink" is a term used when the bones, (vertebrae) in the neck are severely misaligned and putting pressure on the nerves leading to pain and decreased motion. Some people like to refer to this as a "pinched nerve". The misalignment of the neck will also cause muscle pulling over a period of time that can lead to spasm and inflammation resulting in pain.

How does the "kink" get fixed? As chiropractors we help to treat the problem in the neck with an adjustment. This will allow the bones to be restored to their normal position in the neck which results in reduced nerve pressure. After an adjustment, range of motion

and pain will be improved but inflammation is still taking place. The use of ice for periods of 15-20 minutes at a time will help with decreasing swelling and pain between adjustments.

Be sure to consult a chiropractor after feeling a "kink" or "crick" in the neck and do not allow the injury to try and heal over time.

Even if the pain subsides, the chances for re-exacerbation are high because the nerve pressure still exists.

It's important to remember, painkillers work to numb the pain but never resolve the underlying issue.







### **Kilmurry Active Retirement –**

### Is it Lifestyle or genes?

I was intrigued by an article in the New York Times recently, entitled 'What Matters More for Longevity: Genes or Lifestyle?'

I had heard people, having reached 100, being asked how they managed to be still with us. Many were circumspect, they didn't know, but some would give answers that would not be in accordance with the advice we get on diet, exercise, alcohol or tobacco. I had dismissed their advice, putting it down to the exception to the rule. Decades of research shows that ignoring the advice of our medics negatively affects most people's health. It shortens lives. For example, a study published last year, which analysed the lifestyles of more than 276,000 male and female United States veterans, found that adopting eight healthy behaviours could give up to 24 additional years to people's lives. They included eating a healthy diet, getting regular physical activity, sleeping well, managing stress, having strong relationships, and not smoking, abusing opioids or drinking to excess. Research from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine suggests that making it perhaps as far as ninety is largely down to us and our lifestyle choices. But, interestingly, to get beyond that perhaps you need to be very careful and choose your parents well. Even if you do everything right most of us will not get to see 100. Currently less than 1% make it that far. Scientists think that how long we live is about 25 percent attributable to our genes, and 75 percent attributable to our environment and lifestyle. But above ninety years, those percentages change. The older we get; the more genetics seem to matter.

Contrary to what I thought, it surprised me to learn that studies have shown that many people with exceptionally long lives don't have healthier habits than average. And yet, they live longer and have lower rates of age-related diseases, like heart disease, cancer and dementia.

The Long Life Family Study carried out by the Washington University School of Medicine, included families where there was a lot of smoking and some families where they were 'couch potatoes'. But what these families also had were some special gene variants that experts think helped them avoid disease and live longer. One key benefit of these types of longevity genes might be counteracting unhealthy behaviours. A study comparing the offspring of centenarians with a control population found that, among those with unhealthy lifestyles, the centenarian offspring still had low rates of disease, while the control group did not. These genes are very rare. They are in less than one percent of the population, which is about the same percentage that make it to 100. So, it's a bit like winning the lottery. But even if your father made it to 105, you should still behave and do what you are told is good for you, you may have your mother's genes, or maybe they came from the wrong grandparents or a distance ancestor. We should indeed learn from our centenarians, but it appears that we should not take health advice from a centenarian. Lifestyle probably didn't make much difference for them, but for us, you can bet it does. Meanwhile our own Department of Health, has told us that older adults in Ireland are continuing to experience positive levels of health and wellbeing.

This is according to the latest "Health at a Glance: Europe 2024" a report published by the OECD. It finds that at the age of 65, the Irish has one of the highest rates of estimated remaining healthy life years. We have 11.6 years, compared with the EU average of 9.1 years, but behind Norway (14.5 years), Sweden (13.9 years), and Malta (12.1 years). Ireland has one of the lowest rates of people aged 65 and over reporting to be in bad or very bad health, at 9.2%, compared with the EU average of 18.5%. The number of people in Ireland aged 65 and over having at least one chronic disease is 48.9%, well below the EU average of 60.3%. The OECD's annual report also illustrates some areas of concern. Only 22% of persons aged 65 and over in the EU achieve the World Health Organisation's recommendation on minimum physical activity per week (150 minutes), with Ireland lagging marginally behind at 21.8%. I think those of us in an Active Retirement Association are doing much better.

Responding to the OECD report the Minister for Mental Health and Older People, Mary Butler, said: "Ireland has made significant strides in improving healthcare access and promoting healthy lifestyles among older adults. We continue to invest in initiatives that enhance the quality of life for our ageing population, including preventive healthcare, mental health support, and community engagement programs. Our Age Friendly initiatives and supports, are an example of how communities working in partnership with local authorities, voluntary organisations and the HSE have supported Older People to Age well in their own homes and communities".

She went on to say, "Our focus in 2025 will be to build on the significant progress made in proactive healthy ageing initiatives and providing accessible quality services where older people can flourish and enjoy their later years in good health and with dignity." Now we will certainly be looking forward to seeing the meat on that bone.

### **AGM and Resumption of Activities**

We are starting our activities for this term with our AGM at the Kilmurry Museum, on the 11th of February at 7.30pm. Non-members and new members are welcome. Then on the 12th we will be having scootch, bingo and cards, and on the 19th, we will have our first coffee crawl of the year. 

### MACROOM HISTORY TALK

14 JANUARY 2025, Professor Hannah Daly, U.C.C.

Professor Daly teaches and researches in the Civil Engineering Department, UCC and her areas of expertise are Energy Systems, Sustainable Energy and Climate Policy. She does not confine herself to the college's ivory towers, speaks to groups and writes a monthly column for the Irish Times. While her topic is serious, she is adamant that we still can flex the curve enough to have a good outcome. But it depends on all of us pulling together.

The title of her talk was 'Climate Change: its History and Future?' Firstly she outlined the history of knowledge and awareness of climate change. Joseph Fourier first proposed the greenhouse gas effect - it attracted the name much later - in 1824. Claude Pouillet provided further evidence in 1827 and 1838. An amateur scientist Eunice Newton Foote demonstrated that carbon dioxide retained heat better than air. Scientist John Tyndall, an Irishman who has a Mardyke UCC laboratory named after him and Arrhenius further added to the knowledge. Early in the 20th century the scientific community was either ignorant or sceptical of the theory. In 1938, engineer Guy Callendar presented evidence that the temperature and CO2 of the earth's atmosphere had risen in the previous fifty years. With improved scientific theory and equipment including computer modelling, the phenomenon of climate change is accepted and that it has been caused by increased industrialization in the past 200 years and is man-made.

Despite the opposition of the oil-industry in the U.S. and the Middle East, reality is dawning that if

we do not change, catastrophe looms. The recent flood in Midleton, the fire of Los Angeles and the melting of the polar icecaps are examples of its effect. As Prof. Daly said that the idea is so big that most people cannot deal with it and avoid it. This is understandable but will not help.

Prof. Daly's graphs outlined the increase in greenhouse gases and the unprecedented rates of increase. Because the rise and rapid rate of rise are new, the world is literally into a new phase of its existence. She enthralled the audience with her depth of knowledge and her ability to impart her message in a clear and accessible form.

She finished her talk by outlining five simple measures that could radically reduce our carbon dioxide footprint:

- 1. Use solar and wind sources of energy.
- 2. Electrification of transport cars and trains.



- 3. Reduce car use as much as possible.
- 4. Use clean heat.
- 5. Decarbonise industry.

At questions and answers she deftly fielded and comprehensively answered questions on the the quality of the science and punctured the notion that what is occurring to our climate is just an aberration. She received a very warm round of applause for her informative, interesting and positive talk.

Brendan O'Brien was an excellent MC as were the people at the door, the camera crews and all others who help. Prof Daly was presented with a framed poster as a momento of her visit to Macroom.

The next history talk will be on 11 February 2025 in the Castle Hotel at 8.00 p.m. on 'Macroom Golf Club 1925-2025; its Century of Golf'.



### TILLAGE SECTOR NEEDS FAIRNESS AND SUPPORT TO REACH ITS FULL POTENTIAL - MEP KELLEHER

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that fully utilising the opportunities and advantages of a strong tillage sector must be a priority for both the Irish Government and the European Commission.

Kelleher was speaking following a meeting with the Irish Grain Growers Association in Brussels this week.

"The tillage sector, plus our forestry sector, are the only sectors of Irish agriculture where there is a clearly stated objective of increasing its size. The Tillage Strategy calls for an increase to 400,000 ha under tillage by 2030.

"This target will be hard to reach unless we incentivise the sector and the regulators and authorities take their feet off the necks of tillage farmers.

"We still place too many onerous targets on this vitally important sector. Following my meeting today, it's clear that grain growers are hungry for innovation and are well placed to meet any and all environmental objectives that are asked

"They are acutely aware of the importance of biodiversity for their own livelihoods and of the future of the planet. The evidence is clear from their work on reducing and eliminating pesticide usage

on oilseed and rapeseed crops where bee and insect numbers have rebounded in recent years.

"All they want is a fair crack at making a decent living. They are keen to move to a system of adding value to their produce to ensure that they retain a competitive advantage over imports from non-EU markets.

"One of the key issues also raised by the IGGA representatives was the issue of further convergence in CAP payments. Convergence measures to date have seen 7% of tillage farmers lose income. This must not be allowed to continue.

"This was a very informative and interesting meeting and I look forward to engaging further with grain growers, and the wider tillage sector, into the future, especially in relation to their plans for new and innovative pilot

schemes." concluded Kelleher.



### Think Globally, Act locally - HISTORY & FUTURE

(A talk by Professor Hannah Daly, U.C.C) Hi, Chris Barrett here.

On 14th January 2025, with the unexpected snow fully melted in Macroom, I was happy to be able to attend this talk in the Castle Hotel, hosted by Brendan O'Brien on behalf of the History Group in Macroom. It was one of a number of varied talks the group is hosting. On 11th February 2025, the 100th Anniversary of Macroom Golf Club will be commemorated.

There is plenty of further interesting information to be found out about Hannah Daly ( U.C.C website). Hannah has young children and writes a column in the Irish Times, "At a Time of Crisis", as well as making appearances on T.V and Radio.

Hannah believes the subject can appear depressing, but that the problems we are encountering are solvable. Her work spans Science, History and Politics, and that it is important to work out how we should use the facts.

We were given a brief history of how we got to where we are now.

1856: Eunice Newton Foote gave us the first proof of the Greenhouse effect. She placed a glass cylinder full of carbon dioxide in sunlight and found it heated up much more than a cylinder of ordinary air.

Early 19th Century: Joseph Fourier, the French mathematician, was the first to predict the Greenhouse effect and showed how the atmosphere kept the earth warmer than it would be if it was exposed directly to space.

1860: John Tyndall, the Irish physicist, showed that greenhouse gases including carbon dioxide and water vapour, can absorb heat; the strongest effect being from water vapour.

1900: Svante Arrhenius, a Swedish chemist , speculated that low CO2 levels caused the Ice Ages, and that Industrial Burning of coal might warm the planet. He said that a doubling of CO2 concentrations would lead to a 5°C temperature rise. This is confirmed by modern science.

These great scientists of the past did not foresee how fast our use of fossil fuels would grow. Now we know that our planet is heating up more quickly than was foreseen. We are in uncharted territory.

The concentration of CO2 is now 427 ppm. although we are reminded that these figures are out of date as they keep rising.

Scientific records let us investigate ice-core samples which show concentrations of CO2 rising and falling in different Ice Ages. As CO2 goes up, temperature goes up and vice versa.

Currently NO2, Methane and CO2 are rising.

Humans evolved in low, stable CO2 concentrations. 3 million years ago there were forests at the North Pole and sea levels were rising.

Now there is CO2 change at unprecedented speed. Pre-Industrial 280 ppm

Foundation of the Irish State(1923) 304 ppm

427 ppm

This is a rapid change over one lifetime, the fastest rise for 66 million years.

IN 2024 Nasa, Hadley/UEA, NOAA, Berkeley and Copernicus said that the average global temperature rise was 1.55`.

This may not seem a great deal but we can think of it in terms of the energy needed to boil a kettle.

We are aware that sea ice is reducing.

Climactic Attribution Studies are able to work out if Climatic effects are more likely to be caused by Greenhouse Gases.

### **TIPPING POINTS**

These would be permanent destabilising effects e.g the collapse of the AMOC, the Atlantic meridional

overturning circulation. If it changed by 2050, it could turn the Irish climate to more like that of Northern Norway.

At this point Hannah Daly compared the situation to poking a sleeping lion with a short stick.

The Energy system is the main source of global greenhouse gas emissions, which come from buildings. Transport, industry, agriculture, forestry and land use, waste and industry.

There is the goal of limiting warming to between 1.5°C and 2°C.

In 2019 emissions were 12% higher than in 2010.

We are drawing down more carbon from the atmosphere than we are emitting. It is an accumulation.

Current policies are leading to 3'of warming. We are bending the curve but not quickly enough.

A High Court Judge commented,

"The problem is so big that to even describe it factually sounds like scaremongering."

In 1965 in a report in the U.S., politicians were made aware of what was going on.

The IPCC (U.N. Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change) in its 5th assessment stated that the warming of the climate system is 'unequivocal' with changes unprecedented over decades to millennia, including warming of the atmosphere and oceans, loss of snow and ice, and sea level rise.

In 2015, in the Paris Agreement (COP21) countries signed an agreement to keep global warming below

Ireland has a carbon budget framework, but we have a large per capita output and we are very dependent on fossil fuels. This is in contrast with the Scandanavians who put far better insulation into their houses starting in the 1970s and also used more sustainable fuels.

We need to act sooner rather than later and the technologies for early solutions are available.

Five Measures take us to 90% of our 2030 objective

1 (34%) Replace fossil fuels with wind, solar and grid.

2 (22%) Electrify Transport.

3 (10%) Reduce unnecessary car use Improve Public Transport.

4 (12%) Use clean heat e.g. heat pumps. 5 (10%) Decarbonise industry.

It is worth realising that such energy transition will bring multiple other benefits.

\*A safe climate,

\*Security as primary energy will be made in Ireland. \*Health, Well-being and Equality.

\*Prosperity.

There seems to be no rural/urban divide. Most people in Ireland agree we need to act. So what is it that is stopping us from acting? It is more satisfying for us to participate in solutions. People could come together to create a positive tipping point.

At this point there were questions from members of the audience, introduced by Brendan O'Brien, who reminded us

'Science is Proven- No Denying It'

Audience Participant 1 talked about the changes through time such as the Ice Ages, how we are outclassed by the industries of countries such as China, and how she felt the changes were happening at a slower rate than we are told is the case.

Hannah Daly replied that the warming effect takes longer to take place and that sea level rise will definitely occur.

Audience Participant 2 enquired about Nuclear Plants.

Hannah Daly replied that it would take about 30 years to build a nuclear reactor in Ireland. There may be the possibility of small nuclear reactors in the future.

Audience Participant 3 talked about carbon offsets and credits and asked if that was a good way to deal with the situation.

Hannah Daly replied that under EU Corporate rules, things are changing and ultimately big companies will not be able to hide.

Audience Participant 4 asked if Economic Growth is desirable.

Hannah Daly replied that people need a degree of comfort and security. We could collapse our economy and still increase our carbon output.

Audience Participant 5 talked about the movement away from car use and how it conflicts with Corporate Ireland which wants its employees to go back to working in offices.

Hannah Daly remarked on how we saw the possibility of working from home during Covid. She believes housing development needs to be linked to high density transport corridors.

She believes we need urbanisation, and that electric vehicles are the way forward.

Audience Participant 6 noted how 89% of people in Norway have electric cars and that there are 25,000 charging points. We are way behind in Ireland.

Hannah Daly reiterated her enthusiasm for electric vehicles By saying that they are good value if you can charge them at home. Newer models do much higher mileage and she has had a company in Kildare replace the batteries in her old Nissan Leaf which now has much greater mileage. She was able to reuse her old battery which was still able to contribute towards her household energy using solar energy as it still could charge up to 80% of its original output. She feels that the Green Party did a lot of catching up. In conclusion Dr.Con Kelleher reminded us that in science, when you have a theory, you test it and prove it. Global populations are rising as have emissions per capita. He feels it is madness not to believe in climate change and not to do all we can about it.

The audience were very appreciative of the talk given which was followed by a presentation and refreshments and I was able to put my own point to Hannah Daly. I said it seems that people want to hide from the truth about Climate Change.

She agreed saying it was a result of us having An Animal Brain



### **EMERGENCY MEDICAL CARDS**

An emergency medical card is a medical card that is issued without a means test in certain emergency situations.

### Who can get an emergency medical card?

You can get an emergency medical card if you:

- Have a terminal illness and have been told you have 24 months or less to live or
- Are receiving end-of-life treatment or
- Need urgent ongoing care and urgently need a medical card

### How do you apply?

Only a healthcare professional can apply for an emergency medical card for you. They must send a detailed medical report with an application form including your diagnosis, planned treatment and

If you have a terminal illness and have been told you have 24 months or less to live, they only need to send a completed application form. A medical report is not required.

### Does it take long to process?

If you are terminally ill or are receiving end-of-life care, your medical card number will be active on the system within 24 hours of your application being processed.

You can access medical card services while you wait for your card in the post. Your medical card will never be reviewed and it will not expire.

### Is it different of if you need urgent ongoing care?

If you need urgent on-going care you can get a temporary medical card for 6 months

If your application is approved, your emergency medical card can be sent in the post in 10 days. However, your medical card number will be active within 24 hours of your application being processed, so you can get the care you need.

You will need to apply for a standard means-tested medical card before your emergency medical card expires. The HSE will write to you to remind you to do this.





### The pandemic of loneliness

We all get lonely.

Loneliness is that piercing pain in your chest and gut. It's intense and while temporary it feels like forever. It wells up without warn-

It can be related to unresolved grief. The tears come. We are grieving what once was - family, spouse, friend, connection, intimacy, camaraderie - all now in the past. People change and situations change. We move house, our job takes us to a different location, country, culture or language. It takes time to move on from the stability of what once was. Bereavement is a new country.

But it may not be grief. It may be waking up to the sudden realization of the tiny number of people in our lives who really matter and who really care. Colleagues are mostly simply acquaintances. We can spend most of our working days as mere functionaries, ultimately replaceable and unmissed. Even among acquaintances there may be little reciprocity. This is a challenge to all of us even in our comfortable world. Happiness, lasting happiness, is elusive. Loneliness is the unmentionable pandemic. We feel somehow ungrateful that we should feel lonely at all. But there is a whole world out there waiting to be listened to. In the words of the Beatles' song "Eleanor Rigby"

> O look at all the lonely people Where do they all come from? O look at all the lonely people Where do they all belong? '

Feelings of jarring loneliness provide us with a challenge to our identity, but they also invite to depth of relationship with the only One who knows us and cares for us:

> "You have made us for Yourself, O Lord. Our hearts are restless Lord And they will not rest Until they rest in you." (St Augustine, 5th century)



"Teach me to number my days, so that I may get a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:12)

Welcome back dear student, the song 'Time In A Bottle' is a beautiful song whose words ring true"...there never seems to be enough time to do the things you want to do... Time gets swallowed up so easily, especially nowadays. It's an interesting exercise to do a 'time inventory'. People examine their finances regularly to see where all the money is going, but how many of us have ever sat down with pen and paper and inspected how we use time? Our time is valuable - it's what we exchange in our workplaces for wages. But much of it is spent aimless and wasted: not always through laziness but squandered on fruitless pursuits. God warns that our lives are like a vapour that vanishes quickly (James 4:14; Isaiah 40:6-7). Think of when you boil the kettle: the steam rises for a while, then it's gone, vanished into thin air! We need God's help to live productive, measured, and intentional lives that bear fruit for His Glory (John 15:5). In the lead Scripture, Moses asks for God's help.... 'teach me to realise the brevity of life, so that I may grow in wisdom' (Psalm 90:12 NLT). There is a knock-on effect from yielding to God - we get His Wisdom to navigate through life more smoothly.

Time is a precious commodity that God has entrusted us with here on earth. The devil knows how to make a life unproductive - setting up distractions, dramas, and desires all aiming to sneakily steal time. God promises His people that He will restore the years the locusts have stolen (Joel 2:25). Locusts are dangerous pests. In swarms they blot out the landscape, devouring acres of hard work in literally no time at all. The comparison here is that whatever the enemy has used to steal from you, God can, and will, turn back. "The eyes of the Lord search the whole earth in order to strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to Him" (2 Chronicles 16:9). The life of Joseph is a story of stolen time as well as stolen dreams, yet he turned around to his brothers who had sold him into years of misery as a slave, telling them that what they had done for evil, God had turned around for good (Genesis 50:20). The Lord has the same plan for you and me dear friend. As if being sold into slavery wasn't bad enough, Joseph was later lied about and unjustly imprisoned, but he used his time there to make the prison a better place, trusting God with his case (Genesis 39:23), God dwells in etemity - outside of time.

Time has only been given to us here on earth, so what if time is a test? What if God uses time to reveal our hearts, character, and motivation? That's what happened with Joseph; and also, the servants Jesus mentioned in Matthew's Gospel. These three were given a resource and judged on what they accomplished for their Master with it. The two who worked and produced were rewarded, the one who did nothing was rebuked and cast out in anguish (Matthew 25:14-30). Understanding and using time well grows wisdom, "the principle thing" (Proverbs 4:7). Multitudes catalogue their health and fitness, their wealth, and achievements, but how many identify the snares Satan uses to rob time? God's plan for mankind is to 'be fruitful and multiply' (Genesis 1:28) Difficult circumstances or drama created by others can block God's plans, leading to unprofitability and failure. "My times are in Your hands, rescue me from my enemies" (Psalm 31:15). Lord Jesus, help me take stock of my time, and grow in Your Wisdom, amen.
