

The Active Retirement Group had some lovely day trips during the summer, to Gougane Barra, Garnish Island and Bantry, the most recent one was to Bantry House and Whiddy.

Our typical Irish weather was not so kind to us on this last day trip, but it did not dampen the spirits. First stop was Bantry House where we enjoyed an insight of how the rich and famous lived in days gone past. This stately mansion has a beautiful view out over Bantry Bay but on this occasion, the café was more attractive than the gardens to most. The windy day gave us some swell on the ferry trip to Whiddy but this was all part of the craic while embracing the conditions, emphasizing our resilience and positive attitude. The lovely little old pub and restaurant on the island was the destination, where we had some great chat and stories told until our trip back to the mainland. A few cut the visit short, and returned to Bantry for a bit of retail therapy.

The group took a break from indoor events and meetings during the summer, but returned in strength on the 1st September with an excellent presentation by Garda Orla Doyle, our Community Garda. To say she impressed us would be an understatement. We were blown away by the amazing presentation she gave on safety and security. The amount of advice and knowledge that she gave us about our personal security, security in our homes and safety when out and about gave us a lot to think about.

When we think about burglaries, we think about broken down doors and windows to get access, but we forget that burglars like easy opportunities. If they have to make a lot of noise, spend a lot of time, or risk been seen, the chances are they wont bother and move onto easier targets. The obvious thing is to

make sure all doors and windows are securely locked when leaving your house, and not make it easy for them. We tend to forget that visibility from the public road makes their job much easier. If there are high hedges and walls, providing privacy to your home, the chances are that this also makes the place more attractive to the burglar, as they can go about their task easier if they cannot be seen. And having a lot of light around your property is a great deterrent.

Orla went though a very extensive checklist of how we should secure our home and the obvious things that we overlook. She advised us to exercise caution when people knock on our door, always ask for ID and be very careful about false ID. Make that phone call, be it to the company they are saying they represent or to the local Gardai and they will leg it fast if they are not genuine. There are so many things that are obvious but the less obvious ones are that ones that

the burglar will cop. Are you away on holiday and your lawn is unusually untidy. Get someone to cut your grass when you are away.

Supposing you urgently have to call an ambulance for yourself or someone else. There is a little green bottle available at the Garda station that you should have in your house. It should contain all your personal details, contact for a family member, a brief medical history and a list of your medication. This initiative is funded by the Lions Club. Most of the members never heard of it. Orla had a supply of these bottles available for the members and a box of high viz vests for anyone venturing out after dark.

This is just a snapshot of her complete presentation. If you have an opportunity to go to one of these presentations, it will be the best couple of hours you will spend.

WEST CORK AT WAR


Available now in bookshops and online, West Cork at War is a fascinating new book on the Civil War in West Cork, which tells the dramatic story of the largely forgotten guerrilla war that engulfed the region during the autumn and winter of 1922.


It reveals the great tragedy of a time when former comrades in arms, old friends and families fought each other for the elusive Irish Republic.

Containing new research from recently released archives, it also sheds new light on incidents such as the notorious Bandon Valley massacre, the tragic death of Michael Collins at Beálnabláth, the violent attacks on the towns of West Cork towns and the incredible adventures of the legendary armoured car Sliabh na mBan.

The author, Anthony Barrett, a professional engineer working in the pharma industry who has a keen interest in local history, grew up in Ballineen, hearing many stories of the War of Independence from the locality, but was largely unaware of the extent of the Civil War activities in this region until he began researching this book. Though it is a difficult and controversial history, it is part of all of our ancestors' past and deserves to be remembered.

West Cork at War is published by Eastwood Books, part of the Wordwell Group. Its official launch will take place in Cronin's Bar, Gougane Barra, on October 4 at 4 p.m.


Macroom Mens Shed





Some other Tidy Towns groups cease work later in the year and take a break for the Winter and resume in Spring. Macroom Tidy Towns however continue to work all year round and have monthly meetings every month also. Many people compliment and admire the work we do and admire but why not consider doing something small yourself in your own local areas if you are not already involved. This helps overall effort, inspires others and there is a feel-good factor. We in Tidy Towns will support you in whatever way we can. 

Relaunch of Inchigeela Walks by Croí na Laoi

On Sunday September 7th last; a set of walks were relaunched in Inchigeela. These walks are of varying levels and distances and are suitable for all walkers, cyclists and runners. The event was launched at 1pm with the unveiling of the new mapboard in River Island car park. The walks were put together by Nora O'Riordan and Theresa Cotter in 2014 and more work was completed on the trails in the past year to get them Sports Ireland approved with the inputting of a vast amount of way markers and a new mapboard in the island with detail on five walks along with a QR code for phone/digital access to the map. The walks offer a huge variety of distances and difficulty to cater for all levels through very different landscapes which are all offered from the one trail head. All these routes are on quiet country roads but offer very different viewing and majestic unspoilt landscape on every route. One route called Céim Daunt is a short 4 km loop through an indigenous and ancient oak woodland, another carries you on a 10 km sharp incline through the mountains that is akin to the Scottish Highlands with heather moorland and majestic views over the mountainscape and lake country on offer while it offers another route along a series of lakes on the River Lee called the South Lake Road. This route is similar to a coast road even though it is along fresh water. The relaunch was attended by local politicians John Paul O'Shea TD, Andrias Moynihan TD, Senator Eileen Lynch, Councillor Kate Lynch and Councillor Gobnait Moynihan. Chairman Tim Maher spoke about the importance of community work and commended the vast amount of work completed by the sub committee. Shane Galvin led the sub committee of Croí na Laoi who delivered the project where they worked on this for the last year. Galvin spoke about the importance of the team involved in the project and

outlined the process in getting these walks nationally approved by the State. Andy Wells, Dan Kelleher, Neasa Ní Laoire, John F O Callaghan, Anthony Murphy and Tim O'Shea were all part of that team and all were pivotal to the success of the project. There were two walks completed on the day in aid of West Cork Rapid Response who were in attendance at the event. Liam Slattery and Kate Crowley of the organisation spoke at the event about the importance of what they do and the voluntary nature of their emergency service to West Cork residents. The 4km loop was led out by the West Cork Rapid Response 4x4 and another group tackled the slopes to do the Derenannig Linear 10 km walk. A large crowd attended the event where refreshments and music were provided in Creedons Hotel afterwards. Croí na Laoi is a very active Tidy Towns and Development Society and has lots of exciting projects in progress which will benefit the community in the long term. They are actively working on another forest trail / walk with panoramic Lake views at the Holy Year Cross and are seeking to redevelop the local community hall as well as a walking bridge crossing the river Lee. The walks are now available in Inchigeela which is a beautiful part of the upper Lee Valley in a hidden corner of West Cork. Why not try them out and explore this hidden gem.

CROSSNALANNIV (Forrest townland)

In Ireland, unbaptized babies were historically buried in unconsecrated areas known as cillíní (children's burial grounds) The graves were often simple, marked by small stones, and burials occurred discreetly, sometimes at night, which may have been an attempt to deter Grave robbers, who up to the late 1800's stole bodies from fresh graves and sold them to medical schools for research. Cillíní were also used for rapid mass burials during times of crisis, like the Great Famine. Cillíní were also often sites of an earlier church, and the site at Crossnalanniv may well have been such a site, as the field south of the road is called the 'Kil field', meaning the field of the Church For centuries in Ireland, from the medieval period on, babies who died before, at, or shortly after childbirth were buried separately from older people, in what was usually in unconsecrated ground though sometimes it could be within the grounds of an ancient church. Often these sites were at crossroads, on boundaries between townlands and away from houses.

Crossnalanniv is on the boundary between Rathonoane (Forrest) and Knockavullig. A short distance away and close to Canovee Church is

Kilcoulaghta Burial Ground which is also on the boundary between two townlands, Killinardrish and Coolnasoon. So this would suggest that Crossnalanniv was really a burial ground in the vicinity of Church

Crois na Leanbh' is a common enough placename which you will often see on the old Ordnance Survey maps. While unbaptised infants were mainly buried at such places, sometimes toddlers were buried in them and even the occasional adult. In Britain there was a practice where the baby's body was placed in the coffin of an adult for burial, though rarely recorded in the Parish records. (I am not sure how widespread this practice was)

The report into the Organ retention audit some years uncovered a number of cases in Cork Hospitals where there was no record of the burial a small number babies in the 1980's


So the problem in Irish society of dealing properly with infant deaths, whether baptized or not may be a lot more common than previously though.

Throughout Ireland today many cillíní have been restored, sometimes with simple monuments, to remember and honor the lives of these forgotten children and to provide a sense of dignity and acknowledgment for the families affected.

On Saturday night the 20th of September after 6.30pm Mass, in Canovee Church, our parish priest Fr Kieron O'Driscoll will bless the burial site at Crossnalanniv

GOUGÁN BARRA I n-AIMSEAR EABHARDACH


(Gougane Barra in Edwardian Times)

Tadgh Ó Cúill-Maonlaí

Le linn ré na hEadoáir, sheas Béal Átha Ghaorthaidh amach mar lárionad gníomhaíochta cultúrtha, in ainneoin a shuímh iargúlta shuaimhní sna Cnoic Shéithe. Bhí cáil ar an sráidbhaile agus ar na gleannta máguaird mar shiombail den athbheochan ar an nGaeilge agus ar an traidisiún Gaelach, rud a mheall cuairteoirí, scoláirí agus oilithrigh. Sa tírdhreach ciúin seo lán de lochanna agus de shléibhte, áit a raibh an Ghaeilge fós beo, bhí féilte, feiseanna agus ceiliúrtha reiligiúnacha lán le féiniúlacht náisiúnta agus bród cultúrtha.

Thug tuairisceoir an 'Cork Examiner' faoi deara i 1902 nár deineadh cruinniú chomh mór céanna i nGougán Barra riamh agus a tháinig le chéile don fhéile bhliantúil Naomh Fionnbarra. Bhí an lá breá gréine: bhí na sléibhte, na gleannta agus na srutháin ar a ndícheall, agus léirigh an loch spéir ghorm agus na sléibhte dorcha arda ar gach taobh. Ar an Oileán Naofa, in aice leis an sean-dhúnta ciorclach, sheas séipéal beag a thóg an tAthair Hurley as Inse Geimhleach. Cé go raibh sé fairsing don áit, ní raibh sé ábalta freastal ar na sluaite móra. Fuair an scríbhneoir sólás spioradálta ag féachaint ar mhuintir na háite ag sileadh isteach óna dtithe sléibhtiúla iargúlta, agus mhínigh sé iad mar chineálacha fíor-Chéilteach - mná óga, lán fuinnimh, in éineacht le fir láidre oibre. Tháinig go leor i gcairtí agus i ngluaisteáin ó bhaile i bhfad i gcéin, ach dar leis, ba í an radharc ba mhó tionchair ná na rothaithe iomadúla a líon gach spás ar fáil. Luaigh sé go raibh oilithrigh tagtha ó Mhaigh Chromtha, Inse Geimhleach, Béal Átha Ghaorthaidh, Baile Bhúirne, Cill Garbháin, Gleann Garbh agus An Chaolchoill.

I 1903, chuir 'An Claidheamh Soluis' síos ar Ghougán Barra mar cheann de na háiteanna ba bhreátha agus ba uaigneacha i gCorcaigh Thiar, agus mar cheann de na cúpla ceantar sa chontae arbh fhíor-Ghaeltacht a d'fhéadfaí a thabhairt air. Luaigh an scríbhneoir dhá chomhartha annamh lasmuigh den Déise agus de Ghaeltacht Chiarraí—páistí ag labhairt Gaeilge agus Gaeil gan Bhéarla. Roghnaíodh An Gúgán mar láthair scoil samhraidh, agus measadh gur áit iontach a bhí ann. Thug siad faoi deara go raibh Inse Geimhleach agus Béal Átha Ghaorthaidh b'fhéidir ar na sráidbhailte ba Ghaelaí i gCorcaigh. Bhí lóistín ar fáil sna bailte seo, i dtithe feirme, nó san óstán in aice leis an loch.



Cuireadh béim ar ról an Athar Dr. Daly ó Mhailbourne, a bhí le feidhmiú mar shagart ar an séipéal beag a thóg an tAthair Hurley. Bhíothas muiníneach go meallfadh aer úr, radharcra sléibhtiúil agus fuaim shruthán an Laoi Gaela go leor mac léinn.

I mí Dheireadh Fómhair 1904, thaifead an 'Donegal News' ceiliúradh Fhéile Fhionnbarra i nGougán Barra. Léigh an tAthair Walsh as Corcaigh an Ard-Aifrinn, agus thug an tAthair Dr. Daly óráid Ghaelach ar onóir an naoimh os comhair pobail beagnach uile-Ghaelach. Faoi 1905, bhí an 'Irish Independent' ag tuairisciú ar ról méadaitheach na háite san athbheochan. Rugadh an tAthair Dr. Richard O'Daly in Astráil, le tuismitheoirí as an gceantar, agus cuireadh oideachas air i Róimh. Tháinig sé go hÉirinn chun a chuid Gaeilge a fheabhsú agus chabhraigh sé le oilithrigh i nGougán Barra. Sa samhradh 1905, bhailigh sé scoláirí ó gach cearn d'Éirinn agus ón gceantar áitiúil, rud a mheastar gur tús leis an gColáiste Gaeilge.

Thosnaigh na laethanta le hAifreann agus urnaíthe i nGaeilge, an Choróin Mhuire agus an tAingeal Dé. Bhí ranganna i dTigh Óstán Uí Chrónín, agus siúlóidí chun comhrá a dhéanamh i nGaeilge leis an bpobal áitiúil. Bhí cruinnithe tráthnóna gach lá agus seanmóin Ghaelach ar an Domhnach. An fhómhar sin, ag Féile i mBaile Bhúirne, gheall an tAthair Goulding as an Nua-Shéalainn síntiús bliantúil don Choláiste. Tháinig cúnamh ón gConradh i Londain agus i mBaile Átha Cliath freisin.

De bharr srianta lóistín i nGougán, roghnaíodh Béal Átha Ghaorthaidh ina áit. Bhí halla léachta ann, scoileanna Gaelacha, agus lóistín fóirsteanach. D'oscail an Coláiste dhá sheisiún samhraidh i 1906 faoi stiúir Dhiarmada Uí Fhoghlú, le cabhair ón Dr. O'Daly agus T. A. Ó Scannláin. Bhí ranganna ar fhóinéitic, ar fhilíocht

Ghaeilge, ar leabhair scoile, ar chomhrá agus ar stair na hÉireann. Úsáideadh an Ghaeilge i gcónaí.

Bhailigh os cionn fiche scoláire ag gach seisiún sagairt, ollúna, múinteoirí náisiúnta agus eagraithe de chuid an Chonartha. D'imigh siad go léir le brón, agus le súil filleadh. Scaip tionchar an Choláiste go sciobtha, agus admhaíodh go raibh baint mhór aige leis an athbheochan. Bhí páistí áitiúla ag múineadh Gaeilge ar fud na tíre. Rinneadh pleananna le haghaidh níos mó léachtóirí agus lóistín. Tháinig Ard-Easpag Chaiseal, Easpaig Chorcaí agus na hEaspaig Mumhan eile ina bpátrúin, agus bhronn siad síntiúis. Bhí súil ag go leor go bhfilleadh an Coláiste lá éigin ar an seanláithreán i nGougán Barra.

Faoi 1907, bhí obair an Chonartha i mBéal Átha Ghaorthaidh daingean. Ag an gCruinniú Bliantúil sin, faoi chathaoirleacht an Athar T. Ó Murchú, d'fhreastail múinteoirí, comhairleoirí dúiche agus clanna áitiúla.

Mhol an tAthair Ó Murchú tacaíocht láidir an cheantair don athbheochan, ag maíomh go raibh freagracht ar leith ar Bhéal Átha Ghaorthaidh mar go raibh an Ghaeilge fós forleathan ann. D'áitigh sé gur chóir don phobal an Ghaeilge a dhéanamh ina teanga laethúil arís. Dúirt sé gur ghlac an ghluaiseacht Ghaelach gné chultúrtha, mhorálta agus phatriótach, ag tabhairt prionsabail, ionracas agus bróid do dhaoine.

D'iarr sé ar thuismitheoirí Gaeilge a labhairt lena gclann, ar sheandaoine Béarla a sheachaint, agus ar gach teach a bheith ina scoil bheag. Mhol sé ranganna áitiúla Gaeilge, bunú scoil oíche agus seomra léitheoireachta. Chuir sé béim ar rath Choláiste na Mumhan mar chruthúnas ar thábhacht náisiúnta an cheantair. Luaigh sé freisin gluaiseacht an staonadh, ag tabhairt faoi deara go raibh go leor óige tar éis éirí ina n-astantaigh iomlána, ag tabhairt sampla maith don phobal.

VACCINATION & HERD MANAGEMENT MODERN SOLUTIONS TO CONTROLLING TRANSMISSION BADGER-COW TB







Hi! Chris Barrett Back again. Today we hear from Donal O'Leary and Bernadette McCarthy who are both members of MDEG, The MACROOM & DISTRICT ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP whose achievements I wrote about in a recent article.

Badgers, with their distinctive black and white heads, are one of Ireland's most recognisable wild mammals. They generally eat lots of earthworms as well as insects and invertebrates, small prey animals, carrion, fruit, vegetables, grains and seeds. They are shy and elusive creatures, and they have a highly advanced social structure among their family groups. Adult female badgers are known as sows, adult males are called boars, and the young are referred to as cubs. Badgers live in dens called setts, which are networks of tunnels with numerous entrances. If undisturbed, badgers can continue to use a sett for very long times - there is one in Germany that has been estimated to be in use for 10,000 years, although this is of course difficult to

Badgers are protected in Ireland under the 1976 Wildlife Act. However, they are also subject to culling by the Department of Agriculture. This is because some badgers become infected with bovine tuberculosis (bTB) and can pass it onto cattle. The badgers are culled by trapping and shooting by licenced operators. The cost to the Irish state of wildlife control to reduce incidence of bTB was €9.2 million in 2024, €7.7 million in 2023, and €6.4 million in 2022, Several thousand badgers are killed in the culling programme each year. The use of snares to trap badgers causes untold pain to the badgers and other wild and domestic animals that get caught in them.

From Wikipedia: Bovine tuberculosis chronic infectious disease that affects broad range of mammalian hosts, including humans, cattle, deer, llamas, pigs, domestic cats, wild carnivores and omnivores; it rarely affects equids or sheep. The disease can be transmitted in several ways; for example, it can be spread in exhaled air, sputum, urine, faeces, and pus, so the disease can be transmitted by direct contact, contact with the excreta of an infected animal, or inhalation of aerosols, depending on the species involved.

Outbreaks of bTB in cattle herds can be financially and mentally devastating for farmers. The Irish Farmers' Association estimates that the costs to farmers in Ireland for bTB testing, loss of productivity and loss of genetic gains, disinfection, and all other expenses may have reached a total of over €155 million for 2024.

The cost to the Exchequer is also very high - in 2024, the Department of Agriculture spent €101 million on bTB control including compensation payments to farmers. This figure also includes the €9.2 million spent on wildlife control, including badger culling, already mentioned.

It is scientifically established that badgers are a wildlife

reservoir and vector for transmission of bTB to cattle. and this knowledge has been used to justify culling programmes in Ireland and some other countries. However, it is questionable whether culling is effective compared to other scientifically grounded strategies for controlling bTB, and whether the gains in reducing bTB outbreaks in cattle outweigh the financial costs and the suffering caused by culling methods.

A study in Britain was carried out by the Independent Scientific Group to advise the government on how best to tackle the problem of bTB. This study, called the Randomised Badger Culling Trial, published its final report in 2007, and contained the following findings: In a stable badger population, there is limited movement of badgers from one area to another. This is because the animals form social groups, and each group maintains its own territory. In this scenario, badger setts harbouring high levels of bTB infection tend to remain relatively separate. When most badgers are removed from a cull area, a new territory opens up allowing badgers to come in from the surrounding areas. Badger movements around and beyond the infected area increase. Newly arrived badgers tend to pick up the infection from abandoned setts and from unculled infected animals. As well, because of the reduced population of badgers in an area, the ones that remain will move around much more than they did before the cull. This is called the perturbation

Because of this dynamic of changed badger behaviour due to perturbation, the benefits of culling are undermined. Any short-term reduction in bTB being spread by badgers in a small area will quickly disappear.

Instead, a more efficient use of resources may be to (1) focus on reducing the spread of bTB from cattle to land and from cattle to other cattle, and (2) increase the programme of vaccinating badgers in areas that may harbour the risk of infection.

(1) Vaccination of cattle using the Bacillus Calmette-Guerin (BCG) vaccine has been shown in trials to hugely reduce transmission of bTB between cattle - in one study conducted by the University of Cambridge, reported by Agriland in 2024, the reduction was almost 90%. Unfortunately, current EU rules do not allow for large-scale BCG vaccination of cattle as the vaccination can confound the testing procedures used for bTB and can result in false positive results. There is surely a strong argument for changing the laws to allow greater protection of herds, livelihoods, and taxpayers' money, if vaccination is more effective than

The literature also advises frequent cleansing and disinfecting of anywhere that cattle share space and making sure that uninfected animals do not come in contact with potentially infectious cattle.

bTB is spread around the land by movement and

grazing of infected cattle (and other infected animals). It is also distributed when infected slurry is spread, and this is a likely reason why many badgers become infected in the first place. Badgers will not approach cattle, though they may drink or feed from available sources of water or ration. However, if the earthworms in the soil where they forage have been in contact with bTB bacteria, then it is difficult for them to avoid infection. It is more likely that cattle, being much larger animals and naturally very curious, will approach badgers and their setts than the other way around.

(2) The BCG vaccine can reduce transmission of bTB from badger to badger, and from badger to cattle. This approach has been trialled in Ireland and found to be significantly effective, and the number of badgers being vaccinated is being increased. Vaccination must replace culling entirely to protect the population of badgers and to prevent spread of bTB through the perturbation effect described earlier.

Bernadette tells us of a number of studies which have shown that badger culling is ineffective in the long term in that the surviving badgers, once their setts are destroyed will travel long distances to form new setts and potentially increase possibilities of contact with cattle. For example, a study using GPS collars to map badger activity showed that badgers travelled further due to disruptions in their behaviour in areas where culling was taking place and thus increased opportunities for contact with bovines (Woodroffe et al., Journal of Applied Ecology 43 (1),2006).

Therefore as well as being inhumane and damaging to biodiversity, culling is a threat to the well-being of cattle and the dairying industry. It should be noted that deer, many of which are non native are also responsible for the spread of bovine T.B.

Research since the early 2000s has focused on a more humane and sustainable alternative: badger vaccination. A study by Rosie Woodroffe and colleagues published in 'People and Nature 6(5) 2024), has shown that vaccinating badgers is more effective than culling. Over four years , researchers vaccinated 265 badgers across 12 farms in Cornwall. They found the percentage of badgers testing positive for bTB fell from 16% to zero.

In a more large scale study based in Ireland, Professor Eamonn Gormley of Veterinary School of Medicine in UCD has been conducting the Badger Vaccination Project. The project started with field trials in Kilkenny in 2019 and bovines from the area were monitored in subsequent years. The project has demonstrated that vaccination of badgers with the BCG vaccine generates high levels of protective immunity against bovine TB. Badger vaccination is now an integral part of the Irish TB Eradication Programme. According to Minister for Agriculture, Martin Heydon, 3,830 badgers were vaccinated in Ireland last year. Badger vaccination is thus being substituted for continued culling of

badgers such that a significant reduction in the numbers of badgers killed can be achieved over the coming years while still maintaining effective control of the risk posed to cattle. The vaccination Programme initiated in 2019 is gradually being rolled out on a county by county basis but does not as yet appear to have reached Cork.

Now that policy is shifting in favour of vaccination, which is seen as more humane and progressive, why is culling still ongoing? the vaccination Programme deserves greater funding and resourcing so as to end the cruel and ineffective process of culling badgers,

It should be highlighted that husbandry is also an important element of preventing bovine T.B.

For example, fencing off badger setts allows the management of contacts between badgers and cattle. Badgers tend to keep away from cattle by nature but cattle are naturally nosy and will nose around the sett increasing the risk of contact.

As the size of the national herd has increased significantly in recent decades, and farming practices have become more intensive, the risk of cattle-to-cattle transmission of bTB has grown larger. It is estimated that 94% of bTB transmission is between cattle. While badgers may rightly be considered to be a reservoir and vector for infection of cattle, this contribution to the problem is very small compared to crossinfection between cattle and distribution of infection

by spreading of slurry and contamination of water. Farmers are under pressure to manage their stocks, their resources, and their waste, and there is a need for a responsible and well-informed consideration of how to ensure that farming is supported to be sustainable, both economically and environmentally.

Growing up in the rural Ireland in the 1950's travel was a far cry from the modern roadworks of today. Indeed, in those Summer school days we walked to Gurrane National School in our bare feet and this did not pose a problem on the un-tarred roads. It was not until the late 1950's that the Ballyvourney to Clondrohid road was tarred properly but the road from "The Junction" to our laneway at Baratanaknuck took a few years longer. With few cars on the road the bicycles plus horse drawn carts, traps and sidecars were still very much in demand

When Clondrohid N.S. played their Ballyvourney counterparts in the mid '50s they travelled West in Kelleher's lorry while for the return game at Clondrohid the Ballyvourney team made the journey in Lucey's lorry. Incidentally that game was played in the field behind the Clondrohid Tavern and it was my first time to see a team playing in the proper jerseys of Ballyvourney. One of their star players was Tony Kelleher who also donned a peaked cap for good measure. Close on seventy years later his grandnephew Liam Kelleher of the Douglas GAA Club was Captain of the Cork Minor Hurling team in 2024.

Back to the 1950's school holidays included meeting our school friends and cousins and cycling to the sports days at Macroom, Kilnamartyra and Ballinagree. Of course there were the day trips to Macroom Show and the Whitsun at Ballyvourney and the week long Carnival at Clondrohid. Excursions to the seaside were a rarity so we had to settle for the Banks of the Sullane and the Foherish rivers. About that time also a group of locals including my dad, Con Walsh Snr., Johnny Twomey, Eddie Walsh Snr. and Bob Murphy made the annual trip to Killorgan for Puck Fair.

Around 1960, I travelled to Killorgan with Con Walsh Snr, my dad plus our chauffeur Con Walsh Jnr. Making a brief stop at Joy's pub at Killorgan we took advantage

of the fine weather and journeyed to Glenbeigh and to the seaside resort of Rossbeigh. I remember being fascinated by the waves drifting towards the coastline. Con Walsh Jnr enjoyed a swim in the sea and for me it was my first time dipping my feet in the salt water. Roll on the years and in 1982 we made the trip to Ballyheigue in North Kerry for a week long holiday by the coast. The excellent beach, the pleasant 3 mile seaside walks to "The Rock" and the friendly welcome of the local people kept us coming back. This practice has continued for the last forty years and the journey is now much easier with the much improved roadway, embellished by the recently completed Macroom and Ballyvourney bypass. For us Ballyheigue had it all including the 10 mile cycle around Kerry Head and the GAA pitch adjoining our Caravan Park where Hurling, and Hurling only, was played 'til dusk. The children

enjoyed the Funfair and the Merries each evening and we all rounded off the days with sing songs at "The Castle Arms" and "Flahives". The years have moved on so quickly and now we still make the annual trips to Ballyheigue. We look forward to meeting old friends and creating new memories for the next generation. Little has changed on the beach and the GAA pitch is still attracting the future Hurling stars but personally the cycle around Kerry Head is proving much more difficult - oh the ravages of time!!. The "Castle Arms" is no more but "Jimmy Brown's" and "Flahives" are still going strong. Many familiar faces are gone for their eternal holiday in the skies while us, the fortunate few, recall our happy times together. Plans are already made to return again next year and before we know it the holiday is over.

HSE South West Launches New Women's Health Podcast to Empower and Educate



HSE South West today launched a 'Women's Health Podcast - Your Body, Mind and Baby', a new series from the Ireland South Women and Infants Health Directorate in conversation with Dr Doireann O'Leary. The podcast is designed as a valuable resource for women and families, offering expert insights, advice and support across obstetrics, gynaecology and newborn health. It will cover a wide range of important topics including complex menopause, menorrhagia, pelvic floor dysfunction, supporting families through the NICU, breastfeeding support, birth reflections, perinatal mental health and the early days with newborns.

The series launches with two episodes. In the first, 'The First 6 Weeks - Take the Help', Dr Aisling Garvey and Dr Neidin Bussmann, Consultant Neonatologists at Cork University Maternity Hospital (CUMH), join Dr Doireann O'Leary to share their personal experiences of early parenthood. They discuss breastfeeding challenges, vaccinations, the RSV immunisation, and the physical and emotional toll of the newborn period. Neidin also reflects openly on her own postnatal struggles, describing how she felt as though she was "walking through a fog."

The second episode, Birth Reflections, features Senior Midwives Gillian Walsh and Alex Campbell from CUMH, who highlight the positive impact of the



Birth Reflections service in supporting women after childbirth.

Dr Mairead O'Riordan, Clinical Director at CUMH, welcomed the launch, saying:

"We are passionate about putting the patient at the heart of our service. Our priority is to educate and empower women to ensure they receive the best and most appropriate care. Across our health service, we have incredible professionals dedicated to delivering expert care every day, but we also want to reach women where they are. The HSE is a trusted source for healthcare, but care does not need to happen only in hospital. We need to bring our experts to women, complementing and supporting their care plans."

She also highlighted the contribution of Dr Doireann

"Dr O'Leary brings a wealth of knowledge and insight not only through her work as a GP but also through her strong digital presence. 



Your temperament

I love to 'people watch.' When I'm in a public place like at a café, park bench, waiting in line at an airport or in slow traffic I observe how people interact. What is striking to me is seeing seemingly mismatched couples holding hands. A hulk of a male rugby player may tower over a petite diminutive lady but she's boss! A beauty and a beast scenario. You ask yourself how did they ever match up. You might well ask what some people may see in each other.

What fascinates me is that opposite personalities attract! We complement each other. A pacemaker marries a peacemaker, an accelerator marries a brake, a spender marries a saver, an extrovert marries an introvert, precocious person marries someone who is precautious!

It doesn't always go smoothly, however. If you find yourself saying " if only he/ she would ..." then keep reading!

According to the ancient Greeks there are four possible temperaments. These are known as choleric, sanguine, melancholic and phlegmatic. To the Greeks these were 'humours' or moods under the influence of bodily fluids, as the names suggest.

But they do come close to life experience when we examine them. The four dominant personalities can be compared to modes of transportation - the choleric person is like a bulldozer, a sanguine like a rollercoaster, a melancholic like a punctual train, and a phlegmatic person glides like a gondola. The choleric person is direct and to the point, the sanguine is the party animal, the melancholic is the painstaking perfectionist, and the phlegmatic is laid-back. We can be a mixture of two of these but the opposite temperaments of choleric and phlegmatic don't feature together in one individual, nor do melancholic and sanguine tendencies.

Each temperament has their place in a relationship but each is in danger of becoming extreme and needs to be checked from time to time.

Cholerics are at their best in a crisis - decisive and brilliant in directing emergencies - they think on their feet and manage well until the crisis is over. But they are confused as to their role in calmer waters. They can be brutally undiplomatic. They need to learn tact and an awareness of how their directness may come across as insensitivity.

Sanguines are the party animals, extroverts, social planners, with hectic social $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right)$ calendars. The glass is half-full. But as colourful butterflies they never land anywhere too long and may come across as superficial, lacking identity, depth or seriousness. They need to learn consistency and follow-through.

Melancholics are precise, accurate, measured. They are neat, tidy and pay attention to detail. They are the aircraft designers and engineers. Hugely trustworthy, but need to look up and lighten up socially. They see the downside and disadvantages and the glass is usually half empty for them.

Phlegmatics' favourite word is 'mañana.' There's no urgency for them. They take their time coming to a decision, sometimes maddeningly so. They have to weigh all their options. They meet every deadline on the final day - or ask for an extension. "Pressure is for tyres." They need to be reminded or nagged. But they will usually put on the kettle before making a decision.

Opposites attract. So the combination in couples can be frustrating or hilarious. What's recommended though is to develop practiced awareness that we don't all see the same thing in precisely the same way. Know your temperament. See that your family members have varying temperaments - often polar opposite ones. We don't all operate the same. Communication is key, and learning what makes them tick or 'switch on.' And in the process being able to laugh at yourself.

Which type are you?


