

The judges were extremely impressed with both Ardilaun Patrols. In their feedback they congratulated them on their teamwork and understanding of





Macroom's Tidy Towns Submission for the SuperValu National competition was submitted ahead of the May 12th deadline date. As always a very comprehensive submission was made under the following headings: 1) Community - Your Planning and Involvement, 2) Streetscape and Public Places, 3) Green Spaces and Landscaping, 4) Nature and Biodiversity in your locality, 5) Sustainability - Doing more with less, 6) Tidiness and Litter Control, 7) Residential Streets & Housing Areas, 8) Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes. Tidy Towns Judging starts in June and finishes in August. We would ask that every property owner stand and look at their premises and ensure that the area outside is weed free, litter free, clean and painted adequately. There are still premises looking dirty and it would take five minutes for the owners or the workers to improve matters significantly. That's not too big of an ask and show your support to the volunteers who look after so many other things and public areas.

Our former secretary John Lyons has become a Climate Ambassador under the An Taisce Programme in 2025 and was elected to sit on Cork Co Co Strategic Policy Committee (SPC) on Environment, Climate Action and Biodiversity. All of this has led to many actions and initiatives and collaborations to date in 2025. Some of this includes working with an Ecologist on Habitat Mapping and a Biodiversity Plan for Macroom. There is also a new mini 'Nature Trail' in through Biodiversity Garden. Dozens of signs for trees shrubs were erected in recent weeks, together with some additional



signage in the Sensory garden and Fairy Garden. He is currently developing two 'Tree Trail' brochures with funding from An Pobal to highlight and promote the huge asset that exists in Masseytown and Colman's Park, which is currently been transformed to an amenity/biodiversity park.

First judging period for the Cork County Council Anti-Litter Competition has finished and Macroom is in third last place with 979 points out of a 1000. The problem areas were around Dunnes Stores, the Square Area and Chapel Hill Area. On the day of judging there was over 100 cigarette Butts found in these locations, so the next time, smokers be more mindful after finishing. A big well done to the residents in The Glenties and Gleann an Fhia for keeping their areas in pristine condition with no rubbish or Cigarette Butts

found. The second Judging period is from May 12th to May 21st and the chosen estate for the second period is Oakwood, so residents there are asked to ensure the estate is litter free. Some unknown part of the town centre or school area will also be judged each week. As part of the judging, selected stretches on Main Street, Laneways and the Town Square will be checked, with the focus been on litter, down to cigarette butts. These pieces of litter and cigarette butts will be counted, and marks will be lost accordingly.

On the 3oth of April St Joseph's National School did a litter pick for Action Day. They did the school grounds, Duggan's Lane, laneway next to Super Valu, near the Playground, The Castle Grounds and between the Bridge and the Fairy Garden. They were joined by Macroom Tidy Towns Volunteers Shiela Murphy and Liam Walsh.

A big Congratulations to three of our youth Volunteers Sean Cremin, Anna Konrad and Darragh Twomey on been nominated for a West Cork Garda Youth Awards under the Group award. They will be presented with Certificates in due course. A big thanks to Laszlo Horvath in Lidl for donating flowers that were planted in the Fairy Garden.

Volunteers have been busy over the last few weeks with litter picking, Cutting green areas in Housing Estates, keeping on top of usual work, Fairy Garden Maintenance and Planting, placing new signs in different locations around town, pruning and weeding. Minister for Climate, Environment and Energy and our presentation at the National Climate Stakeholder Forum 2025, and our upcoming 10th Anniversary celebration. Who said you only read bad news nowadays?

On the 29th of April we had our first two experts in Kilmurry speaking to us. We thought it best to start by exploring whether there are collaboration opportunities with those who care for most of our land. First up was Anthony Dineen, Climate and Sustainability Advisor, Teagasc, and he was followed by Michael Greaney representing the Forest Owners Co-operative society. Wow! Do we have a lot to learn. Nonetheless some of our members asked lots of questions too and educated us more as did the seven or eight very interesting non-members who accepted our open invitation and came along to join us. Thank you all, and particularly our two most knowledgeable speakers. It is great to learn of so much going on, and it is a spur on for us too. Will we be able to collaborate? We will see as we all learn more.

It was indeed a privilege to host our six adjoining Active Retirement Associations in Kilmurry on the 1st of May. OK, maybe we had a wee bit of pull, with Kathleen O'Shea, the Assistant Development Officer for the Munster region in our midst. Though maybe not, she is truly a fair and impartial woman. A cluster meeting allows us all to both learn from and to help each other, and that we did. It is inspiring to hear all the innovation around the Lee Valley. We availed of the opportunity to share details of our climate grant and to ask whether any other association would be interested in partnering with us should we be applying for a follow on larger one.

On the 2nd of May I attended the Macroom Alzheimer's Tea- Day organised by Aindrias Moynihan TD, a cause close to my heart due to past family experience and perhaps potentially future too. I took the opportunity to have a word with him. So, between the gigs and the reels as they say, four of our members met with Minister Darragh O'Brien at the National Climate Stakeholder Forum 2025, held on the 9th of May in Cork. He was most facilitative and interested in our project and we look forward to meeting him again.

It so happened that we were invited to make a presentation at the conference, an unlikely honour for us, who have much yet to learn.

This is the shortened gist of what we said:

We received €2500 from the climate activities fund. Our application for funding outlined the need. It is hardly surprising that most older people live in older houses. Most have picked off the low hanging fruit, the attic insulation, double glazing, and draughtproofing. Extensive refits may make sense

for our younger members but are just not financially prudent for many given our anticipated remaining lifespan. Nationally about one sixth of our age cohort are in poverty, about one third have little money, another third has some - and did not come by it easily, and so are careful about parting with it, and the rest one could say are relatively wealthy. Yet we all worry how we can make provision for potentially many years of health care needs. For instance, my aunt spent twelve years in a nursing home, my mother ten. If my wife and I needed that, it would cost about 1.5m. A majority will hopefully qualify for the fair deal scheme, yet many may not. But almost all want to live out their lives in their homes and would wish to have the wherewithal to do so themselves or with assistance without burdening either family or State. But don't we all know the future does not always unfold in accordance with our wishes. Making provision for contingencies is a financial priority for

Yet many of us are concerned about global warming and its impact on our descendants. We know that as things stand, we will be the first generation 'that knew but did not do'. We want to change that destiny. So, we want to educate ourselves. We want to find our way to contribute that makes sense for us. We want to learn not just about personal, but also community options and wider networking opportunities with a view to seeing what we can do together – outside our

Our generation are perhaps too inclined to seek to cushion our children. Given the current circumstances it would perhaps now be better for us to do so, by paying greater attention to the more hostile environment and social circumstances that they and their children will have to face. Surely it would be more rational for us to spend money to reduce global warming now when it is more effective than to save for our children to spend our money when it will be less effective. We may not be thanked for the money we leave, but we may be cursed for the environment we left behind us.



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An Update on DOMINIC'S DREAM for CURRAGHBEG NURSERY

Hi! Chris Barrett here again.

Today I am bringing you thoughts from Dominic Cullinane whose vision is to create a completely unique environment for you and your family to enjoy, catering for both children and adults alike.

In creating the gardens and grounds and all the extra features this nursery is doing things differently. By using all types of visual features in an artistic manner, for example a retaining wall made of bottles, a climbing frame made of reinforced steel and a huge curved seating area plastered and mosaiced in 'Gaudi style', this nursery is like no other nursery. The aim is to involve dozens of artists in creating different types of exciting installations throughout.

The centrepiece will be the 180 m long Wisteria tunnel which will be spectacular when in flower. The best time to appreciate this will be from May to June but there will be plenty to see there all year.

So now I am going to let Dominic walk you through the main gate, on the journey you will take.

You enter the Nursery, and on your left is the Green Room which has been created to host parties and events. It was built by Joe Mahoney and Noel Dennehy in 2018 and the decor was finished by the interior designer Ella Gazda.

Just before the Green room is our Beach Bar, with its big open space which hosts our weddings, parties and large groups. There you can also enjoy a coffee with cake with friends or on your own and settle down with a good book from our library. All our tables have access to boardgames if you have time to linger.

Our cakes are baked by Sandra, in house, and are delicious. Apple, cinnamon and walnut, carrot cake, orange and almond are just a few of her specialities. We also offer a large range of coffees, teas, soft drinks

Check out our Library and Design studio next to the Beach Bar. We offer Garden Design and Landscape services as part of our business, as well as a range of classes covering different skills such as furniture making, food growing, fermenting and foraging with more to be added in the coming months.

Hop from the Library to the Games room where you can play table tennis or Pool in a large covered area, which doubles up as our Potting Shed. Here it is no



trouble for us to plant up bespoke hanging baskets, window boxes and tubs for you.

Directly across from the Games room, Brendan O' Halloran's furniture is on display. All our furniture is made locally, from swing seats to picnic tables to Adriondack chairs. Brendan also teaches our onsite furniture making course. If you would like to take part in one of our 6 week courses, let us know. They run throughout the year.

Go up the ramp to the polytunnel and turn right. This will take you to the cantilevered deck. From here youngsters often descend down the hole in the tree which leads them into the willow tunnel. This takes you down to the LauraLynn hopscotch, coloured light blue and pink, the LauraLynn colours.

The wisteria tunnel takes you to the Hobbit house and the lake with the waterfall which is being developed. Up by the field and around will take you to the amphitheatre which will be used for performances in

Our picnic for LauraLynn is held on the 3rd weekend of June each year to help raise funds for an amazing charity. Each year we add new acts to provide an amazing day out. Last year we built Ireland's longest picnic table. Two choirs sang, two folk bands played as did a piper and a Boggle circus skills workshop performed for the children.

From the Amphitheatre, walk to the upper reservoir and water garden, where we are currently building a patio area complete with hot tub.

Then on to the Nursery area, where you can buy hundreds of varieties of trees, shrubs, herbaceous perennials, grasses, alpines, seasonal bulbs and bedding plants.

We look forward to seeing you at Ireland's most unique Nursery.

Most importantly, we are looking for people who want to join us artistically, to create features here, or support us in any way possible. If you have an idea, we would love to hear from you and see if we can make it happen.

To date we have hosted a wedding, book launches and readings, birthday parties, christenings, baby showers and music events.

We are currently open for bookings for this coming year and next year.

Our latest venture is with Chloe Dempsey (@ fermentforagegrow), who will be launching workshops in foraging, fermenting and growing, starting this spring. Chloe has had previous experience working in Common Knowledge and Ballymaloe Cookery School.

N.B. At the centre of the Wisteria tunnel, we are in the process of setting up a production garden to grow fruit, flowers and vegetables to give people an opportunity to see this type of garden at first hand.

The produce from the garden will be used by our cafe, for Chloe's classes and surplus will be available for sale.

Our intention is to set up a herb garden, both medicinal and culinary, a vegetable garden, a bean garden, strawberry bed, raspberry and blackcurrant cages, a vineyard and an orchard with apples, pears plums, greengages, cherries, kiwis and passionfruit. Dominic would like to say huge thanks to Neil Kelliher of Ardrivale, whose painting of the Orial house raised over £1,000 to help us with the construction of the Wisteria tunnel. Thankyou Neil, your generosity is hugely appreciated.

I am always interested to follow up on the latest news from Curraghbeg Nursery. There is always something new for me to discover. I am very grateful to Dominic for sharing this developing project with us and feel we are very fortunate to be able to see it grow.

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
A heartfelt thank you to everyone who joined us for Ballinagree village's very first Darkness into light walk in support of Pieta House on Sat May 10th.

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

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

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
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IRELAND SHOULD TARGET THE LOW HANGING FRUIT IN ITS OWN BACK GARDEN WHEN IT COMES TO TRADE AND COMMERCE - MEP KELLEHER

- BOOSTING EXPORTS TO THE SINGLE MARKET AND FINDING NEW GLOBAL MARKETS MUST BE OUR TWIN PRIORITIES -

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that he believes: that Ireland must redouble its efforts to export goods and services into the European Single Market as a response to the possibility of an extended tariff war with the United States.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economic and Monetary Affairs (ECON) Committee, was commenting as it was reported that the Government were today discussing a large trade mission led by An Taoiseach, later this year.

"Don't get me wrong. Trade missions are essential, and I believe a mission led by An Taoiseach is vitally important to our future prosperity.

"However, we cannot ignore our core markets, and quite frankly, with the exception of the Netherlands, Germany and Belgium, as well as France and Italy to a lesser extent, we export very little to the other Member States.

"In 2023, of the €81.2 billion of Irish exports to the EU, €60.07 billion went to the Netherlands, Germany and Belgium, accounting for nearly 75% of all our exports to the EU.

"The US may be our biggest trading partner as a single country, but we need to make sure we harness the potential of the tariff free single market on our doorstep. As a bloc, the EU is by far our biggest trading partner.

"There is a huge market in the east of Europe that Ireland should be looking to gain traction in Poland, the Scandinavian and Baltic countries, and central European countries like Czechia and Slovakia are all considerably more prosperous than 10-15 years ago. "It's a well-established economic fact that bilateral trade between two countries is inversely proportional to the geographic distance between them.

"For Ireland that means boosting our exports to the countries closest to us. As well as trade within the EU being tariff-free, the EU is now actively working to lower internal administrative and compliance burdens, which

should make it more attractive for small businesses to sell into the Single Market

"As an economy, we need to reduce our overdependence on certain markets. That means new trade deals with countries across the globe, but it also means fostering even closer ties with our closest neighbours," concluded Kelleher.



"And my God will liberally supply (fill until full) your every need according to His riches in Glory in Christ Jesus. To our God and Father be the Glory forever and ever, Amen" (Philippians 4:19-20 Amplified Bible)

Welcome back dear student, still on the study of how God supplies our needs. The Scripture here makes it clear that whatever our needs, God will overflow to us by the Power of His Glorious Presence in those who believe in and live under the Lordship of Jesus. God is the God of abundance and more than enough. When a person is thirsty it's a joyous thing for someone to give you a full glass of refreshment — there's nothing worse than a measly portion. "...Jesus cried out.. 'if anyone is thirsty, let him come to Me and drink! He who believes in Me and relies on Me, as the Scriptures have said — 'out of your belly shall flow rivers of Living Water" (John 7:37-38). Living water flows from the Presence of God and it's not just a drink of joy now and then, but a never-ending source of provision and Life not just for you, but also through you. God knows your need's friend, and He has already taken care of them (Matthew 6:25-33). All we have to do is come humbly before Him and ask and receive believing by faith in His Word. "In returning and rest you shall be saved, in quietness and confidence shall be your strength..." (Isaiah 30:15). For the believer in Jesus there must be a change in leadership. This is what God calls humbling yourself — not in demeaning yourself in poverty or punishment but in confessing sin and acknowledging that you need a Saviour — you need God's help (Psalm 18:28-36). Repentance is turning from sin - and living instead in obedience to God's Word - honouring Him instead of honouring the devil. Where before we paddled our own canoe, to enter into God's Salvation, one must yield all to Him. It has been taught that if you give enough of your money or your time, God will be impressed and give you favour. That's not what truly yielding means. Really it's our hearts - the very essence of who we are and what we live for that God seeks. He has given us a free will to decide who, or what we will serve, but He longs for us to select and trust Him.

Exposing the heart makes one vulnerable - we cleverly hide from others and even from ourselves the reality, but God knows the whole truth and yet He still chooses to make His home in the yielded heart. The enemy tries to torment people in their minds with destructive thoughts that God could never accept or love them, but friend - never forget that Satan is a liar! Jesus said.... "you did not choose Me, but I chose you" (John 15:16). The Lord is looking for fruit that will last. Fruit only comes from a branch that is attached to its life source — here the Lord gives the example of Him as the Vine. Grapes are the fruit that comes from the vine. They are sweet and delicious and can be pressed into a valuable substance that lasts — wine. David reveals the power of resting in God in Psalm 23. In the presence of our Good Shepherd Jesus, we His sheep are safe and protected, and health and our well-being is all provided for (John 10:27-28; Isaiah 53:5). Get to know Jesus, and get right with God, and drink from that Living Water!

LITMUS moments

You might remember 'Litmus paper' from science class, pink Litmus paper turns blue in alkaline solution and blue Litmus paper turns pink in an acidic solution. It's called an "indicator" for that reason.

We sometimes use the term "litmus test" to sample what's going on in a given situation. It's the test of a person or a trial of a new product to see will it sell. It's the putting of a theory into practice.

I like to use the term as an indicator of where I am at present - using the letters of the word LITMUS I try to stop and pause and -

'Live In The Moment Unconditionally Surrendering.'

I don't do it enough of this on a regular basis.

I dream or speculate about the future or I dwell on or am re-playing something that happened in my past. Neither is productive and it whiles away the present. At such moments I am absent-minded and not focused on the task in hand.

We do all have Litmus moments that linger because of their intensity. They include those key joyful occasions like the pouring of water at baptism, seeing a child or grandchild receive their first communion, posing with the Bishop at the confirmation, seeing a couple exchanging their vows. It can be a first kiss, holding hands in public with a lover for the first time, a reunion at an airport. These are truly beautiful moments that we allow to live on our hearts and minds and bring a smile to our faces at the memory. Some are moments captured in our picture frames.

Then there are the awful moments like the diagnosis of an illness, the passing of a loved one, the tolling of the church bell at a funeral, the lowering of a coffin. Those awful moments live on too and we squirm at the memory. There are moments in life we look forward to and moments we dread. For good reason the rosary prayer includes joyful and sorrowful mysteries with which we come to identify over time.

But I shouldn't have to wait for a happy event or sad news to stop me in my tracks to put everything else aside to process what I've just heard and seen.

Every moment matters.

We should allow a moment to linger. While we should take the time to reflect or to plan we should also stop. Some people call this mindfulness. We should take the time to simply "be." These are 'the why of the what' moments where we stop to ask ourselves 'why I am doing what I am doing' in the first place. Find a time and a location where this can happen.

Take a litmus moment today. Be yourself. Surrender to the moment. And surrender to God. Breathe.

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
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
