

MACROOM GIRL GUIDES

Eurochild NOVA (Network of Online Visionaries in Action) Council

Ruth Burton, a member of MacEgan Senior Branch, represents Irish Girl Guides on Eurochild's NOVA (Network of Online Visionaries in Action) Council. Over the past five months, she has been working with 7 other children from Ireland, Romania, Bulgaria, Croatia, and Malta aged between 13 and 17 to advocate for children's safety online.

Ruth's report: We have had a few online meetings every six weeks over the past five months at which we discuss issues regarding child safety in the use of Al, content moderation and addictive content online.

On Friday 10 October I traveled to Brussels to attend the Eurochild NOVA Council's first-in person meeting. Our initial activity on Saturday afternoon was an icebreaker to get to know everyone. This was followed by some child participation training where we learned what it means and why it's important to all children when they are online. We then walked into the city to the Museum of Illusions as a fun activity to bond and get to know each other better.

On Sunday we spent the day in the Eurochild office. During the morning, we discussed different situations and how children should deal with them. Then, we drafted our message to EU policy makers about the different issues that children face online and why it's important to tackle them. That afternoon, with the help of some of the Eurochild staff, we filmed our video which was shown at an event on the following Thursday.

Monday morning saw us preparing for our meeting with Donatella Nembrini. She is a member of the European Commission and is working on the "Safer Internet for Children" project. We discussed the future plans of the project as well as the areas of online safety about which we are passionate. We each got a chance to ask questions. Afterwards we had lunch and concluded with a feedback session with the staff of Eurochild. Everyone there was so nice and helpful and it was an enjoyable weekend. I am looking forward to my next year on the NOVA Council and a further event in Brussels where we will present our project to the EU Ministers



This year's Tidy Towns Results were announced on Friday October 24th in Croke Park, and Macroom retained our Gold Medal. We were represented on the day by Shelia Murphy, Liam Walsh and Michael Crowley. Results showed an 8-point increase from last year which appears good but just keeps up in line with other towns improvements. Macroom received 386 marks with the winner, Carrick on Shannon on 400 points.

Adjudicators commented: " Our shopfront on the Main Street as an excellent initiative, it is also most encouraging to see John Lyons acting as a Climate Ambassador - a recommendation often made to groups but not always achieved in practice. Maith an fear, John!

Your major project this year, the Tom Creedon Cycle Path, is a truly valuable addition to the town and will provide long-term benefit to the community. There are some lovely murals around the town, particularly on gables and in the lane to the vets, and I especially like the house decorated with daisies in Masseytown. Continue these creative projects where possible, including on service boxes. Despite the number of closed shops, the Main Street still presents as a colourful and clean thoroughfare. The Town Park is truly a jewel in the centre of Macroom, and its value cannot be overstated. The walks through the castle grounds are a wonderful amenity. The new cycleway is an excellent project, and the provision of bins and well-stocked Mutt Mitt dispensers is praiseworthy.

The Gearagh Nature Reserve, the biodiversity garden in Colman's Park, and the wooded grounds below the castle provide wonderful opportunities for biodiversity to flourish, and the information displayed on site is both informative and engaging.

Your continued engagement with local schools and the addition of a climate ambassador is invaluable in ensuring that biodiversity awareness and practice are carried into the future. The success of the students from St. Mary's in reaching the Young Environmentalists Finals is a great achievement—well done and best of luck in the competition.

Your partnership with Danone is also commendable, particularly in terms of their support on renewable energy and the auditing of savings achieved through the solar farm, which will serve as clear evidence of the practical benefits of sustainability.

There was no litter to be seen, and all the bins were well

maintained. The Mutt Mitt stations were fully stocked, and the parks and green areas were free of debris. Visible initiatives, like the new road sweeper, make a noticeable difference. A well-organised team, working alongside the TUS and RSS workers, is achieving a high standard.

The residential streets of your town present a colourful and eclectic mix of houses, with some particularly attractive terraces, such as those in Masseytown, adding great charm. Gleann an Fia is well maintained with attractive tree planting, Ros Alainn is welcoming, with a fine bank of native trees at the entrance and a well-maintained green space. An Gortín Rua demonstrates how effective tree planting can soften a housing estate, while the new estate Rás an Mullan looks very well with good tree planting and neat presentation. the roundabout at Hartnetts Cross looked particularly well—thanks are due to Cygnum for their sponsorship here. It is encouraging to see local businesses supporting your work, The continued efforts of Foroige at the graveyard are much appreciated".

Grass cutting arrangements in many housing areas, those estates where the Tidy Towns have been managing the grass cutting for years now is about to change. This has become unsustainable on the part of Tidy Towns volunteers and scheme workers, and doesn't happen in other towns like Ballincollig, Carrigaline and around the County where residents' groups in private estates organise and pay for the cutting themselves. Cork Co Co who will be issuing information and guidance on this in due course.

Macroom Credit Union have sponsored our new Hi Viz jackets, mile buíochas. A Big thanks to the young residents from Meadowlands who picked up 15 bags of leaves for the Tidy Towns, along with residents from Dan Corkery Place and Coleman's Park. These bags of leaves will be used by the Tidy Towns to make compost which will be used in our planting programme in flower and shrub beds throughout the town.

Climate Conversations, a SECAD initiative will take place in Macroom Pitch and Putt Club from 11-1 on Nov 4th and 11th. 

Canovee National School Help Out

On the 14th of October Mary and I, members of our CliMates sub-committee, went to Canovee national school. We had been with them a very short time earlier and had asked for their help. We had received a call from Aisling, the teacher of their fifth class. They were ready for us. We did not know what to expect. We were surprised by the effort they had gone to. They had prepared a wall poster, a collage with all sorts of ideas that people of our age could do to reduce our impact on the environment. It incorporates sound ideas and art. After we recovered from our surprise, we were told by the pupils, that they had brain-stormed and together they had come up with the ideas. They explained and answered all our questions. We then had a very lively discussion. We did concede that we were a little older than they were, but to be honest, when with them and seeing such contagious enthusiasm. I felt vounger than I felt when I was in fifth class myself. We had taken bookmarks with us which we recently had printed. We asked them for another favour, to show the bookmarks to their grandparents and ask them to suggest one thing that we could add, and one we could take away, so that we can improve upon it, should we have another print run. We had enough bookmarks for all the children in that school, so if your grandchild goes there - be prepared.

Trip to the Glen Resource and Sport centre

On the 15th of October, twenty-eight of us headed to the Glen resource centre in Cork city. Our guide was Barry Hickey, who works with the HSE, but also volunteers a lot of his time and expertise there. The HSE gave support to activities there down through the years. Barry recounted what we need to live healthy lives, such as physical exercise, good wholesome food, and engagement with others which is supportive of our mental health. He feels that gardening, and in particular gardening together ticks many boxes. They have a most impressive community garden there, or rather a series of community gardens using every available place in and around the sports facilities and beyond. But the garden is only the starting point. They have a gardening creche, supply food to seventy families each week, provides supports for longerterm unemployed and they facilitate thousands of visitors that, like us, go there to see and to learn. The wholesome natural food is offered to residents of the area at supermarket prices or alternatively for whatever donation their customers choose. They have three composters there, costing 7k each. They have been very successful in sourcing grant funding. Barry advised us not to let lack of funding inhibit us embarking on worthwhile climate related projects. If you are considering visiting them, know that there is also a beautiful 54ha park adjoining. Many thanks to Barry for a most impressive experience. We then had our tea, coffee, scones and niceties in the Address hotel nearby. If you could not go and feel you missed out, you did!

Climate Actions and SEAI grants

On the 21st of October we gathered in the Heritage room Kilmurry museum to hear a great presentation from Kieran Lettice. He was representing SEAI (the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland) on the night. Kieran gave an information packed presentation and paced to suit our taste. There followed several questions and then after the meeting more discussion ensued. At the end of his presentation his recommendations were to start now by: - Doing the free or low-cost things: turning off lights, appliances, heating (where comfortable and safe to do so!) - See if you qualify for a Fully Funded Upgrade (Warmer Homes Scheme). If you do - apply online. - If you don't, start with an assessment: BER assessment or Home Energy assessment. - Usually "fabric first" insulating and fixing leaks saves the most energy and money- Renewable energy - solar pv or heat pumps may be an attractive option for some. - Share information. Don't we have lots of food for thought

Our Arts and Crafts course is soon ending. It focused on card and candle making, and our participants were very happy with Helen Quill Googan. Thank you, Helen. We also wish to acknowledge and thank Cork County Council, who through its Art Grant Scheme supported these craft activities.

On November 5th we will be travelling to Coachford college; there we are hoping to get some help in calculating our carbon footprints.

Then follows an important members' meeting on the 18th of November. Our current project is drawing to its end, and this meeting is to determine whether our membership wish to wind down, continue, or expand our involvement in climate change activities in 2026 and 2027.

Liscarrigane Cross LOCAL PUMP HOUSE RESTORED

On Sunday the 19th of October over 100 neighbours and friends gathered for the opening of the restored local pump house at Liscarrigane Cross.

This is situated in a valley in the Boggeragh montains, east of Ballyvourney, west of Clondrohid and south of Carriganimma. It is steeped in local history and folklore from St Gobnait in the 6th century, to an tAthair Peadar O Laoire who lived locally and featuring this area in his work "Mo Sceal Fein" to George Curtain and his poetry.

Six local friends came together last year with the aim of improving and developing the area. A number of projects were identified, with the pump house the first to be completed. This could not have been achieved without the help and support of their families. The water pump was stolen over 20 years ago which had been a source of water for many a neighbour in years gone by. It became a stopping point for a weary walker, a bus shelter and a bike shed! The house had fallen into disrepair but a temporary roof was fixed on it in 1983, by Jerry "Stephen" Lucey to stop the decay. A new pump was sourced and is in its rightful place, fitted with an Airtag, along with a new solar panelled roof to operate the pump. No need for elbow power anymore! The house is also lit thanks to solar panels. Seating has been included to help the walker or cyclist who take the time to stop and even read a book or two that can be found there.

Tom Healy spoke on behalf of the friends who worked on the project about the importance of developing and upkeeping the area and its history. He hoped people would get enjoyment from the pump house and the three new seats installed locally. He thanked

Both recalled passing the pumphouse in years gone by and how fundamental it was to the local community long go. Both thanked the large group of people who were there and commented on how lucky we were with the weather after the orange weather warning had passed earlier that morning. It was a pleasure to see everyone, young and not so young enjoying themselves. Introductions were done all round to people who previously only waved at each other passing in cars.

The group of friends have other projects ongoing, Bug hotels and bee hives being some, so keep a look out for these in the area.


Preserving Carrigadrohid Castle: A Unique Landmark of the Lee Valley

Arising from the wide expanse of the River Lee in the deepest heart of mid Cork, stands Carrigadrohid Castle. Perched on a large rock, the building leans imperiously onto Carrigadrohid bridge, an ancient thoroughfare, which connects the eastern side of Canovee and Killinardrish with the road leading onward towards Macroom. To call it a castle isn't strictly to do it justice, from an architectural perspective. In truth, its what is referred to as a Tower House, a large, multi-storey building, narrower in its construction than a traditional castle, but none the less, equally as imposing on the landscape as any castle existing today. But

regardless of what architecture students might argue of what type of building it is, the simple fact is it's a singularly and unique structure which you will not find anywhere else on the island of Ireland nor in any quantity any further afield across the U.K. and Europe. Its hewn into the rock and the river beneath it, and here it has stood since 1465.

Built by the McCarthy family, to protect their interests in the area, it functioned as their main residence in this part of the county until the Cromwellian wars saw them removed violently from their abode. The siege which preceded this eviction in 1650 was a bloody one, culminating in the murder of the local Bishop Boetius McEgan who had been brought to the siege site from nearby Macroom to plead with the McCarthy forces to surrender to Cromwell's invading army. When he chose instead to exhort his flock within the walls to not give up, he was hung from a tree by the reins of his horse in full view of the distraught soldiers within. The siege ended shortly afterwards, and the building and surrounding McCarthy lands were given to Cromwellian loyalists(in this instance the Bowen family, the ancestors of the great Anglo Irish novelist Elizabeth Bowen).

The Bowen family remained in the Tower House until the 1850's when they relocated to a modern residence in nearby Oak Grove Estate. By this time the building had stood for almost 400 years, and had been remodelled and extended within- it was now a three storey building, though the external footprint remained unchanged. In the years before the Bowen's relocated(or traded up in modern estate agent parlance) a more organised settlement had grown up around the bridge and the "castle" area a number of houses and streets were laid out, giving the village the look it retains to this day, driven by a local landowner R.B. Crooke. Through all of this, the

dominant structure on the landscape was the Tower House and the adjacent bridge.

The building itself started to fall into disrepair towards the late 19th Century, as fashion and architecture moved on and modern estate houses became the desirable type of property of the local landed gentry and estate owning families.

Which is what you see today, when you are greeted by the tall sentinel on the bridge. This building has withstood war, siege, attack, natural disasters, tidal erosion, flooding(both natural and manmade). The harnessing of the River Lee by the ESB at nearby Inniscarra in the 1950's meant changes for the entire Lee Valley and Carrigadrohid was no exception. The change in weather patterns has been something that this proud building has withstood, and will hopefully continue to withstand.

So that brings us to where we are today. This structure is now 560 years old this year. Or indeed 575 years old, if you wish to take the date building commenced. Tower Houses still exist in varying levels of condition all around the country. Nearby, Kilcrea Castle is an example of what a fully land based tower house looked like, and if you venture further up the west coast to Galway, you will find in Shop St, Lynches Castle, a tower house that functions today as a bank branch. But these other sites cannot compare with Carrigadrohid in terms of its unique location on the water, built on an island rock in the centre of one of the most storied rivers in the country.

But the castle needs help, if it is to survive and thrive for another 575 years. Other than some very basic remedial repairs at the base of the building, and the closing of the entrances to prevent public access it has remained untouched and therefore is quietly slipping away in plain sight. Given the age of enlightenment that we now live in , in terms of preserving our built heritage, we cannot let a unique structure like this vanish from the landscape. But that fear is real, given the precarious state of the building and the pressure it is now under from both its advancing age and the elements(the river in reality being its greatest adversary)

So this is a call to neighbours, friends, local people (and those far away), historians, architects, conservationists and most importantly our public representatives at local, national and European level to please pay heed to the future of this beautiful, scenic and historically important building before it is too late. Any observations, suggestions, directions and assistance as to how we preserve the beating heart of our area are most welcome.

After initial introduction in Irish, John spoke passionately about the urgency of climate change and the importance of local action. "Global warming is no longer a distant concern - it's something we're all witnessing," he said, pointing to the rise in extreme weather and recordbreaking temperatures. "But the good news is that communities like ours can make a difference, starting with awareness, education, and small everyday actions." Macroom's Decarbonisation Journey John reminded attendees that Macroom has been chosen by Cork County Council as the county's pilot Decarbonisation Zone, giving the town a central role in Ireland's climate transition. A chapter of the Council's Climate Action Plan focuses specifically on Macroom town, underscoring its position as a testing ground for sustainable initiatives. Reducing fossil fuel use and expanding renewable energy are key goals, but Lyons stressed that biodiversity is equally critical. "The loss of habitats and species is directly linked to global warming," he said. "Our challenge is to protect what's left and help nature recover — one park, one garden, one tree at a time." Tidy Towns Leading the Way Macroom Tidy Towns has become synonymous with environmental leadership. Over the years, the group has planted hundreds of native trees, developed wildflower meadows, and transformed public green spaces into living classrooms. In Masseytown Park, a Biodiversity Garden now doubles as an outdoor classroom used by local schools, preschools, and the WildWork programme. In Colman's Park, a 1.4 hectare green open space has been transformed into a biodiversity and recreation area, complete with groves of native trees, fruit orchards, nut orchards and a wildflower

meadow. Educational signage, designed by Rosanna Lenci, adds an interactive layer to these spaces, helping visitors identify tree species and understand pollination and wildlife. The Tidy Towns group has also installed a swift tower, bird boxes, bat boxes, owl boxes and dipper boxes supporting local biodiversity and birdlife. Funding and Future Projects In 2024, Macroom Tidy Towns secured €110,000 in Climate Action Fund grants to extend walkways along the riverside at Tom Creedon Park — encouraging more people to walk, cycle, and reconnect with nature. Further funding applications are underway, including one for energy upgrades and another for biodiversity management which will further enhance the town's amenities and sustainability. Another major step forward is the Biodiversity Action Plan for Macroom, prepared by ecologist Karen Loxted through SECAD. The comprehensive 100-page report will serve as a blueprint for future biodiversity efforts and is set to be launched publicly soon. Brochures That Inspire Action The new brochures unveiled on Saturday colourful, bilingual, and designed to educate and inspire — showcase biodiversity-rich sites around Macroom. Each brochure includes challenges, facts, and a little bit of Irish, with the aim of encouraging families and schools to explore the town's green spaces. The publications also align with several UN Sustainable Development Goals, including Good Health and Wellbeing, Quality Education, Sustainable Cities and Communities, Climate Action, and Life on Land. Distribution will begin immediately, with copies reaching local schools, tourism office, and homes across Macroom and its surrounding villages. "We want everyone — especially new residents to know about these beautiful spaces," John

said. "It's about pride of place, understanding our environment, and finding joy in it." The message of the day was clear: "More greentime, less screentime, Connect with Nature" Gratitude and Collaboration John Lyons thanked Macroom Library for hosting the event, the Tidy Towns Volunteers for their dedication over the years, and funders including An Pobal and FuturEnergy Ireland (FEI) for their vital support for this project. FEI sponsored the printing of 2,500 copies of each brochure, noting that the project aligns closely with their renewable energy and sustainability goals. He outlined some of the projects that are being progressed by FuturEnergy Ireland in the hinterland and the revenue that will accrue for the local communities and also for the Council from these developments. Special recognition was given to Rosanna Lenci, the creative force behind many of Macroom's environmental visuals — such as the Tidy Towns logo, murals, educational display boards and the striking poster for this launch itself. Her passion for language, design, and environmental education earned her the title of Honorary Member of Macroom Tidy Towns. "I'm so proud to be part of this," Lenci said. "It's inspiring to see how much can be achieved when a community cares — not just for today, but for the generations to come." The event concluded with closing remarks from Cllrs. Coughlan and Looney, reflecting a shared optimism about Macroom's environmental journey. Macroom's Climate Action Week celebration was more than a brochure launch - it was a statement of intent. A small town making big moves, one tree, one trail, and one conversation at a time.

Scríofa ag Tadgh Ó Cuill-Maonlaí


I bhfolach i gcnoic shuaimhneacha Iarthar Mhúscraí, ba áit shíochánta agus an-ghrámhar í Gúgán Barra agus a timpeallacht, a mheall lánduilli agus uiscí síochánta bothanaigh agus cuairteoirí araon. Ar feadh na gcéadta bliain, d'oibrigh an cheantar mar lárionad beo na beatha cultúrtha agus reiligiúnach, áit ar spreag oidhreacht Naomh Fionnbarra dílseacht agus foghlaim. Thar a áilleacht nádúrtha, tháinig an láithreán ina phointe cruinnithe do scoláirí Gaeilge, do scoileanna samhraidh agus do thurasóirí, ag meascadh naomhóireachta spioradálta le hathbheochan na Gaeilge agus na traidisiúin. Sa choirnéal iargúlta ach go fóill ghrámhar de Chnoc na Seithe, chonacthas creideamh agus cultúr le chéile i gcomhréireacht bhuan céad bliain ó shin. Bheadh sé nádúrtha, dá bhrí sin, go ndearna 'Irish News' trácht ar Gúgán Barra mar áit "clúiteach i gcanadh agus scéal" i gCéadaoin an Earraigh 1925.

I mí Lúnasa 1925, thuairiscigh 'Cork Examiner' go rachadh turas chuig altóir Naomh Fionnbarra faoi bhráid Chumann Gaelach Chorcaí ar an Domhnach dar gcionn. Ag an am sin, bhí an bóthar chuig bunaitheoir naofa Chorcaí tuairiscithe mar áille, agus gealladh go dtugfadh an turas i gcarrthaer deiseanna do thaistealaithe taitneamh a bhaint as na radharcanna ag athrú ar an mbealach. Bhí ticéid, lena n-áirítear soláthar béile, inacmhainne, agus meastar go mbeadh éileamh ard más maith an aimsir.

Ag an am céanna, thuairiscigh iriseoir 'Southern Star' ar staid Gúgán Barra. Ar an drochuair, thug an t-iriseoir faoi deara nach raibh fiú altóirí a raibh meas orthu in Éirinn coimeádta i gceart go minic. Bhí ballaí briste, féar ramhar agus féar ailseach i bhfad neamhaird, agus bhí deisiúcháin thógála riachtanacha neamhairdithe go minic, rud a chruthaigh tuiscint ghinearálta ar dhóiteán agus ar chur amú. Chonaic an t-iriseoir go raibh áiteanna cuairte na hÉireann i bhfad faoi bhun na n-áiteanna ar an gContinent, áit a dhéantar gach iarracht chun iad a chaomhnú agus a mhaisiú. Cé go raibh Gúgán Barra níos iomláine ná go leor altóirí Éireannacha, níor éalú sé ón neamhaird seo. Bhí crainn móra ag fás trí dhíon an ermitéir Naomh Fionnbarra, ag bagairt struchtúr ársa. Bhí na Stáisiúin den Chros go dona damáiste; bhí go leor de na figiúirí briste, mar a bhí a bhfoirgnimh áille - gné riachtanach den tseipéal beag Hibear-Rómhánach a thug go leor de charachtar an láithreáin. Tháinig an t-iriseoir ar an gconclúid go raibh deisiú práinneach ag teastáil ón altóir.

Chuir scríbhneoir an 'Cork Examiner' síos ar Lá Féile Naomh Fionnbarra a bhí á cheiliúradh i Gúgán Barra i rith Mheán Fómhair. Thug sé faoi deara go raibh tóir an chairr mhótair tar éis turais fhada a athrú go turais comparatively gearra. Bhí imeall na locha, ar a raibh embankment álainn déanta le déanaí, líonta le céadta carr, rothaí, agus carrthaer, go leor acu ó Chathair Chorcaí, cé go raibh cuid tar éis taisteal fada. Chuir an scríbhneoir i gcomparáid é seo le hamanna roimhe sin, nuair a shroich na coisritheoirí Gúgán ar an traein go Maigh Chrom agus ansin ar charrthaer nó wagonette - turais fhada, ach ní gan taitneamh. Déantar na searmanais i ndiaidh lón, cé go raibh báisteach throm ag cruthú droch-choinníollacha, agus leanta an tais ar feadh an tráthnóna. Déanadh Aifreann sa séipéal beag ag Athair Burns, P.P., Iveleary, agus tugadh Beannacht an tSíoraí Bheannaithe ón ailtéar. Tógadh an séipéal ar dhóithre stairiúla, agus léirigh sé proof na seirbhíse luath Naomh Fionnbarra thar na céadta bliain. Bhog cuairteoirí "timpeall na stáisiúin," ag iarraidh idirdhealú bunaitheora Eaglais

(Lucht Oibre), le moladh £250 a chaitheamh ar an mbóthar ó ó Chéim an Aigh go Gúgán Barra a dheisiú agus a leathnú, ag tabhairt faoi deara tábhacht stairiúil agus turasóireachta an bhealaigh. Bhí an bóthar go mór i mbearna i rith an tsamhraidh agus meastar go raibh sé contúirteach ina staid reatha. Suileabháin, Tadgh Ó Scannail, Liam de Róiste, Máire Ní Chúill, Ollamh Éamonn Ó Donnchadha, agus Seán Ó Cuill.

Ag an am céanna, bhailigh coiste Coláiste na nGobhnatán i mBaile Bhúirne, faoi uachtaránacht Mícheál Ó Luasa. Léigh an Rúnaí cumarsáid ó Roinn Oideachais ar chúrsaí samhraidh i gColáistí Gaeilge agus chuir sé liosta ar aghaidh de mhic léinnmhúinteoirí a fuair teastas dhátheangach agus Ard-Teastais anuraidh. Dearbhaigh an Rúnaí nach raibh aon ainmniúcháin diúltaithe. Thug Diarmuid Ó Luasa faoi deara gearáin ó mhúinteoirí i mBaile Átha Cliath a chreid go raibh cáilíocht acu ach a diúltaíodh dóibh teastas; d'fhreagair an Rúnaí nach gcuirfeadh sé seo isteach ar an gcoláiste. 



'Ambushes, Arson and Excommunication in Cork in 1920' talk, by Dr Thérèse O'Connell (UCC).

19TH OCTOBER 2025.

Bishop Cohalan was the Catholic Bishop of Cork from 1916 to 1952 - the one and only true one, according to him. From the outset, he had to deal with the repercussions from the 1916 Rising, the rise of Sinn Féin and the demise of the Irish Parliamentary Party, the 1918 Conscription issue, the War of Independence and the Civil War. He later oversaw the early years of the Free State, De Valera/Fianna Fáil's coming to power, the Blueshirts' challenge to the state, the 'Emergency'/ World War II and the Mother and Child controversy. But it was for excommunicating those involved in violence during 1920 that his name is indelibly linked. He was the only Irish Catholic bishop to issue such a decree. How did a farmer's son from Kilmurry, an ardent nationalist and a severe critic of the British government of the day come to that decision? Dr O'Connell explained why.

Born in 1858 to tenant farmer stock and just after the Famine, he grew up in Gurranereigh, Kilmurry. Academically brilliant, he was educated in Farranferris, Cork, and St Patrick's College, Maynooth. He served brief periods as a curate before becoming Professor of Moral Theology in Maynooth - 1896-1914, and he was appointed Auxiliary Bishop in 1914 and the Bishop of Cork in 1916. While teaching in Maynooth, he became involved in a theological dispute with a colleague and fiercely stood his ground. Law and order and the safety of ordinary people were important considerations. As Dr O'Connell outlined, these strands were central to his view of the world and explained his actions.

On the 12 December, 2020 Cohalan issued a decree excommunicating anyone taking part in ambushes, murder or attempted murder. The IRA in turn threatened to kill him. The decree applied principally to IRA men but also to Catholic RIC men. Most IRA activists were young, relatively uneducated and staunchly Catholic. At that time, the priests and bishops were powerful morally and socially. What bishops pronounced mattered.

The context and time in which he issued the excommunication were febrile. The



Independence was in full flow. On the 21 November, on Bloody Sunday, Michael Collins Apostles assassinated fifteen British Special Branch men in Dublin. That afternoon, the British forces took revenge when they gunned down fifteen people, including a player and spectators at a Tipperary-Dublin match in Croke Park. On the 28 November, Tom Barry's column killed sixteen men at Kilmicheal Ambush. (Another, Cecil Guthrie escaped but was later caught and killed). Cork City centre was burned on the night of the 11-12 December. Cohalan wrote his decree hurriedly that night and it was delivered in the Pro-Cathedral that morning. As he wrote the decree, he saw Cork City centre burning and smouldering below his palace. Dr Thérèse noted that the Bishops preparatory notes were written in haste and under stress - untidy, with many corrections, scratches and ink blobs. Usually, his notes were done clearly, precisely and meticulously (She had access to the Cork Diocesan records). Before and after the pronouncement of the interdict, she outlined precisely the train of events as recorded by the Cork Examiner.

During the talk, Dr O'Connell sympathetically outlined Cohalan's reasons for issuing the decree. He was Bishop of Cork and he had the responsibility of being faithful to the teachings of the Catholic Church, its commandments and its views on just wars and the justified use of force. As a Professor of Moral Theology, he was acutely aware of their content and implications. As bishop of many of the IRA volunteers, he was obliged to give them clear moral guidance. He was concerned about public order and the safety of non-combatants. As well, he was aware that most RIC men were ordinary Irish Catholics - for the most part from the same social backgrounds as the IRA combatants. One RIC officer killed by the IRA was a staunch Catholic. Another consideration was the effectiveness of the IRA's strategy - violence only begot violence. He realised the brutal, terrifying and provocative nature of the British Forces' actions.

This is but a very brief resume of the talk delivered with great knowledge, a deep understanding of the background and a strong sympathy for a good man doing his best in a difficult and fraught situation. Dr O'Connell will probably be speaking at other nearby venues soon and I strongly advise that you attend. The large audience in Macroom was riveted.

The talk was recorded and will appear on Macroom History Group's website in due course. Hopefully, a book on the topic will follow. Con Kelleher.





THINK GLOBALLY, ACT LOCALLY

THE LATE MEDIEVAL PERIOD

Hi! Chris Barrett back with you.

Once again we have the great pleasure of learning from Tony Miller, Archaeologist, who has guided us through local archaeology right up to the Late Medieval Period from where he picks up our exciting local history. So over to Tony..


I ended my last article with the year 1169 which is traditionally used as the transition point between the early and later medieval periods. The largescale annexation of the country was carried out over the following decades by Norman adventurers and colonisers initially led by Richard de Clare ('Strongbow') from Wales. Starting in the southeast they very quickly controlled much of Ireland as they had done in other areas of Europe, including England and southern Italy. This was not a totally unexpected move as contact between Ireland and England had been growing through expanding trade and the new reformed church in Ireland had also brought the two countries' closer together. In order to maintain English royal control of this new colony, Henry II made his son, John, the first Lord Protector of Ireland.

From an archaeological view the Norman conquest has left many of the largest and most imposing historical monuments that we can visit. Initial Norman control was enforced through the construction of motte and bailey earthworks, built at strategic locations. A large earthen mound was raised (the 'motte) and fortified with timber defences which were extended to include a lower area for a settlement known as the 'bailey'. Many of these monuments still survive while the closest to Macroom are in north Cork near Charleville. Much of the southwest, including the Macroom area, remained under McCarthy control especially after the decisive defeat of the Normans at the Battle of Callan in 1261.

On a smaller scale the new settlers built rectangular moated sites which were essentially fortified farmsteads. A number of these can still be found in the Macroom area, including a possible one in Mashanaglass, just to the east, and a cluster of three just to the south of Crookstown. Little of these are left visible apart from the water-logged remnants of the enclosing ditch. Ring works are another type of defensive features built by the Normans which, due to their similarity to ringforts, are still underrecorded. One probable example is at Castleventry, near Reenascreena, which was later used for the site

Many settlers, farmers and craftsmen were brought over from England and Wales to help in the establishment of the Norman colony. New towns were built such as Kilmallock in Limerick, surrounded by defensive walls, as well as fortifying Cork City. These settlements were not only important for defence but also acted as markets and trade hubs. Another big change is that pottery once again became a common household item, after having gone out of use from the Iron Age onwards. Soon many types of ceramics from the large potteries of the Bristol area and southwest France were being imported, especially those associated with the wine trade. Sherds of these distinctive pots with green, copper glazes are commonly found on Late Medieval excavations and can allow for the more precise dating of archaeological sites.

The motte and baileys were soon replaced in the 12th and 13th Centuries by imposing stone built castles, including impressive ones such as those found at Trim and Carrickfergus. The closest to Macroom is the well preserved complex at Glanworth which includes not only the castle and monastery but also a fine,

early stone-built bridge.

The consolidation of the Norman colony continued through the 13th Century. However, the 14th Century brought it very close to collapse. This was due to a number of reasons including an extended period of very poor weather and failed harvests and the arrival of the bubonic plague which killed over a third of Europe's population. In Ireland further depredations were inflicted by the Bruce Invasion when Edward Bruce, brother of Robert Bruce, landed from Scotland and tried to collapse English power in this country.

These many hardships left the Anglo-Normans just in control of the ports and towns, such as Cork, and an area on the east coast centred on Dublin, known as 'The Pale'. Gaelic society once again grew in strength and there was a revival in both its political and military power into the 15th Century. This is reflected in the large number of tower houses which were built over the country (possibly 3000 in total) with a number of very fine examples surviving in the Macroom area.

Tower houses are the most common monument from the late medieval period. They consist of a relatively small, fortified rectangular building with 3 or 4 storeys. Access was confined to a single defendable door and the other floors could be reached by a circular staircase in one corner. There is usually a stone vault covering one of the upper floors which had the important function of tying the four walls together. Windows were only small, narrow openings which would have left the interior very dark. In a typical tower house the ground floor was used for storage, the first floor for business and public gatherings with the Hall on the second floor used for banqueting and entertaining. The floors above would have been more private and used by the lord's family. Finally, the staircase continued and gave access to the roof walk (the 'allure') and the battlements. The main defences came from the strong walls, guarded entrance (including 'yetts' and 'murder-holes') and various overhanging features such as bartizans and machicolations. As firearms became more common musket loops were also included in the defences. Two tower houses in the Macroom area are unique in having additional features known as 'redans'. They consist of triangular spurs built onto a corner allowing defenders to provide covering fire to the exterior of the entrance and along the wall base. Carrignacurra,

near Inchigeelagh has one, while Mashanaglass has two of these redans on opposing corners.

Tower houses were built by the Anglo-Irish but the majority were constructed by the Irish, reflecting an improvement in the fortunes of Gaelic society. They were symbols of power and control and were built in dominating locations such as rock outcrops, close to natural harbours or river fords. The best examples locally are Carrigphooca to the west of Macroom and Carrigadrohid to the east, while there are others standing near Millstreet, Inchigeelagh and Crookstown. Another probably stood overlooking the Sullane River crossing in Macroom but nothing now remains of it.

Another group of monuments highly visible in the landscape from these times are the range of monasteries and friaries built both by the Anglo-Irish and the Irish Lords. During the 15th Century several new Franciscan friaries were built here in the southwest including Kilcrea near Ovens, Muckross, Bantry, Timoleague and Sherkin. These ruins are evocative places to visit and they still remain largely intact despite having been empty since the 'dissolution of the monasteries' during the reign of Henry VIII.

It was in the time of Henry and his daughter, Elizabeth I, that a forcible attempt was made by the English to assert direct rule in Ireland. This was a process made all the more bitter by the religious division between a largely Catholic Ireland and a newly Protestant England. During the reign of Elizabeth large tracts of land were seized from the Earl of Desmond and the Munster Plantation was initiated. This, together with defeats in the Desmond Rebellion and the Nine Years war, culminating in the Battle of Kinsale in 1601, led to the collapse of Gaelic power in the country. A new wave of English settlers arrived over the ensuing years, the land was redistributed and new towns, such as Bandon, developed. Ireland had now entered the early modern period and from this period onwards archaeological interest will focus on rural and urban settlements as well as an extensive number of new industrial monuments.

Ballinora retained their MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior Hurling championship title at Coachford and created a new record by winning the divisional championship for the fifth year in a row, Ballinora unbeaten now since 2020 in the divisional championship. Ballinora were strong favourites to prevail having beaten Grenagh in the group stage by twelve points a month earlier and any hopes the challengers had of reversing that result were pretty well dashed by half time when Ballinora led by 0-12 to 0-3 after a very impressive all round performance in the first half. Grenagh were a much improved team in the second half and shared the scoring tally equally with their opponents but there was never any likelihood of Ballinora losing their tight grip and in Ben Mayer they had an ace sharpshooter, the young Ballinora man scoring 0-15 of his side's total, displaying unerring accuracy from twelve frees from all sorts of distances, his performance earning him the Player of the Match award.

Conditions at Coachford were good, the heavy overnight rains having ceased and there was little wind blowing. Playing into the village goal, Ballinora had a good start, a point from Liam Lyons followed by two points from Ben Mayer frees in the first five minutes, and when Mayer had pointed another free and added a point from play within a further three minutes it was clear that the champions were on song and Grenagh were visibly struggling to contain them.

Dan Twomey had an opening point for Grenagh from a 50m free in the 10th minute but Ballinora struck back with a point from a glorious Seán Lyons side-line cut on 14 followed by a Ben Mayer pointed free from inside his own '65' and as the champions continued to apply the pressure, Darragh Corkery fired over two fine scores to leave his side leading by 0-9 to 0-1 after twenty minutes.

Moycarkey-Borris 2-9 (15) – Naomh Abán 2-15 (21) Naomh Abán advanced to the AIB Munster LGFA Club Intermediate Championship Final after an impressive second-half surge saw them overcome Moycarkey-Borris by six points in an entertaining and hard-fought semi-final encounter on Sunday afternoon.

The game, played at a brisk pace from the throw-in, saw both sides trade scores throughout an evenly contested first half that ended level at 1-8 apiece. 








LEE VALLEY OUTLOOK



"You have made known to me the path that leads to Life; Your Presence fills me with Joy and brings me pleasure forevermore" (Psalms 16:11).

Welcome back dear student, do you ever study the expressions on the faces of others? If you look closely you can tell much from their countenance. I'm not talking about wrinkles, but about pain, exhaustion, worry, bitterness, and darkness. The evidence of how they're really feeling. We salute folks daily, asking in passing 'hello! how are you?' and rush right along. Encounters become a habit, at a rushed surface-level only. Loneliness, isolation, feeling overwhelmed or afraid are all real emotions that can have a toxic effect on a life. But in others the joy of relationship and contentment shines through as a beam of light in darkness (Psalms 34:4-7). In the Scripture above, David reveals that trusting God led him to find the pathway of Life. He saw the Lord deliver and protect him, bringing him into a blessed place resulting in a constant awareness of the Presence of God, filling David to overflow with joy and pleasure. "Lord You alone are my Inheritance, my cup of blessing. You guard all that is mine. The land You have given me is a pleasant land . . . I will bless the Lord Who guides me; even at night my heart instructs me. I know the Lord is always with me. I will not be shaken, for He is right beside me. No wonder my heart is glad, and I rejoice. My body rests in safety" (Psalm 16:5-9; Jeremiah 20:11).

Peace comes from knowing Jesus, the Prince of Peace. We don't have to fret, worry or be afraid when our lives are in His hands (Psalm 31:14-15). God will never hurt you friend. Close relationship with the Lord brings rest (Psalm 23:3). The picture from our lead Scripture explains this rest — God is here, so we need never fear. "For You have endowed him with blessings forever; You cheer him with joy in Your Presence. For he trusts in the Lord. The unfailing Love of the Most High will keep him from stumbling" (Psalm 21:6-7 NLT). There is visible evidence of God's Presence — blessing, joy, wisdom, and peace - gifts bestowed to His beloved; to anyone who will come to know Him through His Son Jesus — "the Way, the Truth and the Life" (John 14:6).

Lots of people look for new, or smoother paths in life. Currently, gardeners are clearing dead leaves and debris off their pathways to keep them safe. It's important to be able to see where you are going to avoid pitfalls and slipping (Psalms 119:105). Strain often shows on faces because folks may be enduring confusion, darkness, sadness, or terror. Tonight, many will celebrate horror and demons as 'just a bit of Halloween fun'. There is no light or joy there friend - only cursed pathways, anxiety, and hopelessness. However, for those who call upon the True Light of the World: Jesus, the Son of God, He promises to arise over you with healing in His wings and Light beams (Malachi 4:2). 



I visit your - and Dad's - grave; but I know that you're not really there.



And I know I will see you again, where parting will be no more. But not for a while. Until then.


