
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



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THE LAUNCH OF A NEW RESOURCE BOOK

FOR PRIMARY TEACHERS

Last month, a new curriculum was launched for primary schools. This curriculum is exciting because of its new directions. Wellbeing is a new priority.

Learning is to be playful. Learning is to be integrated. Students can be creative especially through Art, Music and Drama. A new booklet for teachers of junior classes was launched on October 2nd that helps teachers to realize this new curriculum. The booklet called A Bank of Classroom Activities based on Traditional Tales for Teachers of Junior Classes in the Primary School was written by six Macroom-based teachers. The book is practical, 'tried and tested', the result of years of experiences of these six teachers.

The launch took place at the Castle Hotel. Despite Storm Amy, several schools braved the elements to get their free booklet. The evening was full of chat and laughter. Ger Wolfe provided the entertainment. The six teachers read a Rap written by Teresa Downey, based on Jack and the Beanstalk to a rapt audience. The book was launched by Dr. Linda Dennehy, the new Director of West Cork Education Centre. The centre will distribute the booklet to 130 primary schools in West Cork. (The best things in life are free). Also in attendance was Cormac Ó hAodha from the WCEC who is translating the booklet into Irish for Irish language schools.

The booklet took several months to collate162 attractive activities such as Tin Foil Art, Reader's Theatre, Mantle of the Expert as well as 20 powerful classroom strategies. The booklet concludes with 12 mindfulness ideas suitable for all classes. There is wellbeing, playfulness, dozens of ideas for integrated learning. The booklet covers most curriculum areas. Any teacher would have oodles of work if he or she wishes to teach a story a month or per season: The Three Little Pigs, Jack and the Beanstalk, The Gingerbread Man and The Ugly Duckling. There are hours of creative classroom activities to realize the new curriculum. Bang on time!

The group, Macroom Arts Circle, has been in existence since 2010. They convene in each other's houses to share ideas with the intention of providing teachers with new ideas. The group have a special way of working based on the old tradition of Meitheal. This was a time when farmers would come together at trashing time to work co-operatively, depending on each other. This was a time for men to work, laugh and tell stories. Women drew bags of sandwiches and bottles of tea to the men who were thigh-deep in barley. Here, the teachers were steeped in story and teaching. Macroom Arts Circle, a small group of six teachers, has received national acclaim for its way of working, Meitheal. The six teachers are Sinéad Twomey, Marie Thérèse O Callaghan, Teresa Downey, Fiona Angland, Helen Hallissey (editor) and Mary McCarthy (illustrator).

The book will soon be available in PDF form at West Cork Education Centre as hard copies are almost gone. You cannot smell a PDF. You cannot get the feel of a PDF. You cannot hold a PDF. The 200 booklets are of a high quality spec - soon to be a collector's item.

The new Macroom Gift Card is set to launch in October for the town and surrounding villages. Local businesses can accept the card commissionfree.

Macroom and 9 neighbouring villages are collaborating on a new high-tech gift card for the Lee Valley region to drive in-person sales for local businesses and encourage connection between people and places.

Backed by Macroom Business Association, the Grá Macroom Gift Card will replace the previous paper Macroom shopping voucher and offers significant benefits for the businesses accepting the card and recipients spending them.

Businesses in Macroom, Clondrohid, Béal Átha an Ghaorthaidh, Baile Mhuirne, Guagán Barra, Inchigeelagh, Coachford, Dripsey, Lissarda, Kilmurry and are all eligible to accept the card, commission free, including shops, restaurants, attractions, pubs and cafés.

Mastercard backed, businesses will be able to accept the card using their existing payment systems. Once launched, the Grá Macroom Gift Card will be available as a physical card that can be swiped at the till or a digital card that is added to digital wallets, enabling 'tap to pay' technology.

Cards will be available to buy online and in person from Killian Auctioneers Macroom, Cooney's Garage in Coachford, Connections in Macroom, Dromeys Centra in Ballymakera and Daybreak in Ballingeary as well as online at www.townandcitygiftcards.ie

The Grá Macroom Gift Card is the latest 'shop local' initiative from the town following the opening of the Macroom bypass in 2023, with a Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) study finding that footfall in the town is up 28%.

The card will be part of the multi-award winning Town & City Gift Card initiative from Miconex, active across Ireland. Killian Lynch, chairperson of the Macroom Business Association said the new card will be easier to spend and accept: We have spoken to most of the business across Macroom and Surrounding villages and all are delighted to accept the card. Killian says it's a no brainer for business and also for employers to be able to use this card as a staff reward at Christmas, so as to ring fence the spend in the local economy and also to be able to give a card that can be used for day to day living.

"Macroom will be the first town in County Cork to utilise Town & City Gift Card technology to create our own high-tech physical and digital gift card. Around 60 Macroom businesses were part of our old paper vouchers. With the new gift card we're extending the initiative to our surrounding villages in the Lee Valley region, which has a population reach of around 15,000 people. In doing so, we expect to generate around €500,000 to €1 million in sales annually for our Gift Card program, money that is ring-fenced into the Lee Valley/Muskerry region.

"Our old shop local vouchers were cumbersome and

not user friendly. Recipients had to spend the full amount in one go as change was not offered and businesses had to bring the vouchers to the Macroom Business Association for payment, waiting 1-2 weeks. The new Grá Macroom Gift Card will be as easy to spend and accept with the balance automatically updated and businesses getting paid quickly. It will be far easier for organisations to reward their staff with the new gift card too using the Small Benefit Exemption scheme, rather than trying to manage mounds of paper vouchers.

"Our intention is for the Grá Macroom Gift Card to become the default gift card for the Lee Valley. Businesses in Macroom and its surrounding villages are delighted to be a part of it and we'll be onboarding businesses to the card over the coming weeks before the card launches."

Colin Munro is the managing director of Miconex and said: "The Grá Macroom Gift Card will be a single gift card for the Lee Valley with huge potential to lock significant spend into the region for the benefit of local businesses. It takes moments for businesses to sign up to accept the card, and works through the Mastercard system so no additional equipment is required. And there is no commission for businesses to accept the card as payment. Being a part of the card will bring new customers to your business with money to spend and I encourage all businesses to be a part of this exciting initiative for the Lee Valley region."

Rubbish Film Festival



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Kilmurry Active Retirement

A change of heart

Although I had been involved in environmental issues for most of my career, it was only recently that I have begun to take climate change seriously. I don't really know why this is the case. I tend to be slow. Take my attitude to music. I rarely like new songs, well not until they are no longer new and others have moved on to newer sounds. I get the Beatles now, - a bit later than the rest of you. Most seventies music is good -now. I may tolerate the eighties/nineties stuff yet. My journey to concern about climate change has followed a similar course.

In the nineties and noughties, as part of my job in fisheries conservation, I gave presentations on sustainable development. We are utilising the Earth's resources as if we had three earths, I would quote. I was aware of the scientific advice on global warming but had not the realisation that it was something that I had some responsibility for, and that I could and should do something meaningful about it. I thought it was a problem to be sorted by governments. They would agree to tax us out of our bad behaviours and encourage good ones when the time came that it was necessary. Like everything else it would be left to the last minute, but it would happen. I suppose I

My view has changed radically. In 2015 I started studying for a master's degree in philosophy. It so happened that the professor of philosophy in UCC at the time, Professor Graham Parkes, was very interested in climate change and, I thought, very much the pessimist. I, on the other hand, have always been inclined to optimism, too often perhaps, regardless of a lack of supporting evidence. This led to robust debate; I am sure to the annoyance of other students. I relied on then current events; I was aware of Pope Francis's encyclical, 'Laudato Si', 'on care for our common home'. In it he calls on all his flock, and all humanity, to change our ways 'by decisive action, here, and now. It has been credited with having been influential. Then followed the great accomplishment of the seventeen Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) being adopted by all 193 United Nations Member States at the summit in New York in September 2015; a universal plan of action to end poverty, protect the planet, and ensure prosperity for all people by 2030. Professor Parkes though was concerned that the presidential hopeful Donald Trump promised to pull the USA out of that agreement. He was concerned too with the rising strength of libertarian philosophy which advocates for the releasing of the strong from the burdens imposed by the weak, (as did the philosophers Nietzsche and Ann Rand). I did not expect Donald Trump to get elected in 2016, and even then, I had optimistically hoped that his administration's impact on the climate change crisis would be short-lived.

Last year, 2024, I learned that Professor Parkes, had in 2021, then in retirement, written a book, 'How to think about the Climate Crisis'. As you can imagine I was very keen to read it and was struck by the evidence he produced on the rise of the Libertarians, the financial clout of fossil fuels, and the political power of the religious right in the USA. I was also, perhaps by serendipity, gifted Pope Francis's encyclical, which, I admit, I had not previously read. I suppose though, it was the election campaign of candidate Trump, and his determination to 'drill baby drill' and fully exploit the USA's supremacy in fossil fuel which he referred to as 'liquid gold' that opened my eyes to my misplaced optimism. Circumstances were changing and we could no longer trust that the political system of the world would act as I had trusted that it would. I came to have sympathy with the views of those who assert that the major powers had accepted that climate change was real, and that it was changing the world. Rather than focusing on resolving the problem, they claim, that the scramble is already on for the resources that will become scarce in this new more hostile world. Climate change affects the poorest and least prepared countries first, and the consequent economic effects and scarcities give rise to social unrest, which sometimes lead to civil war, displacement, and the flight of refugees to other countries. Governments see that this will be a long-term problem and will heighten strife in the countries to which they flee. So, we can understand the inclination towards political shifts to the far right, walls, new physical borders, protection tariffs, isolationism and reduced overseas development aid (just when it is most needed to give hope to those most affected).

I slowly came to see that I had been neglectful. I needed to change my view and my behaviour. But what can one do, what can we even do collectively. I knew I had much to learn. As I was trying to educate myself, as luck would have it, due to my then role as secretary of Kilmurry Active Retirement, I stumbled across an opportunity to apply for a Department of Climate grant for learning about climate change. Having prepared a draft application, it was circulated to our management committee and then to our membership for decision. We applied and were successful.

This summer many of my colleagues in Kilmurry ARA and I have been learning, and that is to continue for another six weeks. On the 15th of October we will be visiting the Glen Resource centre in Cork. They have been doing great environmental work there and we are looking forward to learning from them.

On the 21st of October there will be a public meeting in the Heritage room, Kilmurry Museum. We will have Kieran Lattice speaking on behalf of SEAI, (the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland). He will make a 30-minute presentation, including grants available, and then there will be an opportunity for questions from the floor. All are welcome.

We have been given the opportunity to speak for 10 minutes at the Southern Region's Autumn meeting in Killarney on the 28th of October. I hope we can assist other associations that may wish to apply for this or similar grants.

In November we will be travelling to Coachford college, in the hope of getting some advice there, and in the hope too of getting some assistance in calculating our carbon footprints.

We will then have an important members' meeting on the 18th of November. This is to determine whether our membership wish to wind down, continue, or expand our involvement in climate change in 2026 and 2027.



Macroom Castle in 2025

maciooni castie iii 1921

Every action has a reaction, and it would be fair to say that the events on Percival's march to Bandon and on to Kinsale with the Essex Regiment had an effect on later events in Macroom after the announcement of a truce.

Our story starts on the 8th June 1921 when Sean Hegarty O/C of Corks number 1 brigade, Daniel Corkery Commandant of the IRA, and Charle Browne Adjutant of the 7tth battalion were resting in a safe house owned by the Delaney family in an area called Toames just outside Macroom. They had been there for 4 days awaiting developments, when, while sitting down for a meal, a shot rang out. A young man by the name of Daniel Buckley who had been coming to tell the men that the miliary were approaching was spotted by the enemy and shot dead. It was Percival's Essex Regiment that had killed the boy, and now they were on a mission to find whomever the boy had been trying to warn.

The 3 men made good their escape from Delaney's and made their way towards Kilmurry Company area which was used frequently by the 3rd Brigade Flying Column. By the following morning, Billy Powell informed them that they were in line with the march of Percival's men back to Bandon after one of their roundups. While they were making their way back to safer terrain Dan Corkery spotted one of their scouts and when he signalled for the scout to get out of the line of sight a volley of shots rang out and the men had no choice but to run for it. Powell and Browne were in front and were captured by a cycling column while Dan Corkery and Sean Hegarty made good their escape. Dan lay in furze until darkness fell while Sean kept on the move until he reached Ryders farmhouse in Cloughduv.

Powell and Browne were arrested and kept with the other prisoners, (many of them not volunteers at all but everyone was under suspicion). Percival's column numbered about 160 men and on 10th June they marched southwards towards Newcestown and on to Bandon, While on the road Percival's men shot dead volunteer Matt O' Donovan for no apparent reason and gleaned great pleasure from the action. They arrived at Bandon military barrack and rested for a few hours before beginning the trek to Kinsale which was the Headquarters for the Essex Regiment. On the Western Bridge they met the funeral of 25-year-old Maurice Quinn of the Old Head area who had died at ballykindler internment camp. Percival arrested the large number of male mourners and made them join the march to Kinsale. Belts and braces were removed so the men could not run.

The 50 or so men arrested at the funeral were tried for unlawful assembly and fined £5 each, a huge sum, all

the while knowing that the money would be spend on drink for the guards at the officer's mess.

On the 16th June Billy Powell was released. Charlie Browne however was transported to Victoria Barracks (now Collins Barracks) and detained in the infamous 'Cage', a barbed wire compound where men could be held indefinitely.

Less than 4 weeks later on the 11th July 1921 the truce was announced although by all accounts this was not what the Republican army had wanted. The Crowns army continued their violent and vindictive raids until the night of the 10th, including the shooting dead of an innocent young boy in Coachford.

Liam Deasy O/C 3rd brigade said 'The end came abruptly and indeed unexpectedly. Had I been asked my opinion beforehand; I should have opposed a cessation of hostilities at this time'.

Tom Barry 'No Divisional or Brigade officer of the IRA knew anything about the negotiations of the Truce except through the reports appearing in the Daily Press

This truce allowed men to go home but they were to remain on alert in case hostilities started again. The IRA had one firm conviction – that activity would resume in time, possibly 3/4 weeks, so they prepared with training camps and discipline. The British had broken the rules of a Truce before so why not again?

However, not all remained on alert. Flashy new clothes were worm by many men, glad to be rid of the trench coats and heavy boots. They were seen as heroes by many of their neighbours and naturally they enjoyed the attention. The Crown forces complained as they could no longer recognise the enemy while Truce negotiations were still being conducted.

Brigadier Sean Hegarty insisted his officers remain on alert and it was this alertness that drew their attention to a car without number plate parked outside Williams Hotel in Macroom. When the driver asked what he was doing there he gave a sharp reply in an English accent saying they were on a fishing trip. However, the republican policeman noted no fishing rods with the party so he went to the castle to report his findings. The man normally in charge would have been Dan Corkery who escaped capture the month previous, but, in his absence, the senior officer in charge was the Adjutant. Charlie Browne.

Charlie made his way to the hotel and found three men. He recognises one of them as a cruel officer from his time in the 'Cage'. This officers methods for getting intelligence were known to be vicious. He immediately contacted HQ and was told to arrest the men. They were taken to the Castle for questioning and found to have concealed weapons even though they were in civilian clothing. A firing squad was immediately

dispatched.

Field Marshall Bernard Montgomery, now in Victoria barracks, would make it his personal mission to find out where his three offices were. Within two days of the arrest a detachment of military arrived in Macroom to interrogate the Irish police and search for the men. Over the next 2 weeks they came several times and each time they got more menacing.

Montgomery believed that he was the man to defeat the IRA. A special Cork City Intelligence Unit was formed and a stream of orders were issued from Monty's desk.

Finally in frustration they placed lorry loads of troops on the hill overlooking the castle and demanded to know where the 3 officers were. The IRA gave nothing away. The last time they came to Macroom they set up machine guns on the square but the lone sentry in the little turret, Neil O' leary, shouted out 'Put you bloody hands up!'

Charlie Browne was prepared for this day. behind the soldiers on the hill were hidden a strong detachment of the Eighth battalion, while members of the Seventh and Sixth were scattered around the town. On the Castle walls a Vickers machine gun pointed down at the officers.

Bernard Montgomery moved forward towards the Castle. Charlie Browne came to meet him, covered by Mick O'Sullivan with the Vickers machine gun.

'Unless your troops are withdrawn within five minutes, he said, my men have orders to fire'.


Monty had no choice but to retreat. He was at a disadvantage to the man who had been his guest at the 'Cage'. A man that had witnessed the shooting of a young man at a funeral in the name of fun. He had witnessed the torture of his comrades and friends. He had suffered immeasurably in the pursuit of Irelands freedom. Bernard Montgomery had finally met his match in a place that he thought he would easily command.

If Mongomery hadn't walked away, and had ordered his men to fire there would have been bloodshed on the streets of Macroom that day. The Truce would never have happened and perhaps even the Civil War would have been avoided. Or perhaps not.

But, in this writer's opinion, the actions of Percival's officers against one man would later be the fuel in the belly of Charlie Browne when he warned Monty and his men to leave Macroom or face the consequences. References – Monty – The making of a General.

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
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Neighbourhood Notice

The staff at ESB Lee Generating Stations have installed a new publicly available Automated External Defibrillator (AED) at the main gate by the road to Inniscarra Generating Station (P31 RC93) at the dam, Inniscarra.

The AED is for use in an emergency by anyone in the community and has been placed outside the main gates to ensure it is accessible to the community 24/7. The most important thing about this initiative is that the AED will continue to be managed and maintained by the ESB so that if is ever needed in an emergency event it will be ready for use.

This AED was installed in consultation with the Community Engagement Officer of the National Ambulance Service Ireland and the Southern Area Rep for Community First Responders (CFR) and has been accepted on to the National Ambulance Service Irelands register so if a member of the public rings 112 / 999 in an emergency the dispatcher will be able to direct them to the AED if needed.

If someone on the Lee river walk at Inniscarra Generating Station or our neighbours has a cardiac arrest their time for a first responder to access an AED will have potentially reduced from ~16 minutes to a couple of minutes and that could be the difference of life and death, see screenshot below of survival rate over time.

So, hopefully the AED is never needed but if it is needed it could be lifesaving.

The survival rate decreases by approximately 10% per minute.

Defibrillations's chances of restoring a pulse decrease rapidly with time




Overview of New AED at Entrance to Inniscarra Generating Station (P31 RC93)















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

Grenagh have qualified for the MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior Hurling championship final for the first time since 2022 by defeating Donoughmore in a very closely fought semi final at Blarney and it required extra time to separate the near neighbours. These teams had met in mid June last in the league final with Donoughmore comfortably coming out on top by a four point margin but it was clear from an early stage herey that Grenagh were fully determined to reverse that result. They stunned Donoughmore with two goals in the opening half to lead by two points at the interval and coming down the home straights in normal time they twice came from behind to earn equality at the final whistle. After an even first half in extra time, Grenagh dominated the last ten minute period and scoring five points in a row without reply they were clear winners at the end.

Grenagh are a more experienced team than their young emerging opponents and opened well to settle quickly. They went two points clear in as many minutes but Donoughmore answered with a brace, 0-2 each after three minutes and the contest was on! Grenagh got a major boost in the fifth minute when Sean Joyce dropped a high cross into the Donoughmore goalmouth, Robert Coleman stretched highest to collect and belted the sliotar past Shane Sexton from close range. Donoughmore replied with four points on the trot, one from Kevin O'Connell and three from Adam Dinan to lead by 0-6 to 1-2 as the first quarter ended. 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"Do not withhold good from those who deserve it when it's in your power to help them. If you can help your neighbour now, don't say 'come back tomorrow and then I'll help you'. Don't plot harm against your neighbour for those who live nearby trust you. Don't pick a fight without reason when no one has done you harm" (Proverbs 3:27-30 NLT).

Welcome back dear student as the song says...everybody needs good neighbours. To have good neighbours, one must be a good neighbour. But in God's eyes it's not just those you live close to; the Word is quite clear - God closely watches our treatment of others. And others watch too. How we do anything, is how we do everything. "Owe nothing to anyone—except for your obligation to Love one another. If you love your neighbour, you will fulfil the requirements of God's Law. For the Commandments say, You must not commit adultery. You must not murder. You must not steal. You must not covet.' These - and other such commandments, are summed up in this one commandment: 'Love your neighbour AS yourself.' Love does no wrong to others, so love fulfils the requirements of God's Law. This is all the more urgent, for you know how late it is; time is running out. Wake up, for our Salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. The night is almost gone; the Day of Salvation will soon be here. So, remove your dark deeds like dirty clothes, and put on the shining armour of right living" (Romans 13:8-12 NLT). That's a great picture — removing dark deeds like dirty clothes. When our clothes get dirty from working or eating, one cannot wait to get out of them and get washed — it's a great sensation: putting on fresh clean clothes and feeling spotless. It gives you clear headspace and renewed vigour and outlook. This is what leaving behind old sinful patterns and mindsets will do when we replace them with the ways of God. Two weeks ago, we studied how God's prophet Isaiah, became distressed in the Presence of God at his filthiness. And how a burning coal from the Mercy Seat that touched his lips made him clean (Isaiah 6:1-7). It's interesting that it was Isaiah's lips that were touched, as it's most often by the words of our mouths that we are contaminated with Satan's muck, and that we defile others - with poisonous words. Jesus warned 'but I tell you that men will give an account on the Day of Judgment for every careless word they have spoken. For by your words, you will be acquitted, and by your words you will be condemned" (Matthew 12:36-37).

Sure, some folks are not easy to be around and may have a bad attitude – but that shouldn't dictate ours! All through the Word, God specifically calls out strife, unforgiveness and bitterness because it's against His nature and character (Leviticus 19:16-18). Even while dying on the Cross having been rejected, mocked, hated, cursed, and frankly, butchered – Jesus cried to God on behalf of those who had done this — "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). They knew well they were killing Him: they had eyes – but spiritually they didn't recognise their depravity because they were under demonic control. All of us have sinned and fallen short of God's Glory" (Romans 3:23). Strife is a subtle and dangerous trap (Proverbs 10:12). Forgiveness is there for everyone, and we need it! God desires that we Repent, and release Mercy (James 2:13; Mark 11:25). Jesus was once asked.. 'who is my neighbour?' by a man wanting to justify himself with his own good works (Luke 10:29). Lord, help us to not make that mistake.

A dangerous word

When I was a young fellah TV cop shows were a large part of our compulsory weekly viewing. I used to love it when the 'bad guy' would get caught and arrested - and be read their Miranda rights as they were being handcuffed - "you are under arrest, you have a right to remain silent, you have a right to an attorney, anything you say can be taken down and used in evidence against you in a court of law." Foolishly, to add to the viewing drama the guilty party might brag or fling insults at the detective - our hero! How dare they? While we will never face arrest we should be careful 'for the record' what we ourselves say! We might have to eat our words later because some people we know may have a tremendous power of recall. When someone begins a conversation reminding us with "I remember what you said . . . "we usually shudder at what might be referred to, scrambling in our minds to recall having said it ourselves.

A word for future reference that we should be very slow to utter is 'NEVER.'

I would never do that (again)!

I could never live there.

I will never marry.

I would never date him or her.

I could never see that myself doing that.

Are you doing something now you thought you would 'never in a million years' see yourself doing? The surprise might be that you like a line of work, person or a place you could 'never' have envisaged years ago. Someone might even remember it back to us - "oh I thought you didn't like him, that you would 'never' go out with him...and yet here you are."

How often we recall the "never do that statements" of our parents. When I lean my elbows on the table, or stretch to put my feet on my furniture, I quickly recoil! I have a flashback moment to those stern warnings. "Never' is a dangerous word in the Gospel. It is usually used to exclude or limit God's power or His mercy. Or it is an expression of arrogance or pride: St Peter is a prime example at the Last Supper addressing Jesus - "Even if everyone should lose his faith in you, I never will!" (Matthew 26:33).

We know how that worked out. Pride came before his fall. Peter was humbled twice. He most certainly denied Jesus not only once, but three times that very night.

We must therefore be careful with 'never'.

'Never' closed some people's minds to God's purposes.

"Prophets NEVER come from Galilee. Look into the matter yourself." (John 7:52)

But 'never' can be a good thing - to commit oneself to never sinning out of fear of offending God or others. Pride can be our downfall though. The words of the Act of Contrition in Confession include the phrase "I will never sin again." But these are preceded by the words addressed to God: "with your grace."

I must therefore try to surrender what God's grace wants - taking one day at a time. If I allow it, life can be an adventure and full of surprises as well as challenges and invitations.


I try to be open-minded to 'what's next.'

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
