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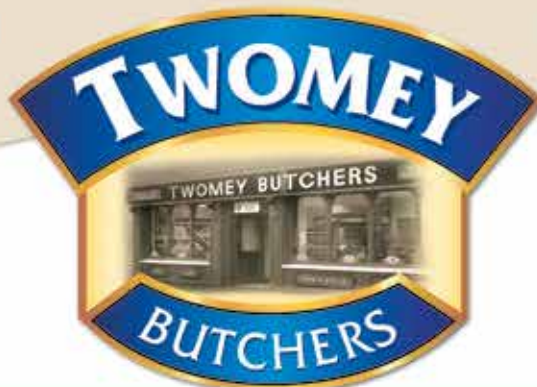

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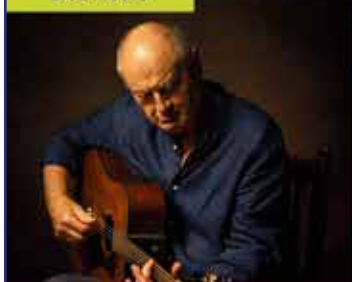

Sustainability – Doing More with Less

Sustainability is an important part of Macroom's Tidy Towns Annual Submission, and there are many simple ways that we can all help to reduce waste in our communities. One action where we can make a real difference is by reducing our use of single-use plastic and takeaway cups.

It is estimated that approximately 22,000 non-recyclable cups are used in Ireland every hour. Because many takeaway cups are made from a combination of paper and plastic, they can be difficult to recycle. Choosing a reusable cup instead is a small change that can have a big impact.

Real Cup, Real Cork Campaign

Two local women, Sofia Kalia and Ailis Crowley, together with Orla McAndrew and Cathy Fitzgibbon, have launched the Real Cup, Real Cork Campaign. The campaign aims to reduce the use of single-use takeaway cups across Cork.

The initiative ran throughout July and is continuing during August. It encourages coffee lovers to bring their own reusable cup when buying a coffee, rather

than choosing a single-use cup. It is a simple action that, when repeated by many people, can significantly reduce the amount of waste produced.

Reusable Cups for Community Events

IRD Duhallow is also working to reduce the use of single-use cups at small-scale community events and festivals across the southern region. A new community-based cup-washing service has been established at IRD Duhallow. The service provides a reusable cup rental system for not-for-profit community events and festivals. The cups can be washed, dried and reused up to 300 times, helping to significantly reduce the amount of waste generated at events.

The cups are cleaned and stored at a dedicated washing facility at IRD Duhallow. The organisation is also currently seeking a Circular Cups Assistant at the James O'Keeffe Institute in Newmarket through the Community Employment Scheme.

Macroom Leisure Centre – Reusable Party Packs

Macroom Leisure Centre has introduced a reusable party pack for birthday parties and events held at the centre.

The reusable pack includes: Cups, Plates, Bowls, Cutlery, Jugs, Buntings etc.

The initiative was introduced in April 2026, and the response has been very positive. Since its introduction, 27 birthday parties have used the reusable kits, helping to reduce waste while keeping parties easy and affordable.

The reusable party pack was introduced to the Leisure Centre by Cork County Council's Environmental Office as part of a project being delivered in collaboration with a number of other local authorities. Macroom Leisure Centre was selected to take part in the pilot because it hosts a large number of birthday parties, charity events and public events throughout the year.

It is a simple change, but the impact quickly adds up. Instead of disposable items being used once and thrown away, the reusable items can be washed and used again and again. When this is repeated across dozens of events, it can make a significant difference to the amount of waste produced.

Reusable Coffee Cups in Macroom

There are also a number of local businesses in Macroom offering reusable coffee cups:

These local initiatives show that sustainability does not always require major changes, small practical steps can make a real difference.

By working together as a community and doing more with less, we can reduce waste, cut down on single-use plastics and make Macroom a more sustainable place for everyone.

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Could Your Headaches Be Coming From Your Neck?

Your neck is one of the most common areas where tension can build before spreading into the head, shoulders or upper back. When the upper neck becomes stiff or overloaded, the surrounding muscles may tighten, and that tension can be felt at the base of the skull, across the temples, behind the eyes or into the shoulders.

Signs Your Neck May Be Involved

Your neck may be contributing if you notice:

- Stiffness at the base of the skull
- Tight shoulders or upper back tension
- Headaches after desk work or phone use
- Reduced movement when turning your head
- Headaches after driving or sitting
- Relief from rubbing the neck or shoulders

These signs do not always mean the neck is the only cause, but they may suggest it is part of the picture.

Simple Things To Try First

A few small changes may help reduce neck tension:

- Raise your screen so you are not constantly looking down
- Take short movement breaks every 30-40 minutes

- Gently turn your head from side to side during the day
- Stretch your chest and shoulders if you sit for long periods
- Drink water regularly and avoid skipping meals
- Use a pillow that keeps your head in line with your spine

Please avoid forcing your neck to crack or using massage guns directly on the neck, as this area is sensitive.

When To Look Deeper

If your headaches or neck tension keep returning despite making these changes, there may be an underlying issue with how your neck, posture or nervous system is functioning.

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KILMURRY MUSEUM MARKS A DECADE WITH A CELEBRATION OF ITS VOLUNTEERS

When the doors of the Independence Museum Kilmurry opened in 2016, it marked the realisation of a dream years in the making — a purpose-built home for one of the most important stories in Irish history, right here in the Lee Valley. Ten years on, the museum is celebrating that milestone in the most fitting way possible: by honouring the people who made it all happen.

The story of the collection itself goes back much further, to a small museum first opened in the village in 1965 by a group of local people who recognised that artefacts of the area's past were at risk of being lost forever. That original collection, built up over decades by dedicated volunteers, is the foundation everything since has been built on.

"Ten years in this building is something the whole community can be proud of," said Terry Datson, chairperson of Independence Museum Kilmurry. "It's built on the work of everyone who came before us too, but this year, we celebrate the volunteers who've carried it forward through this chapter — quietly and without fuss, week after week, giving up their time because they believed this story mattered. This museum belongs to them as much as it belongs to Kilmurry, and this is our chance to say thank you."

In August, the museum is hosting a special invite-only

gathering for the volunteers, supporters and friends who have given their time, energy and enthusiasm over the past decade. It will be a chance for those involved to come together, reflect on what has been achieved, and celebrate the community spirit that has always been at the heart of Kilmurry's unique museum. The evening will include presentations looking back at the journey since the building first opened its doors — the exhibitions developed, the thousands of visitors welcomed, the stories told and the milestones reached. It is a story worth telling, and one that belongs to everyone who has played a part in it.

Ireland's only purpose-built, volunteer-run museum of its kind, it tells the story of the War of Irish Independence alongside the rich tapestry of life across the Lee Valley across the generations. None of it would have been possible without the extraordinary support of people from right across the Lee Valley, whose volunteering, donations and local knowledge have shaped the museum from its earliest days to what it is today. Since 2016, the museum has grown steadily, drawing visitors from across Ireland and further afield, eager to explore both this pivotal period in Irish history and the wider local heritage that surrounds it. Alongside its core historical collection, the museum houses a wide range of artefacts and materials reflecting local rural

life, tradition and community — a living record of this corner of Cork and its people, gathered and preserved by the very communities it represents.

None of it would have been possible without the volunteers, who week after week, year after year, have given their time freely and with great dedication — the museum's success a direct reflection of that commitment.

The anniversary falls during Béal na Bláth commemoration weekend, and the museum will be open on the day of the commemoration itself for anyone visiting the area.

While the anniversary gathering itself is a private occasion for those who have contributed to the museum's story, the public is warmly invited to visit at a later date, when a revised exhibition marking the museum's first ten years in the building will go on display — a chance for everyone to share in the milestone.

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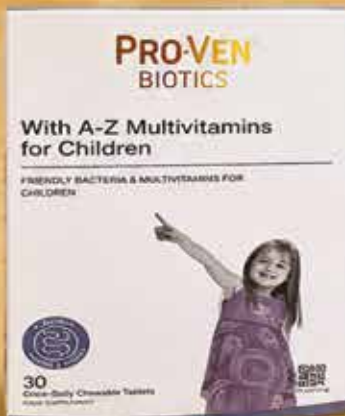
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MACROOM HISTORY GROUP (MHG)

Despite this, she continued to make clandestine trips to the

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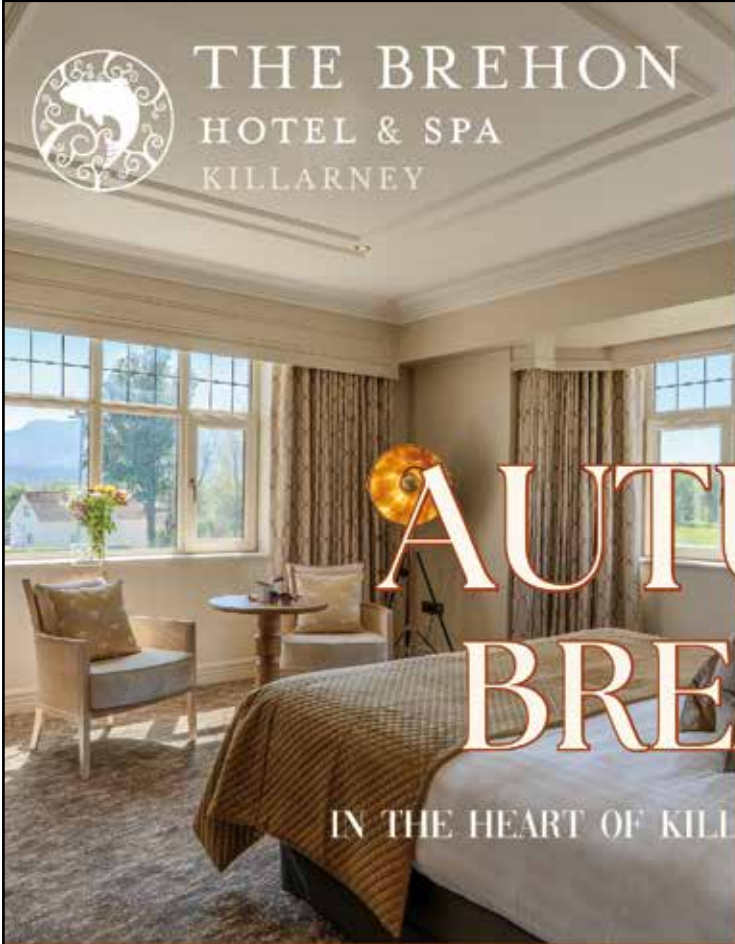
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THINK GLOBALLY, **ACT LOCALLY****Farming and Climate Change**

The weather in Ireland has always been challenging due to our unpredictable oceanic climate, but one thing used to be for sure: rain is on the way and the grass will grow. However, climate change had other ideas on its agenda for 2026; a terribly wet spring followed by an unprecedented drought. It has hit the farming community hard. Luckily down here in Macroom we have now had some respite, but much of the country is still experiencing a soil water deficit. Resilience to climate change is now a must on Irish farms, and there is a natural solution that can help buffer the impacts of extreme weather events: trees.

Irish farm advisers and training bodies like Teagasc have spent decades improving farm efficiency, but this has come at a cost. Hedgerows have been removed and field boundaries expanded to allow for regular paddock layouts, which means farmers can monitor grass production, ostensibly keeping costs down. But this only works while optimal conditions prevail. As we are seeing, the impact of climate change is more pronounced and costly than expected. Extreme weather events are becoming the norm and adaptation is going to prove the difference between survival and failure.

This summer's drought was the longest in our recent history and the second time in the past decade when extreme heat threatened a fodder crisis. The cost of supplementary feeding was borne in 2018 by high milk prices, so farmers weren't necessarily out of pocket by much. That is no longer the case as prices have fallen significantly and farms serving large debts will be under severe financial pressure. Added to this, there is the animal welfare aspect of putting herds of cattle out onto shadeless paddocks in blistering heat.

Trees can help in a myriad of ways. They provide shade and shelter from both heat and cold. Tree roots stabilise soil, preventing nutrient loss or erosion, especially during flooding events. If excess nutrients are accidentally applied, or the grass cannot absorb the correct amount, the trees can recycle these nutrients in their winter leaf-fall, rather than allowing them to run off into watercourses where they would act as pollutants.

Furthermore, trees stabilise ground temperatures, creating a microclimate at their base which is cool in times of extreme heat, and warm in colder weather. This has been shown to extend the grazing season on Irish farms where silvopasture (trees with pasture)

systems were studied by experts such as Jim McAdam and the Council for Forest Research and Development (COFORD). While increased shade from trees can reduce the peak growth spurts normally seen in grass swards, improved soil structure and stability means that grazing can be extended well beyond normal periods.

Cattle are more sophisticated animals than is often thought and, given the choice, they can balance their own diet by browsing hedgerows. Trace minerals and secondary metabolites unavailable in high-productivity grass swards can be found in the various herbs and plants that grow in natural borders, and cattle will seek out anything they are lacking. Willow and oak are high in tannins, which have anthelmintic properties, meaning they can help animals to fight parasites. Willow also contains cobalt and salicylic acid, a natural anti-inflammatory, which helps with lameness and other infections.

Tree planting on farms also has the obvious advantage of an additional cash crop, as well-managed trees can be harvested at intervals for timber. Many native varieties like oak, ash, birch and alder, will quickly regenerate from the stump after cutting and, like naturalised species such as sweet chestnut (*Castanea sativa*), can provide straight-grained timber suitable for long-lasting fence posts and many other uses. While grants for agroforestry (another word for silvopasture) are currently quite generous, farmers are understandably cautious about planting up productive land. But land managed for silvopasture is found to be 42% more productive than open pasture,

because of the added value trees bring. It's worth seriously considering.

Ireland already has some of the lowest tree cover in Europe but we do have an extensive hedgerow network that provides habitat for wildlife and protection for livestock and crops. Unfortunately many hedgerows are removed annually or excessively cut back and degraded. But this valuable natural heritage is a great starting point. Measures like native tree planting along boundaries while restoring existing hedgerows, along with careful rotational cutting, coppicing and hedge-laying techniques can strengthen on-farm resilience.

Good hedgerow management

Hedgerows need to be wide at the base to support more nesting birds and to provide shelter and a barrier to livestock breaking out.

Discuss with your contractor about alternative maintenance

Cut in a rotation (every 3-4 years, lightly) rather than annually.

Cut ideally between Dec-Jan (fruit usually all eaten by overwintering birds by now), allow regrowth to about 3m.

Aim for thickness; a wide base tapering to a triangular top, or 'A' shape, rather than a

box or flat topped hedge. This helps birds without impacting road visibility.

Hedge laying in future years could help return structure as well as supplementary plantings.

Cork 2-14 Galway 0-19

Cork reclaimed the All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship as a second half surge saw them dethrone Galway by 2-14 to 0-19 at Croke Park.

The Rebels missed out on the three-in-a-row last year, against the same opposition, but second half goals from Saoirse McCarthy and Orlaith Cahalane saw them get their hands on the O'Duffy Cup for the 31st time.

The Tribeswomen were looking to win back-to-back titles for the first time ever, and they were on top in the first half but the Rebels were good value for their win, holding off a late surge from Galway in front of a record crowd for a camogie final of 33,419 on Jones' Road.

It was a tense opening half, with the teams level on four occasions. Galway's Niamh Niland hit the first score of the day. Cork began to grow into the contest and frees from Amy O'Connor and Saoirse McCarthy had them ahead for the first time in the sixth minute. But the theme of the first half was one of, 'whatever Cork threw at Galway, Galway had the answer'. In

that vein, a brace of Caoimhe Kelly frees nudged the Connacht women back in front, with Carrie Dolan stretching their lead with another score from a placed ball.

It took Cork 17 minutes to score from play, a fine point from Sorcha MacCartan, which came after an O'Connor free, points which brought the sides level once more.

Dolan and Niland for Galway, and O'Connor and McCartan for Cork, traded scores but the westerners upped the ante, as Aoife Donohue, Derval Higgins and Kelly moved them three clear, before O'Connor's fourth free of the half left the gap at two at half time. At that stage, the defending champions looked slightly the better side, but the second half was to be a different affair.

Cork started the second half on top and they were level as the game ticked into its 34th minute, with Emma Murphy and Laura Hayes getting the scores.

Galway had a response as Dolan fired a free over the bar from the middle of the park, but the Munster women were looking sharp, and Orlaith Cahalane equalised for them once more a short while later.

The Rebels moved ahead as McCartan smashed over her third from play but Niamh McPeake's first of the afternoon had the sides level for the seventh and final time.

Cork were playing with much more intent and they would score the first goal of the game - and the first

goal Galway have conceded in championship 2026 - as Saoirse McCarthy ran at the heart of the Galway defence before smashing the ball at Sarah Healy, who could only help it into the net.

In a blow to Galway, Ciara Hickey came off injured after a clash of legs in the middle of the park, but Niland hit a score to settle their nerves.

But Cork smelled blood, and Orlaith Cahalane scored their second goal, getting on the end of a flick by McCartan to take the sliotar on the run before burying the ball into the bottom right corner with just under 15 minutes to go.

Galway needed scores and Donohue provided one but Amy O'Connor slotted a free, before McCartan smashed over her fourth of the day. McCarthy scored the next point, Galway replied with five minutes of added time announced.

A brace of Dolan frees cut the gap to two as the game entered its last minute, with a chance at the death for Sarah Healy from a free outside the 21, which she blasted over the bar faced by a simply packed goalmouth.

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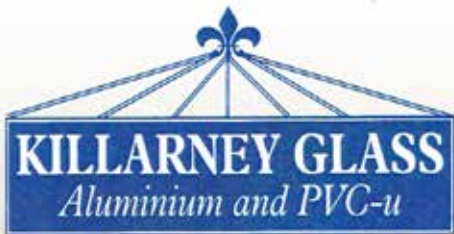
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A Word of Victory

"Catch the foxes for us, the little foxes that spoil the vineyards, for our vineyards are in blossom" (Song of Solomon 2:15).

Welcome back dear student, the amount of information we have to deal with on a daily basis is huge. Our hearts and minds have to filter so much heartbreaking news, pettiness, criticism, along with many frightening reports. It takes a lot of energy just to keep up with it all. Not to mention dealing with work, finances, child rearing, and keeping the whole show on the road. The level of negativity is overwhelming, which is why many are struggling with their mental health (Matthew 11:28-30). When you left the schoolyard or workplace years ago, you went home to rest, but now there's no switch off, and very little downtime. The feeling of misplacing one's phone creates a panic until it's back in the hand – in case we miss something important! We are sincere in our feelings of wanting to support others by answering endless calls, and messages, not to mention reading multitudes of headlines, but it's hard to know when to cut off. From every side we are being bombarded with suggestions of how we should be reacting to this or that, causing people to fear responding in the wrong way in case they get cancelled or mocked online. Now we have to navigate through such a hazardous maze of emotions, strife, and toxicity with the result that many are dealing with the effects or symptoms of complete burnout and exhaustion. Filtering effectively has become a strong personal skillset to learn.

The saying 'the straw that broke the camel's back' is relevant here. One can take so much and then reach the tipping point, where the body or heart gives out and says, 'I can't take any more'. In the lead Scripture above Solomon, who was the wisest king ever, identified the potential destruction that a build-up of things that should be confronted and dealt with, can have on one's relationships and future. The vine represents fruitfulness and harvest. Every gardener knows that you have to be watchful for dangerous pests and conditions that can wipe out your hard work in a single night. Years ago, a young child I knew spent his pocket money on buying a few chickens – seeing an opportunity to make money from selling eggs – only to have his hopes dashed when the fox paid a visit and wiped out all his investment. The trauma was huge for such a young boy to take in - not to mention the financial fallout! A hard lesson was learned - the fencing wasn't secure enough to keep out the danger of the fox. Foxes appear cute and harmless to the non-farmers among us, but they are masters of opportunity.

Boundaries are vital, in every part of life. Personal boundaries are being compromised more and more. Our enemy the devil uses subtle means to steal, kill, and destroy. If he appeared as the world comically portrays him – wearing a red suit with horns and a pitchfork, most folks would recognise him, and steer well clear (1 Peter 5:7-9). So, his tactics are to create busyness doing nothing - stealing time; creating strife and offence out of nothing - dividing people (Matthew 12:25). Focussing accusations and condemnation against God's creation, and diluting faith by promoting false gospels. Daniel foresaw the enemy defy God by oppressing His people, wearing them out (Daniel 7:25). There is a great delusion and falling away prophesied friend (2 Thessalonians 2:3-12). The battlefield is becoming harder to identify. Be watchful, spend time studying God's Word (Proverbs 4:20-23). Mend the weak fences, confront and get rid of the little foxes, and keep them out. Protect your mind and heart, for God has invested much in you!

CAFÉ CONVERSATIONS

It's a sure sign of our culture when you can divide the population into those who wear earphones in public, those who want to wear earplugs, and those who need to wear hearing aids.

You might think I'm nosy but it can be hard not to overhear those who have to talk loudly or repeat what is being said in cafés because of hearing aids.

It's hard to resist when the conversation at a nearby table begins with "do you know what I heard?" You squirm in your seat with delight and subtly cock your head in their direction.

Is it a uniquely Cork phrase I wonder when someone responds in astonishment to some news with 'Go away' pronounced 'go 'way?'

The volume and intonation of "go 'way" is a giveaway regarding the kind of news being heard. If "go 'way" is accompanied by a squeal of delight, it's usually good news like an engagement or the birth of a child. If "go 'way" is greeted with ordinary volume it's usually bad news; and "go 'way" uttered in a whisper indicates that the news item is pretty juicy stuff but sadly, frustratingly out of earshot.

Other counties and countries have their own versions such as 'go on', 'well, I never', or 'oh I say' or 'that beats Banagher.' The American equivalent is 'get out of here' which, like 'go 'way' is not to be taken literally!

It's a little comical when you or I overhear older people's usually loud unfiltered topics of conversation of what medication or diet they are on. There are plenty of war stories in the area of health, such as the kind of ailments they have, what their doctor recommends, comparisons in medication or scars, hospital treatments after long waits in A and E, physiotherapy etc

I have come to the realization to my horror that I've become 'one of them.' As I get a bit creakier I increasingly hear of relatives, friends, or fellow clergy in and out of hospitals. If you have ever said or heard in relation to illness "you who know who has (had) that?" then you're a member of the 'getting older and feeling it" club.

These sometimes caring and endearing conversations are not all about 'sickness and health.' Like the wedding vows, conversations cover other possibilities such as 'better or worse', 'richer or poorer' and 'till death do we part.'

In the case of the latter, maybe it's a uniquely Irish thing when your ears prick up in a public setting to hear the words 'do you know who's dead?' Or 'do you know what they died of?' Or the clincher: 'I saw it on rip.ie.'

Ironically, we have no shortage of tea or coffee at home to drink to our hearts content. We really never have to leave home to quench our thirst when you think about it. But to quench our curiosity, that's another thing.

So where and when we next meet up?

(Don't forget your hearing aids.)
