Colman's Park Amenity/Biodiversity Area: The large green area by the riverside is being transformed in recent times to a biodiversity and amenity area, with two large Display Board erected to highlight the development. One is at the edge of the park and the other at Poirsin Dorcha entrance to the park from Lower Cork St. This entrance, under the railway arch, is landscaped on both sides and the arch is a legacy of the old Cork to Macroom Railway line.

The display boards highlight the wide variety of planting that has been done and some of the existing mature trees. 1) Nut Orchard – Hazelnuts, Cob Nuts, Sweet Chestnut, 2) Wildflower Plot, 3) Cherry Grove, 4) Fruit Orchard – Apple, Pear and Plum, 5) Biodiversity

Hedgerow - Italian Alder, Whitethorn, Guelder Rose, Holly Spindle and Crab Apple, 6) Spindle Grove, 7) Alder Grove, 8) Riverside Boundary – Blackthorn, Sitka Spruce, Elm, Oak, Beech, Bramble, Ivy, Sycamore, Ash and Polar. 9) Silver Birch Grove. In addition to all the trees planted there are other individual mature tree species which include sycamore, Cherry, Lime, Black Alder, Silver Birch, Whitethorn, Oak Mountain Ash and Plum Damson. The Apple trees are already producing fruit with some delicious looking red and green apples. Best leave them grow before having them for a snack. As we head into the longer evenings, it is worth a visit to see the work done here and the two display boards. It's been a busy few weeks for Tidy Towns Volunteers with Litter Picking, Painting in the Fairy Garden, Pruning, Weeding, Stewarding for Corpus Christi Procession, General Mulching and General Maintenance.

Morgan Mc Sweeney's Fourney CODRUM TO 10 DOWNING STREET, LONDON

Morgan McSweeney is British Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer's Chief of Staff and his most trusted advisor. Probably, he is the Irish person in the most influential person ever in the United Kingdom political establishment. His office is in 10 Downing Street and next to the Premier's. How did a Macroom man attain such eminence? He gave a brilliant and riveting talk to Macroom History Group in Murray's on Friday 4th July; it was easy to see why Morgan is where he is. This article outlines some aspects of his background, his journey and how and why he succeeded.

Tim and Carmel McSweeney had three children; Morgan (b. 1977) was the older brother of sisters Órla and Alex. Carmel (née O'Driscoll) is from Bandon, was a bank official and is an accomplished bridge player. Tim has been a successful accountant in Macroom for fifty years but had some difficult times. Tim's sister Evelyn and her husband Pat run a shop in Middle Square – in ways, it is the beating heart of the town. She has done tremendous work for the town in several guises over many years. Her daughter Claire

is advisor to Simon Harris, Fine Gael leader and Tánaiste. Tim and Evelyn were/are active Fine Gael members and politics is an integral part of their personae. The loss of their brothers Fr. James, Jeremiah/Jerry and Joe in the last few years have been severe blows to the family. Their sister Mary (O'Neill) also lives in Macroom.

Following attendance at Macroom's Boys' National School and De La Salle College he left for England about 1994. He brought with him curiosity, an independent of mind and a sharp analytical brain. There, he did various manual and other unskilled jobs. Having attended Middlesex University, he earned a degree in Politics and Economics. He joined the Labour Party and worked as an organiser. This brought him to various parts of Britain. When elected Labour leader, Blair reclaimed the party from the far-left and made it electable. When

in power, and together with Bertie Ahern, he succeeded in devising The Good Friday Agreement. Blair was a progressive leader and developed the idea of New Labour, a labour free of extreme socialist ideology and not over-influenced by the unions. His period in office was marked by political stability, a rising standard of living and the development of public services and especially improvements and investment in education. Blair probably erred in following the United States' policy on Iraq and the subsequent war. Despite winning three elections, Blair was forced out by his party colleagues. The Conservatives regained power in 2010 and Labour again came under the control of first Ed Milliband and then the far-left, copper-fastened by the election of Jeremy Corbyn as leader. For many, including Morgan, Labour under Corbyn was unelectable. Coupled with this was the emergence of first, the neo fascist British National Party (BNP) and then the United Kingdom Independence Party (UKIP), belligerently anti Europe/ European Union. Out of that grew Nigel Farrage's Reform Party and it has the highest party poll ratings as I write - worrying times indeed. In power The Conservatives introduced privatisation which saw a diminution of public services and Brexit accelerated this trend. It also saw Boris Johnson becoming leader, the Tories going farther to the right and the increased strength of Farrage and his group.

In his talk Morgan briefly outlined

how he began as an organiser for Labour Party events. His ability saw him promoted and he planned a Labour victory over the BNP in a tight bye-election. After, he with current minister, Steve Reed wrested control of Lambeth Council from the extreme left. His method was to canvass the electorate, listen to what they said and wished for and offer them candidates and policies on what was needed. Not everything Morgan touched turned to gold; he ran Liz Kendall's campaign for Labour leadership in 2015 - she fared poorly and Jeremy Corbyn won. After that, Labour Together emerged: it consisted of moderate Labour MPs and supporters, and Morgan became a director. Its aims were first to 'rescue' the Labour Party from the far-left, give it sensible policies and make Labour voter-friendly again. When Corbyn resigned after Labour's trouncing in the 2019 general election, Starmer was elected. He was backed by Labour Together and his leadership bid was managed by Morgan. Morgan now became an indispensible aid to Starmer and he was entrusted to oversee the 2024 general election campaign. Covid intervened and whether Johnson's government would have imploded or not is a moot point but Morgan masterminded a resounding Labour victory. He achieved this by insightful analysis of the political situation and employing a clever strategy to ensure victory. Prevent radical candidates from becoming Labour candidates was a key

strategic move. Last October, Morgan replaced Sue Gray as Chief of Staff.

As Morgan explained, governing Britain at the moment is not easy. Basically, the coffers are bare, services are run down and there are threats from Russia and China. Trumps actions are making life very difficult - he cited the effects of tariffs on the British high-class car industry. Britain after Brexit isolated itself from Europe and severely damaged relationships and trust between the two. Europe must re-arm to face down Russia's ambitions. Many people are in dire financial straits and are clamouring for quick solutions. Government is sympathetic to their plight but it cannot solve everything at once. Many including Reform are offering 'magic' quick-fix solutions and exploiting the current widespread hardship. The Labour government is trying to build trust with the people and employ long-term solutions. This is of course is not easy and presents Starmer, Morgan and their colleagues with their biggest challenge to date. What happened in the House of Commons indicates how hard the job will be.

It was fascinating to hear how these problems are viewed from within government and how they will be tackled. It was reassuring to hear Morgan's brilliant analysis and his principles for dealing with them. Underling all this was a compassion for people and steely determination to make things better for all but in a sustainable and just way.

Tim, Carmel and the McSweeney family are justly proud of Morgan's achievements to date. Added to these are Morgan's aversion to publicity and his humility. Macroom too can be immensely proud that it has produced someone of such high calibre.

Murray's was a lovely setting and Morgan was delighted when presented with a Macroom GAA jersey, donated by the Macroom GAA Club.

THINK GLOBALLY, ACT LOCALLY RECONCILING HISTORY

An Event Freely Available to All 20-25th July 2025 in Creedon's Hotel

All talks start at 9pm and are free

Hi! Chris Barrett here again.

Today I have the great pleasure of talking with a very special friend, Joe Creedon of Creedon's Hotel in Inchigeela, about events over the summer which will continue an ongoing theme of Reconciliation which has been a very important aspect of the Daniel Corkery Summer School over the last few years.

As we look at the desperate need for peace in so many countries, and wish it could be achieved, we can look back at events which occured in Ireland with the hindsight of a past century. We can see, and rejoice in what Irish people have shown is possible, by becoming aware of local examples of Reconciliation. The first example of this achievement was the year when the family of Mike O'Leary were reconciled. Mike O'Leary who was a native of Kilbarry, was awarded the Victoria Cross in WW1.

Following that, Michael Horgan, grand-son of Jeremiah Mansell was reconciled, enabling the grave to be discovered as a result of the research.

Last year the reconciliation was held for the last RIC man to die, Jeremiah Maunsell, murdered at the hotel in Inchigeelagh in August 1920.

George Moore, son of Michael Moore resigned and had to leave Ireland once the civil war began, and as we were intrigued to learn in last year's Summer School, went on to be a famous nuclear scientist, part of the Manhattan team in Chicago. Last year's talk on the story of the atom bomb was given by Michael Horgan from Ennis, the great grandson of Jeremiah Mansell.

It is wonderful that some of the family will be attending Inchigeelagh from Scotland this year as part of ongoing reconciliation.



In an earlier summer school there was a reconciliation with the Moore family and three local families who had been involved in the IRA at the time. MIchael himself has been a regular visitor to the Summer school and Inchigeela ever since. The whole process has proved to be very healing for their family.

This year's reconciliation will be for the Guthrie family. Cecil Guthrie was the last man to die at the Kilmichael ambush. He was an auxiliary soldier who was arrested and executed. His body was buried in the Anahala bog (now the area of the Kilmichael Football Club) for six years. In the mid 1920s it was removed and in 1926 it was reburied in the old churchyard in Inchigeela. While Cecil Guthrie was in Macroom, he had his pregnant wife with him. His daughter Dorothy was born in January 1921.

Brian Guthrie, his grand-nephew, will be coming to partake in this year's Summer school and it will be a pleasure to see him.

Throughout the week the photographer, Martina Conroy, will be presenting 'Remnants', a poignant photography exhibition that captures the haunting beauty of abandoned houses and the stories they tell. Through evocative images, the exhibition invites viewers to contemplate the fleeting nature of human existence.

She will dedicate the exhibition to the late Aonghus O'Donnell.

Other artists involved with the week this year will be James O'Connell, Kinsale and Marlese Bernstoff, Germany.

Sunday 20th July the keynote speaker will be Victoria Pearson from Cooleraine, who will be celebrating Daniel Corkery's 'Hidden Ireland'

a hundred years since it was first published.

Monday, there will be a talk by Hugh Burkett on the history of the artistry of Guinness advertising. Tuesday, we will hear Brian Guthrie speak in relation to Cecil Guthrie.

Wednesday, there will be the annual Corcora Concert on selected classical themes.

Thursday, there is the annual visit from the Cratloe Drama Group, following up after last year's very successful 'Wake In the West'.

Friday, there is a talk by Professor John Oxford on the History of Contagious Diseases and Vaccines.

Creedon's Hotel relies on Cork County Arts Office for financial support and all events are free except for the music concert in the Lee Valley Building.

This week of events based around reconciling history is unique and promises to be as enthralling as those in the past.

CARRIGANIMA BORN PRIEST'S KEY ROLE IN FOUNDING THE LEGION OF MARY

Fr. Michael Creedon who was born in Carriganima, in 1878 played a hugely important role in the early days of the Legion of Mary. His parents were Jeremiah and Margaret Creedon (nee Goggin) and they farmed adjacent to the village. They also owned the local pub, which was subsequently owned, and operated, by the Crowley family and is now well known as The Pub Carriganima. Seven of their children are recorded in the 1901 census – three girls and four boys, including 22 year old Michael whom it described as a Classical Scholar. Their son Francis, who was born in 1875 and who also became a priest, was not present.

Young Michael studied at Mount Melleray and subsequently entered the Dublin Diocesan Seminary of Holy Cross, Clonliffe, Dublin. He completed his studies in Maynooth where he was ordained a priest by Archbishop Walsh on 18 June 1911.

After his ordination he served as chaplain to the Clondalkin Monastery from 1911 to 1914. He subsequently served as chaplain in Garristown (1914 -1922) and in Francis Street (1922 - 1929).

Major contribution to the Legion of Mary

In 1927, Fr. Michael Creedon, was serving as a curate in St. Nicholas of Myra Parish in Francis Street in Dublin. It was in that parish that the first meeting of the Legion of Mary was held in 1921. Fr. Michael was actively involved in the Legion. He was appointed Spiritual Director of the Concilium in 1924. During his long service in that role, he gave many talks to legionaires and gave many speeches to the concilium. He played a crucially important role in the Legion from its earliest years and he wrote a number of sections of the Legion Handbook.

"His overall contribution to the Legion was invaluable during its foundation and years beyond. The Legion owes a great debt to Fr. Creedon, who remained Concilium Spiritual Director until his death."

Fr. Michael Creedon died on 29 July 1950 and the 75th anniversary of his death approaches. Newspaper accounts of his funeral provide us with some more insights into the life of Fr. Michael: The Irish Independent:

"On his transfer to Francis St., he found there the first branch of the Legion of Mary, which had just been established. He threw himself into the work and had the satisfaction of seeing the growth of the Legion, 22 Outlook 10.07.25

which has already been carried into 520 Dioceses. When the Central Council of the Legion was formed, Rev. Father Michael Creedon became its Spiritual Director, a position he retained to the end.

His contribution to the work and growth of the Legion was remarkable. His genial disposition, his kindness to all, his indefatigable labours formed a model from the beginning and helped notably to mould the Legionary character."

A report in the Irish Press 02 August states:

"Many Legion of Mary officers and Spiritual Directors were in attendance at the funeral of Rev. Michael Creedon... which took place from the Church of the Assumption, Dalkey to Glasnevin Cemetery, yesterday.... the funeral was led by members of the Men's Sodality of the Sacred Heart, the Dalkey Troop of the Catholic Boy Scouts and the Women's Sodality of the Sacred Heart. School children lined the pathways leading from Dalkey.

Chief mourners were Rev Francis Creedon (brother) and Miss Julia Creedon (sister)

The general attendance included Gen. R. Mulcahy, T.D. Minister for Education; Mr. L. Cosgrave, Parliamentary Secretary to the Taoiseach, Mr. P. J. Little T.D. and Mr. and Mrs W.T. Cosgrave."

Fr. Michael is buried in Glasnevin Cemetery, Dublin. His headstone is a carved replica of the Legion of Mary Standard and bears the following words of

gratitude from the Legion of Mary that he served so well and for so long. "THE LEGION OF MARY DECLARES ITS GRATITUDE FOR HIS INDISPENSABLE SERVICES FROM 1922 WHEN HE CAME TO FRANCIS STRFFT UNTIL HE DIED. HE WAS SPIRITUAL DIRECTOR OF THE CONCILIUM LEGIONIS FROM ITS ESTABLISHMENT IN 1924."

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Macroom History Group (Founded 2023)

It has been a very busy week for the group with activity on several fronts.

Railway View Walk 30 June 2025. 1. Collecting at Kelleher's Garage, about twenty people with connections to Railway View walked up the street. It was a talk without any specific speaker but with attendees contributing. The menu consisted of memories, nostalgia and much history. Kelleher's old showroom was once a busy pub. Timmie Kelleher, founder of the garage, drove Michael Collins to Bandon on the day of his shooting at Béal na mBláth. Just a few doors away was the home of Steven Brady whose book 'The Briar of Life' gives a great account of life in Macroom, particularly around the time of the War of Independence. He later worked in Grainger's and Goold's, Solicitor Office. . Tom Grainger was highly involved in the legal affairs that followed the Kilmichael Ambush. Noted folklore collector Seán Ó Cróinín lived across the road. In the 1940s/1950s he travelled all over Munster to record stories and songs from people. He is referenced in many subsequent studies. Born in Ballyvourney, his brother became a noted Irish linguistic scholar, and his nehew in turn continue that tradition. Seán died suddenly in 1965, aged fifty. Unfortunately, his wife Siobháin died shortly afterwards and their children Seán, Eilís, Dónal, Proinsias/Frank and Mícheáil were left parentless. Denis James Murray was born in Railway View and it was he who sold the Mart land and the ground that later became the Tapes Factory. He inherited 'Ned The Colonel's' house and bought Danny 'Happy's' next door which is now Murray's Bar. He also allowed the Sheridans, a Traveller family, to use his pub - there was a strict understanding between the Sheridans' patriarch and 'Boss' Murray.

A few doors above that was the house/home of Dan Corkery, Old IRA Commandant. He was a noted footballer and won a Munster medal with Cork and trained the first great Macroom team 1909-1913 that won senior county titles. He joined the Irish Volunteers and then the National volunteers. He was local IRA Commandant during The War of Independence; he was jailed several times and after his home and business was burned on one occasion, his wife defiantly put up a placard with 'Business As Usual' inscribed. He opposed the treaty with arms and again was imprisoned. He later became a Fianna Fáil TD and Senator. He continued his involvement with Macroom GAA and, perhaps fittingly, died at a football match. President De Valera attended his funeral. His grandson, Fr Dónal Mc Illwright, partook in the recent Eucharistic Procession.

Across the road was the House where several Catholic Curates lived. The names of Ft John Cronin, Fr Abernathy, Fr Barry, Fr Burke and several others came to mind. Across the road was Macroom Boys National School, run by De La Salle Brothers from 1933 to their departure. The late John Browne was perhaps the first lay teacher and his kindness and interest in local history was recalled. Harshness and physical punishment were the accepted method of correction at the time and was sometimes hard. Br. Stanislaus had a great interest in football and the Youth Club.

Pat Collins and Han Nan were notable characters and added colour to the street and the town. She was a beautiful singer and made use of snugs at a time when pubs were largely men-only spaces. Further up the street were the homes of brothers Danny and Jerry Lucey, They made money carrying turf during the war. Jerry subsequently opened The Palace Cinema in 1953' – Scaramouche was the first film shown. Before Telefís Éireann came on air in 1961 and a staid RÉ, films were 'windows' to an outside world. Censure was strict at the time with many banned outright or severely cut. 'Gone With The Wind' and 'Casablanca' were examples of banned films. Most films came from America or Britain - about 905 between - and these were immediately suspect of being immoral or un-Irish. Despite this, cinema was very popular and showed different cultures with different values and luxuries beyond the experience of many in its audience. Later Jerry ran the Montrose but his timing was off and the ballroom closed just six years after he took it over. Danny ran a mill that later became a picture Gallery. Breda Philly and Mary Teresa Lucey were present and manuy anecdotes were passed, Jerry's youngest daughter Cathy reminded the audience of the saying "The Railway View Slashers love their Rashers but The Cork Street Goats Prefer their Oats". Walshs had the first Supermarket in Macroom and one of their specialities was a roast chicken remembered fondly by many. Ann Walsh/Counihan has a phenomenal memory and remembered stories about Danny Happy and delivering shopping to local customers. She was under strict instructions not to accept tips; ruefully, she abided by this dictat.



When Jerry Lucey died suddenly in the late 1970s, Breda and her husband Denis Murphy took over the running of The Palace Cinema but unfortunately. videos and television effectively closed rural cinemas. Breda and Denis had opened Spar Supermarket and ran a very successful business, Denis was a leading light in The Macroom Mountain Dew Festival but he too passed away at a young age. Later Gerry and Anne Gray ran the business until that too has closed by the advent of new retailers to the town. Browne's Bar was an important social venue that was especially busy on mart days, weekends, Munster Football final nights and when Macroom GAA Club was celebrating or drowning its sorrows. The Leonards, The Twomeys, The Nevilles were also major contributors to the life and vibrancy of the street. 'Dickson' Collins was a fine golfer, fisherman and singer and his wife Noreen was a low handicap golfer and won Munster honours with with Macroom.

The above is but a snatch of what was related – perhaps a more comprehensive record should be compiled. It was a lovely day and thanks to all who came and shared their knowledge.

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EXTENDED EU GAS STORAGE DEAL WILL BE GOOD FOR IRISH CONSUMERS - MEP KELLEHER

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has welcomed the deal struck between the EU's institutions to allow for greater flexibility in gas storage rules.

Kelleher, an MEP for Ireland South, argued that the draft legislation would reduce speculation on the gas market and ultimately bring down prices for consumers.

"The Polish Presidency of the Council and the European Parliament reached an informal agreement to extend the EU's 2022 gas storage scheme until 31 December 2027, as it would otherwise have expired at the end of 2025. The provision is designed to ensure gas supply security ahead of the winter season. to ease tensions in the gas market, as speculation surrounding the existing mandatory 90% fill rate target by 1 November each year was driving the cost of refilling during the summer.

"Gas-storage facilities provide for 30% of the Union's gas consumption during winter months.

"This is about finally ending the EU's dependence on Russian gas imports. We are ultimately funding Putin's illegal and immoral war on Ukraine by purchasing Russian gas. Anything we can do to cut off Putin's financing is a good thing.

"This is important for Ireland as volatility on the gas markets was causing price shocks for our consumers. "Ireland is limited in terms of where it can source gas. It can come either from the Corrib gas field off our West Coast, or from the North Sea via Scotland. "Ultimately, to stop consumers paying through the nose for gas, we need alternatives such as our own gas storage facilities. It is why I have supported the LNG plant and

storage facilities in North Kerry for well over a decade," concluded Kelleher.

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The Magic of Hurling

While Football was the dominant field game in Clondrohid as we grew up in the 1950's there was always a passing interest in hurling. Following much persuasion my father purchased two hurleys from Willie Twohig's Store, South Square, Macroom for my brother Tom and myself after he got a good price for some heifers at Macroom Fair.

Those hurleys were in constant use and gave great enjoyment in the long Summer evenings. Added to that on many a Sunday morning, as we travelled home from mass, we observed our neighbour Daniel Joe Kelleher, Danganasillagh in his blue jeep on his way to support his nephew Denis O'Riordan who at that time was a star player for Glen Rovers and the Cork Senior Hurling team.

My first attendance at a Senior Inter County game was at Killarney against Limerick on 10th July 1966. I recall Colm Sheehan of Eire Og having a great tussle with J. J. Bresnihan of Limerick and despite the heavy rain two goals in the final ten minutes by Charlie Mc Carthy and Seanie Barry saw Cork win on a final score of 2-6 to 1-7. Colm Sheehan of course played a starring role later that year when he scored a hat-trick of goals to help Cork regain the Mc Carthy Cup in great style.

We move quickly through the years to 30th July 1972 when Cork were in the Munster Hurling Final versus Clare. The cows at Baratanaknuck got an early milking and Tom, myself and John O'Callaghan headed for Thurles, the birth place of the GAA. Travelling up the Cahereen road and taking a left at Pike Cross took us on to Millstreet, Mallow and Mitchelstown where we met up with a huge volume of Cork supporters on a similar journey to Semple Stadium. To speed up our trip we travelled by Galbally and onto Tipperary town and arrived at our venue in good time where we parked up near the famed Thurles Racecourse.

We paid our money at the turnstile and took up a prime position at the centre of the then grass incline where now sits the magnificent Ardan Ui Riain. The early morning sunshine quickly disappeared and approaching throw in time that beautiful green bank had turned into a slippery slope. The huge crowd were drifting down the slope and the Clare "shout" was

loud in our ears. While it was scary at first, the throw in restored normality and despite the weather conditions we all enjoyed the game. A youthful Mick Malone from the Eire Og club was starring at centre forward for the Rebels against Gus Lohan, the Banner County centre back as Cork ran out convincing winners on a scoreline of 6-18 to 2-8.

A few years later Joe Kelleher organised a trip to Shannon Co Clare for the Clondrohid Football team to play the local Wolfe Tones side and Gus Lohan was again at No 6 on the local team. He is of course a father to those great Clare hurlers Frank and Brian. Brian is also current Manager of the Clare Senior Hurling team and also the sister of Sinead Mc Golderick whose family all play with the various Eire Og teams in Cork. This year on Saturday June 7th we journeyed to Limerick for the Munster Hurling Final between Cork and Limerick. The sun shone brightly on a capacity crowd of 43,500. It was a magnificent contest and not even extra time could separate the teams. The referee Thomas Walsh of Waterford had to retire injured and was replaced by James Owens of Wexford and the game which was eventually decided on penalties saw the Rebels come out on top. What a way to win or lose a Munster Final.

Times have changed alot since those years of 1966 and 1972 but the magic of the Munster Hurling championship remains - long may it continue to do so.

For the first time ever two members of the Macroom Club representing Cork won the Diamond MasterB Munster final in the 60x30 softball Doubles Competition, played in Broadford, Co. Limerick recently.

GENERAL GAA NEWS- GAA CHAMPIONSHIPS 2025

All Ireland Senior Hurling

Cork hurlers are back in the All Ireland Final for the second year in a row and will face a formidable challenge from Tipperary in the decider. Cork had a relatively easy task in disposing of the Dublin challenge but Tipperary had to battle ferociously to get the better of Kilkenny and will take enormous encouragement from the manner of their victory. They will not fear Cork.

Munster Championship:

Cork drew with Clare, defeated Tipperary, lost to Limerick and defeated Waterford to reach the Munster Final. Drew with Limerick in the Munster Final, 1-30 to 2-27 after extra time and won a penalty shoot-out 3-2 to take the title.

All Ireland Semi Finals:

Cork 7-26 Dublin 2-21

Allianz Hurling League champions for the first time since 1998, Munster winners after a seven-year gap. Is a first All-Ireland SHC title since 2005 now a glass ceiling that Cork are ready to smash through on All Ireland day, July 20th next. Cork were simply magnificent in front of a full house and a huge Cork following, all but putting this semi-final to bed by half-time when they led by 10 points.

Alan Connolly finished with a stunning hat-trick, and 3-2 in total, and both he and Brian Hayes drilled two goals apiece in the first-half. Connolly completed his hat-trick late in the second-half while Tim O'Mahony scored two second-half goals also.

Veteran attacker Patrick Horgan struck eight points as well while Declan Dalton and Darragh Fitzgibbon gave

strong performances, helping to secure their place in the final against Tipperary.

Cork, beaten by Clare in last year's final, had previously stumbled after winning Munster titles losing their subsequent All-Ireland semi-final ties in 2014 (Tipperary 2-18 Cork 1-11), 2017 (Waterford 4-19 Cork 0-20) and 2018 (Limerick 3- 32 Cork 2-31), but looked clued in, sharp and fully focused from the off this time.

Dublin, conquerors of Limerick at the quarter-final stage, were desperate for another good start to give themselves a fighting chance of pushing the roaring favourites hard but by half time Dublin were already in deep trouble. Cork hit the interval with a whopping 4-13 to 1-12 lead and probably couldn't have imagined things going much better for them.

Cork didn't score a single goal against Dublin when the sides met in last year's Championship, at the quarterfinal stage. But they had four on the board this time after 33 minutes, two apiece for Hayes and Connolly, each of them the reward for slick stick work.

Trailing by nine points after 15 minutes, 3-5 to 0-5, the Dublin management were decisive. Andy Dunphy, marking Pat Horgan and already booked, was replaced by David Lucey. Conor McHugh, marking centreforward Shane Barrett, was taken off shortly after.

Brian Hayes dropped out from midfield to mark Barrett and Darragh Power, who came on for McHugh, went to midfield. Things got a little better for Dublin in the form of a 15th minute Cian O'Sullivan goal before getting a whole lot worse. Hayes hit Cork's fourth goal in the 33rd minute, Horgan taking the credit for a wonderful piece of control in the build-up which freed Connolly and opened the gap. Horgan and Diarmuid Healy tagged on points before Cork as good as wrapped it up with their fifth goal, scored by O'Mahony in the 42nd minute. Dublin got a head of steam going between the 45th and 50th minutes, reeling off an unanswered 1-3, O'Sullivan's second goal of the game coming after a quick free by Currie.

Briefly, the margin was down to nine points, 5-17 to 2-17, but no sooner were Dublin fans daring to dream than Cork had shut the door again. O'Mahony nailed Cork's sixth goal with just under 20 minute to go and Connolly completed his hat-trick with a seventh for Pat Ryan's side, blasting home from an acute angle in the 65th minute after Robbie O'Flynn's lay-off.

Substitutes Conor Lehane, Jack O'Connor and Shane Kingston contributed 0-4 between them, keeping the pressure on for starting places in the final.

It was a disappointing defeat for Cork but Manager Joe Carroll and his fellow selectors can reflect on a season of progress nonetheless. Promotion from Division 2 of the league was secured and Cork beat Mayo in Castlebar in the All Ireland Group stage to reach the quarter final. Dublin were good footballers, aggressive and physically much stronger than Cork. There will be much to ponder for Cork management over the coming months as they seek solutions to problems they face in their endeavours to get Cork back to the LGFA top table.

Kate Sullivan opened the scoring after four minutes for

Cork cruised to a fourth consecutive victory in the All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship group stage dispatching Wexford with clinical ease at Chadwicks Wexford Park to round off the group stage in dominant fashion.

Already assured of a place in the All-Ireland semi-finals, Ger Manley's side showed no signs of letting up. They were ruthless once more, setting the tone early. Laura Treacy was outstanding at wing-back, as were Amy O'Connor,Clodagh Finn and Saoirse McCarthy.

Cork were 4-16 to 0-4 ahead with 20 minutes left, and although Wexford found some rhythm – outscoring Cork 0-5 to 0-1 over the next stretch – the margin remained massive.

Their brief rally was undone seven minutes from time when McCarthy was fouled for a penalty. McCartan's strike went over rather than under the bar, but Cork weren't finished. Wexford responded through Joanne Dillon and a Cashe free, but Cork had the final say, Kate Wall setting up O'Connor for her hat-trick goal and leaving 25 points between the teams at conclusion.
