





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When Pain Isn't Where the Problem Is: Referred Pain Explained

Referred pain can be confusing and frustrating. You might feel symptoms in your leg, shoulder, or even your jaw - when the true cause is somewhere entirely different. Here's what to do;

Don't Chase the Pain

If you're stretching, massaging, or using heat on a sore area with no long-term relief, the root of the issue may lie elsewhere. For example:

• Sciatic pain down the leg often starts with a **problem in the** lower back.

Shoulder pain may stem from
nerve irritation in the neck.

 Headaches could be linked to tightness in the upper back or jaw.

Instead of focusing only on the painful area, consider your whole posture, movement patterns, and lifestyle.

Track When It Happens

Start noticing when your pain shows up. Is it after sitting too long? After certain movements? First thing in the morning? Patterns like these give clues. A pain in the hip after long car rides, for instance, could indicate **pelvic imbalance or spinal misalignment** rather than a hip joint issue.

Check for Numbness or Tingling





The 3rd and final judging take place from Monday May 26th to Wednesday June 4th and Sullane Weirs is the chosen estate and hopefully will do us proud. As part of the judging, selected stretches on Main Street, Laneways and the Town Square will be checked, with the focus been on litter down to Cigarette Butts. These pieces of litter and Cigarette butts will be counted, and marks will be lost accordingly.

Tidy Towns Judging starts in June and finishes in August. We would ask that every property owner stand and look at their premises and ensure that the area outside is weed free, litter free, clean and painted adequately. There are still premises in need of attention and 5 minutes on the part of the owner or staff could improve matters significantly. This would greatly assist the volunteers who must look after so many other things and public areas.



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


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

Why Reduce our Carbon Footprint when others are not doing so.

Since we have embarked on our climate project, we were asked occasionally 'Why should we when others won't' and 'Why should we when whatever we do ourselves or as a community will make no meaningful difference to world climate'. These are good questions. Here, we will try to answer them, and we are hoping to do so to the satisfaction of most.

The philosopher David Hume famously pointed out the "is-ought problem". You can't logically move from the facts of how things are, to how they should be. So, a question starting with 'why ought' (or 'why should') signals that the question relates to personal ethics or group morality. In previous times there may have been reasonable consensus on morality within communities that were cohesive enough to form countries. However, many think this is no longer the case. Many assert that within Europe 'moral relativism' is now predominant, the idea that each can follow whatever moral code that feels right for them. Moral relativism is based on the view that ethical positions are options, and such options are equally valid. This (philosophical) position may be considered useful in a secular society where there are many subcultures and religions, and where tolerance is necessary for getting on together. Wise politicians tend to avoid acting as adjudicators on moral issues. Of course, since some ethical positions differ significantly or are even contradictory, all cannot be equally valid or true - unless there is no truth, a prospect few like. We will though take our cue from the politicians. If we were to outline our moral beliefs to try to convince you to reduce your carbon footprint, we would likely be successful only in convincing those of you who already share those beliefs. So, here we will merely sketch thirteen justifications, drawing upon different philosophical, ethical, and rational perspectives. We are hoping that perhaps one of these may resonate with your sense of morality. They are in random order.

1. Enlightenment Era Rationality: Kant's Categorical Imperative

Immanuel Kant's Categorical Imperative says that one should act in such a way that you could hope that it would become a universal law. In the context of reducing carbon footprints, if you decide to do nothing, consider then what this means if everyone were to do the same. If you value a sustainable world, then it can only be rational, and therefore moral, to act in support of that goal.

2. Environmental Virtue Ethics: (Rosalind Hursthouse)

Hursthouse proposes that wonder and respect are the appropriate responses to the natural world. Her Environmental Virtue Ethics emphasises the importance of cultivating virtues such as respect for nature, humility, and responsibility. By reducing our carbon footprint, we embody these virtues, and we live a life that is more in harmony with environmental stewardship.

3. Reducing Suffering

Cross-cultural philosophies often emphasise reducing suffering as a moral duty. Whether derived from Buddhist teachings, Utilitarian principles, or other ethical frameworks, the reduction of suffering extends to our environmental actions. By mitigating climate change, we prevent harm to countless lives, both human and non-human, both now and long into the future.

4. Judaeo-Christian Stewardship

In the Judaeo-Christian tradition, God declared the world good and entrusted humans with its care.

Reducing our carbon footprint aligns with the belief that we have a Divine obligation to protect and preserve the environment as stewards of creation. This teaching is explained in detail and justified by Pope Francis in 'Laudato Si', his influential 2015 encyclical.

5. Ecological Interdependence

Ecology demonstrates that each living thing depends on many others in a complex web of relationships. Human-induced climate change disrupts these relationships with potentially catastrophic consequences. By reducing our carbon footprint, we help maintain the balance of these interdependencies. 6. Self-Interest and Cooperation: (David Gauthier) Gauthier's view on self-interest suggests that cooperating for mutual benefit is rational. We can cooperate with others who are acting to our mutual benefit or seek to cooperate with others who are not yet acting. Even if many others are not acting, by reducing our own carbon footprint, we set an example that can influence others, fostering a collective effort towards sustainability, and it encourages our politicians to take necessary decisions.

7. Tragedy of the Commons: (Garrett Hardin)

The "Tragedy of the Commons" refers to the observation that a resource held in common may be destroyed as it is the individual's or a group's interest to maximise their use and so overuse it, while it is in the common interest not to do so. The capacity of the atmosphere to accommodate the release of warming gases is limited, while protecting this common resource is necessary for all life. Collective action is required to manage this common resource sustainably and prevent global warming. This means each of us has the responsibility to do our part.

8. Democratic Social Contract, Freedom, and Moral Obligations

Democracy is built on a social contract. We get benefits such as freedoms, security and defence, and we give up other freedoms and accept obligations to act in ways that benefit our society. Since the reduction of our carbon footprints supports the viability and ecological well-being of our country and so the common good, we have an obligation to do our part. If we do not accept our obligations, we are then no longer engaged in a shared enterprise, we are just engaged in self-centred pursuits. We also have obligations to citizens of other countries to whom commitments have been made on our behalf. Our obligations are ours regardless of whether others fulfil theirs.

9. The Precautionary Principle

The precautionary principle advises that where knowledge is insufficient and consequences are potentially severe, we should err on the side of caution. Given the substantial risks associated with global warming, this principle suggests proactive efforts to reduce carbon emissions.

10. Scientific Consensus on Global Warming

Empirical science has demonstrated that global

warming is real and largely caused by human actions. The overwhelming consensus among climate scientists underscores the urgency for individual and collective efforts to reduce global warming gasses.

11. Energy security and Resilience

In a world of increasing nationalism and protectionism, we cannot reliably depend on continuing to receive most of our energy from abroad. We have very limited fossil fuel energy reserves. To become more selfreliant, we need to develop our own renewable energy resources.

12. It's not a problem; it's our opportunity!

Replacing dirty energy with clean, will bring great benefits. We will be healthier. We won't be breathing particulates into our lungs; causing sickness and death in urban environments, and particularly in large cities where most of the poor of the world must live.

13. We love our children and grandchildren

Many of us have hoped and worked to make the world better for our descendants and theirs. It is what really matters to us in the end. It is more logical to spend some resources to reduce global warming now when it is most effective, than to save for our children to spend it when it will be less effective. Allowing a more hostile environment, and the political strife for resources that will arise, (or may already have arisen), would not be consistent with making the world a better place for them. It may require commitment and team effort, but if we really want to make life better for our descendants, we will not let that stop us. We still have the opportunity of making the future much better for them than otherwise will be the case.



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Macroom History Group (Founded 2023) OUTING TO BALLINGEARY'S VIRTUAL MUSEUM AND TO THE OLD GRAVEYARD, INCHIGEELA 11TH May 2025

Macroom History Group undertook its first field trip for 2025. The outing first went to Ballingeary and then to Inchigeela Old Graveyard. Talks at both places revealed the rich history of the area and showed that with interest and respect, the past can be entertaining and informative.

History)

Tim Twomey and Heidi were our hosts in Ballingeary. Though born and reared in England, Tim's father was from Ballingeary and Tim has retired there. His retirement is not idle and he and his colleagues have restored An Súgán, the original Cólaiste na Mumhan which began in 1904. It was the first Irish Residential College and played an historic and significant in the Irish Revival mediated through Conradh na Gaeilge/ The Gaelic League the GAA and other organisations. Conradh na Gaeilge/The Gaelic League became the intellectual powerhouse of the Irish Revolutions and people such as Patrick Pearse, Piaras Beasley, Cathal Brugha, Terence MacSwiney, Tomas Mac Curtain, De Valera and Richard Mulcahy were leading figures and all were closely connected to Ballingeary. Indeed Pearse is quoted as saying that the Irish he heard in Ballingeary was the purist he had heard. The Coláiste also attracted linguistic scholars because of Irish's

antiquity and its state of neglect and decreasing use. Tim and Heidi explained the historical background, the research and their efforts to preserve that knowledge and present it in an attractive fashion. The size of the building is limited and so the idea of making a museum of ideas and memories was use. There will be few traditional artefacts on display. In this regard the kitchen will be similar to Siobhán an tSagart's kitchen, a beautiful Irish speaker around the turn of the 20th century and who taught many of the Irish Leaguers their Irish. The museum has some beautiful photos and they have made great use of modern technology to tell the story. The group was happy to hear that Sean Ó Cuiv (born John O'Keefe) and from New Street, who became a journalist and editor, and a noted linguist was one of the Coláiste founders. Pat O'Connell recalled teaching in the newer Coláiste and his stories were amusing and informative.

The next stop was Inchigeela's Old Cemetery and the inimitable Joe Creedon was the guide. The main strand of Joe's talk was on the O'Leary Clan and how they came to Inchigeela, and their subsequent fortunes. The O'Leary's were a branch of the O'Driscoll Clan, West Cork - Baltimore more precisely. Changes in weather and fortunes forced their move inland and away from the sea. Joe explained the fortunes of some O'Learys and they travelled far and wide, leaving their mark in the Caribbean, South America and Australia. In his inimitable style, Joe related his stories with deep knowledge and the gifts of the seanachaí. Very interesting snippets were about Máire Buí Ní Laoire, Cath Céim an Fhia and its background, the story of Art Ó Laoire and the Caoineadh and the escape of IRA activists during The War of Independence. Also buried in the grave were the remains of Auxiliary Cecil Guthrie, who was in the party ambushed in Kilmichael in November 1920. Guthrie escaped from the ambushed but was apprehended, shot and temporarily buried before his interment in Inchigeela. His original family was not willing to defray the cost of repatriation. At the time of the ambush, Guthries's wife was pregnant and in Macroom. Some months later, she posted a newspaper notice that she haad had a baby girl and that she hoped that Cecil would return. Alas, that never happened. Joe was involved in getting descendants of both sides to meet in a spirit of reconciliation, a fact that he was very happy about. Both talks were delivered with elegance, knowledge, insight and compassion. History is important and it can be fascinating and entertaining.


MHG in Ballingeary Virtual Museum, 11 May 2025

My father Denis Corkery was a low-sized stout jolly man who loved the land, his family and his neighbourhood. Affectionately known as Den, he was born on Monday 20th April 1903 and he had two older sisters Mary Ann and Johanna plus a younger brother John and a younger sister Ellie. Living in the townland of Barathanaknuck at the west end of Clondrohid parish in the Muskerry Gaeltacht, both of his parents were native Irish speakers but the next generation did not embrace the language.

Growing up at a time when Irish Nationalism was on the rise but English Rule was still dominant he rarely mentioned those days except to express his fear of the Black and Tans who made frequent raids around the area in their Crossley Tenders.

Like most of his peers his life was spent on the land which entailed lots of manual labour and the horse was most valuable for all types of farm work. With his two trusty animals the Foxy horse and the black horse called Rock he ploughed the stubbles and reaped the fields of corn. Saving the hay entailed working with the Mowing Machine, the Hay Rake and the Tumpling Paddy all horse drawn implements.

The custom of smoking cigarettes was ever present and he liked his Woodbines and Sweet Aftons. He enjoyed a glass of stout and always kept a good bottle of poteen which he shared annually with his cousins Jeremiah and Fr Con Lehane from Dromcummer Banteer.

He married my mother Elizabeth O'Callaghan from Gortnagishaugh Carriganima and they shared three

kids my older brother Tom, my younger sister Eileen and of course myself. Tom joined him on the farm from an early age and he coined the phrase "Tom is a great boy but Paddy is no account". Being part of the Gaeltacht our district was rich in gaelic culture and traditions producing many poets, clergymen and scholars. It also had its own open air dance platform plus regular house dances and musical sessions following the Stations, Treshings and other social occasions. While my father had a lovely singing voice he was proficient at storytelling and enjoyed the regular Scoraiochts with his fond friends at the homes of Johnny Lynch and John Twomey.

Each year as harvest time approached his theory was "When you see the first stack of corn it's time to be recalling your songs and stories" Having heard his stories many times I now regret I did not take note of them.

My own favourite memories of my father go back a long way, walking behind him as he ploughed the fields in my pre-school days aged four or five years and making the short trip on foot with him as he visited his close neighbour Johnny Lynch in the early 1950's. Further on we made the longer journeys as



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he cycled and I ran alongside up the Cahereen road to visit Johnny Twomey and many more friends. The outstanding memory is cycling home, from our close relatives, the Dineen family Peake Coachford at Christmas time around 1960. We dropped into "Mary Ellen" at her licensed premises at Bealnamorrive and stayed longer than expected. To cap it all there was heavy snow as we cycled home ever so slowly to Baratanaknuck. It certainly was Cuirt thar an Mhean Oiche.

While he took little interest in sport he admired the Kilnamartyra Seven a Side Football team and described their passing combination game when they defeated Our Lady's Hospital at the Inch "as the damndest tipping anymore".

The outings from the farm were both social and work related with daily trips in the horse and cart with churns of milk to the creamery and weekly family journeys in the horse and trap to Sunday Mass. The cattle were walked on foot to Macroom Fair and oft times walked home again if demand was low. With his great friend Con Walsh and other neighbours they made the annual trip to Puck Fair in Killorgan. Other annual events included Macroom Show, the Whitsun at Ballyvourney and of course the trip to Ballyvourney on the 11th February each year which was the Feast of St Abby to perform the rounds. Growing up we had a free day from school on that date and no unnecessary work was done on the land as apparently his father had started to transport some farm manure to fertilize on the 11th February but the Butt capsized.

In keeping with his generation he was a man of deep religious faith and traditions. When referring to the deceased in his many tales he always expressed the wish "May God give them a bed in Heaven tonight" and of course the family Rosary was recited at bedtime each evening, All household and farm bills had to be paid promptly and he often quoted the phrase "Short accounts make very long friends". In his 73rd year, with failing health, my father passed away on Saturday morning 31st May 1975 - some fifty years ago.

While the weather was glorious at the time a few gentle drops of rain fell on the coffin as it was taken from the house. (Blessed is the Corpse that the Rain falls on).

The coffin was shouldered by family members, relatives and friends beyond the boundary fence to continue an ancient tradition.

HENRY O'MAHONY'S ESCAPE FROM SPIKE ISLAND IN 1921

This history Classroom Based Assessment (CBA) is based on my great-grandfather's first cousin, Henry O' Mahony.

Spike Island is a tiny island at the entrance to Cork Harbour, near Haulbowline, and situated between Cobh, Ringaskiddy and Corkbeg. Because of its strategic location it was of economic and military significance. Since it was first fortified in 1779, it was used as a military barracks and a prison. It served as a jail from 1847 during the Great Irish Famine, becoming an Irish 'Alcatraz'. It was still in use as a prison during the Irish War of Independence (1919-21) and was from where Henry O'Mahony escaped in 1921.

Henry O'Mahony was born in Passage West in 1895 and went to the local National School until the age of 15. He then started working in Haulbowline Dockyard as an apprentice fitter.

The Irish Volunteers set up the Passage West Company in 1914 and Henry joined it at 19.

The Passage West Company later joined other local companies to create the Cork 9th Battalion, with Henry O' Mahony as Vice-Commandant and Adjutant.

In 1919 the Passage West Company was responsible for raiding ships coming into Cobh, seizing rockets, wireless equipment and arms. In January 1921 Henry was still on the run and took part in an attack on a local Royal Irish Constabulary barracks. The attack was unsuccessful as an on-duty R.I.C man saw them and shut the door in their faces.

Henry was arrested on February 8th in Monkstown on his way to a battalion meeting. When asked his name, he replied Jordan. This alias lasted only three days, and



two days after this he was transferred to Cork Military Barracks. A week later he was moved to Spike Island and treated as an internee - this meant he had more privileges than the convicted prisoners, such as being able to play hurling.

The escape was carefully plotted by Henry O'Mahony, Richard (Dick) Barrett, Tom Crofts, Jack Eddy, Patrick Buckley, William (Bill) Quirke and Maurice (Moss) Twomey. They meticulously planned the escape, recording tides, patrols, searchlights and watchguards. They had heard of an abandoned boat by the dock.

They complained to the British that the sally port, which was a tunnel under the buildings leading to the moats, was full of rubbish. They got permission to clean it and slowly started removing bricks at the back so they could get into the moat.

They had also pulled up the joists of the floor to build a timber ladder.

At 5 p.m. on a wet and windy night on the 10th of

November 1921 they set the plan in action. First the escapees went through the sally port, just before the searchlights turned on as planned and the wind covered any noise. They then crossed the moat and climbed the wall with the use of the handmade ladder. The boat they had heard about was beached and too heavy to move into the water. They made their way to the pier and found one boat that was not chained. Jack Eddy, (19) swam out to it in extremely cold water and found that it was anchored with a rope. He swam back and got a pocket knife, he began cutting the rope but he couldn't hold the knife in his frozen hands and he dropped it. He cut the remaining strands with his teeth.

Helped by Henry O' Mahony's local knowledge they reached Cobh at about 10 p.m. They were safe now as the truce prevented them from being re-captured.

Henry went on to take the Anti-Treaty side in the Civil War and following an application received a military pension for his contribution to the fight for Irish Independence.

Little is Known of Henry's life after the 1920s. Perhaps like many, and because of ongoing tensions in Ireland, he kept silent and spoke little of his war experiences. *Sources: Bureau of Military History Archives, Account* No 1506 Rook: '*lail Break'Sean O' Biordan Liste Framiner*

Cork minor footballers were beaten by a better Kerry team in the Electric Ireland Munster MFC final at Austin Stack Park in Tralee but it was not a rout. "Every time we get off the bus, we're one type of individual and when we get back on to the bus, we should be wiser, we should be more experienced and we should have learnt some stuff from the game."

"For me, this Munster final is not the be-all and end-all. It's a long-term picture. Having said that, every time we go out, we go out to try to win".

Cork were aided by a relatively strong wind in the first half, but it was Kerry who settled the better with two points inside the first two minutes. The Rebels soon got into their stride with Eoin Maguire converting a free and a Ben Corkery-Delaney effort.

Kerry went ahead from an easy free but the game was quickly level once more when Samuel Kelleher-Leavy did great work to set up Tom Whooley for a white flag, 0-3 each after the first quarter. Kerry had two unanswered points while for Ricken's team, wayward shooting and the final pass was lacking. Cork then spurned two goal chances in the space of 20 seconds after 23 minutes. The sides traded points as Kerry led 0-6 to 0-4 and they finished the half well though with two points without reply and could have also got a goal, but a superb block by Cork defender Eoin Looney denied them, 0-8 to 0-4 at half-time.

Kerry had wind advantage for the second half and went six clear.

Cork got their All Ireland title defence off to a fine start with a comprehensive win over Limerick in the opening round of the Glen Dimplex All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship at Páirc Uí Rinn.

Due to the postponement of the Munster final v Waterford (shorts v skorts controversy), Cork didn't have a game for five weeks, but they were in total control here, showing little ill effects of the long lay off. Three first-half goals, from Amy O'Connor, Orlaith Cahalane and Katrina Mackey put the game beyond Limerick and three more in the second further emphasized just how dominant Cork were as they coasted home.

With six minutes gone the game was effectively over as a contest when O'Connor turned provider for Mackey, who flicked the ball to the net to make it 2-3 to no score.

Cork kept piling on the scores with McCarthy and O'Connor pointing from free, before Cork got their third goal and it really was game over by then.

Caoimhe Costelloe got the final score of the half for Limerick from a free, but Cork were well in control as they led by 3-12 to 0-1. With 33 minutes gone, Finn scored Cork's fourth goal as Limerick couldn't stop them.

Cork ran out comprehensive winners, in a totally one-sided game.

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IT'S ABOUT TIME!" - MEP KELLEHER WELCOMES IRISH GOVT COMMITMENT TO RDP PROTECTION FOR PHARMA SECTOR

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that the Irish Government's decision to support the pharmaceutical sector by sticking to eight years of Regulatory Data Protection is both common sense and good for Irish jobs and prosperity.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Environment and Public Health Committees, was commenting after Ireland confirmed its position at a meeting of EU Ambassadors in Brussels.

"It's about time. This is something I have been calling for over the last 18 months. Until this week, Ireland had not picked a side and it was causing worry in the sector.

"There are many politicians on the left and right seeking to undermine RDP for a variety of ideological or geographic reasons. This would seriously undermine the ability of the pharmaceutical sector to invest in Research & Development into new medicines.

"RDP is the way in which companies get the exclusive right to manufacture a drug they have developed. An eight year RDP would mean other companies being banned from manufacturing this drug for eight years thereby guaranteeing a return to the company that invests in the development of the new drug.

"This is in Ireland's interest as the pharmaceutical sector is a major employer in this country, and is a significant component of our trade surplus. Of course, we want to see quicker access to medicines and an overall reduced cost to the exchequer but we must be aware of the wider issue. "However, from an Irish point of view, tens of thousands of people are employed in very well paid jobs in the life sciences sector. We must play clever when it comes to legislation like this. "The announcement this week is therefore

very welcome. It was very important that Ireland got

the fence and showed commitment to a sector that invests in research and development here in Ireland," concluded Kelleher.



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

"Do not be misled: bad company corrupts good character" (1 Corinthians 15:33).

Welcome back dear student, this Scripture is knowledge every parent tries to instil in their children. God, our Heavenly Father has given His Word to steer us, but ultimately we have free will to make our own wise - or unwise, decisions. It's amazing the influence people can have on others - both negative and positive. Godly role models can inspire and bring people up, while wicked behaviour has the opposite effect. David was a young teenager, sent to the battle front with supplies for his brothers, when he heard a bully intimidate his nation's army (1 Samuel chapter 17). Picture the scene - two armies on opposite hills, and a giant spewing wicked words cursing God's people. The men had listened to Goliath morning and evening for a month. Every time they heard his ranting it erased more courage and self-worth. For David having only arrived that day, this was his first time hearing him, but a righteous anger rose up inside him. David told of how God had delivered him from fearful danger whilst shepherding his father's sheep. Now his training came to the surface. In that moment David wasn't acting like a big hero - but his shepherd anointing was ignited. Jesus said.. "the Good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep" (John 10:11). Most people working with those less able than themselves have an innate call to protect, defend and help those weaker. It's a characteristic of God's love in us (Romans 5:5). So, David ran out towards the giant's challenge. He wore no fancy helmet or shield, but the battle armour of the love and fear of God, along with his knowledge of God's goodness and power.

David's relationship with the Lord was cultivated in the privacy of the hills when no one saw (Matthew 6:5-21; Psalm 86). There all alone, God's promises, and faithfulness were deposited: banked in his heart, as He experienced His God loving, defending, and protecting him daily. Now he was making a supernatural withdrawal in faith – as he ran towards Goliath the giant, with only a stone and a catapult as weapons. No doubt those watching were wincing - predicting the outcome would be the giant making mincemeat of the foolish young lad. But they didn't know God like David! He launched one stone – aimed it at Goliath's head, and God hit him right between the eyes, knocking him down with a thunderous crash. Suddenly, the eyes of the watchers grew wide as they witnessed this slip of a boy take the giant's sword and finish him off. Goliath wasn't scoffing now! Everything changed in that moment – these cowering, fearful men suddenly took courage – inspired by the faith and bravery of David. They gathered themselves and ran – chasing and defeating the enemy army who had mocked and intimidated them (1 Samuel 17:51-52). All through the influence of one young man.

"He who walks with the wise will become wise, but the companion of fools will be destroyed" (Proverbs 13:20). Influencers are all around us – in families, friend's groups, workplaces, communities and online. Friend, they can make or break you. God warns us to not be yoked together with unbelievers – some may pretend to believe in God, but do they KNOW Him? (2 Corinthians 6:14-17). How's their character and behaviour? The two 'time thieves' (1) Tomorrow

It's not that I'm not busy, it's just that I'm not busy about the right things. I get distracted. About tomorrow.

She dwells on the past for a half hour a day - and that's it. There are approximately 15 and a half other waking hours. So she gives the past just 3 per cent of her day, the other 97 percent of her day is devoted to what's to be experienced today.


