





## GRÁ MACROOM GIFT CARD OFFICAL LAUNCH WAS HELD TO **BOOST LOCAL BUSINESS IN THE MUSKERRY AREA**

The Grá Macroom Gift Card backed by the Macroom Business Association was officially launched on Wednesday, 29th November at the Castle Hotel, Macroom, with local businesses and community representatives from across the Lee Valley region in attendance.

The innovative new initiative brings Macroom and neighbouring villages together to create a high-tech gift card designed to drive in-person shopping, strengthen local connections, and keep money circulating within the community, and offers significant benefits for both participating businesses and card recipients.

Over 85 businesses from Clondrohid, Béal Átha an Ghaorthaidh, Guagán Barra, Inchigeelagh, Ballyvourney, Ballymackeera, Coachford, Dripsey, Lissarda, Kilmurry, and Macroom are now eligible to accept the card commission-free, including shops, restaurants, pubs, cafés, and attractions.

Macroom and the surrounding Lee Valley area are the first in County Cork to adopt the Town & City Gift Card technology, offering both physical and digital versions

TD. Chair of the Oireachtas Committee on Rural & Community Development and the Gaeltacht, he spoke passionately about the importance of supporting local he said, "these are the businesses that sponsor our local clubs and charities, we need to show our appreciation by supporting this initiative."

Aindrias Moynihan TD praised the Grá Macroom Gift Card for highlighting the importance of shopping local to keep jobs and investment within the community.

Monica Gilmore of IRD Duhallow outlined how the Leader Funding helped bring the project to life, noting that IRD is "very happy to support this type of enterprise in a rural area." She encouraged other initiatives to engage with Leader, emphasising that funding is available to promote rural enterprise and innovation from the South Cork LAG.

Killian Lynch, Chairperson of the Macroom Business Association, firstly he welcomed and thanked everyone for attending. He extended gratitude to IRD Duhallow, Leader, the Department of Rural & Community Development, and the Lee Valley Enterprise Board for their invaluable support, he said "without their backing, this project would not have been possible. This report was read in detail, the positives and the negatives all being commented on. Chairperson, Brian O Sullivan thanked all the volunteers and especially those that show up every Saturday morning. As we prepare for next year's submission, if any community group or organisations have any projects that they are starting in the next while, please let us know at 087-1434770 so that competition each year is under 8 Headings as follows: 1 Community, Planning and Involvement. 2 Streetscape and Public Places. 3 Green Spaces and Landscaping. 4 Nature and Biodiversity in your locality. 5 Sustainability - doing more with less. 6 - Tidiness and Litter Control. 7 Residential Streets and Housing Areas. 8 Approach Roads, Street and Lanes.

The Macroom Tidy Towns Community Biodiversity Action Plan 2026 - 2029 published this week. The CBAP was commissioned with funding obtained the Community Foundation Ireland Biodiversity Fund 2024. The work was completed by Karen Loxton a SECAD Ecologist, in consultation with John Lyons and Joseph Cronin. This 100-page plan is been added to the National Biodiversity Data Centre and to our website. Hard copies will be available in various locations such as from Macroom Library. The BAP Covers the local flora and fauna and recommendations to improve biodiversity in the area. Funding to Implement these recommendations has been applied for under the CFI Biodiversity Fund 2025. On the 29th of November Karen Loxton from SEACD is going to be doing a talk to explore the impact of Climate Change and the importance

of biodiversity to sustain our natural environment in Macroom Library at 1:30pm. A Statement from CFI reads 'Community foundation Ireland is proud to support Macroom Tidy Towns Community Biodiversity Action Plan through our Biodiversity Fund. Local action is at the heart of protecting and restoring nature, and this plan is a wonderful example of how communities can come together, drew on local expertise, and take practical steps to safeguard biodiversity for future generations. By empowering communities like Macroom to lead this vital work, we are helping to build a more sustainable climate-resilient and also achieving our mission equality for all in thriving communities.'

November is a good time to plant bare rooted fruit trees. The time to plant and buy them is from November to March. As well as helping preserve some of our rare heritage fruit tree varieties, a small orchard can be valuable for biodiversity. They are made up of several habitats, including woodland, hedgerow and meadow. Over time these habitats can be home to a range of biodiversity, including bees, butterflies, birds, bats, beetles and fungi. Windfallen fruit is also source of food in autumn and winter for a range of wildlife. Species rich grassland beneath the trees can be a haven for pollinators and biodiversity especially if they contain wildflowers. Make sure to include a native crab apple in your orchard if possible. Pollinators like wild bees and moths have a vital pollination role in orchards, with almost all fruit resulting from pollination through either bee or other insect. In turn, fruit trees provide nectar and pollen essential for the survival of these important

Nine inches of footpath, which had been covered by overgrown plants, have been reclaimed. The committee has purchased Christmas tree which will be planted and will in remain in situ into the future. The committee is currently in discussion with Cork Co Co with regard to obtaining an electronic speed sign, which Is hoped will prompt drivers to reduce their speed as they pass up and down Masseytown. To help defray ongoing costs, a fundraising table quiz will take place in Mary Anne's pub on Friday November 21st at 9pm. A donation box is also available in Costcutters should people wish to make a contribution.

Change is about to happen in the area of Grass cutting arrangements in many housing areas, those estates where the Tidy Towns have been managing the grass cutting for years now. This has become unsustainable on the part of Tidy Towns volunteers and scheme workers. In other towns like Ballincollig, Carrigaline and around the County residents' groups in private estates organise and pay for the cutting themselves. Cork Co Co who will be issuing information and guidance on this in due course.

As always, tidy towns volunteers have been busy with Litter Picking, General Maintenance around town and the Fairy Garden, leaf collection around town and keeping on top of usual work.

So many people compliment the work we do and admire what is been done but why not consider doing something small yourself in your own local areas, as this helps overall efforts, inspires others and there is a feel-good factor. We in the Tidy Towns will support you in whatever way we can. "Text Alert" is designed to facilitate immediate and cost-effective communication from An Garda Síochána to the public. An Garda Síochána provide information by text to each registered "Community Contact" and they, in turn will forward the information by text to all members of their "Community Group".

"Text Alert" is a one-way communications system.

There will not be any facility to reply to the "Text Alert" system. Contact with the Gardaí must be made in person or by a telephone call, to control and verify information.

This text alert is in operation in all the parishes around Macroom and we hope to have it in the urban area and surrounds shortly.

# Remembering Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy

Remembering Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy an Irish nun who dedicated her life to supporting those in need. 19th June 1939 - 3rd November 2025

Sr. Stan was born Treasa Kennedy on 19th of Jine 1939 near Lios Pole on the Dingle peninsula in Co. Kerry. She was one of five children growing up on a small family farm surrounded by farmers and fishermen in her early childhood. She tells of storytelling and card playing in place of radio, cinema and television. In her early life she was aware that some people were better off than others and she wanted to help those

who were less advantaged than her. At 18 years of age, she joined the religious sisters of charity in Dublin and became Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy. Sr. Stan has often said that her initial decision to become a nun was fuelled primarily by a desire to help tackle poverty. Sr. Stan you were "a shining light "may you rest in peace.







#### iCan Cork Regional Meeting at Independence Museum Kilmurry, 16-10-2025.

The Irish Community Archive Network (iCAN) is the leading organisation championing and supporting digital community archives in Ireland, it supports communities to collect and share their local history and heritage online.

To date, iCAN has supported the creation and development of 46 online archives in counties Clare, Cork, Galway, Mayo, Wicklow and Tipperary.

Independence Museum Kilmurry, one of the pioneering members of iCan in County Cork, hosted the Cork Regional Meeting of iCan members on October 16. It was the first in-person get together for the five groups that recently joined iCAN, including Macroom History Group, Inniscarra Historical Society, Kilshannig Historical Society, etc.

Members of Independence Museum Kilmurry shared the story of their community-led museum which celebrated its 60th anniversary this year and delivered presentations on the last journey of General Michael Collins, the story of Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, etc.

Due to lack of numbers Clondrohid did not field a Football team at adult level in 1973 and 1974. However, they were back again in 1975 with a team that included youth and experience. They defeated a strong Canovee side in the opening round at Macroom, got the better of Our Lady's Hospital at Cloughduv and got the upper hand on Kilmichael in the Semi Final at Coachford. A report on the Final reads as follows by TAS.

#### Ballincollig 1-6 Clondrohid 0-7

A goal from right half back Sean Hourihan in the last minute of the match gave Ballincollig victory in a very exciting Grade B Football championship Final in Coachford on Sunday last (October 5th). It gave the Easteners some compensation for their recent narrow defeat in the A Championship. The result was a heartbreaking one for Clondrohid who led for most of the second half and made such a gallant effort to win a competition on their return to the adult playing area after a lapse of three years. All credit is due to Ballincollig however for making the extra effort when all seemed lost and snatching a victory in a dramatic

Clondrohid will bemoan a number of wasted opportunities in the opening half which could have put them in a strong position at the interval but Ballincollig can also point to failure from scoreable frees at different stages of each half and they were unfortunate as well to have a goal disallowed at a crucial stage in the second half when scores were

Clondrohid's lack of experience proved to be their undoing in the final analysis as the steadiness of their more experienced opponents was clearly evident over the hour.

Clondrohid played with the aid of a slight breeze in the opening half and attacked strongly in the early stages. Their forwards made little impression and nine minutes had elapsed before Finbar O'Brien opened their account with a point. The lead was short-lived as Jack Hegarty went through for a Ballincollig point in the twelfth minute and the winners went ahead three minutes later when Maurice O'Connell converted a free. Clondrohid had a pronounced superiority at centre field at this stage and they were on the offensive for most of the second quarter. This was not reflected on the scoreboards as poor shooting and the tight marking Ballincollig defence restricted their tally to a further two points which left them one point ahead at the interval.

Ballincollig's chances of success looked bright at this stage as they would be favoured by the breeze on the resumption. But on the restart Clondrohid continued to force the pace with two points in as many minutes from Michael O'Callaghan. Joe Kelleher increased their lead to three points. Ballincollig fought back and points from Aidan Ryan and Tom Foley (f) again reduced the arrears to the minimum.

Ballincollig switched Tim O'Leary to centre field at this stage and this greatly improved their fortunes in this sector from this point onwards, but Clondrohid were next to score when Michael O'Callaghan pointed another free in the 43rd minutes to increase their lead by two points. Ballincollig were on top in most sectors at this stage and points from Leo Ryan and Jack Hegarty brought them on level terms with ten minutes remaining. Two minutes later it looked all over when Hegarty put the Easteners in the lead with a goal but much to the consternation of the Ballincollig supporters the referee had whistled for a free out and left off the hook Clondrohid returned to the attack and Michael O'Callaghan put them ahead one more with a point from a free.

Failure to convert a couple of scoreable frees looked like costing Ballincollig the match as the game entered the final minutes and when a great effort from Derry White, from a 50, came off the crossbar and was cleared a Clondrohid triumph looked inevitable. Ballincollig refused to throw in the towel and with

seconds remaining Sean Hourihane moved upfield with the ball and his attempt at a point slipped under the bar to secure victory for his side and brought the curtain down in a highly entertaining game.

A vital factor in Ballincollig's success was the brilliance of their wing half backs Sean Mc Carthy and Jack Sexton when the pressure was severest in the opening half as they made timely clearances on a number of occasions. The winners had other good performers over the hour in Derry White, Maurice O'Connell, Tim O'Leary, Aidan Ryan and Jack Hegarty. Clondrohid's stars were: James O'Leary, Paddy Corkery, Michael O'Callaghan. Martin O'Leary and John O'Callaghan.

At the conclusion of the game the Chairman of the Mid Cork Board Austin Cremin presented the Cup to the Captain of the Ballincollig team Derry Barry Murphy who was the only remaining member of the team which last won the Grade B Football Championship in 1963.



## A PICTURE TELLS A THOUSAND WORDS

Hi! Chris Barrett back again speaking with local artist, my good friend Maria Healy, who works with many mediums but who is specialising at present in photographs, in particular their digital manipulation. Her current focus is on the Gearagh.

Maria starts by reminding me that the old saying of a picture telling 1000 words has never lost its

Art is the last true bastion to highlight issues, people and places. Art and artists use their medium to record events of historical, cultural or topical significance without getting embroiled in the political agendas

Art can be hugely impactful and hold a superpower of its own to reach people through whatever medium necessary. Maria has chosen the medium of

Photographs act as a record of an event, or capture a fragment of time which is frozen forever. When one glances or pours over a photograph, there are moments of recollection or re-immersion into that

Even when a person picks up a random photograph where the setting, content or people are unknown to them, there is still a moment of immersion into that slice in time. There is no avoiding it, and it is something we have all experienced at one time or another.

According to land artist Richard Long, "Time passes but a place remains."

Old photographic images of the Gearagh are very thin on the ground as cameras and developing film were an expensive endeavour and beyond most people's pockets until much later, when they were produced widely and more cheaply.

So when Maria Healy was given some old images of everyday life in the Gearagh village of Annahala taken in the 1930s and 40s, it was with much delight that she embarked on using them in her work. These images had belonged to an aunt of Rodger Sullivan from Farren, named May Lyons. May Lyons had been born and reared in Annahala. Maria had been searching for a way to incorporate these old images with images she had taken herself over the last two decades. Her discovery was to lead to two exhibitions with focus on the Gearagh, the first was shown with great success to appreciative locals, at Art On Main Street in Micheal O Muirthile"s Art Gallery, Macroom for the month of February in 2025 . Maria's second exhibition is opening at 6.30 p.m. on Saturday 15th November, 2025 and will run for the remainder of November and throughout the whole of December. Maria holds the view that many visitors to

the Gearagh are unaware of its fascinating history and the dramatic events which unfolded in October 1956, which led to most of the village of Annahala being submerged under water to facilitate the Iniscarra and Carrigadrohid dams being built.

By using the idea of juxtaposing, or using the concept of double exposure, along with digital manipulation, Maria combines her images with Rodger's old photographs.

Suddenly the Gearagh comes alive again in the imagination. People are going about their daily living. ploughing, threshing, family picnics, friends catching up and socializing. Children are at play once more.

These rare photographs are the only tangible evidence of what was, apart from the memories people carry. By combining both old and new photos Maria gives a degree of visibility and permanence to the history of the Gearagh and its people. Her work rescues the story of the Gearagh and prevents it from being consigned to the dusty archives of the history shelves.

Through these images of the Gearagh, Maria shares with us a sense of memory of home, belonging to a community, and partaking in everyday rituals. These show the connectedness of this community with its surrounding landscape of gardens, fields, and farms, and also represent links connecting one family

with the next. The importance of these connections cannot be overstated. The writer, Akiko Busch, describes home as, 'A network of social and cultural currents, those habits, beliefs and values that also make it function and which gives power to the places

The power of place in the Gearagh was the connection between its people, its village, and its unique waterways. Holding a photograph of an original Gearagh home, while standing on the actual stone ruins, enables place, time and space to converge and allows memory to become tangible, if only for a moment.

Narrative and memory break through the boundaries of time and space. Memory is inexplicably underpinned by place and measured by time. The Gearagh holds a sense of present absence.

Traces of what was, evoke responses which are challenging to put into words. It is difficult to walk through the Gearagh and not sense this other resonance. At the time this article goes to print, the Gearagh has an unusually low level of water. This gifts us with another lens through which to focus our attention. There is an uncanny sense of a past reality and an air of melancholy for what was; a nostalgia which Maria reflects in her work. With her unique blending of photographs, it is easy to straddle the past and present world of the Gearagh.

Maria's exhibition will be opened by Gearagh expert, Kevin Corcoran at 6.30 pm on Saturday 15th November at the Ionad Cultura, Ballyvourney





Ross Oil Junior A Football Championship Final: Aghinagh 1-12 Donoughmore 0-15 – draw **Final Replay** 

Donoughmore 2-15 (2-3-9) Aghinagh 2-14 (2-

The never say die spirit of Donoughmore was rewarded in spectacular fashion in the Ross Oil Mid Cork Junior Football championship final replay at Macroom when they came from being seven points down in the 56th minute to score 2-2 without reply in a sensational finish to take the title for the fifth time ever and the first since 2011. The Donoughmore team and supporters were delirious at the final whistle, Aghinagh in shock, as victory was snatched from the latter's grasp in the cruellest of fashion after they looked to be heading for victory as the game neared its conclusion.

Once again, the two teams contributed to a wonderful game of football, played before another huge and enthusiastic attendance and the pity was that there had to be a loser, doubly tough on Aghinagh who lost last year's final, again in a replay, also by a point.

Conditions at Macroom were excellent, with little wind and the expected rains held off until the second half. Aghinagh playing into the town goal opened the scoring with a Seán O'Riordan point, Scott Barrett equalised for the winners and Declan Keating put them in front. As Donoughmore continued to force the pace, a foul on Adam Dinan resulted in a free which Gavin O'Sullivan kicked over a two-pointer, 0-4 to 0-1 to Donoughmore after eight minutes. Aghinagh gradually began to get to grips with matters and in the 12th minute Con Buckley kicked a two-pointer from play and then the excellent Liam Twohig had Aghinagh in front from another two-pointer from play. Twohig now added two more points from play and in the 21st minute Aghinagh struck for the opening goal of the game. Luke O'Leary's long delivery collected by Gearóid O'Sullivan who in turn put Twohig clear inside the defender and the Aghinagh sharpshooter finished sublimely to the net to put Aghinagh in control, leading 1-9 to 0-4.

In the three minutes before the break, Donoughmore at last broke the seven-score sequence of Aghinagh with a point from Seán O'Hanlon followed by a twopointer free from Gavin O'Sullivan and then a point from a Declan Keating free, all of which improved their situation considerably leaving them four points adrift now, 1-9 to 0-8, but with wind to favour them in the second half.

On the resumption, Aghinagh consolidated their position with three points in a row, two from Liam Twohig frees and one from play by Con Buckley, which opened the gap between the teams to seven points by the 39th minute. Back came Donoughmore with a point from a Gavin O'Sullivan free followed by a twopointer from another free, rather needlessly conceded, a four point gap again at the three guarter mark.

Aghinagh were to restore their dominance before being hit by a late Donoughmore tsunami which few could have foreseen. The final stages were incredibly exciting. When Cummins took a pass from Aodh Twomey on 55 and fired home a goal to give Aghinagh a 2-14 to 0-13 lead it seemed that the destination of the title had been decided and few would have disputed that on the run of play that it was not deserved.

'Keep going lads' was the Donoughmore mantra and the team dug deep and produced a stunning response. Declan Keating pointed a free in the 58th minute and immediately after only a superb double save by the Aghinagh goalkeeper Jason McCarthy denied Gavin O'Sullivan and then Kevin O'Connell of a goal. Donoughmore kept up their offensive, and a high ball into the crowded Aghinagh goalmouth was punched to the net by midfielder Seán O'Hanlon, 2-14 to 1-14 now with the clock almost at the end of regulation time. Donoughmore needed a goal to survive and were almost in again when a close range ground shot went across the Aghinagh goal before going just inches wide. Donoughmore were not to be denied and in the next attack in a situation identical to the circumstances of the previous goal Daniel Forde kicked another high ball into the Aghinagh goalmouth and incredibly it was Seán O'Hanlon who again rose highest and punched the ball to the net to level the scores. Donoughmore were in raptures at the change in fortunes and went in search of a winner, urged on by their supporters in full cry. Centre forward Gavin O'Sullivan, later named Man of the Match, delivered the knock out blow for Donoughmore from a '45' sent confidently over the bar despite the pressure and when Aghinagh failed to capitalise on one last opportunity, the final whistle blew and the extreme contrasts in the emotions of the respective camps was so telling.

"But Ruth replied... 'don't ask me to leave you and turn back. Wherever you go, I will go; wherever you live, I will live. Your people will be my people, and your God will be my God. Wherever you die, I will die, and there I will be buried. May the Lord punish me severely if I allow anything but death to separate us!" (Ruth 1:16-17).

Welcome back dear student, last week our Scripture from Psalms forty rejoiced on how God rescues us from the mire of despair and sets us on a new path. Ruth was the daughter-in-law of Naomi. She was from a different nation and culture but chose to stay with her mother-in-law after both their husbands had died, for Naomi was all alone. The verse above is from a passage often read at weddings - signifying the devotion of the newlyweds to each other no matter what the future brings. In Naomi's time, the outlook for a widow was not favourable. Once her money was gone her future was starvation, unless someone took her in. So, Ruth staying with Naomi rather than going home to find a new husband, was a sacrificial act. Now the reality set in when they came to Naomi's home place: Bethlehem, which incidentally translates 'House of Bread'. They returned as beggars, causing Naomi (which means 'sweetness' in Hebrew) to want to change her name to 'Mara' - meaning 'bitter'. She had lost her husband, the breadwinner, and her two sons - her legacy, so she was desolate. To survive Ruth went to work in the fields gathering leftovers from those who were bringing in the barley harvest. The practice in Israel was to let the poor glean behind the reapers to feed themselves. God's plan of Redemption for Naomi and Ruth now kicked into action. "The steps of the godly are ordered by the Lord. He takes delight in their journey" (Psalms 37:23). This is how the Lord works - when all looks hopeless and lost 'light shines in the darkness' (John 1:5).

The field that Ruth was working in belonged to Boaz, who unbeknownst to her, was a close relative to Naomi. He saw Ruth and inquired who she was. Already a good report had gone out about her in the city - that she was the widowed daughter-in-law, who chose to look after Naomi. Friend, oftentimes we do things, or go through things that no one notices - but God knows everything! He knows the truth. The Lord Jesus sees you at your weakest - He knows what it feels like (Hebrews 4:15). He understands the sacrifices, the pain, and the heartache, and He is your Redeemer! (Job 19:25) This means He will bring healing for all that has been lost. God is the One Who restores the years the locusts have stolen (Joel 2:25). He rebukes the devourer for our sake (Malachi 3:11). Things may not turn out like you had planned or imagined, but if you trust Him the Lord will bring redemption. To redeem means to buy back or rescue what was lost and restore with atonement. Because there is no time in eternity where God lives, we can ask Jesus to go back to that time when the enemy came in and destroyed, and He will

bring redemption and turn around with healing for the pain. Life keeps going on friend, but if we trust God we can go forward into a new beginning. The book of Ruth, only four chapters long, foreshadows Jesus the Messiah redeeming our lives from sin, hopelessness, death, and destruction. Boaz was her Kinsman Redeemer. He ended up marrying Ruth, and they brought forth a grandson for Naomi called Obed, who later became grandfather to King David, in the ancestral line of Messiah Jesus!

#### The time is RIPE

Time management and efficiency is big business. Books, conferences, courses, seminars and videos abound. Procrastination is my constant companion and downfall. I delay and distract myself rather than face the present, often pressing, duty.

I heard once that "it's better to keep up rather than catch up." How true - but I'm still catching up!

I'm still distracted by easy wins like replying to a funny text, scrolling some of the click-bait news items and alerts on the phone and before I know it a half-hour of my life has gone. Apparently there is some science to this as part of our brain does like these dopamine hits or quick-fixes while at the same interval we "lose all sense of time." Then waking up again, as it were, we rush headlong back to our normal or urgent tasks

#### What to do and where to begin?

The irony is that if you want to "advance" in anything you must "retreat" for a while in order to plan and strategize.

You have to find a plan that works for you. Here's my strategy. I call it the RIPE TIME METHOD because tasks of everyday can be categorized as

RIPE stands for Retroactive, Interactive, Proactive and Extra-active.

Retroactive (R) refers to catching up on the backlog, Interactive (I) means keeping up with today; Proactive (P) plans ahead and future proofs keeping a backlog at bay, while finally, Extra-active (E) are those emergency or extraordinary situations requiring immediate attention requiring me to drop everything else.

#### RETROACTIVE

Retroactive may seem to be daunting - the stockpile of tasks yet to be completed can be paralyzing - except if they are urgent and the deadline is near. I live too close to the edge! But rather than be discouraged I think it of it in this way. There are 1001 things to be done - maybe I can get 101 of them done this week, and maybe 11 of them today, but I need to start on 1. We have to break the pile down or we break down!

#### INTERACTIVE

Apparently 40 % of our time is spent on repetitive tasks we do every day - personal hygiene, meals, commuting, etc. from Monday to Friday. These are the essential non-negotiable tasks. These are the daily

Interactive tasks can be daily, weekly, fortnightly, monthly, quarterly, half-yearly and annually as-well. We can think of weekly "I" tasks such as laundry, shopping, vacuuming, ironing. . .

Fortnightly tasks include the recycling.

Monthly tasks might include a deep-clean.

A long weekend break might be taken quarterly.

Visiting the dentist should be half-yearly, the medical check up and tax returns - annually etc.

How we manage and deal with daily tasks will require us to place them into their categories. New demands, requests and needs come our way and we must therefore decide whether they justifiably need a bit of extra thought rather than rushing in to them, or attending to them straight away.

So there is a place and a time for allowing things to end up incomplete for today, but not for too long.

#### **PROACTIVE**

P is future planning and future-proofing. It can be highly beneficial to have a Plan in place. It can be pleasant like booking the next holiday and aiming our budget and time organization to allow it to happen and to schedule around it, to use it as a deadline for certain tasks to be completed and the desk cleared. P can be projects and plans - there's always a positive vibe in thinking ahead like this. The trick is in the followthrough.

#### **EXTRA-ACTIVE**

"Life is what happens when we make plans!" Sickness requires rest and re-charging, visitors drop by, a family or friend needs our help, etc. These unexpected and unforeseen circumstances require our flexibility in the RIPE method. Life isn't always linear. But life is for living and public events and our involvement in the community are important too. We are social beings after all.

An extraordinary situation requires our full attention. We have to live with the resulting backlog and allow for the time it takes to adjust to re-establishing our daily routines. That's life!

Today is an opportunity to implement more order and time management in our lives. It might be worth sitting down and drawing a table or chart that works for you. Give it a go.


