

THE MACROMPIAN COMMUNITY ACTIVE RETIREMENT

Our Active Retirement group activities are continuing, and about 25 members are enjoying Chair Yoga every Thursday evening. So much so that they have asked that it will continue on right up to Christmas and possibly beyond. There is a wide range of presentations to cater for the many and varied interests of the members.

Its fair to say that most of us in the Active Retirement Group were not born in the age of technology. Most of us grew up without even a telephone in our home, and when we did get this complicated looking device tucked away in some quite corner of the house, we were severely curtailed in its use, as most households could only afford to use it for any reason other than business or an emergency. In the 1980s we had the introduction of cordless phones, and if were tempted to sneak a quick chat with our friends, we disappeared with it under the bedclothes. Next came mobile phones, which most of us remember were Nokia, so we couldn't believe our luck when we got our own personal phone. Then, there was a major step forward when smartphones were launched. But those of us that grew up with operator-assisted and rotary dial phones did not adjust too well to the functionality of these devices. To overcome our difficulties and learn a few "new tricks", we called on the Girl Guides to come to our assistance. This proved to be an amazing experience from all sides. One of the Girl Guides sat down with one of the Active Retired members, and in a one to one, the members got instruction and guidance through whatever was causing them difficulty. Whether it be to add new contacts or set up a WhatsApp group, the queries were varied, and what was major challenging to those of us in the senior group was second nature and effortless to the girls. These girls were born in the era of modern technology and could answer anything that they were asked. They were the most helpful, mannerly and considerate bunch of young people, and it was so lovely to spend a night with them.

On Tuesday night last, Martin O'Mahony of Ballyvourney Nurseries gave a wonderful talk about perennials and the garden in Autumn. He demonstrated a very thorough knowledge of plants and the conditions favoured by them. He gave us some very useful advice about how to protect our plants from slugs and snails without the use of chemicals that are harmful to the birds and wildlife. He sells this mix, which he has formulated himself

using all natural products. If your garden is plagued by these creatures, and like most people now, who are conscious of the damage done by chemicals to the environment, a trip to the square on Tuesdays is well worthwhile. This magic formula sure doesn't smell very nice, but it seems the snails are equally upset about it as it sends them on their merry away to seek sustenance elsewhere, without killing them or any other creature. It's the perfect answer but somehow, it's a well-kept secret, because nobody attending had even heard about it.

Our next presentation coming up is Art through the medium of Watercolour. Carole Anne Floyd, an accomplished artist, is living in West Cork, where she draws inspiration from the natural beauty of her surroundings. She is an experienced teacher and, on the night, she will demonstrate a watercolour of a local landscape. She will guide us through the basic elements, such as mixing colours, perspective and composition and this is a great starting point if you are new to painting. There will be plenty hints and tips for those who have already dabbled in watercolour painting as she is excellent at encouraging people to discover their creative potential.



I was astounded by their generosity, realizing that all this stuff would make money for Meals on Wheels. My good friend Catherine Doherty got on her WhatsApp groups and she and her husband, Howard started bringing car loads of items that they collected from their friends. Goods were brought, some new in their box, anything 'from a needle to an anchor'.

I set about preparing, sorting and pricing, but I soon realized I'm not going to get through all this lot. In panic, I enlisted the help of three friends that also volunteered with me in NCBI. Ann Marie Corkery, Mary Barry and Noreen O'Donoghue were angels and worked their way throught the mountains of goods. As it came together, it was all so interesting and many stories developed around it. A lovely lady, Chris arrived with a really old Military Box, dusty from being stored in her attic for the last 20 odd years. She related the story attached to it. It was owned by her uncle who was in the British Army and it was used to transport bombs and ammunition. I got onto the local Antique dealers, Michael and his wife Mary, who are a mine of information on all things vintage and they valued it at €40 to €60. Through word of mouth, it promptly sold for €50. This was the first and very encouraging transaction. Another lovely lady Louise, donated chinaware that was her grandmothers and had great sentimental value to her. Artist, Liam Forde brought one of his own lovely paintings of Gougane Barra, which was auctioned.

Only for my wonderful grandchildren, Jamie and

Daniel, I couldn't have done it without them. They came and stayed and worked early and late. When the Gazebos went up out front, the place took on the look of something about to happen. John Lyons and Jennifer O'Sullivan got to work, assisted by Daniel and Jamie and made the place look as if Fossett's had come to town. My daughter in law, Alma organized the decorations with lots of buntings and balloons, donated by Dave in Connections, creating a wonderful carnival effect.

Catherine L Murphy arrived with loads of tables, chairs and umbrellas, and the back garden was transformed. The one big worry was the weather, and with the typical Irish blustery days we had that week, it was 'broken'. Infant of Prague Statues were put out from Coachford to the County Bounds, and sure enough, the day dawned clear, and before long the sun was out. There was a crazy rush to get everything out and displayed, but all my fears were unfounded as people started to arrive early, looking for the bargain of the day and there were so many bargains. The delicious homemade cakes and jams disappeared in no time at all. Flowers donated by Mary of Sweet Magnolia, Sheila Murphy, Theresa O'Callaghan, Lidl, Catherine Sheehan, and many more green fingered friends were sold. Grace, Hannah, Andrew, Ava and Killian were selling the bric-a-brac, along with the many neighbours and friends who helped in every way they could in the spirit of giving.

In the back garden, tea, coffee and cakes were served, and people relaxed in the sunshine listening to the beautiful music of Jerome Coakley, Jer Wolfe and Kevin O'Brien. Other musicians and singers joined in, creating a wonderful atmosphere. We were lucky we had such generous sponsors for the Coffee Morning, as Supervalu, Aldi, Lidl and Dunne's sponsored the food and beverages and many people brough home baking. The kitchen ran smoothly under the expert direction of Peggy O'Connell along with Evelyn McSweeney, my daughter Majella and sister Margaret and thankfully many more ladies giving help throughout the day.

Paula and Ron took care of the Raffle ably assisted by Darragh and Aoife and other family giving a hand. 25 Prizes were donated by local business people and the raffle alone generated €950. My son Conor and my

brother Michael chipped in when and where they were needed.

My good friend and neighbour, Mary Ryan stood beside me every step of the way from start to finish, while planning the event and seeing that everything was going smooth on the day. "Mary, you are one of a kind".

When Pato and Evelyn arrived, they were like Royalty as everyone were delighted to see them. They both have done so much for the older people in this locality and they never get the credit they deserve for what they do, so I know people will join with me in saying to them "Thank you and well done for your many years of service to the community". The Meals on Wheels deliver about 70 meals to people in their homes every day, 7 days a week. This service, not alone provide a hot meal, but also social interaction with people who feel isolated and vulnerable. They are a truly worthy charity and I was so happy to be able to do a little bit. €3,770.00 was raised around this event

Pat O'Connell stated that Macroom Senior Citizens would like to extend our sincere thanks to Ellen Lynch, her family, friends and all those who helped for the outstanding effort put into organising the Garden Fete and Tea Party at her home recently and we were blessed with a beautiful sunny day. Macroom Senior Citizens, which was founded in 1968, to provide Meals on Wheels for the elderly of Macroom, and, now, 57 years later it has expanded its operations to providing Sheltered and Residential accommodation, laundry service, Meals and Wheels to Macroom and Lee Valley Region, Social Activities for the elderly.

At present, we are delivering Meals on Wheels seven days, Monday to Sunday, and we prepared 1,418 meals a month in our kitchen. Over the past 12 months the cost of meat, fish, vegetables and groceries has increased considerably and we depend on fundraising to cover these costs. Events like the Garden Fete remind us of the wonderful Community Spirit, we share and the money raised, €3,770, will be a big help to our Meals on Wheels Service.

International Athletic Achievement: Finn Yore **Shines for Ireland**



Winners of the 2025 Irish - Language Book of the Year Publishing Awards Announced

On Tuesday, 30th September 2025 at a celebration: "I congratulate Leabhar Breac and Barzaz on their of publishers and writers of Irish-medium books in the National Irish Language Theatre, An Taibhdhearc, Galway, An tOireachtas, in conjunction with Foras na Gaeilge, announced the winners of the 2025 Irish Language Book of the Year Publishing Awards.

Gradam Uí Shúilleabháin (Irish-Language Book of the Year for Adults), was bestowed upon Bódléar, a powerful and imaginative work by Darach Ó Scolaí, published by Leabhar Breac. Gradam Réics Carló (Book of the Year for Children), shone a spotlight on Éanna Corr by Antain Mac Lochlainn, also published by Leabhar Breac, a book that captures both youthful wonder and literary artistry. Gradam de Bhaldraithe (publications translated to Irish) was awarded to Tír Bheag, a finely wrought translation of French novel Petit Pays by Gaël Faye translated by Antain Mac Lochlainn, published by Barzaz.

This year's awards drew together a remarkable nineteen (19) shortlisted works, reflecting the breadth of talent and creativity in new Irish writing today. The 2025 winners received their awards from the Oireachtas President, Éamon Ó Cuív who paid tribute to the depth, artistry, and vibrancy of contemporary Irish-language publishing.






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

Know enough to act effectively!

After some procrastination and much soul searching my father, eventually, made his decision. She will have to go to the factory. The cow was old, that was the reality, and the vet, though not our usual one that he would have trusted more, did say it was very unlikely that she would be able to deliver her calf. She had brought him great joy down through the years. With some of her offspring he had won red rosettes and the silver medal at the Dublin bull show. Those good prices from the sale of prize-winning bull calves brought him satisfaction too. She had daughters as well, but none measured up to her, and he knew none would. This will mean the end to his purebred shorthorn breeding. Yet there was a slim hope, that unborn calf. The old cow lay down and despite all coaxing was unable to get up. His sympathy with the animal led to his decision. There she stayed in the byre equidistant from both threefoot wide doors. The day came. You may wonder how did we get the cow out of the building and loaded unto a neighbour's trailer? Easy, this was the sixties, a meitheal would always appear spontaneously and without the asking. Young men without experience trying to direct and then bemused older ones taking over.

When we arrived at the factory, I learned it was not a place for emotion. Even then factories had amazing efficiency at turning live animals into half carcasses. But my father's demands held up things. He wanted the calf. The vet arrived from somewhere else in the factory. The animal was stunned with a shot to the head and immediately slit open in one movement and the calf pulled out. Alive but weak the calf was put in the back of our van, and we headed away. On the way home my father gave me the job of looking after this calf. A suitable easy job for an eight- or nine-year-old. I would have to give him the finger to get him to drink the milk and do so every few hours of the day, last thing at night and first thing in the morning.

My father knew that 'beastings' (colostrum - the milk after giving birth for the first few days) was better for the calf than ordinary milk, and the mother would not be providing that. He travelled around our neighbours looking for anyone that may have a cow that had recently calved, so that he could get some of her milk. Unfortunately, nobody that he asked had such a cow or knew anyone that did. It was left at that. This story does not have a happy ending. Despite my efforts the calf died about three weeks later. About a week afterwards my father found me sleep walking at the top of the stairs. I believe it was the only time I have done so. He tried to get me back to bed but I kept insisting that I had to feed the calf.

You may wonder why I am relating this story sixty years later. It has come to my mind because we have been learning. Many of us have been engaged in our project on climate change over the summer. We have been visiting other communities who have got together and are acting. I have found them inspirational, and we have been learning from them. Many of us know we have not been doing enough. We know too that a legacy of a healthy environment to future generations is very important to us. Yet knowing does not always mean that we know enough or that we will act in accordance with what we know. We know too that it is often that we do not act in our own best interests, or in the best interests of our descendants.

My father knew that colostrum would be good for the calf. He made efforts to get some. They proved fruitless. It was years later that I learned that, unlike humans, calves do not get inoculated or immune protection against diseases and infections across the

placenta from their mothers during pregnancy. They get it from the colostrum; they are entirely dependent on getting maternal antibodies from those first few drinks of a mother's milk after birth. Had my father known just how important it was I am sure he would have extended his search.

Humanity knows about climate change. But do we know enough to know not just how to act but to act effectively in our own best interests, and in the best interests of those who are following us. Unfortunately for humanity, our task has become more difficult as science is being undermined. Vested interests have gained much influence with some very powerful Western political representatives, representatives that seem to have forgotten that their duty to the public interest is paramount. But let's keep faith. Not long ago some were saying that climate action was pointless since China was upscaling fossil fuel burning at an alarming rate. They were, but now they are leading the world in renewables. According to the New York times, 'in just the first six months of 2025, China installed more solar capacity than the United States has managed in its history, and twice as much solar power as the rest of the world combined during those six months'.

Summer excursions

Our two most recent climate related summer excursions were to West Cork. On the 6th of August about thirty-five of us headed off to Kinsale. We headed straight for the coffee in Actons hotel, and such a pleasure that was. Then fuelled up we were ready to learn all about 'Transition town Kinsale', from Donal Chambers who was a trove of information. They have a community initiative running for 20 years. The transition is from being fossil fuel dependant to a low carbon future. They have many initiatives including a community garden which we were taken to see. They have also an interesting 'seed library' which is housed in the town library, (which itself is worth a visit, great credit to the architect). We then took a short walk around the town. Kinsale never disappoints.

The following climate excursion was on Wednesday the 10th of September. We headed west to the Centre of Excellence for Climate Action and Sustainability (CECAS) at Myross house, garden and wood outside Leap. The property is the ex-Missionaries of the Sacred

Heart Retreat centre. The group was set up in 2020, and given covid what it has achieved since is truly remarkable. It is a most attractive setting, incorporating natural woodland with some trees at least four hundred years old, and it runs down to the shoreline. Their manager, Ana Ospina, told us that in 2024 they had forty different community groups visiting, they had 18,500 visitors, they have one hundred volunteers and organised fifty events that year. Their expert on forestry, Mark, showed us the ancient wood, and Trish showed us their community garden, and the food and cakes -oh there were scrumptious. All was truly impressive, and we would recommend a visit.

This trip was subsidised by our climate grant from the Department of Climate, Energy and the Environment and Local link in Bantry were of great assistance to us.







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History Macroom History Group (Founded 2023)

Next Talk; 'Bishop Daniel Cohalan; Ambushes, Arson, and Excommunication in Cork, 1920', will take place on Monday 13 October 2025 in The Castle Hotel at 8.00 p.m. The speaker is Dr Therese O'Connell (Coachford) and Bishop Cohalan was the subject of her recently conferred Ph. D. thesis. Cohalan was from Gurranereigh, Kilmurry and his relatives still live in the area. He was Bishop of Cork from 1916-52.

The following sets out the context of the talk: On the evening of Saturday, 11 December 1920, Irish Volunteers ambushed an Auxiliary patrol at Dillon's Cross in Cork, resulting in the death of Cadet S. K. Chapman. By 10pm, the centre of Cork city was alight, as British Crown forces embarked on a campaign of arson, looting and lawless aggression, in retaliation for Chapman's death during the Dillon's Cross ambush earlier that evening. The Bishop of Cork, Daniel Cohalan, reacted swiftly. In his Sunday homily, delivered the following morning in the North Cathedral as Cork city centre still smouldered below, he not only condemned the violence of the previous night, but conferred a decree of excommunication on all those who chose to perpetuate violence thereafter through the practices of 'ambushes, kidnapping and murder.'

Cohalan was the only Irish Catholic bishop to confer such a decree during the War of Independence, and this singular initiative has informed a common perception of him as being, at the very least, unsympathetic, if not unequivocally hostile to Irish republicanism. This

THE N22 BYPASS - A ROAD TO SOMEWHERE?

Hi Chris Barrett hereagain. Today we have the pleasure of hearing from Donal O'Leary of MDEG, the Macroom and District Environmental Group.

It is a relief, in more than one sense of the word, that the N22 Macroom to Baile Bhúirne bypass is now fully operational. It has brought a noticeable improvement to the levels of congestion and air and noise pollution in both Macroom and Ballyvourney/Ballymakeera and has hopefully contributed to a safer urban environment in these localities.

Along the bypass, the roadsides and roundabouts were planted with grass, trees, and shrubs. If the trees at the sides of the dual carriageway grow well, they will muffle the sounds and sights of traffic and create habitat and protection for wildlife. Perhaps one day soon the local owls, bats, and other winged animals can fly safely above the danger zone of fast-moving traffic instead of through it.

It must have cost a lot of money to plant trees along the entire length of the bypass. Unfortunately, some of these trees have already died. Some failed very soon after planting, which raises questions about how carefully they were planted. Some others died during the long dry spells that we had this year - these would have had a better chance of survival if a longer-term management plan was in place including mulching and watering. To look on the bright side, the trees that have survived until now will hopefully have a good chance of growing into maturity.

Speaking of spending money, the ongoing management of the roundabout at Coolcower has drawn the attention of Macroom District Environmental Group (MDEG) for a few years now. Before the opening of the first stage of the bypass, this roundabout was planted with Cherry Laurel, a highly invasive non-native species that is unfortunately still commonly sold and planted for hedging in Ireland. This species, like rhododendron, can out-compete native plant species and drastically reduce biodiversity in areas where it establishes. In 2022, MDEG contacted the public liaison office for the N22 road project to question the wisdom of planting the roundabout with Cherry Laurel and were informed that it would soon be removed and replaced with a suitable native species - this was shortly after the official opening by the Taoiseach. Was the Cherry Laurel only planted to look good for the big occasion? Did the authorities just plant something cheap and cheerless and realise later that it wasn't appropriate? Would a bike shed have done instead? So many questions that a curious citizen and taxpayer could ask. In 2024, further correspondence with the same N22 liaison office informed MDEG that "the main purpose of the hedging is to prevent glare from headlights approaching the roundabout from one direction impacting the vision of vehicles approaching from the opposite side of the roundabout" - indeed a worthwhile rationale, and if this is the objective then why has it not been implemented yet with an appropriate native and/or wildlife-friendly selection of plants?

Pollinating insects (bees, butterflies, hoverflies etc.) have been in sharp and worrying decline in Ireland and worldwide. A very important initiative to protect and support pollinators in this country has been the development of the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan, and anyone interested would enjoy studying the relevant website pollinators.ie for information and guidance on actions that we can take to protect their future and



Cork County Council signed up to the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan in 2021. At the time, the Council Chief Executive was quoted as saying "The All-Ireland Pollinator Plan is asking all of us to take simple actions to help reverse the decline of our pollinator species. Cork County Council is happy to sign up and be a supporter. One of the actions is to manage our green spaces less intensively. This protects our existing natural habitats and allows wild plants to flower and set seed. The good news is that this approach often requires less physical effort and can be less expensive." In 2019, Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) collaborated with the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan on the publication of evidence-based guidelines for Transport Corridors including national roads. Recommendations included identifying and protecting existing pollinator habitats, reducing the frequency of mowing of grassy areas, pollinator-friendly planting, provision of wild pollinator nesting habitat, reducing the use of biocides to control weeds, promotion of the aims of the Pollinator Plan, and making staff aware of management plans for pollinators.

TII and Cork County Council are the organisations responsible for the management and maintenance of the N22 in County Cork. On the Macroom-Baile Bhúirne bypass this year, there has been frequent strimming and mowing of grass on roundabouts and verges instead of the transition to natural wildflower areas that is recommended for creating feeding and shelter areas for pollinating insects. Quite disturbingly, a local informed me last week that maintenance workers were cutting their way into the thickets of furze/gorse that have sprung up on the bare rock and soil around the roundabouts at Baile Bhúirne and were spraying the furze bushes with weedkiller. Killing these bushes can have no possible benefit to road safety or infrastructure management, and in the absence of a better explanation it can only be seen as a

desire to "clean up" around the road - notwithstanding that furze bushes provide such valuable support for pollinators, nesting birds, and many other wildlife.

How does this kind of management align with the aims of the Pollinator Plan? Actions that support pollinating insects are gentler to the environment, create softer and more colourful landscapes, and spend far less public money than the conventional, tired, wasteful and destructive approach that is driving so many species to the brink of extinction.

We are all learner drivers in the world. We make mistakes, and hopefully we learn from them and try to do better. In the case of the N22 bypass, the knowledge is there on how to manage it best for wildlife as well as for humans. The evidence shows that we can save money while providing a better environment without compromising the safety of road users - surely a winwin situation.

I would like to thank Donal for showing us how considered by-pass management could be a win-win

- · First cut after 15th April. (this will allow Dandelions to flower. Dandelions are a vital food source for pollinators in spring)
- Second cut at end of May. (Cutting at the end of May and not again until mid-late July will increase the growth of important plants like Clover, Selfheal, Cuckooflower and Bird's-foot-trefoil).
- Third cut in mid-late July. (maximises growth of Clovers and other wildflowers)
- Fourth cut end August.
- Fifth cut after mid-October.



Natural regeneration from the native seed bank is often pollen-rich and offers food to which our native bees have adapted.



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
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
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HSE South West works with communities to mark National Breastfeeding Week in Cork



Ballinora were a transformed outfit on their return to Ovens on Saturday last in the final round of Group 5 games in the MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior Hurling Championship. Two weeks earlier Ballinora, chasing their fifth Mid Cork title in a row, were shocked by the intensity of a Dripsey side fighting for their live championship survival and went under by a twelve point margin. This time round, Grenagh were the unbeaten side and Ballinora were fighting to remain in contention for the play-offs and there could be no faulting their commitment- a commitment which earned them not alone victory but also by a sufficient margin to give them the advantage in the Scoring Difference table which earned them a semi final berth. 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
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"But the Wisdom from above is first of all pure. It is also peace loving, gentle at all times, and willing to yield to others. It is full of Mercy and the fruit of good deeds. It shows no favouritism and is always sincere. And those who are peacemakers will plant seeds of peace and reap a harvest of Righteousness' (James 3:17-18).

Welcome back dear student often, when people are dealing with a crisis, or have to make a difficult decision they wonder 'how will I know what the right thing to do is?' This Scripture gives a key. We must seek God's Wisdom by asking Jesus to direct us onto the right paths — His path. Then by faith we receive — that means we trust Him and step out and take action. "My sheep hear My voice, and they follow Me" (John 10:27). Jesus noted that His sheep 'do not follow the voice of the stranger' (John 10:5). Having discernment to recognise the difference between God's voice and the enemy is vital, and it comes from spending time in God's Word and in prayer, talking and listening to Him — basically, getting to know Him (Hebrews 5:14). When we lean upon God He is Faithful to lead us to safety. Studying the lead verse above, the first result of God's Presence is Righteousness or purity, for God is Holy. When Isaiah saw the Lord in a heavenly vision the reaction of this man of God was how sinful he was (Isaiah 6:5). That is the state of all the human race — 'for all have sinned and fall short of the Glory of God' (Romans 3:23). All but One - for Jesus never sinned. That's how His sacrifice was accepted by God to pay the penalty for all our sins. The Sinless Blood of Jesus now lays upon the Mercy seat in Heaven before God's Throne. The innocence and purity of that Blood speaks Mercy on behalf of all believers in Jesus. It is because of Jesus that we can now come into the Presence of God reconciled as His children (Hebrews 4:16). So, Righteousness - or holiness, is the first aspect of the Presence of God.

The second is the level of Peace you get in the midst of the circumstances. Jesus is the Prince of Peace, and God's counsel brings Peace (Isaiah 9:5). When people go to the High Court they need a Senior Counsel to represent and advocate for them. The Holy Spirit is God's Attorney, His free gift to every believer! He is named 'Paraclete' in Greek which means the Advocate, the One Who stands beside you; the Comforter, Helper and Guide — the One Who leads us into the Truth (John 14:16-17). Holy Spirit is our powerful Partner and Friend. When the devil is involved in any situation, there is confusion, bitterness, jealousy and evil of every kind (James 3:15-16). But when the Spirit of God is in control, purity and peace result. This is how you can judge what the right move is. Is this decision from a pure heart? Do I have peace that this is the right thing to do? Others may not be happy, but we must obey God, not appease man (Acts 4:19).

The world promotes self-gratification, but in Jesus' Kingdom the opposite is true. God is not the author of chaos or confusion, but He is the God of Order and Love. This is another key into recognising what spirit is in control here. Is there order or chaos? Jealousy, bitterness and strife, or Gentleness, Mercy and Peace? It's a good exercise to write these things down in a 'pros and cons' type layout, and the answer becomes very clear (Proverbs 4:5-7). Seeking God's Wisdom will always preserve and protect you friend.

Meeting expectations

How do you respond to others' just expectations?

Quickly or slowly - reacting or responding, with panic or coolness?

Here's another personality classification. Buckle up!

According to the author Gretchen Rubin, you and I tend to be one of the following types of people. She classifies people as being Upholders, Obligers, Ouestioners, or Rebels.

Upholders are amazing. The kind of person who is going to have the job done by tonight or tomorrow. They follow up and follow through promptly. They don't forget what's asked of them. In many cases they have already anticipated your question or request. If they don't know the answer to your query they find someone who does - and get back to you without delay.

They are the ones who make a New Year's resolution and stick to it just till December 31st. And they don't break their Lent!

Obligers respond without question. They are like upholders in being very helpful. They readily agree and comply without question - which is a mixed blessing. They see the importance of duty, responsibility and accountability to others but rarely ask needed questions. They assume good will in what is being asked of them. Unlike the Upholders however they may need to be reminded of a promised task more than once. But the danger for them is that they can become doormats. They are Yes people, until they say No, and when they say No, run. "Hell hath no fury" like obliger rebellion if they find they have been manipulated.

Questioners question everything asked of them. If you want something from them, have your explanations and details ready. Lay out the pitch, the parameters and the sense of what you are asking of them. You need to anticipate. But once they see the sense of it for themselves they internalize and follow through. If you are a questioner, you've already questioned the rationale of this categorization!

Rebels pretend to agree with you and appear obliging, but they already have their own mind made up about what to do on their terms. They see a better way of doing things but they might not tell you in advance until the job is done. They reckon that their way is the best way. They see rules only as guidelines, to the horror of upholders and obligers. You cannot tell a rebel what to do, but you can make suggestions if you like.




