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Kilmurry Active Retirement GETS CLIMATE GRANT-

Kilmurry Active Retirement association is receiving funding from the Climate Actions Work Engagement fund to support our work to bring people together and share information on climate action. This fund is focused on climate engagement, awareness and communications - helping communities to reach new audiences in their locality. It provides opportunities for community groups to spread the message of community-led climate action.

Last week the Minister for the Environment, Climate and Communications Darragh O'Brien, and the Minister for the Circular Economy Alan Dillon announced the awarding of €500,000 worth of grants nationally. The grants range from €2,500 for awareness (which we got), to €10,000 for engagement and communications (which we didn't apply for), is being distributed to 96 community groups and organisations around the country.

Kilmurry Active Retirement association currently has 82 members. While we have engaged in many activities over the past ten years, many of us are concerned too about global warming and its impact on our descendants. While most of us have done our attic insulation, double glazing and draughtproofing for comfort and economy, we want to do more. But most older people live in older houses. Extensive refits are often not financially justifiable given our anticipated limited lifespan. We have insufficient understanding of the range of additional options that are available to us and that are also reasonable for our age cohort. Not to leave it at just frustration we applied for this climate actions funding. We are motivated to educate ourselves about personal, community and wider network options, with a view to seeing what, collectively, we can do for ourselves, our community, and perhaps the wider area of our beautiful Lee Valley. We aim to learn about realistic and cost-effective ways for older adults to reduce and/or offset our carbon footprints.

With the benefit of this fund, we now hope to welcome fellow learners and those we can learn from to events in Kilmurry and Crookstown, and we intend to travel to visit other communities from whom we can learn. We did suggest in our application that our project could be seen as a pilot. For those who may be interested the next call for applications will be in the autumn, and the fund is administered by Community Foundation Ireland, to whom applications are made. But in the meantime, we would love all those interested in climate change mitigation to join us in this learning

Our project aims to address two key questions. The first is: Can our active retirement association provide learning opportunities tailored to the needs of our members and our community, so that our older people are supported and enabled to take rational, appropriate, and cost-effective climate actions to reduce or negate their carbon footprints, where motivated to do so?

This will involve providing educational talks that are specifically tailored for older adults. We intend that these will focus on practical and actionable steps we can take to minimize our carbon footprints. The aim is to empower ourselves with the knowledge and tools required to make informed decisions about our contributions to climate action.

The second question the project intends to address is: Can we act as a catalyst to build a broader community network. By fostering collaboration and solidarity, can we help to create a robust community network? Such a network could bring together various stakeholders, including individuals, local organizations, and policymakers, to work collectively towards a common goal, such as to develop a comprehensive action plan that addresses the collective carbon footprints of all network members.

Regardless of how we get on addressing those questions we hope by the end of this year to have

- Increased awareness and understanding of climate issues among older adults.
- Enhanced capacity of older adults to take effective climate action.
- Played some part in promoting a cohesive community network committed to climate action.
- · And perhaps even be seeking follow on funding to prepare a comprehensive action plan aimed at reducing the collective carbon footprints of all community network members.

We are hoping that this novel project represents a significant step towards engaging and empowering older adults in climate action. By providing tailored learning opportunities and encouraging a robust

community network, the project aims to make a meaningful contribution to climate change mitigation. Through collective efforts, we will be better equipped to take rational, appropriate, and cost-effective actions to reduce our carbon footprints and promote a more sustainable future.

In other news we are certainly back in full swing with our activities. Our new social committee are arranging and organising lots of, and a great range of, activities for us. The Quirky Kitchen was the destination of our mystery coffee crawl on Wednesday 19th March. A great find for us, and over thirty of us were very well looked after, and a lovely quirky place it is indeed, thank you. Mary and Trish were the attractions again on Wednesday 26th in Kilmurry and they added scootch. I hear it was enjoyed by all there. Ireland's Weather

Newsletter

Weather from around the world

Spring is the new summer, perhaps unsurprising some might say. Traditionally a season of great variability, a period of change, and indeed meteorologically speaking this can indeed be period of great oscillations as the elements of fire and ice do battle over the often turbulent waters of the Atlantic, with Ireland caught firmly in the firing line between east and west ;perhaps also geopolitically too. Yet this year has been different, though perhaps for its indifference, with our weather in March being particularly settled, with little rainfall, above average sunshine hours and thankfully, a return to milder temperatures which have risen as high as 18.8 degrees Celsius across parts of the country, warm enough to draw a return of the innumerous enlarged plastic 99's from outside various market stores and filling stations across the highways and byways with parched farmers melting in comfort across the cabs of their busy tractors which too have been drawn from their winter slumber by the long evenings and even more so by the firming of the soils, which in some places are starting to resemble cracked mosaics.

As I write this article on the 24th of March, sometime ahead of publication, the forecast calls for another relatively settled week of weather with high pressure never too far away from the southern tip of Ireland and the many headlands of Cork, and after a brief dip in the waterproof canopy of blue that has more often than not of late sat above the vibrant green verdure of the Irish countryside later this week the weather, in the medium to long range, looks very settled. Indeed, commencing on the week of the 31st it appears as though a large anticyclone will become stationary close to or indeed over Ireland, allowing for an exceptionally dry easterly wind to develop across Ireland, and while temperatures in the middle of spring can still be on the chilly side when crossing the not yet warmed plains of central Europe, do look set to bring plenty of spring sunshine, which in itself is often sufficient to warm the hearts and spirits of those who have known all too well the cloud of sorrow that past spells of flooding and incessant rain which can bring hardships for those tending the land. But the dry weather is not without its own complications, and indeed just across the border in Kerry, on the sun dried gorse-crowned mountains of the Iveragh peninsula, a number of wildfires sparked to life through unintended, though from a naturalists perspective, unethical land burnings. Powered by years of dried matter, bushes, grasses, and a stiff northeasterly wind this line of fire devoured the narrowing darkness between the fires front and the ambered glow of the villages of Derrynane and Caherdaniel beneath the churning smog that streamed across a penchant sea. Numerous crews from the Kerry fire service attended the scene of the blaze where for a time the safety of a number of homes was very much called into question. Such wildfires were repeated right along the west coast of Ireland from Derrynane in the southwest to Leenaun in Galway, through Erris in northwest Mayo and eventually into the many hills and valleys of Donegal. Coming of the backs of two rather wet years in 2023 and 2024 there's considerable fuel seeking combustion across our uplands, and with continued drier than average conditions forecast my fear is across the midlands, west and north of





that such scenes may well be repeated over the coming weeks of what could well turn out to be one of the driest starts to spring since records began.

The development of and the extent of drought conditions are not entirely unusual in the context of Ireland's meteorology, though overall the frequency of such events are expected to increase due to changes in our climate. A seminal study by Noone et. al. in 2017 highlighted several periods over the past 250 years where Ireland has experienced a greater occurrence of drought conditions, with the seven periods of 1854-1860, 1884-1896, 1904-1912, 1921-1923, 1932-1935, 1952-1954 and 1969-1977 being identified as years during which droughts were far more frequent in Ireland. Completed in 2017, the study never had the opportunity to include the droughts of the summer of 2018, or indeed spring 2020, and perhaps later this spring the drought of 2025 (though nature could well prove me to be premature in my writing). But, with March both in and out like a lamb, and with the forecast calling for a greater prevalence of high pressure than normal, one must begin to consider the possibility that Ireland and Cork could well be on the verge of droughtlike conditions this spring.

Weekly Outlook Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday 31st March and 1st / 2nd April

A large blocking anticyclone is expected to develop close to or to the northeast ofIreland, clocking out any typical rain bearing weather systems to our west andensuring a dry, settled couple of days with pleasant sunshine. The warmesttemperatures will be

the country as ourwinds will be in the southeast which will make it feel cooler with onshoresoutheasterly winds taking the edge off the temperatures here.

Thursday & Friday 3rd / 4th April

Similar days are expected on Thursday and Friday this week with high pressure again firmly in control. Perhaps the slight risk of a shower or two popping up across southwest Munster, but that will be the exception rather than the rule with generally sunny weather prevailing once more. Highs on both days again reaching up to the mid to high teens across the country in light southeasterly winds once again.

Saturday & Sunday 5th / 6th April

Very little change expected over the weekend with settled weather once againdominating as high pressure remains the dominant feature of our weather. Windswill be from a more easterly direction by then, with values perhaps dropping offever so slightly, but with plenty of sunshine expected it will remain pleasantlywarm in the sunshine for all. highs once again in the mid to high teens across the country.

Extended outlook

The forecast may sound repetitive, but thankfully high pressure looks set toremain as the dominant feature of our weather into next week also, with pleasantspells of sunshine expected once more as our winds continue to originate from adrier easterly direction. There are some signs that it may turn colder with a chanceof a more northeasterly airflow developing, but it would remain largely dry andsunny

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
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












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
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Think Globally, Act locally GOBNAIT Ceoldrama nua le Alan Kiely, Kevin Connolly & Seán Óg Ó Duinnin

Hi! Chris Barrett here.

'Act Locally', has taken on a whole new meaning with today's piece. The acting and singing which I enjoyed when I watched this performance was truly outstanding for a local production.

On a cold dark and extremely wet night in February I drove out to the hall in Ballingeary with a friend. I had considered trying to cancel due to the weather, but two separate friends had already told me the production was incredible, and the hall was jammed packed.

I have seen 'Les Miserables', three times in London and was emotionally moved each time. What amazed me was that I felt the same involvement and overwhelming emotion when seeing 'Gobnait' in Ballingeary.

I am a blow-in who chose to live in this area nearly 30 years ago now, and I have two very good friends named 'Gobnait'. One of these is my closest neighbour, a Gobnait, who keeps bees, so I already felt a sense of connection; but all the same I was concerned that I would not be able to follow the action fully. Nothing could have been further from the truth.

The Irish was fully translated in a perfectly timely manner, instantly visible on the screen above my head and I felt I was very well able to follow the twists in the plot and fully enjoy every moment of this captivating performance.

It was a pleasure to see the pride and pleasure taken by both the cast and audience in such a sensitive and clever interpretation of the life of our much loved local

Gobnait was portrayed as a currently accessible heroine rather than a distant holy woman from the 6th century.

To have the audience stamping their feet with the

orchestrally enhanced, 'Gobnait. Gobnait', showed how immersed they had become in the whole performance; and the achievement of the writers who made it so accessible to people who were perhaps not habitual theatre-goers must be applauded.

I was aware of the enthusiastic whispering of

"Here she comes again", from a female behind me, as Gobnait reappeared on stage; rather as if Gobnait had been spotted once again in the street.

It was a touching reminder of how close Gobnait is to local people and this involvement between performers and audience grew throughout the play. I cannot fail to mention the amazing special effects which were extraordinarily well conceived and executed.

I imagine there was much discussion of how Gobnait managed her rowing etc.

I have had the great fortune to interview Padraig O' Duineen and ask him a little about the performance. I started by asking him what it was like to be a member of the cast in such an amazing play.

"It was brilliant. It was a very new experience for me so I took a while to realise that I was being supported by every other member of the cast. The feeling I have very clearly is that the connection between the cast, musicians and everyone else was the power that affected the audience."

I then asked which was Padraig's favourite bit, and he says it was saying the lines which defined reality at the time when the people knew they had signed up to his death. It was above all an Irish play and it would not be fair to only use the english language to describe it.

I have petitioned on bended knee, bearing in mind the importance of respecting Brehon tradition, that King, Ri Ardghal, (Padraig O'Diuinnin) speaks to you in the local language as used by Gobnait and the actors. This will give you a feeling for the events which led up to

such a wonderful performance. and what it was like to appear as an actor.....







MILAGE FRAUD IS RIPPING OFF INNOCENT CAR BUYERS - NÍ MHURCHÚ

EU Commission estimate up to half of all second-hand cars traded within the EU have been clocked. MEP, Cynthia Ní Mhurchú, calls for immediate EU legislation to combat milage fraud in our second hand car market. Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú says she is not surprised at recent reports from the Competition and Consumer Protection Commission that car related complaints make up a large part of calls to their helpline. She has called for a pan-European mileage database to deal with the wide spread issue of car clocking or mileage fraud in our second hand car market in Europe.

Car clocking falsely inflates the value of older cars, scams innocent car buyers into paying more for a car and has a knock on impact on road safety and environmental targets as older, more worn, less environmentally friendly cars are passed off as newer

An EU Parliament report from 2018 says that car clocking or milage fraud in second-hand cars is widespread in cars traded across EU borders and is estimated to affect up to 50% of second hand cars bought and sold. Ní Mhurchú, a new member of the Transport Committee that commissioned this

report, has criticised the lack of action on it within the European Parliament and is pushing for action on car clocking and milage fraud in our second hand car market in Furone.

"More than 60 million second-hand cars are sold every year in the EU yet we have no single EU law to stop car clocking. Young people are spending their hard earned money on second hand cars only to find they have been scammed. Clocked cars are a danger on our roads, and a threat to the legitimate dealerships who are selling high quality second hand cars all over Ireland"

Ní Mhurchú says it is understandable that a study by the Transport committee of the European Parliament found that 34% of people who bought a second hand car did not know or did not ask about the milage on the car.

"People are not mechanics. They buy a car to get from A to B in good faith and they trust in the system to protect them. Right now, it is failing them across Europe and we need to fix that"

A European Parliament report from the Transport Committee estimates the economic impact of : odometer fraud on the EU to be in the region of between €6bn and €9bn. Despite this, Ní Mhurchú pointed out that odometer fraud is only a criminal offence in six EU Member States, including Ireland. She has called for car clocking to be made a criminal offence across all EU member states in forthcoming EU roads legislation and that the EU would institute an EU wide milage database similar to Belgium's car pass system. She has also said legislators will work with car manufacturers to make car clocking less easy to do.

Ní Mhurchú also described car clocking as a serious safety issue,

"Cars have scheduled maintenance based on their mileage. If the mileage is wrong-then the maintenance will be wrong, leading to a situation where brake pads may be worn, engines may not be correctly serviced, all of which impacts on safety on our roads in Ireland" The Ireland South MEP said clocking a car is all too easy

"I have watched online videos where people are using devices to alter a cars milage in minutes. It is too easy and this is something we have to work with car manufacturers on"

IRELAND WILL MISS ITS 2030 OFFSHORE WIND ENERGY TARGETS ACCORDING TO EIRGRID - MEP KELLEHER

- 27% OF 5GW TARGET BEING REACHED BY 2030 IS UNACCEPTABLE -

"It's now abundantly clear that Ireland will miss its: own 2030 offshore wind energy targets, and urgent remedial action is required if we are to get anywhere close to them," says Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher.

Kelleher was commenting after the publication of a new report by Eirgrid into Ireland's possible future energy consumption.

"Included in this report was the startling admission that offshore wind capacity will only reach 1.35GW by 2030, which is only 27% of the existing national target of 5GW.

"We are failing, and failing badly. If we do not ramp up our offshore capacity, and in other renewables, we risk, as a country, facing the choice of burning gas and oil or allowing our economy to stagnate and decline.

"The last Minister for Energy took a very hands-off approach to offshore wind energy. I am calling on the

new Minister, Darragh O'Brien to get stuck in, and help: turn the tide.

"Working with Minister Dooley, who is responsible for marine mapping, Minister O'Brien needs to overcome the bureaucratic barriers stopping Ireland from reaching its full potential.

"Ireland has the potential to be a wind energy super power. Yet, we are failing miserably.

"We need a fundamental re-appraisal of our planning and permitting system; we need major investment in our grid system. We need the mapping of our waters expedited as quickly as possible.

"Major investment is needed in our deep-water port capacity if we are to be able to service the turbine construction sector.

"While the Celtic Interconnector is due to become operational in 2026/2027, we need to start planning

additional connectors to ensure Ireland can export excess wind energy.

"There must be mandatory, guaranteed timelines certainty for planning and permitting. Investors are afraid of tying up their capital in projects in Ireland that could take up to a decade

to get a return on their investment.

"There is no time to lose. Other countries are moving ahead of us. It shouldn't be like this, and the new Government cannot hang about if we are to make the most of our potential," concluded Kelleher.



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












"Then Pharaoh said to Joseph, 'I had a dream last night, and no one here can tell me what it means. But I have heard that when you hear about a dream you can interpret it'? 'It is beyond my power to do this' Joseph replied, 'but God can tell you what it means and set you at ease" (Genesis 41:15-16 NLT).

Welcome back dear student, continuing on studying dreams. Last week we saw that some dreams are from God, and some aren't. Whether we respond to meaningful dreams is up to us. Some frightening dreams are just nightmares: a visitation from the enemy but other seemingly scary dreams are significant, like the one Pharaoh had here. It really disturbed him, so he called his magicians and wise men to see if they could interpret it for him. No one could. Then one of his aides remembered that when he had a dream in prison, a Hebrew prisoner called Joseph rightly interpreted his dream (Genesis 41:8-13). He spoke to Pharaoh, and Joseph was promptly brought out of prison to see the king. Joseph told Pharaoh that he had no power in himself for this, but God Whom he served – Yahweh, the Almighty Living God would answer. And he did!

The dream was an amazing warning of a coming drought that ended up affecting the world. Pharaoh remembered the details vividly. In God-dreams colours, sounds, smells, and vehicles are all symbolic and important. Joseph prayed and interpreted this dream that seven years of abundant harvests were coming, but they would be followed by seven years of dire famine. He told Pharaoh that God was giving time to be prepared, and not to waste the excess abundance due, but store it up wisely. Joseph told him that having the dream twice indicated it was certain, and now was the time to act upon what God had revealed, by placing someone in charge of preparation for what was coming. Pharaoh didn't need to think twice about it. He appointed Joseph as overseer for carrying

This dream not only saved Pharaoh and Egypt, but they ended up supplying the world with provision when the famine did come thanks to Joseph's discernment and planning (Genesis 41:57). Joseph was elevated from the prison to the palace - not because of some psychic gift, but because of his relationship and dependence upon the Lord. " For the household gods utter nonsense, and the diviners see lies; they tell false dreams and give empty consolation. Therefore, the people wander like sheep; they are afflicted for lack of a shepherd" (Zechariah 10:2). People often look to horoscopes, mediums, or fortune-tellers for wisdom, but that is consulting a lying spirit that is not from God – but from the kingdom of darkness. It needs to be repented of because it is an open door to destruction and generational bondage. Dreams from God are life-giving, life-promoting, offering deliverance and freedom in Christ. Like the verse says the people are afflicted for lack of a shepherd. Pharaoh was the ruler in his kingdom, but he understood that he did not have the answers, nor did any of those who practiced powerful magic in his palace. Only God had the answer, and once he was willing to listen to the Lord's counsel, prosperity followed (Isaiah 9:6-7). Even though his dream terrified him, it was actually a good dream, and God brought redemption through his obedience to the message! God later spoke to Mary's husband Joseph, and Paul, Peter, and Corneilius to name but a few, in dreams and visions, and He's still giving revelation knowledge today (Matthew 2:12-23; Acts chapters 9 & 10; Job 33:14-18). Bring your dreams to the Lord Jesus for His Spiritual Counsel friend, Amen.

A matter of taste

Have you ever noticed what happens you have a delayed reaction to a food you are tasting for the first time? It might take a few seconds for you to decide whether you like it or not. We are conflicted. The reason is our taste buds.

Science tells us that there are 4 types of taste buds in the human tongue sweet, sour, bitter and salty.

Sweet taste buds are at the tip of the tongue, and hence some bitter-sweet foods are sweet to the taste at the tip first and therefore pleasing and invite us to try more only for us to experience a bitter aftertaste. Eating lemon sherbet boiled sweets is a good example of various taste sensations!

Funny how we apply that word 'taste' to other things in life. An old Latin saying goes - 'De gustibus non disputandum est' or 'There's no accounting for tastel' Be it books, films, art works.

But we can extend the image of taste to our decision-making.

Certain decisions we make, and some social situations seem attractive at first, but later we are dismayed or disappointed, leaving a bitter aftertaste.

In a culture that emphasizes choice, we might forget some choices are always wrong in themselves with disastrous consequences. Sin has an allure, a gloss, like poison that's sweet to the taste but leaves toxic effects. Many sins are sweet and attractive - where something appeals to us. But all sin sours.

We use the term "juicy" gossip - indulging in the appeal of finding some juice on someone - only for them to walk into the room as we are talking about them! How sweet is it then?

It may seem appealing to us to lose our temper only for us to bitterly regret the look of hurt on someone's face as we vent. We cannot unsay what we have said in haste or passion.

It may be sweet to have that extra dessert at night only for us to wake up later with hearthurn.

The root of all sin is misplaced pride. We might declare to ourselves that in this instance what I say or do doesn't really make any difference so long as my choices only hurt me and not others.

But all sin is destructive. Sin severs my relationship with God, others and myself. Sin damages trust.

We all have some self-destruct button called moral weakness, and wounds which we try to cover up with a front instead of going to Christ for healing. It is an explanation for our behaviour - but not an excuse, however.

We are right now on the road of harming or healing in our daily choices: ourselves, others and our relationship with God.

We have a conscience. There is something such as healthy guilt or remorse but it is all too easy to give into rationalisation or minimalisation.

We need accountability in our lives if we are to be truly morally and spiritually healthy. Like a sponsor, counselor or priest.

We do not need to run and hide from God any longer, even though we often do when we sin repeatedly. God always forgives - if we let Him.

The hardest thing to swallow in the process is humble pie. But as for the joy of God's forgiveness - how sweet it is!


