



#### Just imagine

Imagine that no more children will be born. That consequently human beings will be extinct perhaps before 2150. Those that are alive now would be the last that would ever be.

How would you think this would affect those of us who are current seniors. Would it really affect how we would live out the remainder of our lives?

Our children, our grandchildren, all our relatives and friends, everyone that we know will live out their life spans. All we would have lost is that which does not actually exist at all. Can we lose the non-existent. Would we have lost anything at all?

I do not know, but I can guess. I can imagine, that most of you are thinking -what a stupid guestion. Most will have an instinctual gut reaction, that not only would we have lost something, we would have lost a lot. Some would think we would have lost nearly

We would have lost our sense of who and what we are, lost meaning, lost purpose, and lost hope. We would have lost faith in the future. But we would adapt. Some of us would break away from any commitment to others. Society would mean nothing but unacceptable restrictions and restraints. Others would try to generate new meaning, to face these last days with some dignity and with courage - to not give in to the inclination to utter despair.

Luckily, this is only a thought experiment, it is not our

Our reality is that ninety seven percent of climate scientists are in agreement that global temperature is increasing at a rate that, if it continues to do so, it will have catastrophic effects. It could also risk a further spiral of unknowable effects. In a worst-case scenario for us it could potentially lead to most inhabited areas of the Earth's surface becoming unsuitable for human (or mammal) life.

There are though, the remaining three percent of our : climate scientists who don't agree. Unlike the first group, these are not asking us to do anything - we do not need to be concerned, we can continue just as we have been. Some take consolation from those three percent, and it is indeed the case too that not all of them are working for vested interests.

Europe seems to be preparing for the worst these days and not just in defense. The Paris Agreement aimed to keep global warming well below 2°C, but France has just announced an adaptation plan to prepare for a 4°C hotter world by 2100.

It will be difficult for our younger generations and the generations to come, to adapt to a world of mighty heat waves, food shortages, and collapsing ecosystems that 4°C hotter would bring. And it won't be easy for them to pay for it either since some actuaries anticipate that climate change will shrink global GDP by 50% by 2070. On the other hand, many in many parts of the world have trusted the validity of the warning from the vast majority of our climate scientists and are taking action and taking it now. Renewable energy is now more than fifty percent of energy usage across many parts of Europe. This has come about rapidly. There are lots of grounds for hope and confidence. We do know that the major historical contributor to greenhouse gases has withdrawn from the Paris Agreement. But what we deemed as necessary for us to do does not become unnecessary because others change their minds. To the contrary, it has become more important. We cannot control the world or the actions of others. All we can do is address our own actions, meaning in this case our own carbon footprint.

Kilmurry Active Retirement Association had a meeting on the 11th March. Among the decisions made that evening was to embark on a project to educate ourselves on what are the realistic and cost-effective options and opportunities, that we, those of us in our

latter years of life, have to reduce or offset our carbon footprints. We hope to welcome fellow learners and those we can learn from to Kilmurry, Crookstown and elsewhere. Wouldn't it be great if we could learn together. Wouldn't it be even better if some of us in this beautiful Lee Valley could work together too in putting what we may learn into practice. If you are interested in learning, teaching or working with us, we would love to hear from you.

In other news we are back in full swing with our activities. We have a new social committee that are arranging and organising our activities for us. As I write this all the talk is about the mystery coffee crawl next Wednesday 19th. We have Keep fit both in Kilmurry and Crookstown on Monday evenings, Buff bones in Crookstown on Tuesdays at 1.30, aqua aerobics courtesy of the Castle Hotel on Wednesdays at 10am. #### **MACROOM HISTORY**

### Dan Cronin's talk on 'GAA and other local History Memorabilia'

Dan Cronin (postman) has a wonderful collection of programmes, mostly GAA, and other items that are not only a record of that activity but tell much of Macroom's past social life. He shared some of his many pieces to an audience of about thirty-five Group on Tuesday, 11 March 2025 in the Castle Hotel. The evening was organised by Macroom History Group and kindly sponsored by Macroom GAA Club. Gerry (Cooper) Kelleher, as M.C., knitted together the occasion neatly and deftly.

At the beginning, Dan explained that his family was very good at keeping things, 'collecting' and not 'hoarding', of course. He began collecting in the early 1980s and has scrapbooks dating from that time. He mentioned the late Thomas Creedon's exploits and his tragic early demise as boosting his interest. Thomas, along with Colman Corrigan and 'Shan' Moloney, featured in some of his slides. Liam Walsh gave Dan many items and this was a considerable fillip to and spur for the collection. Others donated generously as time passed.

The power-point presentation began with photos of the Post Office staff of the 1950s/'60. John, Dan's father, featured in these. Naming those photographed varied from being easy to impossible. Another of John's interests was Canovee GAA Club, and he was secretary/treasurer for a period. It was fascinating to see committee meeting reports, bills and receipt from that time. Notably, at one point, Canovee was in dispute with Cloughduv and formed a hurling club; it arranged a match against Macroom. The schism was short-lived and Canovee concentrated on football.

Club and inter-county programmes are a rich source for Dan. He showed many All-Ireland programmes and these were sourced locally and from farther afield. For example he had some examples of signed programmes, notably of the Kerry-Offaly final

saw Offaly deny Kerry its 5-in-a-row. Others were gained at auctions or in exchanges. Dan noted that there were about 100 'serious' collectors of GAA memorabilia country-wide, with many having special areas of interest. Sadly, Cork does not have its own GAA museum.

Photos of the great Macroom teams of the past were prominent and ranged from the 1909-13 era (winners of four senior counties and the Croke Cup) to 1926 (Denny Counihan was captain), to the 1930s (Denis 'Muttie O'Brien and Con 'Knockie' Cronin were the skippers), to the Mick Goold- (1959) and the Hugo Casey-led (1962) victorious sides. Intermediate, junior, U-21, minor and other Macroom underage successful team programmes and photos featured.

Non-sports items included programmes and photos from pantomimes, concerts, Gilbert and Sullivan operettas and the Macroom Mountain Dew Festival. It also had items on Macroom Agriculture Show which was a big event in its day. Advertisements in the various local programmes were interesting and his trip down memory lane was nostalgic and moving. Relatives of some of the stars referenced enjoyed the mentions of the heroic exploits of their forebears. Dan's collection also has golf, Pitch & Putt, Fianna Fáil and Liverpool F.C. pieces as well as many sports books, especially Cork Club histories. Pride of place is taken by Barry O'Brien's 'Macroom GAA Club History 1886-1987'.

Dan's depth of knowledge is even more impressive than his collection: he delivered his talk with passion, grace and skill and in a very erudite way. At the end, one person commented that 'he saw his life being unwound before his eyes'.

John O'Mahony (Mac. GAA) presented Dan with a memento of the talk. It was a pleasure to listen. Dan deserves our gratitude for assembling and sharing his brilliant collection.







#### **MACROOM GAA NEWS GAA – ALLIANZ NATIONAL LEAGUES 2025**

#### Allianz Football League Div 2 - Round 6 Cork 1 - 23 Louth 0 - 18

Cork footballers had a decisive win over Louth in their second last Allianz National League encounter at SuperValuPáirc Uí Chaoimh, led from start to finish, and secured the two invaluable league points as they battle to avoid relegation to Div 3 and gain a place in the All Ireland Sam Maguire series. Cork were more purposeful in their all round play and the forwards landed some fine scores to reward good approach work. The Mid Cork trio on duty, Neil Lordan at corner back, Colm O'Callaghan at midfield and Chris Óg Jones at full forward all played well for Cork.

Cork started well assisted by the wind, and showed they were targeting two-pointers from the start. Brian O'Driscoll had an early two-pointer and Chris Óg Jones and Rory Maguire added white flags for a four-point head start. Louth replied through Sam Mulroy's twopoint free. O'Driscoll had his second two-pointer from play before Louth response. Cork would score nine of the final 10 points from there to the break. Mark Cronin punished a Louth breach of the 4v3 structure with a two-point free and the corner-forward would later add another when an opponent didn't hand the ball back after a foul – new rules observance important here. Cronin kicked another point and was then denied a goal by a fine save but play was called back for him to tap over the advanced mark. Hurley's free made it a six-point streak and 0-15 to 0-4 at half-time and Cork looked in control.

Louth's Mulroy showed his capabilities in the second half with some fine scores but Cork were never going to let thus game slip away from them and kept the scoreboard ticking over, and went into a 15-point lead. Colm O'Callaghan scored a point and then slammed in a smashing goal in the 43rd minute after combining with Ian Maguire in a forceful run down the centre. Louth stayed in the game with a run of fine scores from outside the arc and had the gap between the teams down to eight points but Cork stayed in control.

This win has Cork in a position where a win over Cavan would guarantee their Div 2 survival but Cavan have now put themselves in a position where they could yet get promotion so the game in Cavan will be a real test for Cork. Cork play Munster championship against Limerick in a few weeks time (Sat, April 5th at 6pm) so need to maintain their improved form. The winners of that quarter final play Kerry in the semi final on Sat April 19th in Cork if Cork qualify.

# Ten Gears Ago - Tom Creedon Cup Final 2015

The 2015 competition was very efficiently run over a four week period and intermediate grade side Cill na Martra won the competition for the very first time defeating Premier Intermediate side Kiskeam in the

Cill na Martra won the Tom Creedon Cup competition for the very first time at a sunny Macroom on Sunday last (Feb 2015) and served due notice on all teams in the Intermediate football championship that they are going to be a force to be reckoned with when that competition begins in a couple of months time. Cill na Martra were fully deserving of this latest victory and have a strong panel composed of some very solid experienced players and a multitude of skilful young footballers who are maturing well. Their enthusiasm and self belief allowed them to overcome a disappointing first half performance to sweep Kiskeam off the park in the latter stages.

Conditions at Macroom could not have been better with warm glorious sunshine and a pitch in excellent condition. The first half was however for both teams eminently forgettable but for Kiskeam ultimately disastrous. The Duhallow men led by 0-3 to 0-2 at the break but could have had two goals to their credit at this stage, Cill na Martra goalkeeper Antoin Ó Conaill twice denying them with brilliant saves. In a half where scores were at a premium, Kiskeam with led by 0-2 to nil when awarded a penalty in the 20th minute. Gene Casey's spot kick was well struck but O'Conaill got a foot to the ball and deflected it out for a fruitless '45'. Minutes later Casey was put through but again his fine effort was saved by the Cill na Martra man and after Seán O'Sullivan pointed a Kiskeam free in the 25th minute, Cill na Martra found the range at last and finished the half with two points, from Kevin Hoare and Danny Ó Conaill, to be only the minimum in arrears at this stage. They were fortunate to be so close as their finish had been very poor (seven wides) and Kiskeam did have slightly the better of the exchanges for most of the half.

Cill na Martra made two effective substitutions at the break and were the dominant team in the second period. 

#### MUSIC VIDEO LAUNCH & PRESENTATION FROM LOCAL SONGWRITER & ECOLOGIST

#### **Laura McCarthy** Supported by MDEG (Macroom District **Environmental Group)**

Hi! Chris Barrett here!

On 15th February, I was very happy to join Laura McCarthy in Macroom Library for a short presentation of her latest release and be part of the following discussion on the landscape and nature in crisis.

There was a varied feel to the afternoon and I was very happy to hear her also sing, and play guitar, accompanied by Tom Jordan on the clarinet.

The centrepiece of the video was a place called "Glasin na Marbh", which translates as little stream of the dead and can be found in Killarney National Park. Here Laura presented us with haunting photographs of the landscape in crisis following the fire shortly after the worst of the major pandemic.

Trees were burned and the poem

"Ghost of the Woods" ,reflected this destruction fittingly.

An interactive discussion of Landscape and Nature in crisis followed with "Glasin na Marbh", being used as an example.

We were reminded of the Silence of Extinction with 60% of birds now in decline. From 2008 the butterfly population has halved and a third of bees are threatened with extinction. Since the 1980s there has been a 98% decline in curlew numbers. We have only about 100 breeding pairs of Hen Harriers left. They have declined by a third since 2015. Laura reminded the audience that the Hen Harrier is an apex predator and its demise, as a hunter, reflects the failure of other species to survive.

Sadly the Hen Harrier is not the only upland species to be in trouble or to have disappeared.

The Killarney fern, the Marsh Fritillary, the Red Grouse, White tailed eagle, Golden eagle and Ring Ouzel or :

mountain blackbird are all being pushed towards extinction, while the Capercaillie and the Mountain Ringlet butterfly, the wolf and lynx are now extinct.

Going back to the walk shown on the video "In the ghost of the Woods", historic cutaway peat can be seen recovering from Fire, along with dying hollies...a 'Barrenscape in the Making', where rhododendrons are able to take over. The attempts of native oak to resprout is thwarted by non-native sika deer. The rhododendron is poisonous and left ungrazed. Tussock grass is able to thrive after fire and exclude other heathland species. The environment therefore supports fewer pollinators.

If we consider how our landscape has changed since famine times, we can see clues to pre-famine settlement such as 'lazy beds'. As the past is key to the present, archeologists study such features as Lazy Beds which are so much part of our culture.

"Only lazy beds rising and falling like the tide of tenants."

Lazy beds are not agricultural. They reflect the desperation of people pushed into the uplands by the pressure of population etc. Somehow people survived there. Was the land more fertile then?

Glaisin na Marbh appears in the Glena Pre-Famine Applotment Books (1823 -1837) and records rent paid for tax purposes, listing the people who lived in the area.

Rent was paid communally by people in these settlements and the land quality was described as middling -coarse - bad.

Laura continued our discussion by considering whether Landscape perception is a barrier to nature restoration. People see a landscape, and focus on different features both in the present and in the future. We have control over our own area but not the bigger landscape. Poor focus, understanding e.g the John **Fire Devastation** 

Hynde postcards showing beautiful rhododendrons change our perception of what could and should be. "...our tolerance for environmental degradation increases and our expectations are lowered."

In looking at what we can do to support nature in crisis, it is important that we understand that beauty doesn't have to be the same as morally good. e.g. a Rhododendron walking festival does not highlight and encourage what is best for nature. Some people have had so little exposure to native woodland that they settle for using promoted conifer trails whilst sadly being unaware of the wonders of native woodland, although here eroded trails may be an issue for the inexperienced.

There is also the recreational aspect of conifer plantations where conifers are planted as a result of short term economic decisions. We are part of the environment we know and we need to shift our base line to respect rewilding over convenience. We do not as a country comprehend the difference between Forestry (conifers planted for profit) and a Forest growing in harmony with the nature around it. A forestry model such as that promoted by Coelte does not encourage native woodland. For real forest we need to look at and protect the Killarnev National Park. I am really grateful to Laura McCarthy for sharing her knowledge as an ecologist and her musical skill with us. I found I was made more aware of nature in crisis, and I really look forward to hearing more of her music in the future.

## NITRATES REDUCTIONS SHOWS FARMERS' EFFORTS ARE STARTING TO PAY OFF - MEP KELLEHER

- STOP THE DEMONISATION OF IRISH DAIRY FARMERS -

"Perhaps the demonisation of Ireland's dairy farmers can now stop," asks Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher following the publication of a report showing nitrogen levels in Irish rivers are at their lowest in eight years. Kelleher was responding to a new EPA report showing a significant reduction in nitrogen levels in Irish rivers. "Anti-farmers have used rising nitrogen levels in Irish waters to try and beat up Irish agriculture, and, in particular, the dairy sector. This needs to stop.

"Over the last decade, the dairy community in Ireland have done everything that has been asked of them in terms of mitigating the effects of dairy farming on the Irish environment.

"We now have clear evidence that their work has made a positive impact. It is clear that we can reduce nitrogen levels without cutting the legs from under our thriving dairy sector.

"We are now on the right track. The Irish Government

can go with confidence to the European Commission and seek the maintenance of the derogation.

"Of course more work needs to be done, but we know that what we have been doing is working. Let's keep going," concluded Kelleher.



And in his example, we find not just inspiration, but a call to action, a reminder that peace is possible, if we have the courage to seek it, the faith to believe in it,

For in the end, the greatest tribute we can pay is to continue the work he began, to build the peace he dreamed of, to be the bridge he walked on, and to carry his light

into the dark places of the world. One destiny, One land, One people, One man. Just a thought.



# A Word of Victory

#### "Is anyone thirsty – come and drink, even if you have no money! Come, take your choice of wine or milk - it's all free! Why spend your money on food that does not give you strength? Why pay for food that does you no good? Listen to me, and you will eat what is good, you will enjoy the finest food" (Isaiah 55:1-2 NLT).

Welcome back dear student, I hope you enjoyed a fabulous St. Patrick's Day. It's common to see folks enjoying green ice cream or green beer to celebrate — the latter may cause some to be worse for wear. The Word of God has much to say about food and drink, yet some of it seems contradictory, so let's delve a bit deeper. "Wine produces mockers; alcohol leads to brawls. Those led astray by drink cannot be wise" (Proverbs 20:1). How interesting — another translation says ... 'wine IS a mocker and strong drink a brawler', meaning there is a spirit attached to alcohol. And that demon brings its attributes to the one dependent upon drink. It's not called the demon drink for nothing! This is not a word of condemnation friend, generally people binge drink for a reason. There's nothing wrong with a social drink, but it's so easy to fall into addiction, and foolish to ignore that much can lead to broken relationships and even abuse.

"It is not for kings, O Lemuel, to guzzle wine. Rulers should not crave alcohol. For if they drink, they may forget the law and not give justice to the oppressed. Alcohol is for the dving, and wine for those in bitter distress. Let them drink to forget their poverty and remember their troubles no more" (Proverbs 31:4-7). Here, the mother of King Lemuel was giving her son wisdom, so that he would lead with integrity and success. There is a culture amongst some that the more you can drink, the bigger the person you are. But God's Word is clear in this advice: craving alcohol is a trap that leads to problems . . . . 1) forgetting God's ways and entering into sin, allowing bondage take hold, causing that one to do things they would have never done had they not been drinking. 2) Alcohol can open the door to a spirit of death — not just physical sickness, but failure immorality, broken relationships, lost dreams, and poverty.

The Word explains that people drink for a reason - to numb pain and torment from past trauma, or problems currently endured. These wounds aren't solved by drink: it just makes one forget - for a while. This is not how God planned for His people to live, as it brings curse, hopelessness, and isolation - the opposite of the Freedom and Life Jesus gives (Galatians 5:1). Often lovely people begin depending on drink to heal pain, but the cure ends up worse than the original problem and leads further into a dark world of homelessness, drugs, prostitution, loneliness, and brokenness. So why does God offer wine in the lead Scripture? There are two types of wine listed in the Word. The spirit the world offers may taste good and give temporary relief, but the wine the Holy Spirit gives brings JOY that lasts (Ephesians 5:18-19; Romans 14:17). Jesus said 'I Am the Vine you are the branches' (John 15:1-16). John saw a day of judgement and famine coming, with God protecting those part-taking of His oil and wine (Revelation 6:6; Malachi 3:18-4:2). In Scripture, Oil refers to the Holy Spirit — His Presence fuels God's fire upon us, radiating with the Power of His Love for His children (Psalm 34:5; Matthew 25:3). God's wine is an end product: the fruit of real relationship with the Lord Jesus, Who leads us by His Spirit into True Peace.


