



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MACROOM AND THE 2025 SENATE ELECTIONS

Two first-time senators with strong Macroom connections were elected in the February Seanad voting. They are Eileen Lynch, Knockrour, Aghabullogue and Garret Kelleher, Ballincollig. Both are members of Fine Gael and were members of Cork County Council and Cork City Council respectively. They will have to vacate their seats.

Eileen's mother is the former Kate Murray (of Murray's bar and butcher shop); her husband is the renowned dog-trainer, Denis Lynch. The Murray family are steeped in the Fine Gael tradition and gaining a Seanad seat is a major boost and advance in her political career. Garret too has strong Main Street and Fine Gael connections. His father is Jerry Kelleher, and his father too had a butcher shop. Jerry has been associated with Fine Gael for about sixty years and he still retains his enthusiasm for politics and FG. Garret's mother is from Cork City. He was an unsuccessful candidate in

the recent General Election. His aunt, Colette Kelleher, was an independent senator, 2015-20, a Taoiseach's nominee. She has worked with Simon, Cope and Tabor Lodge in an administrative capacity.


An Overview of the St Coleman's Park Amenity and Biodiversity







Since 1991, a diverse range of projects has been undertaken to support the economic, social, and environmental development of the local rural area. In recent years, IRD Duhallow has also played a key role in promoting public engagement with the European Union through the Communicating Europe Programme, an initiative of the Department of Foreign Affairs. By supporting locally led projects, this programme fosters dialogue between citizens and policymakers, increasing awareness of European affairs and democracy.

As part of this initiative, IRD Duhallow secured funding to develop and deliver a series of workshops for secondary school students across the region, with Transition Years in St. Mary's

Macroom participating in one day of workshops. Each workshop allotted time to exploring the national, local, and regional impacts of Ireland's EU membership.

In a highly interactive classroom discussion, Ms. Ní Mhurchú encouraged students to take an active interest in European affairs. Throughout what was a very engaging presentation, students gained insight into how European policies shape Ireland and their own local communities. They also learned about the educational and career opportunities that exist within the EU. Students availed of their

chance to ask thoughtful and important questions, deepening their understanding of the role of an MEP and the European Parliament's functions. The depth and quality of the questions presented by the students did not go unnoticed, and the dedication of their teacher Mr. O'Cuill and Principal Mr. McLaughlin to having their students prepared for the event was apparent. The students outlined that they had recently won in an Euroscola group and will be visiting the European Parliament in Strasbourg. Ms. Ní Mhurchú said she would be delighted to meet the girls on their visit.

Given the enthusiasm and engagement demonstrated by St. Mary's students throughout the Communicating Europe project, the future of civic participation in the region is in capable hands.

Sign Language



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"The English Channel is the Mount Everest of channel swimming"

Man against nature



"Open water swimming is one of the most dangerous and unheralded endurance sports in the world taking the body to the edge in conditions that some describe as madness.

Among the obstacles are sharks, poisonous jellyfish, violent seas, hypothermia and physical agony beyond comprehension. Swimmers brave the planet's coldest waters for sometimes up to 20 hours. Their only armour is goggles, a swim cap and speedos."

The beginning...Aug 2021 (Age 63 yrs)

"Harry you have to feel the water Try to feel it in your fingers and hands, as if you were shaping it"... At my age, honestly it felt ridiculous to start with this sort of malarkey However, encouraged by my coach, I joined a group of men and women half my age, and got to work. Culminating in 130km around the island of Mauritius in relay over 3 days, we swam daily from 0600-1800 (sharks tend to feed at night). We fought jellyfish, rocks, coral, vicious currents,

friendships and were all the better for it. Four of our number then shook hands on Swimming the English Channel. There are only 12 approved

huge swells and waves, but we survived, formed solid

boats and the waiting list is 2/3 years. The Preparation (over 24 months) Robben Island (Capetown) May '23 & '24

The iconic prison Island swim in 14c waters and an unexpected record as the oldest fastest (5.25 hrs) swimmer to achieve the double (15km) & a trophy for outstanding services to open water swimming. Nelson Mandela and my father Fergie's favourite poem kept me going:

"It matters not how straight the gate How charged with punishments the scroll I am the Master of my Fate I am the Captain of my soul!"

Lake IJsselmeer (Amsterdam) Aug '23

Largest inland lake in Western Europe @22km, in

Swimming, at the risk of over simplifying, is principally about two elements: Propulsion (as much as possible) and Drag (as little as possible). In freshwater your body sinks more and therefore you have more to pull through the water.

Cork Distance Week (Kinsale, ireland) in July '23

Hosted by the legendary Ned Denison & AKA 'Torture Week'.....by invitation only. As a relative beginner I felt a touch of imposter syndrome.

1st Channel attempt - July '23

Storms throughout July and into my swim week in August, made it impossible for boats to leave the harbour. My son Jack sent some memorable words of encouragement:

"DadMaybe you will swim next week or maybe this week. Whatever the case, perseverance and a strong mind will get you through and you've got both in abundance. Go make history you crazy bastard. Be one of the 'few to few' among the 'many too many!" Frustratingly, my channel attempt for 2023 was aborted.

September 2023 - "Back to the Beginning"

Despite two internationally recognised endurance swims to my name, I was now back to the beginning, which felt a bit likedrawing Community Chest in Monopoly. Another year of Training, Technique Improvement, just plain 'buggering on', 'Do not pass Go and no £200'!

Swimming is considered x 4 to the road run. Hence a swimming marathon distance is 10km to a running marathon of 42 km. The Channel is like running 168 km in one go. They say that the mental challenge is as big as the physical.

Nutrition, training, sleep & jellyfish

Burning between 4-5,000 calories per day, Nutrition & Sleep are vital, along with weight increase to combat the cold.

Km after Km after Km, long slow open water swims(15 - 25km) and short hard interval training (5-6km) in the pool often twice a day. New masochistic self imposed exercises: breath holding - 5.30 mins personal best (never attempt on your own') and hanging to exhaustion from grab bars. Push to the point where muscles and lungs are screaming and begging for relief and then ask the mind to step in and take over. Massages and yoga to recover.

Morning starts @ 0430, cold showers and cold water plunges in the Ice Freezer.

A large Box jellyfish contains enough poison to kill an adult in 4 minutes. Attacking the heart, respiratory and lymphatic systems. One morning I got belted by one 2km offshore and paid the price, anaphylactic shock and hospitalisation.

Training requires peaks (of distance and speed) and troughs (ticking over and recovery) building to my peak of 55 km / week.

Channel tides & Dover straits

The Channel is one of the busiest shipping lanes in the world, with approx. 400 ships per day. Every 6 hours the tide moves 56,000 cubic Km of water through the narrow Dover straights. Producing the infamous channel currents.

2nd EC Attempt 28th July 2024 - Samphire Hoe (0415 hrs).....

Pilot and Coach advanced my slot this year to Sunday 28th July, one hr before high tide at 0430 hrs.

Four men on 'Pathfinder': Skipper Eric & his no 2, Keith the official independent observer and my Coach Derrick Frazer. All here at this ungodly hour for my benefit along with +200 people following on the channel tracker...... 2 yrs of training almost every day; around 2000 km in swims, my aborted year in 2023 and so here we are - no pressure.

In the water, damn the cold, swim to beach, fiddle with goggles, no leaks no fogging for next 14 hrs please. Clear the water line, turn, wave, foghorn blast to acknowledge. A final stretch, shut my eyes, breath slowly and deeply and steady the mind.

"100 % commitment before you hit the water, from the first stroke simply believe you are already halfway to France."

Pathfinder & feeding

I swim into the boat's spotlight and off we go. Breath, stroke, glide, catch, pull, push, recover, repeat goggles fit fine; stroke regular; water probably about 16c, Swim for an hour to dawn & 'first feed'.

Endurance swim feeding, is in a water bottle attached to a rope with carbohydrate powder mix and (for me) diluted with warm Roibos tea and honey. Sports caffeine gels & peaches. And an Ibuprofen every 4 hours (prevention not cure). Feeds generally every 30mins. Essential to keep feed time to an absolute minimum. Grab your bottle, flip onto your back, stay horizontal, open your throat and simply 'neck it'. 10-15 secs max. Slow feeds can accumulate to be the difference between success and failure.

Derrick Frazer

Calm, knowledgeable and supportive. After two hours we were moving smoothly and I was 'in the zone'. Long, strong, pull, push, recover, breath steady, head down, bum up......


The Headmaster

The independent observer Keith, dubbed 'the Headmaster' of the boat, steps out of the cabin and peers at me through his glasses, over his clipboard. His job to document the whole swim and ensure rules and regulations are followed. He counts stroke rate per minute ("SPM") and would be commenting to Derrick if it had slipped. His analysis tells them if I am tiring and whether or not to pull me out. My deepest fear was Derrick calling me in to declare that I was not making headway and we had to abort.

Headmaster's notes extracts

"0730 hrs- feed. Liquid plus solid feed. Ibuprofen tablet in peach pieces provided via plastic drink container with large neck. Tablet spat out by Harry -

thought it was a nut! Derrick confirms "will give with next feed - don't spit it out next time!" Harry smiling as he sets off again.

0815 - Feed. Derrick confirms SPM down to 54. Harry acknowledges. SPM increased after feed- now back at 58.

1115 hrs- Harry continues to make good progress estimated 10 & 12 miles to starboard. Ebb tide increasing and taking us back down the Channel. Current speed over seabed is 2.2 kts.

1230 hrs - Feed. Derrick asking Harry to keep pace up 'Give me 5 minute speed bursts before & after each feed ' Harry nods acknowledgement as he starts swimming.

1400 hrs - Feed. Derrick confirms 'Nice position – keep pushing - all looking good - keep it up.' Excellent 15 sec feed again.

My longest swim to date was 25km @ 9.5 hrs, now in unchartered territory @ +10 hrs. Felt good, steady and strong, not affected by the water temp and unaware of currents. Some prehistoric looking jellyfish seemed far too close for comfort, but fortunately I only got belted once close to the end.

Dover to Cap Gris Nez is directly south east, My mid point time at the turn (I subsequently discovered) was 6hrs 5min. I now needed to swim like hell to get across the current before it swept me south past the Cap. Little did I know, that was over 7 hrs away.

More Notes.....

14.40 hrs- Weather fine, wind increased - Harry making good progress - Wissant to port and Cap Gris-Nez 21/2 miles off starboard.

16.10 hrs- Getting close now. Cap Gris-Nez is +1 mile to port - but flood tide has started to flow and will quickly take us back up the coast, past Cap Gris-Nez. Now the hard work starts - Harry has got to get across the tide and close in as possible so that he can land east of Cap Gris-Nez.

1620- Feed. Derrick 'You are reeling it in! Excellent feeding job! and swimming again."

They say the English Channel starts at 25km, "the business end of the swim". After 12 hours constant swimming: 'Dig deep, trust in your training, increase the pace, don't back off.'

Lighthouse in sight! head down and swim to next feed lighthouse disappeared.... Was I hallucinating? Quite possibly after 12 hours in the water. Didn't dare ask Derrick in case he pulled me out for insanity. Head down Sutherland and get on with it! 30 minutes later the lighthouse was there again, maybe not hallucinating? Derrick was pumping the air and telling me to go for it..... time ticked on....The final battle.... Just dig in & where the hell is Rudvard Kipling when you need him?: "If you can force your heart and nerve and sinew, to serve their turn long after they are gone;

and so hold on when there is nothing in you, Except the will which says to you Hold on !" And suddenly the sand is under my knees, I swim and wade and swim again and walk out of the water guite comfortably in the end to a huge waiting Nothingness. Fr Michael Murphy was horn on February 2nd 1911 in Shandangan, Lissarda the eldest son of James and Elizabeth Murphy (nee Halllissey) a farming family that sold their holding in 1916 to Mr Richard Collins (The farm now belonging to Luceys Larchill) and moved to a larger farm at Gurrane House, Templemartin. The future priest went to Gurrane National School, then to the North Monastery and the sacred Heart College, Cork. Michael made his religious profession on September 21st 1931. He studied in Belgium and Holland and was ordained on 10th August 1936. Shortly afterwards he was appointed professor of Canon Law at Moyne Park, Ballyglunin, Co. Galway. Four years later he and three other Missionaries of the Sacred Heart (MSC) went to Papua New Guinea to

minister to the people there. In a letter home he writes

about his voyage through Los Angeles, crossing the

Date Line, and having to buy light shirts and trousers

to cope with the tropical climate. He spent the next

two years working in local villages, celebrating Mass,

hearing confessions, baptising children, and being

with the people. He visited communities on horseback,

but some were so inaccessible he had to hike through the jungle. He gained the trust of his parishioners, who came to call him Fr. Mike. In June 1942, at the invitation of the Japanese Army, he travelled to source more medicine for his community. He was never to return. On September 11, 1942, after months in captivity and greatly weakened by illness and malnutrition, Fr Michael Murphy was among a small group of men taken by Japanese soldiers to Nago Island just offshore from Kavieng, New Ireland in Papua New Guinea.

He was killed on that day along with others and buried there. At that time the uninhabited island was used by the Japanese for killings and burials away from the witness of the locals. Michael was just 31 years-old.

Years later in late 1945 and early 1946, in the context of investigation of war crimes, thirteen bodies were found on the island, exhumed and brought to Rabaul. Fr Murphy was among the bodies identified.

Fr. Michael was one of millions of people who lost their lives in World War II, but his story and what happened next is an extraordinary example of faith and the power of love.

His parishioners knew nothing of his execution and

waited for his return. In his absence they maintained their church, the altar, and even took care of Fr. Mike's vestments. They only found out about his death in 1946.

After the war Bishop Leo Scharmach of Rabaul came to the parish to assess the devastation. On his arrival Fr. Mike's ciborium, was presented to him. The villagers had protected the 'TabarCiborium' in which the Blessed Sacrament was found incorrupt after four years. "Thus did the good shepherd stayed with his people when their priest had been so cruelly taken away.

The 'Tabar Ciborium' was brought back and beautifully restored and his name engraved on its base together with details on a brass plaque. A plaque to his memory was unveiled on the 25th March 1952 at St. Columba's College, St Alhans, London, by his brother Sean B (Bobby) Murphy Templemartin. Other relatives present were his sisters Maureen and Elizabeth. The deceased priests mother was unable to be present but Mr. Murphy returned thanks to the fathers and teachers on her behalf. In the early 1960's , Bobby, his wife and family moved to Greystones Co. Dublin

In 2015, Fr. Alan Neville MSC travelled to Parishes and Communities of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart throughout Ireland and England with the Tabor Ciborium.

Today Papua New Guinea is one of the strongest regions of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart. Parishes and communities have continued to raise up men and women for the priesthood and religious life. Sources: "Templemartin A Proud Tradition" By Sean Crowley. Bina O'Callaghan

Alongside these academic qualifications, Life Skills form an integral part of a student's experience. This is an essential aspect of their learning as students are able to benefit from having their individual needs met through Support, Infrastructure, Counselling 1:1 Keyworking, Work Experience, Workshops, Extracurricular activities and Certification. Certificates could include 'Safe Pass',

'Manual Handling', 'First Aid', and 'HACCP' (Food Safety Award) to name but a few.

Some of the staff have been working in the centre for 20



years and offer an unparalleled wealth of experience, having worked with students from every walk of life. At this point Christina and Aislinn would like to say a huge 'Thankyou' to Nesta Bonner, Catherine Barrr and Marianne Horgan who have contributed in excess of 60 years in total to the young people of Macroom.

MUSKERRY'S BENEFICENT LEGACY TO THE WORLD

The parishes of Muskerry left a great legacy to the world through their many sons and daughters who totally devoted their lives to providing education, health care and solace for the poor, the sick, the less-well-off, the outcasts, the prisoner and the marginalised. Br. Benignus (Mícheal) Ó Luasa was just one of them

Born in Na Milíní in Cúil Aodha in 1888, Micheál Ó Luasa was held in high esteem in Dublin literary circles, who regarded him as the greatest mind in Western Europe. He served for 65 years as a member of the Irish Christian Brothers.

He was a brilliant teacher and he earned quite a reputation because so many of his students were successful in examinations for the civil service -an achievement that brought him a degree of fame. It was said of him that he had a great and equal love of teaching and of learning. It is little wonder then that he regarded his years in university as the happiest of his life.

On one occasion he went to England at the invitation of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, whose publishing company he had assisted in the role of editor. One of his fellow brothers asked him subsequently how he got on in England?

"I got on fine there," he replied. I even went scoraíochting to Buckingham Palace."

Br. Benignus (Mícheál) Ó Luasa was regarded as a devoted religious, a model of regularity who was earnest and assiduous in his spiritual endeav-

GOLF IN MACROOM: 1910-1913 AND 1924/5-2025

'Golf and tennis were games played by the classes. Gaelic football was played by all classes, rich and poor, young and old.' Dan Corkery, (Macroom {Old} I.R.A Commander, Anti Treaty leader), 1925).

Macroom (Castle) Golf Club is celebrating its centenary this year and it has played an important role in the social history of the town and area in that period. The world, Ireland and Macroom have changed immensely in the period 1910 to 2025; golf in Macroom too has changed. In Ireland 1910, there was no radio or television, not to mention the internet, and there were three cars in the town. Most people lived in poor housing and life expectancy was fifty years. The convent was the only secondary in Macroom and for girls only, and there were boys, a girl's national schools, and a Protestant one in Castle Street. However, a small sector was well off, with many layers between the poor and the welloff. Tuberculosis (T.B.) was rampant and infant mortality high. By contrast, we now have multitudes of radio and television stations, we can 'skype' those living overseas, and the average life expectancy is in the 80s. Most families have cars, some several. As Ireland and the town changed, so too did the golf club. TB is now rare and the infant mortality rate is in low single digits. Over the century, golf clubs became more 'democratic' and accessible. Golf is a simple 'ball-and-stick' game but carries layers of historical and societal 'baggage'. This chapter examines the history of golf, Macroom golf 1910-1999 and the influencing social factors. It explores the process and sees how true Corkery's 1925 assertion was in 2000.

Corkery's quotation comes from a Macroom Urban District Council meeting on Lady Ardilaun's compensation claim regarding the burning of Macroom Castle (1923). He, a former Macroom GAA captain, had commanded the Macroom IRA Battalion in the War of Independence. He had been imprisoned, his house and business burned, and he was a Civil War Anti Treaty leader. At the meeting he criticised the purchase of Macroom Castle Demesne (MCD) and Macroom Castle Demesne Committee (MCDC). Tensions were high as it was just two years since the IRA had dumped arms. Matters settled as Corkery, now a T.D., judged at a 1928 National Athletic and Cycling Association of



Ireland (N.A.C.A.I.) sports in the Demesne. His comment contextualizes Macroom (Castle) Golf Club's founding and underlines the interaction of politics, sport and class in 1920s' Macroom.

The modernization of Britain and Ireland 1870-1910 gave rise to many Irish sports clubs. This resulted from associational culture/club formation, increased prosperity and literacy, cheaper newspapers and better transportation, especially railways. For golf, industrial advances provided grass-mowers and machine-made golf balls (the Haskell golf-ball was introduced in 1902). Agricultural depressions made land cheaper, and builders of suburban estates saw local golf course as desirable.

Sumerians (modern day Iraq) recorded sport (3,000 B.C.), and hurling is first referenced in Ireland from 1200 B.C. Seventeenth-century Dutch sketches of kolven suggest that Holland was golf's birthplace. However Scotland established 'modern' golf where it began in the 'commonage of sheep-grazing lands'. Aristocrats, merchants and lawyers formed The Company of Edinburgh Golfers (1744), the first club to produce written rules. In 1766 The Society of St. Andrew's Golfers' Club followed, the forerunner of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club (1836) which became 'arbiter

of golfing standards, rules and etiquette'. Men played, drank and made deals at clubs, where sport, pleasure and commerce combined. Only the elite had the time, means and acceptability to join.

In Ireland, Montgomery, Newtown-school Laird (1606), allowed 'scholars a green for recreation at 'goff', football and archery'. Faulkner's Dublin Journal, 1762, mentioned Bray, where 'the Goff Club met to dine in the house of Mr Charles Moran', Scot David Ritchie laid out a Curragh course in 1851. A gutta percha ball, found in Straffan (1852), suggests golf was played there. While holidaying in Scotland in 1881, Thomas Sinclair was entranced by golf and, on return, sought-out Scottish golfer George Bailie, a Belfast-based teacher; within weeks Sinclair formed the Belfast Golf Club. Other clubs followed, and the Golfing Union of Ireland (GUI) was founded in Portrush (1891). Due to Catherine McGee, the Irish Ladies Golf Union (ILGU) was established in Belfast (1893), within eight months of England's Ladies Golfing Union's creation. From 1880, throughout the United Kingdom, golf spread among the higher- and

Macroom's first club (1910-13) was in Sandy Hill; there is no record that women played there. Macroom Castle Club was founded in 1924/5 where women played from 1927. Golf is first referenced in 1911 in a Macroom Council debate on Lady Ardilaun refusing to open her Demesne to the public, owing to vandalism. A report that '(her) promise to Macroom Golf Club and subsequently broken, that the grazing would in future be let subject to the right to play, was not popular.' A booklet kept in Macroom Golf Clubhouse confirms a club was instituted in 1910. In 1913 a presentation was made to founder, District-Inspector Charles A. Walshe, Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC) District Inspector. F. Philips's (Justice of the Peace) presented prizes in December 1912. The competition was match-play and Walshe (handicap 10) beat Grainger (28) 1 up; eighteen competed. Dr Patrick Goold, grandfather of a former captain and president of the second Macroom (Castle) Leo Goold, played. In March 1913 a professional's prize was advertised, and the winners of April's 'bag' competition and the Monthly Medal, both stroke-play, were "Mr Slicer (25)" and F. Power (22) respectively.



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

on the 'banks of Sullane'; it has provided wonderful enjoyment for members and visitors since 1925. The club has survived, and in 1999 was doing well. Its story is part of Macroom's history.

The club's formation followed Ireland's Independence. During the War of Independence an RIC Auxiliary Division company was based in Macroom Castle 1920-21. The Kilmichael Ambush patrol, almost wipedout, set out from there. The Free State's founding was followed by Civil War, 1922-23, which ended when the IRA dumped arms. The IRA burned and ruined Macroom Castle before evacuating it. In 1924 the country was in a wretched state. Many were emotionally wrought and disturbed from fighting, killing, grief, betrayal, family division and bitterness. Much of the country's infrastructure was in tatters. War had caused about £30 millions-worth of damage. The Civil War was called 'A War without Victors' and Cork city and county had seen fierce fighting. Despite this, sixteen local men decided to rent or buy the Demesne, and to construct a golf course. Lady Ardilaun (seventy-four), without heirs, had been largely absent for years. She sold the Demesne to the men (MCDC) on condition that they would preserve 'its natural attractions'. Richard Williams listed those who vouched £100 each, and the Demesne is held in trust for the 'benefit of the people of Macroom'. The purchase was controversial and at a 1925 Council meeting Corkery objected. He alleged that MCDC might not act in the town's interests, instancing that £20 had been asked of NACAI to hold a sports-meeting. NACAI procured a ground away from Macroom for £5. Corkery asserted that the GAA could not pay rent as the Golf and Tennis Clubs could as 'golf and tennis were games played by the classes. Gaelic football was played by all classes'.Matters settled as in 1928 Corkery, now a T.D., judged sports competitions.

The explanation of the Demesne's purchase lies in Richard Williams' letter; a copy is displayed in Macroom's clubhouse. The MCDC wanted to lease or buy. Lady Ardilaun was open to negotiation. The MCDC did not include any IRA Volunteer and the Cork Examiner published Williams' letter on November 28, 1925, Kilmichael Ambush's fifth anniversary. The MCDC, composed of 'men of substance', subsequently sold land to Mortimer Twomey, Rockborough, for £1,500. His son leased the same ground back to the club in 1994, forming most of the new-nine holes. The MCDC had leased the 'old'-nine to the club in 1925, and owns the demesne. A clubhouse plague commemorates founding members of Macroom G.C. Some were in both committees. Richard Williams the chief negotiator for MCDC. All the guarantors were business- or professional men, and Williams was a Protestant.

> At its foundation men were full club-members with voting rights and ladies associate-members, without votes. The course was prepared in 1925 and the Cork Examiner 15 January 1926 carried a picture of players putting on the sixth green.1926's AGM was well attended and the main complaint was long grass; frequent mower breakdowns were blamed. The first captain was J. Fitzgerald (1924). Henry C. Murphy presented prizes, and Denis McNamara was the first winner. The Southern Star reported a mixed foursomes in 1927. Activities are not documented again until 1931 apart from club-dances in Macroom Town Hall.

> Economic conditions in Ireland were bad in the 1930s. As well as a world recession, De Valera and Fianna Fáil ibnstituted the Economic War which reduced prices for agricultural produce. However, almost in a parallel world, Macroom GC made significant advances. The ladies-section affiliated to the ILGU, a pavilion was erected (1935) and Parish Priest Canon Barrett, became president and a club leader. Dr May Twomey was the first lady-captain in 1932. Competitions were organized; as well as annual Captain's and President's Prizes, there were men's Sullane, Castle and Barrett Cup competitions. Macroom (men) played Kinsale away, and when Kinsale visited Macroom, 'not having recovered from the effects of the visit', deferred reporting for a week. A 1930s open meeting photo of the clubhouse captures the members, the pavilion and the convivial ambience. The Ladies held an open Geraldine Cup in July 1932. The 1936 AGM recorded that 'the facilities now available enabled them to pursue the game with maximum enjoyment'. A vote of thanks was passed to the ladies' for catering.

Despite the 1930s' poverty and Emergency (1939-1946) shortages golf went on. The 1934 Castle Cup (closed) had thirty players.1937's committee (of eleven) consisted of a (Catholic) canon, doctor, two chemists, two teachers and five businessmen. 1949's committee was similarly composed. A vandalism incident occurred when a visitor's car-windows were smashed following his refusal to buy second-hand golf balls from local youths, and a prosecution followed. In a 1932 ladies' Open-Day (entry-fee 2/6), nineteen competed, fifteen Macroom members, two from Bandon and one each from Skibbereen and Limerick, Macroom, represented by Mrs Rosaleen Horgan, Misses Noreen McSweeney (lady-captain) and Marie Cronin, won the Munster Trophy in 1940. In 1943 Michael Cronin beat Gleeson in the South of Ireland Championship. The Sullane Cup (open, 1946) had an entry of sixty-three, with players from Skibbereen, Bandon, Kenmare, Mitchelstown, Kinsale, Monkstown, Muskerry and Cork despite petrol shortages. The ladies had a successful Open-Day in 1947 and a clubhouse photo of decorous lady-golfers captures a scene divorced from shortages and poverty. The following year eleven joined and the club won a second County Clubs' League.

Nearly 500,000 people emigrated in the 1950s when less than 30% of 14-18 year-olds attended secondary schools. Most emigrants had primary-education only, were unskilled and from poorer areas. Connacht emigrant and writer Dónall Mac Amhlaigh, approaching Dunlaoghaire, recorded being annoyed when he 'saw men in white clothes playing cricket'. His anger was that the 'comfortable class', could stay while he was forced to go. Macroom 1950s golfers were 'comfortable'.

The 1950s club continue as before except for one crisis. Following a dispute with the MCDC, the committee proposed that the club be dissolved. Fr O'Keeffe, C.C., and Dr Michael Cronin resolved the matter. The latter, a gifted scratch golfer, and competed in provincial golf championships. One year, he was beaten by the legendary Joe Carr in a quarter-final of a South of Ireland championship. He was club-captain twice and captain of Lahinch; and he developed an enormous Macroom medical practice. He won two Irish Senior Munster Cups with Muskerry and played with and against the best Irish amateurs of his day.

Thirty- two played in Miss O'Mahony's lady-captain's prize (1955) and the Ladies competed in a Junior League (1959). The West Cork Shield (men's) began in 1956. This has become an important and competitive feature of West Cork inter-club golf. The early 1960s saw no great change in Macroom GC. At the 1960 Ladies' AGM Mary Murray, niece of Abbey Theatre playwright T.C. Murray, became lady-captain and second-hand clubs were sought by advertisement. Ned Cahill, bank manager, was captain in 1961. A photo of Mary O'Regan presenting her captain's prize to Betty, her sister, shows a group of well-dressed ladies. The O'Regan family owned Howard's Mill, Crookstown. Macroom Ladies beat Bandon to win the Munster Intermediate League. By contrast in 1962 Ireland 49% of 14-16 year-olds were not in school (58% not in school {1944}).


But the club had problems. Only 10-12 attended the 1963 AGM; eighteen year-old Michael Kelleher became treasurer. At the 1964 AGM 'it was decided that for the coming year an all-out effort would be made to increase membership'. The dynamic Fr Buckley, Aghabullogue Catholic-Curate, joined in the mid-1960s and he introduced vibrancy, change and new members such as John Lynch and Graham McKay. One member thought that if he were a business competitor he'would clean you out.' It coincided with Lemass's 'rising tide'. At the 1965 Ladies' AGM, Secretary Grainger, reported 'satisfaction': and Anna O'Shea recorded a balance of £37-6-5. 100 attended a social in the Victoria Hotel.

In 1967 the inaugural Senior Scratch Cup was held in lovely weather day with the presence of several international golfers, many friends of Dr Michael Cronin. Of eighty-eight competitors, Bill Kelleher's 72 won. On a momentous day, the course had never seen such great





Iveleary's Chris Óg Jones was the star of the Cork victory over Westmeath in the Allianz National Football League R3 game at Páirc Uí Chaoimh. They wouldn't score again for the remaining eight minutes of the half as Westmeath reeled off the final five points, and only a superb Doyle double save from Cooney and Whittaker kept Cork ahead by the minimum at the break, 1-10 to 1-9.

Cork stretched three ahead with points from Jones and Colm O'Callaghan but Westmeath would soon establish their first lead, 2-12 to 1-12 with a goal, a two pointer and a point. Jones' second goal, after

being fed by Matty Taylor, moved Cork back ahead by the minimum with 18 minutes to play but back came Westmeath with another two-pointer. Jones levelled for Cork at 2-14 apiece before a fourth two-pointer had the Lake County back in front. The Rebels responded with the next three from McDonnell, O'Driscoll, and Cathail O'Mahony but another equaliser followed dfor Westnmeath. It was clear that the visitors were not going to roll over and Cork supporters were clearly worried but a magic moment saved the day for the home side with three minutes remaining.

After a Colm O'Callaghan point, Tommy Walsh supplied Jones for his hat-trick goal. The Iveleary man got possession to the right of the square, came across the defender and blasted the golden goal to the net. Cork were four points clear now but still nearly messed up, conceding a third goal, but were saved by the hooter! 

Macroom Clubs' Day, 1 February 2025. We had a stand at the annual 'Meet the Clubs' Day'. In a room full of stands representing the many sports, social and other organisation our 'pitch' was noticeable and visited. Brendan O'Brien, Catherine Coughlan, Pat Sheehy and Con constructed the display and attended the stall. Featuring were posters of past MHG talks, Macroom history books and items of the past. These included an old shop [ledger, Macroom ICA's minute books, an 1911 All-Ireland football medal, a War of Independence medal and an old cooking pot. It was particularly pleasing to see young people coming to view the display and ask very searching questions. We thank Paul Lynch for supplying the back-board and to all who helped. The effort was well worth it.

History Talk, 11 February, 2025. The subject was 'Macroom Golf Club 1925-2025'. In co-operation with the club, the talk was held in the Castle Hotel, with an attendance of about 115, a record for us. A lovely

display of trophies, old equipment, old photos and newspaper clipping enhanced the occasion. The golf club promoted the event well and golfers young and old, current and past present; they were a wonderful audience, created a great atmosphere and made a very generous contribution to the collection.

The club grew from the ashes of the War of Independence and the Civil War. Since 1925 it has survived the test of time and has provided much pleasure on sporting, social and economic levels to people from the area. Its journey was bumpy at times but all obstacles were surmounted. A course was created and maintained in the tough times of 1920s-1960s. Golf was played by few then, but with increased prosperity, better access to education etc., more people played golf. This infusion invigorated the club: a new clubhouse was built in 1973, the course extended in 1993/4 and a new clubhouse in 1997. Despite the further difficulties of the 1980s recession, the 2008 economic crash and the Covid epidemic, the

course is currently thriving in all sectors. Its history was outlined by Jim Morris, Margaret Buckley (ex Kilnagurteen) who spoke on the Ladies/Women's contribution and Con Kelleher and their inputs were well received

Brendan O'Brien was an excellent MC, Mick Walsh, Pat Sheehy and John Vaughan recorded the event, and Catherine Coughlan and Alan O'Rourke skilfully organised the hall, door and raffle. Current captains Margaret Keating and Gary Morris were the golf representatives and it was a pleasure and honour to work with them. The hotel had the venue in sparkling order, especially thanks to Rena O'Rourke, and the reception staff was pleasant, efficient and helpful at all times. THE SOD OF TURF KEPT US WARM MANY THE **COLD WINTERS NIGHT** OUR TRADITION AND HERITAGE.

It has always been a tradition here in the Lee -Valley and the Muskerry Gaeltacht going to the bog to cut turf in plenty of time for winter. Turf was an economic fuel for people with an open fire place or stove in the house.

Generally, when the weather gets very cold, like recently you can only heat one room in the house at the time with the open fire the turf fire brings great memories to me of my parents and grandparents sitting by a blazing turf fire telling stories and playing Irish music. Sometimes the fire was so hot I had to stand back from it. The garden shed was always full of good black turf ready for the winter. I often heard my parents say when the weather got very cold like we had recently they had a saying that the frost was so severe that it was splitting the stones and the stars were dancing in the sky.

Everything has changed now but not always for the better, the parents and grandparents have passed away now so we are on our own now like many more families. The parents and grandparents were very good to me and did their very best for me and gave me great advice. When I talk of change you cannot get the Bord Na Mona peat briquettes anymore. When I put some turf here in the fire I think of my parents and grandparents again talking about the frost being so severe that it was splitting the stones. To keep an open fire going today timber is the cheaper alternative we cut down an ash tree recently its great for burning and the timber is fine and hot. With the very cold weather its very important for older people to keep warm indoors and to wrap up well when going out and be careful walking especially with ice on the footpaths a fall could result in broken bones, with Gods help the cold windy weather will end, and we will have summertime to look forward to again.
