Don't MISS OUT ON Grá Macroom

Gra Macroom Gift Card Gone from strength to strength after being embraced by most employers locally as their staff reward scheme.

The new Macroom Gift Card which was launched in October for the town and surrounding villages has exceeded expectations with thousands being spent on the card in only 6 weeks. Local businesses can accept the card commission-free and employers can give the card tax free to staff.

Macroom and 9 neighbouring villages have collaborated on a new high-tech gift card for the Lee Valley region to drive in-person sales for local businesses and encourage connection between people and places.

Backed by Macroom Business Association, the Grá Macroom Gift Card is replacing the previous paper Macroom shopping voucher and offers significant benefits for the businesses accepting the card and recipients spending them.

Businesses in Macroom, Clondrohid, Béal Átha an Ghaorthaidh, Baile Mhuirne, Guagán Barra, Inchigeelagh, Coachford, Dripsey, Lissarda, Kilmurry and are all eligible to accept the card, commission free, including shops, restaurants, attractions, pubs and cafés.

Mastercard backed, businesses will be able to accept the card using their existing payment systems. Once launched, the Grá Macroom Gift Card will be available as a physical card that can be swiped at the till or a digital card that is added to digital wallets, enabling 'tap to pay' technology.

Cards will be available to buy online and in person from Killian Auctioneers Macroom, Cooney's Garage in Coachford, Connections in Macroom, Drome Centra in Ballymakera, Daybreak in Ballingeary, Healy shop Clondrohid, Costcutter Masseytown as well as online at www.townandcitygiftcards.ie

The Grá Macroom Gift Card is the latest 'shop local' initiative from the town following the opening of the Macroom bypass in 2023, with a Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) study finding that footfall in the town is up 28%. The card will be part of the multi-award winning Town & City Gift Card initiative from Miconex, active across Ireland. Killian Lynch, chairperson of the Macroom Business Association said the new card is easier to spend and accept: We have spoken to most of the business across Macroom and Surrounding villages and all are delighted to accept the card. Killian says it's a no brainer for business and also for employers to be able to use this card as a staff reward at Christmas, so as to ring fence the spend in the local economy and also to be able to give a card that can be used for day to day living.

"Macroom is the first town in Munster to utilise Town & City Gift Card technology to create our own high-tech physical and digital gift card. With the new gift card we have extended the initiative to our surrounding

villages in the Lee Valley region, which has a population reach of around 15,000 people. In doing so, we expect to generate around €500,000 to €1 million in sales annually for our Gift Card program, money that is ring-fenced into the Lee Valley/Muskerry region.

The new Grá Macroom Gift Card will be as easy to spend and accept with the balance automatically updated and businesses getting paid quickly. It is far easier for organisations to reward their staff with the new gift card too using the Small Benefit Exemption scheme, rather than trying to manage mounds of paper vouchers.

"Our intention was for the Grá Macroom Gift Card to become the default gift card for the Lee Valley and going by recent sales, everyone is embracing on this new system. Businesses in Macroom and its

As 2025 draws to close we look forward to what 2026 will bring, and no doubt it will be busy as usual. We retained our Gold Medal in the National Tidy Town's Competition with an 8-point increase in marks from 2024, a good increase at this level but other competing towns are gaining also.

We competed in the Cork County Council Anti-Litter Competition and won the Town Most Improved Award which we were pleased with. We participated in events throughout the year including Macroom Lions Club 'Meet the Clubs Day', the Gum Litter Roadshow, a Tidy Towns Celebration Event in County Hall. We worked with West Muskerry Athletic Club with their annual road race and School Sports Day. We worked with Lee Valley Enterprise Board/Macroom Business Association with the St Patrick's Day Parade, Food Festival and the Christmas Lights.

Work continued with the Coleman's Park Amenity/ Biodiversity Area and other biodiversity initiatives. Funding was procured for the Refurbishment of the Picnic Area in Coolcower and for the creation of a footpath to Coolcower House in a joint application with Cork Co Co. We organised a Tree Planting event for National Tree Week. Funding was procured and work carried out throughout the year on a Biodiversity Action Plan for the town of Macroom, work carried out by an ecologist. This plan is published and in circulation and will be promoted widely in 2026. Con O Sullivan, Community Services supervisor retired and a presentation was made to Con. A Nature Walk was organised as part of Heritage Week. We launched Two Brochures, focused on biodiversity, one dealing with the riverside area and the other for St Colman's Park Biodiversity/Amenity area. These are available in the Town Hall, free of charge.

One of our Volunteers John Lyons was elected as a community and voluntary rep on Cork County Council's Strategic Policy Committee No 2 on Environment, Climate Action and Biodiversity. John was also nominated to be An Taisce Climate Ambassador and did us proud, gaining an award at National level.





Kilmurry Active Retirement

From now on.

As our climate project comes to its end, did we learn anything? Did it make any real impact on us? Will we do anything differently? It is yes to all three. We certainly learned that other communities that we visited have shown striking commitment. They have found solutions and they are progressively working on them. Scientists have warned that global warming produces changes, and some we cannot predict. At best the capacity of the atmosphere to tolerate global warming gasses, without substantial effects, is around 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels. Almost all our scientists now believe that we will exceed that limit. The climate we enjoy now is the most benign that we will experience. From now on it will be more hostile, even if we act and reduce our emissions. If we do not act, it will be even more hostile. A more hostile climate is already impacting many around the world, especially those without the capacity to prepare - those that are contributing least to global warming. Many are unaware that last month at least 1500 have lost their lives in human induced extreme weather events in Southeast Asia. It is barely newsworthy anymore. These extreme weather events cause substantial harm to livelihoods, wellbeing, and increasingly loss of many lives. Human-induced climate change is caused mostly by those of us in the developed nations. We know that we are all adding to global warming. Consequently, we each are accountable for our share of the harm that our collective action causes. I cannot explain why I came to this most uncomfortable realisation, so belatedly. What am I going to do about it?

At our recent members meeting ninety two percent voted to pursue another climate action project, this time focusing more so on practical actions. Our association will help but we are all individually responsible. In my case, my belated realisation has led to a firm decision. From now on I will not leave any 'net carbon' footprint. Zero. What is meant by 'net carbon zero footprint' is that my negative actions for climate will, at least, be 'offset' (equalled out) by my positive actions for climate. Firstly, I will aim to progressively reduce my footprint, and then I will offset or compensate for the remainder that I cannot yet reduce. Within my remaining lifespan, I think I will be unable to reduce my carbon footprint completely. I expect that I will remain responsible for at least some climate warming gasses being released, either directly by myself, or indirectly by using food and products whose production entail releasing global warming gasses. So, I will take actions myself (such as tree planting) or I will pay for services that will remove more climate warming gasses from the atmosphere than those I release. I will aim at ensuring that, in the aggregate, my impact will be positive or at least will be 'net zero'.

Reduction though is the most important part. It is to that I will address most of my efforts. The logical starting point is to know our current carbon footprint. From this we get to know the scale of the problem, the size of our household's contribution to global warming. It is not difficult to assess our carbon footprints. Typically, it takes around fifteen minutes. Twenty-five of us from our retirement association, were most generously helped by Coachford Community College transition year students. I had done my own assessment a year previously. Our household's estimated footprint then was just over 9 tonnes carbon dioxide, typical enough for this country. We pledged at that time to reduce a little. We did so, simply by changing our electricity provider to one that supplies only renewable energy to the grid. Since electricity is pooled we won't know how the electricity that comes down the line to us was generated, but we are only going to buy renewable electricity from now on. When my footprint was assessed again in Coachford this autumn it was 8.1 tonnes, a saving of 0.9 tonnes. It will cost us €53 for the year more than the cheapest electricity alternative that we could have chosen.

Within my recent assessment, travel at 4.5 tonne contributed most. I have recently made another change. I drive a 2014 2 litre diesel car. I love it and don't want to change it, but I have changed my fuel to HVO (hydrotreated vegetable oil). It's a diesel substitute, a renewable low carbon fuel. Its footprint is only 10% of diesel. It is though currently 5c per litre more expensive, and for the 13300km I drove last year it will cost me €45 in the year more, but it will save 2.1 tonnes of my carbon footprint. So, when I assess my footprint again next year, I expect it will be 6.0 tonnes. I have still some low-lying fruit. We burn home heating oil, and we also have a timber stove where we burn our home-grown timber. We intend to change from home heating oil to HVO, as burners installed in the past decade, as ours was, can use it. But it will take months yet to burn through our current home heating oil before we can gain that benefit. Beyond that I don't

know what we will do next. I expect it will become increasingly more difficult and expensive. However, at our recent members' meeting we decided to share and learn from each other, so I trust we will learn from our friends as we will all be working towards similar ends. While we have made some reductions, we will be still releasing the remaining six tonnes to the atmosphere. We intend to offset that, but next year we will offset it through our active retirement association. It aims to offer advice and a service doing the necessary due diligence for offsetting. The cost to us for offsetting will be €20/tonne. Our total cost for this year will be 6 tonnes \times €20 = €120 for offsetting, €53 for the switch of electricity provider, and €45 for the more expensive motor fuel, a total cost this year of €218 (or €4.20/wk.). We are all living in different circumstances and have quite different priorities and opportunities. We were most fortunate that in our particular circumstances, we could, rather easily, reduce our footprint by one third, and for our first time we will be 'net carbon zero'. What we have done just suits us for now. We know that HVO is an interim step. It is not emissions free, like electric cars are. We know that some resolute environmentalists consider offsetting as greenwashing. They see it as a means of continuing our privileged lifestyle while paying others to do our responsibility. I disagree. It is our collective action that will matter, where or who performs positive actions is of lesser importance. But I know we are far from being pure. We plan to be progressively a bit better. Yet we think that it is the prudent response for our circumstances - for now. While we have resources, we have also to make provision for end-of-life health care eventualities. Being 'net carbon zero' is very important to me. I am incredibly grateful that we have the option of offsetting. I will be more than happy to do so. I am delighted too that we have offsetting options from which to choose. I know that I am primarily motivated by selfishness. I want relief from guilt, from having to countenance that I am still contributing to global warming which is already causing deaths among the most innocent, and which climate scientists expect will increasingly do so. I failed to care enough to see that my choices add to such negative impacts now and will continue to do so long after I am gone.

Macroom History Group SUMMARY OF ACTIVITY IN SEASON 2024-2025

Many years ago there was a very active Historical Society based in the old Church of Ireland schoolhouse at the bottom of Castle Street. However, after a period, that society became defunct. In April 2022 Jerry Kelleher and Seóamh Ó Críodáin/Joe Creedon, New Street, spoke to Dr. Con Kelleher who then approached a few people with the intention of re-starting a history society.

Macroom History Group was founded with the purpose of fostering, preserving and promoting Macroom and District's rich history and heritage. The Group and its activities are focal points for those interested in the area's past and provide a forum. It was decided to have a series of presentations/lectures/talks, with topics and events, locally or from farther afield that affected the life of the area. The Castle Hotel Management readily agreed provide a "home" for these events and they welcomed MHG with open arms. The running costs of room hire and provision of refreshments and audio and visual equipment etc. were agreed.

The first talk was given by Dr Con Kelleher on the 9 May 2022, the topic was the 'Kilgobnet Killings in 1922', an occurrence that could have changed the course of Irish history. The turnout was very encouraging and the admission fee was well received; apart from the talk, the attendees availed of tea/coffee and biscuits afterwards, thus providing a social forum for people to chat.

While the staging of 'talks' – twenty-two in all since May '22 – has been the Group's main area of activity, it also holds Macroom History Town Walks in the summer, organises an annual Macroom Schools History Exhibition in April/May, has just published the Macroom History Journal 2025 and is investigating the feasibility of a Famine Memorial in Macroom

Hospital Grounds. Macroom Union Workhouse was sited there, and saw indescribable death, misery and disrespect to our forebears. Many came, suffered and died unrecorded. Progress is slow in advancing the project, but we will persevere in our efforts.

The third season ran from 16 September 2024 to 15 April 2025 and the following talks were held:

16 Sept. 2024, - The O'Leary Clan and Inchigeela – Mr. Joe Creedon.

14 Oct. 2024, – Eastern Europe, Concept and Conflict – Ms. Bozena Cierlik.

05 Nov. 2024, – Rita Lynch, Macroom's Golden voiced Soprano – Ms. Mary Davies.

14 Jan. 2025, – The History of Climate Change – Ms. Hannah Daly.

11 Feb. 2025, – Macroom Golf Club, 1924-2025 – Mr. Jim Morris, Ms. Margaret Buckley and Dr. Con Kelleher spoke.

11 March 2025, – Macroom GAA and other local memorabilia – Mr. Dan Cronin.

The season concluded with the Macroom History Exhibition which this year saw the return of McGegan College, a very welcome addition to the other three schools.

04 July 2025, – At short notice and unexpectedly, Macroom's Mr Morgan McSweeney and British Prime Minister Sir Kier Starmer's chief- of- staff, discussed – The current state of politics in Britain, Europe and the world. Morgan gave a brilliant analysis on what is happening in Britain and the wider world.

All the talks were very well supported with more than 100 attending the Golf Club Centenary night. On a broader level, Dr Cierlik's talk on Eastern Europe and Prof. Hannah Daly's 'History of Climate Change' were informative, alarming and challenging.

The Town History walks were but modestly attended



and The Schools History Exhibition, thanks to Mick Walsh, was a resounding.

The Group strongly appreciates Rory Buckley's support and the Castle Hotel staff's courtesy at all times. We thank our speakers, committee members for giving freely and generously of their time.

Publishing a journal is a mammoth task and the Group is justly proud of its final product. Most responded very positively; the resulting volume will put on record many interesting events and personalities of the past. I especially thank, Brendan O'Brien, Douglas Kidd, my fellow editors, and Mary Crowley-Healy. At a gala launch, Mr Michael Looney, the Mayor of Blarney Macroom Municipal District spoke and presented copies of the journal to the contributors present. The others to speak were Brendan O'Brien, Con Kelleher, key-note speaker, Jim Cooney and Ms Maura Walsh, CEO, IRD Duhallow, who generously grant-aided the project. Dónal O'Callaghan (Pal, Paddy Murphy, Jonathan Hoare and Pat Barrett sponsored the launch; we thank them very sincerely.

The importance of local history, its collection and making available is an important task for any community. Macroom History Group has tasked itself for this work.

In the Library, local ecologist and songwriter, Laura McCarthy played guitar and launched her moving video which speaks of Nature in Crisis. She was accompanied by Tom Jordan on the clarinet, a haunting reminder for us to be aware of our threatened wildlife.

The Iron Age, The Early Medieval and Late Medieval Period were three contributions by local archeologist, Tony Miller.

Joe Creedon talked about the Daniel Corkery week, specifically inspiring us with his 'Reconciling History'. Once again I was able to provide readers with 'An update to Dominic's Dream for Currabeg Nursery.' 'The Importance of the Irish Oak', and 'Hedgerows-The Farmers's Special Friend' were very informative pieces as were,

'Vaccination and Herd Management Modern Solutions to controlling Transmission Badger to Cow T.B' and the piece on 'The N22 Bypass - A Road to Somewhere' encouraged us look at it through the eyes of nature, rather than just racing past.

The piece by Maria Healy "A Picture Tells a Thousand Words" demonstrated with poignant photographic skill how the Gearagh's past stays part of its present and future. You are still able to see her incredible exhibition, and buy a special print in Ionad Cultura, till the end of December.

MACROOM FC YEAR REVIEWED

A massive year for Macroom FC has come to a successful end with our new Astro Pitch and Community Walkway at Murrayfield now up and running.

We began this project back in 2021 when planning permission was sought. What followed was an extremely busy time into this year with fundraising, Sports Capital Grant application and drawdown, electrical capacity increase at Murrayfield, tender process just some of the many steps we had to take to bring this massive project to fruition. An Astro fundraising committee was formed and huge credit must go to these individuals who volunteered what seemed like unlimited time to get the project over the line. The Executive Committee of Macroom FC also provided continuous support and the larger club membership were also hugely supportive of our ambitious project.

The local business and public community have yet again been instrumental in supporting our fundraising efforts. We are so grateful to every single individual and business who have helped us out. What was clear from the outset was that everyone could see the huge advantages the Astro and Community Walkway would bring to the club,

to Macroom town and to the surrounding areas and this resulted in great support locally. Everyone could see that this was a good positive project that would improve our facilities and offer a better experience for young and old.

The chosen vendor, JN Cummins Premier Pitches, broke ground at Murrayfield in early Jun 2025. A huge body of work commenced with topsoil removal, stone infill, fencing and kerbing, floodlighting, electrical capacity increase, laying of shockpad and surface, dugouts and ballstops just some of the many activities undertaken. After just 4 months of a build the Astro was born and on Oct 11th we hosted our first competitive fixtures. Huge local interest followed and the amount of people who visited Murrayfield that weekend was fantastic. On Oct 13th we commenced weekly training under the floodlights and this has worked out brilliantly with over 700 members enjoying our new modern facility at our home ground of Murrayfield on a weekly basis. Football has been played at the venue for almost half a century and the future of the club and the sport we feel is now well secured locally with the new facilities. The Community Walkway is also proving to be very popular as it provides a safe walking route in Macroom for all and is also a perfect spot to watch training/matches.

An official opening will take place early in 2026. Our priority back in October was to get the kids and club

members on the Astro as soon as possible in advance of the official opening. This decision was the correct one based on the extremely positive feedback from our members and the general public. Further details on the opening will be shared in early 2026.

Our other club venue at the Town Park also received extensive upgrade works during last summer. This pitch is a vital piece of club infrastructure as we now have 35 teams in the club. Our grounds committee did fantastic work and the pitch was sanded and hotlined as well as being fully set with new grass seed. It was in top condition during Autumn. Although there has been extensive rain this winter, we expect the pitch to be in great condition come Spring which will be vital for the many fixtures Macroom FC hosts at both the Town Park and Murrayfield Astro.

On the field the club has had plenty of good days during 2025. Our Senior Women's side had a great win in the Kevin Barry cup final, beating Ballincollig at St Colman's Park, Cobh, a first adult trophy for the club since 2017. Our schoolgirls also had great success with the U13s winning the Bowl Cup and winning promotion. The U19 ladies won the league and reached the cup final while the U15 girls won the U15 Shield. The schoolboys section of the club is also thriving and our U12B and U13A boys both won promotion which was a brilliant achievement for both. There were also boys and girls teams who reached the open draw in National Cup/Trophy.

Aghabullogue footballers defeated fellow Muskerry men Uibh Laoire by the bare minimum to claim the McCarthy Insurance Group PIFC title at SuperValu Páirc Uí Chaoimh, a second county title in three seasons for them after winning the IAFC in 2023, and only losing last year's PIFC final after a replay.

This final could have gone either way and indeed looked to be heading for a replay with the teams level in regulation time but Matthew Bradley kicked a point for Aghabullogue two minutes into added time to bring the cup to Coachford and senior football to Aghabullogue for the first time ever.

Aghabullogue's Aaron O'Sullivan had the first point but it was more than matched by a two-pointer from Cathal Vaughan for Uibh Laoire. Aghabullogue had a goal after six minutes, Luke Casey had the easy task of tapping the ball into the net after Mathew Bradley's free dropped short and left to fall loose. Aghabullogue then conceded a goal, their first this championship season, when Vaughan's attempt from a distance fell nicely for Ian Jones who fisted the ball past Aghabullogue goalkeeper John Buckley, 1-2 to 1-1 to Ivelaeray after 10 minutes.

Casey did draw his side level, Aghabullogue were in control but weren't making their dominance tell on the scoreboard, five wides in the opening quarter. Mattie Bradley put the winners in front with a point from a '45', Chris Óg Jones replied with an Uibh Laoire point on 21, Cathal Vaughan kicked over a two-pointer from a free and when Chris Óg Jones palmed home a second goal set up by his brother Ian, 2-5 to 1-3 with five minutes to the break. Aghabullogue got a two-pointer from Adam Murphy, Casey added a point to leave Aghabullogue two points adrift at half-time, 2-5 to 1-6.

On into added time still level but Mathew Bradley broke the deadlock with a smashing point from a very sharp angle to continue the Aghabullogue inexorable rise towards the top of the football ladder as they now join the senior football ranks for the first time. Heady times in Coachford indeed and well celebrated!

Donoughmore 2-15 (2-3-9) Aghinagh 2-14 (2-2-10)

The never say die spirit of Donoughmore was rewarded in spectacular fashion in the Ross Oil Mid Cork Junior Football championship final replay at Macroom when they came from being seven points down in the 56th minute to score 2-2 without reply in a sensational finish to take the title for the fifth time ever and the first since 2011. The Donoughmore team and supporters were delirious at the final whistle, Aghinagh in shock, as victory was snatched from the latter's grasp in the cruellest of fashion after they looked to be heading for victory as the game neared its conclusion.

Once again, the two teams contributed to a wonderful game of football, played before another huge and enthusiastic attendance and the pity was that there had to be a loser, doubly tough on Aghinagh who lost last year's final, again in a replay, also by a point. Conditions at Macroom were excellent, with little wind and the expected rains held off until the second half. Aghinagh playing into the town goal opened the scoring with a Seán O'Riordan point, Scott Barrett equalised for the winners and Declan Keating put them in front. As Donoughmore continued to force the pace, a foul on Adam Dinan resulted in a free from which Gavin O'Sullivan kicked over a two-pointer, 0-4 to 0-1 to Donoughmore after eight minutes. Aghinagh gradually began to get to grips with matters and in the 12th minute Con Buckley kicked a two-pointer from play and then the excellent Liam Twohig had Aghinagh in front from another two-pointer from play. Twohig now added

two more points from play and in the 21st minute Aghinagh struck for the opening goal of the game, Luke O'Leary's long delivery collected by Gearóid O'Sullivan who in turn put Twohig clear inside the defender and the Aghinagh sharpshooter finished sublimely to the net to put Aghinagh in control, leading 1-9 to 0-4.

In the three minutes before the break, Donoughmore at last broke the seven-score sequence of Aghinagh with a point from Seán O'Hanlon followed by a two-pointer free from Gavin O'Sullivan and then a point from a Declan Keating free, all of which improved their situation considerably leaving them four points adrift now, 1-9 to 0-8, but with wind to favour them in the second half.

On the resumption, Aghinagh consolidated their position with three points in a row, two from Liam Twohig frees and one from play by Con Buckley, which opened the gap between the teams to seven points by the 39th minute. Back came Donoughmore with a point from a Gavin O'Sullivan free followed by a two-pointer from another free, rather needlessly conceded, a four point gap again at the three quarter mark.

Aghinagh were to restore their dominance before being hit by a late Donoughmore tsunami which few could have foreseen. The final stages were incredibly exciting. When Cummins took a pass from Aodh Twomey on 55 and fired home a goal to give Aghinagh a 2-14 to 0-13 lead it seemed that the destination of the title had been decided and few would have disputed that on the run of play that it was not deserved.

'Keep going lads' was the Donoughmore mantra and the team dug deep and produced a stunning response. Declan Keating pointed a free in the 58th minute and immediately after only a superb double save by the Aghinagh goalkeeper Jason McCarthy denied Gavin O'Sullivan and then Kevin O'Connell of a goal. Donoughmore kept up their offensive, and a high ball into the crowded Aghinagh goalmouth was punched to the net by midfielder Seán O'Hanlon, 2-14 to 1-14 now with the clock almost at the end of regulation time. Donoughmore needed a goal to survive and were almost in again when a close range ground shot went across the Aghinagh goal before going just inches wide. Donoughmore were not to be denied and in the next attack in a situation identical to the circumstances of the previous goal Daniel Forde kicked another high ball into the

Aghinagh goalmouth and incredibly it was Seán O'Hanlon who again rose highest and punched the ball to the net to level the scores. Donoughmore were in raptures at the change in fortunes and went in search of a winner, urged on by their supporters in full cry. Centre forward Gavin O'Sullivan, later named Man of the Match, delivered the knock out blow for Donoughmore from a '45' sent confidently over the bar despite the pressure and when Aghinagh failed to capitalise on one last opportunity, the final whistle blew and the extreme contrasts in the emotions of the respective camps was so telling.

Grenagh were a much improved team in the second half and shared the scoring tally equally with their opponents but there was never any likelihood of Ballinora losing their tight grip and in Ben Mayer they had an ace sharpshooter, the young Ballinora man scoring 0-15 of his side's total, displaying unerring accuracy from twelve frees from all sorts of distances, his performance earning him the Player of the Match award.

Conditions at Coachford were good, the heavy overnight rains having ceased and there was little wind blowing. Playing into the village goal, Ballinora had a good start, a point from Liam Lyons followed by two points from Ben Mayer frees in the first five minutes, and when Mayer had pointed another free and added a point from play within a further three minutes it was clear that the champions were on song and Grenagh were visibly struggling to contain them.

Dan Twomey had an opening point for Grenagh from a 50m free in the 10th minute but Ballinora struck back with a point from a glorious Seán Lyons side-line cut on 14 followed by a Ben Mayer pointed free from inside his own '65' and as the champions continued to apply the pressure, Darragh Corkery fired over two fine scores to leave his side leading by 0-9 to 0-1 after twenty minutes.

Ballinora had control of the middle third of the field at this stage with captain Shane Kingston at centre back, flanked by Mark O'Brien and Colin O'Flynn, giving huge support to Liam Lyons and Tommy Burns at midfield, ably assisted by half forwards Darragh Holmes, Danny Dineen and Seán Lyons. Grenagh were under constant pressure and Kelvin Cummins, Paul Barry Murphy and Alex Kiely were resisting strongly but the waves of attack kept coming and fouling was a costly exercise for Grenagh with Mayer in such top form from frees from all distances.

Grenagh free taker Dan Twomey hit over two points to break the Ballinora sequence but in the five minutes before the break Seán Lyons took a classy point from play, followed by another from Darragh Holmes and Ben Mayer made it 0-12 to 0-3 with the final score of the first half from a free on the half way line. Ballinora looked to be the better team and on the road to victory.

To their credit and true to their tradition, Grenagh put in a much improved second half performance and made the Ballinora men stay focussed to the finish. Grenagh points from Robert Coleman, Seán Joyce and Dan Twomey were matched in each case by points from Mayer frees for Ballinora, two from long distance, and Mayer had brought his points tally from frees to ten with two more by the three quarter mark, 0-17 to 0-6 now the score.

A Grenagh point from Twomey was answered by Darragh Holmes and in the 50th minute a well struck Grenagh penalty was stopped by a marvellous save by Ballinora 'keeper Barry Crowley, another indication that this was not going to be Grenagh's day?

The stout Ballinora defence was eventually

breached in the 55th minute when a loose ball in the goalmouth was lashed to the net by Grenagh's substitute Brian Walsh and Seán Joyce added a fine score from a distance but inevitably Ben Mayer answered these and when Joyce added two more for Grenagh, Mayer was on hand again with a another brace to cap a fine individual performance as his team took its 11th Muskerry title.

Roinn Mhuscraí – Annual General Meeting 2025
Comhdháil Bhliantúil 2025 of Muskerry GAA division marked the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the divisional structures in the Cork and this year's AGM (formerly 'Convention') was held in the Town Hall Macroom, the venue for the first meeting in 1925. The meeting was hosted by Macroom GAA and its Cathaoirleach Michael Creed welcomed the delegates to Macroom, praised the divisional officers, club members and the multitude of volunteers in the various GAA clubs in the division who collectively have done so much for the betterment of the sporting and social life of the people in the area.

Muskerry Board Cathaoirleach John Feeney (Dripsey), who like the Runáí Enda Linehan (Inniscarra) and Board PRO Anne O'Riordan (Cloughduv), was standing down as per rule after five years in office, in his final address to the delegates spoke of the beginnings of the divisional board in 1925, soon after the War of Independence and the bitter Civil War which followed and paid tribute to the pioneering officers who led the division in those early difficult years.

The Cathaoirleach went on to thank the players, selectors and clubs for the progress made in recent years in getting Muskerry senior hurlers and senior footballers back near the top in the divisional section of the county championship and said that a full strength Muskerry team is a quality senior team and the evidence was there (in county championship

results) that players improve through playing senior and their clubs benefit subsequently as these players become leaders on the field.

The U21 H and F situation in the view of John Feeney is a problem area for the GAA in Cork. The recent decision of the Co Board that U21 championships cannot start before July 1st will cause conflict in clubs preparing for adult championships at that time of year in his opinion.

The Muskerry Awards, honouring outstanding performances of players from clubs within the Muskerry division, has been a great success and 11 recipients of the awards will be honoured at the Annual Awards Dinner in the Talbot Hotel in January. The Cathaoirleach thanked the generosity of the sponsors of the various competitions and undertakings of Bord Mhuscraí and credited the healthy financial position of the Board to the Cisteoir Diarmuid Kirwan (Éire Óg) and the invaluable contributions of the sponsors.

The Cathaoirleach thanked his fellow officers for their work over the past year and was fulsome in his praise of the Runáí, Enda Linehan and PRO Anne O'Riordan, both standing down after five years exceptional service on the executive and expressed the hope that their talents would not be lost to the division.

The report of Runáí Enda Linehan (carried in the previous LV Outlook edition) was as always very comprehensive and Cisteoir Diarmuid Kirwan's report showed that the finances are in a healthy position with improved revenues and Surplus for the year and increased deposit figures with in the Croke Park account.





Where does time go?

Why are we complaining that there is not enough time?

Surely we should all have more time on our hands with all the convenience associated with labour-saving devices?

If we were to reflect for a moment on the time saved in the modern era by having made so much technological progress we should all be people of leisure. Devices such washing machines and dryers have cut down on the hours of manually washing clothes, and think of the hours saved by not having to walk or travel on horseback, the time spent on cooking or baking with the wide availability of ready made meals or takeaways, the instant shower instead of the long bath, even machinery like power mowers and hedge cutters etc. The list goes on. Surely there's more time to share and enjoy! But no - we are as busy as ever.

Why do we find ourselves saying so often to others - "I don't have the time." So where does 'saved time' go? We keep telling ourselves we are saving time but we don't know what to do with it when free time comes our way.

Our homemade remedy - and our problem - is that we fill in the gaps. We take on more tasks or projects in the time saved, not less. We are restless with free time and have created false busyness. The phone apps also fill in the gaps in our day.

We don't know what to do constructively or creatively when free time comes unexpectedly. Usually we are so exhausted we spend a lot of it sleeping - catching up. And then it's back to the fray. Our phones are better charged than we are.

We have less quality time for others, especially those living alone. I recall with sadness calling regularly to a lady who lived alone in a big town. As I would get up to leave in late morning at the monthly appointed visit, she would say resignedly - "thanks for coming, Father, no one else will call today."

Time of course must be made for rest in our hectic lives or it will be made for us when we collapse with exhaustion or burnout.

But even so it can, admittedly, be hard to keep still. Activity suggests productivity, progress and meaning. We long for - and yet also ironically resent - having more to do.

What if you're forced to stop and rest?

Think of the long hours of mind-numbing boredom today being endured by those in hospitals or nursing homes with no-one to visit. Do we ever think that one day those beds await us? What will it be like when no one calls? Can we empathize and make that overdue visit to a neglected relative? I remember visiting my Dad in a nursing home. It was hard going as he was steadily declining over the passing months, but one could detect the sad, maybe resentful envy of other residents as the attending staff would announce for all to hear over the loud communal television blaring quiz shows, "Mr McCarthy, your son is here to see you." They all lowered their heads in sad disappointment. It was as if my Dad had won the Lotto as far as they were concerned.

I recall during a sabbatical that the day came when I had nothing on my schedule I was actually "bored." I was no longer a parish priest and phone calls had stopped coming. There were no meetings or fixed schedule in my day. Time was my own. It was 2019 and it eerily anticipated the sometimes unearthly silence of our quieter world during COVID in 2020. But even then when we were forced to stop and there was a reprieve from endless Brexit news or of wars or rumours of war, we still found ourselves worried or made feel anxious by COVID numbers. It's like we were so used to worrying about the fate of the world we needed to be distracted by drip-feed bad news. We found it hard to sit still by ourselves for very long. Boredom was often the creeping feared enemy - not the virus.

The bottom line is that we have forgotten what time is for - or more importantly who it is for.

Few people on their death bed regret not having spent more time in the office.

We might already regret not having spent more time with others who are no longer with us. It's time to re-prioritize our nearest and dearest, and to no longer keep them waiting.

But don't forget time for yourself, and give God a call sometime too! That means making some time - to pray.
