



Eurochild is the largest network of organisations and individuals working with and for children in Europe. It strives for a society where all children and young people grow up happy, healthy, confident, and respected as individuals in their own right. It influences policies, buildscivil society capacity, facilitates mutual learning and exchanges practice and research. Its work is underpinned by the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

Ruth Burton of MacEgan Senior Branch has been selected as a member of Eurochild's Network of Online Visionary in Action (NOVA) - a network of eight children from different countries in Europe.

Ruth applied for a place because she is extremely passionate about online safety, especially for young people. In a world where everything is run by technology it is essential that we do everything in our power to protect the young people of Europe.

Ruth explains why she applied for this opportunity. "I think the thing I'd most be looking forward to is being able to share my thoughts and opinions on our digital world with members of the European Parliament. I truly believe that by letting young people share their opinions with the some of the leaders of Europe they can really help make a difference for the future generations of our ever changing world. I'm also excited for the possibility of hearing other young people's view on our digital

What I like most about the internet is the incredible ability to connect with others worldwide. I love the amount of opportunities I've been received due to the internet. For example, the opportunity to apply for this! I've also partaken in activities such as the Hi Digital programme run by Irish Girl Guides and Vodafone which gave me the opportunity to connect more with the people in my community and teach older generations how to effectively use the internet. Although there are so many positives to the digital world, there are also negatives. I believe there is so much room for improvement on the internet. I believe that there should be more EU laws protecting children online and these are some of the issues that we have been discussing at our online meetings over the past three months. We have also discussed the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and how it can be beneficial, our own experiences on the internet and how we can prevent unwanted issues arising in the future. I am gaining a lot of knowledge on the laws regarding my online experience and the issues that young people of my age face online."

The NOVA Council will be meeting in Brussels for a weekend in October.

During this time, NOVA Council members will have the opportunity to meet in-person with the rest of the group. Together, they will work on creating a shared description of what online safety means and what is needed to ensure children feel safe online. This group activity will be recorded and presented at the European Parliament the following week by Eurochild. If time allows, the NOVA Council will also have an in-depth discussion on Artificial Intelligence, the topic that received the most votes during their first online meeting. We look forward to hearing more from Ruth on her return.



John Lyons, An Taisce Climate Ambassador and Tidy Towns member recently co-ordinated a very interesting Nature Walk as part of Heritage Week.

The walk was led by ecologist Karen Loxted who works with SECAD and who is currently working on a Biodiversity Plan for Macroom. Meeting point was the car park at the bridge in Macroom. Following the introductions after the group had gathered, certain plants that were under our feet were selected by Karen who highlighted their names and features, and their medicinal properties in many cases. Some of these would have been used by people in days of old before other medicines were readily available.

Another aspect of the walk was the use of 'Citizen Science' to assess the general quality of water in our rivers. This is something that anybody can do following a little training. It is called 'kick sampling' where the riverbed is disturbed by kicking and a net is then used to collect everything that moves. These macroinvertebrates were then looked at using a magnifying glass and identified with the use of a pictorial chart. They were counted and the numbers of each species recorded. Some of these species are indicators of good water quality while others may indicate poor water quality. On the day, the mix of species collected, such as mayflies indicated that the water quality was good.

The group continued downstream, discussing trees and plants along the way, then entered the Fairy Garden and went across to the biodiversity garden area. Here the signage on the trees and shrubs was very educational and led to many interesting discussions. Nettles were debated, crab apples and the numerous other species that are all labelled. The display boards here, one with information focused on trees and the other focused on pollinators were a mine of information. This area is now sometimes used as an outdoor educational resource and was used by St Joseph's Primary school as part of a pilot Wildwork programme during the last year.

Karen was thanked for facilitating this wonderful event which was thoroughly enjoyed by all present.

As the Tidy Towns Competition comes to an end, we would like to say a big thanks to those who had significant displays of hanging baskets on their premises, particularly Macroom Credit Union, Pickled Café, Lynch's Café, Killian Lynch Auctioneers, Kiely & Co Accountants, Mary Anne's. Next year it would be nice to see more businesses putting up hanging baskets or window boxes, like in some other towns as this would add a lot to the premises as well as to the streetscape with some lovely summer colours.

Over the last number of years our Hanging Baskets have been commented on in the Adjudicators report for the Tidy Towns Competition. This however was largely due to Tidy Towns work, the 64 Large Hanging Baskets on the poles. In 2023 they commented 'There was some beautiful planting to been seen throughout the town, with the flower bed in the square been admired, as well as the lovely circular flower beds outside the castle gates. The landscaping at New Street looked very smart, as did the Grotto Area. In 2024 they commented 'The many flower beds throughout the town were well maintained and give a wonderful splash of colour at the Grotto, Town Square and throughout the town no doubt many assembled in the Tidy Town's Hub in Masseytown where we saw many planted ready to be moved into place as well as upcycling in Progress. Consider creating ecological corridors where there is a food source and resting place every 20 meters by planting window boxes and hanging baskets with pollinator friendly plants.'

Next year Macroom Tidy Towns are hoping to run a Hanging Basket Competition with prizes for both Commercial and Private Premises. Those thinking of erecting baskets are strongly advised to go for a 16inch basket, the largest size basket possible, as the smaller ones are so hard to maintain as they constantly dry out and need watering and feeding while the large ones look better and are easier to maintain.





LE CHÉILE MENTORING SEEKS NEW VOLUNTEERS

ACROSS CORK CITY AND COUNTY

Monday, August 18, 2025 - Le Chéile Mentoring, a national youth justice charity, is now recruiting volunteers across Cork to support two key programmes: youth mentoring and parent mentoring.

Mentors meet with the person they are matched with once a week for one to three hours. Volunteers come from all walks of life—no prior experience is needed, just a genuine interest in supporting young people or their parents. Le Chéile provides comprehensive training and ongoing support to all volunteers.

"We're calling on people from across Cork to join us," said Alan Quinn, Le Chéile's Regional Manager. "We're particularly looking for volunteers in West Cork, Northeast and East Cork along with the city centre. Whether you'd like to mentor a young person or support a parent, there's a way to get involved and make a real difference."

"Mentoring is simple but incredibly powerful," Alan continued. "You don't need to be a professional just a steady, caring presence. That alone can help a young person or parent feel heard, supported, and empowered to take positive steps. What we ask for is empathy, consistency, and a willingness to listen."

Youth Mentoring

Youth mentors are matched with young people aged 12-24 who are on probation or at risk of offending. Volunteers meet weekly for 1-3 hours to build trust,

encourage positive choices, and support personal goals. Sessions can involve everyday activities like having a coffee, playing a sport, or helping the young person reconnect with school or hobbies.

Parent Mentoring

"It gives me a sense of pride, to be able to give back to my community and to feel part of the wider Le Cheile mentoring team. I've been mentoring since about 2018 and the people I've worked with have been such a mix of personalities, ages and circumstances. People I never would have met otherwise, I've had some really great matches. They've meant a lot to me."

"Recently enough, I met someone who I'd been paired up with years ago in town. He approached me to say hi and thank me. He's married, working full-time in a job he loves. He's set himself up for success and he's stable and happy in himself. It was great to be able to introduce this person to my fiancé and for her to get a sense of the work I do with Le Chéile Mentoring."





NATURE WALK AS PART OF HERITAGE WALK

John Lyons, An Taisce Climate Ambassador and Tidy Towns member recently co-ordinated a very interesting Nature Walk as part of Heritage Week. The walk was led by ecologist Karen Loxted who works with SECAD and who is currently working on a Biodiversity Plan for Macroom. Meeting point was the car park at the bridge in Macroom. Following the introductions after the group had gathered, certain plants that were under our feet were selected by Karen who highlighted their names and features, and their medicinal properties in many cases. Some of these would have been used by people in days of old before other medicines were readily available.

Another aspect of the walk was the use of 'Citizen Science' to assess the general quality of water in our rivers. This is something that anybody can do following a little training. It is called 'kick sampling' where the river bed is disturbed by kicking and a net is then used to collect everything that moves. These macroinvertebrates were then looked at using a magnifying glass, and identified with the use of a pictorial chart. They were counted and the numbers of each species recorded. Some of these species are indicators of good water quality while others may indicate poor water quality. On the day, the mix of species collected, such as mayflies indicated that the water quality was good.

The group continued downstream, discussing trees

and plants along the way, then entered the Fairy Garden and went across to the biodiversity garden area. Here the signage on the trees and shrubs was very educational and led to many interesting discussions. Nettles were debated, crab apples and the numerous other species that are all labelled. The display boards here, one with information focused on trees and the other focused on pollinators were a mine of information. This area is now sometimes used as an outdoor educational resource and was used by St Josephs Primary school as part of a pilot Wildwork programme during the last year.

Karen was thanked for facilitating this wonderful event which was thoroughly enjoyed by all present.





Michael Collins Commemoration 2025

The Millstreet Pipe Band was out in force for what turned out to be a sunny afternoon on Sunday, August 24th last to entertain the large crowd of people who had gathered at the monument in Gleannarouge near Béal na Blá to honour the memory of General Michael Collins, 103 years ago after his tragic death in the Irish Civil War.

The annual commemoration generally takes place on the Sunday closest to the anniversary of Collins, who died at this location on 22nd August 1922.


This year's oration was delivered by Minister for Health Jennifer Carroll MacNeill T.D. and the event was also attended by Cllr. Mary Linehan Foley (Mayor of Cork County), Cllr. Joe Kavanagh (Deputy Lord Mayor of Cork), Lt. Col. Peadar Ó Cátháin & Sgt. Roy Kelleher (Defence Forces), Superintendent Gary McPolin (An Garda Síocháma) and Aengus Collins O'Malley (representing the Collins family). As has become custom at the annual commemoration, the event began with a prayer led by Canon Humphrey O'Mahony, who has strong Macroom connections and who recently turned 90.

In her address, Minister Carroll MacNeill made reference to orations from many of those who preceded her, saying that she was particularly drawn by the speech given by the former Olympian and broadcaster, the late Brendan O'Reilly at the 1980 commemoration, when he quoted a phrase used by Collins to describe himself "I think in long strides". In reflecting upon the challenges that Ireland faces today at a national level and those faced by the world at a global level, she encouraged those present to 'think in long strides' about how best to meet these challenges and create a better future for our country and the wider world.

The event concluded with a word of thanks from the organising committee to An Garda Síochána, Cork County Council, the Defence Forces, The Irish Red Cross, the Millstreet Pipe Band, Kilmurry GAA Club, Mai Fitz's bar and restaurant and to local landowners the Kiely family for their assistance in the running of the day's events.



HSE South West expands winter programme to shield babies from RSV



HSE South West is building on last winter's very successful RSV immunisation programme which was delivered to new born babies in maternity settings and higher risk babies in the community. The programme significantly reduced infections, serious illness and hospitalisations of young infants during the 2024-2025 winter season.

Key statistics from the national programme include:

- · Almost 22,500 babies were immunised.
- 83% of those offered immunisation accepted it for
- · Among those immunised (compared to similar babies the previous year who were not immunised), there was a significant decrease in the impact of RSV including:
- 65% reduction in total number of cases presenting;
- 57% reduction in cases presenting to emergency departments;
- 76% reduction in babies requiring hospitalisation
- 65% reduction in babies needing intensive care due to complications of RSV

This winter season HSE South West will once again offer RSV immunisation in maternity settings across Cork and Kerry to all babies born in Ireland from 1st September 2025 to 28th February 2026.



This year the programme is extending to include all babies born in Ireland, during the six month period from 1st March 2025 to 31st August 2025. Parents and guardians of these babies can book an appointment from Monday 1st September on the RSV Immunisation page of the HSE website: https:// www2.hse.ie/conditions/rsv/immunisation/ important to note that appointments will only be available during September. Parents and guardians are advised to book early, to ensure their child is protected ahead of any surge in RSV infections this autumn/ winter season.


Parents of babies born from 1st September 2025 to 28th February 2026 will be offered the immunisation before they leave the maternity hospital.

Dr Niamh Bambury, Consultant in Public Health Medicine, HSE South West said: "RSV is a largely seasonal respiratory illness that particularly impacts babies and infants. During the winter months, we expect to see an increase in the circulation of RSV. RSV can cause severe infection in babies and can result in hospitalisation in some cases. The RSV vaccine is the best way to prevent the illness. The vaccine protects babies during the critical early months when they are most vulnerable. All new born babies will be offered the RSV vaccine prior to being discharged from hospital from 1st September 2025 to 28th February 2026. For all babies born from the 1st March this year up to 31st August, you can book an appointment on the HSE website to receive the vaccine in the https://www2.hse.ie/conditions/rsv/ community: immunisation/. I would urge parents of all eligible babies to take up the offer as soon as possible."

Gabrielle O'Keeffe, Head of Health, Wellbeing & Strategy, HSE South West said: "Availing of the RSV vaccine gives your baby the best protection during the winter months - it prevents severe bronchiolitis, reducing the chance of illness, GP and emergency department visits. The immunisation is provided free of charge, and is being delivered by trained midwives in all maternity settings after birth; and by vaccination teams in the community for children born between March 1st and August 31st this year. Extending this programme to every eligible infant will ensure even more families benefit from this vital winter protection".





RENT INCREASES IN PRIVATE RENTED HOUSING

Who do rent increase rules apply to?

You and your landlord agree the amount of rent you pay for a property at the start of your tenancy. Your landlord must follow certain rules if they want to raise the rent. These rules are set out in residential tenancies legislation and apply to tenancies in private rented housing and in student-specific accommodation

What is a Rent Pressure Zone?

Rent Pressure Zones (RPZs) are areas where:

- Rents are highest and rising quickly
- Annual rent increases are capped

RPZs were introduced on 24 December 2016 and were due to end on 31 December 2025. But, on 20 June 2025, the Government extended Rent Pressure Zones to all areas nationwide until 28 February 2026. This means that all areas are now covered by the rules for rent increases in Rent Pressure Zones.

What are rent increases in RPZs?

Annual rent increases in RPZs are capped in line with the rate of general inflation or 2% a year, whichever

So, if your landlord reviews the rent every 12 months and the rate of general inflation is 1.5%, then your rent can only be increased by a maximum of 1.5%. However, if the rate of general inflation is higher than 2%, for example, 3%, the rent can only be increased by a maximum of 2%.

If your landlord has not reviewed the rent for a number of years, the 2% cap applies every year.

So, for example, if you moved into rented accommodation in December 2016 and the rent hasn't changed since then, the general inflation rate would apply when calculating the rent increase. This is because the inflation rate between December 2016 and December 2021 was 6.6%, which is lower than the 10% that would apply under the 2% per year condition (2% per year for 5 years = 10%).

The Residential Tenancies Board's (RTB) Rent Pressure Zone calculator applies both of these conditions and calculates the allowable rent increase for you. You will find the calculator on www.rtb.ie under the compliance section.

The Residential Tenancies (Amendment) Act 2025 brought these initial changes in from 20 June 2025. What are the proposed changes from 1 March 2026?

A number of changes are not due to apply until 1 March 2026 and need legislation bring them in. These proposals include that:

- Rent controls will apply to tenancies nationwide
- Rent increases will be linked to inflation, with a 2% cap on increases in times of high inflation. However, this 2% cap will not apply to rent increases in newly-built apartments.
- · Large landlords will be banned from ending tenancies with 'no fault' evictions. Large landlords are landlords with 4 of more tenancies.
- Small landlords with 3 tenancies or less will have minimum 6-year rolling tenancies. During the 6 years, they can only end a tenancy for very limited reasons, such as homelessness. At the end of each 6-year period these landlords can end a tenancy for more reasons, such as selling the property.
- All landlords will be able to reset the rent to market value after 6 years unless there is a no-fault

Landlords will continue to be allowed to:

- Sell their rented property with the tenant in place
- End a tenancy, if a tenant has broken their tenant responsibilities

Who can request a Rent review?

A tenant or a landlord can request a rent review. A rent review can result in an increase or reduction in the rent. Rent increases in Rent Pressure Zones are capped and there are limits on how often the rent can be reviewed. There are different rules about the limits and frequency of rent reviews depending on if the tenancy is an existing or new tenancy. You can contact your local CIC for more information.

If a landlord wants to get an exemption from rent limits in an RPZ area, they must notify the RTB within 1 month of setting the rent by completing the RTB's RPZ Exemption Form .

The RTB can investigate and sanction landlords who do not comply with RPZ rules. There are penalties for landlords who do not follow rent increase limits in RPZs, provide false information about an exemption in an RPZ area or do not notify the RTB about using an exemption.

You can use the RTB's calculator to work out if your rent can be raised and by how much. You will need to enter your address or Eircode, the current rent and the date when the rent was last set.

There is no fee for updating this information with the RTB. The RTB's website has more information about updating your tenancy details.

As a tenant, you can ask your landlord to review the rent if:

- You think it is more than the current market rate for the property or
- You want a new review and more than 24 months have passed

What are my options is my landlord is raising the rent?

Threshold has detailed advice on how to deal with rent increases. You can contact Threshold for advice

If there is any dispute about the amount of rent being proposed, either side can refer the dispute to

If your landlord has given you a valid written notice of the rent increase, you must contact the RTB with your dispute before the date that the new rent begins or within 28 days of getting the notice, whichever is later. There is no time limit if the notice is not valid.

You must continue to pay your rent until the case has been determined by the RTB.



HEDGEROWS - The Farmer's special friend

Hi! Chris Barrett back here again.

Today I have the great pleasure of speaking with Marquerite Stelling, who is the grand-niece of my very good friend, Tiné O'Hare.

Marquerite is a self-confessed hedge-fanatic, and before you turn over this page, I would like to assure you that her love for nature and agriculture is backed up by wide knowledge and qualifications and there is huge knowledge about hedgerows to be learned from her. So hold onto your hats and we will hear from her! Marguerite has completed her studies at the Dutch Agricultural University where she achieved a

B.A. in PLANT SCIENCE.

She is currently working on her M.A. in RESILIENCE FARMING and FOOD SYSTEMS.

She is currently working as a Freelancer in the Agricultural Sector where she offers online courses in subjects in that sector, such as Laws and Regulations and Soil Health. She also works in a 'hands-on capacity' to assist on farms regarding natural subjects

Marquerite is the first to admit however, that her passion is hedgerows. We are very fortunate indeed that she has offered to share a few rips with readers of the Lee Valley Outlook. Apart from her experience in The Netherlands, Marquerite has been able to have aerial views of our local landscape, as well as looking at it from roads and higher land. She can see that Ireland's beautiful patchwork of fields is at risk of being taken apart, and she is concerned. In much of Europe they are now seen as vitally important features which should be retained.

Throughout Europe there are, amazingly, 108,000 different styles of hedges.

In her own country, The Netherlands, a lot of these hedges were removed in the 1960s and 1970s in response to a need to produce more food. They were taken down at that time because they were not seen to have a function.

Currently, with more knowledge as to their importance the Dutch are trying to bring them back. How much better it would be if we did not remove ours in the first place, only to realise their worth too late.

There is a real case here for appreciating what we have and here are some reasons why we can learn from the Dutch experience.

The focus in The Netherlands is now to bring back hedgerows with the awareness of how much help they can offer the farmer. The Dutch are reinstituting them as fodder-hedges for their cattle. This is mostly to provide these grazing animals with the nutrients and minerals which they cannot obtain solely from grass. There is a lot of medicinal value in trees and shrubs. An example is Willow, is a pain-killer which also slows the progression of infections. Hawthorn, also offers a number of functions, importantly concerning strengthening and improving the blood vessels around the heart. In addition to these medicinal contributions to the health of cattle, Black Elder and Oak contain tannins. Tannins cause better protein digestion which results in lesser methane output and a higher efficiency of protein use.

With our ongoing awareness of climate change it is worth considering the effects of warmer weather, and not just sunburn affecting the herd.

In the case of Dairy cattle, if the Humidity goes above about 50% with a temperature of 22% or higher, then milk production will decrease.

It has been found in The Netherlands, that if cattle have access to the shade from a hedge, then the South side of the hedge can have a temperature which can be measured at 50°C, whereas on the North side it can be measured at 20'C.

This is something local Irish farmers can check out for themselves, by placing thermometers on either side of hedges. As a result of local topography, hills etc. it is the farmer's own measurements on their own land

It is known that cattle prefer tree-shade which brings about greater milk production and this is more the case on hotter days, which are increasing.

The case for beef cattle is similar. If they do not have access to shade, with a temperature of 22'C and humidity of 50 or more, they will not gain weight.

Irish Hedge-Layers will be represented at the Dutch Hedge-Laying Championships, which annually represent different European styles and promote Hedge-Laying to youngsters. This year it will be held in the East of The Netherlands.

Marquerite reminds me that hedges that are in transition to full growth, will need temporary protection till they achieve it.

Farmers who have mature hedgerows rarely have to call out the vet, and need very little in the way of antibiotics.

One such farm known to her has been antibiotic free for two years.

Sheep will also self-medicate and in The Netherlands this is achieved by sheep which graze in natural treefilled areas

To conclude her advice, Marquerite reiterates that hedgerows are key, if one wants to raise healthy productive livestock.

It is no surprise that Marquerite loves hedge laying for these reasons. But she has 40 more reasons, which you will be able to find out about from her website, which will come online in the future. For now she is most willing to answer your questions by email, and I have to let you know that her English is excellent.

I am most grateful to Marquerite for sharing her knowledge with us and allowing us to learn so much about the wonders of hedgerows.



We must decide - Part 2

Last time we spoke about the most important life decision and posture regarding any personal problems. And that is with the mantra:

"I am deciding (today) to live in the solution rather than to continue living in the problem."

This is a game-changer. We flip the tables on what life has thrown at us. We decide that we want to be people described in the following quote of George **Bernard Shaw:**

"The people who get on in this world are the people who get up and look for the circumstances they want, and if they can't find them, they make them." Put simply: "either life happens to you or you happen to it."

So what now?

There are three directions in which we must grow in order to progress. But we must be patient. This is gradual, not a quick-fix.

The three directions are - inwardly, outwardly and upwardly.

(1) Inwardly

This is a hard, often lengthy, but necessary process. You and I must face up to the fact that while we are deeply flawed, at the same time we are always infinitely loved and lovable. It's not something we may have heard very often but you and I are unique and worthy. Our deepest longing is to love and to be loved in return. It's not touchy-feely. It's coming to the realization that you and I are worthy of respect - as is everyone else. This may not always have been your experience, which is why you might be undergoing anger, anxiety, grief, depression, self-loathing etc but it is true all the same. The love you were shown or were 'taught' was conditional or transactional. That's not love at all. "Love" is to want the best for the other unselfishly. It takes work. Some show it, others don't. I have to process this - heal and forgive. It's why we often try to cope, mope, dope, or elope. It's painful to face up to the truth of the past - when I was proud, selfish, arrogant, hurtful, even feeling entitled. But hope means I can become the person I truly am meant to be. Loved, lovable and loving. It's a new dawn when I can truly own this truth.

Bottom line - I can begin to show the love I never got.

(2) Upwardly

Upwardly to God, our Higher Power. Like the addict undergoing some of the 12 steps program I have included above, "we came to realize that our lives had become unmanageable." We were (are) a mess. But God can work with that if we let him. We are no longer running away. We are totally honest, holding nothing back from Him. We come to live according to the Serenity Prayer. The most important three words I can and must say at this point to God are:

"I uconditionally surrender!" I can also seek to be forgiven, and to find an accountability partner. Keep a journal if it helps.

(3) Outwardly - to acknowledge the world of others! But in a new way. All of the things you have experienced, or are currently experiencing on your journey may well be their story too. They haven't discovered it yet or are still trying to figure things out. Whether you realize it or not, you now see every person in a new light. Imagine for example that everyone around is you is having other worst day. If it was you, how would you like to treated? Gently, I imagine. We are surrounded by co-sufferers. Nearly 2000 years ago St Peter put it this way: ...standing firm in the faith. Do so in the knowledge that your fellow believers are enduring the same suffering throughout the world."

But I think St Paul put it best when he said: "we are part of God's great help." "Blessed be our God and Father... who comforts us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort which we ourselves are comforted by God." (2 Corinthians 1:3)

We might often wonder at life's purpose and our part in it. We also question what we our talent might possibly be. Your story, and mine, matters. Everything that did happen, happened for a reason. We wish it hadn't involved so much hardship or humiliation to get us to this point. CS Lewis said "we come to discover the world of others." As the Disney movie 'Encanto' put it, and as Edith Eger teaches: "you come to realize that YOU are the gift."
